Baseball Funds Drive Now At Halfway Mark

Approximately 25 baseball fans had made donations of \$100 each to the three-man committee headed by baseball chairman Dutch Leuenberger by Saturday noon.

This total donation of \$2,500 is half the amount needed, Leuenberger said, as revised estimates showed that a total contribution of \$5,000 plus revenue from the sale of box seats and signs at the ball park would probably be enough to guarantee the operation of the ball club for the 1946 season, especially if a working agreement with a major or minor league club is obtained.

Original plans called for the three-man group, consisting of Leuenberger, Dutch McLendon and Travis Tarter, to solicit one hundred dollar donations from at least 75 men. But Leuenberger said this week that perhaps 50 donations would be ample since the sale of box seats would net \$3,000 and the sale of signs about \$2,000. This set-up would give the club a total of \$10,000, less probably \$500 for getting the stands and playing field in shape, with which to open the season.

A working agreement with some club is almost sure to be forthcoming before the first post-war season rolls around, Leuenberger said. He pointed out that such an arrangement would of course lower the amount of money needed to keep the club going.

The next baseball meeting will be held as soon as the drive for donations has been completed. At that meeting the donors will gather to name a business manager and a five-man board of directors.

Lamesa Rotary Club welcomed back one of its members returned from the Pacific war zone—Lt. Col. John B. Bennett—at the luncheon in the Plaza Hotel dining room Friday. Mrs. Bennett was a guest.

Colonel Bennett spoke briefly of his experiences during three and a half years imprisonment in the Philippine Islands and Japan. He expressed gratitude to the Rotarians for their letter, one of the few he received while a prisoner. "That letter, bearing names of every member of the club, boosted my morale greatly," he said.

The army doctor spoke of his amazement at the advancement made during his absence, especially in the manufacture and development of war materials. He mentioned specifically rocket ships, radar, atomic bombs, penicillin, DDT and others.

"These developments," he pointed out, "will make great difference in our future, our manner of thinking and our actions toward other nations for the next few years. It is my hope that the world will never see another such war."

Colonel Bennett urged that Rotarians keep in mind the fighting Americans who would never return. Casualties make the tragedies of war, he said.

At least \$20 was received by the Dawson County Tuberculosis Association for seals before they were even mailed out. "That's the kind of cooperation we need," said C. E. Tarter, seal sale chairman.

Mrs. Henry McQueen, executive secretary, and assistants in the AAA office mailed out 1,426 letters, each containing two sheets of Christmas Seals.

"We will have missed many new people in Lamesa and Dawson County," Mrs. McQueen said. "We hope every one of the new citizens will drop by the AAA office and buy Christmas Seals."

The letter accompanying the TB Christmas Seals is headed "It Must Not Happen Here!" It reads as follows:

"Incomplete reports from other nations show that the white plague is on the rampage again. England, Wales, Scotland and France all report rising death rates from tuberculosis. It must not happen here!"

"The Dawson County Tuberculosis Association has been organized to improve this condition in our county. Eighty per cent of all money raised by the sale of Christmas Seals is used in Dawson County.

"The results of 2,310 skin patch tests that were put on last year showed 100 were X-rayed, seven admitted to the stat sanatorium. Four were refused by the sanatorium with the notation, 'It's too late.'"

"Will you help to further tuberculosis control in this county by buying the seals enclosed? They sell for \$1 a sheet. A small price to pay for the mighty work they do—a larger contribution would be sincerely appreciated."

Odessa Bronchos Wallop Golden Tornadoes 51 to 6

Odessa's Bronchos moved right along here Saturday night as they mowed down the Golden Tornadoes 51 to 6, and continued on their unbeaten way to the district 3-AA title. Perhaps 4,000 fans, many of them from Odessa, jammed the north and south stands at McCollum Field to watch J. W. Thompson, Odessa's potential all-state fullback, lead his mates to an easy triumph.

Thompson, a lad with plenty of heft and the speed to carry it with, fully lived up to advance notices as he scored three touchdowns on runs of 48, 7 and 8 yards, set up other tallies with long gains including a 43-yard and a 23-yard run, and did a capable job on defense. He weighs 185 pounds and was the heaviest man on the Broncho starting eleven.

Every man in the Broncho backfield showed he could carry the mail during the contest. Charles Gabriel, left halfback, went 12 yards for the opening Odessa tally mid-way of the first quarter to finish a drive that started on the Lamesa 48. Lamesa's refusal of a 15 yard penalty not long before the Tornadoes kicked out to their own 48 didn't help the locals' cause any. Byron Townsend, Odessa's young promising left half, kicked the extra point. Odessa added another 7 points before the quarter ended. Townsend sprinted 37 yards to score to cap an Odessa surge that started on the Broncho 30 and was boosted along by a 15-yard penalty against Lamesa. Townsend again added the conversion.

Odessa scored three times in the second period to salt the fray away. Sonny Holderman, substitute Odessa back who ran, defended and kicked like he should have been a regular, intercepted a Lamesa pass and went 40 yards to score. Then Thompson really made his presence known to the gathering as he romped 48 yards to pay-dirt. Gabriel scored his second marker to finish Odessa's march from the Broncho 48 after Lamesa's kick-off as he ripped through the right side of the Tornado line and went 11 yards to the double-stripe.

Farmer Responsibility To Increase With 1946 Triple 'A' Conservation Plan

Victory Loan Bogs Down in Fourth Week

Chairman Points to Tremendous Job Ahead For County Citizens

Close of the third week of the Victory Loan drive in Dawson County leaves an enormous job ahead for every person in the county. It is a job that depends on cooperation of every Dawson County citizen, Chairman J. P. White said.

Saturday noon tabulations on the Victory Loan drive placed E bond sales at \$40,556.25, against a \$250,000 quota. Overall bond sales total stood at \$87,056.25.

Neighboring counties are raising their Victory Loan quotas, and it stands tragic if this county fails to meet its obligation, White pointed out.

Community chairman are urged by leaders to organize for bond rallies and raise their quotas at an early date.

Just as the Minute Man of yesterday was called on in time of urgent need, so is every Dawson County citizen now asked to contribute his full share buying bonds in the Victory Loan campaign.

Only through cooperation of every citizen can Dawson County keep faith with its fighting men, both living and dead, the chairman reminded.

Coast Guard Open To Men 17 to 25

The U. S. Coast Guard announced from its Dallas office that men 17 to 25 are now eligible for enlistment. The new policy includes a two-year enlistment, and transportation will be paid from home towns to Dallas and return.

Coast guard recruiting offices address is Room 372, Post Office, Dallas.

Schools open to enlisted coast guard personnel now include aerographer, aviation radio, electrician, advanced radio material, radar, navigation, device divers, firemen, basic radio material, aviation mechanic, direction finders, radar operator and radioman.

Greater responsibility will go to the farmer in the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program, C. E. Tarter, Dawson County ACA secretary, reported Saturday. County and community AAA committeemen will be available to recommend conservation practices to be carried out on farms.

Under the plan, counties will be given allocations of funds within which to operate their conservation programs, and local committeemen will assist individual farmers to plan a conservation program based on the actual farm needs. Final approval of the plan will rest with the county committee, Tarter pointed out.

Past AAA programs have allocated assistance principally according to a statewide formula, applicable to each farm in order to get practices carried out on a broad scale. Tarter pointed out that the "grass roots" approach should help speed the efficient reconversion of the nation's farmland from the strain of wartime production to longer-range soil-building and water conservation.

"The end of the war with its urgent demands for all-out production sounds a note of caution for farmers to take inventory of their most important capital assets—their land," Tarter declared. "Unless we conserve the productivity of our farms, we will jeopardize the bedrock foundation for lasting post-war prosperity."

The 1946 program has been planned to provide about the same assistance that farmers received under the 1945 program. However, more soil practices are expected to be carried out under the new plan, since farmers will bear more of the conservation cost than under the 1945 program.

Division of next year's program is into seven types of practices for which assistance will be available. They are: application of lime, fertilizers and other materials; planting of cover crops; harvesting of legumes and grasses; erosion control and water conservation; range and pasture improvement; forestry practices; and other practices such as noxious weed control and clearing land for pasture.

In Tarter's opinion special emphasis will be on the application of lime and fertilizers to grasses and legumes. Farmers have materially increased use of these materials since they were first offered in 1936. Using these and other program practices, farmers are improving their soils, getting better crop yields and slowing erosion.

There is need for planting more legumes, green manure, and winter cover crops of many thousands of acres of pasture and meadow, which were mowed up during the war. This land, Tarter said, must be brought into a system of cropping which will protect it against dangers of water and wind erosion.

With the demand for livestock and other farm products expected to remain at high levels for the next few years, there is a definite need for pasture and range improvement, including construction of ponds and reservoirs.

The 1946 program will vary by states and counties according to the climate, topography, type of farming, and the conservation needs. The approved practices for each county will be developed by local AAA farmer-committeemen, representatives of state agricultural colleges and experiment stations and other agricultural agencies.

Each county will select only the most needed practices for which assistance will be offered so as to be able to keep the program within the funds allocated to the county, Tarter added.

Jet Plane "Hot" Ship Sleeps in 'Fingertip' Lab

DAYTON, Ohio—By "fingertip" control of planning, the Army Air Forces are harnessing science to expedite the push-button planes of peace and those that may fight what Gen. H. H. Arnold has described as the "push-button war" of the future.
It's a grim picture of that "next war" that is painted these days at Wright Field, home of the Air Technical Service Command.
Col. T. B. Holliday, Chief of the Equipment Laboratory and one of the armed services' brilliant electrical experts, paints it this way:
The next war won't be fought so much by air pilots as by men seated in cabs. We'll have pilotless, crewless, radio-controlled aircraft whose bombs will be tossed by the "cabinmen" seated half a world away.
Something like the control organ with a single radio-active button and a single radio-active switch will be used.
The Equipment Laboratory ATSC was organized in 1942, and years with its equipment, that made America great in the air and whose energies and responsibilities now have been turned from tactical affairs to those which, in the not too distant future, may even lighten the load of Mrs. Average Housewife as she performs her daily tasks at home.
And the constant quest for higher altitudes, higher speeds and greater range for aircraft the further development of jet propulsion and the need of supercharged cabins—these are dynamic ever-present subjects of research by engineers and scientists at Wright Field.
There are curious complications.
Heat Problem
For instance, noted Maj. Haskell R. Collins, Chief of Planning, "It's well enough to marvel that man, in a jet-propelled plane, can fly at 550 miles an hour. But a plane traveling that fast, say at 47,000 feet, operates at 83 degrees of heat through friction with the air alone. Much of that would penetrate the cabin or cockpit.
The problem is not only to find structural material more resistant to heat, but to air-condition these "hot" planes for pilot and passenger comfort.

Cook Sweet Potatoes In Skin For More Vitamin 'C' Content

COLLEGE STATION—Housewives who plan to include sweet potatoes in their Thanksgiving menu not only will save time but also save vitamins if they put the sweet potatoes in the oven or kettle without peeling, says Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Tests conducted by several experiment stations in southern states show that sweet potatoes, boiled or baked in their skins, hold their naturally rich content of carotene (for vitamin A) and vitamin C very well.
In fact, some tests show they retain from 69 to 83 per cent of their vitamin C. Potatoes cooked in a pressure saucepan held the most vitamin C while those peeled and then boiled lost the most.
Here's a tip on how to help save even more vitamin C: Add a little sugar to the boiling water. This gives the potatoes sweeter flavor.

New Geography Takes Pictures, Data in County

Dawson County will have a spot in the manuscript for a new textbook on the geography of Texas, scheduled for publication early in 1946. Author of the textbook is William T. Chambers, professor of geography at Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College, Nacogdoches.

Adoption of the book for use in the seventh grade of public schools in Texas will be sought immediately following its publication.

Lamesa's chamber of commerce has furnished the writer with facts about the county and pictures of a variety of typical scenes, since the book will be well illustrated.

Highlight developments of the town and county will be included, along with description of the area. Pictures furnished Chambers by the local chamber of commerce include the cottonseed oil mill, egg dehydration plant, outstanding 4-H Club winners of livestock contests and blackberry production, harvest and en route to canneries.

Eat Cabbage When First Cooked

COLLEGE STATION—If cooked cabbage is on the menu, the caller should answer the dinner call promptly, says Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Otherwise, the cabbage, kept over hot water to keep it warm for serving, loses a very large per cent of the vitamin C. Shredded cabbage cooks in five minutes so it may be cooked while the family washes and gathers for dinner. Freshly cooked cabbage at best contains only about half the vitamin C of raw cabbage.

Strange as it may seem, cooked cabbage held in the refrigerator two or three days and then reheated does not lose as much vitamin C as that kept standing on the stove an hour or so. When warmed up after refrigeration it contains 24 to 32 per cent of the vitamin C it had when fresh and raw. Miss Lawrence states.

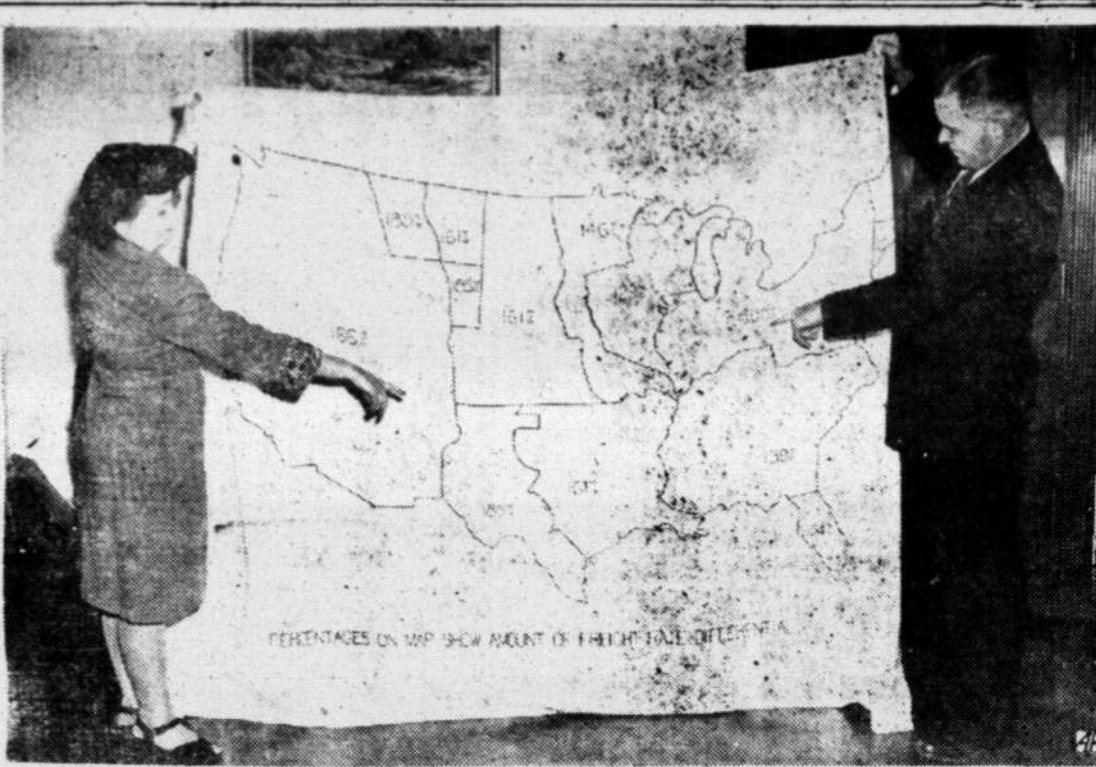

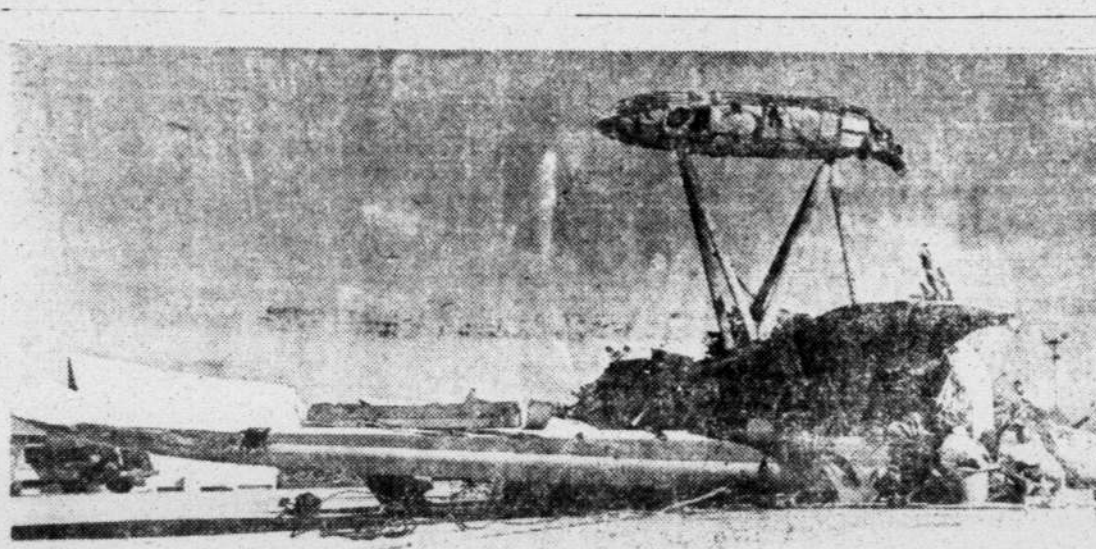

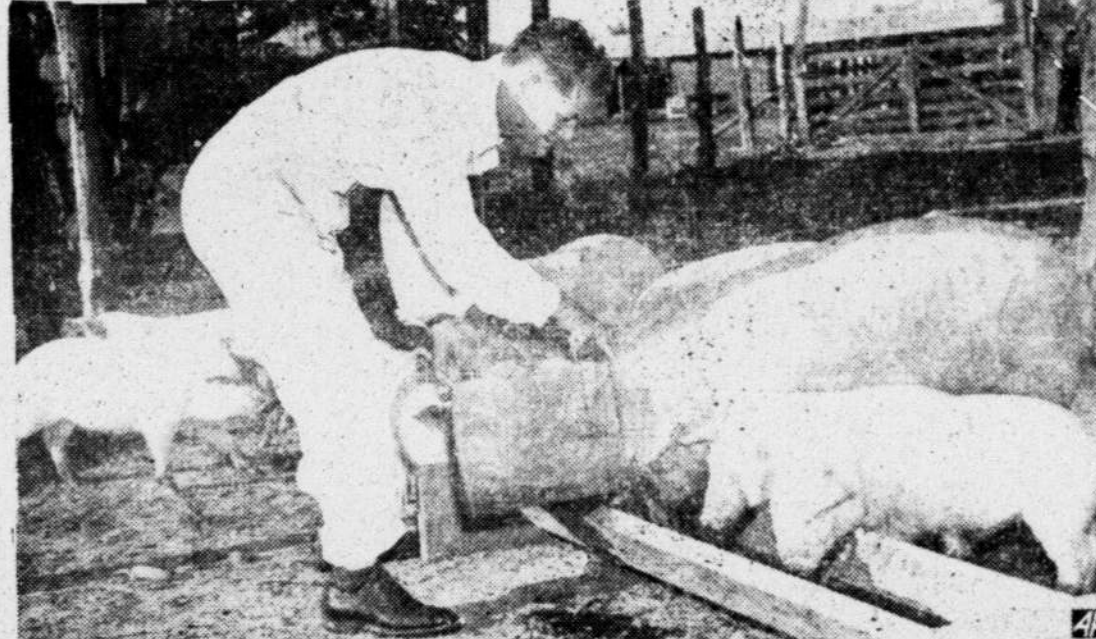

Waterfield, and Barqarus Latest Pro Football Finds

NEW YORK — All football fans like to rave about the top players be they college or professional. When ye guys and gals aren't talking about possible All-Americans, you're whispering about the boys who may be the top pros in the country—fellows like Bob Waterfield, the Cleveland Rams' great triple threat, and Steve Barqarus, the Washington Redskins' super-faker ball carrier.

Bob Waterfield, comes from the University of California at Los Angeles. He played for the Uclans in 1941 and 1942, entered the Army in 1943, but was discharged after an injury at Ft. Benning, Ga. The former UCLA captain gave an inkling of what was to come in his sensational exhibition sparking the West to a triumph against the East on last New Year's Day. His kicks averaged 59 yards and his passes and runs accounted for both of the West's touchdowns.

Steve Barqarus learned the grid game the hard way. When he was at Notre Dame before the Navy moved him around, the youngster was used mostly on offense. Probably the best compliments any football player ever received were thrown at "Mercury" as he appeared to his teammates, when Steven Owen, coach of the Giants, and Adam Walsh, the Rams' boss, said he was one of the greatest backs they've ever seen.

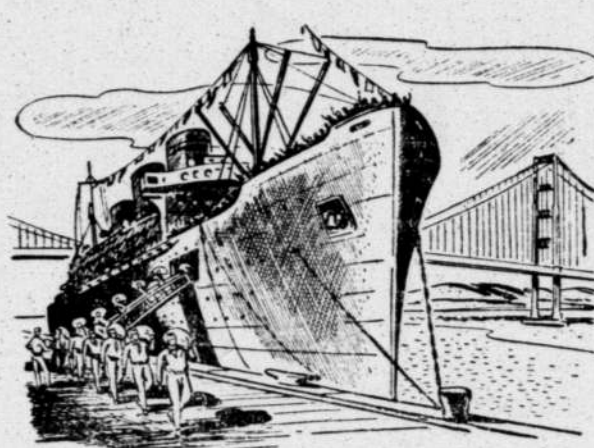

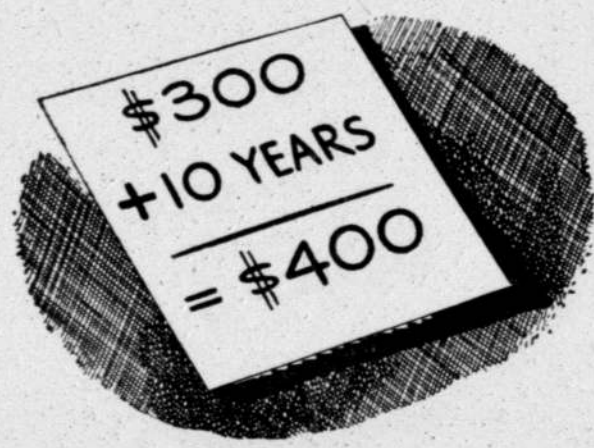

The Army ANSWERS Your Personal War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. My son is a liberated prisoner-of-war, but he doesn't have enough points to be discharged from the Army. I have heard that he can get a discharge now, regardless of the number of points he has. Is this true?

A. American prisoners-of-war and others who were out of United States control in enemy or enemy-occupied territory under honorable conditions for at least 60 days are now eligible for separation from the Army regardless of the number of points they have.

Q. My husband is in the Army. He has 22 points. I have heard different opinions on the number of points necessary to keep a soldier from going overseas. What is the right number?

A. The War Department has announced that enlisted men who have 21 or more months service and officers with 33 or more months service will not be shipped overseas. Exceptions are Regular Army personnel, those who volunteer for overseas service, graduates of certain schools and some soldiers who perform certain special tasks.

Q. Has a ribbon like the rainbow ribbon of World War I ever been authorized for World War II?

A. Yes. All members of the armed forces of the United States and the Government of the Philippines who served honorably on active duty at any time between December 7, 1941, and a date to be announced may be awarded a World War II Victory Medal and begin wearing the ribbon for the medal now.

Q. My husband is an Army officer stationed in the Philippines. Would it be possible for me to join him there now that the war is over?

A. No. Dependents may not yet travel to the Philippines to join military personnel stationed there in whom they are dependent, except when they are bona fide members of the Army Nurse Corps, Women's Army Corps, American Red Cross or United Service Organizations or upon specific request of a theater or base commander for them to be employed there.

Grid Official Quits After 400 Games

ABILENE, Tex.—Vic Payne, dean of football officials in West Texas, has called it a day and there's regret expressed on all sides.

Vic, an Abilene business man, has been closely associated with high school and college sports in this section as player, coach and official for the past 30 years.

His start as a football arbiter dates back 27 years to his freshman year at Hardin-Simmons University. Since then he has worked in some 400 games—an average of more than 14 per season.

He was a coach from 1922 through 1929 at Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons and Texas Tech. He entered business in 1930, but had one more fling at coaching at Hardin-Simmons one season in the early thirties.

His most embarrassing moment as an official, he says, came during a game between Daniel Baker College and Hardin-Simmons. The game had progressed well into the second period without a score when Carl Poe of Hardin-Simmons broke loose, galloped to one sideline, then cut back to the other and finally dashed back to the middle of the field where five or six players piled.

Payne rushed in blowing his whistle. He looked under the pile of players but couldn't find the ball-carrier. Then he glanced over the field and saw Poe standing in the end zone waving the ball at him and grinning from ear to ear.

Such foolishness can be life's darkest moment for an official who has just cut loose with his whistle. It was for Vic.

There was nothing left to do but call the ball back to the point of the play.

But there was some consolation on Vic's part at the half when he encountered his old pal, Les Catfill, the coach of Hardin-Simmons.

Half Turkey Thanksgiving

Many small families are going to have a "half turkey Thanksgiving."

Although market reports for the Thanksgiving season show there will be plenty of turkeys, many small families find a whole bird more than can be eaten with economy.

For this reason many butchers are prepared to sell half turkeys on request. The bird is simply split down the back and along the breastbone.

The half bird, says Miss Edith Lawrence, food preparation specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, is prepared for cooking in the usual way. The skin is skewered over the breast to keep it from pulling away, the leg is tied down and the bird is brushed with melted fat. A good trick to keep the meat from becoming dry is to cover with a clean cloth saturated with fat.

Place the half bird, cavity side down, on a flat rack about the size of the cavity. Cook in a shallow uncovered pan at 325 degrees.

Make the usual dressing. Bake a mound of it on a well greased, doubled piece of oil paper. At the turkey is about half done, remove the rack and substitute the mound of dressing.

Six pounds of turkey will be well cooked at about three hours, according to Miss Lawrence.

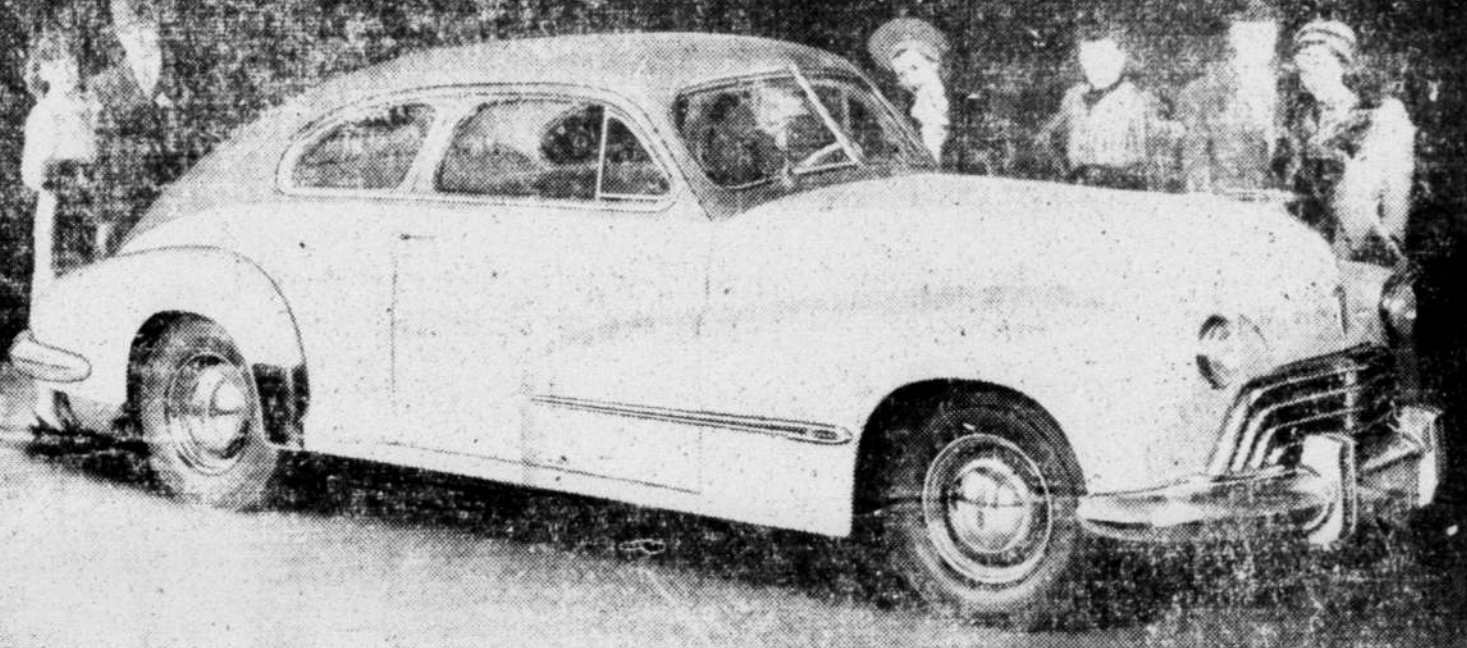

Armed Forces Discharge 17 Dawson Vets

Discharges for 14 army men, two navy men and one marine have been officially recorded in office of County Clerk Howard Humphrey. Dates on the releases range through October and early November.

Back in civilian clothes again are Hubert L. Simmons, T. B. Garrett (negro), John W. Mosley, Joe R. Ramirez, Jose Delgado, Ike Coats, Lorette Owens, Scott St. Clair, Lawrence Oliver, Robert E. Lee, A. L. Crumley, Jim Phipps Jr., Everett R. Oakley, Dolphus Lamolin Rasberry, Ernest Oscar Farmer, Dorman E. Cox and Raymond M. Kinnison.

Formerly with the 91st Air Depot Group, Cpl. Hubert L. Simmons was discharged at Fort Sam Houston, November 9. In the air force three years, Simmons was overseas a year. He served as a heavy automotive equipment operator in North ern France and the Rhineland.

Four battle stars are on the European theater campaign ribbon of T-4 T. B. Garrett (negro), who was with the 44th Signal Heavy Construction Company as an automotive mechanic. He was discharged at Fort MacArthur, Calif., on October 22. He was overseas almost two years.

John W. Mosley, technician fifth grade, was released at Camp Gruber, Okla., on October 20 after serving two years overseas with the armored field artillery as a light truck driver. He was awarded Distinguished Unit Badge. His operations were in Normandy, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe.

Infantryman Jose R. Ramirez, moving picture projectionist in the Pacific area for two and a half years, was discharged November 5 at Fort Benning, Ga. He returned to the states May 3.

After two and a half months in basic training, Pvt. Jose Delgado was discharged at Fort Bliss, El Paso, on October 30.

Fort MacArthur, Calif., was also the discharge point on November 9 for Sgt. Ike Coats, Motor Route B, who was with the 414th Infantry in Europe for almost a year. He enlisted shortly after Pearl Harbor, participating in operations in Northern France, the Rhineland and Central Europe. An automotive mechanic, Coats was awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

Six air force operations in the Pacific were chalked up by Sgt. Lorette Owens as supply technician with the 280th Bombardment Squadron. He was discharged at Fort Bliss on November 11, nine

days after reaching the states. Air offensive over Japan, Bismarck Archipelago, New Guinea, Southern Philippines Liberation, Luzon and Western Pacific are shown with bronze stars on his Asiatic-Pacific campaign ribbon. He enlisted in March, 1942, and was shipped to the South Pacific October 6, 1943.

He enlisted in Oklahoma City December 31, 1941, went into Pacific combat zones in early February, 1943, remaining until December 26, 1944. 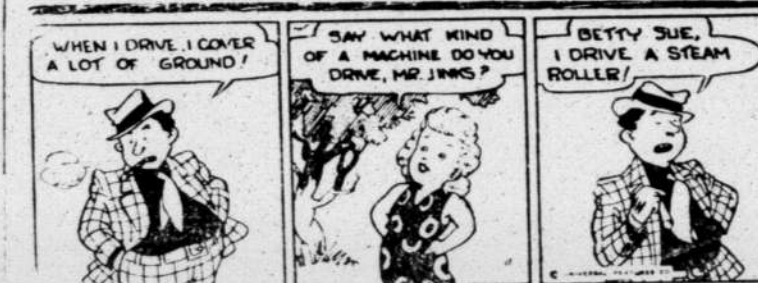

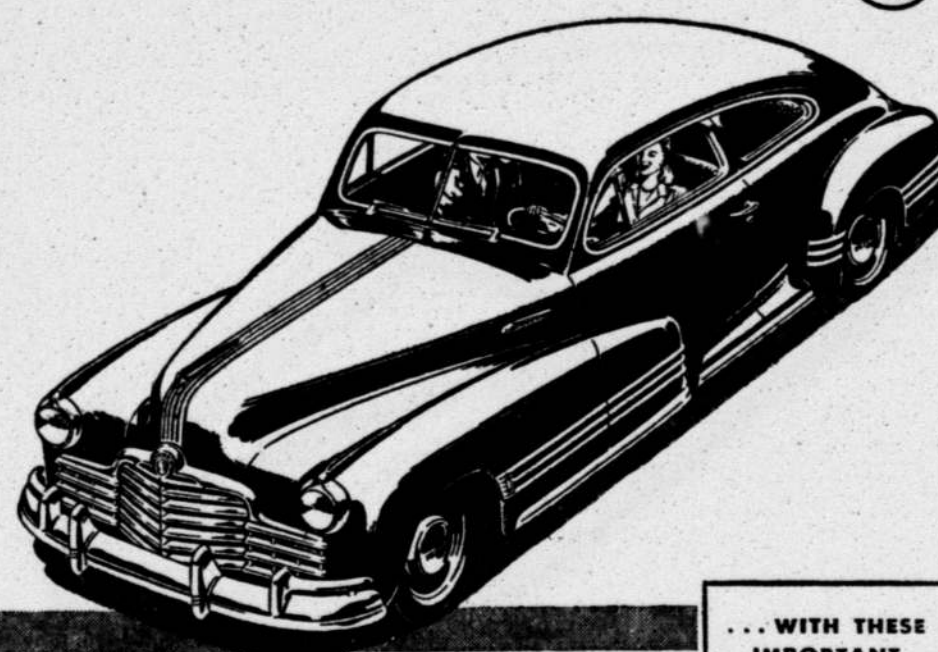

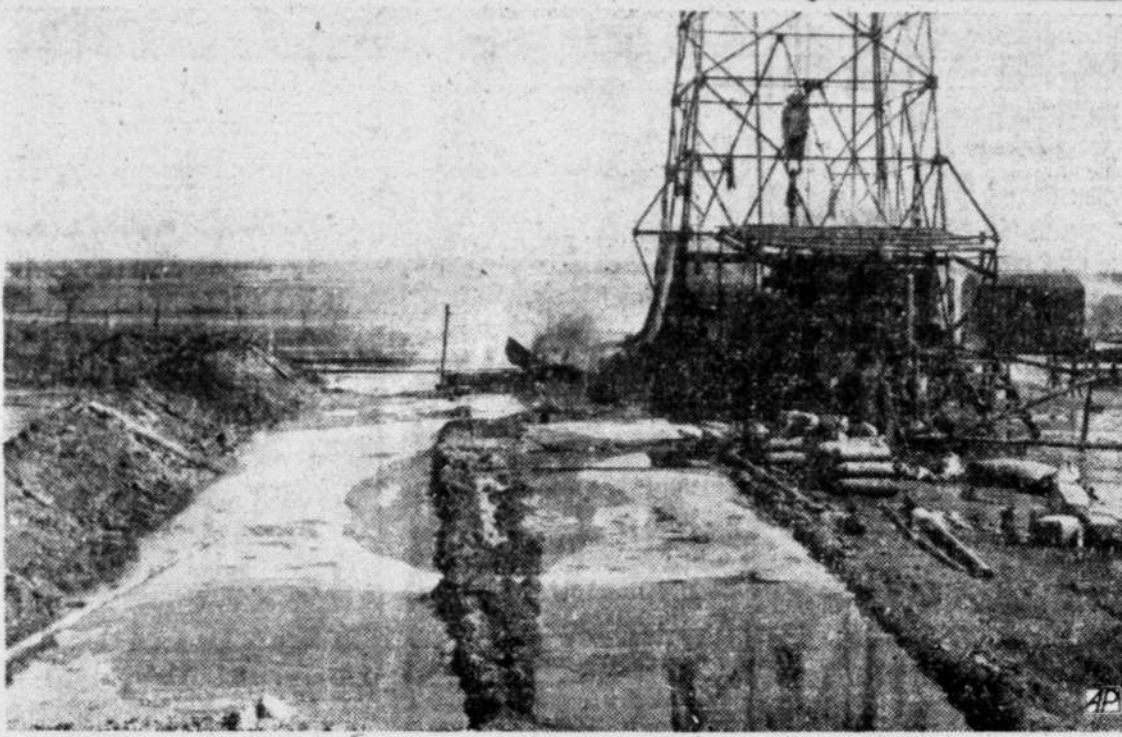

Hog Killing Time Is Here Again

Comes now hog killing time. Not as much as formerly, because with the widespread use of the quick freezer locker, hog killing is now a year round deal on many Texas farms. But most Texas farm people still wait for winter to butcher hogs for home use.

Even at that, according to Roy W. Snyder, meat specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, if the weather gets much above 50 degrees for any length of time while the meat is in cure, it should be taken to a cold storage plant and let it cure under refrigeration.

With sugar scarce, many people will not have enough to cure meat. Salt, Snyder explains, is what actually cures the meat. Sugar improves the flavor and saltwater makes for a rich red color.

The standard recipe is eight pounds of salt, two pounds of sugar, and two ounces of saltpeter. Mix, divide into three equal parts, and rub one part of the mix into the meat every three days. Pack meat into a meat box or barrel after each rubbing. After the third and last treatment, pack meat into the container skin side down. Leave ham and shoulders in the mix for from two to three days per pound. A dry and a half per pound is enough for bacon.

The longer the meat is kept in cure the saltier it becomes. If there is not enough salt that penetrates the pieces to properly cure the meat, it will spoil unless kept in cold storage. With pork as scarce as it is, farm families will do well to have their meat a little saltier than usual, rather than take a chance on spoilage.

Cane syrup or honey may be substituted for sugar, pound for pound. Sugar is still better than syrup or honey if it is available, and granulated sugar will do just as well as brown.

What? and Now, Hybrid Onions

After ten years of work, scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have announced the production of hybrid onion seed on a commercial scale.

The increased yields obtained by use of hybrid corn has focused the attention of seed breeders everywhere on new uses for the hybrid principle, and announcements of new hybrids may be expected soon.

Hybrid onion seed, however, came as a surprise. J. P. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, said the nearness of the male and female parts made the job seem almost impossible. The discovery of a sterile male union was what allowed hybridization with a male

fertile onion on a field scale, he said. The first hybrid onion is known as California Hybrid Red No. 1, and is adapted to parts of California, Utah and Nevada. The new variety has yielded from 460 to 768 100-pound bags per acre and in general is producing at a rate of 50 per cent above other varieties for these areas.

With the discovery of the sterile onion, Rosborough said, the field is now open for the breeding of hybrid strains of various varieties for different regions, seasons and conditions.

Fire Chief Hildreth Cautions Lamesans Against Winter Fires

"If you see the fire trucks going by more often in cold weather, it isn't because our firemen are trying to keep warm," said Fire Chief J. W. Hildreth Saturday. "It's because cold weather means more fires," he said in reminding local people of winter fire dangers.

"Turning on the heat at home is one of the biggest causes of fire," explained the chief. "Use your fuel to heat your house, not to burn it," he advised.

The fire chief started his list of precautions with the roof. "Your house should have a fire-resistant roof, to protect it from sparks or neighboring fires. Your chimney should be inspected for cracks and soot. Have it cleaned and repaired, if necessary."

Continuing down into the house itself, the chief stressed the importance of proper insulation. "The chimney should be insulated so that the walls nearby are not too warm for your hand. The same holds true for flues and pipes, especially where they are near woodwork. A particularly dangerous spot is the place where the smoke pipe enters the chimney."

"Many heating fires begin in the furnace rooms," the chief pointed out, "either because the furnace is defective, or because it is not given the right care. The furnace should be inspected and cleaned before the heating season starts. If you have been getting along with a furnace too small for your needs during the war, now is a good time to have it replaced. The furnace should never be forced or allowed to overheat."

Fuel storage is another important item in winter safety, the chief explained. "If you are storing coal, see that it is not packed too tightly, and try to use first the coal which has been piled first. If you use oil, have the oil tank and lines carefully inspected for leaks. And store your oil outside the house, if possible."

"Portable heaters can be dangerous if not carefully used. Place them where they cannot overheat woodwork or furniture, and where they cannot be knocked over. Electric heaters should be in good repair and, of course, they should carry the approval label of the Underwriters' Laboratories."

Just plain, everyday thoughtlessness is the cause of many a winter fire, according to Chief Hildreth. "Nobody who gives the matter a second thought would put hot ashes in a wooden barrel, use kerosene to quicken a fire, or leave a fireplace unprotected by a screen."

When asked how homes may be made foolproof against fire, the chief replied, "Foolproof is not in a fireman's vocabulary. We recognize that there is always the

possibility of fire, even though we can prevent most of them. That is why we recommend that every family be prepared for fire."

The first rule, in case of fire, is to call the fire department, the chief emphasized. "After that, a fire extinguisher, such as the fire department often uses, can be just as effective in the hands of the homeowner. If he keeps it handy and knows how to use it."

"During the winter months, an extinguisher near the furnace room—at the entrance to the cellar, for instance—may prevent a really serious fire. And check to see that it is in good working order. Then you should be able to put out a small fire, or keep a big one under control until the fire department arrives to finish the job," the chief concluded.

Jobs Still Scarce Reports USES Head

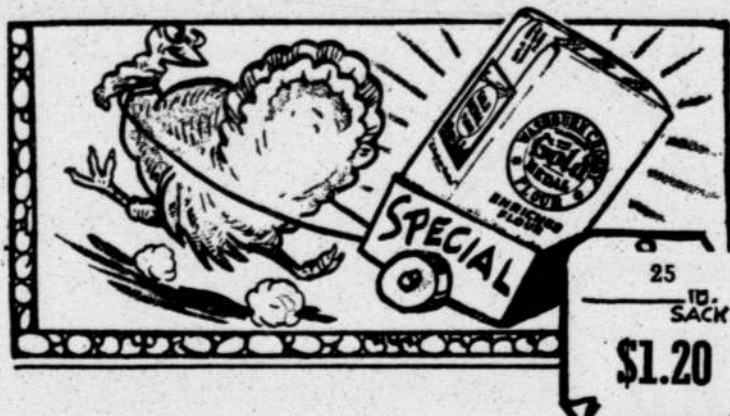
