

Lubbock Z-102's Steve Sever Debuts at Garza Theatre in 'Mary, Mary'



The December 15-18 comedy production of "Mary, Mary" at the Garza Theatre will feature the talents of Lubbock's popular radio personality Steve Sever, playing the part of movie star 'Dirk Winston' in the comedy.

"I act everyday on the radio, I thought I'd see what it's like to act while people are looking at me," Sever comments about his desire to act here.

He can be heard from 5:30 to 9 a.m. weekday mornings with his co-host Laura Mac on Z-102 in Lubbock.

From 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Sever works at his own company now in its sixth year, Walker-Sever Productions, a commercial recording studio that creates radio and television commercials for advertising agencies across the nation.

Sever will be making his Garza Theatre stage debut, appearing with Southland's Linda Ellis, Slaton's Mandy Swafford, Post's Wes Burnett and Garza Theatre director Will McCrary.

McCrary, who designs and directs the productions, plays the role of New York book publisher 'Bob McKellaway'.

Ellis, last year's winner of two "Willy Awards", takes on the role of his wife, 'Mary McKellaway'.

Swafford, remembered for her tantalizing role as the Vaudeville 'nurse' in "The Sunshine Boys", plays the part of "McKellaway's" fiancée 'Tiffany'.

Burnett is playing 'Oscar', the family lawyer friend.

Sever, born and raised in Lubbock, began his radio career when he was 16 and has spent the past 19 years working at various radio stations in El Paso, Dallas and Austin.

His radio experience has spanned pop and rock formats as well as country.

For a time in 1976 and 1977 he served on the executive board for the Federation of International Country Air-Personalities in Nashville.

In 1981 Sever served as a consultant for 33 country radio stations throughout the middle and southeastern United States.

He co-hosted the 1980 Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy Association telethon with Sharon Maines and served two years on the local MDA executive board.

He also currently sits on a sub-committee for the Lubbock Board of City Development Task Force and writes free-lance for Lubbock Lights Magazine.

Not exactly a stranger to the stage, Sever has made a few guest appearances with the Maines Brothers Band over the years and is also known to many as one of the founders of the West Texas Opry, where he performed on many occasions.

He also served as the emcee for the first two years of the opry's existence.

"I am excited about making my first theatre appearance since junior high school," Sever adds.

"Mary, Mary" opened in New York March 8, 1961 at the Helen Hayes theatre and starred Barry Nelson and Barbara Bel Geddes as the "we will divorce, we won't divorce" couple.

The play ran for two years in New York before it was made into a film, starring Dick Van Dyke and Debbie Reynolds.

Tickets are \$6 for adults and \$3 for children 12 years and younger. Performances begin at 7:45 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Saturday and at 2 p.m. Sunday.

Concerned Parents, Teens Tackle Drug, Alcohol Abuse

Parents, teens and concerned citizens of Post met Monday, November 28 to discuss problems and solutions involving alcohol-drug abuse and addiction facing the youth of the community.

Thirty-five persons were present at the Monday night meeting.

Glenda Baker, Garza County Certified Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Counselor, introduced Dr. James Bell, pastor of Post's First United Methodist Church and former member of the Midland Council on Alcoholism and Drug Ad-

dition, who spoke to the group on the functions and formation of a Council in the community.

Following discussion, those present agreed to adopt the name of "Community Alcohol-Drug Abuse Council" to function as a parent-teen-citizen support system.

The following Task Force committees were formed:

1. Community Awareness - education
2. Prevention (help stop the sale and use of illicit drugs and alcohol to minors)

3. Parent-teen support system, alternative programs, hotline
4. Bilingual

Everyone is invited to attend a meeting of the Awareness-Education Task Force on Tuesday, December 6 at 1:30 p.m. in the Postex Plant Conference Room. Other scheduled meetings will be December 8, bilingual; December 10, follow-up on community-wide organizational meeting; and December 13, community education.

CCA Receives Grant from Arts Commission

The Caprock Cultural Association of Post was the recent recipient of an administration grant from the Texas Commission on the Arts to be shared by the CCA, the Post Art Guild and the Garza Theatre.

The grant is matched by the Post City Council and the Garza County Commission, to support the arts programs in our area.

Texas Commission on the Arts received requests for \$15 million dollars from the non-profit arts organizations across the state, but

were only able to award grants totaling \$2.7 million, less than 20 percent of the amount requested.

Even though the total amount of the CCA's grant request was reduced, the organization feels fortunate that it was among the 20 percent of arts associations across the state to receive assistance.

The CCA extends its appreciation to the interested and enthusiastic community of Post, its leaders, and to all the hard-working volunteers.

Garza County's Gross Sales Show Increase

A Texas State Comptroller's analysis of the second quarter of 1988 sales and use tax for all industries shows Garza County with a 12.1 percent increase in gross sales over the same period for 1987.

Garza County's gross sales for the second quarter were

\$8,898,117 with 130 outlets reporting.

Gross sales for the same period in 1987 were \$7,938,587.

In the retail trade division, 86 outlets reported gross sales of \$6,318,539 for the second quarter of 1988, a 10.2 percent increase in retail trade gross sales over 1987's \$5,734,948.

Matching Funds Approved For Landscaping Project

The Texas State Highway Department's share of funds needed to restore part of Post's main thoroughfare to its early-day appearance was approved by the highway commission at its November meeting.

When cereal king C.W. Post laid out the city in the early 1900s, Main Street boasted carefully tended trees on a landscaped median. Over the years, the landscaped area was removed and paved over for parking.

Now, the city of Post is seeking to restore a three-block area in downtown to its original appearance.

The city has committed \$67,310 in cash, materials and labor for the project. The highway commission November 29 agreed to match that amount. The highway

department's contribution will include removing the old pavement and constructing new curbs as well as other items.

The town of Post, under the guidance of C.W. Post, was an early-day example of a planned community complete with elaborate landscaping for the times and the region.

Angie Cruse Represents Area at Echo Valley '88

For Angie Cruse, a senior at Post High School, summer of '88 was definitely a summer to be remembered.

Not only did she have the opportunity to travel to Canada, with stops along the way for sight-seeing, she also had the privilege of being one of 150 United States Girl Scouts chosen as representatives to an international encampment at Echo Valley, Sas-katchewan, Canada, July 12-22.

Angie was part of a 10-girl, two-adult patrol from the Caprock Girl Scout Council making the trip to Echo Valley to join with the other U.S. Scouts; 2,500 Canadian Girl Guides; and 350 Girl Guides and Girl Scouts from countries around the world, such as Nepal, Nigeria, Trinidad-Tobago, Sweden, Singapore and Uruguay.

To be selected for the Caprock Council patrol, Angie submitted

applications and reference letters attesting to her primitive camping expertise; her ability and desire to live compatibly with people of widely diverse ethnic and national backgrounds; and an interest in the international aspects of Girl Scouting and Girl Guiding.

In addition, Angie was interviewed by an adult panel and was chosen as one of the Senior Girl Scouts, grades 10-12, who would represent all areas of the 18-county area of Caprock Council.

The girls chosen for the encampment agreed to share their Canadian experiences with at least three groups during the calendar year following the trip.

Angie and her fellow Scouts from Lubbock, Levelland, Dimmitt, and Denver City left Lubbock on July 3, accompanied by the adult leaders, in "Scoutabout," the new Caprock Council van.

Sightseeing along the way included stops at such points of interest as the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Mount Rushmore in South Dakota, and Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks in Wyoming.

Some of Angie's favorite stops on the way to Canada were Mt. Rushmore, Chief Crazy Horse Memorial, the Denver Mint and International Peace Gardens.

As soon as the scouts arrived in Canada, and prior to the encampment, members of the patrol had several days of individual "home hospitality" with the family of a Canadian Girl Guide.

Angie's hosts for "home hospitality" were the Koshinskys in the Manitoba-Winnipeg area and her four days with them were spent seeing the area and visiting places of interest.

The encampment itself, in Echo Valley, lies between two of the seven lakes left behind by the melting glaciers which gouged the Valley of the Qu'Appelle from the prairie centuries ago.

Echo Valley '88 was divided into six villages, named for the six major river systems in Saskatchewan, with 500 people in each village.

To make it easier to identify the people in your group, different color hats were assigned to each of the six villages. All the people in Angie's village, Assiniboine, were identified by the distinctive pink hats they wore.

Although all the girls lived in tents during their Echo Valley stay, there was no wood gathering or meal preparing - the meals were catered by professionals in order to leave more time for activities.

And the activities were varied. Angie chose service, dance, sports and crafts, to name a few, but the list also included camp skill competitions, service projects, seminars on world issues, musical activities, drama workshops, learning native songs, dances and crafts of all areas worldwide, waterfront activities, tours and ceremonies.

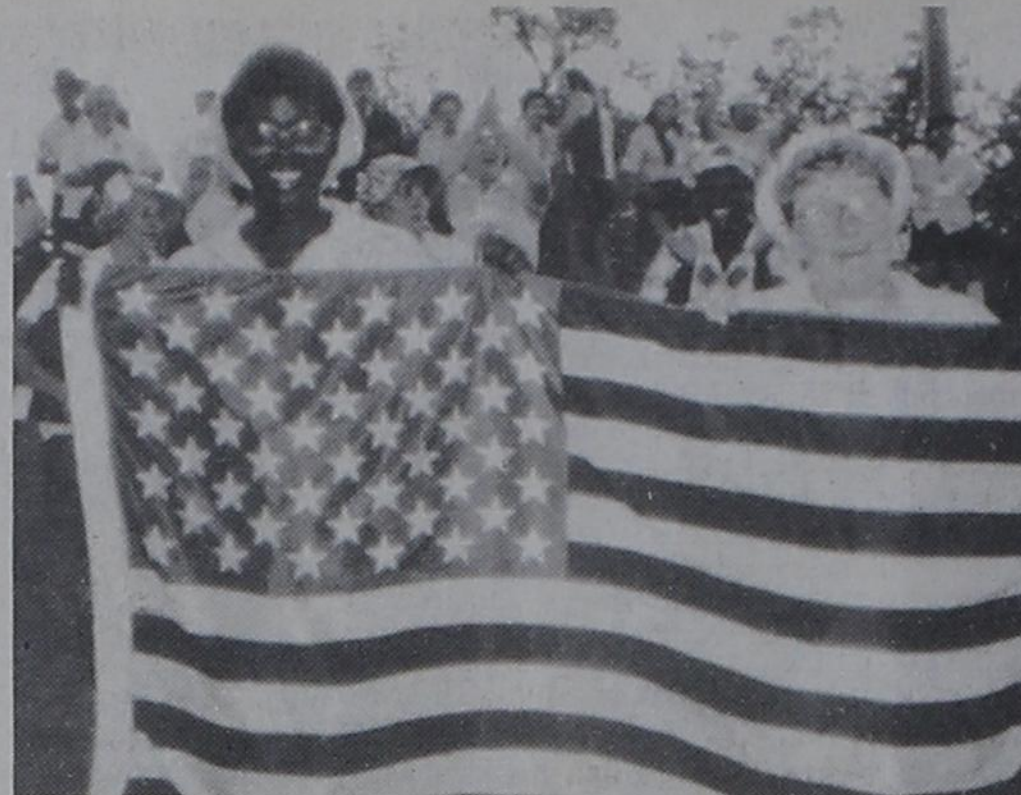
One of the favorite activities - not listed on the schedule of events, of course - was "Swaps." All the girls brought items to trade and Echo Valley was a bonanza for swappers.

After seeing Angie's pink hat (the badge of her village) I understood just how popular the swaps were. The little pink hat that weighed practically nothing when she received it would now weigh in at five pounds, at least.

It was completely covered with pins, badges, and mementos of her time in Echo Valley. Each ornament on the hat was a new friend, a new experience, something to remember.

Thursday, July 21 was the time to say farewell - a last chance to mingle, share and laugh together.

In the evening the girls met, as sisters and friends, for a closing ceremony and campfire - to close Echo Valley '88 - a great experience for Angie Cruse and one she says she will never forget.

I enjoy opening my mail here at the Dispatch - even the junk mail can be entertaining at times, taking into consideration how amazed I can be at some of the foolish things some people (or government agencies) do.

But what amazes me most is the fact that I continue to be amazed. You'd think that by now I wouldn't be at all surprised that people not only do all these foolish things, they write them down in black and white and mail them all over the country so everyone knows just how foolish they are.

Consider this...the Federal Reserve System recently completed a study on money - costing who knows how much money - and came up with these earth-shaking facts:

Pocket Money - The average man carries \$145 in his pocket, about twice as much cash as the average woman. She carries \$74 in her purse.

If they're trying to tell us we can save our money by not having a checking account or credit cards and by being paid only in \$100 bills, I could've told them that - and for a lot less money than that survey cost.

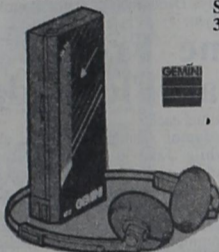

Be Sure You Get Your 'Flu Shot'

The influenza season is just about upon us, and right now is a good time for certain high-risk individuals to be immunized against this disease usually associated with the winter months.

"Influenza kills about 20,000 individuals in the U.S. each year,

most of them in the high-risk categories," said Steve McInelly, a public health advisor with the Immunization Division of the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

"By high-risk categories, we mean persons 65 or older, persons with chronic respiratory and cardiovascular conditions, and children weakened by health problems," he explained.

Flu season is most intense from December through April, although cases can occur in any month. And since the virus mutates frequently, immunizations should be updated yearly. The strains of flu predicted to be most threatening this year are A-Taiwan, A-Sichuan and B-Victoria.

A single vaccine guards against all three of these strains, and persons immunized last year need to be immunized again this year to be fully protected. Because the vaccine is improved, it causes very few reactions, and takes full effect within about two weeks of the "shot."

Contact your personal physician or local health department if you have questions about immunization," McInelly advised.

Typical influenza illness is characterized by an abrupt onset of fever, accompanied by a sore throat, "dry" cough and extreme malaise. Severe cases may lead to pneumonia or may be fatal to persons with other weakening conditions.

IRS Agrees to Cancel Oil Tax Paperwork

The Internal Revenue Service has agreed to drop its rule forcing Texas oil operators to file another batch of paperwork as required by the now-defunct Windfall Profits

Tax, says U.S. Senator Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

"The Windfall Profits Tax is dead and gone, thanks to Congress and the President approving the repeal proposal that I offered with Senator David Boren of Oklahoma," Gramm said. "But the \$100 million paperwork burden imposed by the old law threatened to haunt us into next year."

"So I am delighted to report that the Treasury Department has taken a common-sense approach which holds that if you don't owe any Windfall Profits Tax payments for this year, you won't have to file any more paperwork with the federal government."

The senator noted that even though the tax has produced very little revenue for the last few years, taxpayers, consumers and the oil industry were required to bear the continuing cost of a massive record-keeping effort.

"That was a dead-weight burden of \$100 million, all in the name of a tax that isn't being collected and which is now officially gone," Gramm said.

The Permit, issued to City of Lubbock on September 24, 1984, authorizes the construction and maintenance of a dam creating a 115,937 acre-foot capacity reservoir on South Fork Double Mountain Fork Brazos River, tributary of the Brazos River, Brazos River Basin, in Garza and Kent Counties, approximately 21 miles southeast of Post, Texas for recreational use, the diversion and use of not to exceed 35,000 acre-feet of water per annum from the reservoir for municipal purposes and use of not exceed 21,000 acre-feet per annum of the sewage effluent created by the municipal use authorized to irrigate 10,000 acres of land in Lubbock and Lynn Counties.

The permit indicated a commencement date for the project of September 25, 1986 and a completion date of September 25, 1989. By Commission Order of October 8, 1986, the time limitation for commencement of construction of the dam was extended to September 25, 1988. The applicant is requesting to extend the commencement date of construction from September 25, 1988 to September 25, 1992 and to extend the completion date of construction from September 25, 1989 to September 25, 1995. The city anticipates that construction can commence and be completed on or before the above dates.

The applicant has requested the extension of time due to the fact that the city's request for a Section 404 permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for the project is still being processed. In accordance with a settlement agreement between the city and a party who had originally appealed the Commission Order granting Application No. 4155, land acquisition for the reservoir will not begin until the Corps permit is obtained by the city. It is anticipated that the Corps permit will be issued around the end of 1988 or early 1989. A tentative agreement has been reached by the city with the appropriate agencies concerning the suitability of a proposed mitigation site and an operating plan is being proposed. The city has estimated that final design and preparation of construction plans and specifications for the dam would begin in early 1989.

The city is in the process of negotiating a contract with the Brazos River Authority whereby the authority will construct, operate and maintain the project to supply water to Lubbock. The Application for Extension of Time was received on September 16, 1988, and accepted for filing on October 13, 1988. The Executive Director has reviewed this application and declares it to be administratively complete.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person requests a public hearing.
