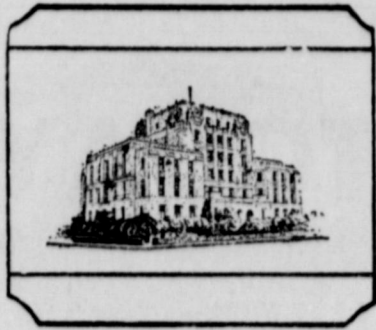

TidBits

There is developing in southern Eastland county a project of more than ordinary economic interest to this area.

It represents at the same time, a most encouraging example of that spirit of voluntary cooperation which justifies our free enterprise system — an example of the ability of our people to see their best interests in the common good and to merge individualities in common effort.

The benefits of the project if realized, as now appears so favorable, will mean millions of dollars in increased agricultural income, higher property valuations, more revenues to support schools and local governmental agencies, and a higher standard of living for people generally. Considerable increases in population and business levels can certainly be expected to eventuate.

It will mean more, both economically and in the living potential of our section, than would the largest industry we can conceive of locating here.

It is the Sabanna Watershed Development Project which was launched in its approved planning stage at a meeting held in Gorman Thursday afternoon.

Affected are about 250,000 acres of productive farm and ranch land, lying for the greater part in the southern reaches of Eastland county and embracing some of the finest peanut, feed and ranch soil in the Big Country.

The primary purpose of the project is to prevent the flood damage which costs so much of the valuable top soil in seasons of heavy rains. In doing so the system of water retarding structures envisioned, in conjunction with other and essential conservation practices, would keep untold thousands of acres of water, now rushing away in rainy seasons, lingering on Sabanna soil to keep it fertile, recharge underground supplies and offset the effects of periodic droughts such as is now occurring.

It would also make these waters available for municipal services for irrigation and for other economically valuable uses.

But what is equally encouraging along with that prospect, is the fact that the Sabanna program is being worked out by the landowners themselves in cooperation.

It demonstrates the capacity of our individualistic-minded people to recognize, organize for and solve their own problems. Whatever help the government is offering is confined to the profitable investment of tax money in revenue producing structures to be owned by the landowners, and to providing the technical services for planning the program. It will be a good investment by the government as well as by the people.

Our system of free enterprise is based on the proven assumption that where individuals are given the right to compete and to choose for themselves, they are more creative of public prosperity.

But individual ownership does not mean, in the ultimate, (Continued On Page Six)

Tickets are \$1.00 each and reservations may be made by calling 629-1141. All seats are reserved and reservations must be made in advance.

The week-end also marks the Fifth Anniversary for Bell Hurst Playhouse. In November, 1964, the finance committee of Eastland Civic League and Garden Club met in the home of Mrs. Gene C. Boney, League president. Committee members were Mrs. J. T. Carter, chairman, Betty Parks, and Mrs. E. G. Rice. Mrs. Virginia Russell, well-known play writer, designer, director, and critic-judge, was a guest at the meeting.

Mrs. Russell accepted the committee's invitation to direct a play to be given in the winter of 1965.

February, 1965, "An Evening of One Acts" was presented in Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria. Plays were "The Dear Departed," "Playgoers" and "Sparkin'."

Eastland Civic Theatre was organized at a party following the closing performance and presented its first play as a separate organization in June, 1965, "The Nutt Family" was given in the Eastland High School auditorium.

The next February "Junior Miss" was given in the newly-opened Bell Hurst Playhouse. "Dial M for Murder" followed in June, 1966, and ECT gave its second "Evening of One Acts" that October, presenting "The Tenth Word," "The Pot Boil-er," and "The Reign of Minnie Belle."

Planning On Sabanna Valley Project Begun

The Sabanna River Watershed Improvement project — designed to control flooding and provide other water conservation benefits on a quarter million acres of farm and ranch land in southern Eastland and northern Comanche counties — took another long step toward reality in a meeting at Gorman Thursday of last week at 1:30 p. m.

In that meeting, held at the offices of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, officials and technicians of the Soil Conservation Service told landowners and representatives of sponsoring agencies what in cooperation would be needed to expedite surveys and planning of the project.

The first survey, to establish points of equal elevation around the perimeter of the basin and provide other topographical data on which planning will be based, is due to get under way about mid-March, Joe Camp, SCS technician of San Marcos and planning chief, told the meeting.

The meeting was called by the Sabanna Valley Landowners Association, an organization of farmers, ranchers and others directly interested, which made the application for the project in 1967. Ross Wilson, Gorman, president of the applicant group, presided.

Sponsoring agencies are the commissioners courts of Comanche and Eastland counties and the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation district.

Some twenty, including County Judge Fred Hall of Comanche, County Judge Scott Bailey of Eastland, members of two commissioners courts and directors of the Upper Leon district, attended.

The project received congressional approval for planning early last fall.

Actual surveying will be done by technicians from the Stephenville area of the Soil Conservation Service, Irvin Poff, conservationist in charge of the 10 county area, told the group.

E. E. McAlister, conservationist in charge of the Eastland office of the SCS, has been designated coordinator for the project. All parts of the program will be kept in

liaison through his office. Actual planning will be done by Mr. Camp and his group, who will develop the overall design or "blue book", by which the project will be laid before Congress, seeking its approval and final authorization of funds.

Hopefully the project will eventuate in a pattern of interrelated water control structures to be built upon the Sabanna watershed by the government, maintained by the local sponsoring agencies, and owned and controlled in all other respects by the landowners who give the necessary easements.

The first step necessary, Mr. Camp told the group, is to secure landowner agreements for the SCS survey parties to enter upon their properties to make the surveys.

He stressed the need for continuing close liaison between the planning agencies and the landowners, and pointed out that the sponsoring agencies could serve indispensably in maintaining this mutual understanding.

"We need your help," he said. "This must be your plan. You can help greatly in identifying local problems and benefits and in developing the general plan."

He emphasized that from start to finish there would be no "under the table" dealings. "Everything will be open and above board and mutually understood," he said.

As a project develops, the SCS men said, there will be frequent public meetings between planners and landowners to keep the sponsors and landowners advised of details and to seek their help in developing features of the design.

Following the meeting Ross and his group huddled on plans to carry information to the owners of land in the basin and to secure their agreements for the surveys.

Poff pointed out that these agreements obtained in advance would greatly expedite the work of the SCS survey crews and enable the project to be taken to Congress sooner. He estimated that from two to three years would be necessary to accomplish this.

Basic purpose of the project is flood control. Camp told the group that a preliminary estimate showed about 12,000 acres of the district subject to severe flood damage. The SCS has already run some leads on the sites he said.

Other benefits involved relate to municipal water supplies and to irrigation. There is good possibility that towns and municipalities in the area may find additional sources of water supply in some of the structures which could be enlarged for the purpose at the community's expense.

Farmers and ranchers could also use water from the structures for irrigation under the same conditions with respect to state law in which they may use water from structures built at their own expense, it was pointed out.

Poff explained that the role of the Soil Conservation Service is limited to providing the technical assistance necessary to developing and realizing the plan.

Sponsors point out that the project would result in millions of dollars of new income in the form of increased crops, heavier livestock carrying capacity and other benefits over the years.

Lee of Rising Star, Truman L. Renshaw of Comanche and W. R. Heizer of Dublin, of the Soil Conservation Service.

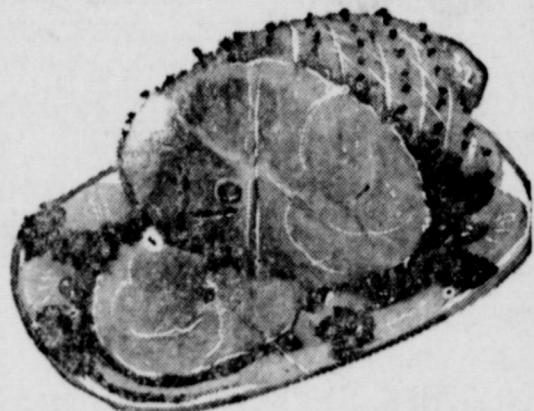

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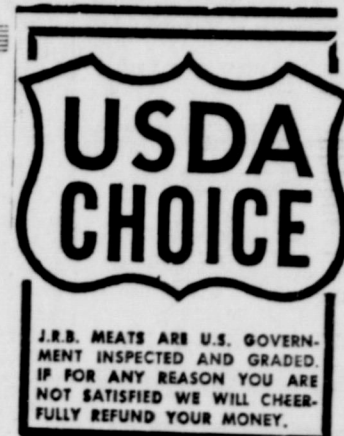
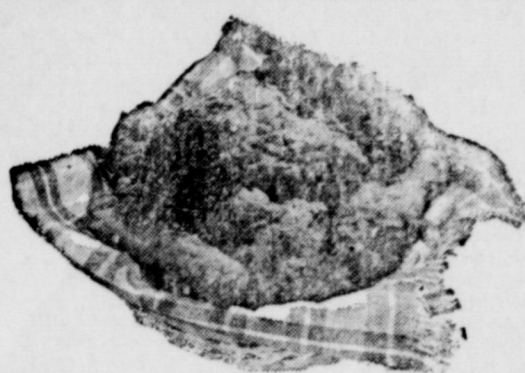

2 Livestock Operators Are Fined By USDA

W. O. Steen, of Abilene, has been fined \$1,000 and permanently enjoined by a Federal Court from violating reporting requirements of the Packers and Stockyards Act, the U. S. Department of Agriculture said today.

The U. S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, Abilene Division, enjoined Mr. Steen, and his agents and employees, from failing to file, within the allowed time, any annual or special reports that the Secretary of Agriculture may require under the P&S Act.

The P&S Act is a fair trade practices law. It promotes and maintains fair and open competition in the marketing of livestock, poultry and meat.

The proceedings in this case are open to the public. Copies of the judgement, P&S Case 1110, may be obtained from the Information Officer, Packers and Stockyards Administration, USDA, Washington, D. C. 20250.

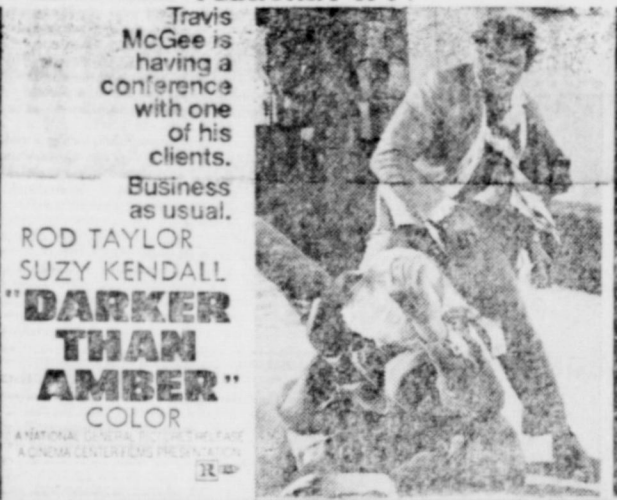

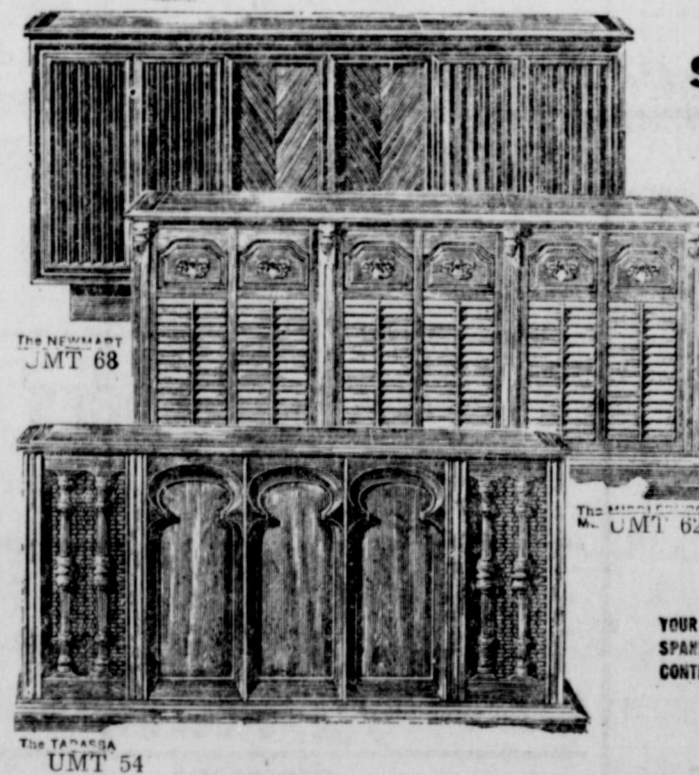

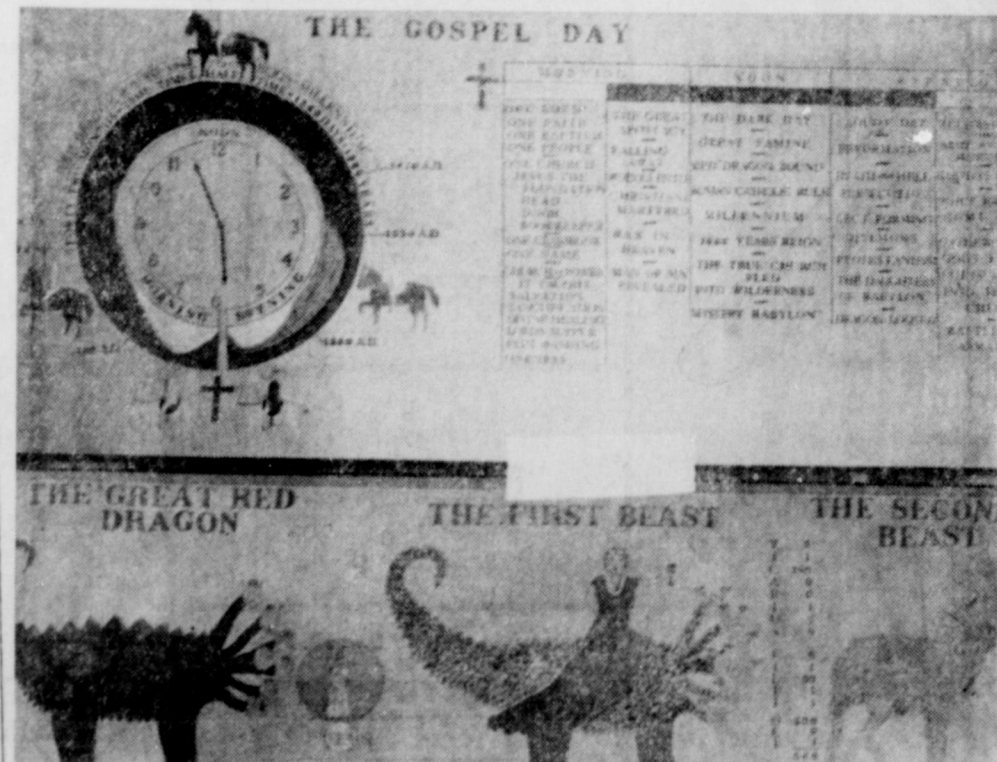
