### Dr. Alvin Price Named New Dean of Veterinary Medicine

Alvin A. Price, a 39-year-old professor of veterinary medicine at Texas A. & M. College, was named last Friday as the new dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine at A. & M. His election was upon recommendation of the president of A. & M., approval of M. T. Harrington.

The new dean succeeds Dean W. W. Armistead, who recently resigned to become dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine at Michigan State University. Price is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Price of Hico. A young scientist and administrator who was chosen from the schools of veterinary medicine in the nation, made a slow climb to the top. He first attended Tarleton State College at Stephenville, where he graduated with his B.S. degree in 1940 in the field of Dairy Husbandry. He then attended a Lock Haven University from graduation until 1942. He served as an Infantry Commander in the African American and Middle Eastern wars, where he earned six medals and was promoted to battalion commander. Price returned to A. & M. College as a veterinarian in 1944 and enrolled in the School of Veterinary Medicine. He received his D. V. M. degree in 1948 and stayed on at A. & M. College as an instructor in Veterinary Medicine. He worked meanwhile on his degree in Veterinary Medicine which he received in 1956. Price has crowded much professional activity into the eight years since he received his Veterinary degree. He served as acting dean of the veterinary anatomy department in 1950, was a delegate to the House of Representatives of the American Veterinary Association in 1952-53, serving also as executive secretary and editor of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association. He was president of the Texas association in 1956 and president of the American Association of Veterinary Anatomists in 1957-58. He served during this time as president of the Phi Zeta and Phi Kappa Phi honorary fraternities at A. & M.

Dr. Price was one of 1000 faculty members selected for awards by the Association of Former Students for distinguished service in teaching at the college.

### Heart O' Texas Fair Offers Complimentary Tickets to Students

Hamilton County school children will be given complimentary gate tickets to the Heart O' Texas Fair in Waco on opening day, Saturday, September 28th.

A total of 64,000 complimentary tickets will be distributed through the schools of 13 Central Texas Counties. The day has been named in honor of the FFA, 4-H Club and FHA and judging of junior show steers, pigs and lambs will take place.

The opening event of the fifth annual fair will be the Western parade in downtown Waco at 10 a.m. Among the attractions free to all on the grounds each day will be "Atoms for Peace," elaborate exhibit arranged by the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission; 118-foot dive by Sol Solomon on the Midway; entertainment on the outdoor stage; livestock, Women's Department displays, Armed Forces exhibit, antique automobiles and zoo.

The first performance of the rodeo, starring Eddie Dean, will be in the Coliseum opening night, with U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough officially opening the show.

## Water Board Hears Plea for Local Project

An enthusiastic, overflow crowd thronged the 29th District Courtroom in Stephenville Tuesday afternoon in support of the bid for high priority on the Bosque watershed flood prevention program by the Upper Bosque Water Control and Improvement District at a hearing held by members of the State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

WCID Pres. Fred McCleskey led the presentation of local support for the project and drew the compliments of board members for preparation and presentation of the local arguments in support of the bid.

In addition to McCleskey, other local supporters, in the order of their appearance on the program included Odie Patsick, T. A. Randalls and Mrs. Guy Aycock of Hico, Mrs. B. J. Pruett, Chad Winters,

Joe Jarrett, J. C. Jurney, Stephenville Mayor J. Louis Evans, Mrs. C. L. Jarrell of Stephenville, Rufus F. Higgs, Dr. Vance Terrell, County Judge Dale Harbin, Estil Moser and Ben Chambers.

The speakers in behalf of the project, in the order of their appearance, related conditions in the watershed from its southern extremities below Hico to the northernmost drainage area above Huckabay.

Board Chairman Arthur Leach of Boerne and member J. C. Porter of Wichita Falls expressed appreciation of the fact that many of those speaking in behalf of the project owned property in the uplands that would not necessarily benefit directly from the program and complimented the speakers on their presentation of the data.

Other board members and state Soil Conservation Service officials at the hearing were board members Ernest Wehman of Palestine and Sid Payne of Tulsa, E. W. Buchtlen of Waco, chairman of the watershed protection planning party, and Carl Spencer, SCS executive director of Temple. Board member J. S. Sharp of Paris was unable to attend due to illness.

The board will have a meeting on the night of Sept. 17, following the completion of their inspection tour, to determine the order of priority to be assigned to the 30-odd watersheds applying for assignment of a planning party that have advanced preparations as far as possible prior to the assignment of the planning party.

Over 100 watersheds throughout the state have applied for ap-

proval of a flood prevention program and some of these have been disallowed for various reasons with some 70 having been approved for future planning, about 30 of which are ready for priority assignment, board members noted.

Randalls, mayor of Hico, pointed out that recent floods on the Bosque have brought at least \$350,000 damages in Hico and estimated that the destruction along the river has run into the millions over the years.

Mayor Evans cited figures prepared by the Corps of Engineers on the three major floods since 1952 which noted damages of \$600,000 to city property alone, and stated that experts had estimated some \$400,000 to \$500,000 of this damage could have been prevented if the area had had the benefit of an upstream flood prevention program such as sought by the local residents.

Judge Harbin also cited figures on work of the County Commissioners Court on flood damage to county roads and bridges, pointing out that the county has spent at least \$250,000 in this respect in the last few years, accounting for at least one-half of the total funds expended on road and bridge repair work. He stated that the commissioners could already see the great advantage in this regard made possible by the Greens Creek flood prevention program.

The landowners present were unanimous in their opinion that the land in the watershed is in such condition at the present and has been for several years that any heavy rain brings about severe washing of the land and the loss of top soil is bringing many farmers in the area to the point where they are afraid to intensify cultivate their best crop growing land for fear of losing even more valuable soil.

Amusingly and yet seriously, Mrs. Jarrell, who owns city property along the Bosque in the south-east section of Stephenville, stated that she is afraid to pray for rain for fear it will rain too much. McCleskey, who made the final presentation in behalf of the project, read a report prepared by the WCID for the board.

### School Bus Safety Laws Explained by Bar Association

Thousands of school children are trooping back to school throughout Texas this week. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when meeting a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule probably outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200.00 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaking is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no-passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the center of the roadway.

help settle the controversy but they were equally obdurate, or took sides with Lee. It begins to look as if I will have to make another trip to see Doc Kerley, so soon to be a hundred years old, to get the matter resolved. Recently I made a trip to see him about Old Cora, about which I told last week. When I first asked him if he knew where Cora was located he shook his head and said he never heard of the place. But Mrs. Kerley was sitting there and daughter Geneva and they spoke up right away and said, "Why, Daddy, you do know about Cora. It was over there just west of us when we lived on Resley Creek. It was the county seat of Comanche County." Then Doc remembered and gave me the low down on it. So he will be a good witness. In the community are numerous women who once upon a time rode their horses on side-saddles, but you just ask one of them about it and see if they don't say, "Why that was before my time." It is said that an actress never gets over twenty-nine. So you can't count on the women of sufficient age to tell you, lest somebody draw conclusions as to their age.

So here I am desiring to be right, and with no convincing evidence either way. I know that Lee is a reliable citizen who has always been a keen observer. And the only way I can account for this being on opposite sides of this important issue is that he lived west of the Brazos and I lived

east of it, and it could be that women in my region mounted their steeds from the right, and on this side of the Brazos they mounted from the opposite side.

One witness whom I interviewed said, "Sure women mounted from the left. Men always do, and so women do too." But I reminded him that Stewart Edward White, the author of more reliable westerns than anybody else, states that Indians always mounted from the right, and that Europeans and Americans do now in most cases. So I feel pretty sure of my ground.

A substantial-looking citizen spoke up, "Sure can. It is just five miles down that road," and pointed west-southwest. Then he told of it being Comanche County's first county seat, and added that the ancient court house has been moved to Comanche and now houses a museum.

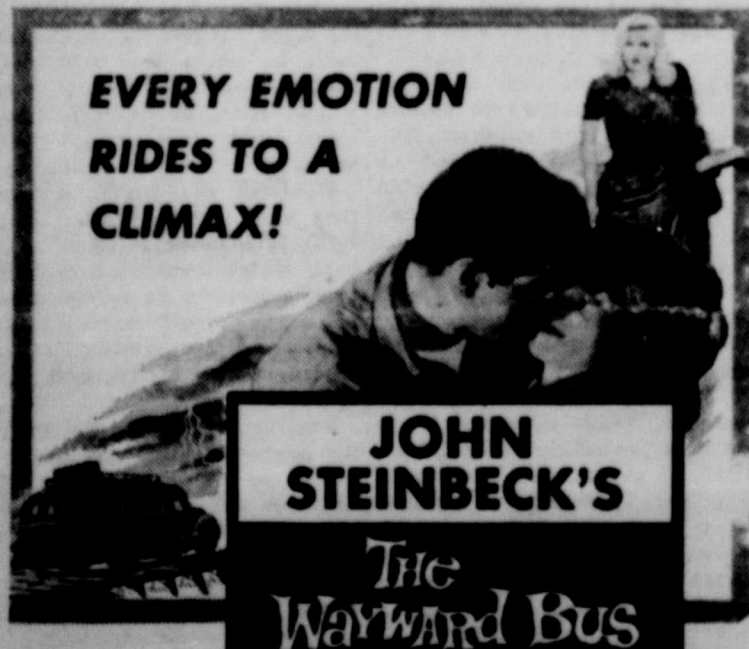

## Rev. John Shuler Writes Account of Recent Mishap

(Editor's Note: The following story is an account of the harrowing mishap experienced recently by Rev. John Shuler and his family, while on a prayer cruise in the Gulf of Mexico. The story was written for the Paris News, and is being reproduced here. Many people in the Hico area are well acquainted with Rev. Shuler. He led the spring revival at First Methodist Church, and his father is a former pastor of the church.)

I am writing this personal account of our accident for two reasons. One is for folks at the Paris News who are always so cooperative and the other is I want all my friends to join with me in a prayer of gratitude. My wife was at death's door and returned.

We had just finished our evening meal and were planning to start our evening devotions. The cruise was one of prayer and preaching and group devotions were held morning and evening aboard the sailing vessel. I went down below deck to get my Bible and just as I reached the bottom step the boat seemed to be turning completely over to the port side. Thanks be to God our little Linda (10 years old) had just gone below to put something in the cabin and I was able to drag her and get her above to the little cabin. As we reached the little cabin one of the ladies said to me, "Oh, Brother Shuler, some of the people are overboard." I knew without her telling me that Skip (Mrs. Shuler) was one of those gone for I knew where she had been sitting. My heart chilled and I also thought that likely Jim (14 years old) was gone also for he had been near his mother. I wanted to go out into the storm to search for my loved ones but I was helpless except for God and I had to take care of the one I felt God had left with me. I held little Linda to me hoping she would not realize that her mother and brother were gone. Just then I heard Jim calling his mother as he came through the cabin door. I pulled him to me and about that time someone said, "Mrs. Shuler is overboard with two others." Jim and Linda heard and our hearts cried as well as tears from our eyes. I held my two children and we were praying. Thank God my children prayed with me in our hour of need. I kept telling them God would give us our "Skip" back from the sea.

Skip had been seated on the port side when the sudden wind, 70 to 90 miles per hour hit. A huge wave had carried her to the back of the vessel and over the side. She had grabbed for things but found nothing. Down and down she went in the churning water. Thank God a Christian can be calm in storms and she did not panic. She asked God if it be His will to spare her to raise her family and serve Him. Suddenly a rope found her. She did not find it. No one on board had thrown a rope. It was dark and stormy and no one could see but God heard the prayers of a husband, two children and their mother and sent a rope. She grabbed the rope and pulled herself even with the vessel and cried for help. The captain heard her and called others to lift her back aboard.

In the cabin Jim, Linda and I were praying when someone said, "Oh, they are pulling someone aboard." I said "Thank you God" for even though they had not said who it was I knew God had brought our Skip back to us. She was brought back into the little cabin where a great reunion was held. All this in about 10 to 15 minutes.

All night I stayed on deck with glasses to my eyes searching the waters for Mrs. Nelson (about 70) and Bill Dosier (about 17). Mrs. Nelson had gone over when Skip did and Bill had dived in to try and save Mrs. Nelson.

When dawn came we entered a little nearby port and from there I was able to get my family transportation back to Port-au-Prince and we are now in this hotel. Be-

fore coming back here I saw a small pleasure fishing boat and told the people of our loss and they promised to search as they continued their journey. We have just received news that at about 5 p.m. yesterday this little vessel found Bill and Mrs. Nelson. All night and until noon yesterday they had held to the little mattress which washed over with them. About noon they found a little fishing canoe which had been washed from the shore.

Right now I write this with great gratitude in my heart. All are safe and "Skip" will be able to travel in a few days. She has rope burns on her right foot and left and is sore all over. So little compared to what it could have been.

You see now why I want the good Christians to join with me in thanking God.

Outdoors business is picking up rapidly right now. When the weather begins to get a little cooler conditions will be exactly right for bass. The hunters have already started on doves, with open season on other game coming along soon.

Let's talk about fishing first. Although a lot of fishermen take home full strings in Summer, it's pretty generally agreed that Fall is a better time, for several good reasons.

In cooler weather, fish are inclined to move around more. That takes more energy and the fish therefore are prompted to do more feeding.

Thus, in Fall, the bass are hungry and their normal sources of food are apt to be somewhat scanty. So they look with favor on your minnow or plug.

Old timers in the bass fishing game have started already, as a matter of fact. Their top-water lures dusted off and hooks sharpened, they may be seen at daylight these mornings and late afternoons, moving slowly along in their boats, tossing plugs or flies along the edges of weed beds, under willows, close to stumps and rocks.

Such a procedure is calculated to pay off, especially when that change in weather comes. Want advice? Try just before and just after the first norther.

#### Those Old Cats

Catfishing has been the best bet for most anglers during the Summer, and in many lakes and streams, the 'rotline operators have been mighty successful. Catfishing is good in Texas the year round. Here's a fish that responds readily to almost any bait, offers excellent sport for the still fisherman, and affords a tasty dish for the table.

A word about carp. This fish was imported from Europe many years ago. There, it was and is considered a delicacy. Taken handily in most Texas lakes and streams, the carp is a valiant fighter, and he comes in king sizes. Rig your line with a nylon leader, and tie your sinker so the fish won't feel tension when he samples the dough bait. Let him run with it and then strike—hard.

Now about coastal fishing—the outlook is excellent. Back in 1951 there was a freeze that killed many game fish. But now, the young have had time to mature.

Indication of good salt water fishing came in the Summer, when many anglers returned with record catches of trout. In number and in size they were better than they had been for years.

Nine-pound trout were captured. A pair of Austin anglers, Steve Eichelberger and Eldon Powell, took 229 specs, weighing 394 pounds in three and a half hours from

the intercoastal canal near Austin. The fish took shrimp as long as the supply lasted, then they hit spoons.

That was the biggest catch ever made by the two fishermen, as far as the boatman knew.

Come Fall, there will be more catches of trout, and the redfish will start striking. When it gets a little cooler, the sheephead will be active.

Cyrus K. Holliday Recalls Pioneer Days of Railroad

## Famous Antique Train To Be Shown In Dallas At State Fair of Texas

An antique train reminiscent of the pioneering days of railroading will be exhibited by the Santa Fe Railway at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 5-20.

The famous old Cyrus K. Holliday locomotive, a replica of the original engine which hauled the first freight and passengers over the Santa Fe line in Kansas in 1869, will be brought to Dallas along with its two ancient wooden coaches.

The diminutive locomotive has the famous "diamond stack" with a brass eagle figurehead gracing the engine head, a big oil-burning headlight, brass fittings and other paraphernalia of the early days of railroading.

Although the locomotive is but a replica of the original, the present Cyrus K. Holliday ranks as a museum piece in its own right. Built in 1880, the old engine was subsequently downgraded to a switch locomotive and finally withdrawn after 60 years of active service.

Restored to its original appearance, the train has been used many times in movies of the old West. The engine still operates under its own power.

With the Cyrus K. Holliday, the State Fair will have on exhibition trains spanning nearly 90 years of rail progress. The Texas & Pacific Railway Company will exhibit its old retired steam locomotive No. 909 and one of its crack modern Texas Eagle streamliners. In addition, the Fair's Monorail line, only such system operating in the U. S., offers a sample of yet another type of rail transportation said to hold great promise for the future.

ply of these birds is abundant this season. Spring rains caused the cover crops to grow well. Rains during the season will cause the birds to scatter, and cold weather will inspire them to migrate southward, but all considered, the dove hunting prospects are superb.

The same applies to quail. Not only has there been a good normal hatch, but landowners have contributed by adding to the supply.

#### Hunters Get Ready

Range is good for deer and antelope, as a result of spring rains, and the hunters are getting that look in their eyes. Unquestionably, there will be a fine deer harvest this season.

Turkeys abound, too, but there has been a reduction in limit in some counties. And that statement calls for a warning: Check local regulations before you go hunting, because county laws vary widely.

From Canada, the news is that there has been a fine season for the duck and goose hatch. These birds will be in Texas when winter winds blow.

## Proper Methods of Ensiling Is Important to Quality

Feeding quality of silage depends consistently made better silage upon the methods used in filling the silo as well as upon the forage with which it is loaded. And quality is usually determined within a few hours after ensiling because that's when the fermentation process important to preservation takes place, says A. M. Meekma, extension dairy husbandman.

U. S. Department of Agriculture research shows that an important key to successful preservation is immediate exclusion of air from the silage, points out Meekma.

Forage tramped, weighted and immediately sealed usually made good quality silage in the experiments. On the other hand, forage left loose and unsealed for two days spoiled. Spoilage was even more complete when air was forced through the forage. The forage heated abnormally for the first few days and ultimately lost nutrients and much of the lactic acid needed for effective preservation, notes the husbandman.

Excessive temperature is an early symptom of spoilage in silage, says Meekma. But it's the exclusion of air that counts in controlling this heating and in encouraging proper fermentation.

Type of plant used in silage is, of course, another factor in quality. A surprising finding from the USDA research was that alfalfa

consistently made better silage than orchard grass, despite the lat-

ter's higher sugar content. One thing, alfalfa withstood high temperatures with less nutrient loss. But, concludes Meekma, there was also a difference in the bacteria development in these two silages when they were silage treated.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS By E. R. LAWRENCE

The old saying about necessity is the mother of invention holds true, I believe. At least it does on the Eric Seider farm at Aleman.

Eric is running around 5,000 laying hens and gathering eggs is always quite a chore. In order to make this part of his operations easier, he constructed a conveyor belt that gathers eggs from 140 nests while he stands at one end of the nests and takes the eggs off the belt and places them in a basket. This is one home-made thing that can take a lot of work out of gathering eggs on most any poultry farm.

Eric made two rows of nests out of one by twelve material, the old square box type nest that is found on so many farms. The nests are 70 nest long and there are two rows of them, back to back. The floors of the nests slope to the rear and have about an inch or a little more slope. This allows the eggs to roll out of the nest onto the belt that comes down between the two rows. At one end, he has a pulley that rolls the belt and brings the eggs to the end. This thing is a little hard to try to describe, but it is so simple that anyone can build one and make it work. Eric used rollers from an old binder and made a belt from canvas. He will show it to you and show you how it works if you'll go down there and can catch him not busy. Any how, this is one piece of home-made equipment that should interest many in

the county who are in the egg business. It won't work though if you're running cages.

I understand that some of the dealers who are marketing eggs from the county are needing more eggs and would like to see a still further increase in the number of layers run in the county. Check with your dealer and see about it.

Albert Greater, Pleasant Valley, has a new laying house loaded with about 2,000 layers that are getting into production well. This gives Albert, and Mrs. Albert, around 4,000 layers now. They have just completed a new electric egg cooler, built into the egg house. Overall it is about 10x15 feet.

More and more egg producers are improving their operations in order that they will be able to place a better egg on the market. Quality eggs can be marketed only if they are refrigerated immediately after gathering. Heat is the main enemy of the egg producer.

Dairymen of the county had a fine meeting last week in the REA building. They sure did enjoy the fine air conditioning too. Mr. A. M. Meekma, Extension Dairy husbandman met with a group of 24 and discussed Bulk Tanks and also Brucellosis control programs. All dairymen of the county are doing their part in eradicating Brucellosis from their milking herds. Brucellosis is a disease that causes Undulant fever in people.

Proper Handling Stressed For High Egg Quality

Egg quality declines rapidly unless the eggs are handled properly from the time they are laid until consumers use them. Thousands of dollars are lost annually by poultrymen and egg handlers because of this loss in quality.

But this loss can be greatly reduced if the eggs are cooled and handled properly, says F. Z. Beamblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist.

He points out that heat is one of the greatest causes of loss in egg quality. Research indicates

that 50 to 55 degrees F. is a good temperature in which to hold eggs on the farm when they are marketed at least two or three times weekly. Any temperature above 70 degrees causes a rapid deterioration of quality—the higher the temperature, the quicker the deterioration.

The specialist advises gathering eggs at least three times daily, and cooling rapidly to remove animal heat. The egg temperature is about 105 degrees F. when laid. If the temperature in the hen

house is around 100 degrees, it is obvious that little cooling will occur unless the eggs are removed.

Beamblossom says that age, or the length of time eggs have been laid, is another factor affecting egg quality. This loss of quality is reduced greatly if the eggs are kept at 50 to 55 degrees F. The eggs will maintain quality even longer at 30 to 31 degrees, but this low temperature is not recommended for short holding because of the cost and the greater tendency toward sweating.

Humidity is another factor in maintaining favorable egg conditions, continues the specialist. Eggs are more likely to hold their maximum quality at a relative humidity of 70 to 80 per cent but a low humidity will not cause undue quality loss unless eggs are to be stored for several weeks.

The new egg law makes it even more important to maintain good egg quality. A leaflet, "Most Important Enemies of Egg Quality," gives recommendations relative to the above factors as well as some important suggestions on maintaining high egg quality. It may be obtained from county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station. Ask for L-339.

The story of the cost-price squeeze on the nation's farmers has gradually slipped from the front pages of the newspapers. It has been an economic reality so long that it just isn't news anymore.

But it is still with the farmers, just the same. Somehow, the charts and graphs of rising prices and falling farm prices just doesn't have the same dramatic impact—except to those who are suffering from its effects.

Eliminating the cold charts for a moment, here's what it means to its victims!

Five years ago, it took 951 bushels of wheat at \$2.06 a bushel to buy a 20-29 tractor at \$1,960. Today, it takes 1,130 bushels at the prevailing price of \$1.71 to buy that same tractor at the current cost of \$2,160. This represents 179 more bushels of wheat the farmer must raise to get that tractor.

Here are a few more startling examples:

Corn: In 1952, 147 bushels at \$1.73 bought a 2 bottom plow at \$255. Today it takes 214 bushels at \$1.22

for the same plow at \$262, or 67 bushels more.

Rye: 1952, 866 bushels at \$1.72 for a combine at \$1,490. Today, 1,528 bushels at \$1.04 for the combine at \$1,590, or 662 more bushels.

Milk: 1952, 447 cwt. at \$1.38 for a two-ton truck at \$1,960. Today, 744 cwt. at \$3.84 for the truck at \$2,860 or an increase of 297 cwt. amounting to 2,650 more gallons.

Milk Cows: 1952, seven head at \$254 to buy that \$1,960 two-ton truck. Today, 17 head at \$163 for that truck now costing \$2,860, or 10 more head.

Eggs: 1952, 390 dozen at \$0.338 for a wringer-type electric washer at \$132. Today, 562 dozen at \$0.249 for same washer now costing \$140, an increase of 172 dozen.

These few figures bring home the fact that the farmer must produce a great deal more at a reduced price to buy commodities which have increased in cost. It shows better than any chart how inflation combines with steadily falling farm prices to put a strangling squeeze on our farmers.

## Back-to-School Safety Program Conducted by Assn.

"Give children a brake." This play on words was made this week by J. O. Musick, manager of the Texas Safety Association, in behalf of the organization's annual back-to-school safety program.

"With the arrival of a new school year, the pattern of life for nearly every Texan will undergo a radical change. The size of our school system will bear this out," he said.

The enrollment in Texas' public schools for the 1937-38 year, is expected to reach 1,883,881 pupils; plus 75,280 teachers, principals, coaches, etc., and more than 8,000 school buses.

"The opening of school doors affects virtually every driver too," Musick continued. "When he gets behind the wheel of his car, he is sure to notice some differences."

"School areas will be guarded by the police, extra traffic signs and signals, and by safety patrols. But special care on the part of the individual driver will need to be added."

He then explained that in the hours just before and after school there are increased numbers of bicycle riders, large groups of child pedestrians and many school buses. All of which are signs, within themselves, for added carelessness while driving on our streets and highways.

"In 1936, there were more than 150 students killed in Texas traf-

fic accidents and approximately 8,920 injured," Musick said. "Of course these are 'just statistics'—unless you or a close member of your family was involved."

"A sense of responsibility and dependability should be a part of the licensed driver's habits. He must recognize that a child can't be relied upon to follow the rules of safety, thus the driver's added alertness must compensate for children's mistakes—give them a brake!"

As a short course in safety, Musick offered the following five suggestions to motorists:

1. Be alert for children at all times, especially around school zones, playgrounds and other places where children congregate.
2. Know and obey the special warnings given in school areas by signs and signals, traffic police and safety patrols. Watch for human caution signs in action—the children themselves.
3. Don't be juvenile and try to
