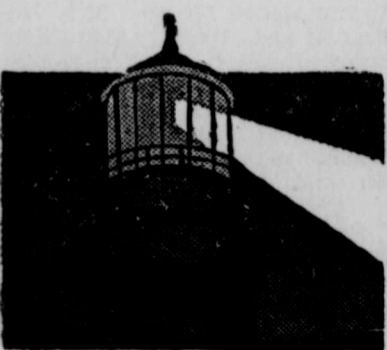

On The BEAM

There is a possibility that a cotton spinning mill will be established in Mitchell County. The Colorado City Chamber of Commerce and a group from various parts of the county are at work on the project. A mass meeting was held last Friday night in the Lone Wolf Co-Opatorium at which the spinning mill industry was rather thoroughly discussed. A lot was learned about spinning mills.

It was learned that a spinning mill will cost a lot of money to establish and will employ approximately 100 people. The valuation of the mill would be good for county taxes and the payroll would add a great deal to the economy of the county.

It will not be an easy matter to raise the money for the project. We had some experience along this line several years ago when we were getting a cheese plant started here in Loraine. The cheese plant started on a shoe string but grew to be a very valuable asset to our town, the county and several other counties around but after a few years operation had to close for lack of a milk supply. In trying to stay in operation the plant lost money and when it closed nothing was saved but the building.

There is not much possibility that farmers will quit raising cotton unless the boll weevil causes so much damage each year that raising cotton would not be profitable so a cotton spinning mill might have a better chance to stay in business than did our cheese plant.

Inspection Stickers Being Issued

AUSTIN - "There is a touch of tourism in the 1966 Texas vehicle inspection sticker," said Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, as he announced the new vehicle inspection period to be given on September 1, 1965.

"On that date, all official inspection stations began issuing the colorful new sticker, a part of which is a replica of the flag of the Lone Star State," he continued.

In making this announcement, Garrison urged motorists to secure new stickers as soon as possible even though they are not required by law until April 16, 1966.

Garrison noted that this new inspection period marks the beginning of the 16th year of compulsory vehicle inspection in Texas and that during that time, vehicle defects as causative factors in motor vehicle traffic accidents have decreased continually.

During 1965, the reduction brought this rate to an all-time low, which compares most favorably with the lowest rates in the nation.

Loraine School Enrollment Up From Last Year

School officials announced Tuesday that enrollment in Loraine school was higher than the opening day of school last year.

Vance Dickenson, high school Principal said 104 were registered in high school, which is several more than last year. There were

53 girls and 51 boys. 19 of these are seniors, 25 juniors, and 30 sophomores and 30 freshmen students.

Grade School principal, Edith Wilkerson reported 263 registered Monday with 13 more coming in Tuesday, making a total of 276

as compared with 232 at the opening last year. Making a total of 380 students.

Social Security Changes

(Editors note — This is the fourth in a series of columns by Erven Fisher, social security district manager in Big Spring, Texas, telling what the social security amendments of 1965 mean to you and your family.)

Several extensions of coverage for social security purposes were included in this year's amendments. Among these groups affected by these extensions are doctors of medicine and people who receive tips as part of their pay. Benefits are now payable to certain divorced wives and surviving divorced wives of deceased workers.

Physicians' self-employment income from the practice of medicine will be covered for social security purposes for the first time beginning with taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1965. In addition, coverage was extended to medical and dental interns employed by hospitals starting in 1966 on the same basis as other employees of the same employer. This means most interns will start paying social security taxes on their earnings, will earn social security credits, and they, their dependents and survivors will be eligible for monthly cash benefits as soon as they have earned sufficient credit and meet other requirements in the law.

Cash tips received by an employee on his own behalf will be counted as wages for social security purposes starting in 1966. The law requires these employees to

make a written report to their employers within 10 days after the end of a month in which the employee received \$20. or more in cash tips. The employer will deduct the employee's share of the social security taxes due on the tips from the regular wages of the employee or from funds the employee may provide if unpaid wages held by the employer are not enough to cover the social security deductions on his reported tips. The employer will report the worker's tips along with the worker's regular wages for social security.

Employer's should get in touch with the Internal Revenue Service in they have questions concerning their responsibilities in reporting of tips. One provision of the amendments will permit certain divorced wives and surviving divorced wives of deceased workers to receive monthly cash benefits.

In order to get benefits, a woman must have been married to her former husband for 20 years before the divorce, must not be married, and must meet one of the following three support requirements at the time her former husband became disabled, became entitled to benefits, or died: She received one-half her support from her former husband; she received substantial contributions from him under a written agreement; or a court order for substantial contributions to her support from her former husband was in effect.

Payment of benefits to a divorced woman would not affect payment to anyone else entitled on the same account, nor would the divorced woman's benefit be affected by the entitlement of others.

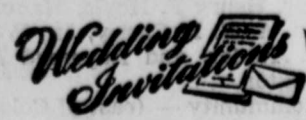

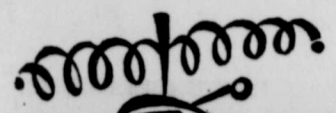

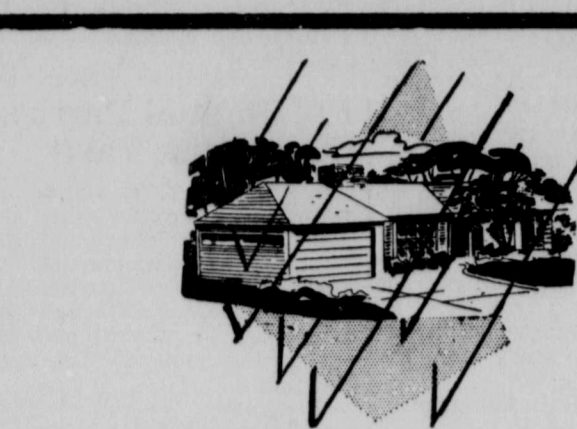
