Ranger Lions Start Statewide Campaign For Sportmanship

The Ranger Lions Club this week announced a statewide campaign to encourage better sportsmanship at athletic contests in Texas and mailed letters to all clubs explaining the plan for the program and asking for the assistance of members.

The letter mailed by the Ranger organization is as follows: Since the past few years has witnessed the need for some type of cooperative effort to build up the type of sportsmanship that we can be proud of especially during our football and basketball seasons, the Ranger, Texas Lions Club feels the need is great to encourage better sportsmanship and more respect toward officials. We are thinking especially of the treatment of our referees and officials by the fans and spectators.

The letter went on to point out that officials are men of experience and integrity, "but not infallible." They are men who want to see games played by the rules and "every team and every player treated fairly."

Ranger Lions offered their plan as follows: "During the months of September and October especially, every Lions Club is asked to have at least one program dedicated to better sportsmanship at athletic contests by having an outstanding speaker, or if not available, coach or official to speak on better sportsmanship." If radio facilities are available they can be used to emphasize this important program.

The program was expected to receive wide support among the Lions Clubs of the state.

STATE HEALTH OFFICER SUGGESTS SLEEP AS AID TO GENERAL HEALTH

AUSTIN TEX., Sept. 17 — Sleep is a necessity of life and health, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, and habitual loss of sleep will tend to retard the body's recovery from fatigue of the day's activities.

"We may be able to go without sleep for a night or two, but too little sleep for a prolonged period will undermine the health of a rugged person and turn a cheerful individual into a cross irritable one," Dr. Cox said. "When good health can be protected to such a large extent by sleeping, and thus allow overtaxed bodies and minds to secure the proper rest, it is hard to understand why so many persons are heedless of this important health measure."
