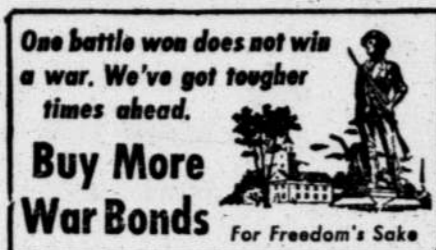

Local Christmas Seal Sale To Fight Tuberculosis Opened Today; Will End Dec. 25th

The Dawson County Tuberculosis Association is launching their Christmas Seal Sale today (Monday), which will continue until Christmas. In connection with the sale, posters are being placed in business houses and other public places, a motion picture film concerning the project is being shown at the Palace Theatre, and more than a thousand letters containing Christmas Seals have been mailed.

Before the local association was organized about three years ago, the Christmas Seals were sent out from Austin, and all proceeds went to the State organization. Now 80 per cent of all money raised in this county is retained by the local association to fight tuberculosis in Dawson County. The remaining 20 per cent is sent to the State and National organization to help carry on the work of preserving health standards throughout Texas and the rest of the nation.

The local secretary of the Tuberculosis Association keeps an individual card record of all of the seals that have been sent out in this section. Some of these cards show that a contribution has been made by some individuals each year for more than ten years.

Officials of the organization report that Dawson County is due to show an increase in the number of tuberculosis cases unless conditions are closely guarded. They state, "This is due to the fact that the Mexican population is increasing so rapidly. The Spanish-American people are five times more susceptible to tuberculosis than the Anglo-American. Tuberculosis has increased in 21 industrial states during the past year. Many of the people populating those states now are from Texas, and will come back to their home state after the war."

The organization's statistics show that out of 1200 test patches that the local association used last year, six cases were positive. All of these were X-rayed. Five persons were admitted to the State Sanatorium, while some other cases were too far developed to be admitted there.

In this county Christmas Seals will be sold from booths on the street, as well as through the schools, and members of the local association urge you to buy some seals and help fight tuberculosis in Dawson County.

The Lamesa-Dawson County Health Unit is cooperating with the local association in this project.

Pvt. F. Cornett Given Award In France

Pvt. F. N. Cornett, a member of the Q. M. Gas Supply Company, has recently received the Bronze Star Medal, according to a message received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Cornett of Fairview Community.

A member of the service since 1941, Pvt. Cornett has been overseas for the past three months, during which time he has been stationed in England, and is now somewhere in France.

He is a former student at Welch School.

Mrs. M. Teague Has Three Sons Serving Oversea

Mrs. Maude Teague, who resides at 910 South Sixth Street in this city has received word that her son, Pvt. Willis C. Teague, has landed safely in England. Willis is the third of her sons to be sent overseas for duty.

One boy, Leroy, is now in Belgium. He entered the service in 1940, and was stationed in San Antonio for 2 years, then was transferred to Wisconsin where he remained one year. For the past 14 months he has been overseas, during which time he has been in Ireland, Northern Ireland, England, France, and Belgium.

Another son, Robert, who has been in service for approximately 2 years is on the Marianas Islands. Prior to going overseas he was stationed at Camp Beale, California, after which time he sailed for Hawaii, where he remained 6 or 7 months, and then went to the Marianas Islands. His wife and baby live at 910 South Sixth Street in this city.

Carrol Teague, wife and daughter, Alice, also, make their home in this city.

Oliver Kinnison Is Commissioned Lt.

Oliver A. Kinnison, Jr., of 405 North Houston Street in this city has joined the world's most powerful air force as a bomber pilot. On November 20 he received his Army Air Forces silver wings and commission as second lieutenant in the graduation ceremony held at Frederick Army Air Field in Oklahoma.

To Lt. Kinnison graduation meant the termination of ten months of the world's most thorough military flight training. As a qualified big ship pilot his war role will become an ever-increasing important one in the historic events still to occur.

All Waste Paper Is Vitrally Needed For War Effort

The waste paper—newspapers, magazines, old books, wrappers, boxes—in the homes and business establishments of Dawson County is needed at once for important war work. The local Salvage Committee has announced a Waste Paper Drive for this county, every citizen needs to save all scrap paper between now and December 8 and 9, when a freight car will be loaded here and sent on to the paper mills.

Waste paper constitutes almost 90 per cent of the content of every piece of paper used in the 700,000 different items made from this material needed by the Army and Navy.

Six hundred mills are now using waste paper as a raw material as compared to two hundred in normal times, which is an indication of the increased need for paper salvage.

Since waste paper is the nation's number 1 critical salvage material of war, it is important that every Dawson County citizen turn in a good collection at the close of the drive now in progress. You are urged to salvage all your scrap paper, and to have it ready on the collection days, December 8 and 9.

Pvt. Searcy Orr Wounded In The Pacific Theater

Mrs. Searcy Orr of this city recently received a letter from her husband, Pvt. Searcy Orr, stating that he had been wounded. He reported that he could not tell her the nature of his wounds yet.

He was wounded while participating in the first drive on Leyte, and is now in a hospital in New Guinea.

Pvt. Orr is attached to a demolition specialist combat engineer division. He entered the service approximately one year ago, and has been overseas since August. He was first stationed in Hawaii and from there went to the Philippine Islands.

Prior to entering the service, Pvt. Orr was employed at Spencer Machine Shop in this city.

Bulldogs Trounce Over Local Club 52-13 In Clash

Midland's Bulldogs rolled to a 52-13 victory over a gamely fighting Golden Tornado eleven here Thursday afternoon, November 23, in an afternoon battle.

The visiting club was led by Hale and Yeager to their decisive victory.

Lt. John Corley Reported Missing Since 9th Of Nov.

Mrs. Willie O. Corley, who resides at 609 South Third Street, received a message from the War Department Wednesday night, November 22, stating that her son, Lt. John A. Corley, Jr., had been missing in action over Germany since November 9.

The pilot of a B-26, Lt. Corley had been overseas almost four months, during which time he was stationed in France. He entered the service in October of 1942, and received his training at bases in San Antonio, Vernon, Pampa, Garden City and Dodge City Kansas, and Barksdale, Louisiana.

You will recall that Lt. Corley asked Dawson County citizens to name his plane before leaving for overseas service, and had named his ship "Reds Raider."

Prior to entering the service he was employed in this city at Lamesa Steam Laundry.

Dan Davis, chairman of the local Sixth War Loan Campaign announced Saturday that the drive in this county had gotten off to a slow start. Dawson County's quota for the drive has been set at \$750,000, out of which \$280,000 must be "E" bonds, this means bonds not to exceed \$5,000 in face value.

Chairman Davis states that special stress is being laid on the sale of "E" bonds during this campaign, and that it is of prime importance that the county fill its "E" bond quota as soon as possible. He reports further that community quotas for the current drive will be published in next Thursday's issue of the paper, and explains that the quotas will be smaller this time than in the previous drive, as the over-all quota is not as large as it was in the Fifth War Loan Drive.

In a recent radio address President Roosevelt stated that the Sixth War Loan drive is something more than just a money raising affair.

He said, "We cannot all fight the enemy face-to-face. We cannot all produce the weapons and raw materials so vital to our armed forces.

"But there is one front on which all of us—every man, woman and child can serve, and serve for the duration. We can all practice self-denial. We can all sacrifice some of our comforts to the needs of the men in service; and yes, even some of our needs to their comforts.

"The war in this present month of November alone will cost seven and one-half billions of dollars. That is two hundred and fifty millions a day. That is why every war bond you buy is so important.

"The war is not over—no, not by many costly battles. While we have every reason to be proud of what has been done—even optimistic about the ultimate outcome—we have no reason to be complacent about the tough road which still lies ahead."

Dawson County citizens can buy their bonds for the Sixth War Loan Drive at either of the local banks, where special booths have been set up, at the local post office, or at O. H. Morris' office.

If you have not yet bought extra bonds for the current drive, do so today. This is one way that you can do your part in the victory that is to come.

S-Sgt. Speck Serves Overseas Now With The Military Police

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND — S-Sgt. Lester C. Speck, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Speck of Motor Route 8, Lamesa who arrived overseas 8 months ago is a member of the Military Police Company which guards the headquarters of Air Service Command, the "nerve center" of the U. S. Strategic Air Forces in Europe.

A vital cog in the defense system set up against the recent flying bomb raids, S-Sgt. Speck and other members of his unit have received high commendations for the efficient manner in which they performed their duties.

Before joining the service on November 15, 1940, S-Sgt. Speck was employed as a farmer.

S-Sgt V. D. Adcock Receives Award

15TH AAF IN ITALY — an operations clerk with the 455th Bombardment Group in Italy, S-Sgt. Vernon D. Adcock, of 512 South Third Street, Lamesa, was recently authorized to wear the Distinguished Unit Badge when his veteran B-24 Liberator outfit was cited "for outstanding performance of duty in armed conflict with the enemy."

This Liberator Group, although handicapped by personnel shortages and operating with only 40

per cent of its maintenance equipment, took off on a vital mission to attack the Daimler-Puch Aircraft Factory at Steyr, Austria. Intense cloud cover obscured the target. Using rockets, aerial flak, cannon and machine-guns in an effort to scatter the American planes, approximately 75 German fighters attacked the formation.

Despite severe opposition, the group maintained its formation, shifted its bombing objective to the Steyr Walzlagerwerke, and inflicted "tremendous material damage." During the air battle, the unit destroyed 27 fighters, probably destroyed 17 more and damaged three, balanced by a minimum loss of four bombers.

"By their grim determination, their outstanding skill and unhesitating courage, the officers and enlisted men of this group have upheld the highest traditions of the Military Service," concluded the citation.

S-Sgt. Adcock's wife and small daughter make their home in Lamesa.

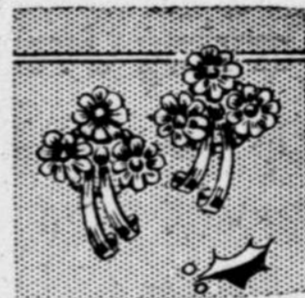

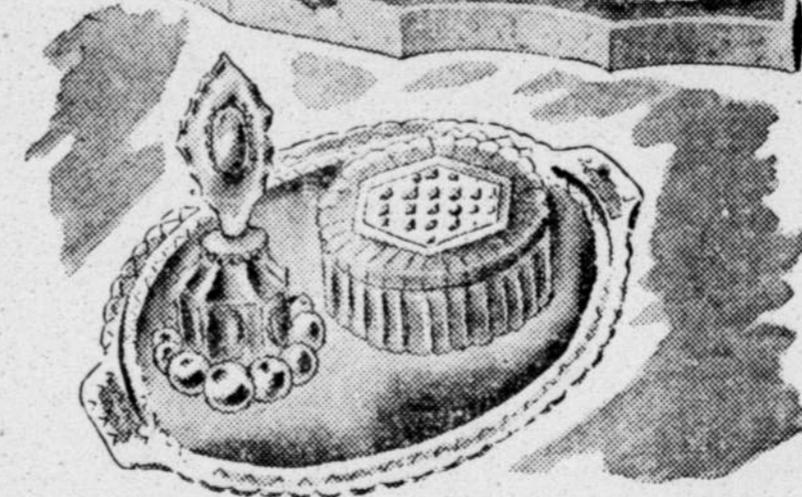

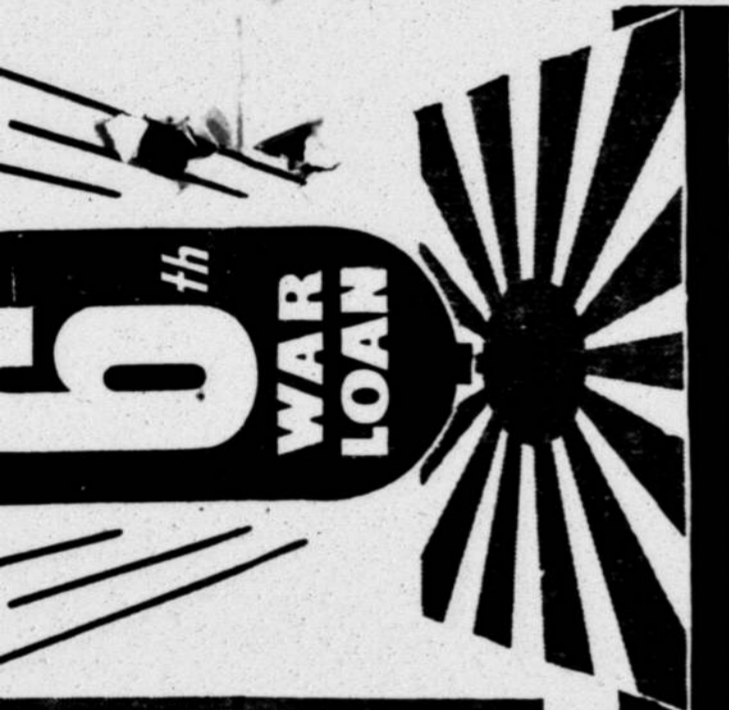
