## City trims 1989-90 budget to \$2.3 million

### Bubonic plague outbreak again detected in county

County Judge Mac Morris has alerted residents throughout Mitchell County that there has been another outbreak of Bubonic plague detected.

Judge Morris reported that the County's trapper, Orvil Sterritt, had collected seven small animal samples in the northwest part of the county and sent them to Austin for examination by the state health officials. Four of the animals tested positive for the disease.

The animals were covered with fleas and ticks when found. They are known to be the main carriers of bubonic plague. Residents are urged to exercise strict flea and tick control on their pets and around their premises. Residents are warned not to handle any suspected animals, rodents, rabbits, etc. with bare hands. Dogs and cats are susceptible as well as humans.

There was an outbreak of the plague last year during February, in a dozen or more West Texas counties, including Mitchell. At that time, regional health officials pointed out that, "the plague is endemic to the region ... it's always in West Texas. Occasionally, often due to weather conditions, it spreads and causes rodent die-off". Health officials do not

expect the plague to spread into the cities, but it could if not properly avoided. Those most likely to be exposed to the plague are people who hunt or work in bushy, wooded areas. Modern antibiotics are available. The disease results in severe flu-like symptoms in humans, and if contracted often goes untreated because of the similar symptoms.

### Chamber plans rattlesnake roundup here

In a special meeting last week, the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors gave a "go-ahead" for preliminary plans to sponsor a Rattlesnake Roundup here next month. The Board gave President Gary Parker the authority to look into the proposed project and to arrange an agreement with a contractor for the Roundup.

A tentative date has been set for Saturday and Sunday, April 1 and 2. The Chamber Board is coordinating the project with Don Bennett, local well-known snake handler.

## Hospital board eyes voting districts

The Mitchell County Hospital Board of Directors adopted an order for a directors' election during its meeting Tuesday night and discussed the possibility of establishing single-member voting districts.

The terms of Preston Morris, Jay Craddock, Marion Bassham and Gus Armstrong are expiring and will be decided upon in the May 6 election.

The board also instructed Administrator Richard Murphy to in-

vestigate the possibility of converting to single-member voting districts instead of the present at-large method. The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) has challenged the Colorado City school district's at-large voting method. Craddock suggested that the hospital district proceed with adopting single-member voting districts in order to prevent any possible legal action.

Colorado City Council spent nearly three hours going over the proposed 1989-90 budget for the City during a special workshop meeting Monday afternoon.

After going over the budget department by department and line item by line item, the Council made only a few minor changes to the figures proposed by City Manager Brenda Hammond. The budget that has been arrived at, to this point, totals \$2,363,431, which is \$44,664 less than this year's \$2,408,095.

The Council will give further consideration to the budget and give tentative approval at the regular meeting in March. Then the budget will receive formal approval in the April meeting.

With the trimmed back budget from last year it was pointed out that it is becoming more and more difficult to stretch today's dollar to cover tomorrow's necessities.

The new budget reflects the following conditions:

- \* Keeping the present level of city services now being provided;
- \* Keeping the same number of employees with no pay raises projected.

- \* Keeping the same rate for water, sewer and sanitation, including the \$1 per customer for debt retirement of the Fire Station;

- \* It includes just over \$200,000 of capital improvements for water lines, meters and equipment replacement;

- \* The debt retirement amounts to \$214,000 on bond issues;

- \* It provides for continuing education for employees to meet state and federal guideline requirements for job certification.

## Good variety of farm items consigned for Kiwanis auction

Many valuable farm related items have been consigned for the Kiwanis Club Farm Auction scheduled for March 11.

Some of the items to be auctioned off include at least eight tractors, a combine, a small bulldozer, grain drill, lots of rotary cutters, rotary hoe, moldboard plow, 5 or 6 cultivators, sand fighters and many other miscellaneous items.

The Auction will be held beginning at 10 a.m. at the County Fair Grounds, Highway 80 West. Grady Morris will serve as the auctioneer.

The Home Extension Clubs will be handling the concession stand during the auction.

All proceeds from the auction will go to paying the club's share of the playground equipment that has been installed at Ruddick Park. Good participation by local farmers and other citizens is encouraged.

## Unemployment jumps to 11.6% in Mitchell

Unemployment in Mitchell County jumped to 11.6% during January, highest since January 1987, when the jobless figure hit 12.6%. The Texas Employment Commission has reported that during the first month of the year, there was a total of 4,069 in the local civilian work force. 3,596 persons were gainfully employed, leaving 473 persons recorded as jobless.

During 1988, the average for the year was 8.7%. Average work force in 1988 was 4,228, average employed was 3,862, and average unemployed 366. Lowest unemployment figure for any one month was 7.1% in April, 1988. Highest unemployment rate was 10.1% in both June and December of 1988.

department expenditures in comparison with last year's budget is shown elsewhere.

In presenting the general budget policy, the City Manager said "it has always been the city's goal to provide the best services possible in return for tax dollars collected. Especially in view of the hard economic times now facing our citizens, it is the pledge of the city administration and staff that during the coming fiscal year that the city redouble its past efforts and give top priority to the following principles:

(a) Local funds should be stretched whenever possible by aggressively seeking outside funding sources, such as the Texas Department of Community Program Grant for 1989, which could be used to extend and improve the water distribution lines in the southeast part of town;

(b) To hold the line on employee hirings;

(c) High priority to be given to expenditures that will reduce future operating costs, such as better utilization of improved technology, equipment and better business methods;

(d) Productivity improvement programs initiated in all labor-intensive departments;

"In matters of public safety, the objectives during FY 1989-90 are:

(a) Complete necessary improvement in fire services to lower our residents' insurance premiums;

(b) Reduce the incidence of crime through special policing methods;

(c) Make specific productivity improvements in the police and fire departments.

"In the public works category, objectives are:

(a) Continue to keep refuse collection and disposal services on a self-supporting basis;

(b) Continue efforts to increase use of recreational facilities by organized groups and shift the direct cost of such usage to those groups;

(c) Prepare long-range maintenance and development plans

for streets, refuse and recreation; (d) And institute cost reduction projects, specifically by conserving energy in the areas of street lighting, parks, center, etc.

"In order to avoid future problems in meeting federal and state standards with water and sewer utilities, the FY 1989-90 budget takes into consideration:

(a) Continue to produce a high

quality water supply to federal and state standards and sufficient to meet daily demands and storage for fires;

(b) Treat all wastewater to meet federal and state standards;

(c) To continue the installation of water works mains replacement with capital improvement funds along with a water meter replacement program."

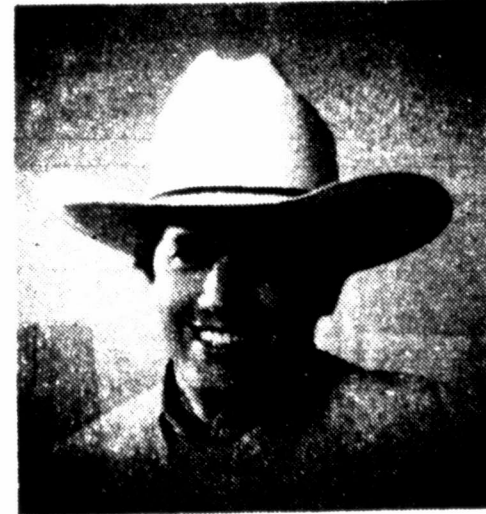
### Fire arms safety program presented

## Unclaimed money awaits residents

Names of Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook residents are among the 110,000 Texans who have \$60 million in lost or forgotten money coming to them this year, said State Treasurer Ann W. Richards.

The 110,000 are named in the 1989 version of the Texas Treasury Unclaimed Money Fund List which will be published statewide on Sunday in 19 newspapers.

A copy of the list is available at the Record office for persons to view.

"Each year we try to locate as many people as we can and return this money to them," Mrs. Richards said. "Last year about \$22 million was given back to rightful owners."

All listed accounts, other than those from safe deposit boxes, are worth at least \$50 with the largest account worth more than \$177,000. All safe deposit boxes

are listed regardless of the value of the contents.

Generally, accounts on the list are from checking and savings accounts, utility deposits, oil royalties and corporate stocks.

Most accounts must be dormant from three to five years before they are turned over to the state.

Persons who find their names on the list can call the Texas State Treasury on its toll-free telephone line at 1-800-654-3463 or they can write the State Treasury at P.O. Box 17728, Austin, Texas 78745. The toll-free line opens at noon on March 5.

During the first few weeks after the list is published, the toll-free line is often tied up by the volume of calls. The lines, however, are kept open for an extended period and there is no time limit for making a claim.

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## Cold temperatures cut many insect numbers

COLLEGE STATION - The Arctic front that blasted Texas recently blew in some benefits for agriculture by reducing insect pests, said an expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. John G. Thomas, an extension entomologist, said the prolonged sub-freezing temperatures will have an enormous economic impact on insects affecting Texas and Texans.

"The below-freezing temperatures, which set new records or tied existing records for continuous cold hours in many parts of the state, should dramatically reduce many insect populations," Thomas said.

He said producers will realize considerably less damage and save on control costs. This often means that the consumer benefits as well.

Thomas said the extreme cold should have eliminated most of

the active - and many hibernating or diapausing - individuals of many insect populations.

"When the Arctic air spread over Texas last week, many insects were very active as opposed to their usually winter diapause state. The cold caught them off-guard and killed many of them," Thomas said.

Thomas said cold temperatures are not the only factor that influences survival of biological organisms, however.

"Moisture or rainfall has a significant impact on survival of insects, along with availability of host plants to provide food and shelter. Other factors include whether the insects are cool season or warm season species, and the impact of parasites or predators on each insect family," Thomas said.

He said cold temperatures with dry conditions cause greater mortality than the same temperature with ample moisture.

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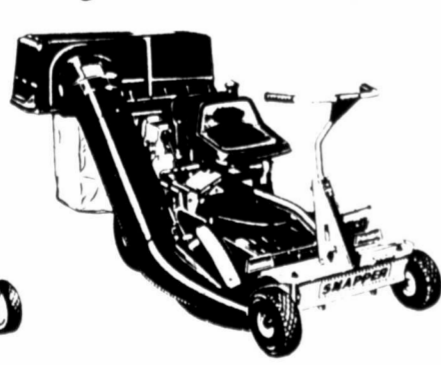

## Decatur halts Wolves, 64-49, in basketball playoff

BRECKENRIDGE - The Colorado City Wolves and Decatur Eagles battled back and forth in their Class AAA area basketball game here Tuesday night. Decatur had the final run, however, as the Eagles advanced to the Region I-AAA tournament with a 64-49 victory.

The Wolves, playing in the second round of the state playoffs for the first time in over two decades, end the season at 15-13. Decatur will play at Texas Tech Friday in a first-round regional contest against either Lamesa or Dimmitt.

"We didn't play well this game at all," said Wolf coach Chuck Claxton. "It seems we quit moving our feet. That affects you offensively and defensively. I thought we had a let-down at first after such a big game Friday night but I could say only one thing about the kids. From football over to the last day of February, they never quit hustling and their attitude was super. It's nice to have the gold basketballs with the footballs."

Strangely, the area contest was like the football victory Decatur took from CHS. The Eagles took a lead early and survived to defeat Colorado City charges.

Decatur began with a 5-0 lead but two free goals by Chris Perkin and a three-pointer by Pat Ridge made it 5-5 with 2:40 left in the first

quarter. The Eagles settled for an 11-7 lead at the end of the opening period after Bubba Bailey converted an offensive rebound, one of four in the quarter, to make it 9-7 with 1:13 left in the first quarter.

The eagles took an 11-point lead, 25-14, with 4:30 remaining in the second quarter but Dane Hoover scored nine points in the period to help the Wolves close within three at 27-24 with 1:15 remaining in the half. Decatur answered with two goals for a 31-24 halftime lead.

The Wolves made two of 10 shots in the first quarter and then five of 13 in the second quarter. Colorado City shot much better in the third quarter (eight of 14) as Hoover added eight more points in route to a team-high 19.

Behind Hoover and two three-pointers by Ridge, the Wolves pulled to within one at 35-34 at 5:10 in the third quarter. Decatur answered it with eight straight points to make it 43-34. Colorado City scored six straight to make it 43-40 and then the Eagles hit nine straight before Hoover shot at the buzzer to make it 49-42 to end the third quarter.

Decatur finally shook the Wolves in the final period with Colorado City making only two of 12 shots and three of nine free-throws.

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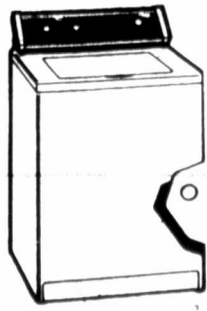

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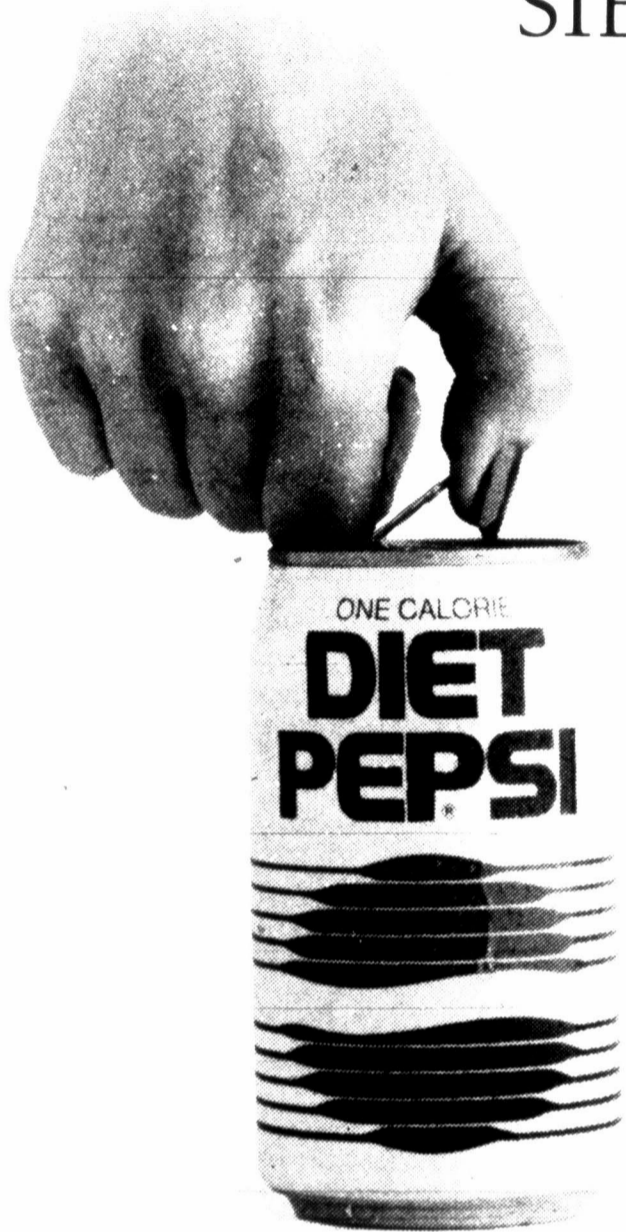
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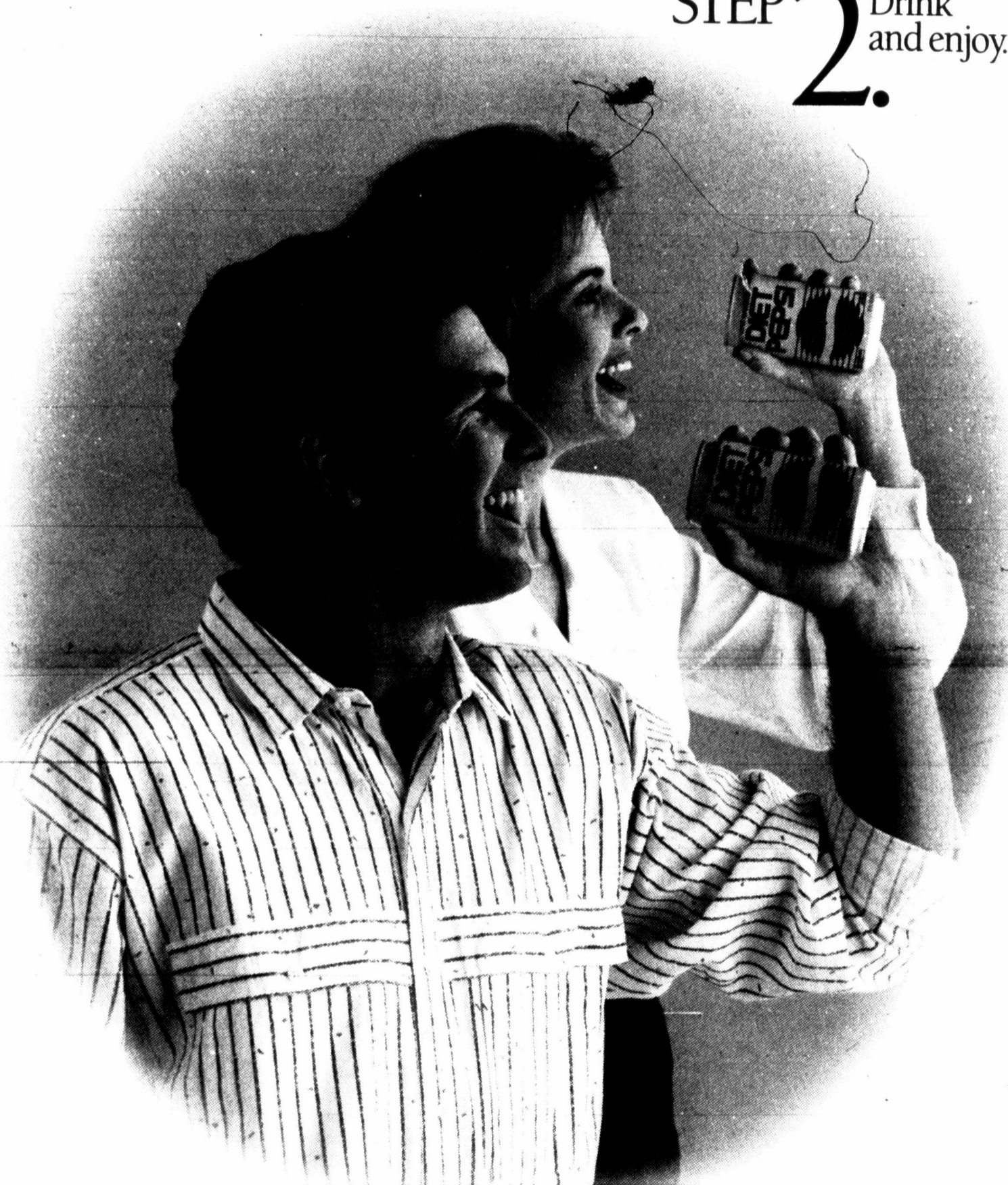
