## MUSIC

The word music suggests lots of different sounds to as many different people. One man said, "A brass band jangles my nerves." And another said "I quit work Saturday at noon and come ten miles to town just to hear the band play." Nearly every person likes music in some form or other, and unfortunately indeed is the man who does not like music in some form. Even the person that could not carry a tune sealed up in a vacuum often likes to hear other people perform. The person who has no musical talent and does not like to hear good music is not a complete human, for there is evidently a missing link in his make-up. What will attract the attention quicker than a good piece of music well rendered? Even the street fakirs are quick to recognize and make use of that fact.

Close observers of humanity say that there is less music among a bunch of criminals per capita than any other class of people, and the good musicians are seldom criminally inclined. Some folks want music that is quick and devilish, and others like it slow and soothing. I met a boy one day about thirty years ago and made a remark about a blister on his lip. He explained that he blistered his lips whistling "There Will Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight." You have heard of the sweet singer of Israel, and the mythological musician of the Greeks, Orpheus, who played so sweetly that the birds and the beasts gathered around to hear him.

Poetry and music have done more to make life worth living than any other existing agencies. They have caused people to perform great acts of heroism and have even caused prison doors to open. With the variety of music we have, if a man can't express himself he will just have to go by freight. I heard a would-be infidel say once that the sweetest music he ever heard was the moving of chairs around the dining table when the preacher and the old folks got up from the table and went into the parlor.

Most music is entertaining, instructive and elevating, but it can be made to bore you, depress you or degrade you. You have heard music of a discordant, vulgar note sung to vulgar words that were of a radically repellent type. Then you have heard music that penetrated the innermost depths of your soul and made you feel grand and sublime. The same marked contrast prevails among various song birds, from the discordant notes of the blue jay to the soothing tones of the dove.

One of the sweetest pieces of music I ever heard was rendered by a chorus of cultured girls returning from town on a mule-drawn street car to Trinity University. Their voices blended perfectly as they sang "Swanee River," and could be heard a long way over the still night air. If there is anything that can express deeper emotions, stronger or more intense feelings, or more varied inclinations, from the foolish ditty or the ribald song of the harlot to the sublime strains of "The Holy City" rendered by a cultured woman of unimpeachable character, what would it be?

## Cryer Thanks Citizens at C-C Meeting

Supt. C. A. Cryer made an address at the chamber of commerce meeting Monday night, thanking the merchants and others who cooperated to make the interscholastic league meet last week a success.

Mr. Cryer said that the business men of McLean financed the expenses of the meet that was attended by some 1000 contestants from the various schools of the county. Special mention was made of the page advertisement welcoming the contestants published in last week's News. This advertisement was mounted on cardboard and displayed in the high school lobby, attracting many favorable comments by the visitors.

McLean contestants won all of the literary events with the exception of two, winning second place on these.

M. D. Bentley, commenting on Mr. Cryer's speech, said that he had observed the behavior of the contestants at the various meets held here and that this year's meet had the best behaved contestants of any previous ones.

Supt. Cryer mentioned the need of furnishing transportation for pupils from nearby rural schools to attend the McLean high school, and a motion carried for President Boyd Meador to appoint a committee to work with a similar committee from the school board to work out plans for such a system.

The advertising committee reported disapproving a proposed air show for Saturday.

Discussion showed that any favorable action by the committee on any proposition does not bind anyone to support it as their work is only to endorse, or disapprove, as they see fit.

Jesse J. Cobb, chairman of the trade extension committee, reported the Alanreed and Ramsdell trips, saying that Ramsdell intends to invite the whole membership of the C. of C. to a meeting there soon.

Mr. Cobb reported the Webb school asking for a delegation some night next week, and it was ordered to invite the Methodist minstrel show to accompany the trippers. A motion carried for the extension committee to formulate plans for free entertainment this summer.

C. O. Greene, chairman of the road committee, made a report illustrated with a blackboard map of the oil field roads, which was spoken to by Commissioner W. W. Wilson and others.

E. J. Lander spoke, praising the work of the McLean band.

The picture show committee reported it successful, several merchants saying that a good crowd was attracted to town on the two days the picture was shown.

The housing problem was discussed at great length, indicating an acute shortage of residence facilities here.

The 894 producing wells in Gray county made a daily average last week of 34,409 barrels, as against 35,971 the week before; Wheeler's 53 wells, 2,173 barrels last week, 900 the previous week.

## S. S. Lesson

### THE CHILD AND THE KINGDOM

Matt. 18:1-14, 19:13-15; lesson text.  
Golden text, 19:14.

From Caesarea Philippi, Jesus went with His disciples back to Capernaum. They had received some new teaching concerning the death and resurrection of the Master. They should have begun to realize that the Kingdom Jesus was setting up was not a material kingdom, and not one over which their earthly ambitions might swell. On their return Jesus took occasion to teach the disciples more concerning their ambitions and the kingdom, with the use of little children as an example.

Jesus loved little children. We have no way of knowing how many miracles of healing He performed on little children. There are four recorded in the Scriptures. He healed the nobleman's son from disease in Capernaum. He delivered a demoniac boy near Caesarea Philippi, and the Syro-phonician's daughter near Tyre. He raised the daughter of Jairus from the dead. There is only one miracle recorded in all four Gospels, and He took the loaves and fish from the hands of a willing little boy to perform that miracle.

The disciples wanted to know who would be greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven. They no doubt expected Jesus to point out one of them. But instead, He took a little child that was standing by and set him in their midst. The child was evidently one of tender years, not yet having reached the age of accountability. Jesus then laid down some principles, not only for the disciples, but also for us. His statement was that the one who wished to enter the Kingdom of Heaven would have to first be converted and become as a little child in relationship to the Kingdom. He further stated that the one who was able to humble himself as the little child would be greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven.

The little child was trustful. He had no evil thoughts, was not in his heart rejecting God. Furthermore, he had no prejudices in his mind. He was willing to let Jesus hold him on His knee if He desired. He was not afraid of Jesus, thinking that the interests of Jesus might be detrimental to him. He was willing in the hands of Jesus. If the little child had committed a wrong, it was easily corrected, and not head and heart strong in the matter. He was satisfied as Jesus held him and was not struggling to be away from Him in his own interests.

Jesus characterized the little child as "humble." So must the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven be—humble. The humility of the child was found in the fact that he was not setting himself in opposition to the Master. He was willing to quietly permit the Master to use him as a subject of teaching. Jesus was calling attention to the child, but the child was not conscious of it. The child recognized Jesus and was interested in Him. The child had no conscious desire in his little heart to feel or have others feel himself greater than those about him. He was depending on them for his protection. His immediate interest was in the disciples and Jesus rather than himself. Such is humility. Such an one will be greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven, and so far as men are concerned there is no mob waiting to claim the place.

The interest of mankind is demanded for little children. The one who receives a little child in the name of Christ receives Him, but the one who harms a little child has an awful reward. Drunken fathers who starve their children come in for a heavy slice of such condemnation. But the man who provides for his children and sells liquor to another man, who lets it cause him to neglect his, comes in for just as great a slice. The wealthy manufacturer, mine operator, etc., who refuses to pay a living wage, and thereby causes suffering of the little ones in the home cut off his generous slice, also.

The subject of the lesson changes some here for a moment. He turns to a lost sheep. No matter how many sheep or cows one has safe in the corral, if there is one lost out in the cold, he will do his best to find it and save it. So with God. He loves those who are safe in His Kingdom, whose lives are daily bringing glory to His name, but His great Father heart goes out to those who are still in the world of sin and rejection. It is not the will of God that even "one" perish. No man can place the responsibility of his condition on God. Jesus said that He would in no wise cast out any one who came to Him on the provisions He laid down. Upon these provisions He placed no price, and every man may come. The conditions He has

laid down in the above verses. It is necessary that men come with the faith and humility of a little child. Such is the price, within the easy reach of every man. He would cast none out. Many who are not willing to pay that price attempt to enter another way, but Jesus says they are thieves and robbers. They shall not enter. The conditions are easy, they are simple, they are childlike, they are Christlike. And men must bear the responsibility of their own choice. There is no other to bear it for them, for God has placed it in the easy, simple reach of all.

### COOKY RECIPES

#### Sand Tarts

1/2 c butter.  
1 c sugar.  
1 egg, well beaten.  
1 1/4 c flour.  
1/4 tsp. cinnamon.  
2 tsp. baking powder.  
1 egg white.  
Blanch almonds.  
1 tb. sugar.  
Cream butter, add sugar gradually, egg, and flour mixed with baking powder. Chill, roll 1/4 inch thick, and shape with doughnut cutter. Brush over with egg white and sprinkle with sugar mixed with cinnamon. Split almonds and arrange three halves on each cookie at equal distances. Place on buttered sheet and bake 8 minutes in moderate oven (325° F.).

#### Peanut Cookies

2 tb. butter.  
1/2 c sugar.  
1 egg, well beaten.  
1 tsp. baking powder.  
1/2 tsp. lemon juice.  
1/4 tsp. salt.  
1/2 c flour.  
2 tsp. milk.  
1/2 c finely chopped peanuts.  
Cream butter, add sugar and egg. Mix and sift baking powder, salt and flour; add to first mixture; then add milk, peanuts and lemon juice. Drop from teaspoon on buttered cookie sheet, one inch apart and place half peanut on each cookie. Bake 12 or 15 minutes in moderately slow oven (325° F.).

#### Light and Dark Cookies

1/2 c butter.  
1 c sugar.  
4 c pastry flour.  
3 tsp. baking powder.  
1/2 tsp. salt.  
1 tsp. orange.  
1/2 tsp. vanilla.  
1/2 c milk.  
2 eggs.  
2 ozs. melted chocolate.  
Cream the butter and add sugar slowly. Add eggs and beat well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt and add alternately with milk. Divide the dough into two parts. To the first part add the orange extract. To the second part add the melted chocolate and vanilla extract. Place the dark dough on the light and roll. Cut and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.), 8 to 10 minutes. Omit 1/2 c flour.

#### Ginger Cookies

2 eggs.  
1 c shortening.  
1 tsp. soda in 2 tbp. vinegar.  
1 c dark syrup.  
1 c sugar.  
1 tsp. ginger.  
Flour to make stiff dough. Roll thin and bake in moderate oven.

Text: "I know that my Redeemer liveth."—Job 19: 25a.

About 1500 years before Christ, this statement of faith in the resurrection was made: "I know that my Redeemer liveth." Although terribly afflicted, Job, who made this confession, did not lose faith but firmly believed that his Redeemer lives. He believed in the "seed" of the woman (Gen. 3:15), the promised Messiah, the Christ, the Savior and Redeemer of the entire world. Job believed that he would rise from the dead, even if his body should be destroyed. "And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet IN MY FLESH shall I see God." (Job 19:26). ## CHEESE EASY TO MAKE

"I have made 195 pounds of American cheese since Miss Ruby M. Adams gave the demonstration to our club in March, 1933," says Mrs. G. G. Frashier, farm and ranch food supply cooperator of the Kingsmill Club, who won second prize on cheese at the fat stock show in Amarillo last month.

This is valued at \$12.50 and cost only \$1.00 to make. "I have not found it difficult to make, and my family enjoys cheese served in many ways," continued Mrs. Frashier.

The instructions Miss Adams gives are as follows:

1. Put milk in a straight sided vessel such as a pressure cooker, and bring to 98 degrees.

2. Five gallons of milk will make a very nice size cheese.

3. For 5 gallons of milk use 1/2 of a color tablet and 1/4 of a No. 2 tablet. Dissolve these in a half cup of water each, and add to the milk after it has been brought to 98 degrees. Mix the rennet and color thoroughly with the milk.

4. After rennet and color have been added to the milk and mixed in, allow the milk to stand undisturbed until a fine curd has formed. This generally takes from 25 to 30 minutes.

5. After the curd is firm, cut both ways across the vessel with a long knife into 1/2 inch strips and break up into 1/2 inch cubes with a wire egg beater by stirring slowly with the beater.

6. Allow the curd to stand from 5 to 10 minutes until whey begins to separate quite freely.

7. Place on a low fire and heat slowly (2 degrees for each 5 minutes) until 100 degrees is reached. It should take from 30 to 40 minutes.

8. Stir slowly all the time during the heating period.

9. Hold the curd in whey at 100 degrees until it becomes quite firm and rubbery; this will take from 45 minutes to one hour. Stir occasionally while holding.

10. When the curd has become sufficiently firm, drain off the whey and keep the curd stirred to prevent its matting together. This should continue until the curd is quite dry.

11. Salt the curd at the rate of one ounce of salt to each 3 lbs. of curd and allow the salt time to dissolve. Then the curd is ready for the press.

12. A cheese mold can be made from a syrup bucket or lard can.

13. Line the mold with cheese cloth.

14. A lever over the mold will serve for pressure by using about 50 lbs. weight on a 6 foot lever.

15. The curd should be kept in the press from 8 to 12 hours. Then remove and place in a clean, cool place to dry on the outside. Turn

same over two or three times daily while it is on the drying shelf.

16. As soon as the cheese is dry on the outside, 3 or 4 days after taking from press, it should be paraffined. Heat the paraffin to 220 or 230 degrees and roll the sides of the cheese cooperators of the Kingsmill Club. The paraffin must be hot, to prevent too thick a coat from remaining on the cheese. A thin coat is to be preferred to a thick, scaly one.

17. After the cheese is paraffined it should be stored 5 or 6 weeks for curing, and a temperature around 60 degrees is the most desirable.

We do not recommend making cheese on the farm in the summer because curing temperatures are not often available.

People who think they are smart should try entertaining themselves for a while.

Sometimes folks have to tell you how good they are before you know it for sure.

Most of us, perhaps all of us know right from wrong, but not all of us do right.

It is funny how you will like a fellow you have done a good turn and dislike the fellow you have wronged.

Citizens who take no interest in elections should not take the privilege of criticizing the acts of those elected by others.

Once in a while you will hear it said that so-and-so is a fine fellow if you know how to take him, but how much better we like those who do not have to be labeled like a bottle of medicine.

Disregarding traffic rules, turning in the streets, cutting corners, and jay-walking, all of which is dangerous, is very prevalent in McLean, and one bad accident will make all of us sorry we were not more careful.

There was never a finer season in the ground at this time of the year, and a few trees, vines, berries or shrubbery planted now will mean much to the profit and appearance of the home.

Nurseries are making attractive prices on all stock this year and only a few days remain in which to take advantage of this year's season.

It now begins to appear that the "bear grass" planted along the curves of highway 66 will not last long enough to see what the object was in planting it. Some places have all of the grass pulled up, and others show the effect of being crushed by careless drivers.

This planting could have been a real source of beauty, if planted a proper distance from the roadway and protected until it became established.

Many small town merchants wait until trade shows a decided upturn before investing anything in advertising, but the few who understand the principles of advertising know that advertising will hasten recovery and make more money for them when recovery arrives.

Right now things seem to be definitely on the upturn and there is little reason for anyone to hesitate to advertise for new business.

A man told us the other day that he would not vote for any woman for school trustee. This statement seems rather strong when you stop to think that 80% of the school faculty, 90% of the members of the P. T. A., one-half of the patrons, and most of the pupils are women folks.

Women are just as capable of holding office as men, and

if they should make mistakes, it would be no more than the men have done.

Permission to use cotton and wheat acreage reduction acres to produce food for the family and feed for the workstock, should be an opportunity for the farmer to plan a real living at home program.

A food budget and farm records will mean much toward putting the farmer on a business basis. The lack of proper farm records has proven a handicap in the various government activities the past year, but this can be overcome in the future by keeping proper records.

"Publication of public expenditures and information about official acts is an American institution. Take that away from us and we have nothing left but Hitlerism," says a prominent man in another state. Yet we hear many times the plea that the reason such things are not made public is on account of the cost, while if the truth was known, the publication would reduce costs, for many things would get more attention, if it was known that the publication would be certain.

Publication in a newspaper is the only way to be sure that people see it now-a-days. There might have been a time when people would stop and read a sheet tacked on a post by the roadside, or on a bulletin board, but such things do not amount to publicity in these times.

Publication of expenditures of tax spending boards in the home paper is the surest way to reduce taxes. Texas has a law governing such things that is observed more by the breach than by the observance in many cases; however, tax spending boards are coming more and more to obeying the law, as the legislature adds penalties for violations.

The value of terraced land has been proven beyond any doubt all over the country, and it is especially helpful in our dry country in conserving moisture and preventing the blowing of soils by the prevailing winds.

Conservation of our loose type soils is a big problem right now, as there is little new land to be broken, and we must expect to make adequate yields from older soils if we prosper, but this cannot be done unless proper conservation methods are used.

The first thing is terraces, and then plant food and humus must be added each year, with proper rotating of crops.

Cotton has done much to ruin the soils here, and a plan of planting cotton in narrow strips with other crops between is good, as this helps keep the soil from blowing and at the same time does not expose so much of the farm to depletion by removing all of the crop.

Time was when, if the soil became depleted, all that had to be done was to break out new land, but that time has passed, and it had much to be said against it at the time, for it is wasteful to allow soils to become entirely depleted, regardless of how much land one owns.

## INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE

The annual interscholastic league meet opened here last Thursday morning with a bang. McLean emerged from the fray with high honors by defeating the nearest competitor by more than a hundred points. In addition to the county championship, many individual medals were won, as well as cups that will remain the property of the school.

The tennis preliminaries officially opened the meet Thursday morning at 9:30. Both doubles and singles matches were played throughout the day, despite the high wind and dirt. In the afternoon, the matches were played for the best two out of three sets and it was singular that during the day only two matches were forced to go the entire three sets. Despite this, there were a number of good matches. In the first round, the McLean doubles team defeated the Alameda boys 8-6, 6-0. Hopkins No. 1 defeated Hopkins No. 2 8-6, 6-1 in the girls singles. In the second round the Lefors girls high doubles defeated McLean ward 6-4, 6-3, and G. McCarty of McLean eliminated Barnett of Lefors 6-1, 6-0. The third round saw the elimination of the Back boys doubles by McLean ward, 6-1, 6-3, and Maybelle Todd of Back by Glenn of McLean high, 7-5, 6-4. The fourth round eliminated Lefors ward girls doubles by Hopkins 1, and Floyd of McLean ward by Bryant of Alameda, both by uneven scores. In the fifth round Julia McCarty of McLean ward defeated the Lefors candidate, 6-2, 6-4, and the Hopkins 1 boys doubles team defeated Lefors, 6-1, 6-1. The sixth and seventh rounds of the preliminaries completed the eliminations. Still of Lefors defeated Ridgeway of Hopkins 1 by an uneven score; J. Tarbush and J. Walker of Alameda defeated the Hopkins 2 girls; Alameda defeated Lefors in a girls singles match, 6-2, 3-6, 6-0, in the first three-set match of the day; Still and Wolfe of Lefors easily defeated Hopkins 2 to emerge winners in boys doubles from the preliminaries.

In the first round of the final division, or semi-finals, M. Back and O. Back of McLean defeated Baker and Strong of Lefors, 6-2, 6-3, to enter the finals and, in another doubles game the McLean ward boys were defeated by Back and Cooke of McLean high. Following that came the exciting match of the day in a singles match between McCarty of McLean and Bryant of Alameda. McCarty won the match after 24 games had been played in the last set. The score was 6-3, 3-6 and 13-11. At the same time that this match was in progress, Lefors boys doubles defeated Hopkins 1. This closed the matches for the day, with the finals to be played Friday.

In the finals Friday morning, Hopkins lost to Alameda, which gave Alameda the right to meet the McLean team for the girls doubles title. The title was won by McLean, 6-4, 6-3. McCarty lost the singles title to Still of Lefors in straight sets, 6-1, 6-3. The Alameda girls singles candidate first defeated McCarty of McLean ward, and then Glenn of McLean high, for the title. To close the matches, Still and Wolfe of Lefors defeated Back and Cooke of McLean for the boys doubles title.

The groundball contests were played Thursday afternoon, and hotly con-

tested games were reported. In the high school division the Lefors girls defeated the McLean girls, and McLean boys defeated Lefors boys, there being only two schools entered in that division. In the rural division Back won the boys title and Webb the girls; in the ward school division McLean won both contests.

To close the day, the volleyball contests were held Thursday night. A fair crowd saw McLean high come out of the fray victorious, with the scrapping little girls from McLean ward as the runner-up. A feature of the contests was the defeat of the Lefors high team by the McLean ward girls in a thrilling and closely contested match. Friday morning was the opening of the literary events. A detailed report of the day cannot be given, and it is possible to give only the winners. McLean won the arithmetic contests. In choral singing Hopkins 1 won the rural division and McLean the ward division. McLean won both boys and girls debate by default, as there were no other teams in the contest. In the declamation contests, McLean won the high senior boys, high junior boys and girls, and the ward junior boys and girls. Lefors won the high senior girls, while Hopkins 1 won all of the rural declamations and picture memory contest. In addition, McLean won the high school division of essay writing, with Back and Lefors winning the rural and ward divisions, respectively. McLean won boys extemporaneous speech, music memory, and all spelling. Lefors won girls extemporaneous speech, Back the 3-R contest and two divisions in rural spelling. Hopkins 2 won the story telling contest, to complete the day.

The track and field events were held in the dirt Saturday. No senior events were held, and the day was so forbidding that very few attended the contests. Hopkins 1 won the rural division in points Hopkins 2 the ward division, with Lefors taking second and McLean third in that division.

## AGGIE REPORT

McLean F. F. A. judging teams competed in the Texas Tech poultry, dairy and livestock contests on April 2. They placed third in poultry, sixth in dairy and fourth in livestock, with the highest team in Holstein judging. John Mertel was first in beef cattle and Cecil Jones first in Holsteins. Cecil was also second in Guernseys. Elton O'Neal placed second in horses, second in hogs, and second in all events in livestock. Billie Robinson was fourth in Holsteins and fourth in Jerseys. The school placed fourth in sweepstakes with 81 teams competing. McLaughlin-Reeder Motor Co. and Cooke Chevrolet Co. furnished free transportation for the boys.

Brownie Cable was elected secretary and Billie Robinson watch dog, of the North Plains F. F. A. Lloyd Miller of Tulsa was elected president. This district will hold their F. F. A. declamation contest at Pampa on May 19. Three or four McLean boys are going to compete in the local contest, the winner to enter at Pampa. The winner of the district will go to the state contest in July. The highest honor a boy can receive is a \$400 prize, which will be given the first place winner in Kansas City next November.

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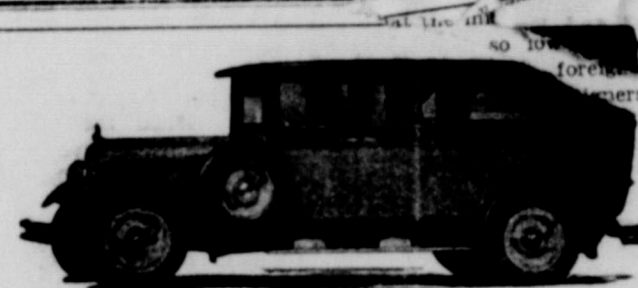
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## DOROTHY DARNIT

An Easter party was given last Thursday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Watkins, honoring the husbands of the members of the All Sew Club.

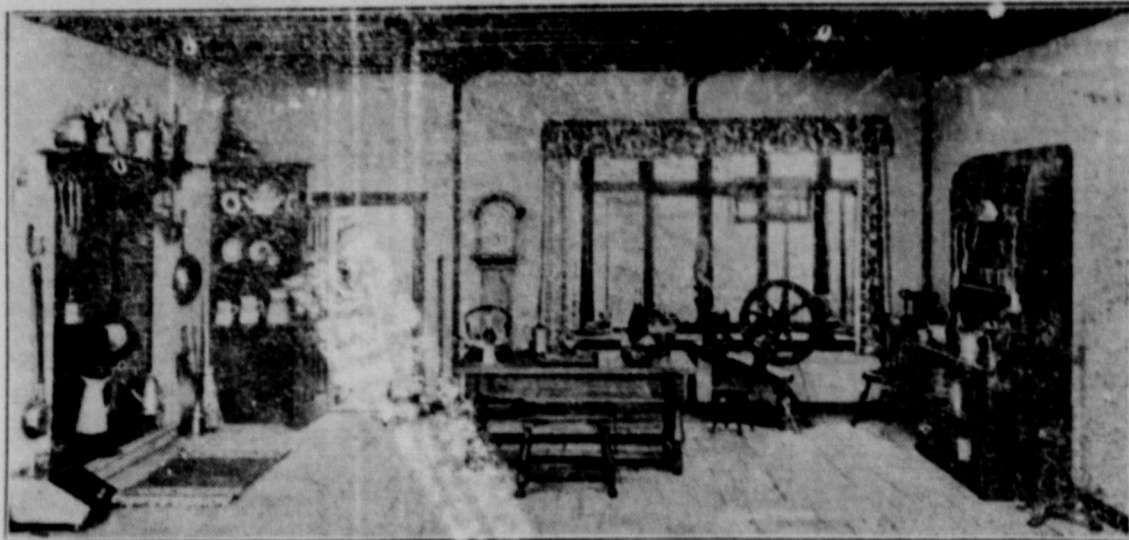

## \$5 FINE FOR MERCHANT TO READ

Did you get your catalog? We got ours and it's a dandy. Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck put out attractive books. They are the Bibles of the business world so far as the common people are concerned and are consulted much oftener than the real Bible. Attractive cuts, entertaining and well written descriptive matter with prices is certainly appreciated.

A curious thing we have noticed is that the prices in each catalog are about the same. Would think they would get together and put out but one catalog, for those catalogs cost a lot of money, about \$125 each. In the trading vicinity of Saco about 2,000 of these catalogs were received within the past month. These new batches are coming rather fast and this is called for on account of the prices of so many things going up so fast. In checking up high salaries recently the government found, so we understand, that \$400,000 per year was paid to the president of one of these concerns, so evidently their prices are high enough to make plenty of money. The cost of mailing one of these large catalogs is considerable, about 11c from Chicago to Saco.

Sears Roebuck and Montgomery Ward have spent over \$5,000 during the past year in advertising through their catalogs to Saco people. And they get business and lots of it.

It would be cheaper for these catalog houses to buy up a few newspapers and that will likely be their next move to cinch all the business.

There are two things that the average merchant hates to do. One is pay the preacher, and the other is pay out money for advertising. Paying the preacher, of course, might possibly do some good for those who feel their sins, but paying the editor is throwing money away.

There is no question but that better bargains can be had in town, but the country man is not going to spend much time running around to find out about it. "Hiding his light under a basket," not advertising, is just what is making the country merchant poor and the catalog house rich.

The average merchant has his wires crossed all the time, he thinks it's price competition that is ruining him. It's nothing of the kind, it's advertising competition that is getting his goat.—Saco (Mont.) Independent.

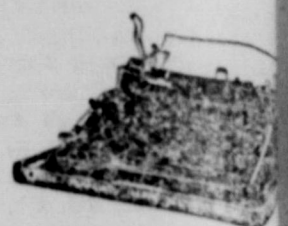
