## State Capital News

Gov. John Connally has accepted invitations of supporters to actively seek designation as Texas favorite son Democratic presidential candidate.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough also has been urged by anti-Connally Pro-Robert Kennedy and pro-John F. Kennedy forces to make light against the governor in precinct conventions for the favorite son role.

Issue may set off a major fight in precinct conventions May 4, a place where the average voter will have anything to say about the choice of a presidential nominee.

**Courts Speak**

Law enforcement officers are warning of the potential far-reaching effect of a new federal decision here declaring as "disturbing-the-peace" law constitutional.

Gen. Crawford C. Martin filed a motion for rehearing to take his appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court if necessary. He filed the decision by a three-judge federal panel in the case which originated with Vietnam protesters displaying signs in a speech by President Johnson in Killeen "a tremendous blow to law enforcement."

Federal judges stayed their decision pending an opportunity for the state legislature to redress "disturbance" offense within guidelines.

They concluded that the existing law, providing fines up to \$100, is "impermissibly and unconstitutionally broad."

Martin said if the decision stands, police will find it "extremely difficult to maintain order in various communities of our state."

Another federal court case in Antonio mother of six sued to collect aid-to-dependent-child-though she did not meet the one-year residency requirement. She maintained that 75 per cent of the welfare for that purpose came from the federal government, was entitled to benefits.

With a three-judge panel with the plaintiff in a decision that could extend to all are, since federal money is anywhere. Attorney General indicated he will appeal decision to the U. S. Supreme Court.

**Budget Board Votes**

Legislative Budget Board recommended a \$2,200,000 special appropriation to help build equip new vocational and technical training facilities at Texas College. Board approved \$86,900 and \$46,345 requests Angelo State College and Midwestern University for associate degree offerings in nursing.

Members went along with request for \$150,000 supplemental appropriation to help build new facilities at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park and \$10,000 for Education Coordinating and participation in a study on Negro education opportunities.

**Land Policy Changed**

New veterans land policies have been ordered to limit veteran purchases to no more than one cent of any one subdivision.

Commissioner Jerry Sad said interest in the revived program - through which qualified veterans can buy land on terms, low-interest rate argument - has been "overwhelming," but too many applications have been coming in on divisions.

"We cannot spend all our money on a few isolated areas," said Sad in announcing new restrictions. "We have large subdivisions have put prices on their far above market value in areas. All veterans (should) have a chance to buy through the state and not spend our money in a few large subdivisions."

J. Overby Smith has resigned as chairman of the State Industrial Accident Board, effective May 4, to become hearing examiner for the Social Security Administration in Dallas.

Dr. Wood is previously from Marble Falls, Texas. He has practiced medicine for 21 years, 20 of these years in Marble Falls.

His first year as a Doctor was spent in Corpus Christi.

Dr. Wood did his under graduate work at Sam Houston Teachers College, now, Sam Houston State College. He graduated from Medical School at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston.

In Marble Falls he was elected as mayor for two terms. The Austin American and Statesman Newspaper selected him as the Central Texas Man of the Year.

From 1962 to 1965 he gave up his private profession to serve in the army corps as a Captain of the Medical Corps in Germany.

The Doctor has one son Alonzo Church Wood 4th.

## Berlin, Germany at HemisFair, Texas

One way to see West Berlin and the rest of the free part of Germany this summer is to visit the Germany-Berlin-Allemania Pavilion at HemisFair '68 in San Antonio, Texas, Apr. 6-Oct. 6, 1968. Once there, you will be eligible to enter on-the-spot contests that may win you a fine German camera or even a real 7-day expense-paid trip to Berlin for two.

One of the many eye-catching exhibits in the German Pavilion is the "Informator" shown above. The two large maps of the Federal Republic of Germany and of the access routes to Berlin are encircled by viewers that show historic as well as current aspects of life and activities. The electronically controlled 4-minute program includes a commentary in English and Spanish, heard through loudspeakers in the base.

In line with HemisFair's theme of "The Confluence of Civilizations in the Americas," the two-story pavilion also contains examples of the cultural and technological contribution by Germans to the present knowledge and skills on this continent.

Other ties that link Germany and the Americas include the first use of the name "America" on a map by the German cartographer Martin Waldseemuller in 1507; the arrival in Philadelphia in 1683 of the Concord, the German Mayflower, with 13 families from the Rhineland; and General von Steuben (1730-1794), an organizer of the Continental Army in the American Revolution.

Also portrayed are John Muesebach, who negotiated the peace treaty with the Comanches in 1847, and Carl Schurz, the Senator from Missouri who later became U.S. Secretary of the Interior (1877-1881); and so on, to Dr. Werner von Braun, "father" of the Saturn V, and Prof. Hubertus Strughold, scientific head of the School of Aerospace Medicine in San Antonio since its founding in 1949.

## CONGRESSMAN BOB PRICE HOLDS TOWN HALL MEETING

Congressman Bob Price spoke Monday at the McLean High School auditorium. Price conducted a town hall meeting in which he gave a report concerning the problems of the United States.

Mayor Boyd Meador introduced Mr. Price to a good group of McLean residents. Below is a summary of the remarks Price made at the meeting.

Having seen what happened in Washington, D. C. after the failure of those in authority to act decisively, I can say only that the breakdown of law and order and the wanton looting, destruction and violence that followed was a national shame and disgrace regardless of any direct or underlying causes.

Dr. Martin Luther King's death was as senseless as the burning and looting in downtown Washington and other cities. He was a non-violent man but violence followed in his footsteps.

But I do not believe that the rioting and burning, looting and murder that followed Dr. King's death can be blamed on this one act. Insurrection over the country has been brewing and needed only that or some other ingredient to erupt. The militants of Washington, Detroit, Chicago, Newark and other cities had already done their planning and were organized and ready.

Stokely Carmichael led the first gangs that went into the streets of Washington. He had made Washington his headquarters after returning from his tour of Communist capitals last year cursing the United States.

Last August after riots in Newark, Detroit and other cities, the President issued a plea "upon all our people, black and white alike, in all our cities to join in a determined program to maintain law and order.

But at the same time the Rap Browns and Stokely Carmichaels were urging Negroes to shoot and loot - kill Whitey. Brown said then at a Washington, D. C. rally: "Lyndon Johnson is my enemy... if Washington, D. C. doesn't come around, Washington, D. C. should be burned down."

The Founding Fathers established the District of Columbia as a Federal city in the first place to afford protection for Congress and the President. After the state had failed to offer protection to the Continental Congress from a mutinous mob of soldiers gathered before the State House in Philadelphia, the assembly was forced to adjourn and reconvene elsewhere.

It is ironic to note that the President in a recent message to Congress on the District of Columbia praised the reorganized District Government headed by a Presidentially appointed mayor and again called on Congress for prompt achievement of what he called the "city's goal of self-government." Under home rule, which civil rights leaders have been demanding, the Congress

might have to move again - if it survives another such senseless uprising.

Our president and the Congress must now take a firm stand and not be coerced into hasty acts that would only encourage more violence. If the President and Congress yield to a violent and lawless but small segment of our society, we have failed the majority of Americans who are now depending on us.

If we fail in this duty and allow some to decide which laws they will obey, more violence is sure to follow. Federal, State and local governments must act now and as forcefully as required to restore and maintain law and order.

## FHA LOANS BENEFITS COUNTIES

Rural residents in Armstrong, Gray, and Donley counties benefited from a record \$627,800.00 in loan funds advanced by the Farmers Home Administration in the 1967 calendar year. This represents of \$36,840.00 over the previous year.

The greatest rise was in the Emergency Loan Program. 52 loans being made for \$223,320.00 against 31 loans for \$140,370.00 in 1966. This type loan provides a standby source of credit for eligible farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain credit elsewhere because of drought conditions and untimely freezes.

Also, 1967 saw the first rural recreation loan made in the three-county unit. A loan of \$48,000.00 was made to a group of 60 farm and rural families in Gray County to develop the McLean Country Club and build a club house and swimming pool. This facility is being widely used by area residents and is fulfilling the aim of the program, to benefit the community through development of the recreational potential.

Mr. Terry, the brother of George Terry of McLean, died Sunday in the Amarillo Veterans Administration Hospital. He was a native of Sunset and came to Wellington in 1930. He was a veteran of World War II.

## Ten Accidents Reported In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highway in Gray County during the month of March, according to Sergeant J. L. Dalrymple, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$3,135.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1968 shows a total of 40 accidents resulting in one person killed, 16 persons injured, and an estimated damage of \$19,935.00.

The final entry in the 1967 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. There were 3,267 persons killed, 205,308 persons injured and an estimated property loss of \$793,094,000.00. This compares to the 1966 record of 3,406 persons killed, 208,510 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$57,414,000.

1967 marks the first decline in traffic deaths and injuries since 1960. The Sergeant stated, "With new traffic laws and the willingness of the public to drive defensively, traffic deaths and injuries can be further reduced in 1968."

The range top cooking is quick and oven-baking is carefree. And everyone will go for this new money-saving top-and-bottom corn meal trick... so good you almost forget it's a budget-stretcher.

#### SLOPPY JOE BUDGET BAKE

Makes 6 servings

**SLOPPY JOE FILLING:**  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 lb. ground beef  
1 tablespoon cornstarch  
1 clove garlic, minced  
One 6-oz. can tomato paste  
1/2 cup water  
2 tablespoons instant minced onion  
1/4 teaspoon pepper

**CORN MEAL PASTRY:**  
1-1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 cup enriched corn meal  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup shortening  
2/3 cup cold water

Heat oven to moderate (375°F.). For filling, sprinkle salt into hot skillet. Add ground beef. Cook until lightly browned, stirring frequently. Stir in remaining ingredients, one at a time, in order listed. Cover and cook over low heat about 10 minutes.

For pastry, sift together flour, corn meal, baking powder and salt into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add water, a tablespoon at a time, stirring lightly until pastry can be formed into a ball.

Turn out on lightly floured board or canvas. Divide dough in half. Roll one half to form a 10x6-inch rectangle. Place in 10x6-inch baking dish. Cover with filling. Roll remaining dough to same size. Cut slits in center to allow steam to escape. Place over filling. Bake in preheated oven (375°F.) about 30 minutes or until lightly browned. To serve, cut in 6 pieces.

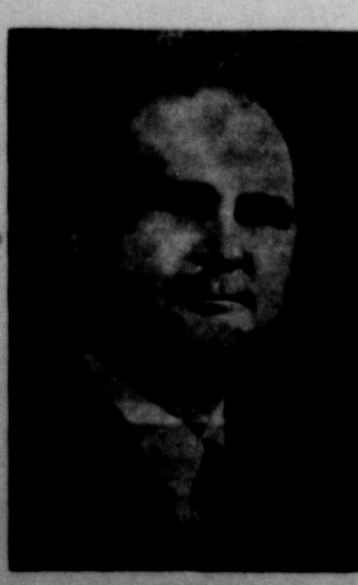

The panhandle region has long been known for its excellence in producing bands of superior quality. This year in Texas both of the Texas Honors Bands of the entire state are from this North Texas area; Hereford in 3AAA and Springlake-Earth in 2AA.

What makes this area so strong? There are two main reasons. One is West Texas State University. No where else is there such a fine music school with an emphasis on helping to strengthen the entire area. Band directors in the area are free to draw upon that school for any aid in the band field. Another reason is tradition. This is the support that the bands receive from the various communities. McLean, as have many other area towns, set the standards for their band many years ago and fortunately these standards still exist.

## U. I. L. Events

Most people see the band during marching season and at no other time. Many don't realize that April and May are two of the biggest months for bands. This is called the concert season for band and the ability of each band is tested on the concert stage. In this event which takes place April 24 this year, all public school bands of North Texas (South Texas was earlier) are in competition with standards set up by the Texas University Interscholastic League. The band has to play regulation music from a list published by U.I.L. and the bands that rate a First Division are those groups that have perfected this music. The groups that received a Second Division are those that score well above average and have done excellent work. The ratings go all the way down to Five. First divisions are few and far between as this rating designates a band as one of the finest in its class in the state.

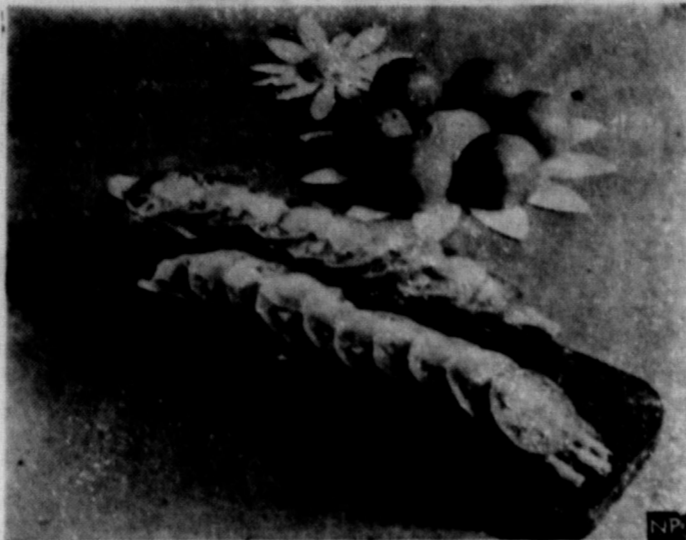

- 1/4 cup mayonnaise
- 6 scallions, cut in half lengthwise
- 3 medium-sized tomatoes, thinly sliced
- 1 package (8-ounces) sliced process Swiss cheese

Spread both bread halves with butter or margarine, deviled ham and mayonnaise. Arrange scallions and tomato slices over both bread halves. Top with cheese. Place bread halves on a baking sheet. In preheated broiler, broil 4 to 5-inches from source of heat for 2 to 3 minutes, or until cheese is melted and golden brown. Makes 6 servings.

WHAT ARE CARBOHYDRATES?

With all the fad diets of recent years, one might think carbohydrates could be practically eliminated from our meals. The most popular crazes for weight control have, after all, stressed cutting carbohydrates down to only 60 grams per day. Nothing could be more unwise. For one thing, carbohydrates make up about half of the usual American diet. In other countries the proportion is even higher. Plant foods, which are the basic source of most carbohydrates, are a staple almost everywhere. From carbohydrates we get most of the human energy we use. Carbohydrate foods give the highest yields of energy per unit of land cultivated. They are inexpensive. They are easy to store and to transport. But energy, inexpensiveness, and wide availability are not the only reasons for the importance of carbohydrates. Carbohydrates are fuel. First, let's analyze what carbohydrates are. Carbohydrates are the familiar sugars and starches in our food. They also are found in the fibrous portions of vegetable foods, which usually are indigestible. As stated, carbohydrates are fuel. They supply us with heat and energy. Foods that furnish carbohydrates in generous amounts include breads and cereals, potatoes, lima beans, corn, dried beans and peas, dried fruits, sweetened fruits, sugar, syrup, jelly, jam, and honey.

Macaroni Is An Easy Dish To Fix

Macaroni is an "easy" food - easy to prepare, easy to combine with more expensive foods because of its milk flavor and easy on the budget.

It has three basic ingredients - semolina, plain or enriched flour and water, according to Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. Semolina is a granular substance that feels much like table salt. It is milled from a special kind of durum wheat, one that is very hard and high in protein.

High quality semolina has a rich golden color which both millers and processors try to retain. It adds color, consistency and cooking quality to macaroni foods.

When shopping for macaroni, read the label, suggests Mrs. Clyatt, a specialist with Texas A&M University. If it has "made from durum wheat" or "made from semolina" this means a high quality macaroni product.

Keep macaroni dry and unopened packages will keep indefinitely. After a package is opened, close it tightly or put the macaroni in an air-tight glass jar or can, recommends the specialist.

ALERT FOR SCREW-WORMS

Livestock producers are urged to continue a close watch over all animal wounds. Weather conditions are very favorable, say officials of the Screw-worm Eradication Program, for fly development and spread. Stockmen are urged to continue submitting worm samples to the Mission Lab for positive identification. It's the only way, says the officials, we can know what is happening.

The Texas A&M University specialist suggests you include cottage cheese as a part of basic menu plans.

CORN LEAF APHIDS

This insect, normally no problem in corn and grain sorghum, is causing extensive damage to emerging plants from Central Texas east and south. Weather conditions favorable for population explosions and unfavorable for predator insect increases are largely to blame for the situation, said John Thomas, Extension entomologist. Fields already suffering damage should be treated at once and local county agents should be contacted for control information. The infestations are expected to spread north and west as planted corn and grain sorghum plants emerge.

LET'S GO FISHIN'

While fishing is usually thought of as a man's sport, the first fishing expert was really a woman.

A printing of a bit of outdoor writing penned on parchment around fourteen hundred years ago has been credited to a sweet little English nun named Dame Juliana Berners.

Juliana was born of a royal family in England and did some fishing and hunting as a girl with some of her sporting cousins and friends. Later on, she entered a nunnery at St. Albans and wrote the first known work on fishing.

Juliana wasn't any slouch concerning the art of angling, say the fishing experts at Mercury outdoors. For instance, here's how she recommends making a fishing rod.

First you cut a smooth six-foot staff of willow or aspen. Heat it in an oven, get it good and straight, and let it dry for four weeks. The next trick is to get a piece of plumber's wire, heat it red hot, and burn a hole clear through the staff. Then store it in a smokehouse for a while.

Now you take a stroll in the woods and cut a slender slip of hazel the same length. Soak it thoroughly, straighten it out, and let it dry in the smokehouse too. The next step is to trim the hazel whip so it can be inserted into the butt section. Now, fashion a metal pin to hold the two together, and you have a two section fishing rod.

Juliana advocates such a two section rod because it forms a good walking staff for a Sunday afternoon stroll, and can easily be transformed into a fishing rod if you happen by a good fishing hole.

For a line, Juliana advocates the long horsehairs woven together and colored with a mixture of ale, crushed walnut leaves and alum. Such a line, she says, blends with the water and fools the fish more readily.

In her tips for anglers she recommends not casting a shadow on the water, fishing below low waterfalls or in deep pools, fishing when the wind is west and using a wire leader either out of the south or the west when fishing for pike.

She makes one more recommendation which is just as true today as it was five hundred and forty-three years ago. Choose your bait with care, she says, "for you cannot bring a hook into a fish's mouth unless there is food on it that pleases him."

**Tomatoes—From Ornament to Staple**

We have examined several fields of alfalfa in the McLean area as well as in the Pampa area. Without exception every field is heavily infested with Alfalfa Aphid. Many people are calling them green bugs. However they are not the type of insects we call green bugs that infest small grain fields.

Keep in mind there is a long list of different types of aphids. Green bugs are aphids but a different type to what we call alfalfa aphids. Fact is there are more than one type of alfalfa aphid. One of them is called the spotted alfalfa aphid.

All aphids have piercing and sucking mouth parts. They suck the juices from a plant rather than feed on the foliage.

It takes a contact insecticide to kill aphids. Methyl Parathion applied by airplane is your best bet. Depending on the size of your alfalfa, but from one to one and one-half pints should be applied per acre. The size of your alfalfa should govern the amount of total liquid put out per acre. The larger the alfalfa the more volume of liquid one should apply. A minimum of a gallon jar acre should be used.
