NEW FILM TELLS GRIPPING TRUE STORY

"Shiokari Pass," a new film from the producers of "The Hiding Place," will be shown at Robert Lee Baptist Church on Sunday, June 26. The one hour color release from World Wide Pictures will be shown once beginning at 7 p.m.

"Shiokari Pass" is unique among World Wide Pictures productions. Although it has an English soundtrack, it was originally produced for showing to Japanese audiences. It was filmed entirely in Japan with a Japanese cast and crew, and depicts the delicate beauty of that country. The drama of the story unfolds against a backdrop of Japan's spring blossoms, snowcapped mountains, and whispering native music.

A true story, "Shiokari Pass" is based on the international best seller by Ayako Miura. Nearly two million readers have been touched by this story of the abiding love of a young couple at the turn of the century.

Credited with creating a deeper understanding of the Christian faith among the Japanese people, the film tells of the love of Nubuo for Fujiko, and of his willingness to be guided by his personal faith, no matter how great the cost of commitment.

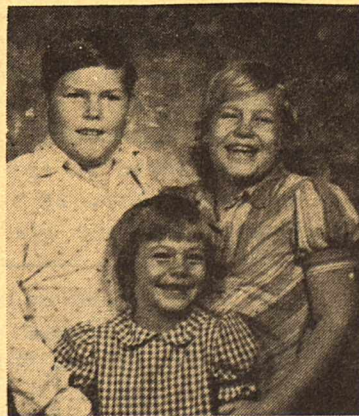

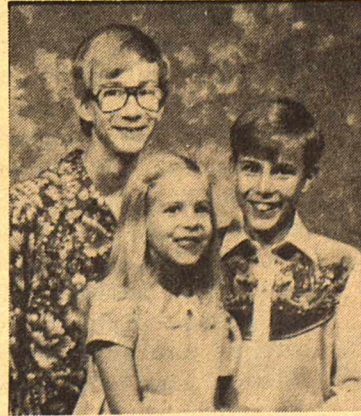

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Congressman Bob Krueger Reports

Communication Is Name of Game

Communication is the name of the game.

As simple as it is, I learned the appropriateness of that phrase last week in front of a national television audience.

I had been asked to appear on the NBC Nightly News program opposite Presidential Press Secretary Jody Powell, just 24 hours after a House Subcommittee on Energy and Power had approved my amendment calling for gradual deregulation of natural gas prices.

The intent of the "confrontation" was to clarify some of the differences between my views on natural gas deregulation and those of the administration's. It is obvious that we share similar goals, to supply plentiful and economical fuel to the American people, but we differ in the way we think these goals can be attained. I also believe my amendment addresses itself to the very important issue of environmental impact, while the administration's proposed coal conversion plans seem to ignore some serious effects such a conversion can have on the environment.

Mr. Powell had made comments about my amendment, which calls for immediate deregulation only of a limited percentage of narrowly-

defined "new" natural gas and for 5-year phased-in deregulation of offshore gas, to the effect that my amendment called instead for total and immediate deregulation.

Because my deregulation amendment pertains only to what is defined as "new natural gas", it would affect only about 10 per cent of the natural gas supply now available, but, at the same time, would provide incentive for further exploration, which means more jobs, more gas and, in the long run, more economical fuel for the consumer.

After Mr. Powell's statement, which he made from an elegantly furnished White House office, the cameras returned to me in a stark television studio a few miles from the White House. I replied that the press secretary's comments were consummately and absolutely false, then time ran out, before I could explain the precise points of my amendment, points that Mr. Powell obviously had not time to study.

It now falls upon me and other members of congress--without the aid of national television time--to go about the task of educating the nation on the specifics of complex, yet extremely important, energy legislation.

After the brief national TV appearance, I did receive some unanticipated support, also at the national level.

Newsweek Magazine, in this week's edition, has done a 750-word profile concerning my efforts and that story puts into perspective some of the most confusing elements of natural gas deregulation and the role it plays in the overall energy picture.

Then, over the weekend, syndicated columnist George Will, in a nationally televised program, said "Bob Krueger has done more to resolve the energy crisis" than anyone in the administration.

That calibre of support is appreciated, particularly when it comes from highly respected and objective sources such as a national magazine and a journalist with the integrity of Mr. Will, but it also points out the increasing importance of getting to the American people the information they need to help their legislators determine the route we must go to prevent energy shortages, to supply fuel at a reasonable price and to protect the environment.

That challenge, as complex and difficult as it is, is one I accept. I hope the people of Texas, and the entire nation, take the time to differentiate between off-the-cuff emotional rhetoric and responsible and scholarly reaction.

CATTLE PRICES RISE, PRODUCERS GET LESS

Retail beef prices have increased about 5 per cent in recent weeks, and cattlemen may soon be getting a slightly bigger piece of the beef profit pie, says a livestock marketing specialist.

Of course, marketing costs have been partially responsible for the increase in retail beef prices, but these costs do not benefit producers. Following a substantial drop in the farm-to-retail price spread in April and early May, it is jumping up once again.

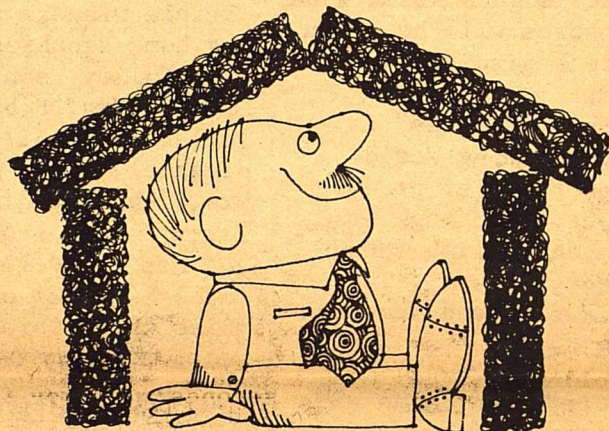

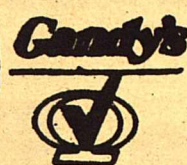

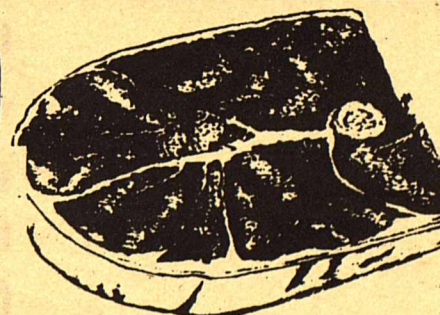

Brochure Tells Of Market News

How the federal-state market news program for farm commodities works is outlined in an updated brochure just released by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The program is operated by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS), usually in cooperation with state departments of agriculture.

The brochure, aimed at the nation's entire agricultural marketing sector from producer to retailer, gives basic information on where and how market information is collected, the commodities reported, and how the reports are disseminated. It shows where to get detailed information on market news covering individual commodities.

Market news, offered as a public service by USDA since 1915, provides timely information on the supply, demand, prices, and movement of livestock, grain, poultry, eggs, dairy products, fruits, vegetables, cotton, tobacco, and other commodities.

There are about 220 market reporters working in 178 year-round and seasonal offices nationwide collecting, analyzing and disseminating market news. A constant flow of information is maintained between offices by a combined teletype and data communications network operated by AMS.

Market reports reach the public through commercial news wire services, radio and television stations, newspapers and trade magazines, and printed reports mailed on request. In recent years, use of taped telephone reports has rapidly expanded in all marketing areas to give callers instant market information when needed.

Belt Variety Has Cinch on Fashion

A variety of belt styles accent fashionable slim waists this season.

Style conscious consumers can choose ready-made belts--or create their own.

Some belts simply tie--these may be in solid color cording, leather, or in fabric to match the garment.

Others made of ribbons and trims sewn to backing give different and fashionable touch to a simple dress or top.

Both wide and narrow belts with buckles--or other types of fasteners--are popular, too.

On many wide belts, especially the waist-cincher type, we're seeing interlocking closures in interesting texture or color.

On narrow belts, the buckle may be a disc or other decorative shape with a hidden fastener on the back. These work nicely with simple, understated belting, such as fabric that matches the garment or simple leather belting.

For belts with rich detail, however, simpler buckles are more attractive.

Also, some buckles have a rough-and-ready appearance--and these coordinate best with heavier suede and other leather-type beltings. Their special waist accent gives casual clothes a lot of interest.

For another exciting effect, today's belt wearer can "pair up" an unusual buckle with a complementary fabric for the belt--such as nautical buckle over fabric of stars or anchors printed in a straight line to make belts.

Convenience foods, easy care fabrics, power lawn mowers, stereos, electric carving knives and toothbrushes, automatic washer-dryers have become a part of our daily high-energy-use society--but not for long, says Mrs. Fay C. Roe County Extension Agent.

Energy-conscious families need to make new rules for using energy and think through the multiple uses of appliances and machines they already own to determine their most efficient use and future purchases.

In addition, our energy supply is not the only environmental force we need to consider--the earth's capacity to assimilate wastes, and the supply of natural resources, whether renewable or nonrenewable, are also important factors.

Economic and environmental realities that will force lifestyle and consumption changes, according to the agent, include--

- * fewer disposable goods and throw-away containers
- * smaller, less luxurious, more energy-efficient houses and cars
- * increased home production of foods, clothing and other goods and services
- * substitution of human energy for fuel in both home and market production processes
- * reduced travel and family mobility
- * increased emphasis on conservation and the recycling of materials, and improved consumer practices.

Sundresses and tube tops that are shirred with elastic thread will last longer if laundered in cool water, because heat damages elastic. Then drip dry or use no-heat setting on the dryer.

Window screens are coming back into favor--as more families use windows for ventilation in order to lower utility costs.

Screwworm Are At All Time Low

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program reached two milestones in the "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms" campaign on June 17, reports Dr. James E. Novy, director of field operations.

It was the end of the first week since April that no screwworm cases were recorded in Texas. The latest confirmed case, from Brewster County, was identified in the laboratory June 9.

It was also the end of the first June week since June 20, 1964, that Texas was screwworm free. In years before the program started, June was normally the month with most severe screwworm problems.

Novy says 29 cases of the parasite have been recorded in Texas so far this year. By June 17 of last year the total was 3,441.

Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe, at a February meeting in Austin, kicked off the "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms" campaign, saying the cold and wet winter had given the program a big assist.

Briscoe explained that sterile flies produced at the Mexico-U.S. plant in southern Mexico are now augmenting production of the plant at Mission, Texas. "This is the year the job can be finished by ranchers, the Texas A&M Extension Service, the Texas Animal Health Commission, and the Screwworm Eradication Program all working together," said Briscoe.

Novy says it is essential that each rancher carefully watch his animals, treat all wounds with a protective smear, and submit samples of all worms taken from wounds for laboratory identification.

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FARMERS FACING HOT, DRY WEATHER

Texas farmers and ranchers will have to put up with another month of hot, dry weather if National Weather Service officials are right in their forecasts. They are calling for below normal precipitation for the period of mid-June to mid-July for nearly all of Texas, and temperatures should be above normal for the northern half of the state and near normal for southern and western sections.

Rep. Massey, who will discuss recent legislation, was chairman of the House Public Education Committee during the 65th Legislature. He also served on the House Administration and Natural Resources Committees.

Krueger will discuss pollution problems and permits as they pertain to agriculture.

Following the business session, a tour will be taken of the Mueller Supply Company.

Sixteen soil and water conservation districts are members of the West Texas Association. They include: Upper Colorado, Upper Clear Fork, Concho, Middle Clear Fork, Mitchell, North Concho River, Coke County, Runnels, Middle Concho, Sandhills, Mustang, Howard, Midland, Nolan County, Andrews and Central Colorado.

Current officers of the organization are J.M. Sterling, president, Colorado City; J.D. Crawford, president elect, Midland; and Cone Robinson, Sr., treasurer, Norton.

Cities Receive June Sales Tax

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday his office has mailed checks totaling \$39.3 million to 865 Texas cities for their June share of the one percent city sales tax.

Robert Lee and Bronte received their share of the payment to the tune of \$2,577.88 and \$1,727.91, respectively.

Payments in 1977 to date in Bronte amounted to \$4,919.62, compared to \$4,536.66 to the June date in 1976, an increase of 8 percent.

The 1977 payments to Robert Lee to date totaled \$6,964.06, compared to \$6,782.75 to date in 1976, for an increase of 2 percent.

The latest checks bring to \$167.1 million the amount rebated to the cities to date this year, a 15.1 percent increase over the same period last year.

The city of Houston again received the fattest check--\$7.5 million--while Dallas and Fort Worth received \$4.8 million and 1.8 million, respectively.

Roanoke received the smallest check--\$15.79.

Bullock also reminded Texas taxpayers of the following bills approved by the 1977 Legislature which will affect sales tax collections:

--- SB 110 exempts from the sales tax syringes and hypodermic needles used for medical purposes. The bill is effective Aug. 29.

--- HB 694 exempts newspapers and subscription sales of magazines from state and local sales taxes effective Aug. 29.

--- HB 1831, now in effect, exempts from the sales tax the sale and rental of motion picture film to or by movie theaters and television stations.

Bullock said that the exemptions will have only minor effect on overall sales and use tax collections.

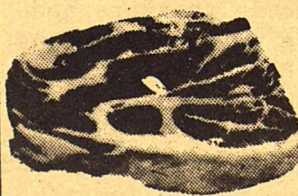

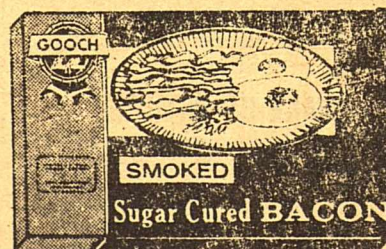
