But for myself, their determination and plain old persistence endears them to me. I hate the little boogers for the mess they cause, but at the same time can't resist a rueful smile as I, too, pull down the wads of nesting materials they install over the building.

I hate to admit it, but if they ever get as far as laying eggs...well, the sparrows will finish raising their family unmolested, by me at least.

The Rivercrest Allied Youth Organization presented an Alcohol Awareness Program on May 2 in the high school auditorium. The program was to inform the students of the real effects of alcohol.

Guest speakers were Joyce Clark, Chairman of the Board of the Dallas-Ft. Worth Chapter of M.A.D.D., Jim Hooper, a defense attorney from Texarkana, and John Davidson, Regional Director of Services in the alcoholism division of Ark-Tex Council of Governments in Texarkana.

Mrs. Clark, originally from Bogata, spoke to the students concerning the M.A.D.D. (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers) chapter which she helped form two years ago following a tragic crash, killing three people and injuring several others caused by a drunk driver.

Jim Hooper is a graduate of the University of Arkansas School of Law. He handles criminal cases many of which concern DWI offenses. He spoke from the standpoint of the laws concerning these cases.

John Davidson gave the students his views on how the attitudes of the American public must change about the problem of alcohol abuse can be solved. The program was effective and well received by the student body and visitors.

Wildflowers To Look At, Not Pick

This spring's profusion of bluebonnets and other wildflowers in many areas of the state has prompted numerous calls to state agencies about the legality of picking the flowers on public lands and state owned highway rights of way.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said there is some justification for confusion, since state law on the subject is subject to interpretation.

Officials said it is unlawful to pick, dig up or otherwise damage any plant found in a state or national park. Although the bluebonnet has been designated by the Texas Legislature as the official state flower, the plant is not granted any more protection from picking under state law than any other wildflower.

A spokesman for the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation said state law declares it a misdemeanor to "recklessly damage or destroy" wildflowers along state owned road rights of way.

However, he said although his department discourages the public from disturbing the flowers, law enforcement agencies' officials normally do not construe casual enjoyment of the plants, including picking to be reckless damage and destruction.

State agency officials recommend that Texans and visitors enjoy this year's unusually lush offerings of wildflowers without damaging or removing

them, in order to allow more people the privilege.

Another recent topic of curiosity has been the availability of seeds for growing bluebonnets and other wildflowers. Officials said no state agency distributes or sells seeds, but some may be available from commercial seed firms, feed stores or plant nurseries.

Paris Art Fair Unique Events
 The 22 year old Paris Art Fair traditionally attracts artists and spectators from a wide area. Many will come this year from your community, and we wish to reach them with word of our features, attractions and delights planned for May 7 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.
 A rainbow of hot air balloons will add a new dimension May 7 to the 22nd annual Paris Art Fair, rising above the usual music, dancing and special events planned at Paris Junior College.
 Professional artists and amateur craftsmen from across the country will display and sell their work during the fair from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Entertainment for bagpipers, Indian dancers, local singers and musicians—as well as the hot air balloon antics—combine to make the Paris Art Fair an event for the whole family, the whole day.
 At least 25 huge colorful balloons will be in Paris to coincide with the fair, for a nationally sanctioned balloon competition. Preliminary runs on Friday, May 6, the balloons will perform at least three times through Sunday in the "Greater Paris Hot Air Balloon Competition."

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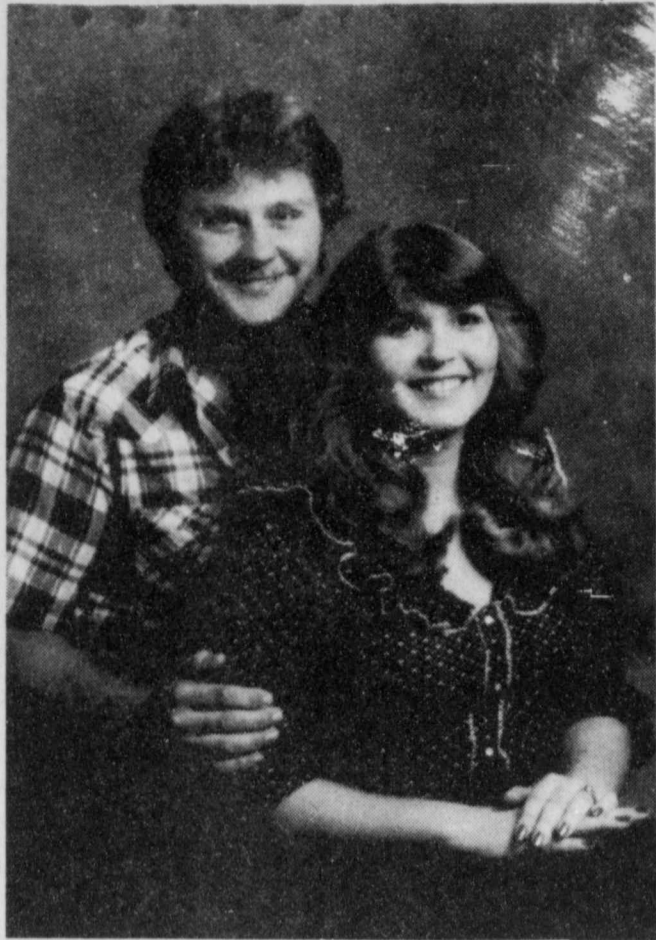

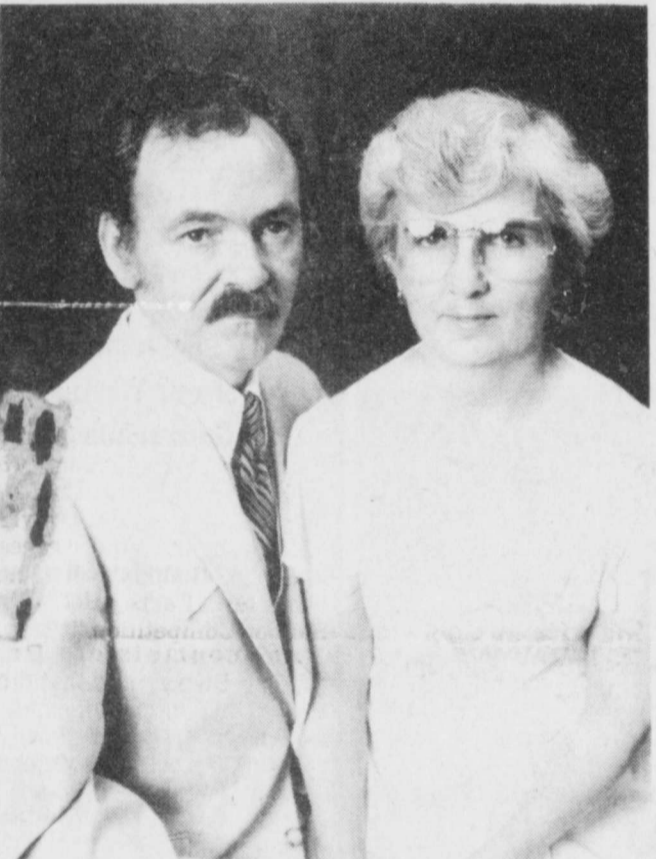

After a tour of south Texas and a short trip to Old Mexico, the couple will make their home at Lake Palestine.

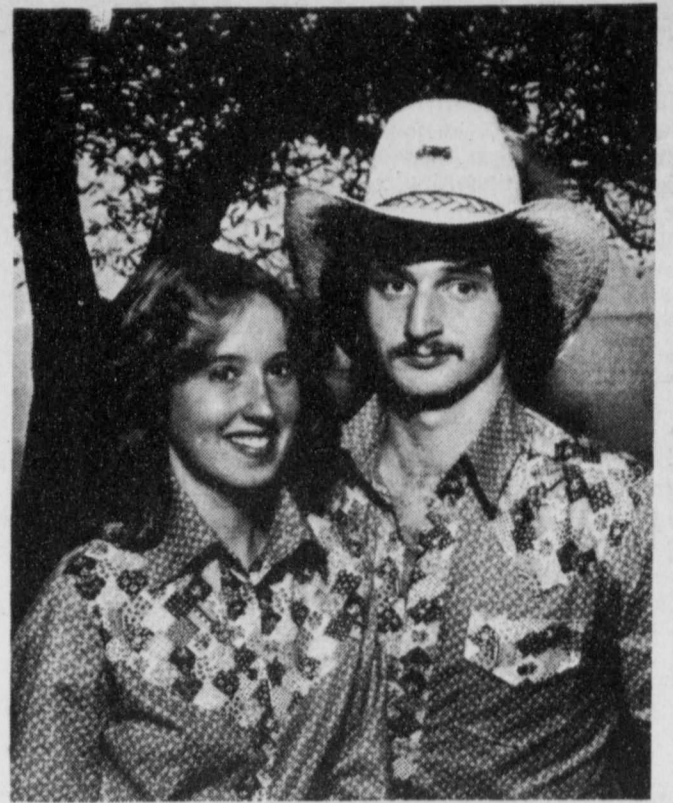

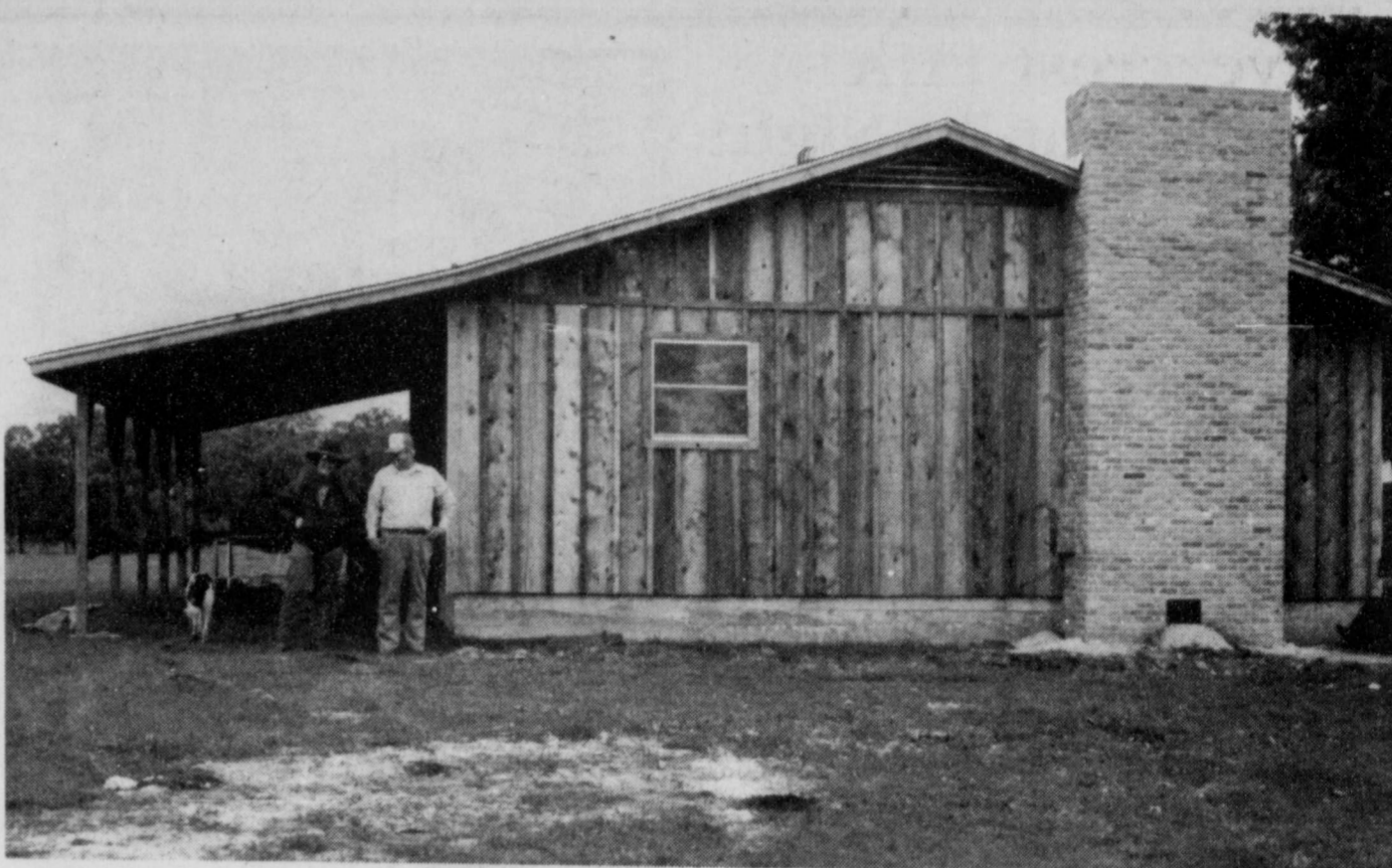

IMPORTANCE OF COLOR VISION

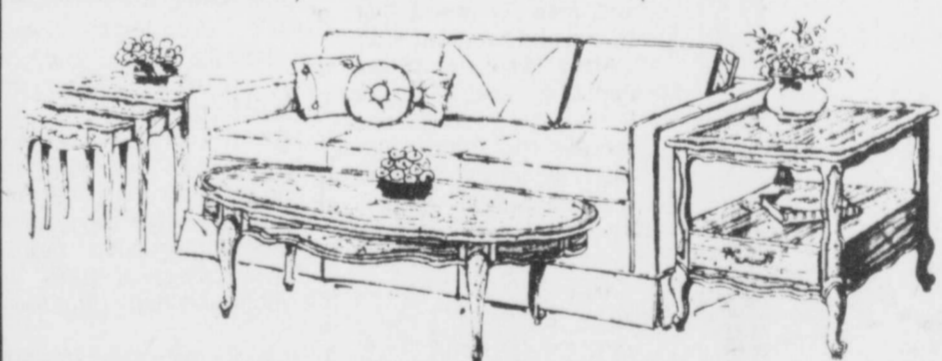

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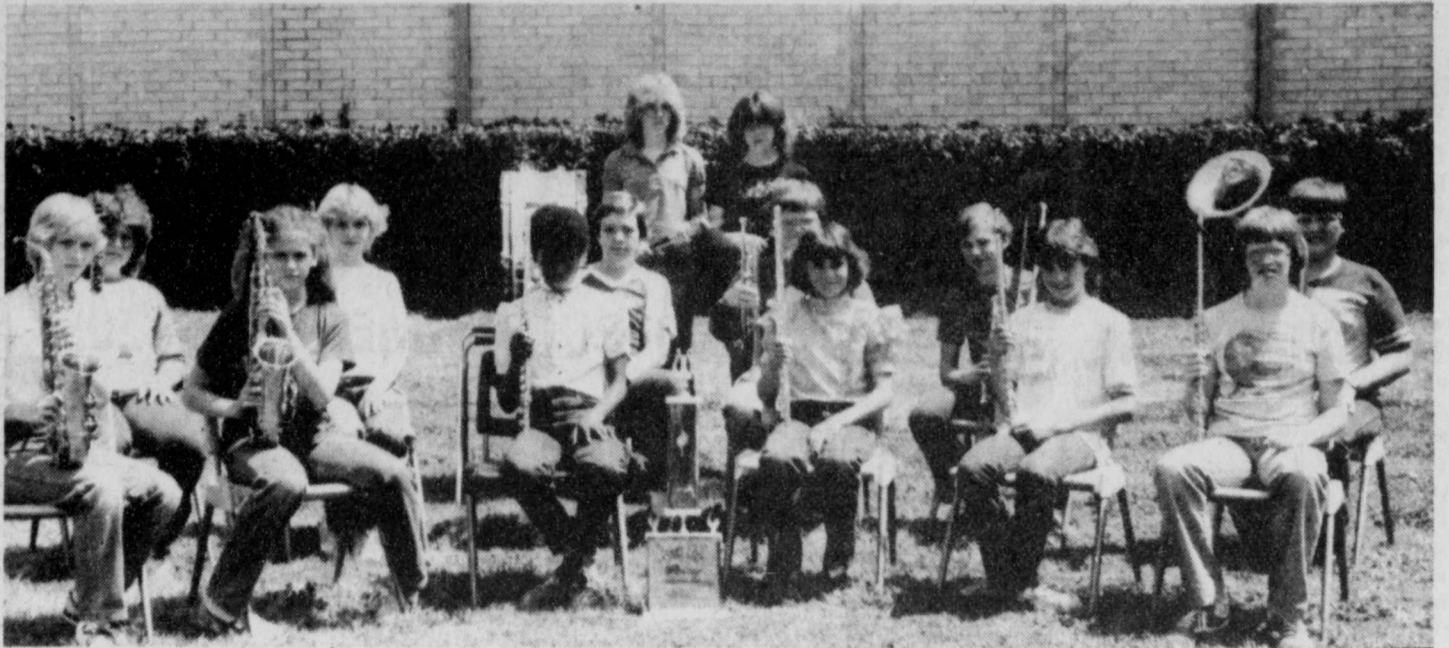
