13 DIE WHEN FIRE WRECKS HOME

TOLL IN BLAST  
NOW FORTY AS  
PROBE DEEPENS

ONE OF VICTIMS HELD  
RESPONSIBLE UNDER  
PRESENT THEORY

(By Associated Press)  
WEST PLAINS, Mo., Apr. 16.—Revenge and financial troubles were two motives advanced today by prosecuting attorney Green as he pressed his investigation into the cause of the explosion that destroyed a dance hall here last week, killing thirteen persons.

Green suggested that J. M. Wiser, who rented a garage below the hall, may have been responsible for the blast, either because of announced views against dancing because financial troubles may have led him to suicide. Wiser, a churchman, was killed in the explosion. He had not expressed his opinion of his hatred in dancing here, but at his former home in Alton, Mo. he was known to oppose it.

Might Be Accidental  
The prosecutor pointed out also that so far as direct evidence shows, the explosion might have been caused accidentally. He is confident, however, that it was not caused by gasoline fumes, as at first supposed.

Wiser's body, which was exhumed yesterday shortly after burial, was found to have been caused by a bullet. These, said Green, had resulted while handling dynamite.

Green said he had witnesses ready to testify that Wiser was in the hall twenty minutes before the explosion.

DATE SET FOR DUMAS HEARING

THREE MEXICANS  
FACE PRO COUNT  
FOLLOWING RAID

Venancio Rubio, F. A. Dominguez and Joe Cox, Mexicans are in the Lubbock county jail, charged with the possession and sale of liquor and seven other Mexicans are their co-defendants, charged with drunkenness as a result of a series of raids made by Deputy Sheriff Vernice Ford, Deputy Capt. Moore and John C. Kellar, state officer, on residences in "Little Juarez," the Mexican colony of the city, late Saturday night.

Rubio and Dominguez are charged with the possession while Cox faces three counts of both sale and possession. Their bonds were set by Justice of the Peace C. L. Scott at \$1,000 each. Cox's being \$3,000. The seven other Mexicans were assessed fines of \$16.85 each.

Various and sundry bottles and kegs of beer were either confiscated or destroyed by the officers during the raids. Three different houses were visited in their raids.

Up until noon today, none of the men had made bond although one had paid his fine of \$16.85 and was released.

SUSPECT HELD  
IN RANKIN ROW  
DEMANDS BOND

HABEAS CORPUS PLEA  
TO BE FILED WITH  
RANKIN COURT

J. H. Dumas, of Lubbock, who is being held in Austin on charges of murder and conspiracy growing out of the fatal shooting of two men in an alleged attempted bank robbery in Rankin, Upton county, will be given a preliminary hearing in Rankin Wednesday, his attorney, Owen W. McWhorter, said today.

Mr. McWhorter planned to leave for Rankin this afternoon and announced that he would institute habeas corpus proceedings in an effort to free his client.

Was Arrested Here  
Dumas, who has lived in Lubbock for the past several years, was arrested here on April 7 by Sheriff H. L. Johnson, upon advice from an Upton county grand jury following his indictment. On Sunday, April 8, Rangers Aldrich and McCoy took him into custody, intimating that they would take him to Rankin. The Rangers did not take the prisoner to Rankin, however, but instead took him to the state capital, where he has been held ever since.

A second man, indicted upon the same charge by the Upton county grand jury, has not yet been apprehended. Both indictments followed testimony given by the grand jury by Ranger Captain Frank Hamer to the effect that "an organized murder ring, was operating in Texas to take advantage of the \$5,000 dead bank robbery reward, offered by the Texas Bankers association."

Neither Dumas or the second man indicted in the case are charged with the actual shooting of the alleged robbers. Attorney McWhorter said. The shooting was done by officers who were absolved of "frame-up" charges by the grand jury which indicted the two other men.

Dumas denies any connection with the shooting and the charges that he "framed" the robbery, or the shooting, according to Mr. McWhorter, formerly Lubbock county attorney, and his client will plead "not guilty" to the charges, he said.

The preliminary hearing at Rankin Wednesday will be held before Judge C. R. Sutton, of the 33rd Judicial district.

FINAL DETAILS TO BE

SMITH CAMPAIGN  
GETS UNDER WAY  
IN TEXAS TODAY

(By Associated Press)  
HOUSTON, April 16.—Supporters of the presidential candidacy of Governor Al Smith of New York were rallying to their leader's first militant action to win Texas votes for Smith at the Democratic National convention.

While repeating their resolve to fight for an unimpaired Texas delegation to the convention, the Smith forces put up T. W. Gregory, Houston lawyer and attorney general under Woodrow Wilson, as a candidate for delegate at large to the convention.

R. L. Henry, president of the Smith-for-President club here, announced that a statewide campaign in behalf of Mr. Gregory's candidacy would be launched immediately. It was, he said, an answer to statements by Col. Thomas H. Ball, at Huntsville Saturday, that he would serve as delegate at large only if the delegate was not one which would "take the responsibility at any time of nominating a candidate known not to be in sympathy with the 18th amendment or adequate laws to enforce it."

MOTHER AND SEVEN CHILDREN  
WITH FIVE MEN ARE TRAPPED  
AFTER WEDDING CELEBRATION

ALTOONA, Pa., Apr. 16.—Thirteen persons were burned to death at Blair Four, 20 miles south of here, early today when fire destroyed the home of Embro Krepachalk.

The dead include a mother, her six children, another daughter who had just married and five men who had gathered for a wedding in the home of Krepachalk, a quarryman. A daughter of the family was married Saturday. The bride and groom were among the dead. The cause of the fire was not determined.

Raps Newspapers

WASHINGTON.—Declaring he understood some newspaper had published or would publish the deposition of Albert B. Fall before it was introduced in the Sinclair trial, Justice Bailey today said he would consider such action as contempt of court and would take steps to mete out the necessary punishment. The Washington Herald, a Hearst publication, today published quotations purported to have come from the deposition taken at El Paso because Fall was too ill to come here to testify. Its transcription was finished today by M. H. Bull, El Paso commissioner who took the testimony.

Small Camp Settlement

Blair Four is a little quarry camp settlement a few miles outside Williamsburg. The house, a two story frame, burned rapidly, the only one to escape, being Embro Krepachalk, head of the family, who was on the first floor. The others, trapped on the second, were engulfed in the flames before they could get out. Coroner S. Rothrock is investigating the blaze.

One Killed, Eight Hurt In Big Blaze

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 16.—An unidentified man was killed and six other men and two women seriously injured today when fire destroyed the Tropicus hotel at South Carolina Avenue and the Boardwalk.

Ninety-eight persons were in the building.

The injured included Celia Boyland, of Jersey City, who was believed to have fractured her spine in a leap from the third floor into a firemen's net.

Briggs To Pampa

PAMPA, Tex.—George W. Briggs of Eastland has accepted an offer to become manager of the Pampa chamber of commerce, succeeding Scott Barcus, resigned. It was announced today. Mr. Briggs will take office about May 1.

SALINA, Kan.—Frank H. Dewese, 27, understudy of Richard Dix in the latter's picture "The Quarterback" and former room mate of Buddy Rogers at the University of Kansas, died in a hospital here last night following an operation for kidney.

Dale Case Ready

AUSTIN.—Both sides announced ready and jury selection was to begin Monday afternoon in the trial of former state Representative F. A. Dale on bribery charges for which he and former Representative H. H. Moore were expelled from the house of the 40th legislature.

Prisoners Escape

CORISCANA, Tex.—Seven prisoners, one of them being C. C. Howe, convicted of robbing a bank at Richmond, Texas, escaped from the Navarro county jail this afternoon. When E. W. Warnell of the sheriff's office entered the part of the jail where the prisoners were he was attacked and his pistol taken from him. He was hit over the head with the butt of the pistol and his keys taken. The prisoners then trooped out. A couple in which a man and woman were riding past the jail was stopped and they were compelled to get out. The escaping prisoners took the car.

Houston Promoter Is Given Two Years

HOUSTON, April 16.—C. C. Cannan, Houston oil promoter, Monday was sentenced to serve two years in Leavenworth penitentiary by Federal Judge J. C. Hutchinson on his plea of guilty on charges of using the mails to defraud.

In addition to the two year sentence, Judge Hutchinson levied a sentence of five years, suspended for five years, to run concurrently, and a fine of \$1,000.

Cannan was indicted December 19, 1927. The government charged that in 1924 he promoted the sale of securities on a 20 payment plan and that the securities were not purchased when orders were received.

One Dies, One Hurt As Train Hits Car

JEFFERSON, Texas, April 16.—Alex Wilson, 29, was killed and Freeman Ayres, was injured severely when their automobile was struck by the East bound Texas and Pacific Sunshine Special here last night.

Wilson was a barber here, and is survived by his widow and two small children. Ayres lives at Linden, near here.

Hamer Declines To Address Officers

AUSTIN, April 16.—Ranger captain Frank Hamer will be constrained, it was learned today, to decline with thanks an invitation to address East Texas peace officers meeting May 1 and 2 in Marshall, which the "Murder and reward ring" which he charged was "discovered" by the state bankers' association and rewarded for dead bank robbers.

The captain, after promising to "at his hat" if he didn't substantiate the allegations, went before Upton county grand jury. Shortly afterward, that body indicted two men on murder and conspiracy to murder charges in connection with the killing of two men at Rankin alleged bank robbers.

Search Abandoned For Accused Robber

SAN ANTONIO, April 16.—Search for a man alleged to have had a part in the robbery of a bank at Attala, Alabama, was abandoned yesterday after officers had spent several days scouring the west of here near Boerne, Texas.

The alleged bandit escaped in a car after a gun battle last week and is supposed to have hidden out in the hills. A companion was captured.

Heavy Replanting Occasioned By Cold

DALLAS, April 16.—Approximately 15,000 acres of cotton planted in Dallas county this year must be replanted, A. B. Jolley, county agent and manager of the chamber of commerce agricultural division, insisted today.

A portion of this cotton was damaged by snow and sleet last Saturday, Mr. Jolley said.

OFFICER SLAIN

EXPRESS COMPANY CAR  
ROBBED OF THREE  
SAFES IN TOLEDO

TOLEDO, Ohio, April 16.—A band of robbers who held up an American Express truck at the union station here today and escaped with two strong boxes and later, during a gun battle with police, killed patrolman George Zientara, failed to get any loot, express company officials announced today.

Officials said a check up showed the robbers secured only two strong boxes and not three as at first reported.

TWO HELD FOR  
BRUTAL DEATH  
OF WEST TEXAN

BODY IS FOUND UNDER  
HIGHWAY BRIDGE AT  
COLORADO SUNDAY

COLORADO, Texas, April 16.—A negro and a white man were held in jail at Sweetwater today in connection with the slaying of Ernest Hardin, 42, farmer, whose body was found below a highway bridge here yesterday.

The body was discovered by boys fishing in the creek. His skull was crushed by a blunt instrument. There were three knife wounds on his body. Indications were that the man had been thrown from an automobile. A trail of blood led from the road to the edge of the embankment.

Had \$30 On Person  
Jim Hardin, a brother of the dead man, said that the murdered man had about \$30 on his person, none of which was found on the body. He is survived by a widow and six children.

Building Permits

Officers of Louisiana and Nearby States Hunt Bank Robber and Hold Up Man After Prison Farm Break

(By Associated Press)  
BATON ROUGE, La., April 16.—Police in this and nearby states today were on the lookout for Cleveland F. Owen, bank robber and hold up man who escaped from the Angola prison farm near here some time Saturday night by sawing his way through the bars. An investigation has been ordered in an effort to determine how Owen obtained saws and gained his freedom from the prison grounds.

With the famous New Orleans convict, who in a confession attributed to him by police shortly after his conviction for shooting with intent to kill a New Orleans policeman, said he staged holdups by night when by day he was known as a respectable contractor, went J. C. Anderson, convicted of larceny in Caddo parish.

Owen's criminal career is one of the most spectacular in Louisiana criminal annals. It was while he had the contract for construction of the Baptist hospital and the city park swimming pool at New Orleans that he was convicted and sentenced to prison for from 14 to 21 years for attempting the life of policemen who sought to arrest him. Among holdups attributed to him are those of a New Orleans branch bank, several drug and grocery stores and a Fort Worth, Texas, bank, the latter robbery being reported to have netted him \$9,000.

Owen is on his third escape from penal institutions. He escaped from the Texas prison at Huntsville following his conviction in connection with the Fort Worth holdup. After his conviction in the attempted murder charge, he escaped from Angola farm and was captured last October.

(Abbreviations: A—ace; K—king; Q—queen; J—jack; X—any card lower than 10.)

1. First hand bids one spade. Second hand passes. What should third hand bid when holding: diamonds—X X X; hearts—X X X; spades—X X; clubs—A X X X X?

2. First hand bids one spade. Second hand passes. What should third hand bid holding: spades—A X; hearts—X X; diamonds—K X; clubs—Q J X X X X?

3. Hearts are trumps. Seven cards, diamonds and trumps, have already been played and opponents' trumps have been exhausted. The declarer now holds: spades—X; hearts—X; clubs—X X X; diamonds—X. Dummy holds spades—K, Q, J; 10; clubs—A, X. Now should the declarer play?

2. Pass.

### MILAN'S BOMB BLAST AND PEACE TREATY ALSO STAND OUT

Germany and Ireland joining forces in a German plane, the Bremen, have achieved the hitherto impossible. Two German aviators, Captain Hermann Koehl and Baron Gunther von Huenefeld, with Commandant E. Fitzmaurice, during a crossing of the Atlantic ocean from Baldonnel, in Ireland, to Greenly Island, Canadian territory, in the straits of Belle Isle—the first heavier than air machine to make the westward passage.

**French Land Airman**  
While nothing loath to pay tribute to the Europe-to-America pioneers, the people of Paris are served most of their rejoicing over the safe return to Le Bourget field of their new national heroes, Cossu and Lebrun, who completed a 35,000 mile air tour around the world. The French fliers occupied six months in their expedition, but made the light flight from Tokyo to Paris, with stops on the way in six days.

**King Victor Emmanuel of Italy** narrowly escaped injury or death in a bomb explosion at Milan. The bomb, considered in some quarters as an act of terrorism and in others as an attempt against the King, was timed to explode about the moment the monarch would pass a given point on his way to open the Milan industrial fair. He was delayed, however, and the infernal machine was detonated before the nearly a score of spectators were royal procession reached that point killed and forty injured.

**Demonstrations Follow**  
Great demonstrations of loyalty to the King followed and the government, represented by Mussolini and his ministers, set about immediately to run down those responsible at the same time emphasizing the cooperation between the royal house and the fascist government.

Six great powers have now in their hands the pact for non-aggression negotiated between Secretary Kellogg and Aristide Briand. In addition to the United States and France, Great Britain, Germany, Italy and Japan have the text of the proposed single multilateral treaty, which is to be given due consideration.

Japan is concerned over the spread of communism in that country. The government took active measures last week to suppress the movement by the arrest of hundreds of agitators. In China also communists continued their campaign. There has been many executions of these agitators by the Chinese authorities.

**Revolt in Caracas**  
In Caracas a revolt by a battalion stationed in the presidential palace was put down with the loss of only a few lives. Venezuela is preparing for an election, and this riot was the climax of disturbances carried on for the past few months by the students of the university, but until last week without military support.

Henry Ford in London expressed the belief that England would be an excellent central point for the further development of the automobile industry.

### Northwest Held In Icy Winter's Grip

MINNEAPOLIS, April 16.—The winter which failed to keep a day with the temperate zone last December 21 and then dropped around to overlap an appointment their spring, continued today to cause inconvenience in the northwest.

There are a number of reasons why Tom Heeneey was selected as the opponent for Gene Tunney in the next heavyweight championship fight, but the big reason and the compelling one was that Tunney insisted upon his choice.

There were other angles that contributed to Tex Rickard's decision to give the air to the other challenger and select Heeneey. He is a big fellow, he has a creditable record and he has that international that if it is not actually color, that Rickard may be able to dash up into a good advertising picture.

Heeneey also is honest. No one doubts his purpose or questions his motives and enter all one talk of a "fixed fight" in which he won the championship. Tunney would see to have a man in there beyond reproach.

The big thing which influenced the selection of Heeneey, however, was the conviction of the championing Heeneey than he would, for instance, be a better fighter in beat-down in beating Johnny Risko at Paulina.

Gene Sure To Win  
Tunney, even though he has boxed only 10 rounds in almost two years, should have no trouble in winning from Heeneey on points. He won't knock him out, you can bet on that. Winning on points is an unsatisfactory performance for a heavyweight champion in defense of his crown, but Tunney is used to it and he may be educating the public away from the idea that a champion ought to "order" his man.

Heeneey is built for the championship. A big, slow fellow who picks into his men. A boxer without much of a punch. A stand-up fellow who follows every orthodox move of boxing. After one or two rounds in which Tunney can size him up in safety, he ought to be safe to make the fight his way for the rest of the distance. Tunney likes to coast along and size up his men before he goes to work on them.

The boxing of Gene Dempsey was a disgraceful affair. Gene can tell you, but with Heeneey the process should not be enough to draw more than a healthy pink to the cheeks of his classic countenance.

With Risko or Paulino it would be different. It would be of no benefit to apply scientific analysis to their styles.

Because Risko and Paulino have a way of setting themselves for what a blind man would expect to be the delivery of a right-hand punch and then deliver a left-hand swing to the belly or to any spot above the chin, or below the knees.

Heeneey Suits Gene  
Tunney, if he is as good as he seemed to be against Dempsey, winning the 14 seconds he was on the floor, ought to beat Risko or Paulino, but he would be roughed up considerably and he does not choose to be cuffed around in the presence of his distinguished friends.

If the fight is staged in New York it will have to be 15 rounds, and that may be to Tunney's liking as

## HOUSTON HALL FOR DEMOS IS GIANT AFFAIR

### CLEAR VIEW ALLOWED BY CONSTRUCTION MINUS PILLARS

HOUSTON, April 16—A peculiar type of construction, a German invention, makes it possible for builders to put up an expansive convention hall in anticipation of the Democratic gathering here in June without a single pillar obstructing the view of the delegates and alternates.

Only a single row of pillars on each side of the main hall, however, will divide the delegates from the spectators in side wings. There will be no cumbersome beams or massive girders to hold up the roof of this unique building. Yet the main hall will extend over a width of 120 feet and a length of 326 feet.

Roof Is Wooden Network  
Despite the lack of pillars and girders, not a beam in the roof is more than 12 feet long! The secret of this unsupported roof construction lies in the net-like formation of the 12-foot beams. It is called a lamella type of roof and has been proved successful in Europe as well as America.

Houston civic leaders had been puzzled as to how they could rush the construction of a suitable building in time to accommodate the thousands of delegates and others at the June convention. They decided on wood as the most suitable material, especially since Houston is in the heart of the Texas timber belt.

But always the problem of the roof got in the way. Wood seemed to mean a series of roof arches, trusses and pillars, making a hall cluttered with pillars and braces and blocking vision from all angles.

Will Seat 20,000  
The lamella-type of roof, however, obviates this disadvantage. Here was a type of room that afforded a main hall 120 feet wide and, with the addition of a row of columns on each side, permitted the building of two more pillars, means each 76 feet wide. Thus 20,000 people could be accommodated in a large hall with only two rows of pillars.

Stresses and strains were checked, and the lamella arch was decided upon.

This is built of a series of specially cut boards of runners three inches thick, 14 inches wide and 12 feet long, each runner bolted at either end to the middle of other runners, and itself having runners bolted to its middle. The resulting form is a net-like arch of firm construction.

Standard steel bolts and nuts are used, but special spring washers are imbedded in the timbers to allow for the expansion or contraction of the lumber.

Where a low-pitched roof is desired, the thrust of the roof is taken up by small steel tie-rods running from wall to wall. With a high-pitched roof, wood bents or concrete piers take up the roof thrust.

The lamella making up the roof are cut from Texas long leaf pine. The auditorium it is believed will stand for many years.

## "PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN PORTRAITS"

## "PLAIN" MR. HOOVER

The War Gave Hoover Job  
Of Serving Humanity

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third of four articles describing Secretary of Commerce Hoover, and the sixth of a series of Presidential Campaign Portraits written for The Journal and NEA Service by Robert Talley. The final article on Mr. Hoover will appear Tuesday.

WASHINGTON, April 16. The World War shifted the course of nations and, likewise, it changed the whole course of Herbert Hoover's life.

As an organizer and relief director he fed the starving multitudes of Belgium and France, not with loaves and fishes but with \$1,400,000 that his semi-official commission raised in America and other countries. As U. S. food administrator in 1917, he introduced "Meatless Tuesdays" and "Wheatless Wednesdays" to a nation of 20,000,000 people who had never been used to dictation—and made them like it.

The war work of this man, now a presidential candidate, stands out as one of the greatest individual achievements in the history of the world.

The outbreak of the war in 1914 found Herbert Hoover in London, one of the highest paid mining engineers in the world and well on his way toward the amassing of tremendous wealth. When the armies of Europe swung into action, that part of Hoover's life ended and a new epoch in his career began—an epoch that was to carry him to world-wide service and world fame.

In the early days of August, there were 150,000 Americans, bound bound, stranded in London. Gold disappeared from circulation; checks, drafts, and letters credit suddenly lost their value. The American consulate was swamped with appeals for aid.

Hoover plunged into this situation with fellow Americans living in London. He raised \$250,000 for loans. The American embassy got \$200,000 more from Washington. Soon the stranded wanderers were safely on their way home.

That job was only a prelude. Hoover, overrun by German armies, was in grave danger of starvation. An American living in Brussels went to London and appealed to Hoover for aid. At the same time the Belgian ambassador in London appealed to the American ambassador, who likewise suggested Hoover. Hoover accepted; he checked his private business affairs and went to work for humanity.

By October, 1914, he had a skeleton organization set up and receiving contributions, well on the way toward the gigantic task of feeding 10,000,000 hungry people. Then he appealed to the allied governments and enlisted their contributions. Before long the Belgian Relief Commission was spending \$17,000 a month, \$10,000,000 of which came from France and England and the rest from private contributors, mostly in the United States. The commission had a fleet of 70 cargo ships, flew its own flag, issued its own passports and maintained an organization of 50,000 workers in Belgium and occupied France.

In those days, Hoover was the man in the world who could come and go wherever he pleased, without asking anyone's permission, even through the German lines.

It was a tremendous job. Hoover, after the war, admitted it. "There was never a time," he said, "when our finances were certain for 60 days ahead, or when our contracts did not exceed our assets by anywhere from \$5,000,000 to \$20,000,000."

In its four years of existence, Hoover's commission spent upwards of \$1,400,000,000. The administration expense never averaged more than one-half of one per cent.

The record that he had made in Belgium caused President Wilson, in 1917, to summon Hoover to Washington to become food administrator of the United States. Food was needed for the allies and needed badly; the Argentine wheat crop of 1917 had failed and with it went a loss of 200,000,000 potential bushels. Sinking of cargo ships and submarines complicated the problem.

So there came that well-remembered period when posters, newspapers and magazine dinned the American ear on every hand that food must not be wasted; when it was drilled into children in the schools, hurled at theater audiences by four-minute speakers, preached from the pulpits by pastors. There were "Meatless Tuesdays," "Wheatless Wednesdays" and the like. And directing all this great work of organization was a man who sat at a desk in Washington and occasionally went in the late afternoon to build up his two boys in the tiny teams of Rock Creek park.

Well, it worked. The 200,000,000 bushels, saved at American prices, went forward for export according to schedule. Countless Atlantic and the flow continued her cargoes of food followed across the Atlantic until the war ended.

The war came to a close, but Hoover's job did not. Instead he had even bigger task. The war left Europe practically bankrupt, without food and without money. Countless millions were facing starvation in the general chaos of disorganized misery that marked the wake of the great

conflict. Much of Europe tottered on the edge of bolshevism and ruin.

A man was needed—a man who was equal to the gigantic task—and that man was Hoover. And so President Wilson sent him to Europe to head the newly-organized Allied Relief Administration.

Poland, Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Finland, Lithuania, Latvia and Armenia with their starving multitudes came under Hoover's wing. For more than a year Hoover's wielded more power in Europe than any man on earth.

The rest of that story is history. It is a story of six hundred million dollars spent for supplies, of ports being re-opened and railroads restored, of the resumption of industry in factories, of the return to agriculture and always the grim fight against diseases. Once typhus reared its ghastly head in Eastern Europe and claimed 800,000 cases, but an organized campaign succeeded in reducing this to 10,000 cases in six months.

There were difficulties to be met and obstacles to be overcome. Vienna was starving. The Italians had tried to send food but the trains had been blocked at the frontier. Red tape prevented. Up came a train of American food in charge of two American doughboys. This train went ahead and on into Vienna—with one of the doughboys holding a pistol against a protesting official's head. Maybe that has something to do with the fact that today Hoover holds a gold medal presented by the University of Vienna and inscribed "In Recognition of Humanitarian Service."

There was another day when a revolution flared in Montenegro. Some of Hoover's officers hopped into their motorcycles with sidecars and dashed off to meet the armed rebels, who were advancing on the town. Presently they came back, their sidecars loaded with weapons.

"We traded hams for guns," they explained.

In 1926, Hoover returned to the United States on the crest of world-wide fame and admiration. A popular demand arose for his election to the presidency but, not being a politician, he muffed it by being unable to decide whether he was a Republican or a Democrat. He finally announced himself as a Republican, but his indecision had killed his chances with both parties.

President Harding appointed Hoover as secretary of commerce, then a comparatively unimportant post, but almost immediately Hoover began making a big job out of a little one. He needed more trained assistants, and being unable to afford them out of his appropriation from Congress, he hired them and paid them out of his own pockets—which he still does today.

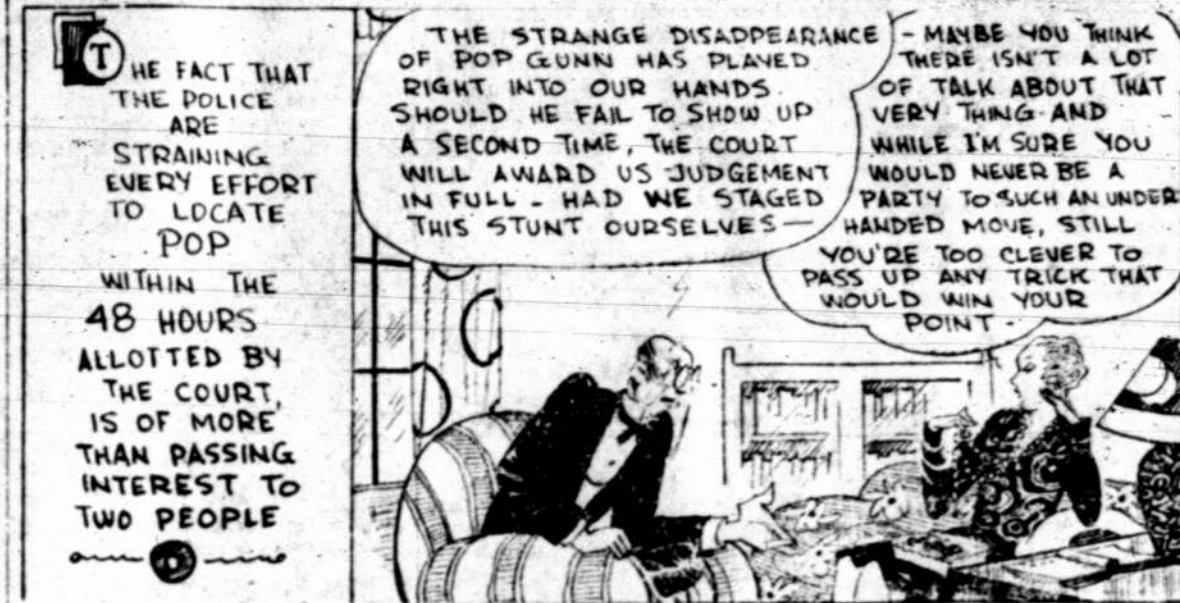

## GREATEST IRRIGATION PROJECT IN HISTORY PLANNED IN DRY COLUMBIA BASIN, GIANT DESERT IN WASHINGTON

SPOKANE, Wash., April 16.—The greatest irrigation project in history which would make fertile farmland out of a desert nearly as large as the state of Connecticut, provide support for 500,000 people and add \$600,000,000 in taxable wealth to the nation is being planned for the Columbia river basin, near here.

The Columbia basin is a vast tract of land, now dry, barren and useless, which lies in the fork of the Columbia and Snake rivers and embraces upwards of 3,000,000 acres. During the past few decades hundreds of people have made futile attempts to homestead portions of it; but in its present condition the land is practically worthless.

Now, however, farmers, bankers and business men throughout the northwest have united in an organization, which plans to turn this desert into a garden spot by means of irrigation.

South and east of Albany, Idaho, 134 miles away from the Columbia basin project, is the point on the Pend Oreille river where it is planned to start a huge canal to carry enough water to irrigate the major portion of the desert. The melting snows from the mountains would be captured and put to work.

And now outlined, this canal would go through 34 miles of tunnels, 40 miles of natural lakes and 90 miles of open canal, which would be 47 feet wide on the bottom, 90 feet wide on the top and 21 feet deep. The water would flow by gravity, although it is believed huge pumping stations would be necessary at some points.

Land Fertile if Watered  
Soil in the basin is certain to be fertile if it can be watered. The altitude ranges from 500 to 1700 feet, the climate is mild, with long, dry summers. Irrigated experimental

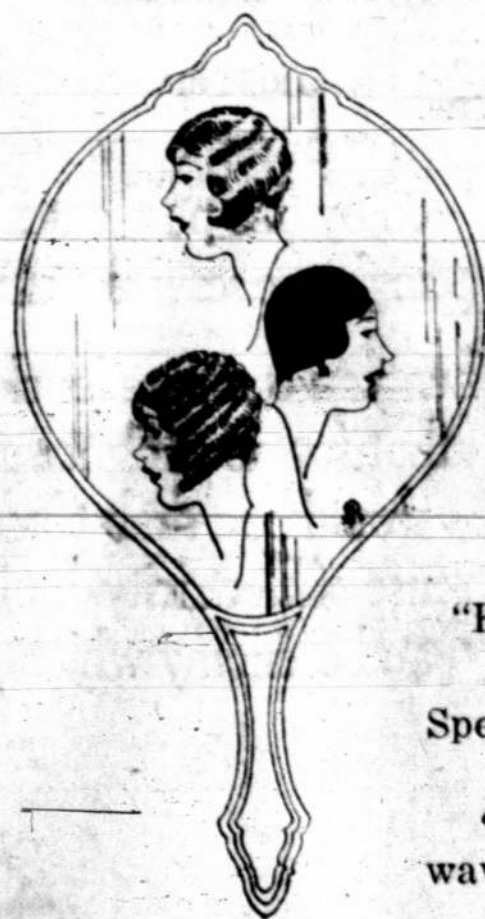

## BETTER MUSIC STUDY COURSE SESSION TOPIC

## COORDINATION PLAN IS TO BE DISCUSSED AT AMARILLO

(By Associated Press)

AMARILLO, April 16.—Coordination of music courses in Texas schools and general encouragement for musical education in this state will be discussed at the 13th annual convention of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs meeting here April 16-19. The program was announced by Mrs. Howard Gardner, program chairman, of Beaumont.

## Educational Subjects

One entire day will be devoted to educational subjects. It will be Wednesday, April 18, and the principal address of the day will be on "Organization of Musical Education in Texas," by William E. Jones, president of the Music Teachers' Association of Texas. Mrs. James L. Price of Dallas, president of the federation will preside over the educational program, which will open at 9 a. m. with the federation hymn sung by all delegates.

The formal opening of the convention will be on Tuesday, April 17. On the preceding day there will be a number of preliminary events, including the district president's council meeting in the morning, executive board meeting in the afternoon, a dinner complimentary to the executive board in the early evening

and the observance of president's evening later.

An unusual feature of the president's evening will be the presence as honor guests of the presidents of music federations in New Mexico and Colorado. Other honor guests will be the president of the Music Teachers' Association of Texas, the president of the Southwest Chautauque, and national, state and district officers of the federation.

## Past President to Attend

Mrs. John F. Lyons, past president of the National Federation of Music Clubs, past president of the Texas state federation, and now a national board member, will be among those extending greetings. The first session of the convention proper will be devoted to reports of committees and officers, and descriptions of the work in various districts. A junior session, devoted to music among children, will be held the afternoon of April 17. That night May Peterson of Amarillo, concert artist, and former grand opera star, will sing, and a woman's club reception will follow.

## \$100 Prize Is Offered

A prize of \$100 will be awarded on the afternoon of April 18 to the best chorus of women's voices. On the same afternoon a twilight organ recital will be given in the First Presbyterian church by Miss Katherine Hammons of Dallas and W. J. Marsh of Fort Worth. Wednesday night there will be a program by the Texas Composers' organization. The last day will be devoted to business and the adjournment will be followed by a trip to Canyon visit to West Texas State Teachers' college, and a drive through Palo Duro canyon.

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# ITALIANS LAND IN GERMANY ON DIRIGIBLE TEST

PLAN EXPLORING TRIP TO POLAR REGIONS IN BIG SHIP

(By Associated Press)  
STOLP, Pomerania, Germany, April 16—General Umberto Nobile brought his dirigible Italia through a night of head winds and electrical storms landing at Seddin air-drome, six miles from here this morning.

The Italian airship with which he hopes to explore north polar regions landed at Seddin at 8:35 a. m. and was immediately placed in the hangar. It had taken the craft thirty hours and 40 minutes to come from Milan, which is about 600 miles from here by air.

Nineteen persons were on the ship.

**Ship Little Damaged.**  
Apparently the only damage suffered by the ship was the tearing of the left stabilizer.

When the gondola touched the ground, General Nobile stood at the door of the cabin and beside him his shivering mascot Titania, the dog which flew over the North Pole with him in the Norge. Nobile stepped out and was heartily cheered by the spectators.

"We had a terrible storm over the Carpathian mountains," General Nobile told the Associated Press correspondent, "and I am exceedingly proud of the Italia. I am quite confident the North Pole expedition will be a success."

During their stay here the Italians will be guests of the German government. The expedition will pay only for supplies which they will carry into the north when the Italia sets out for King's Bay, Spitzbergen, where the vessel Citta D. Milano will serve as a mobile base.

**Hangar Overhauled.**  
The hangar at Seddin was completely overhauled at the expense of the German government. A supply of hydrogen gas and benzine has been installed for the use of the dirigible.

General Nobile has made arrangements to stay in the polar regions the remainder of spring and the larger part of the summer, op-

# WAYLAND PAYS HEAVY DEBT IN BIG CAMPAIGN

PLAINVIEW SCHOOL IS NOW CLEAR; PLAN FOR ENDOWMENT MADE

PLAINVIEW, April 16—Those interested in the future of Wayland college are rejoicing in the announcement made the past week by Frank Day, president of the board of trustees, that the college is free of debt. The declaration follows a campaign for funds that has been waged in Plainview by the Chamber of Commerce represented by A. G. Hinn and R. H. Knoohuisen.

Wayland opened school last fall under the burden of a \$42,500 debt and facing a gloomy future. Today it is free of debt and according to A. B. DeLoach, college accountant, will open next fall with the brightest future the institution has ever known.

**Plainview Meets Quota.**

Several months ago a proposition was made whereby Wayland college would receive \$10,000 from a group of Amarillo citizens, \$7,500 from the State Baptist Convention, \$10,000 from Plainview Baptists if the citizens of Plainview would contribute \$15,000. Plainview met its quota last week and all debts were paid in full.

Mr. Day stated that members of the board of trustees working through the chamber of commerce had found more friendly feeling and cooperative spirit existing toward Wayland and among citizens of Plainview at this time than at any previous period in the existence of the college. Baptists over the Panhandle have become interested in the institution and criticism has been turned to praise. This fact points toward an increased enrollment next fall.

**Endowment Is Goal.**  
A \$200,000 endowment is now the goal of the board of trustees. An Amarillo man, who is interested in the college has offered \$25,000 to apply on the proposed endowment and other individuals have intimated that they will be interested in aiding the board to procure the desired amount.
