DALLAS (AP)—Mrs. Pearl Hall, 30, was shot and killed early Wednesday at the home of Mrs. L. W. Boone, who was later arrested and held in jail to face murder charges.

Police said Mrs. Boone admitted firing the fatal shot. L. W. Boone, husband of the woman held, said both women entered the bedroom early Wednesday and Mrs. Boone fired one shot.

The shooting was result of alleged domestic difficulties, police said.

Vet Is Held In Death Of Slain Woman

In Possession Of Car Belonging To Deceased When Arrested

OKLAHOMA CITY (UP)—A man believed to be Veigl Brown, ex-soldier who left Fresno, Calif., with Mrs. Marie Elmley, 40, a few days before her battered body was found near El Reno, Okla., last month, was arrested at Shawnee, Okla.

Shawnee police said Mrs. Elmley's missing automobile and pet terrier were recovered at the time of the arrest. The slain woman was prominent in society at Shawnee, Okla.

O. P. Ray, superintendent of the crime bureau, said the message from Shawnee identified the car recovered as that of Mrs. Elmley.

The woman's body was unidentified for almost a month. Her mother, Mrs. Josephine Mayhew, wife of a prominent Windsor physician, became alarmed when mail sent to Mrs. Elmley in care of general delivery here was returned unclaimed.

Worker Charged In Death Of Temple Veterinarian

Confession Follows Discovery Of Body—Doctor Was Slugged To His Death

TEMPLE (UP)—Fragments of a body found in the dump of a telephone call his body was found Tuesday. Querner was arrested and taken to Belton, where he made a statement late Tuesday to Sheriff Zedley.

Investigation is under way that Dr. Clifford lived for eight years at a boarding house operated by a Querner, the former Mrs. Emil Schmidt. She married Querner last summer, left him six weeks after their marriage and again began operating the boarding house in which Dr. Clifford lived.

When Dr. Clifford's body was found late Tuesday by Hoyt Burden, who had been cutting stalks on the A. J. Parker farm two and one half miles east of Temple, it was lying face downward. Dr. Clifford's coat was up over his head and nearby was a medicine kit with his hat on top of it.

Burden was attracted to the body by his team of mules shying as they came near the weeds in which it lay.

Investigators found footprints of two different sizes near the body, which led them to believe two men were involved in the slaying. A ring was on the doctor's finger. An undertaker said he had been dead about five days.

Local Refinery Consumptive Demand Given Priority Under New Rail Commission Order

Efforts Exerted Here Considered Major Cause Of Unusual Provision; Local Refiners See Crude Shortage Problem Well Toward Solution

By terms of a supplemental order issued late Tuesday with the railroad commission's new order cutting the state allowable oil production to 868,412 barrels no oil will be allowed to be transported out of any field until local refinery consumptive demand shall have been supplied out of the local production of such field or pool.

This unusual order was considered a direct result of strenuous efforts exerted from Big Spring for weeks culminating Monday with a barrage of urgent messages from more than thirty firms and individuals to the railroad commission as well as high officials in the national administration.

Local refiners were jubilant over the step taken by the railroad commission. They saw in the supplemental order a long step toward solution of their chief problem—acquiring supplies of crude sufficient to meet the demand they have for refined products.

Re-hearing on the order will be held in Austin November 28.

The daily allowable production for the Howard-Glucose field was set at 13,300 barrels, a reduction of 200 barrels.

At present, the Humble Oil & Refining company and the Shell Pipe Line company, the only major purchasers running crude from the local field, are taking approximately 7,000 barrels daily, leaving 6,000 barrels for Couden, Howard County Refining company and Col-Tex after deducting a few hundred barrels of Magnolia production which is taken by that company's pipe line.

The Couden Oil Corporation, largest local plant, is receiving about 4,100 barrels daily and Col-Tex about 1,500 barrels daily while Howard county is getting about 250 barrels.

The Couden demand is more than 7,000 barrels. The new plant soon to be ready for operation cannot be operated with the 4,100 barrels daily now being received.

Howard County Refining company needs 1,000 barrels daily. Although refiners were uncertain as to how the railroad commission would enforce the supplemental order, it was expected the major purchasers, now taking most of the production, would be required to sell additional crude from their lines to the local refiners until the latter's requirements were met.

Final Legal Detail Preliminary To Swimming Pool Loan Application Attended To By City Commission

Final detail in the ordinance of the city of Big Spring providing method of payment of a loan of \$21,000 sought from the Public Works Administration for construction of a municipal bathing pool at City Park was attended Tuesday evening by the board of city commissioners. The government would make a grant of \$9,000, bringing the total of the proposed expenditure to \$30,000.

The state public works advisory committee's attorney had recommended a change in the ordinance. It originally provided that the government's loan of \$21,000 would be secured by a mortgage on the pool, bath house and appurtenances, and the five acres of land upon which it will be located if built. The city proposed to pay the loan solely out of income from operation of the pool.

The ordinance was changed to read that the debt would be secured by having all revenues from operation of the pool placed in a separate "Swimming Pool Fund," the loan to be paid solely out of this fund, with the specific statement that in no case would the loan constitute a debt against the city's tax income or be retired by a tax of any type.

If and when the loan is approved in Washington the city will make notes of \$500 each due over a period of 15 years, bearing 4 per cent interest payable semi-annually.

In case revenues from the pool did not pay off the loan in the 15-year period the city agrees to continue keeping all revenues in the separate fund until the whole debt is paid from pool revenues only.

The Big Spring pool application was formally filed with the state public works committee last week through D. A. Hansen, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which is maintaining a bureau for aiding West Texas cities in presenting their applications.

Indications are that water, sewer and bond applications of various cities will be disposed of by the state committee and sent to Washington for final approval before swimming pool applications are put through.

Resignation Is Declined By Roosevelt

Morgenthau Appointed To Post Of Acting Treasury Secretary

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Roosevelt Wednesday announced that Secretary Woodin would "begin complete leave of absence" at the end of the week, pending return of Henry Morgenthau, Jr., who is to be acting secretary of treasury. Under Secretary Dean Acheson having resigned, Morgenthau was appointed to that post.

Woodin tendered his resignation to the president several days ago. President Roosevelt declined to accept, suggesting instead a complete rest. Woodin has been suffering from a throat infection.

Johnson Urges Quick Action On Compliance

Code And Reemployment Agreement Compliance Not Working Well

WASHINGTON (UP)—Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, recovery act administrator, took President Roosevelt Wednesday a report showing compliance with codes and Blue Eagle reemployment agreement are not working successfully and that means must be taken quickly to secure thorough enforcement.

This conclusion was reached after a ten day swing through the midwest Johnson said.

Westbrook To Ask Immediate Bond Issuance

Will Ask Governor To Speed Bonds To Keep Promise To Federals

WASHINGTON (UP)—Lawrence Westbrook, Texas Relief Director, said Wednesday he would urge Governor Ferguson urging that the state demand the bond commission to speed issuance of relief bonds in Texas.

The board of control of relief gave printers until December 15. Westbrook said he was going to demand the contract be broken, or some steps taken to speed up the matter in order to live up to a promise made the federal government.

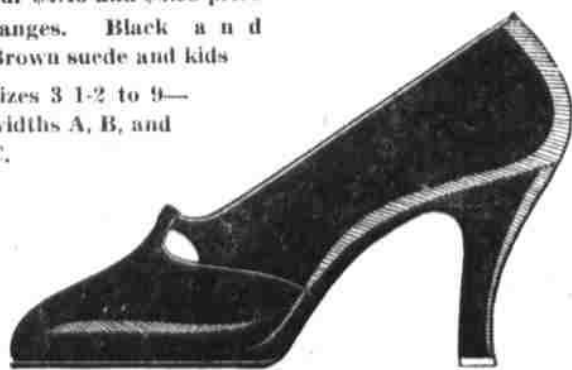
