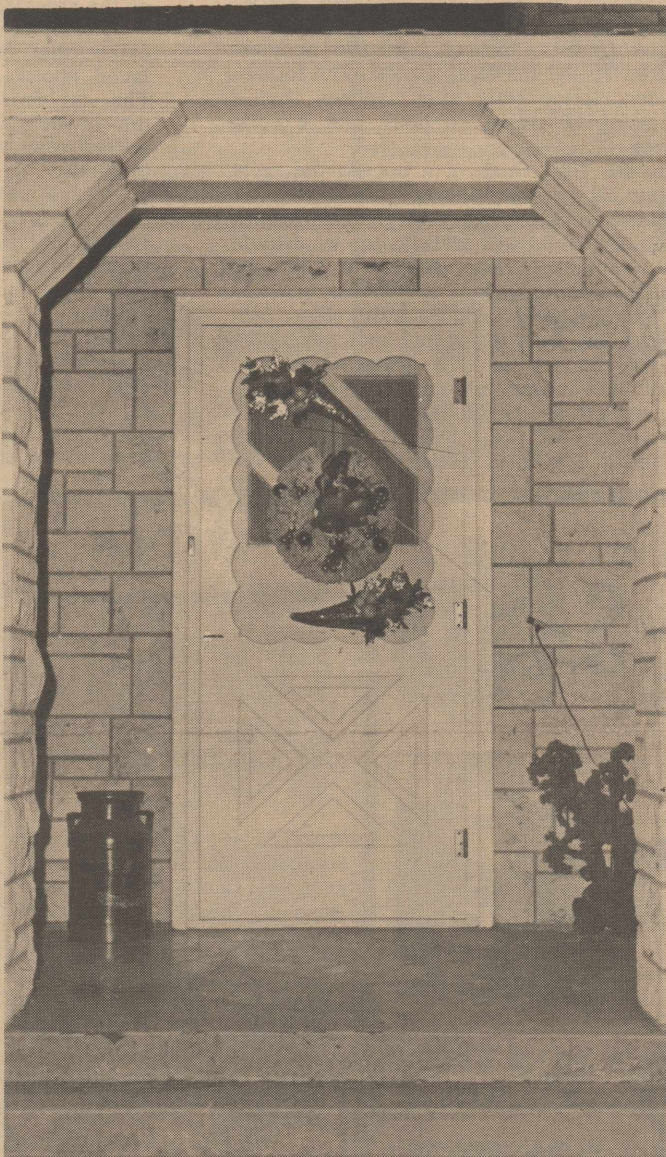
Lions Club To Sponsor Trap Shoot

After Four Years With Hart Schools

Andy Gardenhire, superintendent of Hart Public Schools, has resigned effective June 1, 1968. His present contract expires July 1, 1969.

Gardenhire has not announced any future plans.

Before moving to Hart in 1964, he taught and coached at Tulia, Lakeview, Quannah, Plainview, and was high school principal at O'Donnell from 1960 to 1963.

Supt. Gardenhire and his wife, Patricia, have two daughters, Sheila, 15, a sophomore in Hart High School, and Dena, an eighth grader. Mrs. Gardenhire teaches English and serves as junior high and high school librarian.

In addition to his work with the school, Gardenhire has been active in community affairs.

"Hart can be proud of its school and the many efforts of the school personnel", said Gardenhire. "In recent years the students and school have gained much respect from the area communities, thanks to their well-qualified faculty, maintenance men and administration."

Several Federal programs have been carried out recently at Hart School including Head Start, Title I reading program, in school and out-of-school N. Y. C. programs. These new programs were added at no cost to the local school district. Two Title I teachers and two teacher aids, four to ten in-school N. Y. C. workers, and two to four out-of-school N. Y. C. workers make up the Federal school programs.

Hart School has had summer recreation programs taught by Athletic Director Don Ewing, in order to upgrade the athletic and recreation programs for young people.

Manual training has been added to the special classes in order to reach the slow learners.

"A top-notch curriculum is available in the entire school," stated Gardenhire. "Junior high choir has been added, along with extra effort being spent on Interscholastic League events throughout the entire school."

The high school curriculum has added physics, Spanish I and II, related math, agriculture IV and shorthand.

One Second To Live

Delinquency In 12 Easy Rules

Several years ago the Houston police department distributed to parents a little booklet entitled, "How To Make a Child Into a Delinquent: 12 easy Rules."

1. Begin at infancy to give a child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living.

2. When he picks up bad words, laugh at him. This will make him think he's cute.

3. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he's 21 and let him decide for himself.

4. Avoid the use of the word "wrong". It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he's being persecuted.

5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all responsibility on others.

6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and glassware are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.

7. Quarrel frequently in his presence. In this way he won't be too shocked when the home breaks up later.

8. Give him all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own.

9. Satisfy his every craving for food, drink and comfort. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.

10. Take his part against neighbors, teachers and policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.

11. When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying: "I never could do anything with him."

12. Prepare for a life of grief. You'll be likely to have it.

Sometimes it is necessary to scare a person to make the person aware of the dangers around him. We know many of you will be on the highway during the holiday season, and in an effort to help you complete your journey safely, we would like to give you an "instant replay" of a fatal accident. We hope it scares you. We hope it reminds you to buckle your seat belt. And we hope it saves your life.

The first second of a traffic accident is often called the fatal second. The following description tells what happens when a car going 55 miles an hour hits a solid object:

In the first tenth of a second the front bumper and grille collapse.

In the second tenth of a second the hood crumbles, rising and striking the windshield as the spinning rear wheels lift from the ground. Simultaneously fenders begin wrapping themselves around the solid object and, although the car's frame has been halted, the rest of the car is still going 50 m. p. h.

Instinct causes the driver to stiffen his legs against the crash, and they snap at the knee joint.

During the third tenth of a second the

steering wheel starts to disintegrate and the steering column aims for the driver's chest.

The fourth tenth of a second finds two feet of the car's front end wrecked while the rear end still moves at 35 m. p. h. and the driver's body is still traveling at 55 m. p. h.

In the fifth tenth the driver is impaled on the steering column.

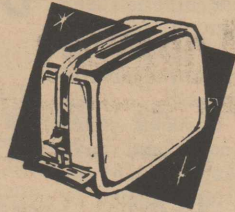
The sixth finds the impact built up to the extent that feet are ripped out of tightly laced shoes. The brake pedal breaks off. The car frame buckles in the middle and the driver's head bangs into the windshield as the rear wheels, still spinning, fall back to earth.

In the seventh tenth, hinges rip loose, doors open and the seat breaks free, striking the driver from behind. But he doesn't mind, because he is already dead, and the last three-tenths of a second mean nothing to him.

That's what happens in the first second of a fatal accident. Now, just two questions: (1) Will you buckle your seat belt? (2) Once you've got it buckled, will you drive safely-- and watch out for the other guy?

KITCHEN KORNER

We haven't really had the snow we expected and I'm sure what cotton is left those farmers are hoping we won't get any moisture for a few days.

I went to the P.T.A. Style show last Monday night and those of you who didn't go really missed seeing some beautiful clothes and a nice program.

The ladies in charge spent a lot of time decorating and arranging for the show. They should be thanked for their efforts as any program to raise money goes to the school and to a scholarship given each year to some deserving senior.

BRISCOE COUNTY FARMER HAS NEAR RECORD MICRONAIRE

It is a quite interesting story to hear the experience of Mr. Joe B. Mercer, a member in the Briscoe County Co-Op Gin, who lives in Silvertown and farms on the High Plains near that city, as he relates his experience with a new cotton that was first released in 1966. Mr. Mercer has a verticillium wilt problem on his farm and he planted the new Gregg 25V that has the glandless seed, both years of 1966 and 1967, and no wilt showed up in the cotton. In 1966 he watered in July and then again just before the rain started around the 20th of August, which lasted for 4 or 5 weeks, and he says the cotton didn't make at all. This year he planted the same cotton again, but he managed it differently and he has a quite different story to tell.

Out of 97 wrap-ups from approximately 48 acres he had 80 bales ranging in micronaire from 3.7 to 4.3 with only 11 bales falling below the 3.5. The lint yield per acre averaged 1054 pounds compress weights; there were 61% of the staples ranging from 1 inch to 1-1/16; with 30% being 3 1/32, and the remainder

15/16. The planting was finished by April 18, and harvesting was completed by November 12.

Here is a salute to you, Mr. Mercer, a farmer of the Plains on the northern fringe of the cotton belt with a record like this on wilt infested ground, in a bad year for micronaire like '67. When Mr. Mercer was asked how he watered the cotton in '67, he replied, "I watered it July 20th, and that was it, and it never rained any afterwards." He also states that he had a neighbor who had the 25V in '66, and that he watered in July, but had not watered again when the rains started, and that he had one of the best fields of cotton around.

Just a reminder that the fully stormproof Gregg 35 in which a large percentage of the south Plains has been planted in the past is still a good cotton. And if you like a high production cotton with an excellent turnout you cannot pass up the new Gregg 45. The 35 and 45 are not tolerant to verticillium wilt. DUTCH DREAM APPLE PIE

Line pie tin with unbaked pastry. Prepare raw, mellow apples sliced and sugared to fill pie tin.

Mix together:

1 c. graham cracker crumbs
1/2 c. flour
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon

Completely cover apples with crumb mixture. Over top pour 1/2 cup melted butter. Bake 1 hour - moderate oven.

CRANBERRY-MARSH-MALLOW SALAD

1 bag (1 lb.) fresh cranberries
1 pkg. (10 oz.) marshmallows
1 can (1 lb. 4 oz.) crushed pineapple, well drained,
1 c. whipping cream, whipped
1/4 c. sugar
1 c. chopped nuts

Grind cranberries. Mix in remaining ingredients. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart mold. Refrigerate overnight for a soft gelatin-like salad or freeze 5 hours. Unmold and, if desired, garnish with greens. 10 to 12 servings.

HOME MADE MINCEMEAT

2 lbs. lean beef
1 lb. chopped suet
4 lbs. tart apples
3 lbs. brown sugar
3 lbs. currants
1/2 lb. citron
2 lbs. raisins
1 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. mace
2 oranges
2 lemons
1 T. salt

Any lean meat may be substituted for the lean beef. Stew the beef until tender. Cool the meat and chop. Add the beef suet, chopped fine. Pare and core the apples. Put apples, currants, raisins, oranges, lemon and citron through food chopper, also beef. Cook together for 30 minutes and add: for 30 minutes and add:

1 cup nutmeats.
Pack in jars and seal.
