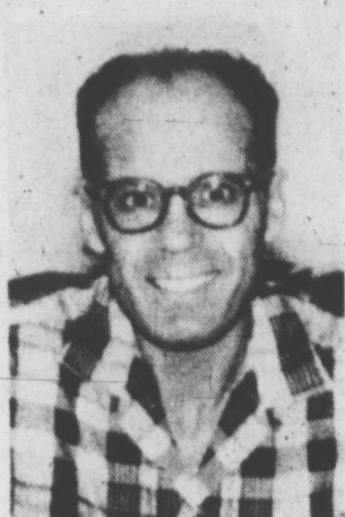

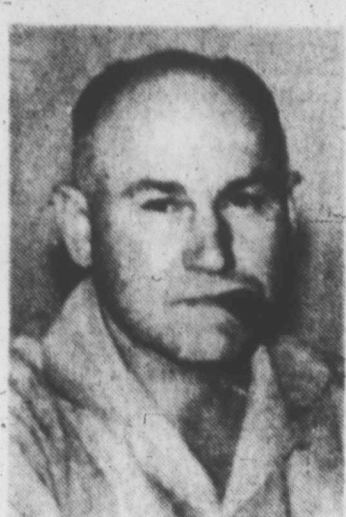

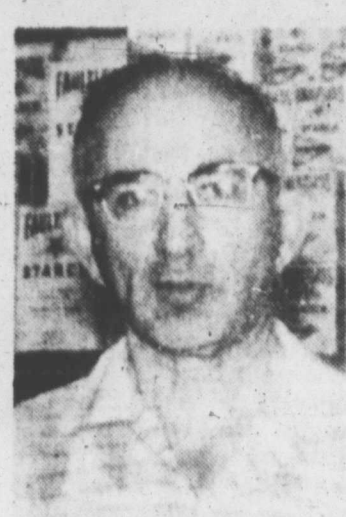

## DRIVE FOR INDUSTRY

### Team Stock Sale Starts

Nine contact units go into action Wednesday to sell shares in Colorado City Industrial Team Inc., a non-profit corporation designed as a tool for the community's industrial development.

Thirty-seven citizens, representing all phases of the community's business and industrial family, will form the contact units under chairmanship of Charlie C. Thompson, president of City National Bank.

There's no set goal as to the thousands of dollars sought in the corporation's organization, but the stock purchase plan will allow both lump sum purchases and subscriptions ranging from monthly to annual.

A special kickoff session is scheduled Tuesday night in Civic House for the unit members, the eve before they begin their drive for fellow citizens to "join the team."

Special informational programs concerning the Industrial Team were conducted by Chamber of Commerce leaders Wednesday and Friday at Jaycees and Lions luncheons. A similar program is scheduled Tuesday for Kiwanians.

Sponsored by the chamber's industrial committee, chairmaned by Glenn R. (Bob) Robinson, and unanimously endorsed by the chamber's directorate, the Industrial Team will seek to build up financing to be used over a period of years to assist new industries to locate here or to expand industry already here.

Provisions of the Team's organization prohibits it from attempting to "buy" industry or to giving grants in any manner.

## AGAINST 3 PERSONS

### Burglary, Fraud Complaints Filed

Felony charges have been filed in Justice of Peace T. E. Arnold's Court against three men, one a 26-year-old already facing a case in County Court alleging he contributed to delinquency of a minor.

Named in the charges are Alberto Lujan, 28, charged with burglary of Thomas Bros. Station here May 25; Christiano Rivas, charged with removal of mortgage property; and Frederick E. Coursey, charged with check fraud.

Lujan was named in a complaint alleging that he contributed to delinquency of a 15-year-old former inmate of State Boys Training School after the boy admitted taking a battery and two radios in the Thomas Bros. burglary.

The delinquency charge came after the boy, now on probation following a juvenile hearing before County Judge Elmer Martin, said he had been drinking with Lujan just prior to the burglary.

However, the felony burglary charge was filed by District Attorney Eldon Mahon following the juvenile hearing when the boy claimed Lujan had influenced him to commit the burglary.

Rivas is alleged to have removed a 1949 model half-ton Chevrolet pickup from the county last January with intent to defraud First State Bank of Lorraine. The mortgaged pickup actually belonged to the bank, the complaint claims.

Coursey is charged with intent to defraud J. M. Yates Jr. with a \$210 check, written on an Abilene bank, for furniture and duct.

### Trial Docket Scheduled in County Court

Docket will be called in County Court Wednesday and two cases already are set for trial.

Scheduled for trial Thursday before County Judge Elmer Martin is Floyd Wilson Iglehart of Odessa, charged with possession of whiskey for sale.

Set for trial the next day, Friday, is a driving while intoxicated case involving Clyde Hilburn Stringfield, who was charged here May 27.

Iglehart, whose bond has been \$1,000, was arrested here by city police June 9 in the city's Negro area. He told authorities he was a nightclub operator.

Pleading guilty during the past week in County Court was James Arthur, who paid a \$100 fine for transporting beer and whiskey in a dry county.

Three persons have paid fines and served brief jail sentences for driving while intoxicated. All were on pleas of guilty.

Jody Burton Tidwell was fined \$115 and costs, plus three days in jail, for DWI. Minford Arlius McCoy paid \$122.50 fine, and served three days, while Harvey Gregg Ratliff paid \$50 and served three days.

## INDEPENDENCE DAY EVENT

### All Facts of History Derive From God, Audience Is Told

No. 1 fact of our universe is God, 200 persons were told Friday night in Ruddick Park, and all other realities are derived from that original.

That was the emphasis for Colorado City's traditional community-wide Christian service on the eve of Independence Day.

The speaker was Dr. D. Ray Lindley, president-elect of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth.

Because of the fact that in the first place there was God, the Divine Creator is the author of all laws by which we live and the creator of all the purposes of our lives.

Lindley, nationally recognized educator-minister-writer, spoke in the park's amphitheater in a service sponsored jointly by Chamber of Commerce and Colorado City Ministerial Alliance.

People today are dragged with facts of civilization speeding along from radio to radar and television, to atomic power and space travel to the moon, he noted.

"But a fact tonight that dwarfs all these facts," he declared, "is . . . in the beginning God created."

"Here is the underived fact of our universe. All other facts of history are derived from this first fact."

Man's great trouble, the speaker explained, comes from the predicament of trying to make God a vice president of the universe and putting man in control.

"What does it mean to you here in Colorado City," he asked, "in your service clubs,

Chamber of Commerce, church, business and citizenship?"

"Can you conceive of the stupidity of any insignificant human being making any decision without asking God?"

Because in the first place there is God, He is the author of all laws by which man lives.

"Man does not make the laws," Lindley emphasized, "and it is best our lawmakers seek the laws God has written into reality."

"And its best we seek to live our own life in those laws."

One of the best ways to combat lawlessness and juvenile delinquency, he said, is for parents and lawmakers to recognize they, themselves, are under authority. And he cited as dangerous doctrine rushing toward world calamity the idea for national sovereignty when God is the sovereign.

God is the creator of all purpose within life, too, since there is God in the first place, the audience was told.

"He's a part of all our puny little deeds," Lindley stated, "and our sordid ways."

"One of the saddest aspects of our times is the people whose calendars are full and lives empty."

"If a man lives forever, then he must identify his life with a cause that lives forever."

And the pathos of our times, he added, is in those who have never lived outside themselves, never helped others, never helped their community to grow into fine things.

Right-of-way acquisition has started for the Interstate 20 freeway route north around Colorado City.

Heading the right of way project is J. E. (Archie) Pierce of Texas Highway Department's district office in Abilene.

The right of way specialist said 33 separate property owners are involved in the Interstate 20 bypass route around the city.

Appraisals already have been made and approved by the 33 tracts. The other four are due approval soon.

Pierce, a 12-year veteran with the State Highway Department and experienced in right of way work on Interstate 20 at Abilene and Sweetwater, said he could make no estimate on how long the right of way acquisition here will require.

But plans and specifications will be ready for letting of contract on the multi-million dollar project as soon as the right of way is purchased, according to Ben Wilkinson, State Highway Department engineer.

Pierce, as he began contacting property owners along the freeway route, said the right of way project will be carried out with a definite pattern—the same for all landowners.

Here is the way the project is carried out:

1. Right of way and design maps were prepared by Resident Engineer Joe Smoot's office here in Colorado City. After these were checked and approved by state office of Texas Highway Department in Austin and U. S. Bureau of Public Roads in Fort Worth, the maps were sent to professional appraisers.

2. Professional appraisers for the local project were from Abilene and Sweetwater, since no local appraisers apparently met the standards required. See BYPASS Pg. 7

## FOR JUSTICE OF PEACE

### 800 Speeding Tickets Are Courthouse Worry

Almost 800 tickets have been issued for speeding on Mitchell County Highways during the first half of this year.

That's the report Saturday from Justice of Peace T. E. Arnold, who made a public appeal for citizens to "please observe the speed laws of our state."

"By about Monday, when this Fourth of July weekend is over," the justice of peace said, "the total probably will be above the 800 mark."

The speeders, stopped mostly by Texas Highway patrolmen, end up in Arnold's court. And their speeding offenses during 1959 range up to 120 miles per hour on highways within the county.

They are motorists from every business, professional and social strata.

Their attitudes of response in face of the speeding charges are just as varied, too.

An Army major recently sent his check for \$20.50, covering a fine for speeding 78 miles per hour from Honolulu, Hawaii.

And his comment with the check was "you damn shore ain't welcome."

A note accompanying a check recently from a speeder living in Odessa contained this verbal attempt to splash his dissatisfaction—with being caught into the face of the justice of peace:

"I invite you to Odessa, Be-

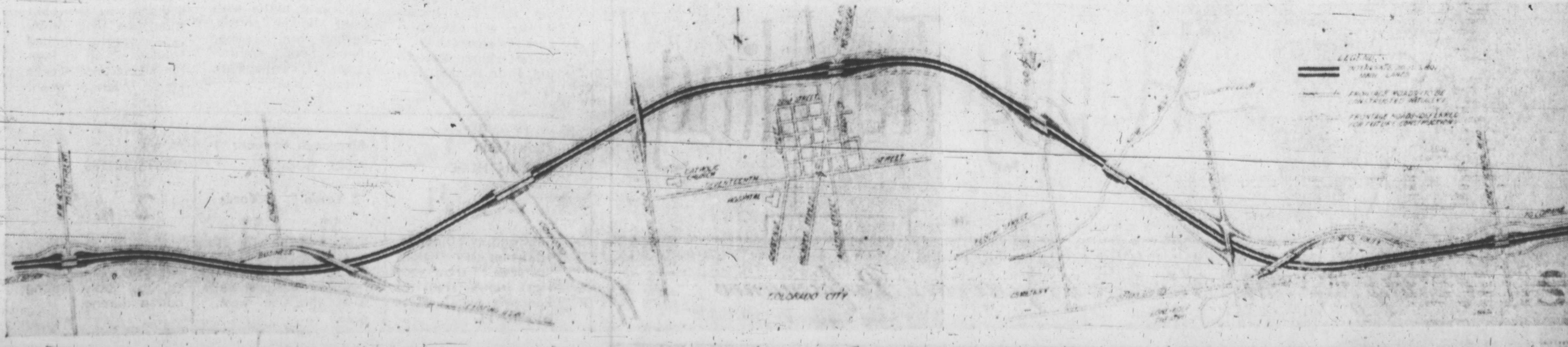
lieve I can tell you how to make an honest living."

Arnold says most of the speeders stopped on Mitchell County highways live in the Midland, Odessa, Monahans area.

All those handed tickets, though, are not bitter. An Irving traveling man, who said he travels 4,000 miles each month, apologized in person recently for his first speeding ticket in all his years of traveling.

But the one with whom Arnold probably sympathizes the most is the husband who paid a fine the other day for traveling in the 70's.

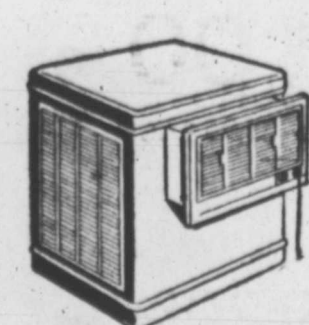
