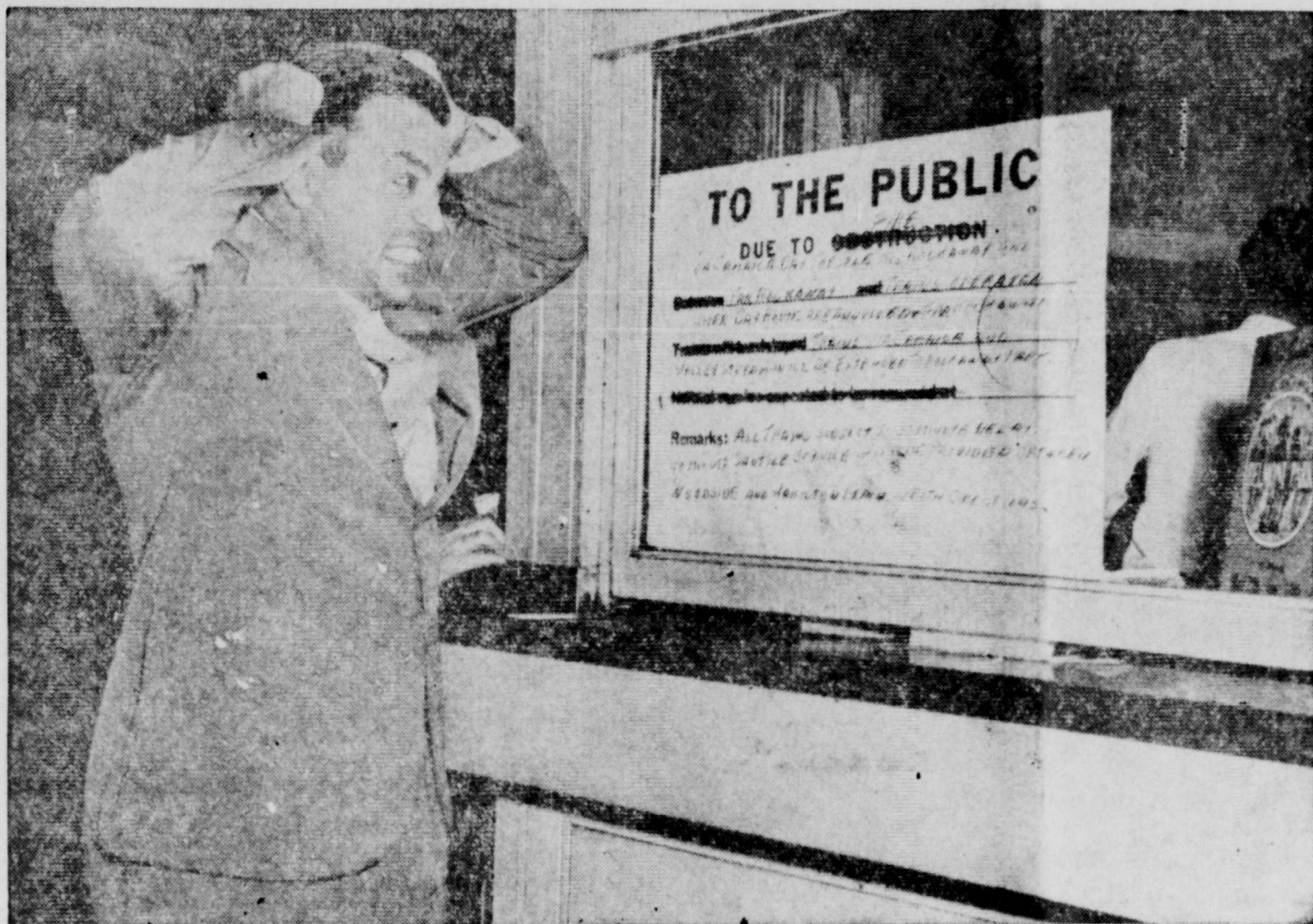

E. C. Johnston Drilling Company was deepening its No. 1 Mahan-Edwards oil test just east of Cisco Saturday from the Lake Sand to the Marble Falls horizon in the hope of obtaining oil in paying quantity.

The well is an offset to Lake production. Despite extensive completion efforts and good gas pressure, oil in paying quantity never appeared. The operators then decided to drill ahead and explore the Marble Falls.

Nearby, the Glechrist Drilling Company No. 1 Waters was making little headway in an effort to complete the well in the Lake section, it was reported.

Oil men were watching the Marble Falls venture with considerable interest.

Barkline Oil Company was reported as drilling ahead in the Ellenberger lime in their No. 1 S. B. Mize, oil test five miles east of Cisco, Saturday. A drill stem test was run last Thursday in the top of the Ellenberger at 3,935 feet.

Following the test, results of which were not available, it was decided to drill ahead.

An earlier test in the Lake region indicated possible production in that zone. The Mize well is an offset to Barkline's successful Lake production in their No. 1 Mrs. Briggs Owens, which opened the field.

H-SU Plans Huge Building Project In Coming Year

ABILENE, June 3 — A \$15,000,000 development program for Hardin-Simmons University was announced Thursday by W. P. Wright, president of the board of trustees. Approximately one fourth will be for new equipment and buildings, while the remainder three fourths will go into endowment. President Rupert N. Richardson described the program as the most significant thing in the history of the university during the last decade and a half.

The program will call for an expanded faculty, improvement of academic standards, and an increase in the student body of approximately a third. The committee which planned the program anticipated a student body of 2400 compared to the present 1800.

The expansion program is a long range one for H-SU. No date limit is set in the planning range, although it has been described as a 25 year program.

Among the buildings which are being proposed in the \$3,500,000 building program is a new dormitory for men and one for women, a larger library, seven new laboratories, a student life center, an assembly and Bible building, new classrooms, a new school of music building, a new stadium, a new land building, and an art building.

Plans also call for an increase of \$11,000,000 in the endowment.

Bank Checks Are Post Dated A Real Aid In Budget Keeping 1ST NAT'L in Cisco—Mbr. F. D. I. C.

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"AT THE LOCAL LEVEL"

Speaking before a large audience of prominent educators, business and civic leaders at Lanier High School, Houston, recently William R. Archer, Regional Vice President of the National Association of Manufacturers, and President of Uncle Johnny Mills, declared "In order to reduce federal funds, we must adopt some re-allocation tax program that will bring to the states direct revenues rather than handouts from Washington of tax money taken from the states from which have been deducted a bureaucratic brokerage." To succeed in this will mean the removal of the threat of bigger government in Washington, he said.

The meeting, sponsored by "Americans for Constitutional Government" was held in conjunction with a Memorial Day program.

Mr. Archer pointed out that "Communists and socialists can more readily accomplish their objectives in centralized Washington than in forty-eight states." He stressed therefore the necessity of "re-discovering our state capitols and finding a solution at the local level." "Merely to decry government spending and plead economy is not enough," he said, "unless we are willing to accept the responsibility incident to the undertaking and to deny ourselves those things which we might otherwise get from Washington."

"The 'Something for nothing' fallacy and the magic Santa Claus formulas for security, Mr. Archer remarked, are being sold by vote-getting politicians to a gullible American public. In discussing security he said "that real security is primarily spiritual; it is inside. Material security of value

is only that security which comes from sacrifice savings. Too many people are thinking about security instead of opportunity."

Mr. Archer reminded his listeners that "Increased production per worker per hour is the result of tools, the great multipliers, and is the only basis upon which higher wages can be paid, cheaper goods can be made available to the consumer, and bigger returns paid to the investor. Our future progress and the world prestige rests upon our ability to attract venture capital with which to buy better tools, to make possible greater production and further improve our standard of living."

Urging the members of the audience to avail themselves of the facilities of Trade Associations in order to secure up-to-date information about pending legislation and fiscal problems, Mr. Archer stressed the need of their becoming articulate and well-informed.

In closing, Mr. Archer remarked "the safe guard of freedom is the will to remain free, and paternalism is weakening that will."

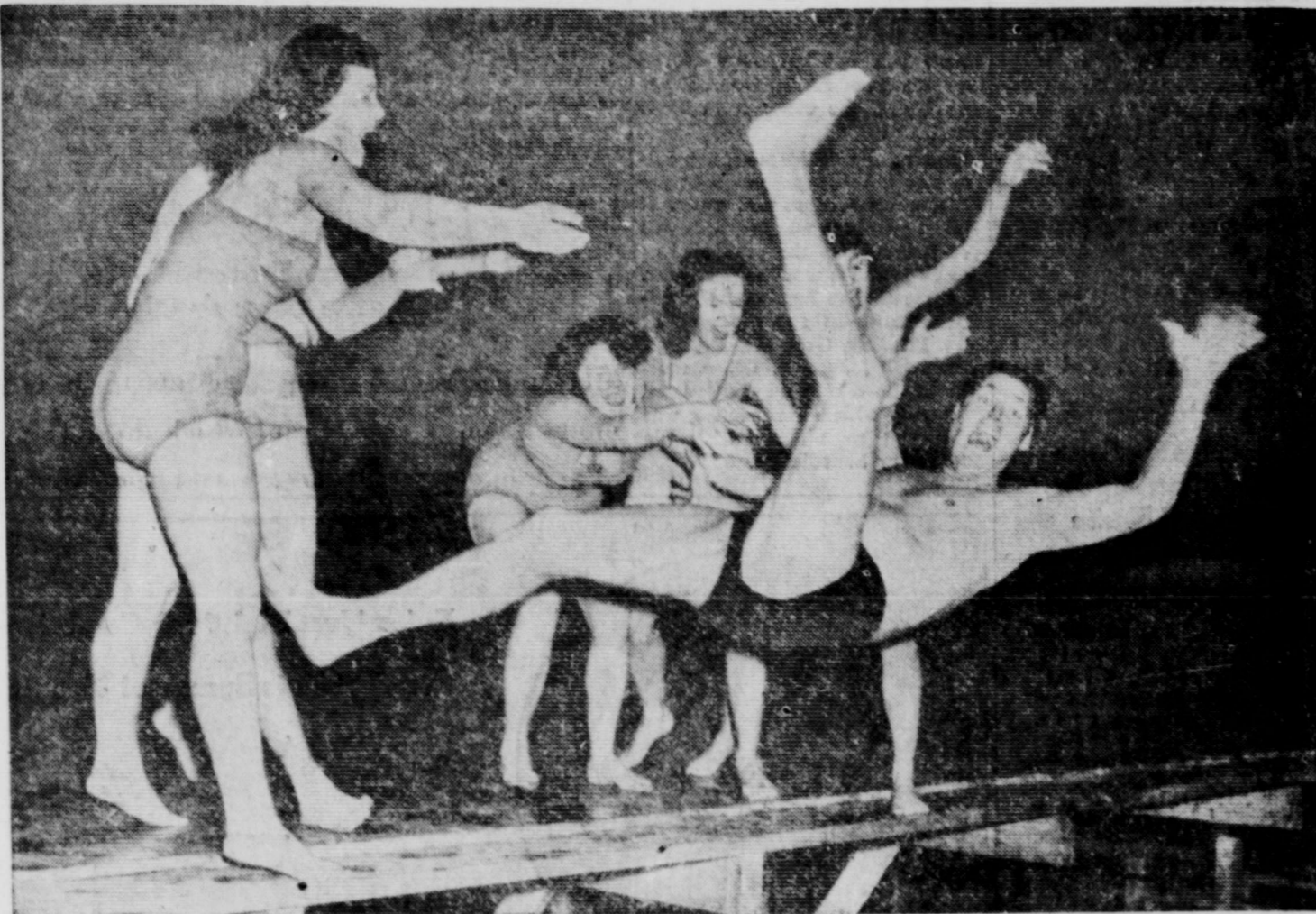

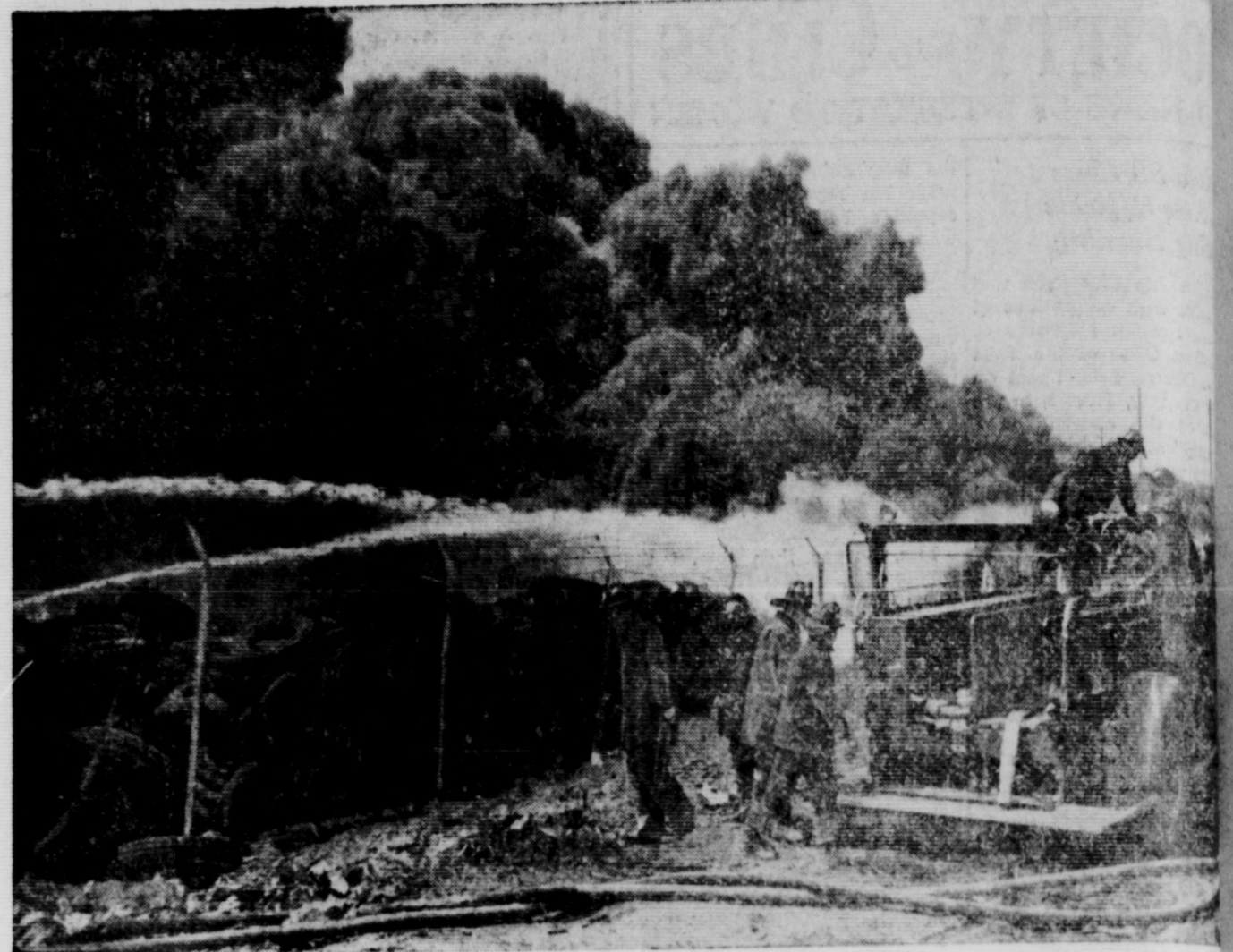
