The group also funds the library's summer reading program and provides copiers to the facility.

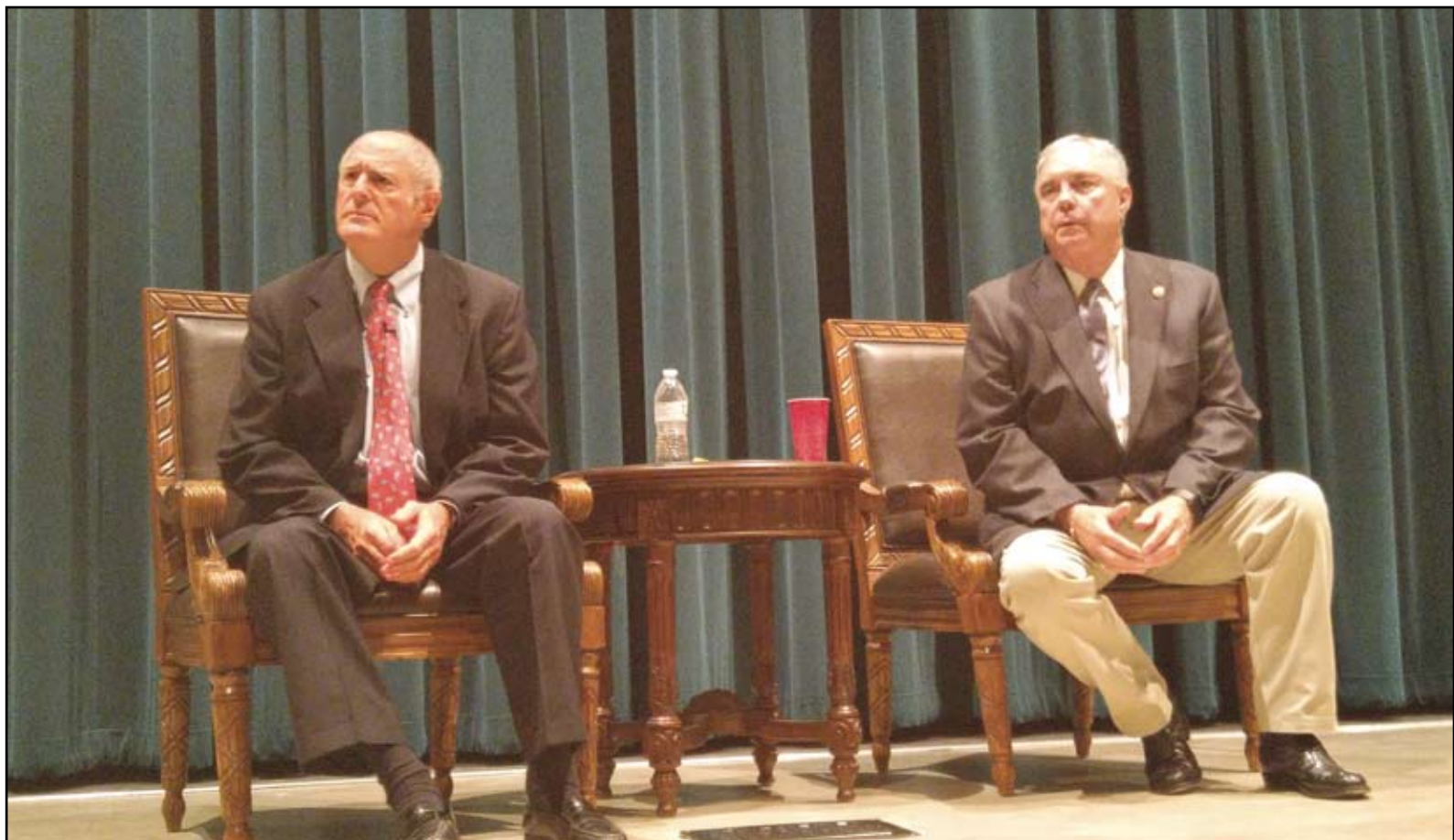

Seliger, Darby discuss issues during forum

State Sen. Kel Seliger and State Rep. Drew Darby understandably have lots of responsibilities in the Texas Legislature, but one of their biggest is to remind their colleagues that West Texas is still part of the state.

Seliger and Darby, this area's representatives at the state capitol, updated Big Spring residents on the major topics of this year's session of the Texas

Legislature during a town hall meeting at Howard College Tuesday. While they discussed major issues such as border security and education, they also discussed how they have to spend a lot of time making sure this part of the state gets its fair share of the economic pie.

"Sometimes I feel like I'm teaching geography," Seliger said. "There is a lot of Texas west of Interstate 35 and north of Interstate 10, but several of my colleagues aren't aware of that."

The problem is simple numbers — the

vast majority of legislators represent people living in the "I-35 corridor," meaning Seliger, Darby, and their fellow West Texas representatives sometimes have an uphill battle making sure this area's interests are addressed.

"There are 19 House members representing the two-thirds of Texas west of I-35," Darby said. "Harris County (home of Houston) has 25 by itself."

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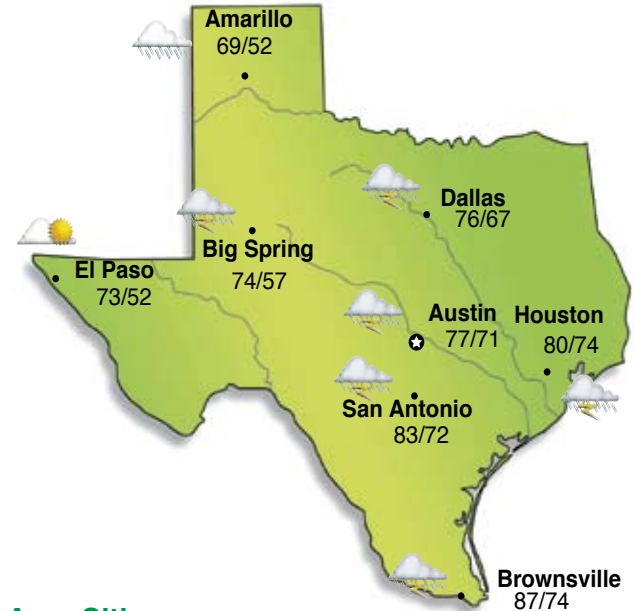

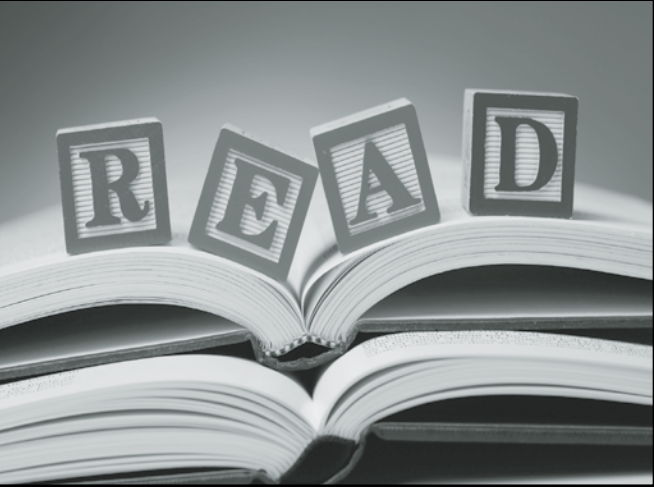

Among the issues addressed by the representatives during Tuesday's meeting were:

• Howard College's budgetary shortfall — Declining enrollment was a major factor in the college receiving over \$1 million less in state revenue over the next two years. Darby and Seliger both say that the state's funding formula for junior colleges — which is driven in large part by "contact hours" (hours students are physically attending classes and labs) needs reworking.

"Did the state do enough for Howard College? No," Darby said. "How do we remedy this? It can't be on the backs of students and their families ... We need to make sure we do what we can to help Howard College."

"When the economy is good, people tend to go to work instead of at-

tending college classes," Seliger added. "Howard College has done nothing wrong. We have to take a look at the funding formulas and see what we can do to change things."

• Infrastructure — West Texas is a vital supplier of oil and gas, along with agricultural products. Darby said it's vital West Texans have the necessary infrastructure to get those products to market.

"We don't have any seaports around here and we don't have a lot of major air terminals, so how are we supposed to transport our products to market? Roads," he said. "That's why roads are so important to me and why I support the Ports to Plains initiative. We can develop a road system all the way from Amarillo to Del Rio cheaper than we can build two exchanges in Waco."

• Border security — Seliger and Darby said the state of Texas has had to pick up the slack

left behind by the federal government's failure to address this issue.

"We will spend more than \$300 million every two years on border security," Seliger said. "These are things the federal government should be doing, but if they're not going to, we have to do it."

• State budget — Darby noted that the state has a \$17 billion surplus this year, as opposed to a \$27 billion shortfall four years ago. The challenge, he said, is to spend that money fairly and wisely.

• Public education — "I'm a big supporter of public education, and I stress the word 'public,'" Darby said. "There is an assault on public education in Austin ... that in the end is about diverting public funds to private and parochial schools."

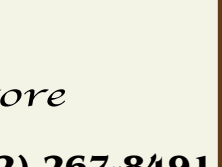
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Howard County 4-H students participate in service project

Each year during National 4-H Week more than 12,000 Texas 4-H youth participate in more than 350 service projects across the state, said Dr. Chris Boleman, 4-H Youth Development director and member of the National 4-H Council board.

"This year, National 4-H week was held from Oct. 4-10," Boleman said. "During this week, Texas 4-H clubs statewide will showcase the great things that 4-H offers young people and highlight the incredible 4-H youth in the community who work each day to make a positive impact."

Boleman said Texas 4-H Youth Development is the youth outreach component of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, part of the Texas A&M University System. 4-H Week cumulated with One Day 4-H on Oct. 10 – a day set aside each year

for 4-H members, parents, leaders, and volunteers to provide service to their communities and say "thank you" for their support of the 4-H program.

"This year, 4-H members and clubs were engaged in a variety of activities to provide service to individuals, groups, and nonprofit organizations in their communities," said Dr. Toby Lepley, assistant state director for Texas 4-H Youth Development. "Some of the projects slated this year included visiting senior centers, community clean-ups, fundraisers, food, clothing and book drives, a veteran appreciation event, and pet adoption."

Lepley said this year's community service activities will also include numerous tree plantings throughout the state.

"For the first time in the seven-year history of One Day 4-H, Texas

4-H Youth Development had a featured service project as part of the week's celebration activities," Lepley said. "Texas 4-H Youth Development partnered with the Texas A&M Forest Service to help celebrate that agency's 100th anniversary of protecting the citizens of Texas and the country."

The Forest Service is providing one bur oak tree — one of the only trees that can grow successfully in all 254 counties of Texas — to each county so it may be planted in a courthouse square, on city hall grounds or at some other notable public venue where it can be seen and appreciated by those in the community.

"For 100 years, the service has been helping protect and save the lives of Texans and others through its many efforts," Lepley said. "We're glad we can help them celebrate their

achievements even as the Texas 4-H members and clubs celebrate their own. We hope we can make this a historical milestone for both agencies."

Lepley said at this time, 4-H'ers in counties throughout the state have scheduled almost 200 tree plantings for either 4-H Week or One Day 4-H.

Boleman said National 4-H Week activities also included participation by members and clubs throughout Texas and nationwide in a single, innovative experiment on 4-H National Youth Science Day which was held on Oct. 7.

"This year's 4-H national science experiment was called Motion Commotion and gave youth the opportunity to explore the physics of motion, particularly applied to distracted

driving," Boleman said. "This innovative experiment was developed by Oregon State University's Cooperative Extension program and demonstrates the physics of a speeding car collision combined with distracted driving. It is a simulated activity focusing on the physical and human factors of motion."

Boleman noted that participation in 4-H has a significant positive impact on young people. He said recent findings from the Tufts University "4-H Study of Positive Youth Development" indicate that, when compared to their peers, young people in 4-H are almost four times more likely to contribute to their communities. They are also twice as likely to pursue healthy behaviors and

to engage in science, technology, engineering and math, or STEM, programs outside regular school hours.

Stakes high for Clinton, GOP as Benghazi panel holds hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — After months of buildup, Hillary Rodham Clinton finally takes center stage as the star witness in the Republican-led investigation into the deadly 2012 attacks in Benghazi, Libya.

Clinton, the Democratic front-runner for president, testifies from a position of political strength as her potential rival for the nomination, Vice President Joe Biden, announced Wednesday that he will not jump into the presidential race and she rides the momentum of a solid debate performance.

Meanwhile, the Benghazi committee is on the defensive as the panel's GOP chairman scrambles to deflect comments by fellow Republicans that the inquiry is aimed at hurting Clinton's presidential bid.

Even so, Clinton faces a formidable challenge as she tries to explain security lapses at the U.S. diplomatic compound in Benghazi, the slow military response to the violence and the Obama administration's changing

narrative about who was responsible for the attacks that killed four Americans.

Rep. Ryan becomes unlikely spokesman for balancing work and family

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican Rep. Paul Ryan is likely to become the next speaker of the House. He's already become an unlikely spokesman for balancing family life with work.

A reluctant candidate for the top leadership post, Ryan, 45, made clear this week that he will step up only under several conditions. One of them: Reducing the travel time and fundraising associated with the job of House speaker so that he can spend weekends at home in Janesville, Wisconsin, with his wife, Janna, and three school-age kids.

"I cannot and will not give up my family time," he said after a closed-door meeting with House Republicans on Tuesday. "I may not be able to be on the road as much as previous speakers, but I pledged to make up for it with more time communicating our message."

Not this time. Not with New York's array of power arms, and Murphy swinging a hot stick that made him the NLCS MVP.

The Mets never trailed against the Cubs and advanced to the World Series for the first time since they lost to the crosstown Yankees in five games in 2000. They will play at either Toronto or Kansas City in Game 1 on Tuesday night — the Royals lead 3-2 in the ALCS.

But the first big question for New York is the health of center fielder Yoenis Cespedes, who left in the second inning with soreness in his left shoulder. Any health issue for the slugger could be a big factor in the next round.

"Cespedes' shoulder is going to be OK," Collins said. "They didn't think there was any damage. They thought an injection would calm it down in a day, so he'll be ready."

The Cubs, meanwhile, still haven't won the crown since 1908. Manager Joe Maddon's wild-card bunch surged into this series, but was over-matched.

"They did not let us up for air at any point," Maddon said. "Their domination of the early part of the game and their pitching was impressive."

When Dexter Fowler looked at a called third strike for the final out, Jeury's Familia dropped to his knees in front of the mound and then hopped up for a hug from catcher Travis d'Arnaud. They were soon joined by the rest of their jubilant teammates in the infield grass.

By wrapping it up fast, the Mets can now set up their imposing rotation how they want for the World Series. Jacob deGrom, Matt Harvey and

Noah Syndergaard will all be on full rest, and then some.

"This is a long time coming," Wright said. "We've been through some bad times. We've been through Septembers where you're just playing out the schedule and that's no fun. To be able to completely reverse that 180 and now celebrate and get a chance to go to the World Series, I wish I could bottle it all. I really do. That's an emotion I'll never forget."

Right when it looked as if his historic streak was coming to an end, Murphy connected for a two-run drive to center against Fernando Rodney in the eighth inning. The second baseman raised his right arm as he rounded first after his seventh homer of the playoffs — the string in-

season homer streak, finished with four hits and batted .529 (9 for 17) in the series.

D'Arnaud also homered as the Mets won their fifth pennant. Bartolo Colon pitched 1 1-3 scoreless innings for his first playoff win since 2001, for Cleveland at Seattle. The 14 years, 12 days between postseason victories for the 42-year-old right-hander snapped the major league record of exactly 14 years for Milt Wilcox, according to STATS.

Colon, who made 31 starts this season, replaced rookie Steven Matz with two out in the fifth and runners on first and second. He struck out Kris Bryant swinging on a 3-2 pitch, preserving New York's 6-1 lead.

Bryant hit a two-run homer in the eighth, but it was way too late for Chicago in its first appearance in the NLCS in 12 years. The Cubs shut out Pittsburgh in the wild-card game and eliminated rival St. Louis in the division series, but were unable to mount much of a challenge against the Mets' talented pitching staff.

"I think we're in a place no-

body expected us to be and we can be proud of that," Bryant said. "We were four wins away from going to the World Series. I think a lot of people didn't really expect us to be here."

The Cubs also loaded the bases with no outs in the fourth, and only came away with one run on Kyle Schwarber's grounder to first. Starlin Castro lined right to Wright at third on a hard smash for the first out.

While the Mets' pitching dominated much of the series, it was clear the Cubs were in trouble after aces Jon Lester and Jake Arrieta dropped the first two games in New York. Kyle Hendricks lasted just four innings on Tuesday night, and Jason Hammel even worse in Game 4.

With two out and a runner on in the first, Hammel walked Cespedes before Duda hit a long drive to center for his first playoff homer. D'Arnaud followed with a shot to right for the Mets' second set of consecutive homers in playoff history, joining Darryl Strawberry and Kevin McReynolds in Game 4 of the 1988 NLCS against Los Angeles.

Hammel was replaced by Travis Wood after a one-out walk in the second, and Duda drove home two more runs with a double into the gap in right-center. Duda was just 3 for 24 in the playoffs coming into the night.

Cavaliers, Thompson reach agreement on long-term contract

CLEVELAND (AP) — Already an elite rebounder, Tristan Thompson snatched a long-term contract from the Cavaliers.

The restricted free-agent forward has agreed in principle with the defending Eastern Conference champions on a five-year, \$82 million contract, ending his holdout and giving the Cavs needed frontcourt depth as they enter a new season.

The team confirmed Wednesday night that it had a verbal agreement with Thompson, who helped the Cavs get to the NBA Finals last season by filling in for an injured Kevin Love. Thompson had been seeking a maxi-

mum deal, while the Cavs made it known they valued the former No. 4 overall pick, but weren't going to overpay for a reserve

The sides had been in an awkward stalemate, which threatened to carry over into the regular season. However agent Rich Paul, who also represents star LeBron James, and Cleveland's front office were able to come to terms less than a week before the opener at Chicago.

There's a chance the deal will be finalized Thursday and Thompson, who has been working out on his own during the holdout, can begin practicing.

Thompson posted a photo on Insta-

gram wearing a Cavaliers' baseball cap.

"It's been a long summer of grinding and hard work but now it's back to The Land to take care of some unfinished business," Thompson wrote.

With Thompson's deal and extensions given this summer to James, Love, J.R. Smith and Iman Shumpert, owner Dan Gilbert has shelled out nearly \$300 million in guaranteed money during the offseason.

Thompson will be among the league's highest-paid power forwards.

When Thompson declined to sign a one-year, \$6.9 million qualifying offer from the team last month, it appeared he might be willing to sit out part of

the regular season. James had called Thompson's holdout a "distraction" and the impasse over the contract threatened to sidetrack the Cavs from getting back to the Finals.

But now Thompson will back up Love and provide his usual energy for Cleveland's second unit.

Thompson came through in the playoffs after Love dislocated his left shoulder in the first round. The affable 24-year-old averaged 9.6 points and 10.8 rebounds in the postseason. He averaged 8.5 points and 8.0 rebounds in the regular season.

Cleveland chose Thompson three selections after drafting Kyrie Irving with the first overall pick in 2011.

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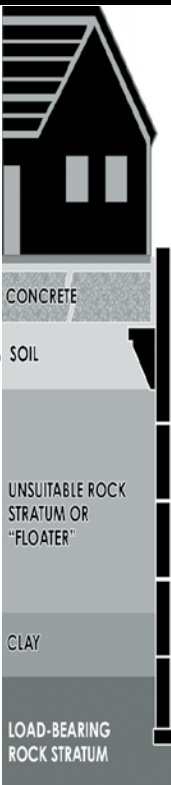
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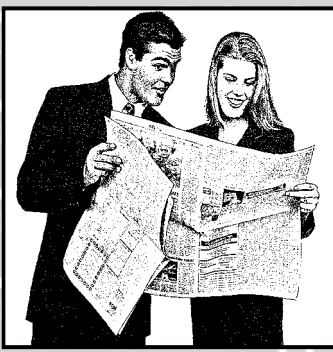
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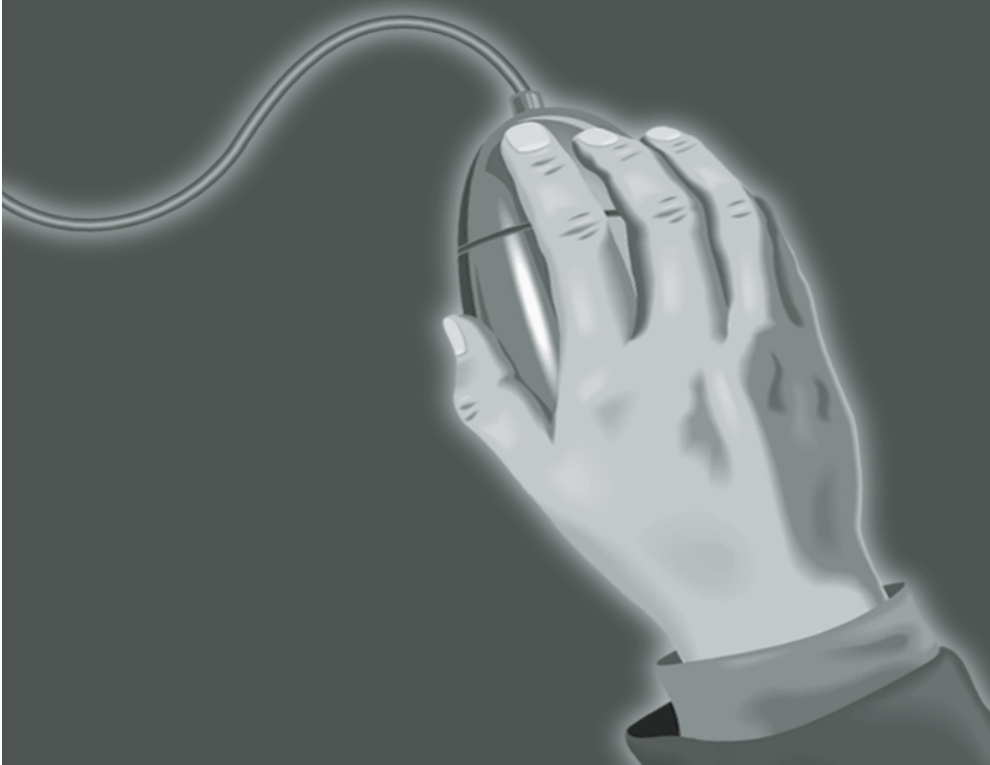

The Huddle Factor

South dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

Anyone who has played bridge for any length of time should know that to do well at the game, you have to think. There are times, though, when too much thinking can be detrimental to your cause, especially when an extended hesitation may give away information. Take this deal where South was declarer in three notrump.

West led the eight of hearts, and East took the ace and shifted to the club deuce. West won South's queen with the king and returned a club, dummy's nine losing to East's jack as South discarded a spade. East then exited with a diamond.

Declarer now had eight tricks — a five diamonds, two hearts and a

spade. A spade finesse could produce a ninth trick, but if it lost, East would cash the club ace to set the contract. But there was no reason to try the finesse at this point, so South cashed his diamonds, producing this position as the last diamond was led:

North

♥ 10 7 4

West

♦ A

♦ 10

After South discarded a club from dummy on the diamond ten, East went into a long huddle and finally parted with the five of spades. Declarer had been keeping an open mind about his next move, but given East's obvious discomfort on the last diamond, the solution seemed clear. East would have had no problem had he held two low spades, so he had to have his actual holding.

So South played a spade to the ace, felling East's king, crossed back to the queen of spades and cashed the K-Q of hearts to make his game. Of course, had East elected to discard a heart or the club ace instead of a spade, declarer would also have scored nine tricks.

South might have found the winning line on his own, but East's prolonged huddle made the final decision much easier. I know, because I was South.

Today's Highlight in History:

On October 22, 1962, in a nationally broadcast address, President John F. Kennedy revealed the presence of Soviet-built missile bases under construction in Cuba and announced a quarantine of all offensive military equipment being shipped to the Communist island nation.

On this date:

In 1746, Princeton University was first chartered as the College of New Jersey.

In 1797, French balloonist Andre-Jacques Garnerin (gahr-nayr-AN) made the first parachute descent, landing safely from a height of about 3,000 feet over Paris.

In 1836, Sam Houston was inaugurated as the first constitutionally elected president of the Republic of Texas.

In 1883, the original Metropolitan Opera House in New York held its grand opening with a performance of Gounod's "Faust."

In 1915, Israeli statesman Yitzhak Shamir was born in Ruzinoy, Poland, in present-day Belarus.

In 1928, Republican presiden-

tial nominee Herbert Hoover spoke of the "American system of rugged individualism" in a speech at New York's Madison Square Garden.

In 1934, bank robber Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd was shot to death by federal agents and local police at a farm near East Liverpool, Ohio.

In 1953, the Franco-Lao Treaty of Amity and Association effectively made Laos an independent member of the French Union.

In 1979, the U.S. government allowed the deposed Shah of Iran to travel to New York for medical treatment. A decision that precipitated the Iran hostage crisis. French conductor and music teacher Nadia Boulanger died in Paris.

In 1981, the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization was decertified by the federal government for its strike the previous August.

In 1986, President Ronald Reagan signed into law sweeping tax-overhaul legislation.

In 1991, the European Community and the European Free Trade Association concluded a landmark accord to create a free trade zone of 19 nations by 1993.

Ten years ago: Hurricane Wilma punished Mexico's Caribbean coastline for a second day. Meanwhile, a record 22nd tropical storm of the sea-

son formed about 125 miles off the Dominican Republic; because the annual list of storm names had already been exhausted, forecaster called the new system Tropical Storm Alpha. A Nigerian Boeing 737 passenger jet crashed after leaving Lagos, killing all 117 on board. The Chicago White Sox defeated the Houston Astros, 5-3, in Game 1 of the World Series.

Five years ago: WikiLeaks released 391,831 purported Iraq war logs that suggested more than 100,000 Iraqi civilians had died in the conflict.

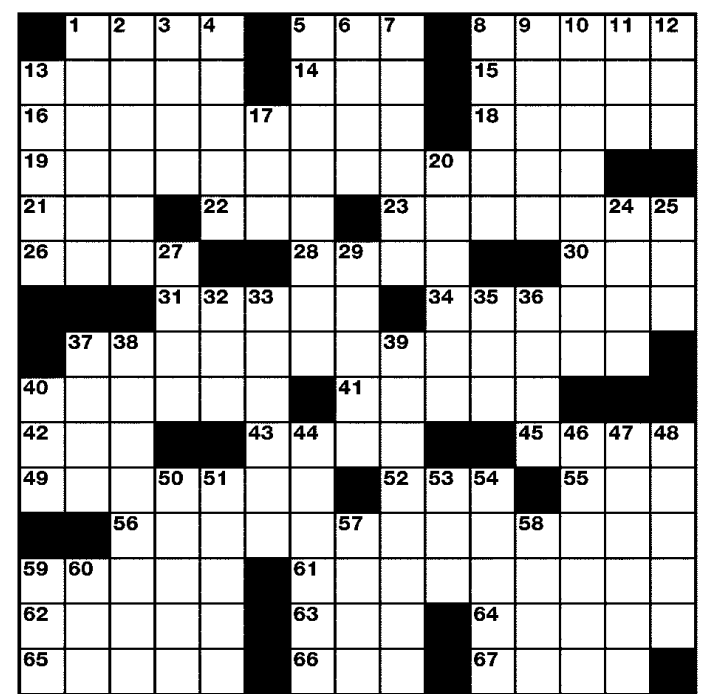

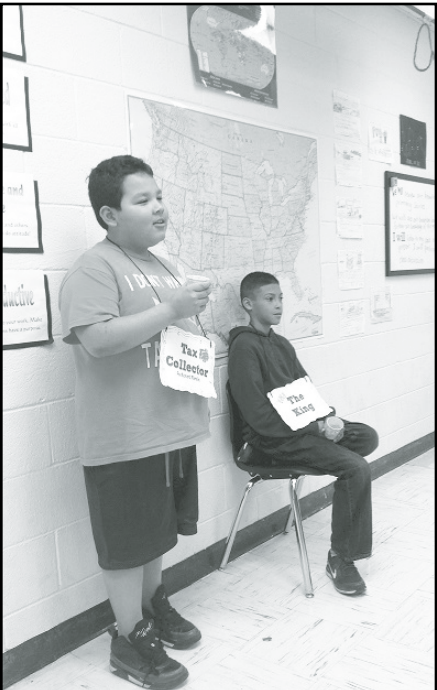

Big Spring in do or die situation Friday

Though a loss this week would not eliminate Big Spring from the post-season, it would make it awfully tough.

Both Wylie and Brownwood have experienced teams playing well. Stephenville on the other hand, Big Spring's opponent this Friday night on the road, has looked less like the traditional powerhouse Steer nation has come to know over the years.

The Steers are coming off a bye week in which they got some much

needed rest as they gear up for their final three games of the regular season.

"Got a lot of rest and did some individual work," head coach Ritchey said. "We were able to get in a lot of fundamentals in that we can't get to in a normal week."

The team is almost 100 percent healthy now, except for running back Preston Alexander who is still dealing with a bruised pinky.

"We will do what's best for him physically and if he can't go, Manuel Galvan will be ready to take the load and pick up where he left off against

Snyder," Ritchey said. Despite playing on the road, Stephenville provides possibly the Steers' best chance to secure a playoff spot. Stephenville doesn't appear to be as strong this year as they have in the past, due in part to some recent changes.

They are coached by recently promoted offensive coordinator Greg Winder. The team is playing with a talented sophomore quarterback, replacing a Division I athlete. They are also without stand-out running back Kaegun Williams who transferred earlier in the

year. Though many of the names have changed, the scheme is still the same. Stephenville plays a 3-3 stack defense with a lot of zone. Against that defense, it would be hard to overload the box without giving up some glaring holes in the secondary, but Ritchey is expecting them to come out in anything.

"Everyone has come in different against us then what we've seen on film because of Preston. We prepare for what we see on film, but we will adjust to what they throw at us," Ritchey said.

This team has seen

eight, and even nine guys in the box at times to stop the run. The extra work of throwing and catching over the bye week will need to pay dividends to keep drives alive.

It will take more than just being balanced against Stephenville. Ball security is a problem the Steers have had for weeks now, and it has kept them from winning several games that they wound up losing.

"We have to bring down, or better yet eliminate, all the turnovers. We feel like we've been beating ourselves," Ritchey said.

Against Graham, the Steers fumbled the ball in Graham territory late in the ball game. Against Andrews, the team failed to catch three consecutive kick-offs, and against Snyder quarterback Garrett Wigington and running back Riley Henson each threw an interception on drives that could have tied the game.

The final key to the game is cutting down on big plays allowed on defense. Teams have had 14 plays of 20 or more yards in just the past two games against the Steers. Look for that to be cleaned up Friday.

Forsan looks to remain undefeated in district

Forsan enters Friday’s game against Ozona on a four-game win streak, playing their best football of the year and most importantly, healthy.

For several weeks the Buffaloes were plagued with injuries at wide receiver, offensive line, and defensive end. The team battled through, called up some members of the Junior Varsity team, and have now set their sights on a district championship.

Standing in their way this Friday is a road trip to Ozona to face the 2-5 Lions. Despite a poor record and a different looking team this season, Ozona will still be a tough task for Forsan-head coach Jason Phillips’ team.

“They are undersized and not as big as they used to be, but they get after it. They have a high motor and are aggressive on the defensive side of the ball,” Phillips said.

On offense, Ozona uses motion and misdirection to attack opponents.

“We must be sound defensively with gap responsibility. We haven’t seen an offense like theirs this season,” Phillips said.

The defense, now at 100 percent, has a lot of speed and size up front. Last week they lived in McCamey’s backfield. The defensive line is where this defense begins and can have a huge impact on their unit’s success.

On the offensive side it all begins with the line as well. Now with all five starters in their usual positions, Forsan will look to establish the run early and stay balanced on offense against Ozona’s 3-3 stack defense.

“It is a defense we have seen before this season, starting with the Coahoma game,” Phillips said. It sets up well for our running game.”

The Lions’ defensive line will be a challenge

this week for Forsan’s talented offensive line. Ozona likes to stunt on the line to cause confusion and get free rushers into the backfield.

“Our communication must be on point. We did a good job in that department last

week and with all five starters back, I expect it to be just as good,” Phillips said.

The area finalists bring back 12 starters, six on each side of the ball. They have several dynamic players on each side of the ball and a few that

earned all-district honors.

Forsan has several highly touted players of their own. Forsan’s size advantage and new found speed on the defensive side of the ball gives them an advantage.

Quarterback JesseCervantes

is also as usual a huge advantage for the Buffaloes. The senior quarterback continues to grow and develop each week. In all wins this year he has had at least 220 yards of total offense, a stat for fans to keep track of as the game

tices and that is what we need to do. We may be banged up and inexperienced, but that doesn't change the fact that we must go out there and try to improve as a uni and get better every day."

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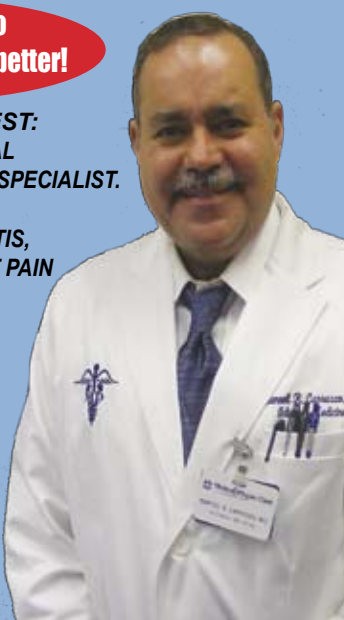
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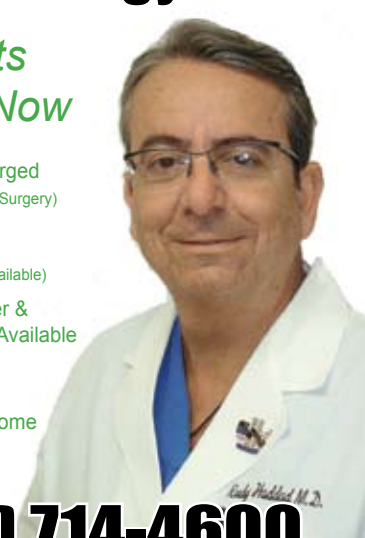
