Three Loraine residents injured in I-20 wreck

A Loraine brother and two sisters were injured Thursday afternoon when the pickup in which they were riding went out of control and flipped over.

Trooper Steve Torres said the mishap occurred at 4 p.m. Thursday 4.2 miles east of Colorado City on Interstate 20.

Bonnie Herrington, 18, was driving east on I-20 when the 1980 Ford Courier went out of control, overturned one and a half times and landed upside down in the median.

Torres said none of them were wearing seat belts, but that they were not thrown from the vehicle.

Also injured were Justin Herrington, 13, and Randi Kay Herrington, 8. They are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Herrington of Loraine.

All three were taken by ambulance to Mitchell

County Hospital and Justin and Randi Kay were later transferred to University General Hospital in Lubbock.

Fred Herrington, the children's uncle, Friday afternoon said both Justin and Randi Kay were in the intensive care unit of the Lubbock hospital. Justin suffered a small fracture to the back of the head and a broken collar bone. Randi has a fractured leg.

Bonnie remained hospitalized in Colorado City with cuts and abrasions. She did not suffer any broken bones.

The uncle said none of the three suffered any internal injuries, although Justin did have some fluid in one of his lungs.

"They are stabilized, but they're watching them very carefully," said the uncle of Justin and Randi Kay.

Hospital board eyes bank loan

The Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors, meeting in special session at noon Thursday, authorized board chairman Gus Armstrong to negotiate a loan with City National Bank to help meet operating costs.

Armstrong said the bank has agreed to loan up to \$200,000, in addition to the \$350,000 already previously owed. Both loans must be paid in full on or before Oct. 30, said Armstrong.

"This \$200,000 will give us a breathing spell until we start getting more money in," said Armstrong.

Mitchell County Hospital, like other small hospitals, is suffering from decreased patient revenues while expenses continue to mount.

In addition to the loan, the hospital will be taking other steps to help solve the cash flow problem, said administrator Jim Bullard.

Bullard said new policies are being formulated concerning efforts to collect past due accounts and that a "goodly" number of

those accounts have responded to the collection efforts.

"In the next two weeks, we'll probably completely redo our accounts receivable area," said Bullard.

Other areas the board has committed to study and take action on include:

- increasing the tax rate;
- reducing staffing levels to area peer group levels;

• increasing hospital charges comparable to other hospitals its size;

• setting goals for department directors and having them give an update at each regular monthly board meetings;

• establishing proper controls and reviewing expenses to achieve a 25 percent reduction, and;

• acquiring Medicare dependent status from HCFA.

Bullard said he does not anticipate an immediate staff reduction, but said that as employees leave for one reason or another some of them may not be replaced.

I notice that the annual Silver homecoming will be held in a month or so in the Baptist church, across the street from the old school.

Silver, the Coke County community about 25 miles south of here, certainly isn't what it used to be. There are not many people left. Even most of the houses are gone.

What used to be oil field camps with street after street of houses are now just mesquite-infested fields. Those company houses have long since been moved to other places - some to Colorado City, but mostly to Robert Lee.

The old red brick school building, once the pride of the community, stands a monument to what once was a bustling little town full of good, hard-working people.

My family moved to Silver from Snyder just as I was about to start the third grade. It wasn't until after I finished the sixth grade that we moved to Colorado City.

Those years at Silver were some of the best. What we lacked in quantity, we made up for in quality. There were not many of us in school (my class had only about 10 or 11 students), and it only went through the ninth grade. But, we had some of the best teachers anywhere, and the school building was one of the finest in the area. Not many schools back then air central air conditioning - but we did at Silver.

Community activities were centered around the school and the churches. Other than the Baptist church, there were a Methodist church and a Church of Christ. Only the Baptist church remains.

My third grade teacher was Mrs. Kennedy. Her husband worked for the same oil company as my dad. She took a special interest in my artistic ability and urged my parents to send me to San Angelo to take art lessons. Of course, I wasn't about to take private art lessons and now I can't even draw a straight line.

My fourth grade teacher was Miss Violet Brown. She also taught my training union class at the Baptist church. I remember her name was Violet because once as a class project, we were supposed to bring seeds to plant in coffee cans. My mother sent me to school with some violet seeds in an envelope. "Remember, the seeds are the same name as your teacher's first name," my mother told me.

My fifth grade teacher was the coach's wife. Everyone said she looked like Blondie in the cartoon strip. Since she didn't have blonde hair, I never could see the resemblance.

Don Gressett (a Westbrook ex) was my sixth grade teacher. He also drove a school bus and taught shop for the older boys.

I remember the band director, Mr. Greer, also taught some classes. I think he taught me fifth grade spelling. He was unmarried and all the girls thought he was good looking.

All in all, we Silver exes haven't turned out too badly. Of course, some have been more successful than the rest of us. I know of one lawyer who can trace his educational roots to Silver, and I know of one successful author whose books can be found in most any bookstore - not bad for a couple of oil field brats.

TO THE EDITOR: In a recent letter to the editor in the May 24 edition of the Colorado City Record, Peggy Maddox wrote about a 264 percent jump in unemployment in Sumter County, Alabama, which recently opened the world's largest hazardous waste landfill.

I called the city manager, Mr. Thomas Luke, in Livingston, AL, and asked him some questions concerning the landfill. Here are some interesting facts he shared with me:

- The landfill employs between 350 to 400 people.

- The Chem Waste people are good neighbors in every respect.

- There have been five new industries locate in the area since the landfill opened.

- Unemployment is the lowest in 10 years (7½ percent).

- Employees are paid above average wages.

- Employees are apparently very happy working for Chem Waste as union organizers have been voted down twice by a large margin.

- One-fifth of the city budget comes from landfill revenues.

- The local school district receives additional revenue to help meet school expenses.

- He would be happy to discuss facts with anyone who wants to give him a call.

These facts are in sharp contrast to representations recently made in the letter written by Mrs. Maddox.

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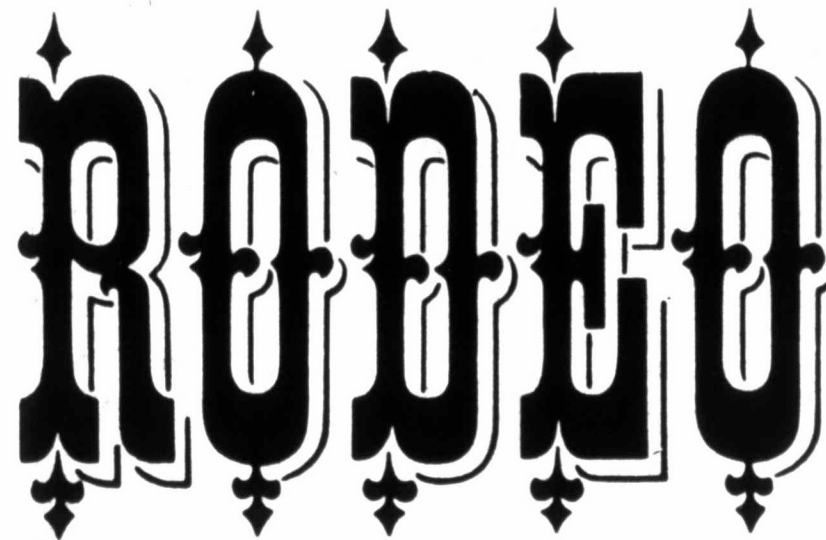

School finance bill impact told

AUSTIN--After three months of special sessions and two vetoes, Texas Governor Bill Clements suddenly reversed his field and decided to sign into law a school finance bill very similar to one of last session's legislative proposals.

"The bill could have done more for our schools and could have been less costly to our taxpayers," said 30th District State Senator Steve Carrier (D-Roby). "But I guess that we're lucky to have any kind of school finance plan at all considering the mixed signals, flipflops, and political chicanery coming out of the governor's office for three solid months."

Senate Bill 1, which is virtually identical to the bill twice vetoed by the governor, represents a compromise that moves toward financial equalization. While bolstering state funds to poorer districts, most of them will still be short of the state revenues that full equalization should provide. Wealthier districts will be protected from tax shock by phasing in reductions to their state aid. Locally, SB 1 impacts local

school districts as follows in terms of state aid increases for the coming school year:

Colorado City + \$226,351
Loraine + \$143,821
Westbrook 0

Senator Carriker went on to say, "It's a shame that this bill,

which could have been adopted in a single week with the cooperation of the governor, took us four special sessions to enact and still leaves Texas school children at the mercy of the courts. We've simply got to do better for our public schools."

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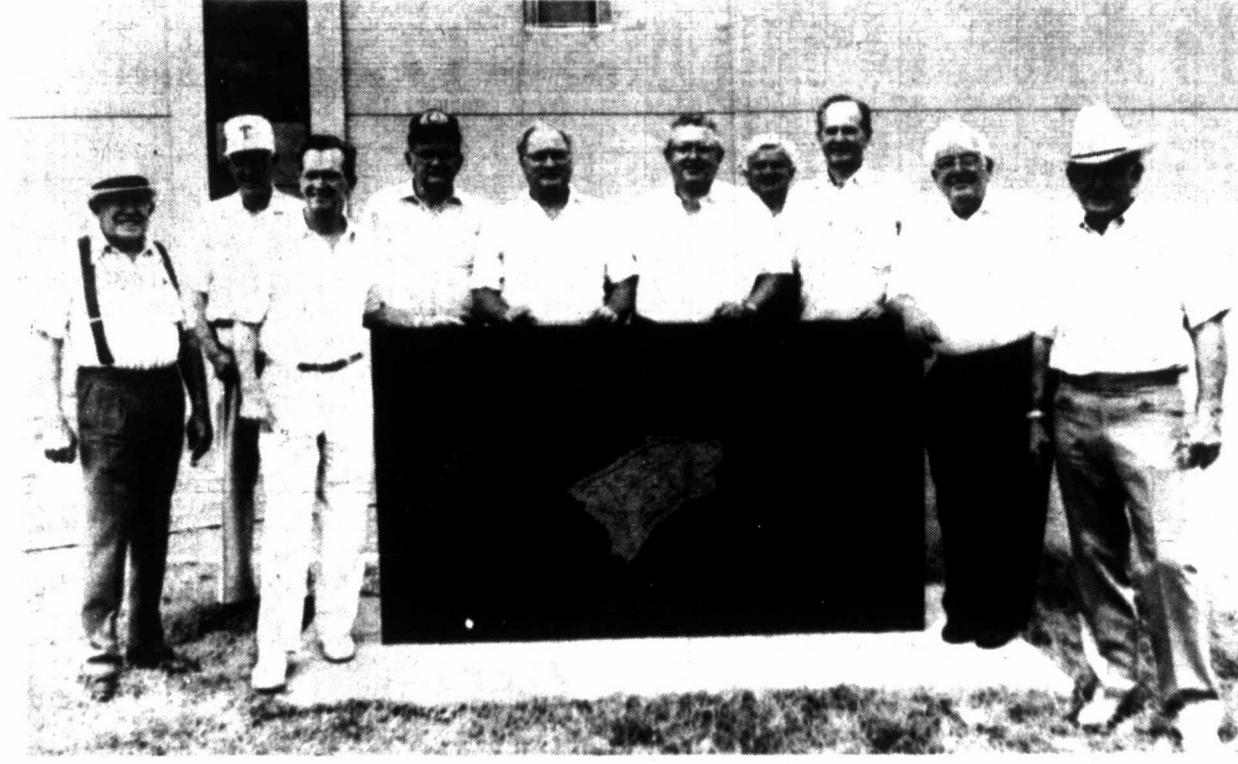

CHIEF LONE WOLF

Perhaps the greatest bargain Colorado merchants ever experienced was the first ever "Frontier Roundup," back in September of '37. It was a multi-faceted endeavor which included a fair, and old settlers reunion, a rodeo and a horse, mule and jack show.

The Frontier Roundup was co-ordinated by the Colorado Chamber of Commerce. A budget of \$1,545 was established and local businesses agreed to guarantee the expenses. If the promotion failed to net the \$1,545, merchants would have to dig into their own pockets to make up any losses.

A blue ribbon financial committee was lined up with Joe Smoot, chairman. He was capably assisted by P. K. Mackey, Max Berman, O. B. Price and Ben Baskin.

The first order of business was to get pledges from retailers. And, Colorado businessmen responded, some with considerable donations, while others pledged less. The City National Bank, Col-Tex Refinery, Whipkey Printing and Max Berman all pledged \$50 each. Texas Electric had a \$25 pledge, Berry Fee Lumber Company, \$20 and the Ben Franklin Store, Farmers Gin, Hotel Colorado, Safeway and Colorado Steam Laundry, each \$10. Also, J. P. Majors, Pick and Pay Grocery, Kirschbaum's Department Store, and L. B. Elliott each pledged \$5. And there were many other pledges, some for as little as one dollar.

Meanwhile, the Chamber of Commerce was busy promoting the roundup. Letters were sent to newspapers in the area and around the state. With perhaps a little journalistic license, Chamber Manager Carl Blasig boasted "the biggest two day celebration ever staged in the Mitchell County capital," was set for September 10 and 11, 1937. Further, he wrote, "the rodeo performances will be staged on the grass carpeted high school athletic field without the slightest annoyance of dust to spectators."

One of the first members of the media to respond was the Fort Worth Star-Telegram which promised to cover the roundup with a reporter who would bring "a camera and a typewriter."

Also, boosters with local talent, known as the Goodwill Trippers, were preparing to visit area towns to promote the roundup. Two trips were planned; the first going to Maryneal, Blackwell, Bronte, Robert Lee, Water Valley, Sterling City, Chalk, Coahoma and Westbrook. The second promotional tour would find the Goodwill Trippers going to Snyder, Rotan, Roby, Sweetwater, Roscoe and Loraine.

So, the stage was set for the biggest blow out ever held in Colorado Texas. Next week, we'll see how it all came out.

Sales tax rebates received

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent a check totaling \$22,426 to Colorado City as its local sales tax rebate.

The check reflects a decrease of one percent from the \$22,651 received for the same period last year. The 1990 payments to date total \$177,634, down 8.67 percent from last year's total of \$194,494.

Neither Loraine nor Westbrook received a check this time. Loraine's payments to date are \$3,447, up 6.28 percent from a year ago, while Westbrook's payments to date are \$3,671, up 76.89 percent from last year.

Mitchell County received a check for \$30,355, up 217 percent from last year's check for \$9,564. The 1990 payments to date total \$103,573, up 47.20 percent from a year ago when the total was \$70,363.

This month's check includes taxes collected on April sales and report in May by businesses filing monthly returns.

Merchants collect the sales taxes and send them to the comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

Area cities and the amounts they received include Big Spring, \$91,798, up 17.31 percent; Snyder, \$54,562, up 6.20 percent; Sweetwater, \$51,942, down 1.46 percent; and Sterling City, \$3,852, up 53.45 percent.

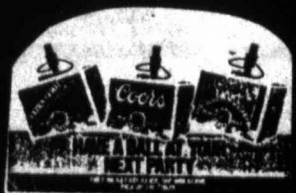
The only area county to collect optional local sales tax is Scurry which received a check for \$34,505, up 3.46 percent.

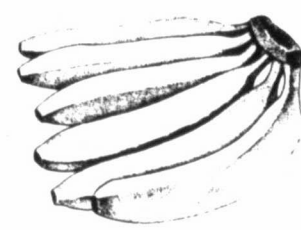
