COLORADO DEMANDS CEASE OF PICKETING MELLON RECOMMENDS 225 MILLION TAX REDUCTION

AMOUNT LOWER BIG FIGURE AN ESTIMATE

GRAM AS OUTLINED BY SECRETARY TO COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The limitation of the proposed tax reduction to approximately \$225,000,000—lower figure even than was recommended today by Secretary Mellon at the opening of the tax hearings by the house ways and means committee.

The tax reduction program he outlined follows:

Reduction of the corporate tax from 12 1/2 per cent to 12 per cent.

Extending permission to corporations with net incomes of \$25,000 and less, and with not more than 100 stockholders, to file returns and pay the tax as partnership or corporations at their option.

Revision of the surtax rates levied on individual incomes between \$16,000 and \$50,000.

Repeal of the estate tax.

Exemption from taxation of income derived from American government acceptance held by foreign central banks of issue.

No change in Excise

Contrary to expectations the secretary opposed any change whatever in the remaining war time surtaxes and miscellaneous taxes.

At length, for the retention of the present three per cent levy on automobiles and the ten per cent tax on admissions applying to seats selling for more than 15 cents on the ground that these taxes and the excise tax on tobacco could be kept "in the interest of a balanced tax system."

"Unless we are to rely almost exclusively," he said, "on direct taxes paid by a few and are prepared to see our national government supported not by the body of our citizens but by a few who should be retained."

FAMOUS FRAUD TRIAL CALLED TO LIFE AGAIN

DENIAL OF PROBATION BY APPEALS COURT BRINGS ACTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, Arctic explorer, today was granted a supreme court review of the decision of the circuit court of appeals holding that the district court in which he was convicted on the charge of using the mails to defraud had no authority to release him on probation.

In November 1923, Dr. Cook was sentenced to serve 14 years and 9 months in Leavenworth penitentiary. Later the court issued an order placing him on probation for five years but the circuit court of appeals reversed the decision, holding that the probation court did not possess a trial court to grant probation to a person after the term of confinement when the sentence was imposed, had expired.

Railroad Loses In Junction Argument

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—(P)—The supreme court today dismissed the appeal of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad contesting a state order requiring it to maintain a division superintendent and train dispatchers at Smithville, Texas.

SANITY TRIAL NEARING END

DEFENSE OVERULED IN ATTEMPTED CHANGE OF EVIDENCE RULE

(By Associated Press)
LOCKHART, Texas, Oct. 31.—Falling in its attempt to have the evidence rule changed, the defense in the sanity trial of A. V. Milliken, convicted slayer, sprang a surprise Monday morning in failing to put relevant witnesses on the stand.

Judge M. C. Jeffrey immediately began preparing the charge for the jury.

Judge William E. Hawkins, defense attorney, argued to the court that the common law rule of evidence, which would allow the introduction of all relevant testimony ought to be followed. The motion of the defense was overruled by the judge.

Both sides have been proceeding on the former decision of Judge Jeffrey excluding evidence relative to Milliken previous to the trial in November, 1926.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS SOUND AND PROSPECTS BRIGHT FOR FUTURE, BANK REPORT SAYS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Oct. 31.—Sound business conditions prevailed in practically all Texas industries during the past month, and the business outlook for the future is very encouraging, it was stated in the monthly report of the Federal Reserve bank of Dallas released today.

Outstanding financial developments of the month were the heavy liquidation of indebtedness at both banks and mercantile establishments, increased bank deposits, increased public spending, and large volume of money seeking an investment outlet.

While there was a further reduction in the estimated yields of cotton, production this year compares favorably with the average for the preceding five years and the higher prices being obtained this year, together with the farmers' large equity in the crop, will provide a large report, the statement declared.

DEFENSE WINS POINT IN FALL SINCLAIR CASE

QUESTION AS TO NAME OF PURCHASER RULED OUT OF EVIDENCE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The defense in the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy trial scored a point today when Justice Sissons ruled out a question as to whose name was originally discussed as the purchaser of oil subsequently bought by the Continental Trading company, Ltd., of Canada, from the A. E. Humphrey companies.

"The defense counsel have been seeking to link Harry P. Sinclair, who obtained the lease on Teapot Dome naval oil reserve, with the Continental. This company, the government contends, was in possession of \$35,000 in Liberty bonds, which it turned over to the Fall-Sinclair group, and the latter, in turn, turned them over to the Sinclair group."

Through former Senator Charles S. Thomas, of Colorado, the prosecution wanted to establish that Sinclair was the purchaser of the bonds, and that the latter, in turn, turned them over to the Sinclair group.

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PATIENCE CEASES AS VIRTUE GOVERNOR SAYS IN SERVING NOTICE TO LEADERS OF I. W. W.

(By The Associated Press)
DENVER, Colo., Oct. 31.—The state today for the first time openly challenged leaders of the Colorado coal strike called by Industrial Workers of the World with an order to stop picketing tomorrow.

"Patience has ceased to be a virtue," Governor W. H. Adams told I. W. W. chiefs through Adjutant General Paul Newton.

The governor's ultimatum was delivered to Roger Francezoon, head of the I. W. W. in the United States, at his Walsenburg headquarters by the adjutant general and Colonel Arthur L. Hart, ranking officer of the Colorado national guard.

In informing Francezoon that the government had decreed picketing was unlawful, the adjutant general warned that any intimidation of miners wishing to work, any demonstration or attempts to communicate with workers would not be recognized.

Not Ready to Answer
After several hours of consideration of the state ultimatum, Francezoon said he would recommend that picketing cease. He said the I. W. W. leaders were not in a position to answer the government's demands immediately and asked for a day at least before making a definite reply. Governor Adams granted the request.

"We have a feeling the governor's message is an implied threat," Francezoon said. "We also recognize the power of the state and if we discontinue with picketing it does not mean that the strike is over."

Checks on Rosters
While the military authorities made no mention of the national guard, the adjutant general has checked roster rosters and equipment and informed Governor Adams that mobilization could be under way in a few hours. The governor is known to have an unsigned order declaring martial law in the strike zone. This order was prepared last week when I. W. W. organizers defied efforts of county authorities to stop picketing.

To individuals, nor any further increase in the exemptions allowed individuals, which propositions have been the battle grounds of public revenue legislative fights. Nor is any reduction along these lines now planned by congressional leaders.

Arguing for the limitation of the total tax cut to \$225,000,000 in the face of surplus of \$635,000,000 for the last fiscal year and a projected margin of \$455,000,000 for this year, Mr. Mellon insisted that the basis for the reduction must be the surplus available in the fiscal year 1929. This, he said, is estimated at \$274,000,000.

The secretary frankly admitted that "for a number of years past the treasury estimates have underestimated revenue that was later realized." He recognized that the argument may be made again that the estimated surplus for 1929 is too low in view of the big margins of last year and this year.

Answer Is Explained

"The answer is explained," said the secretary, "in 1927 and this fiscal year were in the main due to certain resources which can not be available in 1929, since by that time they will have been exhausted."

"In so far as current revenue is concerned, it should be noted that the treasury estimates that the same receipts will be available in 1929 as in 1928, and as were actually collected in 1927."

"There is no evidence available to justify the assumption that they will be larger. There are certain definite indications that they may be smaller, but the department hopes that these unfavorable factors will be offset by the normal growth of the country."

Would Avoid Repetition

"Every effort to avoid a repetition of this result," he said, "has been made in preparation of the estimates here presented. It would be unwarranted and unwise to assume that in the present estimates there is any concealed surplus. In these figures, the treasury has not consciously nor as a matter of policy played safe."

"If tax reductions are made or appropriations voted on the assumed present figures under state probable future revenues, the responsibility for such reductions or appropriations must be assumed by those who advocate them. The treasury has placed the probable receipts at the highest figures compatible with the most dependable forecast and facts which careful and disinterested investigation could secure."

AGGIES EXPECT BIG CROWD FOR SATURDAY TILT

GAME WITH MUSTANGS MAY BE DECIDING CONFERENCE CLASH

(Special To The Journal) COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 31.—The athletic department of the A. and M. college of Texas is expecting to handle a crowd of twelve thousand people at the Aggie-S. M. U. contest on Kyle field Saturday, November 5.

With the exception of the annual Thanksgiving game with the Texas Longhorns, which is played on Kyle field on alternate years, the Mustang game on Kyle field has years ago attracted the largest number of spectators ever gathered there. With special trains from Houston, Dallas and Waco assured this year, indications point to an even greater attendance for the coming game.

Erect Temporary Stands

In addition to the permanent stands with a seating capacity of 13,000, temporary stands are now under construction for the Thanksgiving game with the Longhorns which will enable the seating of 3,000 additional spectators. If the advance ticket sales indicate there will be a larger attendance, another section will be added.

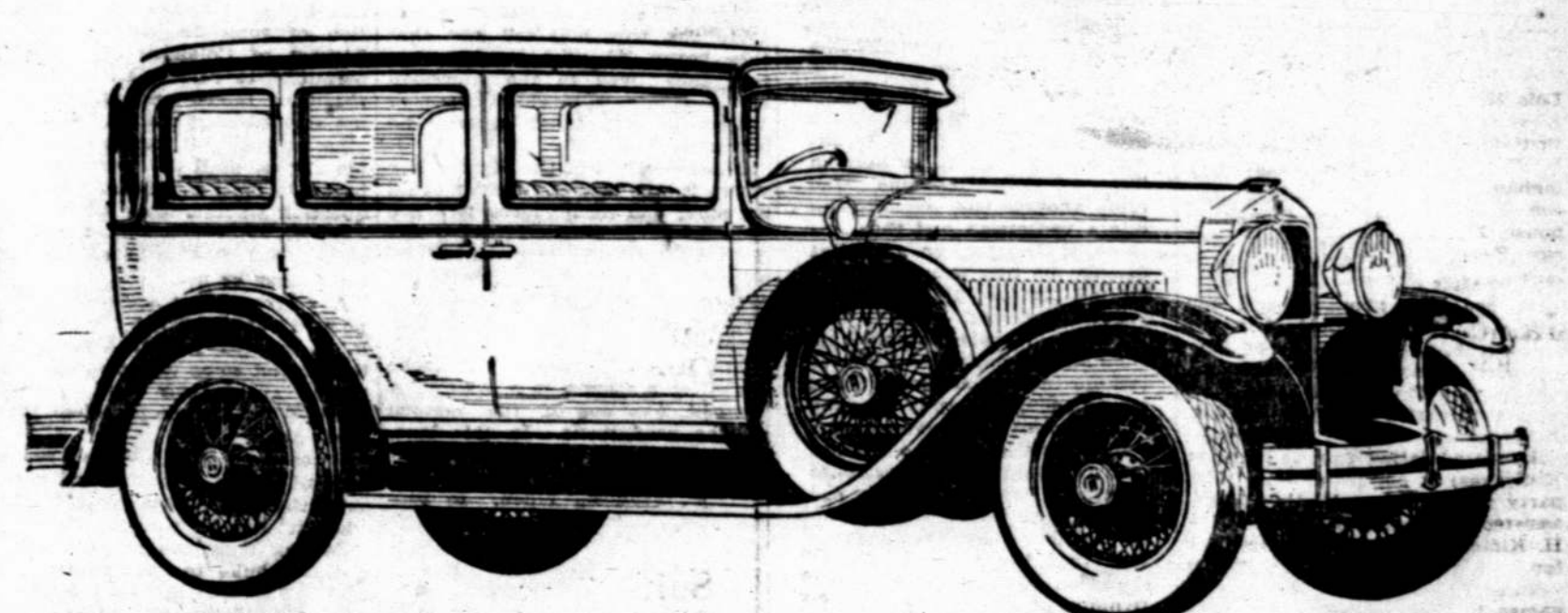

A New Yorker in Paris

PARIS, Oct. 31.—The Apaches,
those half-legendary habits of the
Paris underworld, have degenerated
into little more than prototypes of
the New York street gangster. All
the romantic flavor has slipped
away from them and guides men-
tion them in the past tense, as the
Chinatown drivers of New York tell
you of the "shirt tail gang."

Their very district has been in-
vaded and those who claim the
glorious distinction of being
"Apaches" are youngsters of the
gang type who must find it diffi-
cult to survive in Hell's Kitchen
and who would be put to rout in
Chicago.

Time was when the brutal and
primitive ways of the Apache and
his girls of the half world were
matter of fearless fiction. Some-
times they are who will tell you that
they never did exist in the sense
that they lived in the American
movies or the vaudeville dances.

However, even their legends no
longer are created.

These sections of the Montmartre
where it was said a stranger could
not enter and escape alive, now are
occupied by a certain type of work-
ing man. It was from one such
belt that the leaders of the anti-
American demonstrations came not
long ago when Naxos-Vanzetti sen-
timent was running strong.

The Rue de Vence, which looks
more like a fissure in a wall than
a street was one of the famous
Apache rendezvous. In this lane
that is little more than a built up
compath, it is easy to visualize the
Paris of Francois Villon. In Ra-
dine's time this was a literary gath-
ering place, but now cheap and
dirty drinking places mark the cor-
ners.

A few steps away are other lanes
where the Apache hid out—such as
the Aubrey-le-Boucher, around
which has been written some of the
most blood curdling tales. Other
hideouts dart through the outskirts
of Montmartre.

But the Apache, or such of him
as is left, has turned his hand to
petty and cheap crime. They tell me
are still depends upon his wife
of the half world for a living and
when times are a bit bad he has
connections with spies in his ho-
tels.

Thus if a little quick money is
desired one of the "hotel jobs" is
neatly and quickly turned. He does
not, however, make a profession of
robbery like the American stick-up
man and professional burglar. In

his agents attend to that and he
arranges through his connections
for the sale of stolen goods. After

words he resorts to robbery only
under pressure of great necessity.

in the Paris underworld, which is
a large and elaborate industry with
branches in almost any neighbor-
hood, with competition from those
erectiles who wander the sidewalks
of the de l'Opera, the Madeleine,
the des Batignols, the des Capucines
and fire with the blubbers of the
colorful sidewalk cafes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Presi-
dent Coolidge came back from the
west in what was for him a perfect
fit of color, but it didn't last long.

At the first post-vacation press
conference, as has been noted Mr.
Coolidge blossomed out in a dar-
ling, light gray suit, which gave
him the most collegiate appear-
ance in the entire assembly.

Since then, however, the presi-
dent has always appeared before
us in the same old black suit
which he wore before he went
away. Or if it isn't the same suit,
it's exactly the same color. Infor-
mation is not available as to
whether the president sold the pearl
gray suit, stored it or gave it to a
runnagale sale.

These press conferences often
deal mostly with trivial matters.
The other day, the president—as
the White House spokesman is
sometimes called—dwelt at great
length on the rather dumb sugges-
tion of someone in Chicago that
District of Columbia residents be
permitted to vote in Maryland. The
president talked and talked about
the various complications of such a
plan, reviewing it from all imagina-
ble angles, until the correspondents
began to snicker. There was some
question whether they were snick-
ering with the president, for it was
hard to tell whether he was attempt-
ing humor or not.

A correspondent spoke up and
pointed out that what the people of
D. C. wanted was to vote within
the district so as to have something
to say about their local govern-
ment. What did the president think
about that?

Whereupon the Voice replied
that no such question had been
submitted in writing and that
when it was, he would consider it.

Coming from the president, this
was a rebuke to the correspond-
ents to submit their ques-
tions to the president prior to the
conference for him to answer
comment upon or ignore. But
hardly a press conference passes
without one or more correspond-
ents asking for illumination on a
point which isn't clear to them
and it is most unusual for the
president to ignore such a verbal
query or to bawl out the asker.

At any rate, the people of the
District of Columbia know now
what the president thinks of an
all together impracticable suggestion,
but are left to guess how the pre-
sident feels on what is to them the
serious issue of self-government.

It is, of course, embarrassing
when the president expands upon
a trivial subject to the point where
it becomes funny, for he does not
smile and the correspondents often
cannot tell whether he expects to be
taken seriously or otherwise. The
boys feel like laughing, but fear
that to obey the impulse might be
a serious faux pas.

There was an incident two or
three years ago at the first White
House press conference held fol-
lowing the arrival of Calhoun and
his French debt mission. The
president fingered a written ques-
tion and studied it for two minutes
—something important, everyone
thought, for the president usually
wades in with hardly a pause. Fi-
nally he began to talk in a rambling
way as if something of enormous im-
portance was about to come. The cor-
respondents were on tiptoe, expect-
ing an important pronouncement
on the debt negotiations. It de-

There is little difference between
an accurate statement and a wrong
one in philosophy. Indeed, such
declarations are relative in regard
to truth and error, approximating
neither very closely.

Take, for example, H. M. Stan-
sifer's thought that "there is no
greater reward than a pleasant
memory." There is a great truth
in it. If you put the infection upon "re-
ward," a reward is something to re-
ceive at the end of something and
if the task is completed, there is
some satisfaction in musing over a
thing well done.

On the other hand, pleasant mem-
ories may be hugely unwise. He
who remembers only the pleasant is
in danger. It is foolish to neglect a
danger signal and imagine there can
be no washout ahead. Trial and er-
ror is one of the great teaching
methods—it is largely nature's way.
But trials bring pains, and errors
are certainly not pleasant mem-
ories.

One of the most educative of
moods is that inspired by unpleas-
ant memories, coupled with the de-
termination to avoid everything
even remotely similar. It is such a
viewpoint that gives a feeling
of greater security. Experience
has various effects upon people,
ripening some into the most use-
ful of citizens, softening some into
loose habits and self satisfaction,
and hardening others beyond the
point of good neighborliness.

There is a useful pleasure in re-
membering old harms received in
the crucible of experience, and the
scars may be pointed to with pride,
but in connection with such re-
stricted pleasure there is the wis-
dom that is truly enlightening. And
often man's unpleasant memory is a
good toward better things—Ex-
change.

Logic is a thing that works both
ways. Pleasant memories are nice
to sit and enjoy and smile over, and
talk about, but it takes the real
old hard knocks and the rough
places in the road of life to urge a
fellow on to a full determination
of doing the thing regardless of
the handicaps and the things that
hinder in various ways. It is not
always the triumphs of victory that
push a fellow on to the very best
there is in him. Sometimes the
sting of seeming certain defeat
brings the best there is in one out,
and causes them to exert them-
selves to the limit, and sometimes
brings on a turn of the tide, and
ultimately ends in a victory.

We should never look upon op-

Cement Carryover
Slightly Reduced

AUSTIN, Oct. 31 (AP)—Six cement
plants located in San Antonio, El
Paso, Dallas, Houston and Port
Worth produced 5,997,374 barrels
during 1926 and sold 5,942,359 bar-
rels of the product, thus somewhat

BIG INCREASE
IN TEXAS WILD
LIFE IS SEENBETTER OBSERVANCE OF
LAWS IN GENERAL
IS NOTED

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 31.—Game in Texas has substantially increased, public sentiment has turned to a better appreciation of game protection, game law violations have been reduced, sale of hunting and fishing licenses have been greatly augmented, and beneficial legislation facilitated in the four years since 1923 when the legislature allowed the game, fish and oyster commission full use of game funds. Will Tucker, game commissioner, says in his annual report to Governor Dan Moody, released today.

Touches All Phases
The report goes into all phases of game life and work in the state. It shows improvement in practically every aspect of game protection.

Tucker, a former newspaperman of Longview, prepared a lively, concise, interesting report—one that reflects the attitude of a statistician combined with the enthusiasm of a sportsman and nature lover. He philosophizes at times. Telling of the hatcheries, from which streams are stocked, he says: "A stream without fish is a misfortune of social justice." "It may be beautiful," he continued, "to the artist and the photographer, but to the masses who are moved with delight by the game flight of bass, such a stream is only a picture of regret."

Written Inquiries
Tucker has sent inquiries concerning game all over Texas. His replies indicate an "enormous increase in quail, a good increase in turkey and doves, and a fair increase in white tail deer and antelope, especially in the game reserves."

Good will co-operation in game conservation have been steadily increasing in every section of the state, Tucker said.

Despite general acceptance of the value of conservation laws, however, he noted, "this acceptance in certain quarters is still qualified by liberal reservations ranging from indifference to open antagonism."

This, he said, is to be expected in view of the brief period of actual game law enforcement, which he showed to date back only to 1923.

Big Change Seen
A great change is taking place, however, as Tucker sees it. He told how, in times past, "certain elements would not be tolerated in some sections. But now, he continues, more justice is done, and the legislature for exemptions from general game laws, are asking for special laws intensifying protection to game and fish."

Tucker made several recommendations to the governor. Among them are:

General revision of fish, shrimp and oyster taxes to prevent double taxation and other complications in enforcement of tax laws. A state-wide limit for daily catch of fresh water fish and adequate size limit for channel catfish.

Elimination of trawling fishing in several western counties because of the tremendous demand for fish there.

Closed seasons of bass, crappie and white perch in March and April, and should be for all fresh water fish for February, March and April.

Change white wing dove season to August and September.

Universal License
Universal hunting license of \$2. Non-resident big game license for deer, turkey and bear at \$15. Non-resident small game license at \$5.

The report also showed: That black tail deer in the Big Bend section has steadily decreased, due to extensive hunting in the mountain region.

Prarie chicken of the Panhandle has rapidly increased in last year even with extensive hunting during 10 day open season.

Twelve thousand increase in number of hunting license over preceding year.

Game collections increased more than \$25,000.

Oyster production of Texas exacted from 104,473 barrels in the fiscal year ending August 31, last, due to unusual drought conditions.

Increase of sand, gravel and mud shell sales fund from \$127,000 to \$134,000.

SERVICE STATIONS GAIN

According to the Automotive Equipment Association, 88,000 automobile service stations in this country installed nearly a billion dollars' worth of parts and service supplies last year. This would make the average earning for each station more than \$10,000.

Irish Airplanes
Seek Victims Of
Saturday's Storm

(By Associated Press)

DUBLIN, Ireland, Oct. 31.—Two Irish Free State airplanes were searching the galway and mayo-casts today for the bodies of victims of the Irish fishing fleet overtaken by a great storm on Saturday.

It is now feared that more than fifty men were drowned, many of them within sight of their homes on the shore. Virtually every bread winner at Lackan bay, a village in County Mayo, was drowned within 200 or 300 yards of his home when the fishing boats were dashed to pieces on the rocks. One family lost five men.

In Cleghra, county galway and nearby fishing towns, 31 fishermen are missing while eight bodies have been washed ashore.

Heart rending scenes have taken place in the stricken districts as news of the disaster came to the families of the fishermen.

Lindbergh Signed
By Guggenheim Fund

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has been retained in a consulting capacity by the Daniel Guggenheim fund for the promotion of aeronautics and will not identify himself, at least for the present, with any commercial undertaking. His arrangement with the Guggenheim fund will leave him free to engage in any activities to promote the cause of flying.

It was under auspices of the Guggenheim fund that Colonel Lindbergh made his air tour of the country after making the first flight across the Atlantic from the United States to France.

At Local Hospital

The Sinclair crude oil purchasing company guaranteed the performance of the oil purchase by the Continental company. This contract was signed by Sinclair and Stewart.

H. L. Phillips, president of the Sinclair crude oil purchasing company, produced the resale contract under which the Continental company was to sell the Humphreys oil to the Prairie and Sinclair companies. H. S. Osler, president, signed for the Continental while officials of the Sinclair and Prairie companies signed for them. Sinclair's name was not on that contract.

Terms of Document
Under the terms of this document the Sinclair and Prairie companies paid \$1.75 a barrel for the oil which the Continental had paid \$1.50. The government contends that

by this, Sinclair and Stewart and O'Neil became guarantors of a contract which enabled the Continental to take big profits from their own companies.

Phillips testified that both the Continental purchase, the guarantee and the resale contracts came before the board of directors of the Sinclair company on November 21, 1921, at Chicago. The resale contract then was ratified.

Part Standard Stock
Replying to O'Neil J. Roberts, government counsel, Phillips said the stock of the Sinclair crude company was held one half by the Standard Oil company of Indiana and the Sinclair Consolidated Oil company.

"Do you know how much oil the Sinclair crude oil purchasing company took under the resale contract?"

"Four million barrels," Roberts then produced the contract by which the Continental company assigned its contract with Humphreys to the Sinclair and the Prairie companies for \$400,000.

Government Seeks
To Trace Bonds

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—The promotion, in the Teapot Dome oil conspiracy case, plugging persistently along today in its effort to show that Harry F. Sinclair was connected with the Continental Trading company, Ltd., of Canada, through whose profits it charges \$250,000 to liberty bonds reached the hands of Albert B. Fall. Through documentary evidence and witnesses, O'Neil J. Roberts, government counsel, continued to trace the organization of the company which he claimed was formed merely to take a profit on oil purchased from the late A. M. Humphreys, of Denver, for \$1.50 a barrel and sold to other companies, including Sinclair's own company for \$1.75.

"The Continental company was a mere shell, gotten up by these gentlemen for their own purpose," Roberts asserted.

Former Senator Thomas, of Colorado and H. L. Phillips, president of the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing company were put on the stand by Roberts in pursuing his
