ONIONS: THE FRESH "SWEET" DIFFERENCE

Onions are probably one of the most essential culinary ingredients and here in Texas where the bulk of the nation's spring onions are grown, supplies are abundant at this time of the year. These spring onions, named by the Texas onion growers as "SpringSweet", are refreshingly sweet and mild. Because of their mildness, they are easily enjoyed in their raw state, chopped or sliced in salads, adorning a juicy hamburger, added to relishes for picnics, and the list could go on and on.

Texas SpringSweet onions are predominantly yellow onions with tissue-thin skins. Although "juicy" is not a word ordinarily used to describe onions, it definitely describes this spring onion variety. This juiciness results from the onion's high water content, indeed a freshly harvested

characteristic.

An important fact to note is that the shape of the onion, flat granex or round grano, is not necessarily the indicator of sweetness. "People tend to relate sweetness to the flatter varieties since they grew up with the Bermuda onion," notes Paula Fouchek, Director of the Texas Fresh Promotional Board. "The onion varieties that are around today have those sweet Bermuda characteristics in a round onion and the time of the year they are grown, during the winter months in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, insure their sweetness."

This season, Texas onion growers have introduced a new onion developed by Dr. Leonard Pike of Texas A&M. Scientifically, this onion is known as the 1015Y variety. The industry, however, has started referring to it as the Texas "Super Sweet". Being introduced into the grocery stores this spring, the new "Super Sweet" variety is an extremely mild round onion that grows to jumbo size. The industry expects about 2 million bags of this variety this season. Next season they anticipate even more, as more seed is available for planting, and plan to have them better identified in the supermarkets.

For onion lovers, his is good news. The other good news is that while you are enjoying the flavors of the spring onions, you are actually contributing to a healthy diet. Research has shown that an onion weighing 150 grams or 5.3 ounces contributes 15% of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of Vitamin C, contains only 65 calories, has only 10 mg. of sodium while providing 200 mg. of potassium. Quite a nutritious story.

Nutritious and delicious, spring onions are a great contribution to any meal.

Council Votes To Table Bids On Park Project

After two postponements, bids for construction of facilities at a city park in Cross Plains were opened in a meeting Tuesday, June 4, at 1:30 p.m. in the City Hall.

Only three bids were offered and opened by Fred Aycock of Abilene, architect for the city, and Jack Gilreath also of Abilene, a consultant of the city with

Randolph, Gilreath & Associates.

After the bids had been opened and read, the Cross Plains City Council promptly unanimously voted to table the project for re-evaluation. It was explained by City Secretary Vickie Walker that the architectural and consulting firm representatives will get back to the council as "soon as possible"

with a re-worked project.

Tuesday's bid opening had twice been postponed because firms which had specifications and blueprints out and had not made bids.

The park facilities are to be constructed at the site immediate north of the city's new Community Center building on North Beech Street behind the Multi-Purpose Center. It was

originally announced that the primary structure at the city park Community Center was to have been a pavilion, possibly suitable for various type family or group gatherings. Some recreational equipment or facilities were also to be included in the bids.

Money for the project has already been funded through a grant.

Showers Last Week Yield Area Inch and More Rain

Thunder showers which fell in the Cross Plains area Wednesday of last week dumped an inch off more moisture in most every community in this immediate section of the state.

Although warned by weather observers via radio

and television, that some of the showers building could possible reach severe stages, none was reported to this office. For the most part, the rain fell gently, although in some places, such as in the city, heavy downpours were experienced on occasions, causing brief excessive runoff.

The moisture was welcomed by most area farmers and ranchers and all area gardeners. The rain did, however, stop the grain harvest, and it was just beginning to resume on the weekend, although it is nearing completion. The 1985 grain crop is yielding better than average, and for the most part is grading high, but is bringing less per bushel than number one wheat did 30 years ago.

The rainfall was a boon to feed crops, gardens, yards and pastures. Runoff kept earthen livestock tanks full for the approach of hot summer months when the drain on the watering holes is heavy.

In Cross Plains gauges registered from 1.50 to 1.80 inches with the latter being the gauge usually used by the Review in its record keeping. Showers and storms in May netted 2.30 inches of rain which brought the year's aggregate to 10.20 inches for the first five months. Then Wednesday's moisture upped the total, to noon Saturday, to 12 inches.

A check on amounts of rainfall in the communities surrounding Cross Plains found the lightest amount in the Atwell sector where Roy

Neil Tatom reported .90 of an inch, but said others in the area reported slightly more, about an inch. E.W. Meador at Cross Cut had a gauge that read one inch, and Frank Snodgrass at Sabanno and J.P. Clark at Cottonwood both reported 1.20 inches.

Slightly more fell at Rowden where N.V. Gibbs said his gauge had 1.30 inches, and Freeda Burkett, correspondent for the Burkett community, reports 1.60 inches. J.T. Beggs of the Pioneer locality had 1.70 inches in his gauge last week, and M.F. Dill, who lives midway between here and Cottonwood, got 1.75 inches.

Valuable Information From Soil Conservationist

County Judge Mack Kniffen said valuable information about most of the soils in Callahan County is available from the Soil Conservation Service located in the County Courthouse at Baird.

"Many people could save money and avoid a few headaches if they would only consider the soil first when planning to build a home, constructing a road, building a pond, or planting a crop, garden, shrubs, or trees," Judge Kniffen said.

Steve Useton, district conservationist at Baird said, the soils in Callahan County,

are different.

"They have personality and individuality just as people do," Useton said. "some of the soils are deep and fertile, others are shallow to bedrock. Some are sandy, some are clayey. Some shrink when dry and swell when wet. Some soak up water well, others stay wet. Some are acid, others are alkaline. All of these are important when considering the soil for different uses," he added.

Descriptions of the soils

showing thickness of layers, structure, percentage of sand, silt and clay, and other physical characteristics are available. Interpretation information such as percolation rates, natural fertility, drainage, ponding, flooding, runoff, depth to bedrock, seasonal high water, tables, bearing strength, and shrink-swell potential is also available.

"Detailed soil maps or general soil maps of the county are also available," Useton continued. "A soil map might be called a

blueprint of the land. It can be interpreted to show the best areas for cropland, pastureland, rangeland, and wildlife habitat, as well as the more suitable areas for homes, shopping centers, schools, parks factories and highways."

Judge Kniffen said anyone having a need for soils information should contact SCS. This information is available through the local Central Colorado and Lower Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Dyess Open House Signals Arrival Of B1-B

DYESS AIR FORCE BASE, TEXAS - When the Air Force's first operational B-1B aircraft enters active service here on June 29, 1985, it will be greeted by its predecessors in the long line of America's strategic bombers. The base will host an open house whose theme will be "The Evolution of Strategic Aviation," and which will feature bomber aircraft old and new.

Plans for the B-1B Arrival Task Force in a press conference at the Abilene Chamber of Commerce offices. The task force, which has been planning the arrival for several months, is composed of Dyess personnel and Abilene citizens.

Visitors to the base will be able to view vintage World War II bombers owned and operated by the Confederate Air Force, as well as modern strategic bomber and tanker aircraft active in today's U.S. Air Force.

The arrival event's planners noted that the day's activities are scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. with a flyover of Abilene by Confederate Air Force aircraft. At 10 a.m., Dyess AFB will begin admitting visitors wishing to see the first B-1's arrival, set

for 2 p.m.

In the interim, visitors will be able to see such active Air Force aircraft as the B-52, FB-111, and C-130 on display, as well as such vintage aircraft as the A-20, B-17, B-24, B-25, B-26, and B-29. The B-29 to be displayed is reportedly the last known aircraft of its type still flying. There will also be displays related to the B-1B, provided by the aircraft's prime contractors.

The Confederate Air Force's vintage aircraft are scheduled to take to the air again at 12:15 p.m. This time, they will take off and fly over Dyess AFB.

The 96th Bombardment Wing, host unit at Dyess, will receive its first B-1B at 2 p.m. The new aircraft is scheduled to arrive overhead at 1:40 p.m., fly over the airfield twice, land, and be brought to the center foreground of the other display aircraft.

The first bomber's name, chosen from those submitted by the public during a recent local "Name The First B-1B Contest," will be unveiled at that time, and the plane officially transferred to the 96th Bomb Wing. The open house will end at 5 p.m.

County Judge Instrumental In Forming Silver Haired Legislature

Judge Scott Bailey of Eastland County, Chairman of the Texas Department on Aging's Citizens Advisory Council representing the West Central Texas Area Agency on Aging, has announced the creation of the first Texas Silver-Haired Legislature.

The Silver-Haired Legislature, established by the 69th Texas Legislature, is an elected legislative body comprised of representatives and senators 60 years of age and older. The Silver-Haired Legislature will meet at the Capitol, tentatively in October 1986, to research, develop and pass legislation which is of concern to the state's 2.3 million older Texans. The legislation will then be passed on to the governor

and the regular session of the 70th Texas Legislature for consideration.

"I look forward to this historic event," says Judge Bailey, CAC Chairman from Cisco. "This is a great opportunity for older Texans to better impact the political process. In the 22 other states which have such a program, nearly 70 percent of the legislation they forwarded to their regular legislatures was favorably acted upon."

"This first effort will take a lot of support at the community level throughout the state. We will be asking for help in the election process and will need contributions of time and money since there has been no funding attached to the enabling

legislation for the Silver-Haired Legislature.

"The Texas Department on Aging's Citizens Advisory Council is presently developing election guidelines and a promotional strategy. We will keep the public informed as further information is available."

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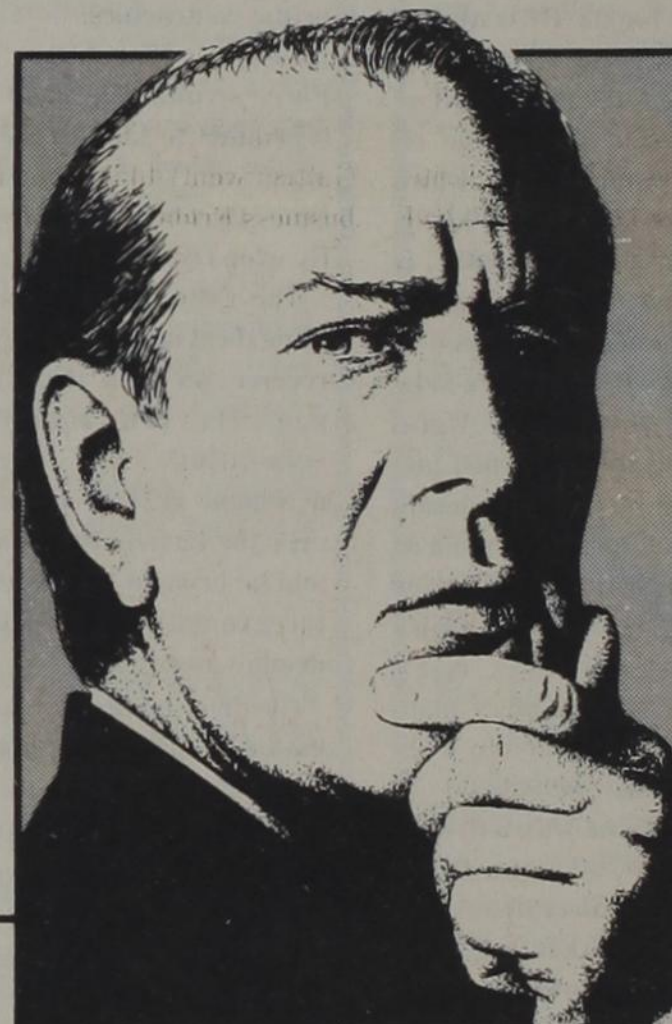

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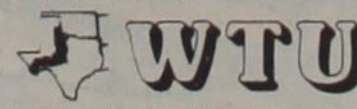
