CITY PLANS TO OBSERVE MEMORIAL DAY

American Legion Uses Home First Time

Formal Opening To Be Held On Friday, June 19

The newly completed American Legion Allen Houston Post Home opened its doors Tuesday night to the Legion members and their wives. The home which is on the corner of North Fifth and Wasson Streets is one of the most complete and up to date club homes as will be found anywhere. The building is a wooden structure, large and roomy inside, with hardwood floors, stage, kitchen, ante rooms and relief case. It is a hall to be justly proud of.

Program Given

The program which began at 8:30 was preceded by orchestra music of several selections. S. Richardson made a short talk on "Counting the Cost" in which he said that it was to the memory of those boys, Allen and Houston, after whom the hall was named that the hall was built. Mrs. J. D. Dyer, representing the Women's Auxiliary, then took charge of the program, which included a reading by Miss Elizabeth Arnett; "Everything's Gonna Be Alright," The Blue Bonnet Choral Club sang two numbers; "Lassie O' Mine" and "The Wind at Night." These numbers were well applauded. Mr. C. Baldwin, who is a gold star parent made a short talk. The pupils of Mrs. Valeria Sharp Pratt gave a sailor's dance and came back for an encore. Mrs. Philip Yonge then spoke in behalf of the Women's Auxiliary. She spoke on "The Dream Come True", in which she said that the Legion Home was as much of a dream to the Women's Auxiliary as it was to the Legionaires themselves. During her talk she pledged the co-operation of every member of the auxiliary saying that they would help the men in any way that they could. Mrs. Yonge also read the preamble to the Legion constitution. Miss Elsie Hinds read "The Youngest Child" which was so well liked that she gave an encore "The Old Time Preacher". Mr. G. M. Roberts then made a talk on Americanism and outlined the standards that the Legion stands for.

This closed the program after which Mr. Richardson took charge and asked Mr. Dyer to introduce the visitors. His first introduction was Mr. J. P. Allen, father of the boy after whom the post was named. At this time Mr. Allen gave to the Legion a picture of his son to hang in the hall. Mr. Dyer at this time explained that two life sized pictures of the Allen and Houston boy are being painted and will probably be ready when the hall is officially opened. Other visitors at this time included Post Commander Smith of Tahoka and six other Tahoka Legionaires and two from O'Donnell.

To Be Officially Opened

Mr. Richardson then made the announcement that the home will be officially opened June 19 at which time state commander Hal Brennon will be the principal speaker. Also Judge Clark M. Mullican of Lubbock will be a principal speaker. This closed the entire program and all adjourned to drink punch and eat ice cream cones donated by the Coca Cola Bottling Works and the Purity Ice Cream Co. A short business session was then held. A large crowd was in attendance almost filling the house to capacity.

Business Session

S. Richardson had charge of the meeting which opened with the reading of the minutes by Bland Taylor which were duly approved. Palmer Anderson, chairman of the program committee for Memorial day gave a report of the committee and announced the plans which will be found elsewhere in this issue of the Courier. Lamesa people will no doubt respond liberally in this campaign, and it will be the very smallest thing that we can do. Wear a poppy Saturday, in memory of the boys "over there".

Our Mayor has issued a proclamation that we observe poppy day in Lamesa. Be prepared to help all you can. Remember the boys and their families, who have suffered from the effect of this terrible slaughter of men, in a war that touched every nation in the world, and brought grief to the hearts of millions of people. A small contribution in memory of those who have suffered most, will be greatly appreciated. The Dawson County Courier feels confident that our people will do their part. At 12:00 o'clock Saturday, four buglers will be placed on the four corners of the square, and will sound taps as a warning for every person and every industry to pause five minutes in honor of them the glorious dead. On Sunday afternoon on the Court House Lawn, The Lamesa Municipal band will offer several musical selections. Judge Carl Rountree, who is an ex-service man, will be the principal speaker for the occasion. Following the program the Legionaires will drive out to the Lamesa cemetery and decorate the graves of those heroes who have died in battle. The graves to be decorated will be marked with a flag.

HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB AT POST

- Each one should bring for her own use, a plate, knife, fork, spoon cup and tea towel and bedding. The pavillion will be used as sleeping quarters. If children are brought enough food should be added to the list to provide for them.

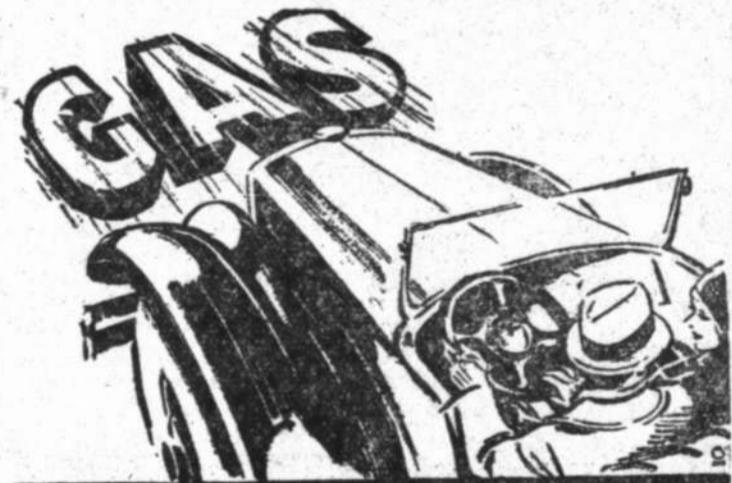

A NEW ROOM FROM AN OLD ONE

When I entered the living room contest I hardly knew how to begin but with some encouragement and help I finally finished it. My room was 14x14 feet in size with a southwest front.

The floor was my first problem; it was rough and full of cracks. I knew those cracks had to be filled, so I made a paste of news paper and thick cooked starch and filled the cracks. The floor was scraped as smooth as possible with a plane and after this we gave it three coats of dust colored floor paint. The materials for refinishing the floor were given us by the Patterson-Sargent Company through the Cleero Smith Lumber Company. This floor is easier kept and much more attractive than it was before. For painting the woodwork in the room a little of the floor paint was added to white paint to make a lighter shade of the same color that was used on the floor.

It was necessary to repaper. I selected for my paper a gray mingled paper for the ceiling and a beautiful pink, green and gold mottled paper on a background of the same color as the woodwork for the walls.

We refinished old furniture: nothing new was bought. The varnish was removed from the library table, an old drop-leaf table, three rocking chairs, one straight chair and a duofold. For this we used lye paste and commercial varnish remover. We sandpapered, restained and varnished these with three coats of varnish rubbing down each coat with pumice stone and linseed oil and finally waxing

them so that they looked like new. Two old rocking chairs used in the back bed room were upholstered in blue-gray and green auto slip materials. The piano and magazine stand were cleaned and waxed.

The glass curtains are made of gold colored theatrical gauze hung over tan shades. We have five pictures which are predominately blue and green in coloring to repeat other colors used in the room. Two of these are copies of masterpieces; one is "Weeping Magdalene" and the other "Spring". The other pictures are a bluebonnet scene and a mountain scene in winter. The other is a motto. There is also a lovely vase of flowers on the magazine stand.

The entire cost of refinishing the room, including the paint which was given us was \$23.63.

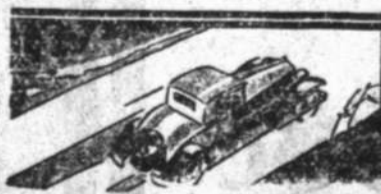

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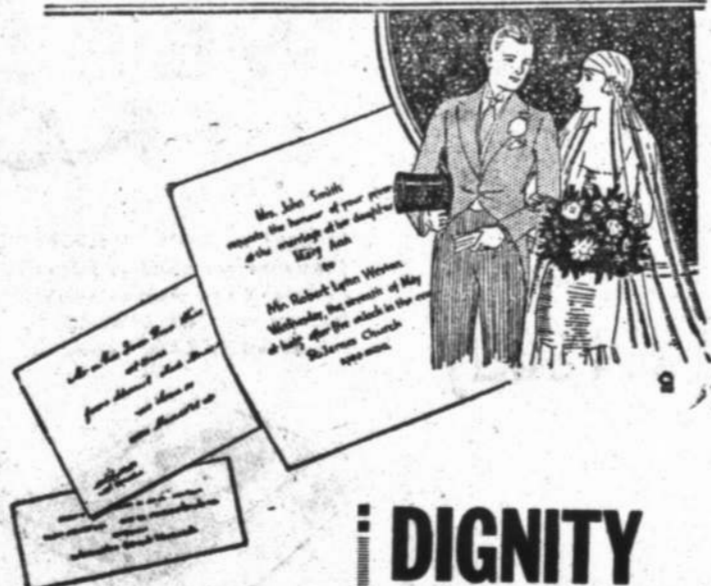

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL NEWS

By W. W. Evans

C. H. Henderson of the Sparenberg community has a field of 6 acres of oats which he intends to harvest as an early feed crop.

E. W. Hester of O. K. has a field of 8 acres of barley which promises to make an excellent yield of grain this season.

E. L. Adeock of the Woody community is preparing to harvest several acres of small grain for early feed.

These crops are not expected to become as important as other staple crops but have proven this year well worth the trouble and expense of seeding and harvesting. The crops were seeded to obtain winter and spring pasture and perhaps the expenses of seed and labor already obtained through the pasturing of milk cows, and a promise of 1 T. grain per acre is indicative of the future, and that more extensive trials will be made.

Dawson county is indeed the livestock county as shown by the number of dairy cattle, hogs, poultry on the farms and is further reinforced by the acreage of grain and feed crops planted. It is believed that the best market for feed crops is on the farms; this is especially true when animals of high quality are kept.

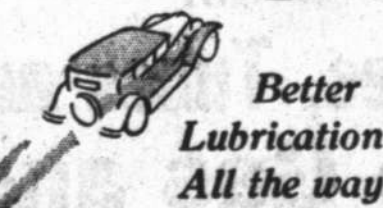
