Then off Guadalcanal, at Tarca, at Saipan, and at Okinawa, the Gray Ghost was either hit, or near hit, prompting the Jap sinking reports. As Jap surrender emissaries ventured toward the flagship of Vice Admiral Jack Fletcher in the harbor, their whale boat passed close beneath the Pensacola. It was

Light Company States Rates Are Reduced

Southwestern Public Service Co. has announced another reduction in electric rates. It is the second voluntary rate reduction made by the electric service company in one year's time. The new rate for residential service starts at 6c per kilowatt hour and graduates down to as low as one and eight-tenths cents a kilowatt hour.

When Southwestern Public Service Co. took over operation of the electric system in September, 1942, the top rate was 10c. On Oct. 1, 1944, the top rate was reduced to 7½c, and, effective Oct. 1, 1945, the top rate has been further reduced to 6c. The new reduced rates are already in effect and will apply to October use. The two rate reductions this firm has made since the nation entered the war were designed to bring the rates in line with those elsewhere in the territory served by the company. The lower steps of the residential rate scale down to one and eight-tenths cents per kilowatt hour.

Southwestern Public Service Co. has operated the electric system in this community only three years, all of which has been during war time, but has operated in other cities, towns and communities in the Texas Panhandle and in New Mexico for more than 20 years, and has long followed the policy of voluntary rate reductions as frequently as possible, consistent with the maintenance of adequate and reliable service. The company is now busily engaged in a broad program of increasing power plant and line capacities to provide for increased use of electricity with industrial and rural expansion of this territory, and through increased use of electric service in homes and business establishments when new electrical appliances and apparatus become available.

While prices in general have risen during the war, and will probably continue to rise, the Southwestern Public Service Co. has demonstrated its ability to reduce rates as the result of increased production and efficiency, and hopes to be able to continue this program in the future, its officials state.

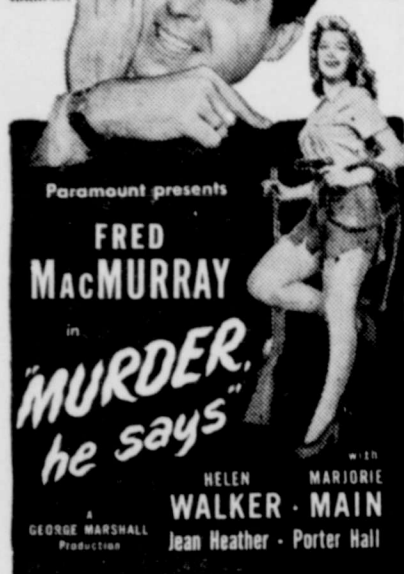
