Smith Charges Republicans With Wastefulness Death Recommended For 17-Year Old Eastland Boy

Clyde Thompson As Found Guilty Of Shook Murder

Young Davis Lad Relates Horrible Details Of The Murder Of Two Shook Boys Last Month.

Murders Planned

Thompson "Just Wanted To See Them Kick," 12-Year-Old Lad Tells Jury In Trial; Said He Boasted.

(By Associated Press)
EASTLAND, Oct. 16.—Clyde Thompson, Eastland county youth who is still in his teens was found guilty of the murder of Lucian Shook by a jury which recommended the death penalty in district court here tonight.

EASTLAND, Oct. 16.—His friend, Clyde Thompson, said he was going to kill "Shook" just to see him kick. Woodrow Wilson Davis, 12, testified here today in Thompson's trial for the slaying of Lucian and Leon Shook near Leary, oil boom town, last month.

The 12-year-old boy, who also was charged with murder for the killing of a Shook, was promised immunity, and the district judge said he would tell the truth on the witness stand.

Thompson Threatened Them
The night before the Shook brothers were shot and beaten, Woodrow told him and his brother, Thomas, went to the Shook home with Thompson. Their 17-year-old friend stole a shotgun and a bandolier, and told the Davis boys he would get them and get them "right" if they told of the theft, Woodrow testified.

The following night Thomas, who is still in his teens, and Woodrow went again to the Shook home with Thompson.

Good Roads Group Starts Petition

Executive Committee Meets At 11 Today In Preparation To Circulate Of Petition.

The executive committee of the Lubbock County Good Roads association will meet at 11 o'clock this morning in the offices of the chamber of commerce at city hall, for the purpose of planning the circulation of several copies of the petition asking for a special bond issue election of \$2,000,000, for paving and hard-surfacing state and county highways throughout the county.

Attend Rotary Club
The association's board of directors have been asked to attend the Rotary club luncheon at noon and they will meet immediately following the luncheon and more than likely start definite circulation of the petition.

Every district in the county will have a copy of the petition circulated throughout its area and it is planned to have them signed and tested for presentation to the county commissioners here on next Monday.

Since Attorney General Calhoun has put his approval on the legal form of the petition, it is expected that nothing will stand in the way of calling the election within 30 days after the commissioners meet, or, as required by law of the state for holding such elections.

Wintry Storm Spreads Thick Mantle Of Snow In Colorado; Rail, Air and Motor Transportation Is Disrupted

DENVER, Oct. 16.—Winter made a flying assault on the middle and southern Rocky mountain range states today, spreading a thick mantle of snow over the area as the season's first storm was driven down from the northern states of Montana and Wyoming by rising temperatures and sunny skies.

The greater part of Colorado was blanketed in white. Moving swiftly from the north, where it left a toll of one dead and disrupted air, rail and motor transportation, the storm belted the Colorado mountain and plain areas and made itself felt in northern New Mexico and adjoining states.

On the crest of towering Pike's Peak near Colorado Springs, more than 14,000 feet above sea level, three persons were left stranded by the elements. A storm enveloped the peak and the little party found itself unable to penetrate the huge snow drifts which blocked the automobile highway.

Motorists Marooned
They were safely housed in the summit house at the peak tonight, waiting the arrival of a cog train to take them to safety tomorrow. Four other motorists were marooned at Glenwood, about midway up the mountain, on the automobile road, where 16 inches of snow made the highway impassable.

In Wyoming Joe Miller, 63, a sheep herder, was frozen to death.

Negro Charged In Attack On Woman

Cooke County Grand Jury Returns Indictment In Case; Victim Identifies Photos of Attacker.

GAINESVILLE, Oct. 16.—Indictment charging Billy Jordan, 19 year old negro, with criminal assault and with robbery with a deadly weapon, were returned here today by a special session of the grand jury called to investigate attacks made upon Mrs. A. R. Hasenpfeiffer October 8.

Jordan, whose home is in Houston, was arrested there after officers had traced Mrs. Hasenpfeiffer's car from Gainesville to that city. Jordan is alleged to have stolen the car after the attack. Mrs. Hasenpfeiffer, pictured Jordan's photo out of half a dozen pictures handed her today and identified him as the man who attacked her while a number of other people testified that they saw him in the vicinity.

South Presents Big Question To Political Parties

Leaders Wonder If Hoover Will Win In Section Traditionally For Democratic Party Alone.

Battle For Votes

Republican Party For First Time Is Organized In Section While Democrats Are Forced To Work.

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 16.—How solid is the "solid south"? That question is the question asked by the rest of the country as it hears reports that democratic Dixie is swept by waves of anti-Smith and pro-Hoover sentiment; it wonders whether republican Herbert Hoover will win any of the electoral votes which traditionally belong to the party of Alfred E. Smith.

Time Will Tell

The answer awaits November 6 but in the meantime there is ample evidence that the hand of cotton is running high political temperature without a parallel since reconstruction days and the invasion of the republican carpet bagger.

Well before the Houston convention entrusted the standard to Governor Smith, opposition to him was in full vigor below the Mason-Dixon line. Since Houston, that opposition has achieved important proportions; for a time democratic hoisting became almost epidemic. The situation is well reflected in the fact that for the first time in political ages the republican party is organized and actually stumping the south.

114 Votes Somewhere
Between Kentucky, Tennessee and Oklahoma, 114 electoral votes tucked away in the rest of the south from Virginia to Texas, 114 credits to the electoral college which ordinarily are conceded to be the property of the democratic presidential choice from the moment the convention has voted its will. Now, nothing is conceded, as witness Hoover's bid for southern support with his Tennessee speeches; Smith's dip into Dixie on his present tour; and the fact that both vice presidential nominees have been assigned southern itineraries.

Governor Young Declines To Halt The Execution Of Edward Hickman

California Executive Expresses Disbelief Of Theory Of Insanity Made In Appeal by Attorney and Boy's Father; Slayer Continues With Statements

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 16.—Governor C. C. Young at Sacramento today declined to halt the execution of William Edward Hickman, set for 10 a. m. Friday expiring death sentence. The theory of insanity made in an appeal to him by the youth's father, Thomas Hickman, of El Paso, Texas, and his attorney, Jerome K. Walsh, of Kansas City.

Almost at the same hour, the slayer of little Marian Parker met newspaper men in his cell at San Quentin state prison and reiterated his statement that he was sane.

Explains Motives
While plans for his execution went on almost within earshot, Hickman issued a written statement in which he explained his motives for the murder, simultaneously he asserted he had not lived in vain, because he added, he furnished a hideous example for American youth. Chastising freely with newspaper men the slayer discussed his life and his early ambition to become a minister.

Zeppelin To Start Home In 10 Days; Visit U. S. Cities

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener expects to start the Graf Zeppelin on its return flight to Germany in about ten days.

"But first," he said today, "we will fly to Pittsburgh, Akron, Detroit, and perhaps Chicago and some other cities."

With Captain E. A. Lehmann, his first officer, he outlined the future of the huge Zeppelin as he neared the reception New York had prepared.

"The damaged horizontal fin will be fixed by the end of the week," he said. "It is only the cover that is damaged. We will be ready to go back by the end of next week."

"With favorable winds we will probably make the return journey in three days," Capt. Lehmann estimated.

Borah Appeals To Women To Support Prohibition Rule

Republican Senator Calls Upon Women Voters To Prevent Overthrow Of The 18th Amendment.

SALISBURY, N. C., Oct. 16.—Carrying the presidential fight of Herbert Hoover into the traditionally democratic state of North Carolina, Senator Borah of Idaho, in a speech here tonight, called upon the women voters to prevent the overthrow of prohibition by electing the republican candidate.

Changes His Plans
Suddenly changing the program of his campaign trip which followed roughly the line of the recent tour of Governor Smith, the senator late today accepted an invitation of Salisbury. Hoover supporters make a brief speech while traveling to Charlotte. He previously had planned to make only one address at Charlotte tomorrow night, but after his arrival there he motored to Salisbury, 40 miles northeast of Charlotte, to deliver tonight's speech.

The senator at the onset congratulated the women of the nation of their activity and their leadership in this campaign.

"Without the women and their influence and leadership," he declared, "the Eighteenth amendment would never have been written into the Constitution, and without the women and their leadership it can not be kept in the Constitution and enforced."

New York Honors Zeppelin's Crew With Big Welcome

City Roars Tumultuous Welcome To Crew Who Made Another Era In Transportation Over Sea.

Parade Is Formed

Two Score Men Are Treated To City's Best; Large Reception Given At City Hall; More Planned.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Two score of gallant men who had shown a new way to the commerce of the air by their flight in the Graf Zeppelin from Germany, tonight were the guests of an enthusiastic city, after a tumultuous welcome in the late afternoon.

The largest city of the land forgot its business for a time to hail the crew of the dirigible, symbolic of a new era in transportation passenger and cargoes.

Throngs Ignore Rain
At 10 p. m. the visitors were landed from the municipal tug Macon at the Battery, that small clear space at the tip of Manhattan on which the skyscraper encroaches as close as they can. Patient men and women had waited since early morning at the landing, and a chorus of ten thousand voices was on hand to cheer a light sprinkle of rain failed to diminish the crowds.

The grey official buildings had blossomed forth with the flags of the two republics, Germany and the United States and from their upper stories, as the parade formed and moved up Broadway, came that peer storm which office workers delight to shower on the heroes who pass below them.

The mounted policemen cavorted ahead of the automobiles bearing the city's guests and behind marched smartly picked detachments of the army and navy. The

Report Shows Two Million Increase In City Property

Tax Rate Is Lowered To 80 Cents As Result Of Hike In Valuations; Building Is Forced To Increase.

By a 12 1-2 per cent increase in taxable assessed property valuations amounting in dollars and cents to approximately \$2,000,000, obtained in the Lubbock Independent school district, during the past year, the city school tax rate has been lowered from \$1 to 80 cents.

A. C. Jackson, city school tax collector, yesterday, in making the announcement of the decreased tax rate, stated that total valuations for the school district are now \$23,704,000. The increase in valuations has been occasioned by the city's steady growth and not because of any so-called boom. Mr. Jackson stated. Last year's building permits totalled approximately \$1,800,000.

The decrease in school tax rate is made possible, with the increase in taxable valuations, by the fact that the Lubbock school district is clear of the heavy indebtedness which has been facing it for the past three years. Only bonded indebtedness is now outstanding. With the decrease in city school taxes, it is expected that approximately 90 per cent of the city taxes will be lower than last year.

Economy Of Past Two GOP Regimes Bitterly Assailed

Smith Charges That Hoover And Party Attempting To Cover Up Expenses Of Government.

Waste Is Wilful

Democratic Nominee Gives Attitude Toward Deficits In Federal Expenses, Charges Fraud.

(By Associated Press)
SEDALIA, Mo., Oct. 16.—A challenge to republican claims of economy in administration of the Federal Government was issued tonight by Gov. Alfred E. Smith, who declared in the only formal speech prepared for delivery before a Missouri audience that according to his ideas the Harding and Coolidge regimes had been as "wasteful as any the country had ever seen."

"They attempted to give away our natural resources," he said, "and they have postponed and neglected the most pressing needs."

Three Pictures To Present
The Democratic nominee explained these were three pictures he desired to place before the country. One, he said, was that which the republican party would like to have the American people view "as showing great efficiency and great economy."

The second, he added, was a picture "setting up real facts which show the government is costing more this year than when President Coolidge took office," while the third, he said, disclosed the "republican lack of ability, lack of efficiency and lack of business methods."

The governor contended that Republicans were "lacking an issue," and for that reason had attempted

AUSTIN, Oct. 16.—Use of any form of electricity in fraternity initiations at state institutions was condemned and recommendation was made that the proper authorities ban electrical apparatus from such ceremonies, in a report today by a district court grand jury investigating the death of Nollie McElroy, 19 year old Texas University sophomore, September 30, during a stunt accompanying his induction into the Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity.

The grand jury held no one liable for the boy's death. McElroy died after crawling between a pair of bed springs charged by the current.

Gigantic Highway From Texarkana To San Diego, Plan

Bankhead Highway Planned Completed Between These Two Points Within Year; Texas Nearly Paved

PORT WORTH, Oct. 16.—A hard-surfaced highway stretching from Texarkana to San Diego, Calif., within another year, is predicted in a report by Fred B. Robinson, Waco, traveling director for the Bankhead Highway association, who recently returned from the fall meeting of the organization in Atlanta, Ga.

The report also said that the Bankhead Highway is paved practically the entire distance across Texas, the last county, Hopkins, having recently completed paving work. The gist of the report was that Texas counties are cooperating to maintain the highway and that the whole stretch is in good condition and under constant improvement.

Ed Lasater Urges Defeat of Hoover

DALLAS, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Ed C. Lasater of Fairbairn, Texas, veteran stockman, once a leader in the anti-Moose movement in the state, another time republican candidate for governor and during a part of the war a member of Herbert Hoover's food administration, urged the defeat of Hoover in a statement here last night.

Lasater said that "it would be a terrible blow to the hopes and aspirations of the average man and woman of America if Hoover should be elected president of the United States." Mr. Lasater said that he resigned as chief of the division of livestock and animal food products in Hoover's food administration because he became convinced that Hoover had no sympathy for "the common people."

"He has set in the cabinet and has made no move to give the producers a square deal," Lasater continued, and his promises to bring relief to agriculturists are worse than idle.

John B. Benson, president of the board of education, explained that while there had been some rumors of political activity in the schools, teachers and principals were ordered a week ago to have it discontinued at once.

Pecos Overflows In Mexico Areas

ARTESIA, N. M., Oct. 16.—(AP)—Stockmen and farmers along the Pecos river were reported today to be moving their stock to safety as the result of overflows from the river.

The river was a mile wide and rising as the result of rains to the north and west. The damage was confined to farms along the river's course.

The insects were reared from eggs acquired in Texas by the Australian experts who have endeavored to obtain help in fighting the cactus which is damaging the Australian grazing ground. A report to the Commerce Department today said that the experiment had just got under way.

Ministers Declare Actions Justified

Georgia Methodist Ministers Association State Political Activity Is All Right.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 16.—The Atlanta Methodist Ministers association today issued a public statement declaring that the activity of ministers in the presidential campaign is justified.

The statement was issued in reply to a recent protest published by a group of approximately 50 Methodist laymen against ministers being active in the campaign. It declared that the Georgia protest is apparently a chain letter, the first having been forged in Virginia.

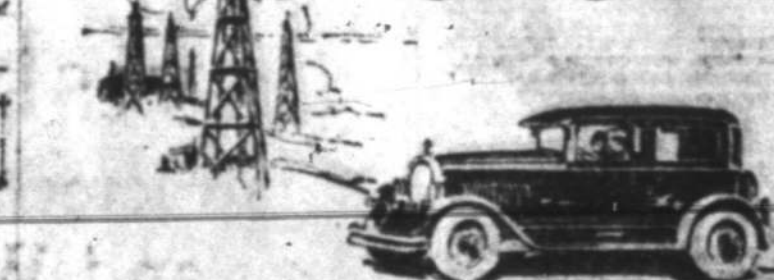

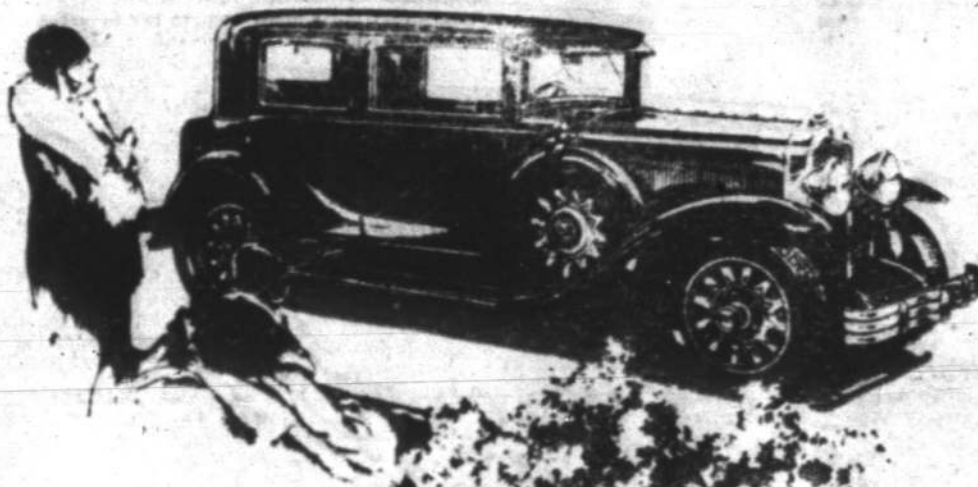

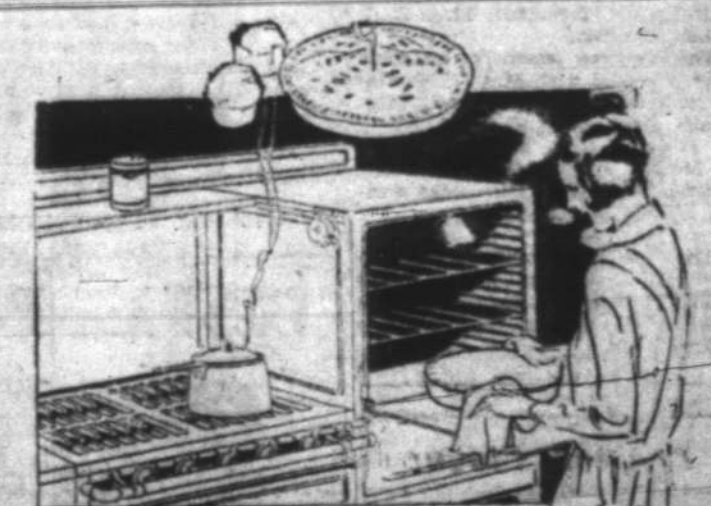

This defeat at the hands of the Daniel Baker Hill Billies has by no means damped the ardor of the Abilene crew. On the other hand, their loss to the Brownwood team has served to rouse the Indians to a keen fighting pitch.

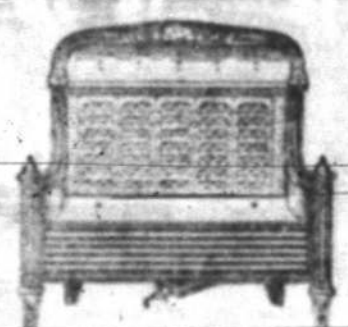

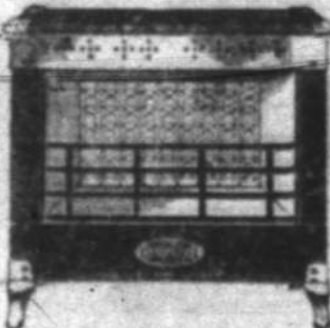

Turner Awarded Verdict in Suit

A verdict in favor of the plaintiff was reached by the jury of the Ninety-Ninth district court yesterday afternoon, after half an hour's deliberation in the case of J. C. Turner versus John W. Moore, in a breach of contract suit, awarding the plaintiff \$200.

Contract Breach Alleged
The breach of contract, as alleged, was made by the defendant, John W. Moore, who was claimed to have entered into a contract with J. C. Turner and L. L. Shadish to furnish lodging and food for about 150 pipe line workers employed in laying a pipe line between Lamesa and Midland, at the agreed price of \$1.50 per day. After the plaintiff purchased supplies, bedding and put up their camp, it was charged that some of the pipe line workers either lodged with or stopped at the camp, and it was further contended that the defendant used trucks to transport the workmen from the field, past the camp established for 25 miles to Abilene.

Food which had been prepared, on order, for feeding about 150 men, was claimed as having been given away to farmers in the vicinity of the camp and thrown away, because of failure of the pipe line workers to show up.

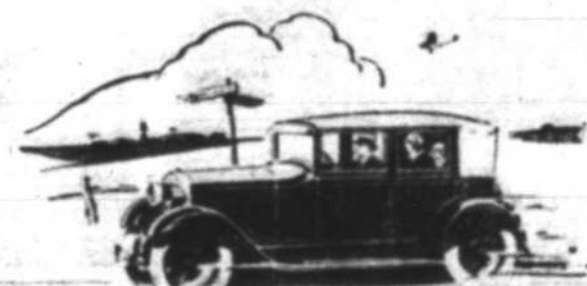

Thompson, Woodrow said. He and his brother stayed outside in the brush, but Thompson called the Shook brothers and asked them whether they had a gun, the boy said. The Shook brothers replied that they did, and came out only with a lantern and a bound horn. Thompson then asked the Shook brothers to go with him to get some money from under a rock. And they started out while the two Davis boys followed.

Tells Of Intentions
Only a little while before Thompson had said that he intended to "murder" Shook and that "it would be the last time Shook will see a shadow," Woodrow testified.

"I asked him why he wanted to kill Shook and Clyde said 'just to kill him kick,' Woodrow said. The moon was shining brightly, the boy said, and he and his brother, who were following Thompson and the Shooks, could see everything.

"I heard a shot and saw Leon stagger. He groaned. Lucian cursed Clyde and Clyde shot him, then shot Leon twice, then shot Lucian two times more. "On the way home, Clyde said 'Well, I got 'em, didn't I?' and Thomas said 'yes, you got 'em but they will get you before long,' Woodrow testified.

W. B. Thompson, father of Clyde, testified that his son was born on Oct. 5, 1911, and was under 17 years of age at the time of the slayings.

Smith Speech

to put into the minds of the people what "they are pleased to term Coolidge economy," and declared he regarded this as the "greatest misrepresentation" so far made. Further, he said that Herbert Hoover, the Republican standard bearer, had a "large share in the painting of this false picture when, in his speech of acceptance, he said:

"By rigorous economy Federal expenses have been reduced by two billion dollars per annum."

Should Know Better.
Asserting that "no more misleading statement could be made in the campaign," the Democratic nominee added that Mr. Hoover "knows better, or should know better."

"He knows, or he should know," the governor went on, "that the two billion-dollar reduction is the difference between the peace-time cost of government and the war-time cost of government. If he were talking out straight forwardly and fairly to the American people, that is what he would say. He chooses, however, to attempt to conceal the true state of facts. I challenge him to make good his statement that Republican economy made a difference of two billion dollars in the cost of running the government. He knows that is not so, and he could never in his life time make good his misleading claim."

The finishing touches were put to the false picture by the secretary of the treasury, Mr. Mellon, in a talk over the radio only a few days ago, when he said that Governor Smith and the other Democratic speakers were seeking to withhold credit from the Coolidge administration for reducing expenditures.

Expenditures Increased.
"Well, we certainly are, because there has been no reduction. In fact, the expenditures have been increased and Mr. Mellon and Mr. Hoover know that to be the fact."

"Now that I have finished the false picture, let me paint for you the real picture. Anticipating just such a speech as this, the Republican campaign managers produced the false picture when in their campaign book of 1928, they say the following:

"Neither is there any denial that more money is being appropriated to operate the government than was appropriated three or four years ago."

"In painting the real picture, it is obvious that a comparison between 1921, when the country was in a war-time basis, and the peace-time 1928 would in no way reflect the true situation."

"In the real picture, let me first call your attention to the fact that \$2,600,000,000 worth of assets acquired during the Wilson administration for the purpose of progressing the war were turned into cash in peace time by the succeeding Republican administration and no credit given on the Wilson side of the ledger. This, the Secretary of the Treasury admits, in his annual reports.

Report Shows Blame.
"The annual report of the secretary of the treasury for the year 1928 shows that if it had not been for the assets left behind by the Wilson administration there would have been deficits in the years 1922 and 1923, and substantial reductions in the surplus in the years 1924, 1926, 1927 and 1928."

"The public, to discover this, would be compelled to delve into the treasury reports. We would never hear of it from Republican campaign orators. We would never hear this from the political book-keeping of Mr. Hoover and Mr. Mellon, or the Republican National committee."

"But, of course, when you are painting a false picture, over-looking a little item like \$2,600,000 is not of much consequence."

The governor declared he wished to add that the "fiscal reports of the United States Government come as near to a Chinese puzzle as anything," he had ever seen. He declared it looked as if the "whole system was devised to confuse and mystify."

Ripped Into Lord
The Democratic nominee stepped into Director Lord of the budget, who in June 1925, declared that "because of the Budget Bureau established under President Harding, it was possible to come within \$48,000,000 of reducing the cost of government by two billion dollars, between 1921 and 1928."

"The true explanation of this reduction, however, he did not discuss," the nominee continued. "How a man of General Lord's ability could get into his mind that the people of this country would be prepared to believe that you could reduce the cost of government by two billion dollars, while at the same time, the people of this country, and even human life, have been in jeopardy."

Dr. Eckener returned his thanks for the welcome of the city and said he hoped the flight might bring the two peoples nearer together. He expressed appreciation of the assistance and facilities given him on this side of the Atlantic.

After the formal exercises, the guests were escorted to their hotel and a little later were guests at a private dinner presided over by the acting mayor. The evening they occupied the choicest seats at a musical show and topped that off by a special showing of moving pictures, which preserved for history their flight.

Tomorrow another round of festivities has been prepared in which German-American organizations are taking a large part.

might have gone that way. But this inquiry, coming from the Democratic headquarters to a Republican newspaper, indicated doubt, and Chairman Chandler of the Republican National Committee promptly capitalized that doubt with orders to his aides to claim everything. And they did.

Tilden received the greatest popular majority ever received by a defeated presidential candidate, having more than a quarter of a million votes than Hayes. But by claiming the votes of several Southern States, South Carolina, Louisiana and Florida, the Republican candidate could count 181 electoral votes to 164 for the Democratic candidate. The Democrats insisted that the votes belonged to them, and with a Democratic House and a Republican Senate there was no possibility of either accepting the view of the other. The outlook for the settlement of the controversy was dark. There was danger of civil war.

The Electoral Commission was the outgrowth of the grand committee that had been advocated by members of both parties. There were a few on both sides who opposed it, but as there seemed to be no other way out of the difficulty, both Houses agreed to the measure, creating the commission. Morrill said that if either House had thought the fifteenth member would not be non-partisan, the measure could not have passed. Senator Ingralls said afterward that the commission was a device favored by each party in the belief that it would cheat the other, and which resulted in defeating both.

Briefly, the commission was to be made up of three Democrats from the House, two from the Supreme Court, with three Republicans from the Senate, two from the House and two from the Supreme Court. The four justices of the Supreme Court were to choose the fifteenth member. The Democrats thought it would be David Davis when they allowed the bill to pass, and the Republicans thought it would be Joseph Philo Bradley. And Bradley it was.

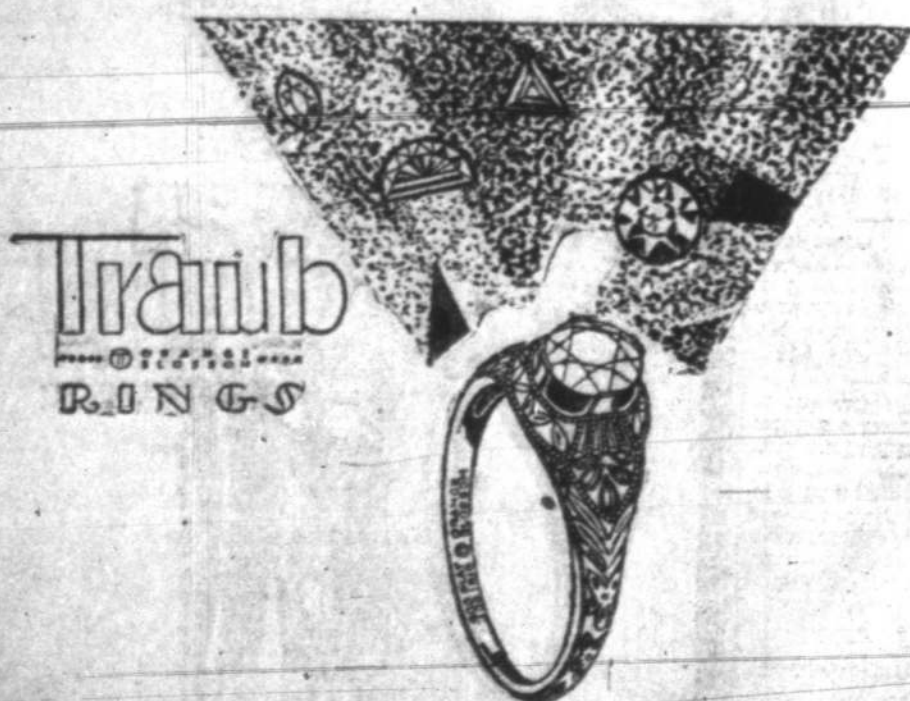
When the testimony was heard Justice Bradley voted on every question of fact and of law in entire harmony with the seven Republican members of the commission. Whether it was the Oregon case, where it was acknowledged that one of the Republican electors held a position of "profit or trust" under the Government; or in the case of the double returns of Louisiana; or in the case of the Florida court decision; or in the South Carolina case, he voted with the Republicans. After all the contest were heard the claims of 181 single Democratic electors among the disputed ones were recognized, and the claims of every Republican elector were. Every vote stood eight to seven, with the result that Hayes was declared elected by 183 electoral votes to 164 for Tilden.
