Endurance Fliers Pass 400 Hours

(By International News Service)
LAMBERT FIELD, ST. LOUIS, July 30.—A race requesting the endurance fliers to come down some time today was prepared by Major William B. Robertson who is in charge of the company sponsoring the flight. At first he intended to make the race an order but decided to make it a quest.

LAMBERT FIELD, ST. LOUIS, July 30.—The "St. Louis Robin" passed its 400th hour of sustained flight at 8:17 this morning.

ST. LOUIS, July 30.—After having past their four hundredth hour of unbroken flight, pilots Dale Jackson and Forrest O'Brien today sent to the ground from the champion plane, "St. Louis Robin" a suggestion that the spectators "Go home and come back next week if they wanted to see us land." But this morning its motors began to lose its rhythmic hum and field observers are of the opinion that the flight is nearing an end.

LAMBERT FIELD, ST. LOUIS, July 30.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and his wife, who were en route to New York city from Kansas City, zoomed over Lambert Field today and waved a salute to the endurance fliers in "The St. Louis Robin." The Lindberghs then landed and got out of their plane for a short while. O'Brien and Jackson had been aloft 413 hours at 12:17 o'clock this afternoon.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 30.—Funeral service arrangements are being completed here today for Capt. P. J. Crichton and Owen Haugland, endurance fliers, who were killed when their plane "Minnesota" crashed after being aloft for 245 hours. It was Haugland's sixth attempt to better the endurance record. He died in a hospital several hours after the crash. Capt. Crichton was killed instantly.

American Candy Much Sought in Distant Climes

CHICAGO, July 30.—Patagonia is becoming "candy conscious."

So are the Virgin Islands. But neither are far ahead of residents of Alaska or British Malaya when it comes to taking proper care of a luscious chocolate cream or a pocketful of gum drops.

And as for South Africa. The most helpless thing imaginable is a truck load of hard candy when the natives of this far-flung point take it in hand.

All of this according to Ferdinand A. Bunte, of this city, in a statement concerning the growth of the confectionery industry in this country.

According to Bunte, America is doing more than its share in filling the sweet tooth of the world. Exports of American confections are increasing steadily and while English-speaking countries are the best customers, far off points are rapidly gaining.

The nature of the candy preferred by the different nations is highly varied. The British Kingdom bought ten times as much hard candy in 1927 as chocolate creams, while in Cuba, Panama, Nicaragua and South America the sale of chocolates amounted to approximately 40 per cent of their total candy bill.

But when a South African man-about-town goes wooing you'll find a jar of hard candy tucked under his arm, this being the favorite sort of sweet. The Fiji Islanders, on the other hand, like nothing so much as they do chocolate creams—and they must be of the best. To tickle a Uruguayan you must have a ready supply of bon bons or candied fruit, while the Alaskan and Newfoundlanders prefer gum drops while chasing seals here and there.

23 Miners Dead In German Blast

BERLIN, July 30.—Twenty-three miners were killed and twelve injured in a choke damp explosion at the Niederhermsdorf mine at Waldenburg, Silesia, today, according to information received here. Seven were seriously injured.

J. C. Penney Co. to Open Here in 1930

J. C. Penney Company is to open a store in Ballinger it was definitely announced Tuesday. The Penney company had been considering the location for some time, and made a thorough investigation of prospects here.

The building now occupied by the Ballinger Auto Company, and fronting on Hutchings Avenue adjoining the Farmers & Merchants State Bank has been leased. The lease is to take effect in 1930, and to run for ten years.

The months of January and February will be spent in getting the building ready for business, making alterations on the front, and many changes on the interior. The chain store will be in the building March 1st, 1930.

The lease calls for ten years occupancy, and stipulates \$3,900 per year at the rate of \$325 per month. The building covers all of lot two and part of the adjoining lot. The lease was filed in the county clerk's office by the J. C. Penney Company of Delaware.

Health Nurse is Back from Meet

Miss Addie Alexander, county health nurse, has returned from a vacation trip of a month's duration. While away she also attended a convention of nurses in Montreal, Canada. This convention was of international scope, and representatives from practically all countries of Europe were present as well as nurses from all parts of North America.

There were over 8,000 present at the meeting which began July 8th and continued through the 13th. Of this number about forty were from Texas, and practically all the Texans went on a special train made up at Fort Worth.

The convention heard many surgeons and doctors of national and international repute, and well known in their branches of healing. The principal speaker was a famous doctor from Italy.

Miss Alexander went from the convention to New York, where she spent some time, returning to Galveston by a boat which docked Sunday. She reports a very worthwhile and enjoyable trip.

BORDER PATROL WILL BE STRENGTHENED SOON

EL PASO, July 30.—The United States-Mexican border patrol may be strengthened as the result of the death at the hands of smugglers of Ivan E. Scotten, patrolman and other recent serious clashes between patrolmen and smugglers. Chief of patrol H. O. Horsley has indicated that in his official report on the death of Scotten he will ask that the patrol be strengthened to meet a growing situation. In the meantime, the suspected slayers of Scotten are still at liberty.

The task of patrolling the long stretch of borderland is filled with hazards, and the recent discovery by patrolmen of the presence of hi-jackers, who battle diligently with the liquor runners, has made the job an even worse one.

Often, Horsley says, small groups of U. S. patrolmen are forced to battle not only liquor runners, but the smugglers and hi-jackers together.

Legion Planning Much Activity

The Pat Williams Post of the American Legion is planning a Ballinger program that will be presented at the American Legion Hospital at Kerville some time during August. The Ballinger post troupe will be given a time, probably on a Sunday. The party can leave early in the morning, offer their program, and return home that night.

There are many tubercular soldiers being cared for at the Legion hospital and it is one of the largest institutions of its kind in the Southwest. Posts from all parts of the state have been presenting entertainment at the hospital for the disabled veterans, who greatly appreciate this attention from their former buddies of the World War. In addition to those on the program, the local post will send as many members of the Legion and Auxiliary as possible so that they may get a better idea of the bigness and helpfulness of the hospital.

The Legion post will call the Ballinger Pastor's Association together at an early date to start the final selection of a local citizen to be awarded the certificate as the most valuable citizen. This is a move instigated by the American Legion all over the nation. Each town where there is a Legion post each year issues one such certificate to some man or woman who has accomplished the most outstanding service for the community during the past year. A number of people are nominated to start the balloting and a double postal card system of voting is used to elect the person to whom the certificate will be issued.

Commander M. C. Atkins stated Tuesday that a called meeting would be held soon by the local post at which time those going to the state convention at Beaumont would be elected as delegates, and a committee appointed to work up a large delegation to attend the convention. A map, from the 17th district will be in the race for state commander at the Beaumont meet, and all posts in this district will make an effort to send large delegations to help elect him to the high office. Ben J. Dean, of Breckenridge, will be placed in nomination, after being mentioned for that place last year. Dean served on the national legislative committee and held a number of high state and national offices, and it is believed he will be elected against a number of others who aspire to the position.

BEAUTY PARLOR WOMAN STAGING HUNGER STRIKE

MEXICO CITY, July 30.—Twenty-two persons were killed and forty wounded in a violent battle between Agrarians and residents of towns in Sierra de Agua and Acultzingo, said a dispatch from Orizaba, in the state of Vera Cruz, this afternoon.

Convicts Sent to Other Prisons

AUBURN, N. Y., July 30.—One hundred freedom-crazed convicts, including the ringleaders in the revolt which turned the prison yard into a battlefield were shipped out here today, some going to Sing Sing, some to Clinton prison at Dannemora and others to Meadow Prison at Comstock, fearing the panic which had gripped the congested prison here might flare up in another outbreak. Search for the escaped convicts was continued today.

New Factory in Kansas City to Build Gliders

KANSAS CITY, July 30.—Kansas City is to have the first factory for the commercial production of gliders and the first training school for glider pilots in the Middle West, according to announcement made by the Cook Glider and Sailplane Company.

The concern, a Kansas corporation with a capitalization of \$50,000, will be located near the Fairfax airport here. It plans to start the construction of fifteen gliders immediately. The school for glider pilots will start operation in a short time, according to officials of the company.

Officials of the concern believe the manufacture of gliders and the training of pilots for motorless flying is an important step forward in the development of Kansas City as the aviation center of the United States.

They point out that pilots who become proficient in the use of gliders are more efficient pilots of power airplanes. It is expected a course of training in glider flying may become a prerequisite for pilot's license in the United States as it now is in Germany.

Two types of gliders will be produced by the company, Mr. Cook announced. One will be a primary training ship with a wing spread of thirty-five feet of the parasol type with open bridge type fuselage. It will weigh 250 pounds and sell for \$500.

The second type will be a sport glider with covered fuselage. It will weigh 200 pounds and sell for \$750. Later it is planned to manufacture a soapplane for the use of expert glider pilots.

Mr. Cook became interested in gliders when he was in the United States navy aviation service during the great war. He studied the development of the motorless craft and later built one here.

The Cook glider is said to be the second strictly American designed motorless craft to be perfected. It has been approved by the National Glider Association, governing body of motorless flights, and has been flown more than 200 times.

Cook believes gliders will play an important part in aviation in the future. He predicts they will be used as trainers of large power planes.

Fair Booster Trip Discussed at Meet

Due to illness and death in the family of one of the Texas & Pacific officials who were scheduled to meet with the directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning the visit of the railroad men was postponed to some future date. Announcement of the date of the meeting will be made in the near future, as it is thought that the meeting will be held soon.

A general discussion by those present was taken up, but no official data being available, nothing definite could be reached, so all action on the question was deferred until later.

A report of the representatives who went on the highway motorcade to Ft. Stockton was heard, and plans formulated for action.

The annual booster trip for the Runnels County Fair was brought up and dates for the excursion settled, it being decided that if possible to make the trip during the third week in August. This date is not definite, but is the one recommended for the trip. Officials of the chamber were authorized by those present to work with the fair officials in arranging an itinerary for the excursion and other details. The itinerary will be about the same as in previous years, it was decided. The program for the trip and the itinerary will be announced some time during the week, and final plans arranged.

COUNTRY WATCHING N. Y. BANK FAILURES

NEW YORK, July 30.—This city's two most recent and sensational bank failures which apparently have lost depositors in both institutions a total of around 12,000,000 is a matter of deep concern to every depositor in every bank in every state in the country.

The failures were those of the City Trust which carried some \$7,000,000 down with it, and the wreck of the 43-year-old Clark Brothers private institution in which thousands of depositors lost life-time savings to the amount of nearly \$5,000,000.

Disclosures in the first case have resulted in indictments against several of the bank officials and former state bank examiner Frank Warder. Some ten or fifteen indictments have been handed down against the four Clarke brothers and their partner, John F. Bouker.

Investigation of the latter case reveals a situation which will result in suggested remedial legislation in the matter of private institutions which do not call themselves banks, but which, in effect, really are.

MACHINE IS FASTER THAN LIGHTNING

LAFAYETTE, Ind., July 30.—A machine that operates faster than lightning and which can split a second into a million parts has been perfected by R. H. George, of the Purdue University engineering experiment station here. It is a new type of hot cathode oscillograph for use in studying high frequency electrical activity such as occurs in power transmission lines during thunderstorms.

As lightning flashes, the apparatus starts automatically and takes a photograph of what occurs on a power line and at the end of the flash shuts itself off.

The speed is so great that light may travel across the photographic film of the apparatus at the rate of 130 miles a second which would encircle the world, a distance of 25,000 miles in three minutes.

In addition to being a great aid to power companies in recording effects of lightning so that equipment may be made to meet the situation, a new field for the oscillograph has been found in testing voices for talking motion pictures.

Chinese Communists Spread Conspiracy

SHANGHAI, July 30.—A series of raids today by the French police uncovered what is considered as proof that a widespread conspiracy, aiming in city-wide disorders contemplated here Thursday by members of the Communist party. After two tons of documents had been examined, it was announced that the China Communist party was apparently the originators of the conspiracy. This party is alleged to be leagued with the Third International Party.

MOSCOW, July 30.—The Soviet Government today officially denied any negotiations looking toward a settlement soon—the Russian dispute has been settled.

Americans to Sail On Graf Zeppelin

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, July 30.—Preparations were virtually completed here today for the departure of the Graf Zeppelin for America. Present plans call for the start soon after dawn Thursday. Three American women, Mrs. Mary Pierce, of New York; Mrs. George Crouse, of Syracuse; and Rene Froissart, formerly of Hollywood, will make the trip. The passenger list is composed mainly of Americans. Frank E. Nicholson, formerly of Texas but now of New York plans to make the trip.

DANZIG OFFICIAL WINS DIVORCE CASE

BERLIN, July 30.—A social sensation which rocked the society of several nations came to an end when the courts of Danzig granted a divorce to Col. von Heydebreck, commander of the Danzig police.

The reason this divorce suit attracted international attention was that Col. von Heydebreck charged Prof. van Hamel, Dutch commissioner of the League of Nations in Danzig, with being the corespondent.

Prof. van Hamel became involved in the case through the publication of some letters alleging more than friendly relations on his part with Mrs. von Heydebreck. But van Hamel refused to appear in court, asserting his extraterritorial immunity.

For that reason the divorce suit dragged on for two and a half years. Finally, when van Hamel left Danzig on June 21, the courts pronounced the divorce.

PITTSBURGH POLICE GET ARMORED AUTOMOBILE

PITTSBURGH, July 30.—That this city is not far behind New York, Detroit and Chicago in advanced methods of warring on criminals was shown when the finance committee of the city council voted to purchase a partly armored automobile for use of the detective bureau. The cost was set at \$6,000.

Mueller hit safe, scoring Bean. Al Mueller was safe on a fielder's choice, forcing E. Mueller at second. Lynch drew a base on balls. Kittrell got a hit, but was caught off first and called out when he ran out of the line returning. Wes Parma was walked purposely by Kallina to fill the bases, and Hanna poked one over second base to score Al Mueller and Lynch.

Dick Ratliff, former Ballinger catcher, had a perfect day here Monday at the expense of his old teammates. He played right field for the Colts. Out of five times up Dick got a home-run and a double, two sacrifices, and a stroll.

Bill Bean's hitting was a large factor in the winning of the game Monday. His home run with two on in the third was a well hit pelota that soared over the high wire netting in right field, and his triple punch in the fifth proved that Bill can hit a left-hander in a pinch. He was hit by a pitched ball in the sixth and struck out his last time up when the third strike was called before he was in position at the platter.

INDIANA DRY MEN GET IMMENSE STILL

(By International News Service)

TERRE HAUTE, July 30. — One of the largest stills in this country was captured by local authorities at Burnett, Ind., near here. The still had a capacity of 54,000 gallons of mash.

The plant consisted of five mash vats with 6,000 gallon capacity each and two mash vats of approximately 12,000 gallon capacity each, a double still of 500 gallon capacity and what was said to have been one of the most complete condensing systems yet developed.

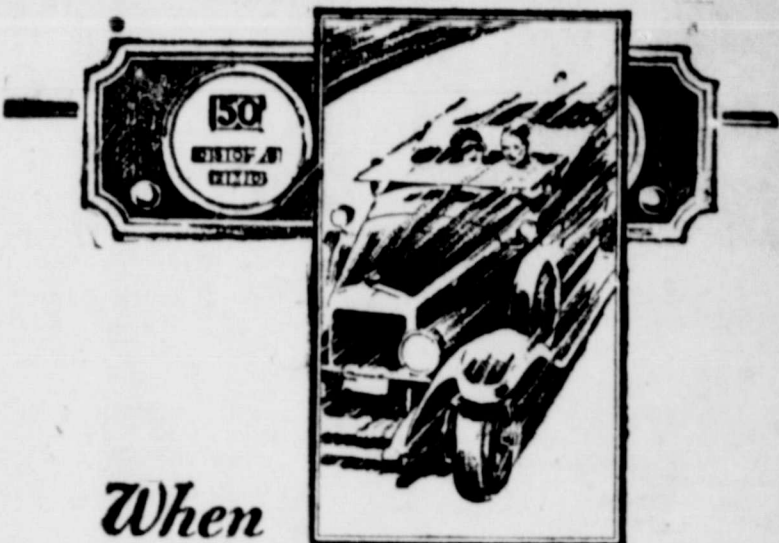
Owners of the still had constructed a large artificial lake for

their water supply and the mash was pumped from the vats to the still house with electrically-driven pumps. Several lookout towers and houses had been erected.

With their modernized equipment, the still owners were capable of manufacturing \$2,500 worth of alcohol a day, officers estimated.

Two alleged still operators were arrested and four fled.
