POST OFFICE TO BE HELD AT POST OFFICE

Blankets will be ready for distribution on Thursday, February 13 to those who are interested in receiving substitute clerk or carrier work at the local post office. The blankets will be issued from the post office, and must be filled out and on file with the manager, Tenth Civil Service District, Customhouse, New Orleans, La., not later than February 24.

Applications must possess the following qualifications to secure work at the post office: They must be a citizen of the United States; They must have reached the age of eighteen, but not over forty-five years; Persons appointed much have such health and freedom from physical defects as will enable them to meet the rigid physical standard which the Post Office Department and the Civil Service Commission consider necessary to perform the duties of these positions. Before appointment they will be given a physical examination by a Federal medical officer.

Further information will be given applicants at the Post Office.

Although Mr. Miller is a resident of Ft. Worth he is well known in this vicinity having spent most of his time in Lamesa since 1910 and having extensive real estate holdings in Dawson county since 1900.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon, Feb. 8, at 2:30 o'clock from the Broadway Baptist church in Fort Worth with Rev. White officiating. Interment was in a Fort Worth cemetery.

Musical Centennial Program Underway

The State Department of Education, headed by Dr. L. A. Woods, has sent the program of the Centennial Music features to local school authorities. A chorus of 50,000 Texas school children is desired for the school chorus on June 13, 1936 and as many more are expected to participate in the state-wide choral program, to be held in Dallas on October 30th, 1936. Every band and orchestra in Texas schools is requested to make preparations through rehearsals for participation in the Band and Orchestra program on November 10th.

The State Superintendent has asked that all counties be organized for a county-wide open air program some time in the spring, and that the counties send their best singers and players to a district or regional program.

The bulletins list the songs and phonograph records for Primary, Junior, High School and adult choruses as well as for the Colored Choruses and all numbers of the band and orchestra numbers.

Mr. Roberts of the Elementary school has been designated to head up a Dawson County program in which the pupils of Dawson County may participate. He will await warmer weather and some Interscholastic League events before announcing his plans. He does state, however, that he hopes to be able to use the lights and seating facilities of the Lamesa High School Football Field.

Applicants For Pension Must Prove Income

Austin—(Special)—Applicants should be able to prove their yearly income because of old-age assistance law provides that \$360 yearly for single persons and \$720 yearly for married couples must be the total of revenues received by applicants from all sources including the State aid. Orville S. Carpenter, executive director-designate of the Old Age Assistance Commission said today about the new law.

"Applicants should be prepared to make a full and complete statement of all earnings for the two years immediately preceding application," Mr. Carpenter declared.

"The cash or security clause in the new law necessitates that applicants be able to tell the exact amount of money they have in the bank. They should be prepared to give a description owned, serial numbers, from whom purchased, etc.," he explained. "If securities were sold, the name of the purchaser must be known. Full details about all securities handled, bought, or sold during the last two years must be provided.

"Not only does the requirement concern earned income, but aid received from any source must be listed," Carpenter stated.

Section 7, subsection (e) of the new law reads that the application shall contain the following information:

If receiving aid from any source, the amount received and from whom, or if such aid be not in cash money, then a description of such aid tendered, together with the name of the source of such aid and from whom; the amount received from the United States Government, State or County, public or private charitable organizations, corporations, or private individuals.

Applicants will be able to get blanks in their own locality February 14. These forms may be filed as soon as filled out by applicants.

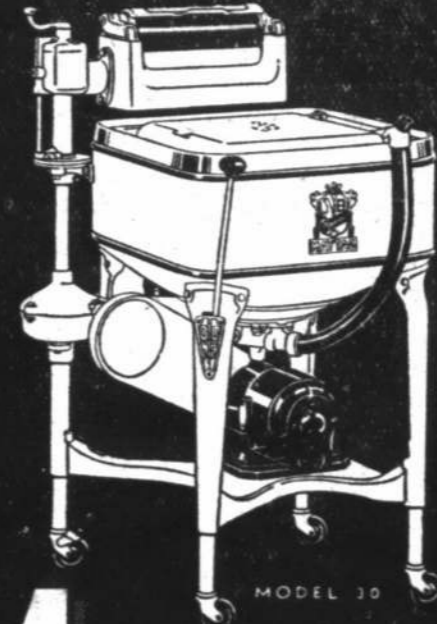

Health Dept. Warns Against Tuberculosis

Austin, Texas—Tuberculosis, in common with the other major killers, is a criminal whose work is effectively carried on under cover of ignorance, stated Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

Carelessness is its greatest ally. How otherwise explain the conduct of persons who, despite poor appetite, faulty digestion, loss of weight, loss of strength or a sensation of tiredness in the afternoons, refuse to admit that their condition requires professional investigation? Personal co-operation is necessary if we would cut down the ravages of this preventable disease.

Tuberculosis is no respecter of persons; no one is immune to tuberculous infection. Children who are in repeated contact with tuberculous persons almost invariably contract the infection. All children, therefore, should be protected at all times from protracted exposure to infection from persons known or suspected of having the disease.

Removal of the contact cases, protection of the infant and very young, and prompt professional advice when symptoms suggestive of tuberculosis arise, will do much to reduce the tuberculosis death rate. But, as has been indicated, these measures by their very nature are largely outside the province of health officials. The problem is quite definitely a personal one.

ON TEXAS FARMS

Called on in a meeting for reports on outstanding home demonstration work in their counties in 1935, and allotted only one sentence each in which to report, the following interesting items were revealed by home demonstration agents:

Palo Pinto County—Pauline Lokey, agent—Each club had 1 demonstrator and one cooperator to put out 50 asparagus crowns, and each club had 1 demonstrator plant seed for crowns for 1936.

Baylor County—Nona Roberson, agent—One club exhibited 39 varieties of fresh vegetables from fall gardens; 18 varieties were from a cooperator who was once a food supply demonstrator. "Once a demonstrator, always a demonstrator."

Archer County—Georgia Mae Evans, agent—One 4-H club girl has improved the entire home as a result of being a bedroom demonstrator.

Jones County—Jewell Faulkner, agent—In Jones county more than 30,000 feet of tile have been laid in the gardens of the girls and women in the organized clubs to say nothing of that laid in rural communities.

Collin County—Helen Dunlap, agent—About 50% of a wagon load of grape cuttings put out during February 1935 by the home demonstration club women are living.

Parker County—Annie Mae Donaghey, agent—440 containers of tomato products from 1/2 acre of marglobe tomatoes at a cost of 40c—30 cents fertilizer, 10 cents for seeds,—reported by Miss Julia Staggs, Spring Creek home demonstration club.

Tarrant County—Mary Powell, agent—Tarrant county farm families have reserved over 300 certificates for tax exempt cotton to make mattresses as result of our mattress work.

Kaufman County—Golden Fry, agent—In the farm food demonstration, one demonstrator canned 2,000 quarts for her pantry, 31 farm food demonstrators completed pantries with sufficient storage and needed varieties of products.

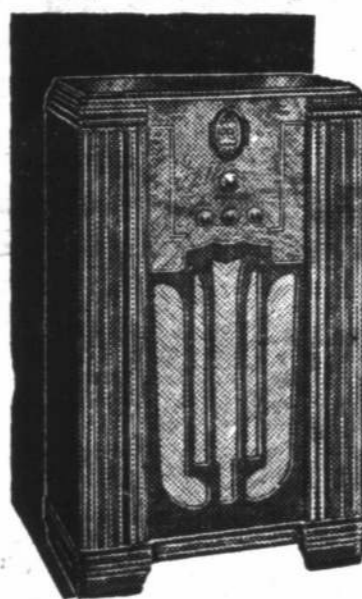

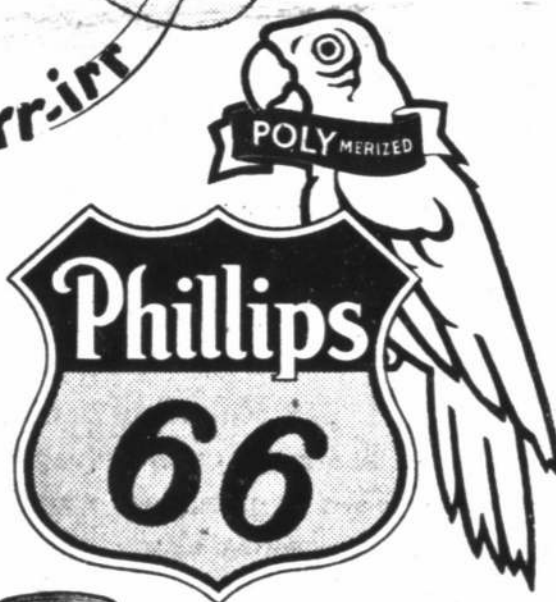

PROPERTY EXEMPTION OF PENSION APPLICANT

Austin, February 12—Because \$7,500 worth of property for a married and \$5,000 for a single person are listed as legal disqualifications under the old-age assistance law, applicants necessarily should be able to give adequate description of all real property owned as well as personal property if the lat-

ter is valued at \$1,000 or more, Orville S. Carpenter, who will be Executive Director of the Old Age Assistance Commission, said today concerning the new law.

"Each applicant should be able to describe all personal property, including jewelry, furniture, automobiles, and live stock, in addition to his or her real property," Mr. Carpenter explained.

All applicants should have the following information available:

- (1) Original purchase price and date of purchase of all property.
- (2) Description of property from the county tax assessor telling block number, etc.
- (3) Amount of property rendered for on tax rolls.
- (4) Name of lien holder and amount still due on mortgage, as well as total equity in property. Also date and amount of lien.
- (5) Description of all property disposed of during the last two years, person sold to, and purchase price obtained from such sale. Also date of transfer.

Applicants will be able to get blanks in their own locality February 14. These forms may be filed as soon as filled out by applicants.

Large Increase In Cotton Production Over South Plains

More than three times as many bales of cotton had been ginned in 19 South Plains counties in Lubbock's territory than were ginned up to the corresponding date last year, bureau of the census report issued as of January 16, this year for the 1935 crop, compared with the 1934 crop.

Ginnings were 342,271 bales, compared with 33,561 bales, an increase of 258,710 bales or slightly under 310 per cent increase.

One more ginning report may be expected, as of March 1. Ginnings are estimated by cotton men as at least 95 per cent of the season's total. Some say the crop is even greater ginned than that figure.

Lubbock county leads with 47,545 bales; Lynn is a close second with 45,306 bales while Lamb is third with 29,071 bales.

Other counties rank Dawson, fourth; Hockley, fifth; Terry, sixth; Scurry, seventh; Hale, eighth; Crosby, ninth; Dickens, tenth.

For the 1934 crop, rankings were: Lamb, Terry, Scurry, Lynn, Hale, Hockley, Dawson, Bailey, Crosby.

State ginnings were 2,791,706 bales for 1935 as compared with 2,292,074 bales for 1934 at this date.

Twenty counties in the state ginned 30,000 bales or more; Lubbock ranked eighth and Lynn ninth. Jones, West Texas county was second; Haskell, tenth; Knox, 14th; Wilbarger, 18th and Taylor, 19th.
