education and tests help make it possible."

Ms. Reiter and the other two ESC counselors are conducting a survey which will aid them in meeting their students' needs, to offer the assistance appropriate for their situations. Each student will register his or her opinion concerning the testing program of their school and counseling services provided the students. He or she may also indicate their own personal and academic growth.

In addition to being a good listener, a counselor endeavors to help the student to set educational goals which are consistent and realistic with the student's abilities and interests; informs each student of SAT/ACT test dates and registration; and helps the student keep aware of requirements not only for graduation but also those needed for college acceptance.

Ms. Reiter became interested in counseling as a career when she was a senior in high school, working in the counselor's office. She studied at East Texas State University in Commerce.

A counselor, she explains, does not merely decide to work in that field. Teacher certification and three years teaching experience are requirements. A counselor must also hold a master's degree in guidance and counseling.

Ms. Reiter encourages parents to meet with her concerning their children's college and career plans.

Cooperative Counselor Assists Students With Career Plans

Providing college and career information for high school students, is a big part of Kari Reiter's job. A cooperative education counselor with the Education Service Center, she works with students in six different Panhandle schools.

Working out of Amarillo, Ms. Reiter's services are available to students from kindergarten through twelfth grade but varies with the six schools. In addition to Hart, she works with Channing, Silverton, McLean, Adrian and Pringle-Morris.

One of three counselors working with the Amarillo based service center, she spends two days every three weeks with each of the six schools.

Ms. Reiter began working with the Service Center last February and worked each Monday with students at Hart High School.

"We try to see every senior," she explains, "making sure each one gets information he or she needs concerning college or their career plans. We also like to work with parents along with the students concerning financial aid available for college or trade school."

"A lot of schools don't let students see test results (achievement and other exams) but Hart does. I think that's great," she says, explaining that this information helps them to see what areas they may need help in.

Cook Of The Week

Sharing recipes with Hart Beat cooks this week is a young woman transplanted from East Texas, Mrs. Louis Banister.

With five year old Mikey beginning kindergarten, Debbie is working at The Company Store.

Born in Dallas and reared in Longview, Debbie says it took time getting used to West Texas. For Louis, however, it was almost like moving "home". He grew up in Clovis.

They met in Kilgore where Louis had gone to work in the oil fields. He received his degree in music education from Livingston University in Alabama.

Cooking is Debbie's favorite hobby. She particularly likes baking breads and is trying her luck with sour dough breads. She likes to decorate cakes and says her biggest undertaking was to make a "train" birthday cake for Louis' father. His praise, made the three-dimensional locomotive worthwhile.

She enjoys crafts and likes making her own Christmas ornaments from "dough" made of salt. She has some patterns but mostly designs her own patterns. She likes to do macrame and enjoys crocheting.

HOMEMADE CHICKEN AND DUMPLINGS

- 2 c flour
- $\frac{3}{4}$ t salt
- 3 eggs
- 1 pt whipping cream

Mix flour, salt, eggs and half the whipping cream. Roll out about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thick. Let set 10 mins. Cut as you'd like.

Have chicken boiled until tender. Remove chicken and set aside. Add dumplings to boiling broth. Continue boiling one-half hour. About half way through, add remaining whipping cream and chicken to dumplings.

BATTER FOR VEGETABLES

- Mix well:
- $1\frac{1}{3}$ c all purpose flour
- 1 t salt
- $\frac{1}{4}$ t pepper
- 1 T melted butter or vegetable oil
- 2 beaten egg yolks
- Add:
- $\frac{1}{2}$ c water

Allow batter to rest covered and refrigerated 3 to 12 hours. Just before using, add 2 stiffly beaten egg whites.

If you do not have time to let batter rest, mix well and add whole eggs. Batter can be used with any vegetable - potatoes, onions, tomatoes, squash, okra, etc. Place vegetables in batter, coat well, deep fry till golden in color.

If batter is too thick, add more water. Makes enough to coat 2 c vegetables.

- $2\frac{1}{2}$ c all purpose flour
- 2 t baking powder

- 1 t baking soda
 - 1 t lemon peel, finely shredded
 - $\frac{3}{4}$ t salt
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ t ground cinnamon
 - $\frac{1}{4}$ t ground ginger
 - 2 beaten eggs
 - $1\frac{1}{4}$ c sugar
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ c cooking oil
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ t orange extract, optional
 - 2 c finely shredded zucchini
 - 1 c chopped walnuts, optional
- In large bowl stir: flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, ginger and lemon peel. Set aside. In another bowl, beat eggs, sugar, oil and extract. Add egg mixture. Add zucchini and nuts. Mix well.

Turn batter into greased 9x5x3 loaf pan. Bake in 350° oven 50-60 mins. or till wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 mins. Remove from pan to wire rack, cool thoroughly. For soft crust, wrap and store overnight before slicing.

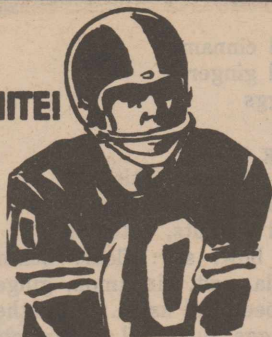

Enrollment Total Up From Start

Enrollment in Hart schools after the first week was 554, up from an opening day enrollment of 525.

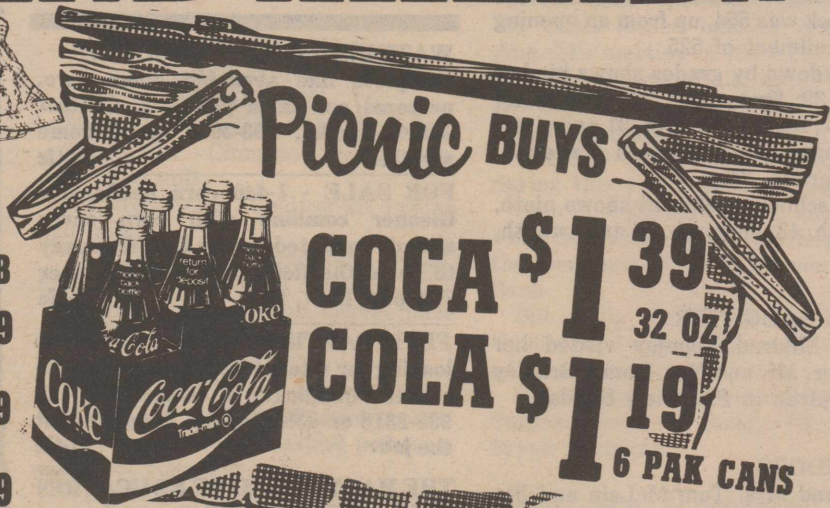

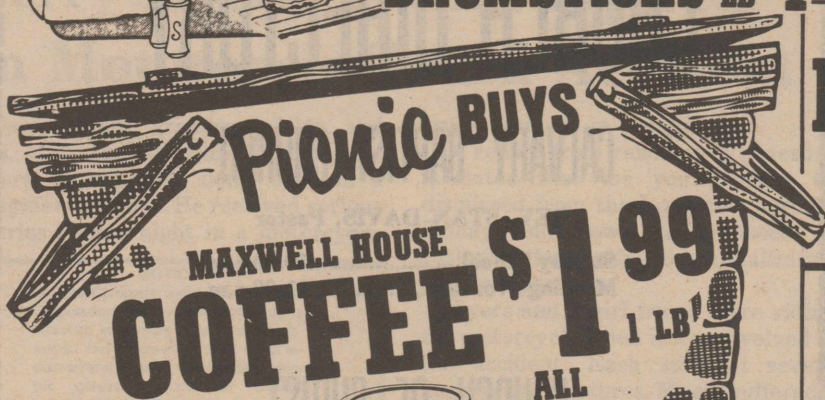
