

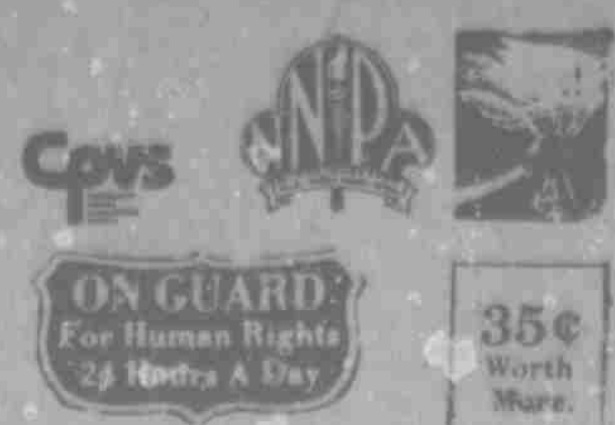

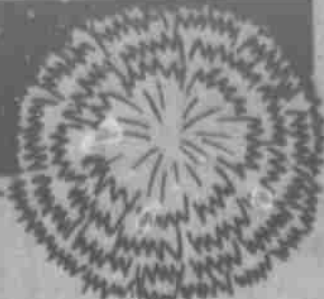

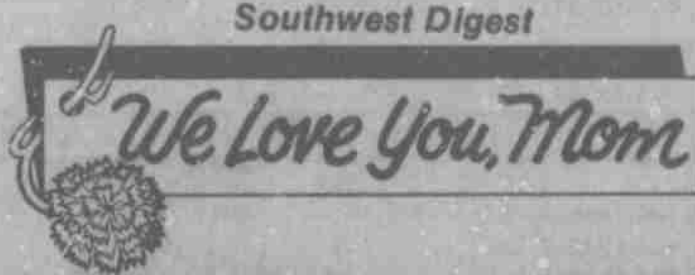

It Needs To Be Said

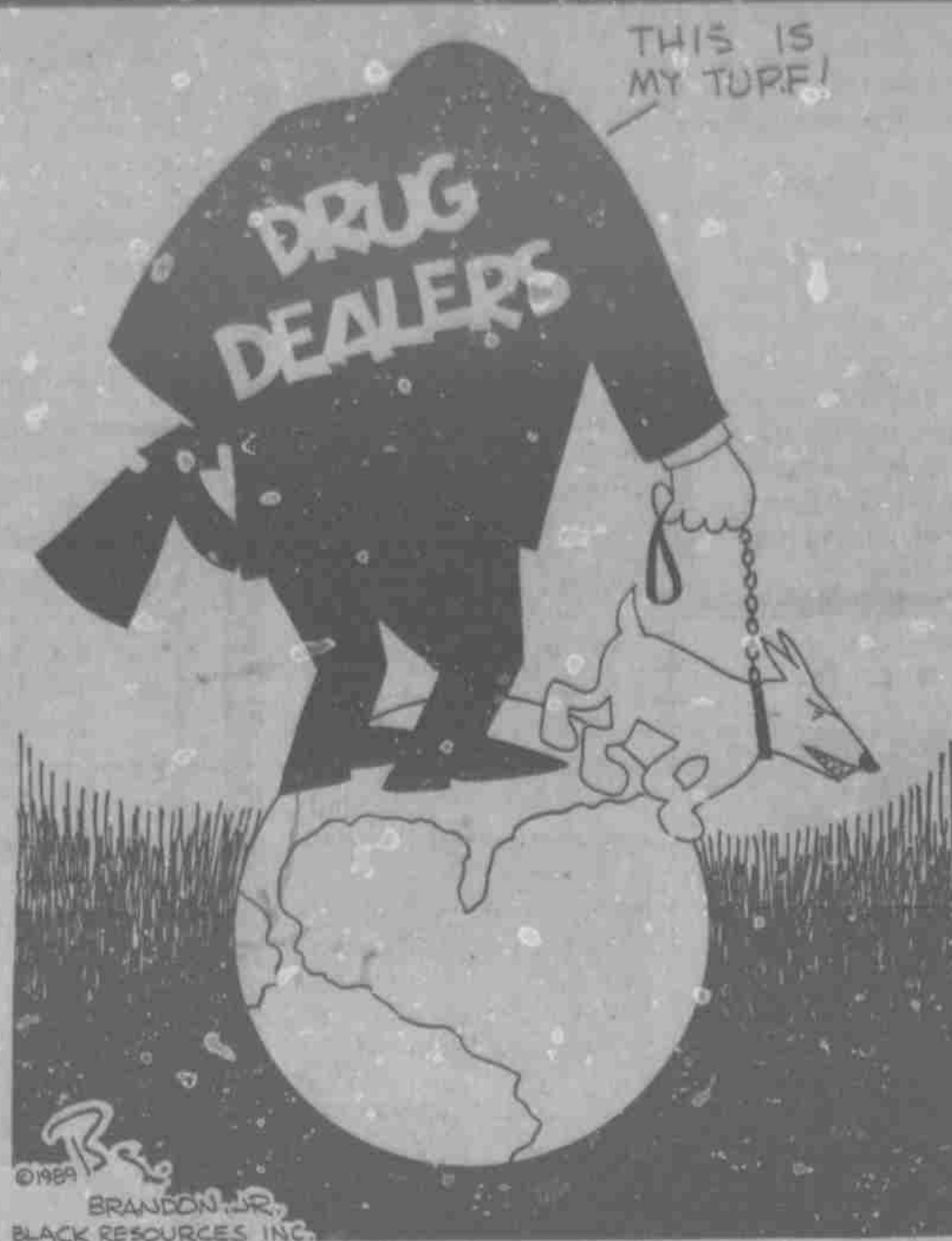
It never ceases to amaze me how some people allow gloom and doom to play such a vital part of their everyday life. Why can't they realize that thinking, talking and seeing only gloom and doom, that it will soon become a habit that's hard to get rid of. Since all of us can identify at least one in this category, it is reasonable to assume our community has too many. You know that person in your church that complains that the sermon was too long, it's too cold or hot, that baby cries all through services, it is very seldom a good word is said about the church, but they are there every week. Then we have those that see nothing worthwhile about Lubbock, especially East Lubbock. They keep the crime, drugs, unemployed and other negative aspects associated with East Lubbock continuously at the forefront. And these same people when asked to participate in positive community events, the excuses will flow like water from a burst hydrant.

If you are not apart of the solution, then you are apart of the problem. Just how much blame should be placed on us, the general public for the problems within East Lubbock? If "A" shoots "B" and "C" is home sleep, how can "C" be blamed? Well, if "C", who has known "A" for years and has been looking the other way at other illegal acts of "A" or if "C" knew about illegal activities at the place where "B" was shot and did nothing about informing the police of it "C" is the type that feels "it's none of their business what their neighbor does" or if "C" ignores federal, state and city elections by not voting, then "C" may well be responsible for the problem and share in the blame.

No, charges can not be filled against "C", but as a responsible citizen of any community, "C" can not ignore their part in the problem. The point is, East Lubbock has too many "Cs". They are not only third party in criminal activities, they are third party to life itself. They will not initiate action to correct a problem nor will they support the problem directly, the "C" merely do nothing within the community except spread after the fact "lip service."

Since the majority of "Cs" are very adept in lip service, here is some positive words you can spread. Throughout East Lubbock, more and more people are improving the appearances of their homes. As you ride, East Lubbock streets, look at how many homes are being or have been improved with new fences, flowers, new grass or paint. Each year, more homes join the band wagon and soon our community will be looking good. While you are out talking, tell about AM58 radio with its Black DJs, the daily advertising of Black businesses, that we get to hear our Black ministers on the radio and how our community, in the majority, support AM 58, that shows TOGETHERNESS. For those who say Blacks can't make it in Lubbock have forgotten about Doctor Darnon Hill, Doctors Johnson and Johnson, Ron Givens, Oscar Jones, Bert McWilliams, Kenneth Wallace, Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Givens, Joan Y. Ervin, just to name a few, that have stayed in Lubbock and did well. And even those that have left and did well, our community was the foundation for which their success is based, so why not take some credit. And look at the people that have come from other places and did well in Lubbock, does this not indicate that if you want to be successful, the place really does not matter.

Only "one track mind people" and people who "refuse to see the forest for the trees" continuously bad mouth our community. Sure there are bad points to our city and

Workers Not Needed!!

Workers are not needed in Valdez, Alaska, to assist with oil spill cleanup. In a letter to the Texas Employment Commission, Joe Sitton, Director of Alaska Employment Security Division, states, "Hundreds of job seekers are outside our office door each morning. Not only do we not need help, but there is not a bed to be had anywhere (even the churches are full), and it is still winter here, so camping or otherwise roughing it is out of the question."

The letter was sent by Sitton to TEC Administrator Bill Grossenbacher to seek the assistance of TEC in discouraging Texas workers from going to Alaska.

AN EDUCATOR'S OPINION

A Future for Children

I have been privileged to serve on the board of directors of the United States Committee for UNICEF, the United Nations Children's Fund. It is an experience that has given a human face to all the dry economic news about falling commodity prices and renegotiation of developing nations' debt.

Tragically, the human face I see is that of a young child—malnourished, suffering from disease, denied an education, and thus denied a future.

Children are the prime victims of the developing world's impoverishment. It's hard to comprehend, but each year some 14 million children die from common illnesses and malnutrition.

The 1980s have been a harsh decade in the Third World. In most of Africa and much of Latin America, average incomes have fallen by 10 to 25 percent. At the same time, in the 37 poorest nations, health spending has dropped 50 percent—and education spending 25 percent.

The recent UNICEF report, *State of the World's Children 1983*, notes that an additional half million children are dying each year due to worsening economic conditions.

But this tragedy is preventable. In the midst of growing poverty, simple, inexpensive programs, such as UNICEF's immunization against measles, tetanus and whooping cough, are saving the lives of 2.5 million children a year—almost 7,000 children a day.

Perhaps you can imagine my an-

guish when President Bush proposed last month to cut the U.S. contribution to UNICEF from \$60 million to \$34 million. That \$26 million savings is not a lot of money to the U.S. government. But it's an enormous amount to children in need of life-saving vaccinations, potable water, and schools.

I often write about the connection between education and the U.S. economy, emphasizing that America's future depends on educating all our children well.

That truth does not stop at our nation's borders. Children in developing nations are the future of their countries just as surely as American children are the future of ours.

A new plan—jointly sponsored by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), the U.N. Development Program, the World Bank, and UNICEF—recognizes education as a prerequisite for economic development. The plan, which aims to drastically reduce global illiteracy by the year 2000, stresses primary education for children in developing countries.

In *The State of the World's Children*, UNICEF head James Grant, a U.S. citizen, calls the protection of children's minds and bodies "both a moral imperative and a practical precondition for sustained economic and social progress."

Programs that seek to assure children in poor nations a future deserve U.S. support, for the sake of our tomorrow—and the world's.
