Bruce Blair Services Held

Funeral services were held from Farwell First Baptist Church Saturday at 2:30 p.m. for Bruce William Blair, Jr., 49, who passed away early last Thursday morning in M. D. Anderson Hospital at Houston following an illness of the past six months. Rev. J. L. Bass officiated at the services and burial was in Sunset Terrace Memorial Park under direction of Steed-Todd Funeral Home.

Mr. Blair was born at Alma, Okla., Sept. 2, 1918, and was married to Edith Banks in Dallas Oct. 13, 1940. He was a member of the Baptist Church and was serving as a deacon at time of his death. The Bushland Experiment Station is again conducting a test on parts of the John Christian farm to study the results of time application of fertilizer on milo. The test is being conducted on an Amarillo Sandy Loam soil, on the farm two and one half miles east of Farwell.

Purpose of the test is to demonstrate the effect on milo yields of different rates and time of application of nitrogen. Two previous tests have shown that the later the nitrogen is applied the higher the yield. The split application (one half nitrogen after bedding and one half side dressing) was not as good as the treatment receiving all the nitrogen side dress.

Results in previous years have indicated that it would be more economical to fertilize as a sidedress only; thus, eliminating a trip over to split the application. The check plot in 1967 on this trial yielded 3780 pounds while the highest yields were received on the sidedress application. Sidedress yields ranged from 7197, 7272 and 7543 lbs., from the following amounts of nitrogen, 80, 120 and 160 lbs. per acre.

The test this year is the same as in the past with the exception that on a portion of the soil in the test this year, a chemical will be used that retards conversion of ammonium nitrate by bacterial process. And will also keep the ammonium nitrate from leaching.

The chemical being applied this year is in the proportion of

one quart to the acre. The nitrate is soluble in water, according to Dr. Arthur Onken from the Experiment Station. He stated that some ammonia is lost by irrigation although it is not water soluble.

The local experiments are being made through the cooperation of the County Agricultural Agent, Ronny McNutt, and John Christian.

Several other such experiments are being conducted in various parts of Parker County.

Residents Vote On Sales Tax

Residents of the city of Farwell will go to the polls Tuesday to approve or reject a proposed one per cent local sales and use tax for the city.

The special election has been called by the city dads in accordance with the constitution and laws of the state of Texas.

All duly qualified voters in the city are eligible to vote on the proposal. Election judge will be Betty Stewart. Clerks are Norma Christian and Neil Walling.

The tax proposal has been much in the limelight since it was first proposed several weeks ago. Since only residents

of the city will be eligible to vote on the issue, those living in the country who will also be required to pay the tax are taking the attitude of "taxation without representation" while others are in favor of the tax, stressing what can be done with the revenue received from such a tax, should the issue pass.

According to figures from the city hall, some \$8,000 in additional revenue would be realized from the one per cent tax.

Polls will be open at the city hall from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m.

Town Election Set Tuesday, March 5

All Texico residents are reminded of the town election set for Tuesday, March 5, in which a mayor and two councilmen will be elected, along with apolice magistrate.

Howard Billingsley and Don Cross are vying for the mayor's position. The mayor serves a two-year term. Billingsley presently is a councilman with an expiring term of office. This is Cross' first bid for public office.

Manford Turnbough and Bob Dollar have filed for the two four-year terms for town councilmen. Dollar is serving the remainder of a four-year term, to which he was appointed following the resignation of Gayle Doolittle, who moved to California.

Sam Lewis, incumbent, is seeking re-election as police magistrate. He is running unopposed.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. Tuesday morning, March 5, and close at 7 p.m. All qualified voters in the town are eligible to vote.

News From Vietnam

Editor's Note

The following are excerpts from a newspaper "Short Bursts" printed in Vietnam for the soldiers who are serving at Bien Hoa. The paper was sent to Mr. and Mrs. Jim Hughes, Texico, by their son, TSGT. Pete Hughes, who has been serving in Vietnam since last July.

Commander's Message

Bien Hoa has, in the past few days, withstood its greatest trial. We have been able to rebound from the enemy attack because of only one thing -- YOU, the men of Bien Hoa. Your courage in beating back the attacks, your determination to dig out and get on with the mission, your willingness to work until the job is done, have enabled us to hit the enemy hard. We have flown more missions in the past few days than in any other comparable period.

You can be proud of your accomplishments, both individually and as a base. I am proud to be able to say that I could be associated with no finer group of men during a period of duress.

Security Police Stop VC

A gritty group of men from the 3rd Security Police Squadron and augmentees who were manning a 20-year-old French bunker thwarted the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese forces attempting to infiltrate Bien Hoa Air Base on Jan. 31.

They manned Bunker Hill 10, the first outpost to notice the oncoming enemy, and for seven hours bore the brunt of the attack. Augmented by a quick reaction force of 15 men, the bunker's normal crew of four repulsed numerous attacks on their position and withstood 12 B-40 rocket hits.

"The infiltrators consisted of 300 to 350 VC and NVA troops," said Capt. Martin E. Strones, of the Security Police Squadron. "The enemy couldn't take the bunker and had to bypass it. This let us hit them with intense cross fire. The cross-fire pinned them down and slowed their penetration."

"This," he said, "kept them from gaining access to other area on base." Bunker Hill 10 made of concrete, resembles a

miniature fort. It was made with sandbags. It guards the east end of the runway and east barracks. "The VC hit the bunker with machine gun fire from three sides and then fired rockets. A rocket killed an officer and wounded several men inside. Although defeated by the noise, theymen fought on," the captain said.

The machine gun position was knocked out by a rocket, so the men inside launched 40 mm grenades at the advancing enemy. Sgt. Marshall A. Gott, who was in the bottom of the bunker, went topside and out of the corner of his eye saw a VC trying to overtake them. He reacted immediately by snapping his M-16 on automatic and spraying the area. Gott stayed on top of the bunker until ordered to leave - even then he left reluctantly, Capt. Strones said.

"The bunker soon began to run out of ammo, but one of our drivers, SSgt. William Piazza, heard they were in trouble and drove through enemy fire to resupply them. This made it possible for them to hold out."

"Another hero of the battle was SSgt. Larry A. Sawyer, leader of a quick reaction force, who braved fire to reach the bunker. He got there, loaded the wounded into a jeep, evacuated them through enemy fire and then returned with more ammo and supplies. There is no doubt in my mind that Bunker Hill 10 bore the brunt of the VC attack. It was sort of like the Alamo. The men refused to give up; they had a spirit, even when completely surrounded that the enemy could not break."

by Nancy Cooper, who will also compete in the County Spelling Bee, and then went on to spell correctly the word DREW.

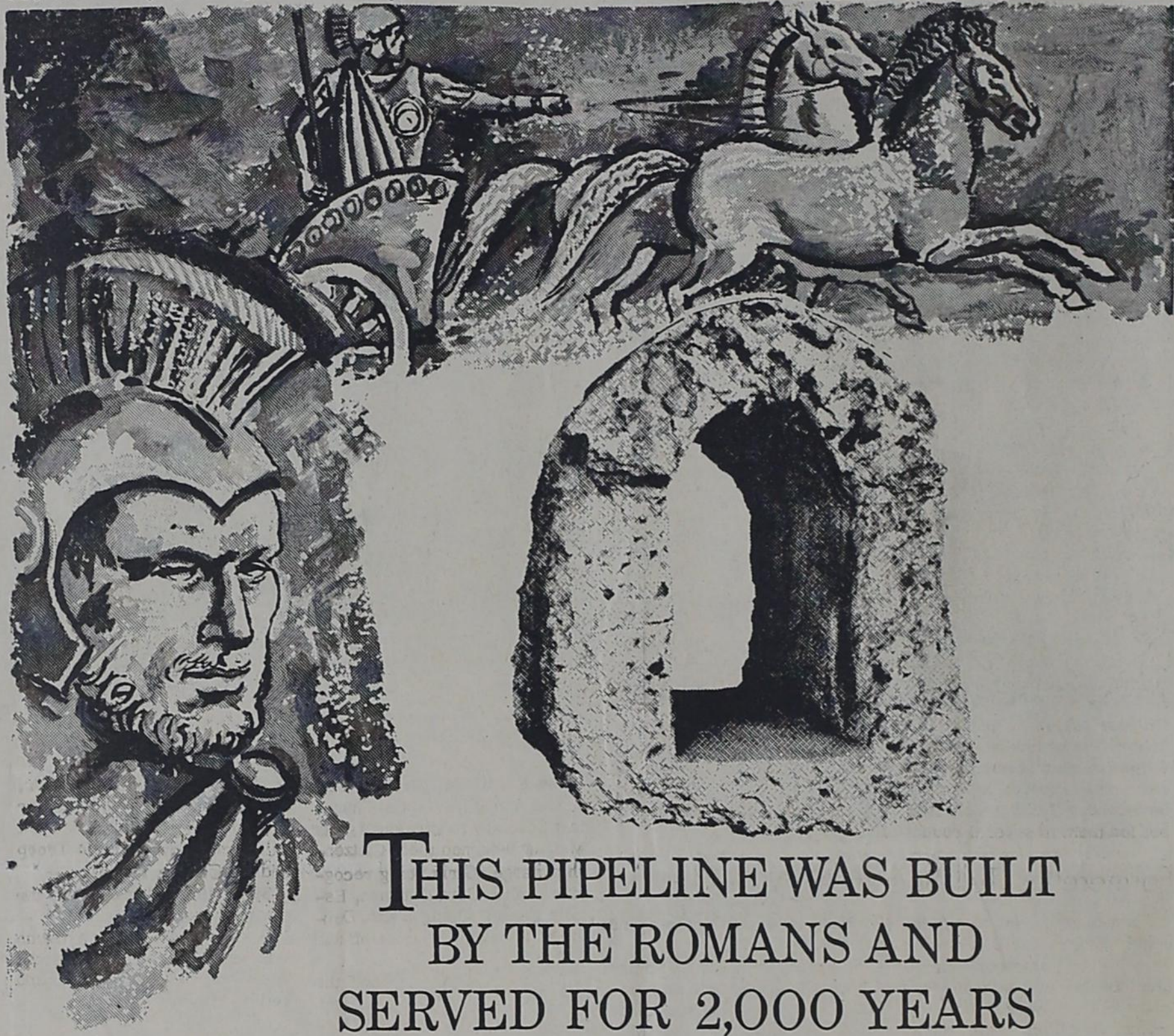
Both students are members of the sixth grade class. Alternates for the county spelling bee will be Valerie Fitz and Glenda Rhodes, fourth grade students.

This photo, from the Smithsonian Institute in Washington D. C., shows a section of the original aqueduct that served the water needs of the conquered city of Cologne, Germany. It was constructed in 80 A.D. by the engineers of Fabius Sabinus Titus, Emperor of Rome. The aqueduct extended 56 miles underground between Cologne, and Eiffel and served as the main artery for the Cologne water supply until the late 1920's.

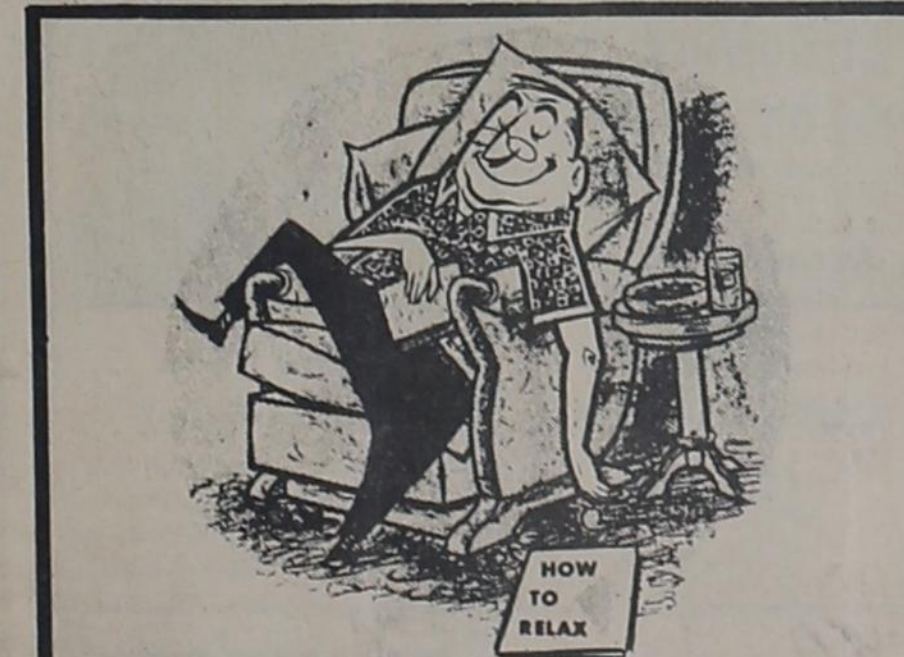
The Texico girls presented a skit, "Accepting the Challenge", with all members of the local organization participating.

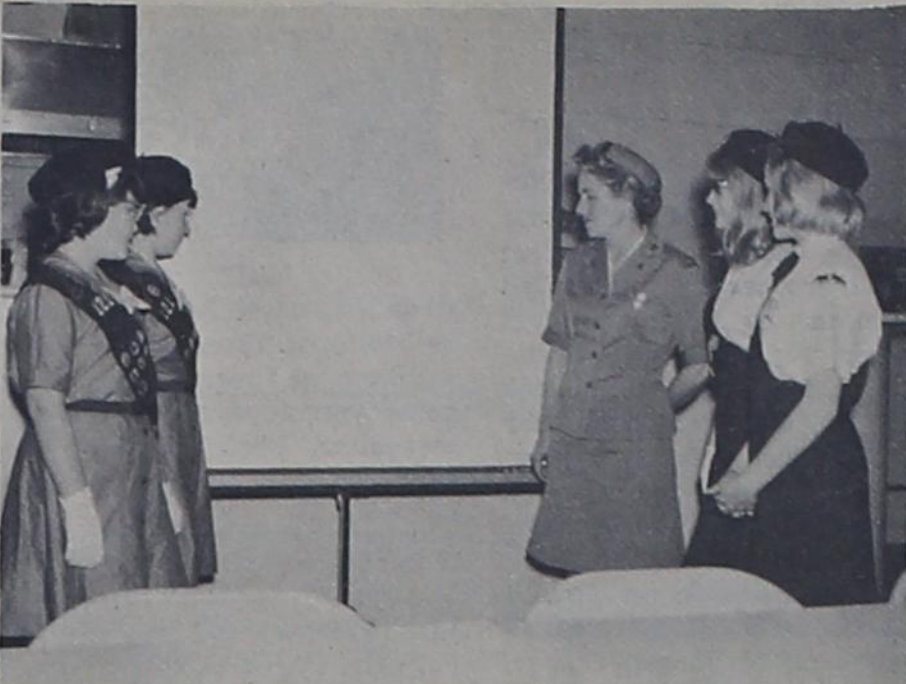

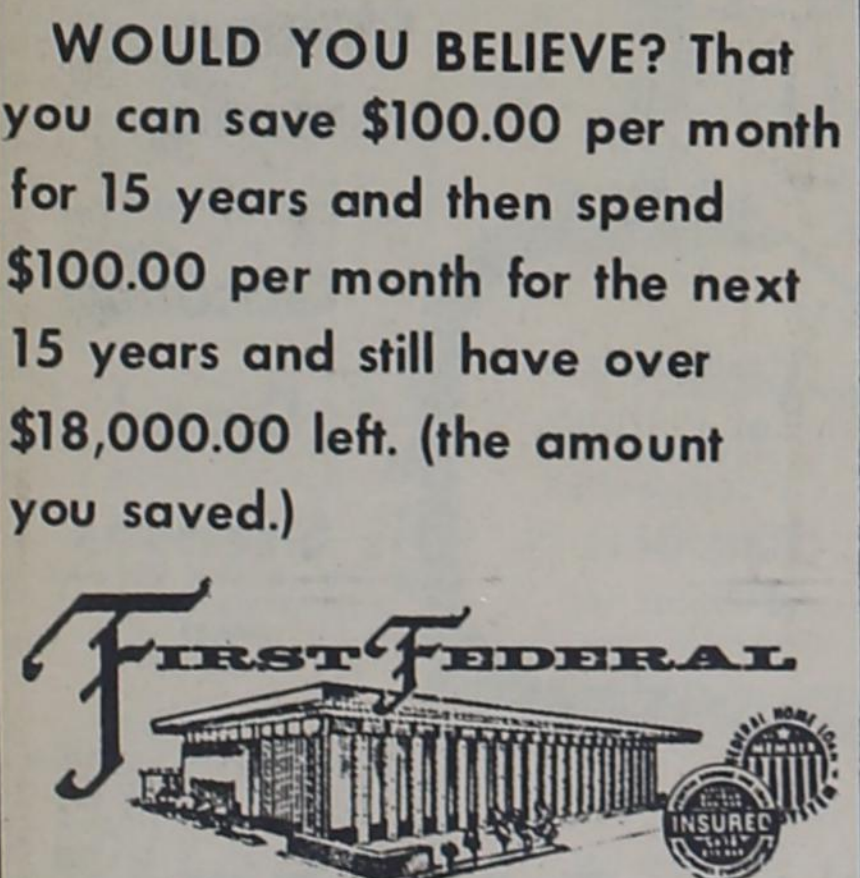


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Zadene Burris Bride Of John S. Hubbard

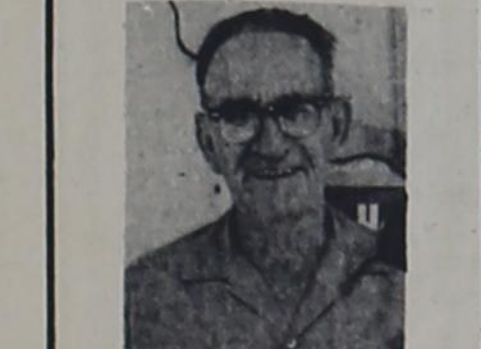

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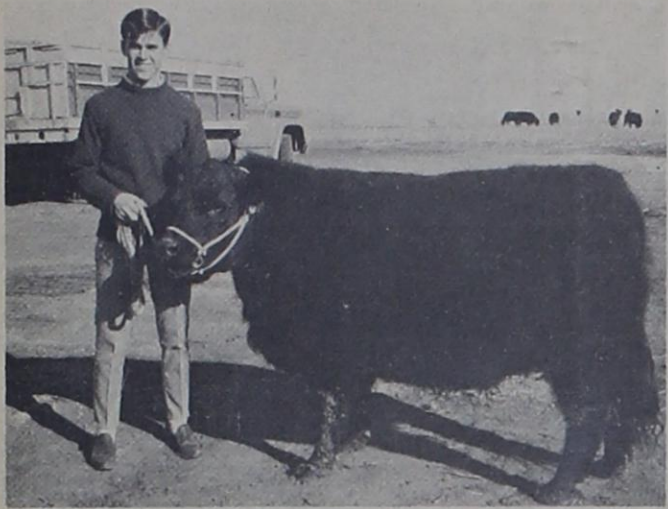

annual calf-scramble at the Houston Show last year. Sponsor for the purchase of the animal was Shell Oil Company. The animal was purchased by Keeth from Merrill Brigrance at Olton, early last April, for a sum of \$250. Keeth states that since that time he has fed the

On The Farm In Palmer County

This study, under the supervision of the Bushland Experiment Station, was conducted on an Amarillo Fine Sandy Loam soil. Donald Christian was the cooperor on this test. The farm is located one and one-half miles north of Lariat.

In this test, a comparison was made of yields from different time of applications of nitrogen under the two irrigation systems.

Visual differences between farrow and sprinkler irrigation observed in the field were not reflected in the yield. There appears to be no consistent differences between the two methods used in this study.

The check plot under the sprinkler method yielded 3140 lbs. compared to 3220 lbs. under the furrow method. Where all of the nitrogen was applied preplant under the sprinkler

method the highest yield of 5440 lbs. was made from a 120-80-0 application. A high yield of 6360 lbs. was made from an 80-80-0 application with half of the nitrogen put on preplant and half sidedressed. The highest yield of 5180 was received from a 160-80-0 application under the furrow method.

Based on these data, the advantage of split applications over all-preplant appears to be due to something other than correcting losses due to leaching, according to Wendell Robertson, research associate at Bushland.

H. D. Agent Gives Sewing Tips

Good-looking garments made at home from durable press fabrics begin with a careful choice of patterns and adjustments in certain construction techniques, according to Palmer County Home Demonstration Agent, Cricket B. Taylor.

Observe these pointers when sewing with durable press fabrics:

Use a pattern with straight lines, a minimum number of seams, and few details. Avoid fullness in sleeves and other shaped areas because it cannot be steamed or pressed out.

Mercerized cotton, nylon, polyester or "polyester core" thread may be used. Zippers, and interfacing should be pre-shrunk. Tape, interfacing and linings should have similar qualities as the garment fabric.

Avoid seam puckering by relaxing stitch tension on both spool and bobbin feed to minimize puckering.

As with all fabrics, press during construction with a hot iron, first trying out temperature on a test swatch.
