Abernathy Auto Dealers Set Record



In July of last year the Review announced a goal of 600 sales for the automobile dealers of Abernathy to reach by the close of 1940. The dealers not only reached this goal, but exceeded it by 47 sales.

A check at the close of business December 31 revealed a total sale of 647 units during 1940.

District Ring Tourney Set In Lubbock

Lubbock, Jan. 9—Curtis Lebow of Abernathy, champion of the flyweight division for the last two years, was the first entrant for the 1941 Lubbock district Golden Gloves tournament. The curlyheaded Abernathy lad sent his entry in early last week, with the notation that he expects to fight at 118 pounds. He will thus be in the bantamweight division.

Plans for the district tournament, sponsored by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, are proceeding rapidly. date for the meet is February 6 and 7; The place is yet to be selected.

Winners of the Lubbock district will compete in the state tournament at Fort Worth, sponsored by the Star-Telegram. State winners will battle at Chicago for the National Championships in a meet sponsored by the Chicago Tribune.

All expenses to the state and National meets will be paid by the newspapers sponsoring the tournaments. Winners will also receive handsome individual awards.

Several preliminary tournaments have been scheduled, but only one has definitely announced dates. Littlefield will sponsor a tournament January 30 and 31, exactly a week before the district sawoff. Abe Murphy, coach at Littlefield high school, is in charge of arrangements.

Other preliminary meets are definitely to be held at O'Donnell and Tahoka, but dates are yet to be set. Tentative plans have been laid to conduct meets at Plainview, Floydada, Brownfield and Slaton.

Participation in the preliminary meets is not necessary to enter the district meet, but the experience gained is valuable when the "Play-For-Keeps" competition begins.

FIVE HURT IN ACCIDENT

Fire added to seriousness of a truck-automobile collision that hospitalized five persons early Saturday night two miles east of Lakeview.

Mrs. R. A. Daugherty of Lakeview and son and daughter were brought to Lubbock sanitarium in private cars. Bill Evetts, 43, of Plainview was in critical condition from burns at midnight in a Plainview hospital.

Reports from Plainview said Evetts, pinned several minutes under the flaming truck, suffered first and second degree burns over more than a third of his body. The injured are in Lubbock sanitarium.

Mrs. Daugherty, wife of Hale county precinct two commissioner, fractured right ankle and body bruises.

Her 6-year-old son Roy Lee, possible fracture of the jaw, deep lacerations of the scalp and over the left eye. His condition was serious.

Wanda Fay Daugherty, 13, the daughter, lacerations of the face and legs.

Investigators said L. Buchanan, also of Plainview, was driving the truck and Mrs. Daugherty was driving a light sedan when the machines collided at an intersection of two dirt roads. Buchanan was treated for minor injuries in Plainview sanitarium.

They said the car struck the right side of the truck cab, overturning the truck, which caught fire after the impact.

Buchanan pulled Evetts from beneath the wreckage and extinguished his burning clothes, experiencing trouble holding Evetts, crazed by pain. Buchanan then gave first aid to the injured woman and children.

The boy and girl were taken to Petersburg by Gene Mayo and given emergency treatment by a physician there. Albert Clubb, Petersburg grain dealer, brought Mrs. Daugherty to the sanitarium.

O. H. Head, associate of Clubb, and R. Q. Davis, county employee, brought the boy here and Charles Schuler, Petersburg mayor, accompanied by L. M. Wartes, brought the girl.

Rix ambulance was sent to Abernathy but the injured had been started to the hospital when it arrived.

Thomas C. Laws and Norvell Redwine, Texas Highway patrol officers, said buttons from Evetts' clothing and small bits of clothing were found near the wreckage, to attest to his close escape from a burning death.

Buchanan and Evetts are employed by Buchanan and Evetts are employees of a pump company at Plainview and made a delivery of cement east of Lubbock shortly before the accident.

LETTER TO GLENN HARRISON REVEALS THE SITUATION IN FRANCE AS VERY CRITICAL

Conditions in German-occupied France are grave, according to statements contained in a letter from a citizen of the zone to Glenn Harrison, a son of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Harrison of Lakeview.

Harrison recently received a letter from Marcel Moraud, Frenchman, stating, "The situation is very critical, but I can't write anything because the censorship is worse than ever. Everything is controlled by the Germans and they are starving the population to death. U. S. will have to speed up her armament if she doesn't want to follow our fate. The papers are violently attacking Great Britain (imposed Nazi propaganda) but there isn't a single Frenchman who doesn't delight when he hears of some 185 German planes crashing on English soil.

"If what we hear is true, U. S. has become 100 per cent pro-Ally and is practically already in the war." Harrison and Moraud were students at Texas University in 1937 and have corresponded intermittently since Moraud returned to France. The Frenchman, 23, is a son of the head of the Romance language department at Rice Institute and at one time had the distinction of being credited with dual citizenship. Born while his father was a French consul in the United States, Moraud traveled between the two countries without a passport, crossing once on the Normandy, as officials here listed him as an American, Harrison said. When he became 21 years old he declared himself a citizen of France.

Moraud was attending school in Paris when the war began. Harrison said the letter he received recently had been en route from France for two months. It had not been censored and was sent airmail via Portugal. Twelve and a half francs postage was required to send the letter. Harrison said Moraud stated in his letter he was planning to come to the United States but gave no details. Harrison was of the opinion Mar-

aud had already left France and possibly might have reached the United States.

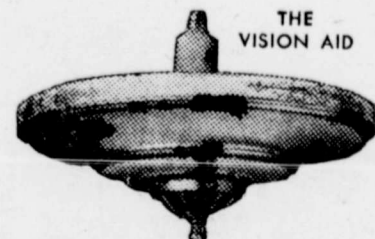

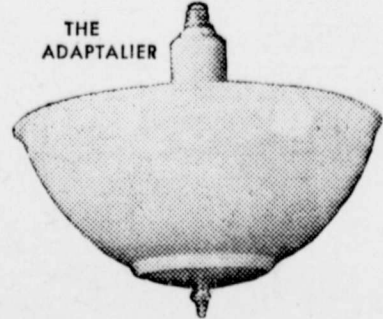

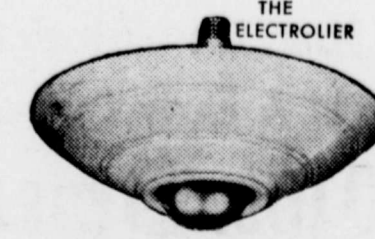
