Sanitary sewer offer gets okay

An offer by an area developer to enlarge Rockport's sanitary sewer plant at no cost to the city received unanimous approval during a meeting attended by four of the city's five council members this past Friday, Dec. 17.

The offer came from Jerry Haldeman, managing partner of Baker-Haldeman Development Co. of Rockport, who is planning a major retail-residential development on both sides of Fulton Beach Road at the present site of the Paws & Taws Building.

In a proposal formally presented by Bickford Shaw, attorney representing Baker-Haldeman, the development first is proposing to enlarge — at no expense to the City of Rockport — the city's sanitary sewage plant by an additional 460,000 gallons per day.

Approximately 100,000 gallons of this would be used by Baker-Haldeman's Nautical Towers project, 100,000 would be made available to the City of Fulton and the remaining 260,000 gallons would be available for Rockport.

City Administrator Herman Johnson in Friday's meeting told the council that

Rockport's extraterritorial jurisdiction and the township of Fulton are in Rockport's sanitary sewer service area as designated by the Public Utility Commission.

What that means, he elaborated, is that if anyone in this area wants sanitary sewer service, it is the responsibility of Rockport to provide it if the individual or group wanting service meets the city's requirements and bring their lines to Rockport's facilities.

"If the city does accept this (Haldeman's) project," Johnson said, "they are only doing what the law requires them to do. If they disapproved it (the proposal), it would be a point of question."

Haldeman's proposal has raised the possibility that Rockport may be able to enlarge its plant even more than the developers propose, by making funds available that the city could use if a pending grant application is approved.

The city presently has pending an application for funds through the Environmental Protection Agency to increase the city's sanitary sewer plant from its existing one million gallons per day to 2.5 million gallons.

Under Baker-Haldeman's proposal, the developers will pay Rockport \$554,000 —

an amount representing connection and other fees the developers will pay the city for the sanitary sewer connections.

Rockport and eight other cities are due consideration next month on their

applications for additional funding to complete projects begun under the EPA-funded project. If Rockport's application is approved next month for the plant expansion, the money paid by Baker-

Haldeman will pay the city's share of the project cost.

At Friday's meeting, Johnson said the total cost of the grant involved will be an estimated \$2.28 million of which the city's share will be about \$570,000.

Baker-Haldeman are proposing to locate a three-story parking garage and 20,000 square feet of retail development on the west side of Fulton Beach Road with a skywalk connecting these facilities to development on the east (bay) side of the road; three towers, two of which will be condominiums, and a restaurant and hotel-banquet facility. Haldeman said present plans call for the restaurant to project partly over the water.

Developers also propose a marina-type harbor but are waiting word from the Corps of Engineers on this phase.

Haldeman said Monday, following the meeting, that his firm made the sanitary sewer offer in an effort "to do our part to better the community. We can carry our own weight with this project," he said, "but we want to do something to get the blessing of the community and contribute to the community."

The developers' offer was presented to Fulton's city council as a matter of information at that council's Dec. 14 meeting. Allen Lee, who serves as city attorney to both Rockport and Fulton, told the Fulton council Haldeman might approach the council at its next meeting in January.

As presented by Shaw Friday, the developers' basic offer calls for construction of 5,000 linear feet of 10-inch gravity line that would go into the township of Fulton and construction of a lift station with a 12-inch force main line to the Rockport sanitary sewer plant which will be upsized to handle the additional sewage.

Baker-Haldeman will pay for connections of their Nautical Towers development — approximately 333 connections — but will not pay for the 333 connections that will be made available to Fulton under the agreement.

If the city receives the grant through the state for enlargement of the plant to 2.5 million gallons per day, it will proceed with that project.

Big cats injure boy

A 9-year-old boy suffered lacerations and two broken bones in his hand when a lion and a jaguar caught the boy's hand through a chain-link fence at Bay Cat Cove Saturday, Dec. 18.

Michael Riley Hollingshead apparently had his hand on the chain-link fence of the pen where the big cats are kept and was petting the jaguar when it put its paw on the child's hand, according to the sheriff's report.

"Grandma, it has my hand," Michael exclaimed, at which point his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Hollingshead, tried to help the boy.

Apparently the lion then took the boy's hand in its mouth and bit it.

The grandparents got the attention of the animals' handler, who took a stick and beat the lion with it until it released the boy.

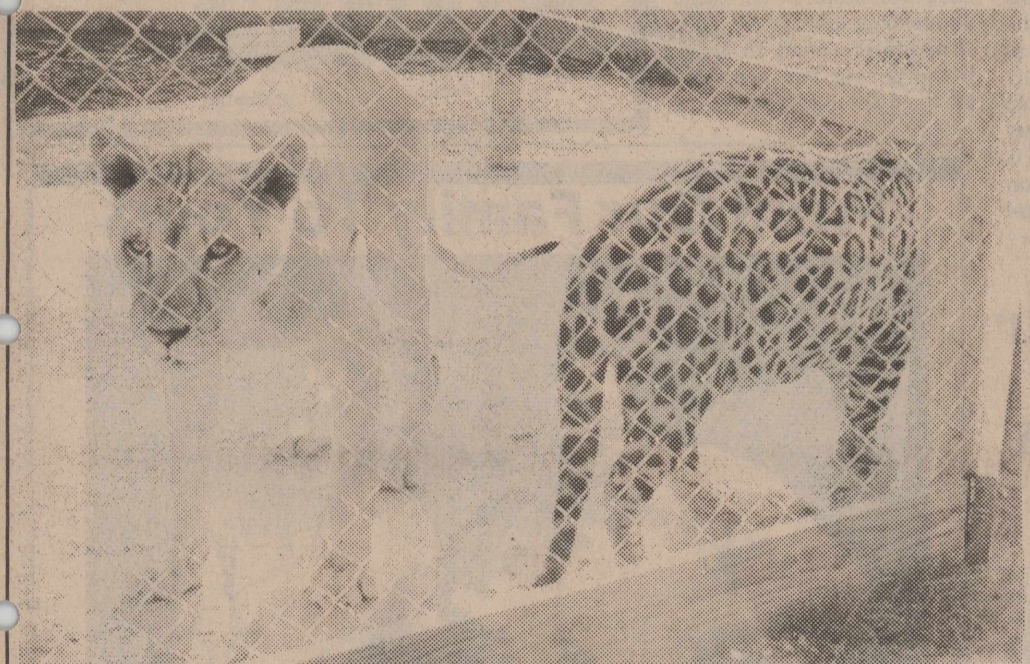
Michael was taken to Coastal Bend Hospital in Aransas Pass, where he was treated for lacerations, two broken bones in his hand, a lacerated shoulder and bruised ribs.

The proprietors of Bay Cat Cove, Mary Helen Robbins, her husband and son, have licenses for the animals. The permit states that the animals are to be kept from the public, and the public from the animals.

Charles Gibbons, attorney for Robbins, said "We have nothing more to add," when advised of the sheriff's report.

The Hollingsheads could not be reached for comment.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and federal authorities have been notified, and the incident is under further investigation.

Traylor annexation hearing cancelled

The second hearing on proposed annexation of Traylor Avenue and a portion of Hwy. 35 North was called off Monday afternoon when Rockport's city council failed to get a quorum at the hearing site.

Rockport Mayor Burt Mills and two of the city's four aldermen met at the annexation

of Traylor and Hwy. 35, site of the 2 p.m. hearing. Also present were City Secretary Helen Braffett, City Public Works Director J.C. Gurley and one area property owner, Victor A. Long, a resident of Harbor Oaks Subdivision.

Mills and council members Murray

McMillan and Richard Beck waited until about 2:15 p.m. before Mills called off the hearing due to lack of a quorum. Alderwoman Betty Jean Ward was unable to attend the hearing due to an emergency and Alderman W.B. Allen could not be contacted.

No new hearing date was set Monday and Braffett said she did not know when a new hearing date might be set.

Monday's was to have been the second hearing on Rockport's proposed annexation of Traylor Avenue from Hwy. 35 to Fulton Beach Road and Hwy. 35 from the south property line of the Wal-Mart site to the north property line of Traylor.

At the first public hearing, held Dec. 13 in City Hall, council members heard from a group of property owners in Harbor Oaks who were concerned with drainage in the area around Traylor Avenue. City officials pointed out the city could do nothing to solve drainage problems in that area until it becomes part of the city.

Annexation of Traylor Avenue is a necessary first step before city officials can consider a request from the Candy Stick Corp., developers of the proposed Harbor Oaks Shopping Village, that the shopping center site be annexed into Rockport.

That request was first made to city officials last spring and again this fall following announcement of the grocery store that will be the anchor tenant of the development.

Area banks, businesses observe holiday season

Most area banks and government offices will observe a holiday on Dec. 24 — Christmas Eve — and most area businesses will be closed on Christmas Day, Dec. 25.

The Rockport Chapter of AARP has cancelled its dance on Thursday, Dec. 23, due to the holidays.

Area banks and savings and loan institutions will close for the day on Dec. 24 and will close at noon on New Year's Eve, Friday, Dec. 31.

Aransas County's school children are already on holiday. Classes were dismissed this past Friday, Dec. 17, and won't resume until Monday, Jan. 3.

Rockport's City Hall will be closed on Dec. 24 and Dec. 31 for Christmas and New Year's eves. No garbage pickups will be made on those days; customers on a Friday

pickup route are asked to put their garbage out on the preceding Thursdays.

Employee benefits high

American workers in 1981 "earned" almost half a trillion dollars over and above their regular salaries and wages. According to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, workers received employee benefits worth \$485 billion or more than three times their level of a decade ago.

The estimate is based on the Chamber's yearly survey of benefits paid by private employers and on the Department of Commerce's report of total wages and salaries paid, which amounted to almost \$1.5 trillion, including pay of all government workers.

According to the Chamber's Survey Research Center, which compiled "Employee Benefits 1981," the annual survey of private employers showed they spent an average of \$6,627 per employee on benefits last year, or 37.3 percent of payroll, a record

high. "Employee Benefits 1981" is a 36-page publication of data, tables and charts which provides a definitive report and latest trends and developments on employee benefits. The Chamber began making such surveys 34 years ago on a biennial basis and now makes them annually.

The 1981 study covers information from 994 reporting companies, whose benefit payments ranged from less than 18 percent to as high as 65 percent of payroll and cost from under \$3,000 to more than \$11,000 a year per employee.

Commenting on the survey, Dr. Richard W. Rahn, vice president and chief economist for the Chamber, emphasized the yearly growth in employee benefits has two major consequences: It enhances workers' security and well-being

and it increases the employers' cost of doing business.

Payments for vacations, holidays, rest periods and other time off, according to Rahn, now constitute almost 40 percent of the cost of total benefits — or \$2,375 in the case of the average yearly benefits payment of \$6,627.

Over the years benefits have grown dramatically. Ten years ago, for example, they averaged \$2,544 per year per employee. They rose sharply up until 1975, according to the Chamber's records, and since then the yearly growth in benefits has slowed and may be tapering off.

Where benefits will stop, of course, nobody knows. So far, at least, it appears that neither employers nor employees believe they have had too much of a good thing.

Symptoms may signal problems

For many parents, diagnosing their child's outbreak of measles or other childhood disease is a simple matter of recognizing the symptoms. But what about those symptoms that aren't as easily identified, symptoms that could signal a more serious problem?

Esther Bell, occupational therapist, and Mary Tarmichael, physical therapist, both of Warm Springs Rehabilitation Hospital, suggest parents watch for signals that could indicate problems in a child's early development.

Warm Springs Rehabilitation Hospital is a comprehensive rehabilitation hospital located near Gonzales, Texas. They first suggest that when reviewing a growth and development chart, don't be concerned if your child hasn't developed a behavior pattern by the early part of the range given, but if he hasn't accomplished a task by the last part of the range considered normal for

a child his age, consult a professional.

"The normal child is responsive to touch and likes to be cuddled," Bell says. "If your child is fretful when touched or if touching seems unpleasant for them, it could indicate a need for help."

If a child seems to ignore one arm, that is a sign of a possible physical problem. A child eight months of age or older who is frightened of movement, or cries when moved, could be signaling for help.

If, by the time a child is walking, the parents notice the child needs constant motion, there may be need for closer examination.

A child who shows an extreme dislike for lying on one side of their body may be indicating an early physical problem.

By detecting these signals early and getting a proper diagnosis, the child has a better chance for receiving early treatment for a specific problem.

Psoriasis helped by oil

Q. Please tell us what is good for psoriasis from a nutritional standpoint.

A. Leading nutritionists feel that this stubborn, eczema-like condition usually disappears when salad oil (that is, cold-processed vegetable oil such as safflower, soy, etc.) and lecithin are added to the diet. The amount to use appears to be three tablespoons of granular lecithin until the condition clears up and then one or two tablespoons as a daily routine intake thereafter; two tablespoons vegetable oil daily until the condition clears up and at least one tablespoon daily thereafter.

The following vitamins, all of which play a part in skin health, have also been found to be helpful in treating psoriasis: vitamin A (up to 100,000 units daily during the first week; reduce to 25,000 units for three months; the B-complex vitamins, especially B-6 (100 to 200 mg. daily); vitamin C (up to 3,000 mg. daily); vitamin D (2,500 to

5,000 units daily); and vitamin E (up to 1,600 units daily).

Q. My wife has one bad cold after another, and in between times she has sinus "drip." She got "turned on" to nutrition a few years ago, and this helped a great deal at first, but now, even though her nutritional needs are met perfectly (she's a big Adelle Davis fan), she still has these colds and things. I told her that they could be psychosomatic, and she got madder than "ol' you know what" at me. What do you say?

A. Psychiatrists, psychologists and even nutritionists (Adelle Davis, for instance) tell us that some colds and other upper respiratory problems are psychosomatic in origin and stem from an unconscious need to cry. When certain experiences remind us unconsciously of traumatic happenings in our earlier lives, when we either cried or wanted to cry, and tears are now held back, the need to cry seeks a socially acceptable form of expression — such as a cold.

Poaching increases in Texas

AUSTIN — Arrests for hunting and fishing law violations increased statewide during September and October over the same period a year ago, according to law enforcement officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"There was a 35 percent increase in number of arrests for the two-month period, and it was a fairly consistent increase throughout the state," said David Palmer, director of field operations. He said this year's total was 9,065,

compared to 6,741 a year ago.

"It just seemed like poachers decided to open all the hunting seasons early this year," Palmer said of the September-October flurry.

Palmer said some of the increase in cases could be attributed to additional game warden personnel in some counties, especially along the coast. "However, we certainly didn't add 35 percent more game wardens to account for that big an increase," he noted.

Deer hunting out of season accounted for a large number of cases, and East Texas was a hotspot for that activity as well as the popular deer hunting areas of the Edwards Plateau and South Texas.

Frank Dickerson, regional law enforcement director at Corpus Christi, said a record number of cases for white-winged dove hunting were filed in his region, which includes the popular whitewing hunting counties of Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. "We filed over 500 cases during the four days of whitewing hunting," Dickerson said. "I thought it was interesting that we found the expected number of violations during the first weekend when a lot of hunters were in the field, but we got about the same number on the second weekend after the number of hunters had decreased." He said this indicated to him that a fairly high percentage of hunters were in violation of the regulations.

Dickerson said an increasing number of arrests are resulting from information telephoned to the department's toll-free Operation Game Thief number in Austin. Persons observing hunting or fishing law violations may call 1-800-792-GAME. If the information leads to a prosecutable case, the caller may be eligible for a cash reward of \$50 to \$200.

Callers may remain anonymous if they desire. The reward program is funded entirely from donations by individuals and organizations.

"Pineywoods Deer Management" is an illustrated 34-page booklet dealing with deer and habitat management in the pine forest region of East Texas. It includes data on deer life history, timber and livestock management for wildlife production, food plots and deer harvest recommendations.

The other booklet, entitled "South Texas Deer-Livestock Relationships and Management" contains much of the same type information as the East Texas booklet, with special emphasis on management of typical South Texas brushland for optimum production of deer in concert with domestic livestock grazing. It describes brush clearing and pasture rotation techniques which allow maximum forage for wildlife and cattle.

Pirates drop three

Rockport-Fulton entered the Port Lavaca Invitational Tournament with the hopes of gaining experience before the bulk of district play opens after Christmas, but the experience they received may not have been that valuable as they lost three games over the past weekend.

The Pirates looked pretty good as a team Thursday night when they were 10-point losers to Port

Lavaca, the host team and a team which beat the Pirates in the opening game of the year.

In the loser's bracket, the Pirates went on to face Calallen, a district rival. The Wildcats overcame a 22-18 lead by the Pirates at the half to come-from-behind and claim a 45-35 victory as the Pirates went cold in the second half, scoring only 4 points in the third quarter, and then

only 4 points in the final stanza. Tim Redden was the top scorer for the Pirates with 14 and Aaron Commander added 9 points.

After taking two losses, the Pirates found themselves against a team which had won only one game all year in the Miller Bucs, but the run-and-gun Bucs ambushed the Pirates which managed to get only 6 points from three players

as the top scorers in the game. Commander, Randy Foote and Rudy Soliz each has 6 points. Miller was off and running in the first quarter as they jumped ahead 11-4. The Pirates made a mild comeback in the second period, but were trailing 35-20 at the half. Two poor second half quarters netted only 12 points for the Pirates.

The losses drop the Pirates' record to 4-8 for the season.

Rockport Lady Pirates fall short

Improving with each outing, the Lady Pirates lost a pair in the Ingleside Classic last weekend as the Ladies fell to a tough West Oso team and then to Incarnate Word Academy.

The Lady Pirates dropped the opener by a narrow margin of 36-29 to a Bear team which had blasted the Pirates in a pre-season scrimmage and also in an earlier contest in the regular season. For the

first quarter, the Lady Pirates had the game under control, taking a 12-11 lead after the opening eight minutes. Then to pad their lead, the Pirates outscored the Bears 9-6 in the second stanza to have a lead of 21-17 at halftime.

It was the third quarter where the Pirates lost it all. Only 2 points were netted by the Ladies, and the Bears popped for 10, making the score 27-23 after three quarters. The

Pirates could never overcome the shock of the poor start in the second half, and the Bears went on to win 29-26. Diana Herman was the only Pirate to net double figures with 10 points, while Charlotte Pugh hit for 7 and both Lori Register and Mona Cowen picked up 6 points.

In the next round, the Lady Pirates ran into the Angels of Incarnate Word. Again the Ladies played it tough in the first half,

trailing 28-22 at the half after a terrible start.

The Pirates were in the contest tough until the fourth quarter. The Pirates outscored the Angels 14-12 to pull within 4 points at the end of three quarters. Going into the fourth period behind only 40-36, the Lady Pirates ran into hard times and the Angels rallied for 24 points during the quarter while the Pirates netted only 12 points. Again Coach Marc Walker's crew had played well, but they fell a little short.

JV roll over Pickers

Led by Bill Mott's 29 point outburst, the Rockport-Fulton JV blasted Robstown Tuesday night in Robstown by a 73-48 margin.

Rockport held only a 2-point lead after the first quarter 15-13. Then the running game of the Pirates got on track and

they began to ease away from the Pickers.

Holiday stress can cause child abuse increase

"Have a holly jolly Christmas," one Christmas song advises. "It's the best time of the year," it adds. The holidays can be the most exciting time of the year, but they can also be the most stressful and have a most un-jolly result: child abuse.

Dr. Margaret McNeese, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Texas Medical School at Houston, said there are three kinds of child abuse: physical, emotional and sexual. The pressure of the holidays and of recent economic problems can cause an increase in incidents of physical abuse, she said.

Physical child abuse rises during holiday periods because "the normal times parents are away from children are changed temporarily," she said. Children are out of school, at home all day and often in the way of parents fixing meals or wrapping presents, for example. That puts families under more stress than usual.

Children from the ages of 0 to 3 years are at "the most risk for abuse," McNeese said, "because they are very demanding and non-verbal. School-age children aren't as much at risk

because they can relate and respond to the parent."

Other problems that add to the parents' stress are repeated illnesses, a new baby, loss of job, moving and death in the family.

The most stressful time of day, when most physical abuse occurs, is between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m., she said.

Most people who physically abuse their children don't know anything about child development, nor do they realize what is con-

sidered abuse, she said.

"Hitting a child with anything other than your hand, on the child's buttocks, is abuse," she explained. "Some people say the first hit is for the child, and any more are for the parent."

She suggested trying other punishments, such as "time out" (having a child stay in his or her room for a short time, for example) or denial of privileges, to discipline children.

She added that abusive

parents seldom see their actions as abusive. Often, they are raised the same way.

McNeese offered these suggestions for coping with having children underfoot during the holidays:

— Plan your days. Do things like wrapping presents when children are taking naps, for example.

— Take the children to a park for an hour to let them run off some of their energy.

— Plan some time away from the children. Some child care centers are still open: let the child stay there for a morning or afternoon. Or send your children to a neighbor's house for the morning, offering to return the favor

when she needs time off. "Avoid stressful situations as much as possible,"

the pediatrician advised. "Don't set yourself up for problem situations."

Drugs may help contain seizures

Epileptics for years faced an uphill battle against the stigma that society placed on them. But anti-convulsant drugs now available have helped change the picture.

Proper use of the right medication can help make an active and fulfilling life possible for most epileptics and limit the chances of an epileptic seizure, says the Texas Medical Association. Epilepsy is a nervous-system disorder with symptoms that may include muscle spasms, mental confusion and loss of consciousness. Seizures can range from mild to severe and usually last only a short time. The drugs are designed to prevent these seizures, in which brain cells create abnormal electrical discharges that cause temporary loss of certain body functions.

Scientists still do not know why these cells, called neurons, do this. But epilepsy has been related to birth defects, prenatal damage or injury at birth to

the central nervous system, poisons, head injuries, diseases such as measles, circulatory disorders, brain tumors and poor nutrition. In some cases, the cause is impossible to identify.

An estimated 2.1 million Americans suffer from epilepsy. The Epilepsy Foundation of America says anti-convulsant drugs successfully prevent seizures in the majority of people who take medication regularly and as prescribed.

A study published recently by the New England Journal of Medicine offered other encouraging news. Certain epileptic children who remain free of seizures during four years of treatment probably can stop taking the drugs without suffering relapses. These are children who are not in high-risk categories. Persons who discontinue the drugs should do so only with a doctor's permission and under his or her close supervision.

Adult continuing education program to begin its second phase

The second phase of Adult Continuing Education will begin on Jan. 17, with an offering of 10 courses. The program will be expanded as new courses are requested by the community and qualified instructors can be located. The Continuing Education Program is designed to provide community service by offering noncredit courses, seminars, workshops, institutes and other activities. Quail hunting season begins Jan. 29

The Matagorda Island Unit of Aransas National Wildlife refuge, with the exception of the old air base facilities area, will be open for bobwhite quail hunting from Saturday, Jan. 29, through Sunday, Feb. 13, 1983. Shooting hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily. Each day of the hunting will be by drawing only.

Applications for hunting can be obtained from Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, Matagorda Island Unit, P.O. Box 141, Port O'Connor, TX 77982 after Jan. 1, 1983. Applications on post cards will not be accepted this year.

Applications must be

received at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, Matagorda Island Unit, P.O. Box 141, Port O'Connor, TX 77982 by Jan. 17, 1983. Drawing will be held Jan. 18, 1983.

All quail hunting activities must comply with Federal and State laws and regulations.

Hunters are reminded that public transportation to Matagorda Island is not available and should make their own arrangements for the 10-mile boat trip to the island docks.

Camping is permitted near the island docks. All hunters are required to register at the island refuge office prior to

hunting. Transportation to the hunting areas will be provided by refuge personnel as their work schedules

permit. Personal motorized vehicles are not permitted on the Matagorda Island Unit.

Don't forget your pet's Christmas present. Our pets are treated like members of the family. On Christmas Day, there is

Save energy and water in laundry

COLLEGE STATION — High energy and water prices can be cut considerably by some simple conservation practices in home laundry.

The water heater should be set no higher than 140 degrees F, according to Becky Saunders, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Normally soiled clothes will wash nicely in warm — rather than hot — water. A cold rinse is just as effective as a warm one,

and can save energy. Conserve water by setting the water level to match the load size. Wash time can be shortened — and energy saved — by using soak cycles.

When buying new appliances, consider how much hot water is used per cycle, Saunders advises. Read the operating manual that comes with the machine carefully and learn all the energy and water saving instructions.

Water and energy savings can be achieved by combining small loads. "Do

not overload the machine, however, because this can result in wrinkling, lint or cleaning problems, and can cause other damage to your clothing," cautions Saunders.

Assure proper cleaning in shorter cycles by pre-treating or soaking heavily soiled clothes. Use the correct amount of laundry detergent for the load size.

Mend any tears or holes in clothing before laundering garments, because washing often worsens these problems, reminds

Saunders. Pre-treat stains and spots. The heat of the dryer could make them permanent.

Don't forget that physical energy can be conserved, Saunders adds. "Locate the laundry area near the laundry source, such as the bathroom. The dryer, if not overloaded, also can save on ironing."

Sharing the work load with other family members can help, Saunders suggests. Be sure, however, that everyone who does laundry follows energy-saving procedures.

Poinsettia suitable for winter

The Poinsettia (Euphorbia Pulcherrima) is a native plant of the Republic of Mexico. This plant was brought to the United States many years ago by our Ambassador Poinsettia, and thus bears his name.

This plant is suitable for cultivating for winter display in the deep south, but it requires quite a bit of care for the northern climates. In the South it may be grown outdoors and it will grow into large shapely bushes and/or trees, which produce very handsome bracts of red, pink, or creamy white. There are single and double-flowered poinsettias. In the double-flowered poinsettia you will find the bracts to be more numerous and remain attractive much longer.

We, here in this area, are more familiar with the single stem plant in a six

inch pot with a single head of bracts, which are in full bloom at Christmas time. Some plants are grown with more than one branch, but the flower head (bracts) is usually smaller than a single stem specimen. After flowering the plant should be cut back and kept dry in a temperature of 50 to 55 degrees for several weeks. In May they should be pruned to within six to eight inches of the soil and started into growth again by watering and keeping in a sunny, warm location.

After new growth has started, a minimum temperature of 65 to 70 degrees should be maintained. If you want additional poinsettia plants, cuttings can be taken from this new growth and rooted at that time. The soil should consist of fibrous loam, three parts, and one part of equal proportions of dried cow manure, leaf mold and sand. These plants need to be ventilated more freely

and the atmosphere should be kept drier than at any other time during the growth season.

Weekly fertilizing with a dilute liquid fertilizer with a reading of 20/20/20 is required for maximum growth and beauty. You must remember that the red (pink or white) bracts is not the flower. The tiny yellow center cluster is the flower of the poinsettia.

Poinsettias resent drafts and are easily damaged by spraying of insecticide.

They need short days and long nights to bloom. Light at night prevents flowering and the formation of the bracts. The old myth that the poinsettias are poisonous has been recently disproved. If you like plants and enjoy working with them, you may want to pick up some poinsettias after Christmas and try to make them bloom for the next year.

Leaders support war on drugs

COLLEGE STATION — A leadership project of the 22,680-member Texas Ex-

tension Homemakers Association has resulted in a united effort in support of

the Texans' War on Drugs Program.

A resolution adopted recently by the entire membership pledged the support of Extension Homemakers groups in the war on drugs at both the community and county levels, according to June Cline, organization specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Extension Homemakers are concentrating their leadership efforts, Cline says, in four main areas:

1. Speaking in their communities to increase the level of awareness about the harmful effects of drugs.

2. Monitoring court cases that involve drugs to see that offenders do not get off without receiving the full measure of the penalty that fits the crime.

3. Forming parent peer groups in schools, communities and churches with parents, and getting together to develop guidelines for their children to follow to help prevent drug involvement.

4. Encouraging drug awareness programs in schools and making drug awareness part of every teacher's in-service training.

Goals of the Extension Homemakers organization

are to promote wholesome family relationships and to share community responsibilities with other organizations, Cline says. The anti-drug educational effort is one more voice among many throughout the state that should bring a clear message to drug dealers and users about their being unwelcome in Texas.

The Texans' War on Drugs committee was established by Gov. Bill Clements and is chaired by Dallas businessman H. Ross Perot. The committee, of which TEHA

President Billie McCraw is a member, established a three-pronged approach to combat drug abuse: education and prevention; legislation; and law enforcement.

Association's committee responsible for the implementation of education and prevention has been instrumental in establishing and strengthening community and family groups throughout the state, Cline reports.

The level of awareness of drug abuse has already increased considerably, and programs involving parents and various civic organizations are making progress in the effort to eradicate this menace to Texas youth, Cline adds.

V.A. news

A recent report by the Veterans Administration of military personnel use of the GI Bill reveals that by last September more than one million persons had trained while still on active duty.

The post-Korean GI Bill was the first bill to extend educational opportunities to service personnel as well as veterans, said T.W. Myatt, Director, Houston VA Regional Office. The peak year for training by military personnel was fiscal 1976, when 286,000 persons used the popular VA benefit.

Forty-six percent of the service personnel who trained while on active duty — more than 577,000 — went on to school as veterans, about 75 percent of the service personnel trained part-time, 28 percent of the active-duty trainees used correspondence courses rather than classroom training, nearly 31 percent of the service personnel were considered educationally "disadvantaged" when they applied for training and, since 1978, the most popular form of training has been at the college level.

The number of military personnel using the GI Bill has declined considerably since 1976. Persons initially entering on active duty

after Dec. 31, 1976, no longer were eligible for the educational benefits, Myatt noted.

The post-Korean GI Bill still permits a veteran to use education benefits within 10 years following discharge or by Dec. 31, 1989, whichever is earlier. Recent legislation has extended that deadline for 1982 and 1983 to educationally disadvantaged or unskilled Vietnam-era veterans who allowed their 10-year delimiting date to expire before using all their entitlement for educational training.

District court report

In the Dec. 16 court of Judge Littlejohn, David Clyde Davis pled true to charges of aggravated assault, resulting in revocation of his probation. Davis was sentenced to six months in the Aransas County Jail, and fined \$2,000 plus court costs.

Matthew B. Swann was found guilty of felony theft

(\$200/\$10,000) and sentenced to three years with the TDC, probated and ordered to pay restitution.

In the Dec. 17 court of District Judge Ronald M. Yeager, Sheril E. Young pled true to charges of unlawful possession of a controlled substance, resulting in revocation of probation. Young was sentenced to 10 years with the TDC, probated.

Civilian vets decrease

The number of military veterans in civilian life took a downward turn during the last 12 months for the first time in 16 years.

That and other data on veterans and related programs were compiled by the Veterans Administration in "Trend Data 1957-1981."

Prepared by the agency's Office of Reports and Statistics, the 52-page book covers 25 years of data on 11 major VA activities such as veteran population, expenditures, loan guarantees and insurance. Highlights:

— The number of veterans in civilian life has decreased for the first time in 16 years, falling to 30,083,000.

— Total VA expenditures have almost doubled since 1972, and have increased 298 percent to \$25.2 billion in 1981.

— Veterans receiving compensation have increased 10 percent to nearly 2.28 million in 28 years.

— There has been an almost continual increase in

the number of outpatient medical-care visits over the past 25 years, from 3.3 billion in 1957 to 17.9 million in 1981.

— Spending by VA for medical programs has increased 615 percent in 22 years, from less than \$1 billion to \$6.6 billion. But the average number of VA hospital operating beds has fallen from a 1958 peak of 121,201 to a 1981 low of 82,079. The average daily patient census in VA hospitals has dropped from 111,599 in 1958 to 66,376 in 1981, a dip of 41 percent.

— Total employment in the VA has increased 33.6 percent to 232,417 in 25 years. The number of full-time physicians increased 47 percent since 1957 to a total of 6,849.

— The VA and VA-supported nursing home care average daily census has increased from a low of 324 in 1965 to a high of 22,347 in 1981.

James Walker, a retired government economist, has a complaint not likely to get much attention in the vast federal bureaucracy in the Nation's Capital. His federal pension, Walker says, keeps "compounding" due to cost-of-living increases until today it amounts to \$2,400 a month, or about \$29,000 a year — "more than 11 percent more than I

deserve and a hell of a lot more than I need."

Walker, according to an article in the Washington Post, has written to budget chief David A. Stockman requesting that a temporary freeze be placed on further cost-of-living increases in federal retirement pensions, including his own.

When he retired in 1967, he was earning \$17,000 a year as an economist for the Department of Labor.

Walker's pension grew in compounded fashion because of numerous cost-of-living adjustments received by federal retirees. Until 1976, the government made cost-of-living adjustments twice a year and sometimes almost every three months.

Thanks to critics of overly generous federal pay policies, chiefly the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, these cost-of-living adjustments now are made only once a year, at a savings of millions of dollars to taxpayers.

About 1.4 million government retirees enjoy a retirement bonus shared by only a few retired workers from private industry. According to a survey by the U.S. Department of Labor, only three percent of workers in private industry are covered by pension plans that are indexed to the Consumer Price Index (CPI). And of these few, most place a cap or limit of three percent on cost-of-living increases. There are no such limits on federal indexing.

Still taxpayers each year are led to believe that federal pay policies lag behind those in the private sector. The studies on which those claims are based do not even take into account forms of compensation such as pensions.

In defending federal pay policies, a spokesman for a union representing government workers contended most federal retirees are not as highly rewarded in retirement as Walker. The average pension, he said, is about \$11,000 a year. "He's just not typical,"

the spokesman said, speaking of Walker.

This may well be the understatement of the year. How often do you find a federal worker or retiree asking for a reduction in their government checks?

Offer

In response to a question from Juanita Wagley, who owns the Paws & Laws Building, on how the city could fund the grant project if funds were not available from Baker-Haldeman, Johnson said, "Either bond issue or certificates of obligation."

"So what it boils down to," Wagley said, "is that this is a bonanza for the city."

"It certainly is," Johnson responded, "if it works out."

In answer to a question from Kathryn Winkelman concerning the proposed

development, Johnson said the project is not in city limits of Rockport or Fulton and Rockport has no authority over it except in the matter of providing utility service.

Friday's meeting began at 1:30 p.m. at City Hall and was recessed about 2:30 p.m. when Shaw presented the council with an actual proposed agreement rather than a letter of intent as the council had expected.

Rockport Mayor Burt Mills observed, "I believe this is good for the community and you can't gripe when it's no cost to you. If

we can get the grant from the state, that makes it even better."

Winkelman asked what would happen if the city doesn't get the grant and Johnson replied the city would still gain a sewage increase of 260,000 gallons per day at no cost.

Following reconvening of the meeting shortly after 4 p.m., Alderman Richard Beck moved to approve the agreement with the developers and W.B. Allen seconded the motion. Beck, Allen and Murray McMillan voted for the motion. Alderwoman Betty Jean Ward was not present at the session.

Also not present were any representatives of the Fulton city council although Rockport council members indicated they had expected at least the Fulton mayor to attend Friday's meeting.

New law limits 1982 tax options

COLLEGE STATION — Cash basis taxpayers on a calendar year have little time left to manage their 1982 income tax situations.

They need to consider changes brought about by the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 and this year's Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act in their tax planning.

"Under the new tax rules, taxpayers should still complete estimates of taxable incomes for 1982 and 1983," says Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

If an income tax estimate suggests that "continuing business as usual" for the remainder of the year is unacceptable, then a tax management strategy must be selected and implemented by Dec. 31.

Recognizing that tax rules have changed, Lovell offers a word to the wise: "Immediately consult your tax advisor."

Your tax advisor will size up your situation and counsel you as to the appropriate tax strategy, says the economist. Otherwise, you may regret tax decisions based upon general recommendations which appear in the media this time of year.

Lovell gives this illustration. Assume that the general advice is that you should delay receipt of income until 1983 or later and pay expenses before 1983. This strategy reflects the expected lower income tax rates effective in July 1983, and that taxable income in 1983 may be less than in 1982.

Business firms may decide to purchase certain depreciable business assets which qualify for investment tax credit in 1982 rather than waiting until 1983. Those assets which are purchased after 1982 must have the tax basis reduced by 50 percent of the investment and energy credits taken on the assets. Additionally, the provision for expensing up to \$5,000 of qualifying property is available in 1982 and 1983. In the currently depressed agricultural sector, farm machinery and equipment may be a good enough buy

to make 1982 purchases a sound after-tax business decision.

Taxpayers in the higher income tax brackets may wish to implement several options before the end of 1982:

— With the scheduled 10 percent reduction in personal taxes in July 1983, charitable contributions may have a higher after-tax cost after 1982.

— The maximum capital gains tax rate decreased from 28 percent to 20 percent on net capital gains resulting from sales or exchanges occurring after June 9, 1981. Taxpayers with less than a 20 percent effective tax on net capital gains may justify postponing capital gains income until 1983 to benefit from the lower individual tax rates.

— As a result of the Installment Sales Act of 1980, installment sales contracts should be considered for delaying ordinary income as well as capital gains income into 1983. Such strategy may be especially suitable for taxpayers expecting lower taxable incomes in 1983.

— Contributions to Keogh plans and IRAs can be made anytime until the date the tax return is due. With the higher dollar limits and new eligibility requirements, many taxpayers should consider using these alternatives for fine-tuning 1982 tax liabilities prior to filing in 1983.

— With the Accelerated Cost Recovery System effective beginning in 1981, end-of-year purchases of recovery property are eligible for a full year's depreciation deduction.

Whatever your income prospects for 1983 relative to 1982, you should quantify expectations through practice runs by completing the appropriate income tax returns, advises Lovell. After comparing estimated taxable incomes for 1982 and 1983, you must decide whether to increase or decrease 1982 taxable income or to leave it unchanged. If the decision is to change 1982 taxable income, then you need to estimate the impact of various alternatives for achieving the desired results, notes the economist.

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 587
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SPEED OF TRAFFIC IN, ALONG AND UPON THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND WAYS OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT; ESTABLISHING THE RATE OF SPEED ON STATE HIGHWAY NO. 35; PRESCRIBING PENALTIES AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That under the authority of Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. Article 6701d, Section 166, et seq., as amended, the prima facie speed limits shall be altered within the city limits of the City of Rockport, and on the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation made by the State Highway Commission, the speed prescribed for all motor vehicles in and along State Highway No. 35, shall henceforth be as follows:

State Highway No. 35
Beginning at the north City Limit of Rockport to a point 1.223 miles south of the north City Limit, 40 M.P.H.

From a point 1.223 miles south of the north City Limit to a point 2.199 miles south of the north City Limit, 35 M.P.H., except that portion signed for school zone at 25 M.P.H. when flashing.

From a point 2.199 miles south of the north City Limit to a point 3.099 miles south of the north City Limit, 45 M.P.H.

From a point 3.099 miles south of the north City Limit to the south City Limit of Rockport, 50 M.P.H.

SECTION 2. It shall henceforth be unlawful to operate a motor vehicle upon the streets, alleys and ways in the City of Rockport in excess of the following speeds:

(a) Fifteen (15) miles per hour in all alleys.

(b) Thirty (30) miles per hour within the city limits of Rockport, Texas, except when a lower rate of speed is required or when a greater speed is permitted as set out and prescribed in this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. For the purposes of this Ordinance, an alley shall be defined as the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel, having no legal or official name and of twenty (20) feet or less in width.

SECTION 4. That any violation of the terms of this Ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, any person so violating shall be fined in any sum not exceeding TWO HUNDRED AND NO/100 (\$200.00) DOLLARS.

SECTION 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. If any portion of this act is held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions hereof shall nevertheless be valid, the same as if the portion or portions held unconstitutional had not been adopted.



Farmers, ranchers need to examine tax situation

COLLEGE STATION — With 1982 winding down, farmers and ranchers ...

to take a close look at their income tax situation. A few smart decisions to adjust income or expenditures before the end of the year might save considerable tax dollars.

"The key thing is for farmers and ranchers to consider the tax impact before making any major sale or purchase," points out Dr. James Ahrenholz, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"The general purpose of year-end tax planning is to level out taxable income from year to year to avoid jumping through several tax brackets from one year to the next," notes the economist.

However, 1982 offers a certain dilemma for many agricultural producers. With another tax reduction (about 10 percent) slated for 1983, producers may feel inclined to shift some taxable income into next year, particularly if 1982 taxable income will be above average.

On the other hand, pushing income into 1983 could be a costly mistake if income prospects for next year look better or if such action will create a net operating loss (NOL) this year.

"Avoiding a NOL is important from several

standpoints," says Ahrenholz. "Personal deductions options should add up to at least \$5,400 for a couple with no dependent children and \$7,400 for a family of four. If income does not equal these levels, these allowances will be lost."

Social Security retirement benefits also will be affected by low net earnings in preretirement years. And contributions to a Keogh or IRA retirement plan may be affected if taxable income falls too low.

"To find out where you stand on 1982 taxable income, use last year's tax tables and schedules and subtract 10 percent," says the economist. "For a rough estimate of 1983 taxes, subtract another 10 percent. Remember that the maximum capital gains tax on the sale of land, machinery or other investments is 20 percent."

Delaying expenses is a sure way for the cash basis taxpayer to shift taxable income from 1983 to this year, says Ahrenholz. This can be done by postponing purchases until next year or by waiting until next year to pay for fertilizer or lime that's needed before the end of the year.

Certain soil and water conservation and land clearing expenses can be capitalized and depreciated rather than taking them all this year. If this election is

made for soil and water conservation expenses, then it must be continued in future years. However, the choice to expense or capitalize land clearing costs is an annual election, the economist points out.

Producers might also be able to defer paying certain taxes and interest until next year. And shifting capital assets bought before 1981 from a rapid method of depreciation to straight line depreciation can postpone deductions.

"Farmers also can boost their 1982 income by making sure they receive payment for grain and livestock sales before year-end," Ahrenholz explains. "In addition, they can receive advance diversion and deficiency payments when they sign up for the 1983 wheat, feedgrain and cotton programs."

CCC crop loan proceeds can also be included in income in the year received. Once this practice is started, however, it must be continued in future years.

To avoid a NOL, producers might consider selling certain assets that will eventually be sold anyway. Gilts might be sold instead of sows to create ordinary income instead of capital gains. Machinery that is depreciated-out might be sold instead of traded, resulting in ordinary income in 1982.

Bobwhites exist in fair numbers in Texas

When it's Christmas-time, it's natural to think of a "partridge in a pear tree." Here in South Texas that translates to "bobwhite in a mesquite tree" (try singing that one!). And what an appealing little partridge it is.

About the size of a meadowlark, the male northern bobwhite's most prominent coloring is the white eye-stripe and the white throat. This is contrasted by black in the ear region, setting off the white areas.

The rest of the body, including the upper breast, is overall ruddy-colored overlaid with blackish, especially below the white stripe and throat. The underbelly is light.

Where the male is white, the female is buffy and

more heavily marked with brown and buff barring both above and below. The tail is short and dark.

Most of the eastern U.S. is in the bobwhite's range and where it doesn't occur naturally father north, it has been introduced. It has also been introduced in some of the western states, although they have their own species of quail.

Bobwhites exist in fair numbers in western and southern Texas except where excessive grazing occurs. A maximum population density of about one quail per acre, under the best conditions, is possible in the fall.

Since quail live in winter coveys of about 10-15 birds per covey, this amounts to about that many acres per covey. Less optimum con-

ditions may produce only one covey per 24 acre.

Prime habitat in Texas consists of sandy mesquite drylands; pine-oak woodland with small farms; and coastal prairie uplands.

Croplands are important in summer and fall. Brushy areas and woodlands are important all year for

roosting and cover but are also important for food in winter.

Spring population densities are about half of what the fall population is so a pair of bobwhites will use up to four acres.

The typical roosting behavior in winter is for the covey to orient in a circular

formation, bodies touching on both sides and their tails together. This serves to maintain body heat.

In the fall, the diet consists mostly of seeds, especially of legumes and acorns. Doveweed (Croton spp.) is important as food here in Texas. They also

eat ragweed, sunflower and sorghums.

Animal protein, with the availability of insects in summer, provides up to 30 percent of the diet during the breeding season.

By spring the males will begin displaying to attract their mates and the coveys begin to break up into pairs. If both members of a mated pair live through the winter, they may stay together.

A shallow depression about five inches wide is scratched out and lined with dead leaves. Grasses or other vegetation are arched over the nest to conceal it. Either sex builds the nest. About two days after completion of the nest, the first egg is laid and one per day after that is laid until there is a clutch of about 14 eggs.

Now it is winter, the social unit is the covey of 10-15 birds. Half of these will be killed.

In 1970 it was estimated that 37 million bobwhites were shot by hunters during the open season. The life expectancy for a bobwhite is less than a year (8.5 months) yet it is known that it can live at least up to 8 years. Obviously few birds survive to breed more than once.

Habitat destruction such as the removal of hedgerows has been especially devastating to this species.

Give a bobwhite a merry Christmas — leave that weed standing and "shoot" it with a camera, not a gun.

A few states actually consider these birds too attractive to be hunted and protect them. In 1981 Texas hunters killed an estimated 3,000,000 bobwhites and that was considered a bad year.

Burning is an effective tool

COLLEGE STATION — Burning of pastures and ranges can be an effective range management tool if planned and done properly.

Use of fire as a range and pasture renovation practice, called prescribed burning, is not a "cure-all" but rather an alternative that should be integrated into a ranching operation, says a range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"It's important to work out a prescription for each kind of burn," says Wayne Hanselka of Corpus Christi. "This means that clear objectives must be established. A burn to suppress brush may be entirely different from one to remove debris or to provide early spring grass growth for cattle."

Rationale for a burn should include location, purpose, timing and how to burn. These components make up the "fire plan." Preburn treatments might include deferring pastures or using herbicides or mechanical means to reduce brush canopies and encourage fuel growth.

"Finalize plans for a prescribed burn six months to a year before the burn," recommends Hanselka. "This includes arranging alternate forage sources for your livestock, lining up equipment such as dozers or graders to construct fire lanes, and arranging for fire fighting equipment. Also schedule personnel for the job, with the fire boss in charge."

The specialist also advises notifying appropriate authorities when a prescribed burn is scheduled. These include the local sheriff, fire department and Department of Public Safety as well as persons with special interests or facilities on the property, including those with oil, gas and hunting leases. The Texas Air Control Board must be notified when burning salt marshes in coastal counties.

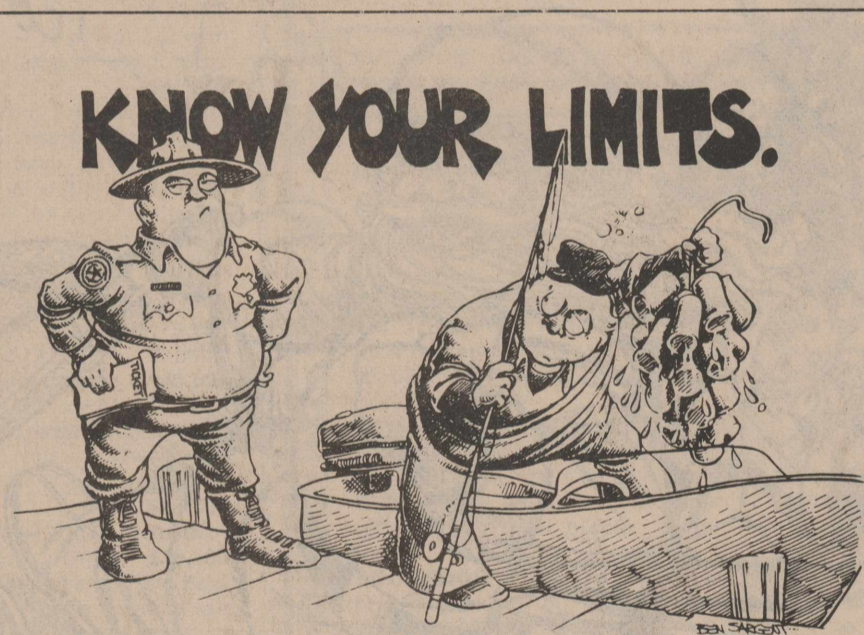

Even Santa gets the flu

HOUSTON — To millions of children around the world, Santa Claus is an ageless fellow. He's lived over 16 centuries — without the benefit of a medical checkup.

But this year is different. The jolly old man in red has delivered enough Nikes, after all, to learn the relationship between fitness, lifestyle and health.

"It's Santa Claus, all right," confirmed Dr. George Kerr, a pediatrician and director of the Human Nutrition Center at the University of Texas School of Public Health. "Like all of us, he's suffering from holiday exhaustion and making resolutions to improve his health."

A celebrity noted for a belly that shakes "like a bowlful of jelly," Santa does not sport a lean image. But according to Kerr, these extra pounds are "not a problem of his own doing." Fueled by millions of high-calorie, high-fat, high-sugar treats, Santa really can't exercise self-

control in eating. To avoid the cookies and milk left on mantels everywhere would disappoint children who look for evidence of his yearly visit.

"Even more of a problem are the alcoholic beverages left by well-meaning but unwise parents," Kerr warned. "These nightcaps increase Santa's risk of having an accident or mixing up presents. Most certainly, they contribute to his rosy cheeks and prominent red nose."

These physical traits also suggest that Santa is hypertensive, a condition of high blood pressure exacerbated by his habit of smoking a pipe, his lack of regular exercise and the demands of his inflexible deadlines.

"Santa isn't immune to the fitness craze. He balks at tight chimneys. He's just as susceptible as you and I to the advertisements and promises of weight reduction clinics, exercise clubs and health food stores. But the constant crash dieting

in January actually increases his nutritional risks and leads to feelings of frustration and depression," said Kerr.

While Santa's excess baggage puts a strain on his health and his self-esteem, obesity is not the gentleman's greatest health risk, according to Kerr.

"The occupational hazards associated with his job are greater than those of any ordinary workplace," he said. "Why, on his sleighride alone, he's exposed to extremes in temperature and humidity, pollutants from industrialized cities and cancer-causing hydrocarbons from the soot of chimneys."

Add to this list the dangers of a fall from a rooftop, a kick from an indignant reindeer, altitude sickness, jet lag and frostbite, and suddenly Santa needs a heavy liability insurance policy.

Kerr also disclosed that St. Nick has been arrested as an illegal alien, mugged in numerous unsavory neighborhoods and has grown nearsighted after deciphering millions of handwritten notes.

And, of course, Christmas inevitably coincides with the flu season. In Santa's countless personal appearances, mothers with children in tow parade to shopping centers and malls for a face-to-face encounter with Mr. Claus.

"Can you imagine the exchange of germs? In taking his history, I was shocked to learn that Santa has contracted 37 strains of the same virus!" Kerr said.

For Santa Claus, the road to recovery involves some simple self-discipline from January to November.

"We've prescribed a nutritional eating plan, regular exercise program and relaxation techniques for Mr. Claus that should improve his condition dramatically, but I doubt that these will have any profound effects on the future of Christmas. While carrot sticks and juice are nutritional substitutes for milk and cookies, they do contradict tradition."

Yet despite his rotund appearance, his hectic lifestyle and demanding profession, Santa continues to flourish generation after generation.

Kirkpatrick is at the midpoint of his career

KINGSVILLE — Dr. Roy L. Kirkpatrick, at 42, considers himself at the midpoint of his career, and his current work at Texas A&I University may mark the beginning of a new direction in his research.

Kirkpatrick is a distinguished research scientist at Texas A&I's Caesar Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute, the highest ranking research position the Institute offers.

His friendly, soft-spoken manner and his office, furnished with mementos of his heritage and his experience, give little indication of his prestige as a wildlife scientist.

On the wall near his desk hangs a wooden plaque carved in the shape of his native West Virginia, with a barefooted mountaineer and the words "Lest we forget" stitched in the fabric center.

"I grew up on a small farm in West Virginia and was the first member of my family to go to college," he explained. "My sister made that plaque for me as a joke so I wouldn't forget my upbringing and feel too important with my title as distinguished research scientist."

Elsewhere in his office is a display of miniature wooden

figures depicting scenes of everyday life in an African village and a pair of egrets carved from cattle horns. They were obtained in East Africa or in Nigeria during Kirkpatrick's two-year assignment as an animal science professor in 1969-71.

Kirkpatrick says his experience there was both "rewarding and harrowing." His primary task in Nigeria was teaching animal science courses at the university, but he also helped establish a new breed of cattle that was resistant to tsetse fly infections.

"In the rain belt of West

Africa, there is practically no protein in the human diet because most animals are susceptible to sleeping sickness. Establishing the new breed helped alleviate their protein deficiency but created new problems in teaching the people how to manage their livestock," noted Kirkpatrick.

His help extended beyond his academic pursuits with the founding of a local congregation of the Church of Christ.

"I have a strong commitment to the church and both my wife Thelma and I looked forward to the opportunity of serving as missionaries. I still correspond with church members there and I'm glad to say the congregation is still going strong."

Kirkpatrick's Nigerian assignment and his current stay here mark his only absences from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 16 years. After earning an animal science degree from West Virginia University and finishing graduate school at the University of Wisconsin with degrees in endocrinology and reproductive physiology, he went to Virginia Tech as a professor of wild animal physiology and nutrition.

It has been a productive association with 88 technical publications and 108 presentations so far. He was the 1978 recipient of VPI's faculty research award as the outstanding College of Agriculture researcher over the previous five years. Currently he is serving as editor of "Wildlife Monographs," a publication of The Wildlife Society.

"Over the years I have evolved to become less an animal physiologist and nutritionist and more a wildlife nutritional ecologist," says Kirkpatrick.

"My present interests are concerned with the way various aspects of nutrition act to regulate wildlife populations. My work here will focus on writing on the influences of nutrition on reproduction and offspring survival in certain wild animals," he added.

Kirkpatrick believes that wildlife management is largely dependent on habitat management and that the key to effective habitat management is the management of nutrition.

"Deer, for example, are seasonal breeders," he observes. "The difference between producing one or two

fawns is determined by the digestible energy intake of the doe at the time of ovulation. If her diet provides a high level of vital nutrients, then the chances of multiple births are increased.

"It's also important for the doe to receive high levels of protein and energy during the last trimester of her pregnancy as it affects the size and vigor of the fawns and her own lactating ability," he added.

Kirkpatrick's literature review here will include the needs of rabbits, rodents, mammalian and avian predators, turkeys, ducks and quail. He hopes to provide wildlife managers with more insight into nutritional requirements by comparing species differences in production in response to nutrition.

"The goal is to condense all the information so managers can get an overview of ways nutrition affects reproduction and survival," said the researcher. "I hope this will generate a cross-fertilization of ideas among people working on many different species."

Kirkpatrick hopes to continue this type of comparative literary research into wildlife ecology. He will leave Texas A&I in March after a six-month stay. His paper should be ready for publication and will serve as a representative of a different approach to wildlife research and a new career direction.


The symposium, which was held in 1977, honored Chaney, professor of biology
