ONE KILLED IN TRAIN HOLD UP

(By Associated Press)
EBENSBURG, Pa., Oct. 11.—James Garman, railway express guard was killed and two bandits escaped with \$33,000 pay-roll of the Ebensburg Coal Company today, when the bandits held up a train on the Cambria, Indiana, railroad, about three miles from this town.

Officers are pursuing the bandits, but have no definite trail to follow.

AIRSHIP HELD FOR REPAIRS

SAN DIEGO, Oct. 11.—Because the rear cabin was smashed while the Shenandoah was being moored last night after completing her transcontinental flight, necessitating some repairs to the big dirigible, the ship will probably stay at her mooring mast at North Island today, according to a message from the flying field.

THREE BANDITS HELD IN ATTEMPT TO ROB BANK

PAWHUSKA, Okla., Oct. 11.—An attempted robbery of the First National Bank at Shidler, Oklahoma, was frustrated today after a gun battle in which two of the three bandits were wounded and all three captured.

The bandits, who had entered the bank soon after the institution had opened for the day, overpowered three employees who were in the bank at the time, and were engaged in looting the institution when they were observed by persons passing the bank. The parties gave the alarm and citizens rushed to the bank and opened fire on the bandits with the above results.

COOLIDGE IS AGAINST KLAN

WASHINGTON, October 11.—President Coolidge's attitude toward the Ku Klux Klan has long been known to those who are in touch with him. Bascom Slemph, private secretary to the president, wrote in a recent letter to James Beery, of Indianapolis, Beery had inquired of Slemph concerning his recent statement that the president has repeatedly stated he is not a member of the Klan and is not in sympathy with its aims and purposes.

WILL NOT APPEAL IN PICTURE SHOW CASE

District Judge Woodward arrived here Saturday at noon to enter a judgment in the picture show suit and to sign up the minutes and close the fall term of district court. While in session only two or three days out of each week, court has been grinding for four weeks.

It was announced at the close of court Saturday that the plaintiff in the picture show suit would accept the verdict of the court, no motion being filed for a new hearing nor notice of appeal given.

AIRSHIP TRIP TO U. S. IS DELAYED

FRIEDRICH, Germany, Oct. 11.—The beginning of the flight of the Zeppelin ZR-3 to America has been postponed until tomorrow. In explaining why the start was postponed it was announced that the low-lifting power of the air made satisfactory ascent impossible without unloading ballast and gasoline.

The Zeppelin will fly across the Atlantic and be delivered to the United States government.

FARMER DROPS DEAD AT WINTERS

WINTERS, Oct. 11.—G. W. Reinhart, age about 55 years, died suddenly here this morning. Mr. Reinhart lived Northwest of Winters in what is known as the Drasco community. He came to town this morning to transact business and walked into a barber shop to get a shave, and was laughing and talking to friends when he was stricken dead.

Deceased was a widower, and had been living in this part of the county for several years.

YEATS HEARING DRAWS CROWD

NOWATA, Okla., Oct. 11.—A. W. Fields, father of the girl with whom Joseph E. Yeats eloped, had to be restrained by the county attorney and sheriff from leaving the witness stand and attacking E. J. Giddings, an Oklahoma City attorney, when Giddings asked Fields if he would not have given his consent to the marriage of his daughter to Yeats, if Yeats had asked him. Fields started to rise up from the witness stand, but was restrained by officers who were nearby.

Yeats was arraigned for preliminary hearing yesterday, and entered a plea of not guilty. County Judge W. H. Thomason, before whom the hearing is being held, began hearing evidence in the case. The father of the 14-year-old Georgia Fields was the first witness to take the stand. He related the circumstances leading up to the elopement of his daughter with the minister, saying that the family had considered Yeats as their pastor, and the minister had been given the freedom of the Fields home. The father of the girl also narrated the flight of the man with his daughter, and told of finding his girl in the custody of the officers at Ballinger, Texas, where Yeats was arrested.

The mother of the girl was also placed on the witness stand, and Ralph Magnus, a 14-year-old friend of the girl, testified that he delivered a note from Yeats to the parents of the girl. The note told of the departure of the man and the girl, and the boy said he did not deliver it until 4:00 o'clock of the next day after the couple left, as he was instructed by Yeats not to deliver it until then.

The hearing is being held in the district court room, and the court room was jammed to the doors when the trial opened. Two officers who brought the prisoner into court had to enter the room through a side door on account of the crowd filling the hall leading into the court room.

Georgia Fields had not been placed on the stand when court recessed for the day, but at a conference with the county attorney preceding the trial she maintained that Yeats performed their marriage ceremony, and stands steady.

8 KILLED IN MEXICAN HOLDUP AND WRECK

(By Associated Press)

EL PASO, Oct. 11.—B. F. Barker, of El Paso, auditor of the Erupcion Mining Company, and eight other men were lined up and shot to death Thursday by bandits who wrecked a freight train on the Chihuahua & Orient Railway 41 miles Southwest of Juarez. The bandits got away with a \$15,000 pay-roll.

A customs guard is missing and it is believed that he was also slain. A rail had been removed from the track in a sharp curve, and the engine and tender, and a box car loaded with dynamite were derailed.

Federal troops are at the scene of the hold-up to start in pursuit of the outlaws. It is believed that two of the hold-up men are Americans.

COTTON PICKERS RENIG ON WORK

Local officers served notice on a big bunch of cotton pickers here Saturday afternoon to go to work or go to jail. The pickers arrived here two or three days ago, and the man in charge had been asking a \$10 bonus on the hands, \$2 per hundred for picking, and the farmer employing them to furnish the sacks. Farmers considered this unreasonable and declined to put up. A short time after the officers called on the transients, they closed a deal which was said to be satisfactory to the farmers, and left for the cotton fields.

Two truck loads of cotton pickers reaching here Friday in care of a Mexican who rounded them up and put up the money to get them here, did not take to the cotton fields as readily as might be expected.

J. L. Lee, a farmer of the Maverick country, was in town and prevailed on the party of Mexicans to go out to his place and pick. Mr. Lee followed them out, congratulating himself on being so fortunate to get such a large bunch of pickers.

Notwithstanding that the cotton is good, and the field extends right up to the house, the Mexicans said that it was "too far to walk," and they asked the captain of the bunch to bring them back to town. The Mexican in charge of the crew became somewhat riled up because his bunch of pickers would not go to work so he could get the money he had invested in them back, but there was nothing doing, and the Mexicans returned to town and other farmers were trying to trade with them throughout the day Saturday.

One labor agent arriving here with a bunch of pickers was asking farmers eight dollars a head

COURT HEARING FERGUSON SUIT

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 11.—Deep interest was manifested by the Supreme Court today in the question of its own jurisdiction to hear the Ferguson injunction suit and the right of Charles Dickinson, as a private individual, to bring the suit to keep Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson's name off the general election ballot.

The injunction suit in which District Judge Calhoun held that Mrs. Ferguson was eligible to be governor, came before the court of the last resort on certified questions from the Third Court of Civil Appeals. The case was argued for four hours by counsel today, and the question of jurisdiction and the question of the right of a private individual to file such proceedings were attacked by attorneys for the defendant.

The case is still before the higher court, but an early ruling is expected.

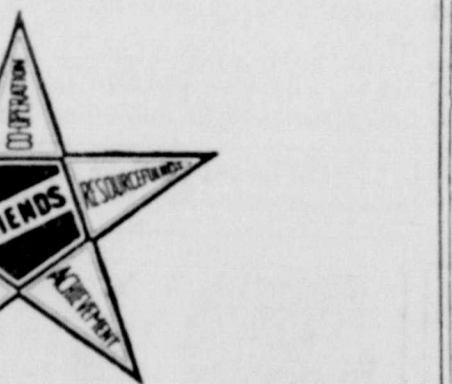

YOUNG MAN IS PAINFULLY HURT

John Keyes, son of Dr. C. T. Keyes of this city, suffered a badly mauled left hand about 4:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Famous Market, when the member was caught in a sausage grinder. His index finger was broken three times, the second finger six times, the third finger twice and the little finger once. The grinder, operated electrically—had to be broken with a hammer before the injured member could be removed—this requiring about fifteen minutes' time, during which Keyes heroically maintained his composure under excruciating pain. A spectator from Dallas fainted during the ordeal.

Immediate medical attention was given, but it was not known Thursday if any of the injured digits would have to be amputated. Keyes was operating the sausage mill at the time, shoving meat into the grinder with his left hand. He complacently viewed the injury when his hand was extricated, refusing to have the member bound until he had inspected it.—San Angelo Standard.

Young Keyes was in Ballinger attending court first of this week, being one of the defendants in the Rowena bank robbery case.

JEANES BUYS SMITH BLDG.

Title to the Mrs. R. A. Smith building fronting the court house square will pass to E. A. Jeanes, according to a deal closed this week in which Mr. Jeanes buys from Mrs. Smith this property.

The two story building, covering a space of 120x130 feet is at present housing the American Legion club rooms in the second story, while the lower floor is occupied as a storage room by L. B. Stubbs, and an auto repair shop. The deal transferring the property to Mr. Jeanes was made thru Judge Paul Trimmer, representing Mrs. Smith, this week. The consideration was not made public.

Mr. Jeanes announced that he would occupy the entire building as soon as he could perfect all his plans for installing a modern poultry and produce plant. He will get possession of one-half of the lower floor by the middle of November, and will move the Economy Mills from the present stand on Eighth Street to the Smith building, and will also install at an early date, and have ready for operation by January 1st, a 10,000-egg capacity commercial hatchery.

As soon as all plans can be worked out, and as soon as he can get possession of all the building, Mr. Jeanes stated that he expected to occupy the entire building, and do a general produce and poultry business. He stated that he expected to install an up-to-date cold storage plant by next fall.

The American Legion will be forced to seek new quarters as soon as Mr. Jeanes gets ready to occupy the second story of the building.

When the next big crop is produced in this county the farmers should get together and work out some plan for harvesting the crop.

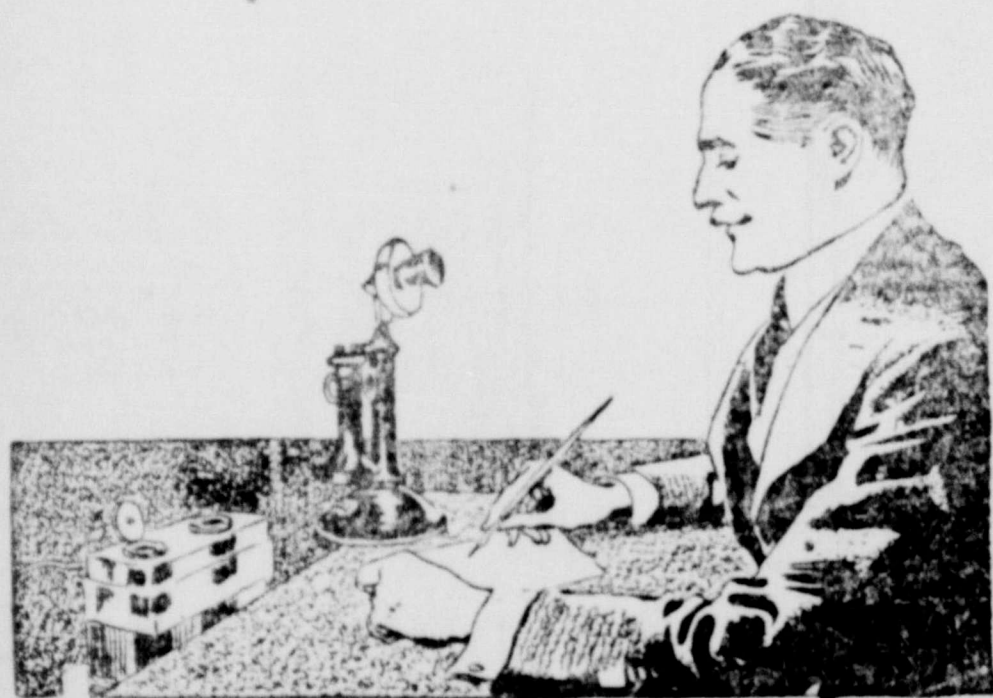
