China Painting Artist At Prairiland

Mrs. Ann Vanderhoof, noted china painting artist, is again conducting china painting classes at the Prairiland Homemaking building. The

classes, which are sponsored by the Prairiland Homemaking Department, currently have twelve ladies enrolled.

Mrs. Vanderhoof, who is

from Dallas, was recently featured on Channel 5's Good Morning Show, demonstrating her china painted roses. She specializes in roses and horses, known to be the most difficult of items to depict on china.

She is a past president of the China Painting Teachers of Texas, a charter member of the Porcelain Art Guild, and winner of the coveted "Fred-dy" award, the highest honor in china painting.

She became interested in china painting in 1945, and she and two other ladies opened the Three Sisters China Shop in Dallas in 1949. The shop helped revive the art, which was virtually dead at that time. Since then, the art has become increasingly popular.

In great demand, with some 48 pupils waiting for her in Dallas, Mrs. Vanderhoof says she enjoys coming to Prairiland because "these are my friends". Of all the classes she teaches, she says that the Prairiland group is the most enjoyable.

Irene Harvey, noted local artist, first became acquainted with her, and is responsible for the area being fortunate enough to receive such expert instruction.

Mrs. Vanderhoof not only teaches china painting, but also conducts seminars and judges china competition all over the nation.

Those in the class are working on a variety of objects, such as plates, cups, "Gone With The Wind" lamp globes, and vases.

Mrs. Vanderhoof provides inspiration, and careful, individual instruction, with tips usually unavailable to the public.

Farmers Respond To Survey

Farmers in Red River County have been doubling as statisticians in completing questionnaires which become essential links in the sophisticated economic structure of Texas agriculture, Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said today.

The county's producers were part of some 30,000 farmers across the state who recently responded to the mid-year survey on summer acreage and production conducted by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The results of the survey will be issued in an August 10 crop report which is available free of charge.

She will be assisted by some members of the hospital nursing staff, Mrs. Leslie Kerr, office nurse for Dr. Ed McCulloch, and Lisa Risinger, dental assistant for Dr. Ragan. Bogata City Council Approves Budget

Following a budget hearing held August 8, 1978, the Bogata City Council approved a budget of \$141,260.00 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1979.

The budget items are as follows: Administrative expenses, \$13,043.00; Sanitation, \$3,425.00; Streets, \$18,550.00; Fire Dept., \$3,890.00; Dept. services, \$11,405.00; Water and

sewer, \$72,543.00; Revenue sharing, \$17,404.00.

Revenue sharing expenditures will be about 12 percent of the total and will be mostly for capitol items.

The complete budget as approved by the City Council is on file in the city business office and may be inspected during office hours.

Red River County Shares Economic Boost

The multi-billion dollar boost that oil and gas industry operations gave to the Texas economy in 1977 was shared by the citizens of Red River County.

The marketed value of petroleum production in the county has been calculated at \$135,400 in an economic activity profile of the state's top producing counties prepared by

the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

"Texas' oil and gas industry remains the cornerstone of the economy of the state and of many of its counties," said the Association's president, H.B. Harkins, Alice, independent producer and drilling company executive. "It is imperative that the state maintain taxing and regulatory policies which will encourage the growth of this industry."

Red River was one of 201 counties last year which produced petroleum with a marketed value of \$100,000 or more. The county ranked 201st in the estimated total value of petroleum produced. The association has computed that some \$132,900 came from the production of 14,700 barrels of crude oil, with approximately \$2,500 attributed to an output of 2,800 MCF of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county were calculated at \$16,900.

While paying local, county and state property taxes, producers in the county also helped support state government through production tax payments estimated at \$6,300. This included \$6,100 from crude

oil output, \$200 from natural gas.

The search for additional petroleum continued in Red River County last year. Oil and gas developers spent an estimated \$1.6 million in the drilling of seven dry holes, three of which were wildcats.

Medical Help Of Growing Importance

In an effort to help patients prevent many of their personal health problems, the Texas Medical Association is promoting six health habits the association says can save lives and money.

A California study showed that people who followed these ideas lived 7-11 years longer than those who did not. One of the authors of the 1973 study said a man at age 55 who follows all the habits can be as healthy as someone 30 years younger who follows less than two.

If these habits can help keep you healthy, then they are going to save you money on medical bills, said Mylie E. Durham Jr., M.D., TMA president. Feeling good and

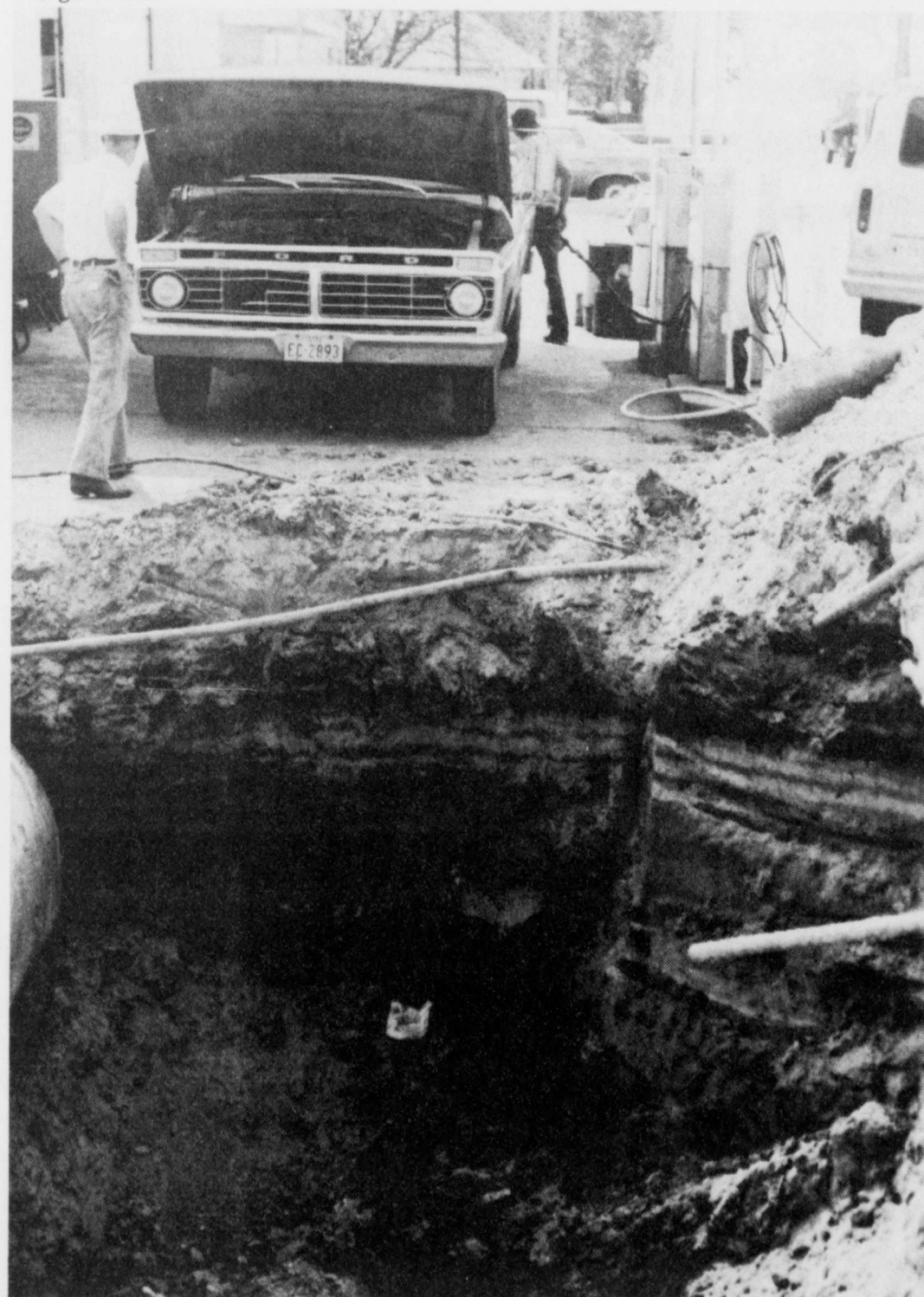
saving money are two great reasons to follow these recommendations:

1. Eat three meals a day, including breakfast, at regular times and avoid snacks.
2. Control your weight. Use your head to fight fat. Remember that fat diets don't keep weight off permanently. Diets based on good nutrition and sensible amounts of food have the best chance of success.
3. Exercise more than one or two times weekly. If you haven't exercised in a long time, ease into it. If you're over 40 or have heart problems, check with your doctor before starting a program.
4. Avoid having more than two alcoholic drinks daily.
5. Get enough sleep. Eight hours nightly is a general rule but individual requirements vary.
6. Don't smoke.

Health experts are putting more stress on self-help habits because they play a major part in solving several problems.

As scientists increase the average lifespan by battling traditional killers such as heart disease, an individual's efforts to increase the quality and quantity of life become even more important. Even expensive masses of modern technology cannot save someone if he is determined to destroy himself or make life miserable by following bad habits, Dr. Durham said.

As part of the association's efforts to educate the public, doctors statewide are distributing several hundred thousand pamphlets entitled "Your Health Is in Your Hands." The pamphlets include the six health habits and other ideas on saving lives and money. Fort Gibson, Tenkiller Ferry, Eufaula and Wister Lakes and the navigation system in Oklahoma, at 7:00 p.m., August

10 in the Muskogee Civic Center, 5th and Boston.

Oologah, Hulah and Birch lakes, at 7:00 p.m., August 11 at the Plaza National Bank Building in Bartlesville.

Col. Benning said the new regulation goes into effect on November 15, 1978. The meetings are being held to inform the public of the areas at each lake where take-off and landings of seaplanes would be prohibited, and to give the public an opportunity to comment on these possible restricted areas.

Construction To Begin On Big Pine Lake

Senator Lloyd Bentsen announced Friday that a Senate subcommittee has approved funding to begin construction on Big Pine Lake in Northeast Texas.

Bentsen said the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Public Works approved \$900,000 for the project.

Dry Fallow Will

Control Nematodes

Nematodes in the soil can be easily killed if exposed to the heat during a hot dry summer. Dry fallowing, which requires turning the soil often enough to keep it dry and weed free will help in the control of nematodes.

Nematodes can live on certain weeds, therefore, it is important to keep the dry fallowed area of the garden free of all vegetation. Dry fallowing works well in those areas that complete production in early summer. For example, after corn is harvested, the stubble can be removed and that portion of the garden tilled and fallowed the rest of the season. In addition to killing nematodes, some insect and weed control will be obtained. The following year, the fallowed area would be a good place to plant the more nematode susceptible crops such as okra, melons, tomatoes and squash. In most cases, nematode populations can be gently reduced during hot, dry weather where fallowing is strictly observed.

Once soil is infested with root knot nematodes, eradication is almost impossible. The idea behind all control measures is to reduce the nematode population to a level where economic loss does not occur in that crop year. As the growing

Cotton Demand Seen Stable

Both domestic mill use of cotton and sales of U.S. cotton abroad in 1978-79 will be virtually the same levels reached in the cotton year just ended, says economists at Cotton Incorporated.

However, they say, cotton producers making selling decisions should keep an eye on several factors that could cause cotton prices to fluctuate during the coming months.

As Daniel Troxler, associate director for demand economics, notes, because of the drought in Texas and insect problems in California, "U.S. cotton production prospects have declined in recent weeks, putting upward pressure on cotton prices. Harvest is still many weeks away in most areas, so the market will continue to focus its attention on the production outlook."

"Any further deterioration in production prospects here or in other major producing countries could push cotton prices higher," he adds. "However, world crop conditions could improve, or business conditions weaken, pushing prices down—possibilities that must not be ignored."

The analysis of cotton demand is contained in the August issue of the Cotton Summary, monthly publication of Cotton Incorporated. Cotton Incorporated is the fiber company of American cotton producers.

According to Troxler, textile mill activity currently is fairly strong. Demand for lightweight woven fabrics of 100 percent cotton and cotton blends "has been exceptionally strong for over a year." Other areas showing strength include cotton yarn for spinning, corduroy, towels and sheets.

However, he says, "demand for one major fabric category—

heavyweight woven fabrics for apparel—remains weak. Mill cutbacks in denim production have been especially damaging to cotton use."

Demand for these fabrics, especially denim, must improve before mill use of cotton will increase significantly, the Cotton Incorporated economist points out.

"Consumer demand for cotton textile products remains fairly strong, an encouraging note for raw fiber use if consumer purchasing does not weaken," he adds.

Troxler points out that since the start of the year, consumer confidence has been battered by rising inflation. While the loss in confidence has not yet caused consumers to cut back on spending, he says, further increases in consumer debt plus inflation eventually could have this effect.

"In total," says Troxler, "there appear to be more indications of an economic slowdown and reduced consumer spending sometime during the next six to 12 months than signs to the contrary."

The outlook for world cotton consumption combined with foreign production prospects points to a third straight strong marketing year for U.S. cotton exports, the economist says. Exports in 1978-79, he says, are expected to match the 1977-78 level of 5.5 million bales.

Due primarily to the problems in California and Texas, Cotton Incorporated's 1978-79 U.S. cotton production estimate has been reduced to 10.8 million bales, a 500,000 bale decrease from the estimate made a month earlier.

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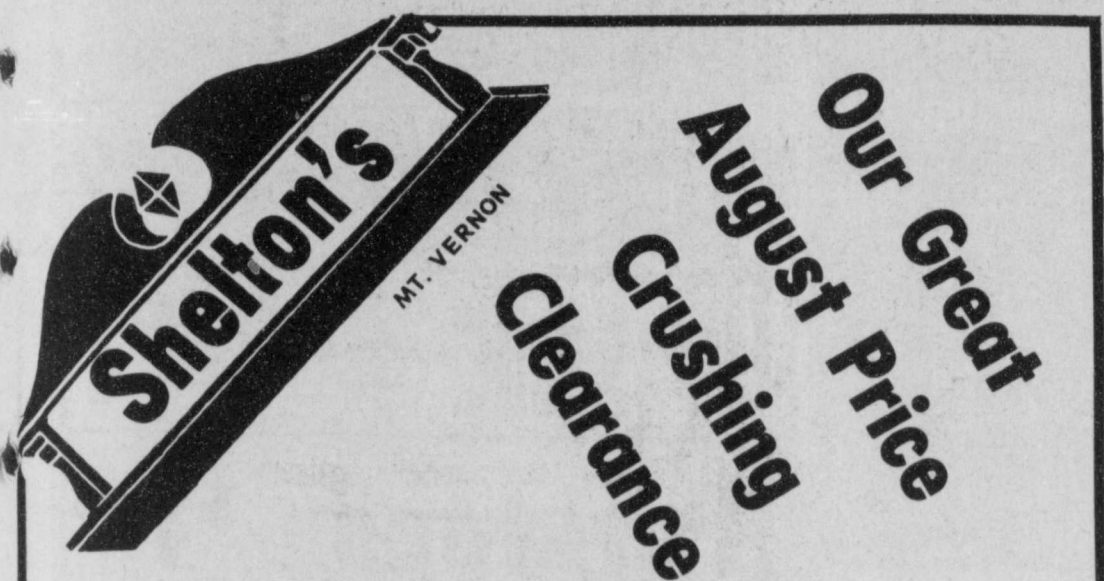
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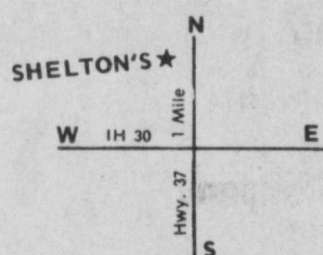


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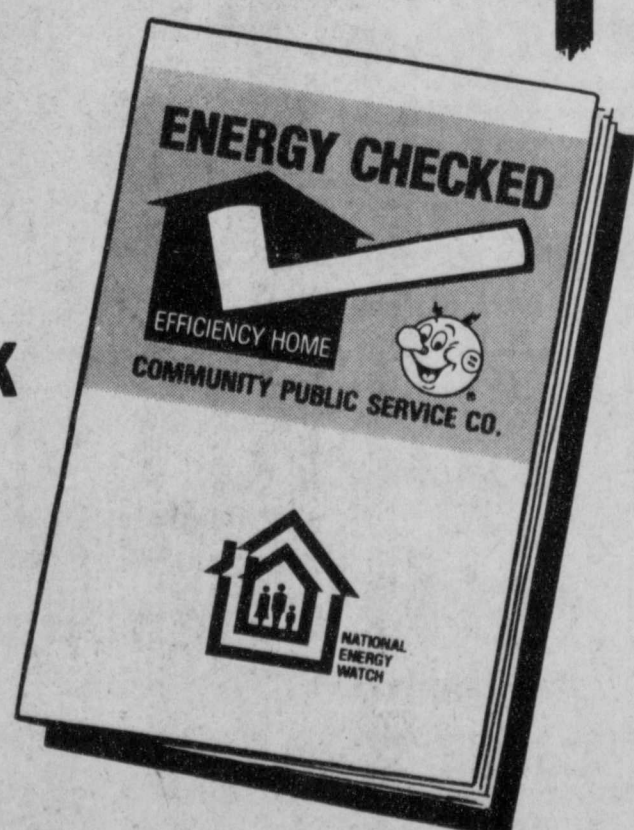


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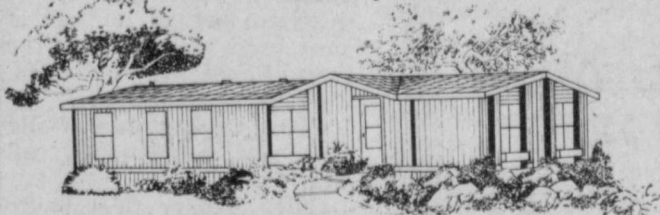

Researcher Seeks Better Forage

Grasses that thrive and grow during the winter months have received much interest during the past few years. The improvement of these cool season grasses through a breeding program and improved production practices is being studied by Dr. L.R. Nelson, forage breeder for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Major emphasis in this breeding program is variety development of soft winter wheat and ryegrass.

Forage production of the small seeded annual ryegrass is usually limited during the fall and winter. However, ryegrass is capable of producing high yields of very high quality forage from March through May. Seeding ryegrass

in either a prepared seedbed or overseeded onto a sod has been successful.

A major goal of Dr. Nelson's ryegrass breeding program at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton is to select or develop new varieties which germinate and emerge rapidly and have good seedling vigor. With these characteristics, additional forage production of ryegrass during the fall months would greatly increase the value of this pasture crop.

Another objective of the ryegrass breeding program is to maintain good disease resistance, particularly to crown rust. Winter hardiness and forage quality are two

other areas being watched carefully in the development of new lines.

Research is just beginning to study seedling rates of both tetraploid and diploid varieties of ryegrass planted in either a prepared or a sod seedbed. The possible use of a starter fertilizer in conjunction with a disiccant to obtain a good stand in a sod is also being investigated.

Since the soft winter wheats have much greater forage potential than the hard wheats, the wheat forage breeding program is being centered around the soft red winter wheat type. Currently, the most popular variety in East Texas is Coker 68-15. This variety is adapted to the area but lacks disease resistance, particularly to powdery mildew.

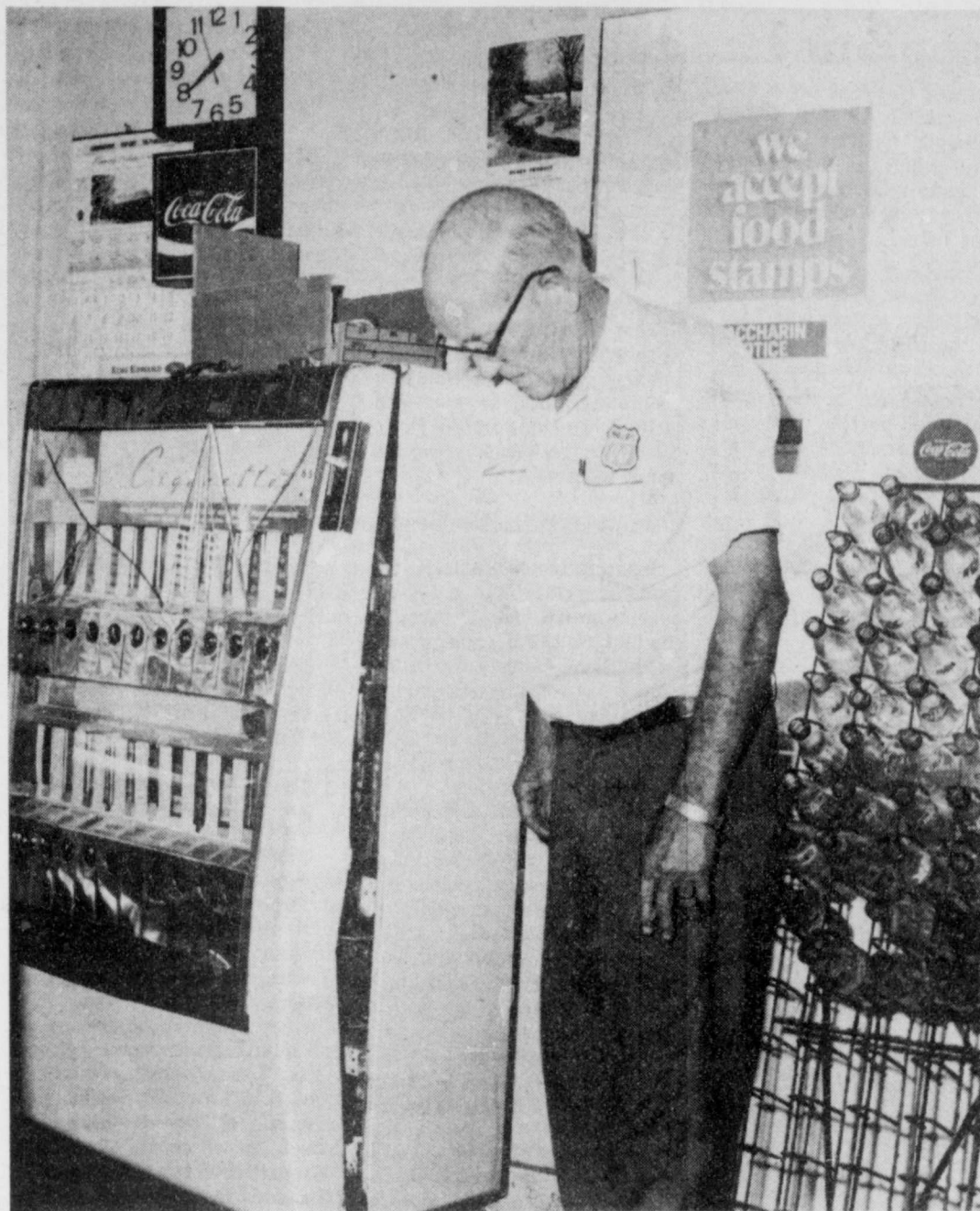
Dr. Nelson believes that the major areas for wheat improvement are increased forage yield throughout the growing season and increased disease resistance. Diseases such as powdery mildew, leaf and stem rust, and glume blotch often limit both forage and grain yield of wheat in East Texas.

Glume blotch, a fungus disease, attacks the wheat during the heading stage. Forage yield is not hurt by the disease but grain yield is often severely limited because of premature death of the plant. The genetics of glume blotch is being studied and new and better sources of resistances are being sought.

Other areas in the wheat research program include improved winter hardiness, lodging resistance and high forage yield. Wheat breeding programs may take 10 years and 12-15 generations of crosses to develop a new variety. Studies are made of 8,000 to 10,000 headrows for several characters such as plant heights, forage potential, disease resistance, etc. One headrow is one row, planted from one head of wheat, five feet in length. Record keeping becomes a major consideration.

Nelson's research with rye and oats is primarily variety testing for forage or grain yield. Studies involving sod-seeding and starter fertilizer application are also underway with rye.

The overall objective of the cool season forage breeding program at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton is to develop disease resistant varieties which will produce large amounts of high quality forage for as many days as possible during the fall and winter months.

Southern pine beetle activity is the lowest it has been since 1959 when beetle outbreaks first began in the state, according to a state forest pest control official.

"Pine bark beetle activity has been very low so far this year," said Ron Billings, head of the Pest Control Section of the Texas Forest Service. "Very few beetle spots have been detected on pest control survey flights this year."

"Usually 50 to 75 percent of all beetle infestations detected during the year are found during May, June and July," said Dr. Billings. "However, at the end of July only about 30 active spots have been observed in the entire state."

Ground checking of the spots has revealed that Ips engraver beetles, not southern pine beetles, have been responsible for most of the infestations sighted. Infestations of Ips beetles do not have the potential to expand like those of southern pine beetles, he said.

Ips beetles can kill high-value yard trees but they usually do not have much impact on commercial timber production. "The best control after attack is the speedy removal and utilization of actively infested trees, making sure that the bark and slabs are destroyed."

"Land owners may get a false sense of security because

current pine beetle activity is low. The beetles will be back, it's only a question of when and to what extent the timber losses will be," he said.

According to Dr. Billings, the best way to prepare for the next attack is to thin dense, slow-growing stands and harvest overmature stands. These are the types of stands in which the chance of successful attack and rapid spread of the infestation is the greatest.

Landowners who desire an appraisal of the relative susceptibility to beetle attack of their pine stands can contact the nearest Texas Forest Service district office.

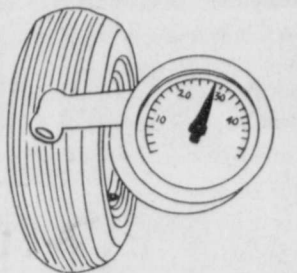
