Strickland Is Candidate For Representative

DeJuan Strickland, a Plainview farmer and businessman, filed late Monday for State Representative, 78th District, on the Republican ticket. His candidacy is subject to the Republican primary, May 4.

The District is currently labeled the 79th, but due to redistricting will become the 78th on Jan. 1, 1969. Voting in Hale County in primaries this spring and the general election in November will be for a representative for the 78th District.

Strickland, 33, is engaged in farming, cattle raising and the real estate business. He has not previously run for office, but said he is seeking election as representative because of a strong desire to give people in the lower Panhandle area a political voice.

Expresses View

"I am not a professional politician, but I do believe that con-

tinued one-party government is bad for Texas and leads to stagnation in government," said Strickland.

"I belong to no cliques or party machines."

Strickland farms in Hale and Floyd Counties and is a graduate of Lockney High School in Lockney. He attended the University of Minnesota and Wayland College in Plainview. He is a veteran of the army with two years of service.

A high school football star in the 1950's, Strickland is past president of the Plainview Toastmasters. He is a member of the Community Concert Association.

Strickland is a member of the board of the Hale County Noxious Weed Program.

He and his wife, the former Judy Graham, have two children, Michael DeJuan, 4, and Karen Gail, 1. They live at 1405 Zephyr in Plainview.

Chamber Banquet Tickets Go On Sale

Tickets for the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce Banquet went on sale here last week, at Struve Hardware & Dry Goods and at Pinson Pharmacy. Ticket prices for the steak dinner are \$3.25.

The banquet is scheduled for 7:30 p. m., April 4, in Abernathy School cafeteria. Members of AHS homemaking classes will serve the dinner.

Principal speaker on the banquet program will be a star professional football player, Don Meredith, quarterback for the Dallas Cowboys.

Another highlight of the program will be presentation of Abernathy's Outstanding Citizen of the year. Andy Reid is the current titleholder, having been named for the honor at last year's banquet. Edwin Crow and Jim Bob Smith are others who have been named Outstanding Citizens by the C. of C.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION IS POPULAR

The Adult Basic Education program which was initiated in the local schools in October 1967 is proving to be an effective and popular program. This particular program is open to all adults 18 years of age and older who did not complete the eighth grade in school. Currently, there are 38 adults enrolled and average attendance is about 30 each night. Age ranges from 18 to 65 years of age.

Objectives of the program are to help under educated adults learn basic skills and enable them to improve themselves. Specific objectives of A. B. E. are to help adults learn to read, write, and speak the English language effectively and to acquire functional arithmetic skills. Classes are held in the Junior High building under the auspices of local school administration.

Three levels of instruction are taught: Level I, --Beginning--Grade 3; Level II, --Grades 4-6; and, Level III, --Grades 7-8. The A. B. E. program is concerned with educating the over 1.6 million functionally illiterate adults in Texas. These adults represent approximately 17% of the State's population.

Adults have the opportunity to spend 120 hours in learning how to read and/or improve their reading ability. Classes meet each Monday and Tuesday evening from 7:30-9:30 p. m. There is no cost to the student.

Adults who cannot enroll this year will have the opportunity to enroll next year during the 1968-69 school year. Plans call for three teachers providing the enrollment is enough to warrant them. The current program will end about the middle of June.

Mr. Griffin was graduated from Texas Tech in 1951, and received his degree from the University of Texas Law School in January, 1956.

He was Assistant District Attorney from May 15, 1956, to Dec. 31, 1956, and was first Assistant County Attorney from 1957, to July, 1960. He was County Attorney from July, 1960, to Dec. 31, 1961.

Mr. Griffin is a member of the Texas State and Lubbock County Bars, and is past president of the Texas-District County Attorneys' Association.

Active in civic work, Mr. Griffin is a past president of Lubbock Lions Club; past District Governor of Lions' Club District 2T2, and presently is 2nd Vice-President of the Texas Lions' Crippled Children's Camp. He is a member of the Board of Directors of Civic Lubbock, Inc. and Auditorium-Coliseum Board. And he is a former member of the Board of Directors of United Fund and Budget Division of the United Fund.

Mr. Griffin is a member of St. Christopher's Episcopal Church and is secretary of the Vestry of that church.

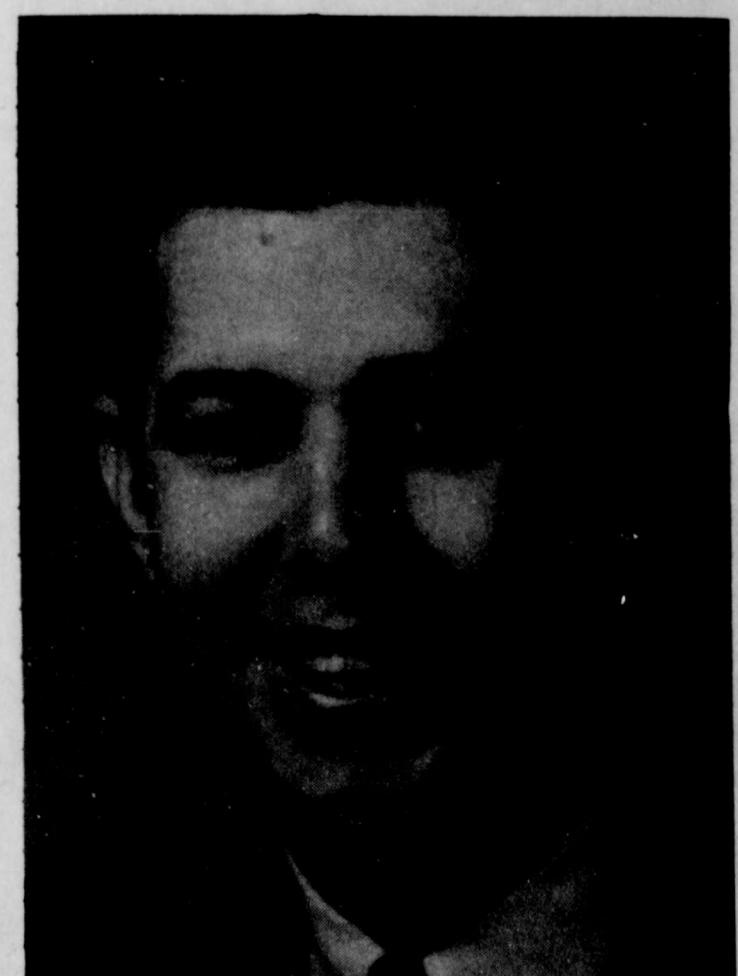

The usual parade of bands downtown was cancelled due to the large number of entries in the contest.

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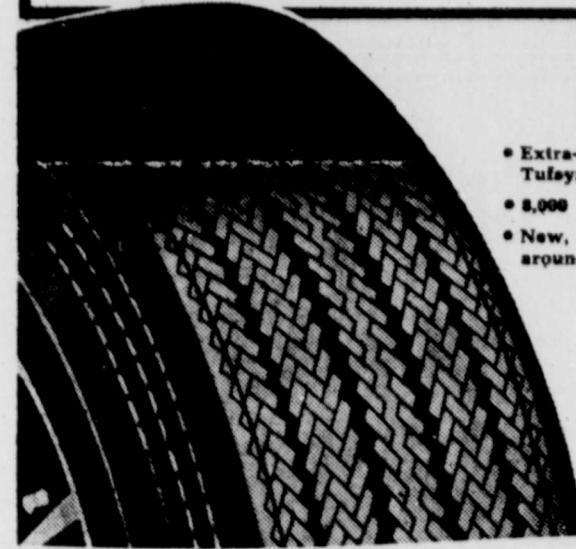

Edible Cottonseed Flour Developed

U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists have developed a process for making high-protein edible cottonseed flour. Experimental trials indicate that 100 tons of cottonseed should yield about 36,000 pounds of high-quality edible flour containing 85 percent protein. The U.S. could produce about two million tons of the flour and the rest of the world about 6 million tons. The product could make a major contribution toward easing the protein malnutrition in much of the world.

Crop Sign Up Continues For Farmers

More than half the farms in Hale County have been signed up to participate in the 1968 government wheat, cotton and feed grain programs. John Martin of Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said Friday. In a weekly report made Wednesday 461 farms in Hale County had been signed up to plant 23,465 acres of a more than 50,000-acre county allotment. About 44 per cent of the feed grain allotment on 793 county farms will be taken out of production as farmers signed intentions to divert their corn and their grain sorghum allotment by 31,670 acres of the total 115,197 acres of grain sorghum allocated for 1968.

On a county average, ASCS sign-up figures indicate Hale County farmers on 862 farms will plant about 76 per cent of the total cotton allotment. Martin said sign ups by the Wednesday report showed farmers diverting 16,016 acres of the 67,913 acres allocated for cotton in Hale County.

March 15 is deadline for sign ups.

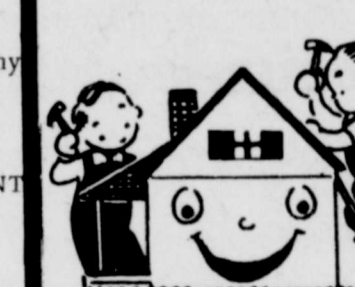
