The students listened to some of the radio programs, discussed some of the problems now at hand, and the prosecuting of the remaining phase of the war. An assembly program under the direction of Mrs. Taylor and her Latin students was presented.

Theme for the day was "Work and Pray On V-E Day," and the event was reverently and quietly observed here.

### Farmers Asked To Have Census Taken Here Now

"Due to the shortage of manpower, tires, and gasoline, the farm census which should have been completed in this county 30 days ago, is far behind schedule," stated Fred A. Groves of Lubbock who was a Lamesa visitor Wednesday.

Groves reported that the census must be taken for the government, and stated that information for the various census in this county is needed as quickly as it can be secured.

He states that every farmer, whether he lives on his farm or at some other point, is asked to contact one of the farm census enumerators here as soon as possible, and give them the information required.

Enumerators are Walter Taylor, who has been assigned the territory which lies immediately north and west of Lamesa, and the district in the extreme southeast corner of the county; E. P. White, who has been given the territory which lies in the west and northwest and north part of the county; and Mrs. Roy D. Smith, who has been given the northeast part of the county to work.

For the convenience of farmers, Mrs. Smith and Mr. Taylor will be in the AAA office in this city each Saturday for the next three weeks from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m., to fill out census reports for farmers.

Groves states that this matter is urgent and asks farmers to make arrangements to have their census taken in the immediate future.

### JAMES CHAPMAN HOME AFTER YEAR OVERSEAS

He has been in the army since July of 1944 and has been overseas since December. He wears a marksmanship medal which he received while in training at Camp Hood, Texas. Pfc. Cornett's wife and two month-old daughter, Patsy Sue, live in San Diego, California. He firmed with his father before going into the army. He is a graduate of Lamesa High School.

### The Conclusion Of The War In Europe Is Announced

By EDWARD KENNEDY Associated Press Staff Writer REIMS, France, May 7—Germany surrendered unconditionally to the western Allies and Russia at 2:41 a. m., French time Monday. (This was at 7:41 p. m., Lamesa time Sunday).

The surrender took place at a little red schoolhouse which is the headquarters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The surrender which brought the war in Europe to a formal end after five years, eight months and six

days of bloodshed and destruction was signed for Germany by Col. Gustav Jodl.

Jodl is the new Chief of Staff of the German army.

It was signed for the Supreme Allied Command by Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, Chief of Staff for General Eisenhower.

It was also signed by Gen. Ivan Susloparoff for Russia and by Gen. Francois Sevez of France.

General Eisenhower was not present at the signing, but immediately afterward Jodl and his fellow delegates, Gen. Admiral Hans George Friedeburg, were received by the Supreme Commander.

They were asked sternly if they understood the surrender terms imposed upon Germany and if they would be carried out by Germany.

They answered yes.

Germany, which began the war with a ruthless attack upon Poland, followed by successive aggressions and brutality in internment camps, surrendered with an appeal to the victors for mercy toward the German people and armed forces.

After signing the full surrender, Jodl said he wanted to speak and was given leave to do so.

"With this signature," he said in soft-spoken German, "the German people and armed forces are far better or worse delivered into the victors' hands."

"In this war, which has lasted more than five years, both have achieved and suffered more than perhaps any other people in the world."

Office To Be Set Up Here To Help Vets

An Associated Press story from Washington appearing May 5, in The Dallas Morning News stated that thirty-three new Texas employment offices are planned to help returning war veterans. This announcement came from War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt, and Lamesa was listed as being selected for such an office.

It was estimated unofficially in the story that 20,000 Texans are leaving the armed forces monthly.

McNutt said the new offices are itinerant in many instances now, but will be made permanent along with others yet to be established.

Leaving for overseas duty on October 27, 1942, Pfc. Whitaker landed on Guadalcanal, where he was in combat. From there he was transferred to the Fiji Islands, where he remained for 10 months. He was also at bases on other of the islands in the Pacific.

Pfc. Whitaker entered service June 9, 1942, receiving his training at Camp Wolters and on Angle Island at San Francisco, California.

Having made Dawson County his home since 1926, Pfc. Whitaker is a graduate of O. K. High School. For 9 years, Pfc. Whitaker resided in Lamesa, and at the time of his induction into the military service he was employed with Henningsen Lamesa, Inc.

Survivors are his parents, one brother, Grady Whitaker, who is a former member of the Army and who served overseas 19 months prior to receiving his discharge and five sisters, Mesdames G. R. Wilson, Jr., Clarence Land, J. C. Hudson, Jim Norman, and Miss Essie Whitaker.

### Pvt. Flud, Listed As Missing, Is Reported Safe

Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Flud learned this week that their son, Pvt. George W. Flud, who was reported missing by the War Department, is now safe and will arrive home for a visit in the near future.

Pvt. Flud who is a member of the Infantry, was placed in the missing status by the War Department December 16, and no further word was received about him until Monday, May 7, when the following letter was received from him by his parents:

April 28  
Well got back in England the other day. Have been a prisoner of war in Germany. I will return home in a few days. Don't worry about me.

Don't know much to write about. Tell everyone hello for me until I get home.

Hope Happy is O. K. Well got to close for now. Don't write me, as I am coming home soon.

George.

At the time he was reported missing in Germany, Pvt. Flud had been overseas for approximately 2 months. He entered the service more than a year ago, prior to which time he was working on a farm for his father. Pvt. Flud attended the Welch Schools, after which time he was employed in several places in this city.

He has a brother in service, Sgt. Lonnie L. Flud, who is now in the Philippines, where he is attached to a Tank Battalion.

### Weldon Lindsey Met Lubbock Men At Pacific Base Recently

A story appearing in Sunday's edition of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal told of the meeting of Weldon Lindsey, a member of the Seabees and son of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Lindsey of this city, and Cpl. Hop Halsey, former State Representative from the 119th district and T-Sgt. Weston Parris, formerly with a tire company in Lubbock.

Lindsey, whose wife also makes her home here, has been overseas for approximately 3 years, during which time he has been stationed at bases in the Pacific Theatre of War.

According to the story, Cpl. Halsey and T-Sgt. Parris, who have just returned to the States after 14 months of foreign service, made a career of seeing other boys from the South Plains while going from island to island and they reported to have contacted a number of Lubbock and South Plains boys.

### Seventy-Four War Casualties Present Equal Number Of Reasons To Buy War Bonds

According to an announcement made this week by Ed DuBoise, chairman of the Seventh War Loan Drive, approximately 150,000 has been raised to date on the \$445,000 "E" bond quota. Chairman DuBoise further states that the national over-all bond drive will begin Monday, May 14, and reports that after that time, all denominations of bonds will be available to the public and will be counted on the overall quota of \$750,000 which has been assessed Dawson County.

There are many reasons to buy war bonds in this the Seventh War Loan Drive. A primary reason for purchasing bonds is the fact that every war bond you buy backs up the fighting men.

Records obtained from R. L. Price, Dawson County Service Officer, reveals that a total of 74 war casualties is the loss realized in this county since the outbreak of the war to January 1, 1945.

That record presents 74 reasons to buy additional war bonds in this the Seventh War Loan Drive. Every bond backs up the fighting men, and helps provide a protecting umbrella on the battlefield. Every war bond plays its part in reducing casualties.

The casualty list submitted by Service Officer Price names these Dawson County men as killed in action: William Martin Creel, Seaman 2-C was killed November 30, 1942. Capt. Robert Hurst Smith of the Army Air Force was killed in an air plane crash off the Coast on September 10, 1943. S-Sgt. Francis H. Curry was reported killed in the European area September 16, 1943, and Lt. (jg) Carl A. Johnson was listed missing June 30, 1943, on the U. S. S. McCawley which was sunk by the Japs off the Coast of Rendova Island. He was officially declared dead by the Navy Department July 1, 1944. Granville Johnson was also listed as killed in action, as was Pfc. Orbin Lee Arthur who was killed August 7, 1944. Lt. Vincent P. Boyer, a glider pilot, was killed over Holland September 23, 1944.

Leslie E. Davis was killed December 21, 1942. 1st Sgt. Harley E. Franklin was killed in Italy July 5, 1944, and Cpl. Fred Gardner was killed in France September 18, 1944. Pfc. B. H. King died from wounds on Tinian Island July 24, 1944, and Robert S. Mapes was killed in France July 14, 1944.

Tom B. Preston was killed in action June 15, 1944; Weldon Deverl Scott died after leaving service December 15, 1942. Pfc. William H. Witt was reported missing in action in February, 1943, and declared dead in February of 1944. Raymond Homer Yates, T. M. 2-C was on a ship which sank in September of 1943, and was declared dead September 12, 1944. Lester Riddle, a sergeant, died of wounds received in France on November 14, 1944.

Also listed as killed in action were J. P. Phillips, who was killed in Italy on June 1, 1944; Pfc. Victor A. Markwardt, who was killed in France June 15, 1944; Pfc. Darrell Meeck, who was killed in France June 12, 1944; Maurice Davis who was killed in action in France July 7, 1944; Lt. Vincent Boyer who was killed in Holland September 3, 1944; S-Sgt. George D. Keathley who was killed in Italy, September 3, 1944; Pvt. Audine Kitchner who was killed in action on Leyte October 27, 1944. Also Sandlin J. Jordan, who was killed in action in France March 27, 1944; Lt. James Edward Hinson who was killed in Italy May 7, 1944, and James Olen Reeves, Seaman 1-C, who was killed in the battle of Midway, June 4, 1942.

Service Officer Price has these Dawson County men listed as wounded in combat action: Duward Schmidt, a private was wounded April 8, 1943 somewhere in the Pacific, and Pvt. Dean was wounded April 23, 1943.

John W. Gist, a sergeant was wounded in action September 14, 1943, in the European area, and Pvt. Clayton Barkhurst was wounded somewhere in the Southwest (Continued On Back Page)

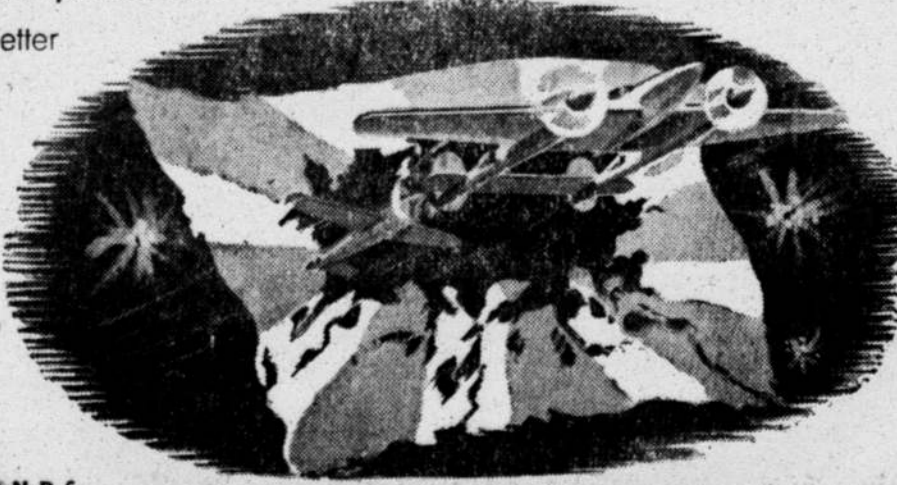

## Story Of Rescue Of Wendorf Told In A Magazine

The May edition of Reader's Digest carried a synopsis of the forthcoming book "Mission Beyond Darkness," written by Lt. Commander J. Bryan III, USN, and Phillip Reed. The story is about 64 brave young Americans, members of the carrier Lexington's Air Group 16, and mentions Edward (Wendy) Wendorf, who has visited in this city on several occasions with Ensign D. Dyer, Ensign Bob Crawley, and Ensign Chuck Jacobs. Wendorf, whose hometown is West, is former college roommate of the three boys mentioned above.

The narrative published in Reader's Digest, covers part of the first battle of the Philippines on June 19, 1944, when Navy planes from the USS Lexington attacked a Japanese fleet.

The story tells of how the boys took off from the ship, knowing that the gas carried in their tanks would hardly be sufficient to allow them to make their aerial attack on the fleet and return to the ship's deck. The portion of the story which mentions fighter pilot Wendorf tells of his return to the ship after attacking the fleet.

Wendorf and another fighter pilot, Seybert, were split apart four times to let stray planes slip between them after their return. They spotted a carrier, lost it, and lost another. A formation of bombers rushed at them head on, driving them almost into the water.

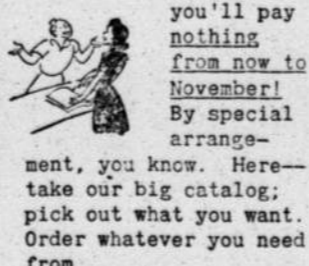

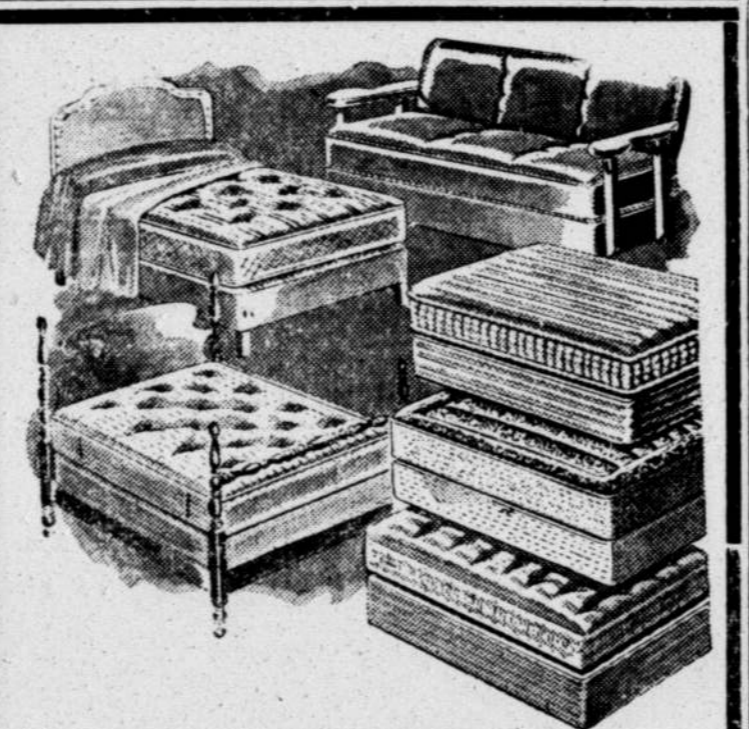
Members of the Fair Association also made plans to sponsor a livestock show in this county next Spring, and decided to invite members of Borden County 4-H Clubs to have a part in the show.

WITH THE 40TH INFANTRY DIVISION IN THE PHILIPPINES—Into an enemy trap and safely out again is the story of Pfc. Loyd C. Plumlee, brother of Roy Plumlee, Lamesa, and a friend Pfc. Angelo Piscitelli of Stamford, Conn.

These two riflemen, with the 185th Regiment of the 40th Infantry Division, were leading an assault on Jap mountain fortifications in mid-April. Few paths led to the tree covered peaks which the enemy occupied.

Suddenly as the two climbed a ridge they were fired upon from two sides by machineguns and mortars began dropping their death load on them. This action disclosed the enemy positions, which were later knocked out, but it also gave two enlisted men the scare of their lives.

On Luzon they were part of the platoon which placed the first American flag in the mountains overlooking Clark Field. It was on the peak of a 1700 foot ridge, after a bitter fight, that these men lashed enemy shovels together for a flag pole. From the bald peak the flag waved defiance to Japs nearby.

These Yanks were among the first troops to enter the two capitol cities of Iloilo, Panay and Bacolod, Negros. They are also veterans of New Britain.

At present they are heading the assault on the mountains of northern Negros.

### H. L. Grissom Saves American Lives On A Hospital Ship

ABOARD THE USS HOPE SOMEWHERE IN THE PACIFIC—Harold L. Grissom, electrician's mate, third class, 909 North 3rd Street, Lamesa, has helped save the lives of many American fighting men by his work as a crew member of the USS Hope, a modern hospital ship.

In six months of active duty the Hope, established a remarkable record of only 14 deaths out of more than 5,000 cases taken aboard.

Recently the Hope staged a dramatic rescue of four Army fliers forced down in the Philippine waters. The Hope's radio man heard faint SOS signals on Christmas Day and with the SOS, the cheerful message, "Merry Christmas—Rescue was effected on Dec. 26, and one of the rescued fliers swore the ship with her bright red crosses and green markings on the sides resembled the most welcome "Christmas tree" he ever had seen.

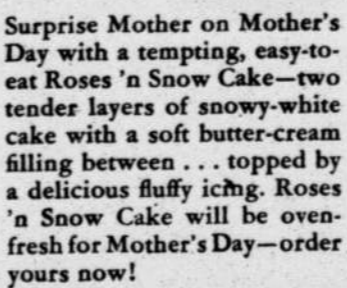

## New Experiment Reveals Wide Use Of Liquefied Gas

It is believed that since liquefied petroleum gas is derived from natural oil well gas or oil refining, its availability in the immediate postwar period can be considered as assured as that of natural gas and crude oil. And with this in promise, an expansion in the use of liquefied gases is expected.

"Health does not mean physical aspect only, but it includes the emotional, mental and spiritual well-being of the individual, the development of the personality as a whole.

"It stands to reason, that for every organ in the body, every bone in the skeleton, and every nerve in the brain and spinal cord, there must be a better or a worse way of living. Some organs, bones and nerves can stand ill treatment for a time while others will break under the strain within a very short space of time. Unless each individual knows the unchangeable laws laid down by nature for the correct method of treating the mind and body, he cannot be sure what judgment nature is going to mete out in return.

"Knowledge of physiology and hygiene is useless, however, unless it be conscientiously applied. The thing for each person—man, woman, boy or girl—to do is not only to acquire the scientific knowledge of how to use his mind and body so that he may develop the best and most serviceable qualities in them, but also to keep that knowledge constantly in mind and govern his actions accordingly. With these working together he can attain the best physical state, the best mental control, and the best social spirit possible.

"It is the social duty of every individual to guard his own health, and the younger generation must take its place in the game of life and learn the rules. Pacific on November 21, 1943. Pfc. Carl S. Hester was wounded in action in the Mediterranean area December 30, 1943. Pfc. Clyde E. Taylor was wounded in North Africa in March, 1943 and Sgt. Lester Riddle was wounded in France in November of 1944.

Sgt. R. C. Lott was wounded in the Pacific theatre of operations; Sgt. Turber F. Salsar suffered from wounds received on Cape Gouster; Pvt. Kermit B. Jordan was wounded in France June 15, 1944; and Sgt. Jim Tom Boyd was wounded in Italy March 16, 1944. Lt. Edward L. Gordon was wounded over Germany August 5, 1944; Pfc. Carl S. Hester was wounded at Salerno, Italy on November 17, 1943; Clarence T. Ham, a master sergeant was wounded on the Marshall Islands; and Pfc. Cecil Foster was injured in Germany, January 26, 1945.

According to the records kept by Price the men named below have been listed in the missing status; Pfc. Willie O. Woody was listed missing May 2, 1942 in the Philippines. Pfc. Clyde E. Taylor was reported missing March 30, 1943 and was later reported safe. John Samuel String, M. M. 1-C was reported missing in the Manila Bay, but on June 22, 1942 was reported safe. Pfc. Alvin V. Brown was placed in the missing status December 18, 1944 and was later reported a prisoner of war.

Edwin H. Moore, a staff sergeant in the Air Corps, was listed missing April 5, 1944 and later reported dead. Raymond L. Gregg, a lieutenant and David L. Gallaway, also a lieutenant, have both been reported missing; as has Bogue Carmichael, Harold Oswald, and Lt. John A. Corley. S-Sgt. Keathely was also reported missing and later reported dead, and Lt. J. C. Norris was reported missing July 2, and later reported to be a prisoner of war.

Dawson County men who have died in service, according to the records kept by Price include Marvin Sutton, an air cadet who was killed in a plane crash near Lubbock on January 2, 1943; Lt. Homer D. Glover, who was killed in a plane crash May 10, 1943; and Sgt. George White, who was killed from a fall on July 25, 1943. Capt. Eugene M. Key died in service September 3, 1942; Lt. Tracy Bourland died in service, and Pvt. John Bill Doby drowned at Shelby, Mississippi July 24, 1944. Joe F. Sellers, Seaman 1-C died November 18, 1943; Millard Nieman, S 1-C died February 15, 1944; and Sgt. J. H. Sellers died in Italy March 3, 1944.

Included in the prisoner of war list are these men: Dr. John R. Bennett, who was taken prisoner December 9, 1941 on the Philippine Islands; Willie O. Woody, who was taken prisoner February 17, 1943 and who was reported to have died in a Jap Prison Camp on September 30, 1943; James Q. Ward, a private who was captured on Bataan; Joe Scott, who was captured on the fall of "Corregidor" on May 6, 1942; and Lt. J. C. Norris, who was reported a German prisoner.

Those who died after leaving the service, according to Price are Weldon Deverl Scott, who passed away December 15, 1942; Ervin T. Bailey, who died March 16, 1942; Francisco G. Landin who died July 17, 1944; and Truman Campbell who died recently.

Mr. Price explains that his list does not include all the Dawson County War casualties and asks families whose boys or husbands have not been listed above to contact him, in order that an accurate record can be kept.
