Aged Man Charged With Assault On Stepdaughter Thirteen Killed, Scores Hurt In Holiday Tragedies

Four Meet Death As Passenger Is Derailed Monday

Railway Mishap Is Cause Of Injuries To Over 50; Four Aviators Plunge To Death In Planes

Three Hurt When Dynamite Blast Undermines Plank Covering Excavation In New York

(By Associated Press) OAKDALE, Tenn., Nov. 11.—Derailed of the northbound passenger train, Ponce De Leon, of the Southern Railway near here early today caused the death of four persons and injuries to more than fifty passengers.

Three of the dead were trainmen. Numbered among them was the engineer, W. A. Eisman, of Chattanooga, who had taken over the throttle temporarily, in the place of W. A. Williams, of Chattanooga, the regular engineer. Eisman was buried beneath the wrecked engine.

Others Killed
Ed Grant, fireman of Rising Fawn, Ga., V. L. Winstead, mail clerk of Nebo, Ky., and Marion Bradshaw, St. Augustine, Fla., were the others killed.

Nearly all of the injured passengers were from Ohio and Michigan. Special trains from Somerset, Ky., and Chattanooga, Tenn., took the injured passengers to those cities. John Russell, Jr., of Mill Springs, N. C., was severely injured and was thought to be in a dying condition in a Rockwood, Tenn., hospital, where he was removed from the wreck.

The cause of the wreck has not been determined.

City Commission Sought In Borger

Hearing Of Petition For Election Of New Members Set For Today; Officials Not Protested

(By Associated Press) STINNETT, Nov. 11.—A hearing on a petition seeking a special election to select two members of the Borger city commission, to replace those named during martial law, today was set for tomorrow by County Judge H. M. Hood.

The petition, bearing a large number of names of Borger citizens, was presented to Judge Hood without discussion. Attorneys agreed upon 4 p. m. tomorrow as the time for the hearing after the judge requested time to examine the document.

The petitioners, lawyers said, do not intend the move as a protest against present officials, but against the method by which they were selected. They contend that with a double resignation of two members of the commission on the same day a statute requires a special election to fill the vacancies.

The petitioners involved are now filed by W. A. Henderson, mayor, and Dyke Chillum, commissioner. The place of the third commissioner, Moe Steinberg, is not contested as he was named several days after the appointment of the others.

BOMBERS ARE SOUGHT

Two Government Motorboats Are Wrecked
MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 11. (AP)—Federal officers were checking clubs tonight in a search for bombers who clunk alongside two government motorboats used in liquor raids, wrecked them with dynamite, and dashed up the harbor under cover of fog. Whatever the officers had learned they kept secret.

Finis Wilson, deputy prohibition administrator here, said he accepted the bombing as a challenge from moonshiners and rum runners and "since they have asked for war, they will get plenty of it."

STROKE PROVES FATAL

Embezzlement At \$3,000,000 Mark

Sum Taken By Ten Or More Employees Of Flint Bank One Of Largest In American Banking History

(By Associated Press) FLINT, Mich., Nov. 11.—More than \$3,000,000, said to be the largest embezzlement from a single bank in American banking history, was the sum taken by ten or more employees and junior executives of the Union Industrial bank of Flint for their speculations in the stock market. It was revealed here today in an unofficial statement of the progress of the audit of the shortage which has been under way for some time.

The gross theft is set at \$3,952,000, but the net loss is estimated in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000 which in turn is expected to be cut down by payments on certain insurance policies held by the bank.

Stands For Loss
To forestall any possibility of loss to the bank as a result of the theft, Charles S. Mott, president of the bank and vice-president of General Motors corporation has turned over more than 1,500,000 of his personal funds. He had previously put up approximately \$1,000,000 in cash.

SPECIALIST COMING

Expert To Aid In Solving Airport Problem Here

William J. Mackenzie, airport specialist with the United States Department of Commerce, will arrive in Lubbock within the next two or three weeks to assist this city in solving its present airport problems, according to a letter received here Monday afternoon by the local Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Mackenzie will confer with Chamber of Commerce officials and members of the city commission.

His recommendations will relate to the proposed \$35,000 hangar, fund for which has been provided in the \$75,000 airport bond issue voted here last March.

Burying of Children Is Re-Enacted By Slayer Suspect

(By Associated Press) CAMDEN, N. J., Nov. 11.—Gladys May Parks, also known as Mrs. Baker, charged with killing one child and suspected of slaying another, today re-enacted how she buried the children in different parts of New Jersey and witnessed the death of a group of women who cried out "lynch her."

At National Park, after Miss Parks had shown how she had disposed of one child's body, she was made up a crowd of 1,000, surrounded the police automobile in which she was, and shouted threats against her.

Threats Hurling
"Give her what she gave the poor children," one cried. Another with a bunch of flowers in her hand, shouted, "Kill her and I'll put these on her."

The accused woman was well protected by policemen and detectives. Tonight Miss Parks was again in the Camden county jail, still holding to her story that Dorothy Rogers, four, and her brother, Timothy, two, came to their deaths by accident.

Police Doubtful
"The police frankly declare they do not believe her but have found no motive with which to confront her and break down her statements."

Miss Parks, who had been sought by the police for a week for questioning in connection with the finding of the skeleton of the girl in the woods at National Park on November 2, walked into the Newark

Leap From Plane Is Fatal To Girl

Ruth Rockwell, Takes Life By Leaping Two Thousand Feet; Farewell Message Is Found On Body

(By Associated Press) CURTIS FIELD, N. Y., Nov. 11. Ruth Rockwell, 20, of Crestwood, N. Y., committed suicide today by leaping from a passenger airplane shortly after taking off from Curtis Field. A bulky envelope, apparently a farewell message, was found on the girl's body.

The plane was piloted by E. F. Booth, of Curtis Field. The girl appeared at the field about 15 minutes before she leaped to her death and asked to charter a plane for a short ride. Booth said he had gained an elevation of about 1,500 feet when his passenger tapped him on his shoulder and asked him to "go up a little higher."

Fell Sudden Jar
He went up to about 2,000 feet and then felt a sudden jar and the ship steered to the right. He glanced back and saw that the left door of the cabin was open and the girl was on her knees before it.

She apparently was saying a prayer for a moment later she arose and leaped. The pilot said.

Her body was found 300 feet from the edge of the flying field.

ASSASSIN DIES

Man Thought To Have Shot Political Head Succumbs

MENDOZA, ARGENTINA, Nov. 11. (AP)—Jose Caceres, believed by the police to have been the man who shot down Dr. Carlos Washington Lencina, at a political rally last night, died at a hospital today.

Although he was not positively identified as the assassin, a police guard was kept around his bed at the hospital. Some witnesses said he was the first to shout "viva Yrigoyen" at the meeting when Dr. Lencina, a bitter opponent of President Yrigoyen and a political force in this city was addressing these witnesses, said that during the disturbance which followed, Caceres fired four shots, one of which struck Dr. Lencina in the head and another penetrated his lung.

INJUSTICE CLAIMED

Wife Of Albert Fall Says Conviction Forced

John Brady Waits For Court Action On Murder Charge

Former Judge Of The Third Court Of Civil Appeals Accused Of Stabbing His Stenographer To Death

Victim Is Buried

Examining Trial Expected Latter Part Of Week For Grayhaired Attorney Of Austin; Aid Offered

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Nov. 11.—John W. Brady, former judge of the third court of civil appeals and leader in the civic, religious and official affairs of Travis county, today was confined in a Travis county jail cell to-day shaking convulsively at intervals as he awaited processes of the law he so often expounded. Against his is a murder charge—an accusation that he stabbed a slip of a girl to death.

Prosecutors said it looked like a "death penalty" case.

Victim Buried
Relatives and friends bore to the grave in a simple funeral procession, Miss Leila Highsmith, 28, and laid her away beside the grave of her mother who died several years ago.

The blade of a knife officers described as an "East Dallas Special" about 12 inches long when opened, had penetrated to her heart. There were two other wounds on her arms.

Assistance Offered
While attorneys from many parts of the state sent telegrams of sympathy and offers of assistance to the grayhaired lawyer, it seemed likely he would not get a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace F. R. Tannerhill, in whose court the charge was filed, until the latter part of the week.

County Attorney Roy Archer said he did not believe Brady's case was "a baffling one."

Death Penalty Case
"From the facts that have been seen," he said.

Dr. Mehl removed a one-and-a-half inch piece of shell which lodged in Rühner's leg during the Argonne drive in September, 1918.

J. W. Gamel Named As Secretary Of Community Chest

Dr. Paul W. Horn Chosen Chairman Of Educational Committee Of Campaign To Be Launched Soon

J. W. Gamel was elected secretary of the board of directors of the Lubbock Community Chest at a meeting of that group last night at 7:30 o'clock in the offices of the organization at the city hall.

One other election was announced at the meeting, that of Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Tech, as chairman of the educational committee of the campaign. Dr. Horn's acceptance was received last night and the committee will be functioning within the near future. It will be the work of this unit to see that every individual in the city of Lubbock is fully informed as to the activities of the community chest and that a great educational drive be launched.

Clark On Way
Henry Clark, of the American City Bureau, will arrive in the city next Monday, November 18, and will be here for a period of two weeks.

During his stay he will speak before every assembly of the schools and all civic organization explaining in detail the accomplishments of a community chest and presenting the plea for support.

Dean A. H. Leitch, chairman of the budget committee, reported for that body stating that all requests of every agency represented in the drive had been thoroughly investigated with a view to setting the goal for the coming campaign. A full study has been made of the needs and requirements and officers are confident that the budget for the ensuing year will be announced within a few days.

While with 45th Georgia infantry Mr. Lokey was sent to Charleston, S. C., to defend Fort Sumter at the opening of the Civil war. His name was inscribed in the Stone Mountain memorial and he was presented with a bronze medal in recognition of the honor.

Survivors are three sons, G. W. Lokey, Hammond, S. J. E. Lokey, Farmersville, and Thomas F. Lokey, this city; two daughters, Mrs. J. K. Box, Lubbock, and Mrs. W. J. BRIDGE DEDICATED

New Span Arches Detroit River, U. S. To Canada

DETROIT, Nov. 11. (AP)—Dedicated as a monument to the 114 years of uninterrupted peace and of the ever-increasing friendship between the two nations, the \$20,000,000 Ambassador bridge, arching the Detroit river, between Canada and the United States, was dedicated formally this afternoon.

The dedication of the huge span, the largest suspension bridge in the world, was the climax of the Armistice Day observance here and in the "twin border cities, the paradox of veterans on both sides of the river having the bridge as their goal."

Refuses to Tell Of Booze Party

Railway Official Keeps Silence On Big 'Booze Party'

E. E. Loomis Will Not Tell Details Of Alleged Wall Street Drinking Affair Exposed By Brookhart

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—In three minutes the grand jury reviewing the "Wall Street booze party" of 1928 heard today all that E. E. Loomis, president of the Lehigh Valley railroad, had to say about that occasion since made famous by Senator Brookhart of Iowa.

Mentioned in the senate as having taken "some alcoholic stuff" at the dinner, Loomis described his appearance before the grand jury as "short but sweet." He declined to discuss his testimony, saying:

"It was a private dinner and I have some idea of the proprieties. You will have to rely on the laboratory experience and smelling properties of Senator Brookhart."

You don't expect me to discuss for the public anything that happens at a private dinner where I was a guest, do you?"

Frank S. Night, manager of the Willard hotel where the alleged "booze party" was held, also testified briefly before the grand jury. Brookhart had appeared previously.

Writer Questioned
The hotel man brought with him records apparently requested by the jury concerning the dinner, which was given to some republican senators by Walter J. Fabry, a New York broker. These fixed the date as December 10, 1928. The jury also questioned Walter Liggett, magazine writer, whose article in the current issue of Plain Talk contained numerous charges of liquor law violations here.

Impressive Program Commemorates End Of World War

ONCE again the entire world paused and faced to the west at 11 o'clock yesterday commemorating the eleventh Armistice Day observance following close of the World War on November 11, 1918. An impressive Armistice Day program was held in Lubbock at the Texas Tech gymnasium, following a lengthy parade through the business district of the city and to the college.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, in delivering the main address at the college, urged racial understanding and international peace.

Expense Insignificant
"While the colossal expenditure of money in the World War was insignificant compared with the millions of lives lost, we are reminded that 250 billions of dollars were spent in the great conflict," said Dr. Horn. All the wealth of Texas totals 12-13 billions, just one-twentieth part of the money spent in the war. We would be greatly alarmed if some vandal should seek to destroy our great state, and yet the forces of armed combat spent 20 times Texas' wealth.

"Long ago individuals learned a better way than fistclouts in settling misunderstandings, and the intelligence of the world should employ the same amicable reasoning."

Referring to the criticism which was directed upon the late Woodrow Wilson, Dr. Horn said, "It is my hope that our great fatherland may be able within a few years to catch up with the idealism of Woodrow Wilson."

In speaking of the unity of service men during the world war, Dr. Horn quoted a newspaper poem which read as follows:

"Here's to the sons of the North as they march over the fields of France; May the spirit of Grant be with them as they advance."

"Here's to the sons of the South as they march over the fields of France; May the spirit of Lee be with them as they advance."

"And here's to the spirit of the sons of the North and the South as they march over the fields of France; May the spirit of the flag be with them as they advance."

Preceding Dr. Horn's address, Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Methodist church, read the following:

"May the spirit of Lee be with them as they advance."

Kerlee Is Charged With Wife Murder

FORT WORTH, Nov. 11. (AP)—A charge of murder of his wife, against which he had filed suit for divorce, was filed today against W. E. Kerlee, 35, automobile mechanic who is in a hospital with a wound that may prove fatal.

Mrs. Frankie Kerlee, 25, mother of two small children, was killed almost instantly by charges from a shotgun Saturday night. Between the time she was slain and before Kerlee was found on a sidewalk two blocks away from the shotgun by his side and a wound in his abdomen, two charges of bullets were sent into the room of a residence. It was the room of Henry Stafford, brother of Kerlee's first wife and at a residence where Mrs. Kerlee had spent part of the evening before she started home.

Hospital attendants said that Kerlee has a chance to recover.

ROTHSTEIN CASE UP

Death Of Broadway Figure Echoes In Trial

NEW YORK, Nov. 11. (AP)—The Rothstein case, which cost a police commissioner his job, flamed intermittently in the headlines for months and then leaped again into prominence during the recent mayoralty campaign, will develop into a trial tomorrow.

Just a year and eight days since Arnold Rothstein, Broadway gambler and racketeer, was shot and fatally wounded, presumably in the Park Central hotel, George A. McManus, race track bookmaker and gambler associate of Rothstein, will be tried for the killing of his one time friend.

On November 4, 1928, Rothstein staggered out of the Park Central hotel with a bullet in his abdomen. He died two days later, refusing to the last to name his assailant.

Shortly afterward McManus surrendered and was indicted with "Tymon Miller, Butler, who was questioned by police a few hours after the shooting and then released, is still at large.

Wife Of Defendant Back In City Following Arrest On Theft Charges; Life History Written

R. E. WEST, 60, of Lubbock, Monday was arrested and lodged in the Lubbock county jail charged with criminal assault on his 11-year-old stepdaughter, Annie Dell Steele.

A complaint was filed early yesterday morning by his wife, Mrs. Maude West, and he was apprehended shortly before noon by Constable J. C. Roberts.

In the complaint filed yesterday she charges her husband with criminal assault on the child.

The complaint was filed in the court of Justice G. R. Scott.

Officers last night stated that a preliminary hearing in the case probably would be held Tuesday at which time bond is to be set.

Mrs. West was arrested in this city several weeks ago and taken to Midland where she was lodged in jail charged with theft in connection with the robbery of a jewelry store in that city. She was taken by officers two days after she had married West, for whom she had been keeping house. While in the Midland jail, Mrs. West wrote her life story for newspapers, in which she told of her several previous marriages and of the tragedies of each.

"I am an innocent woman," she said in speaking of the charges that had been preferred against her. She also expressed fear for the safety of her children while away from them.

Laundry Mark Is Train Wreck Clue

Body Of Andrew Laird Sent To Seattle For Funeral Services; Lived In West Texas Since 1888

FORT WORTH, Nov. 11. (AP)—The body of Andrew Laird, 89, Chillicothe pioneer, West Texas ranchman and wheat grower, was sent from Fort Worth today to Seattle, Wash., where funeral services will be held. Mr. Laird died last night in a hotel here.

The body was accompanied by Florence C. Laird, Norfolk, Va., and Cecil Laird, Sandusky, Ohio, sons. Moving to Vernon in 1888, Laird became interested in the implement business. Later he was a cattle raiser at Chillicothe, becoming interested in business ventures with W. E. Connelley of Fort Worth, Frank Hill of Wichita Falls and C. T. Herring of Amarillo.

Survivors are another son, Lawrence A. Laird, Oshana, Alberta, Canada; three daughters, Mrs. Irving Jennings, Douglas, Ark.; Mrs. W. McPhail, Seattle and Mrs. Allen P. Knight, Bellingham, Wash., and 18 grandchildren.

CHARGES ECHO DEATH

Three Held For Murder And One For Drinking

PARIS, Nov. 11. (AP)—Three Paris men today were charged with murder and one of them with driving while intoxicated here in the death of Thomas Henry Deatley, 18, last night in an automobile collision.

David Fox, shipping clerk and the alleged driver of the car which struck Deatley and his companions Billy Miller and Neil Rose were those charged. Fox also was charged with driving while intoxicated. Deatley was killed while repairing a tire on his car which was parked at the curb.

Examining trial was waived. The three were released on bonds of \$2,500 on the murder charge. Fox made a \$500 bond on the charge of driving while intoxicated.

Board Has Loaned Over \$46,805,000

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—The Federal Farm Board has loaned or made available to agricultural marketing associations a total of \$46,805,000 since the first loan was approved under the agricultural marketing act five months ago.

Board officials revealed today that some of the money loaned early in August, already is being repaid. While the principal work of the board has been to get funds into circulation among qualified marketing associations, machinery for receiving it back again has been set up.

The loans made have ranged from \$25,000 to the Arkansas Cotton Growers Cooperative association to between \$10,000,000 and \$20,000,000 made available to the American Cotton Growers Exchange for the use of its members. Much of the latter sum has not been taken out of the board's treasury but it has been definitely set aside.

PROBE FATAL BLAST

Coroner's Jury Searches Wreckage For Clues

ELYRIA, O., Nov. 11. Holmes, was indicted by a Hutchinson county grand jury today for a liquor law violation. No indictment has been returned against Hodges or Sam Jones, also charged with the Holmes slaying, in connection with the district attorney's death.

Prohibition Enforcement Areas Reorganized

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 11. (AP)—Reorganization of the prohibition enforcement districts of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and southern and southeastern sections of Texas was announced today by O. D. Jackson, prohibition administrator of this district.

Under the plan a special district known as number 12 will be created from district Nos. four and seven with headquarters in New Orleans. The revision provided for centralized work under one headquarters against both narcotic and prohibition violations.

Per Cent Of Underweight Boys And Girls Now Decreasing

Nutrition Class To Be Organized At Central School; Milk, Graham Crackers Will Be Given Children

Similar Group At Sanders Shows Marked Results; Increased Attention Is Given Health

With the reduction of the number of underweight children from 25 per cent to 15 per cent since the opening of school in September and the correction of a number of other defects, the results of health culture in the public schools of Lubbock are that which could be hoped for.

Lubbock has a school health supervisor, Mrs. J. C. Smith, this year for the first time in its history, and more and more attention is being given to matters pertaining to the physical well being of the boys and girls.

On September 13, a nutrition class made up of 35 underweight children, was organized in Sanders school. Each morning at 10:30 o'clock the pupils were given graham crackers and one-half pint of rich milk, and by November 1, all but three had gained from one-half to 11 pounds. Six other children were given milk and crackers at home by their parents and they also increased in weight.

A still larger nutrition class will be organized this week in Central school. The milk and graham crackers will be given the same as in Sanders school, and health cards, showing the age, weight and defects of each child will be made and kept on record. The cards will be shown to the children in order that they may take the necessary steps toward self-improvement.

Central ward school is the only one in the city which has a Sanders nurse, Mrs. J. C. Smith, to devote her entire time to the teaching of health. One teacher in Dupre school has several classes; in the work, and at all other schools, each teacher gives health lessons to the pupils in her particular room.

"We are not having many contagious diseases in the school at present," Mrs. Smith said. "We find fewer children with poor hearing than with any of the other common defects. Bad teeth lead the list, and defective tonsils come second. Three children considered failures in school have been fitted with glasses and are improving both in conduct and studies."

"My apartments rent much better today with kitchenettes," she told me. "They give the feeling of permanence, and of a home. People don't want just a bedroom, living room and bath today; they want a place to cook, too."

Farmers Cooperative Plant Destroyed By Flames At Early Hour Monday; Gasoline-Soaked Rags Found

(Special To The Avalanche)
LAMESA, Nov. 11.—Several bloodhounds have been brought to this city by Tom Hutton, sheriff of Jones county, to track, if possible, persons guilty of setting fire to the Farmers Cooperative gin number one, which was destroyed here this morning at 3 o'clock. The sheriff arrived by airplane.

All ginning machinery was ruined as the blaze swept over the structure and only a shell of the building was left standing. The loss was given at \$16,000, with insurance partly covering the damage.

Damage Suffered
W. R. Taylor, manager, expressed a belief that the gin was intentionally set afire following the discovery of gasoline soaked bagging in the gin. No cotton was destroyed by the blaze but cotton seed in the bin by the building suffered water damage and a carload of bagging was destroyed during the early part of the blaze.

Directors of the gin company are meeting this afternoon to decide whether the gin will be rebuilt immediately.

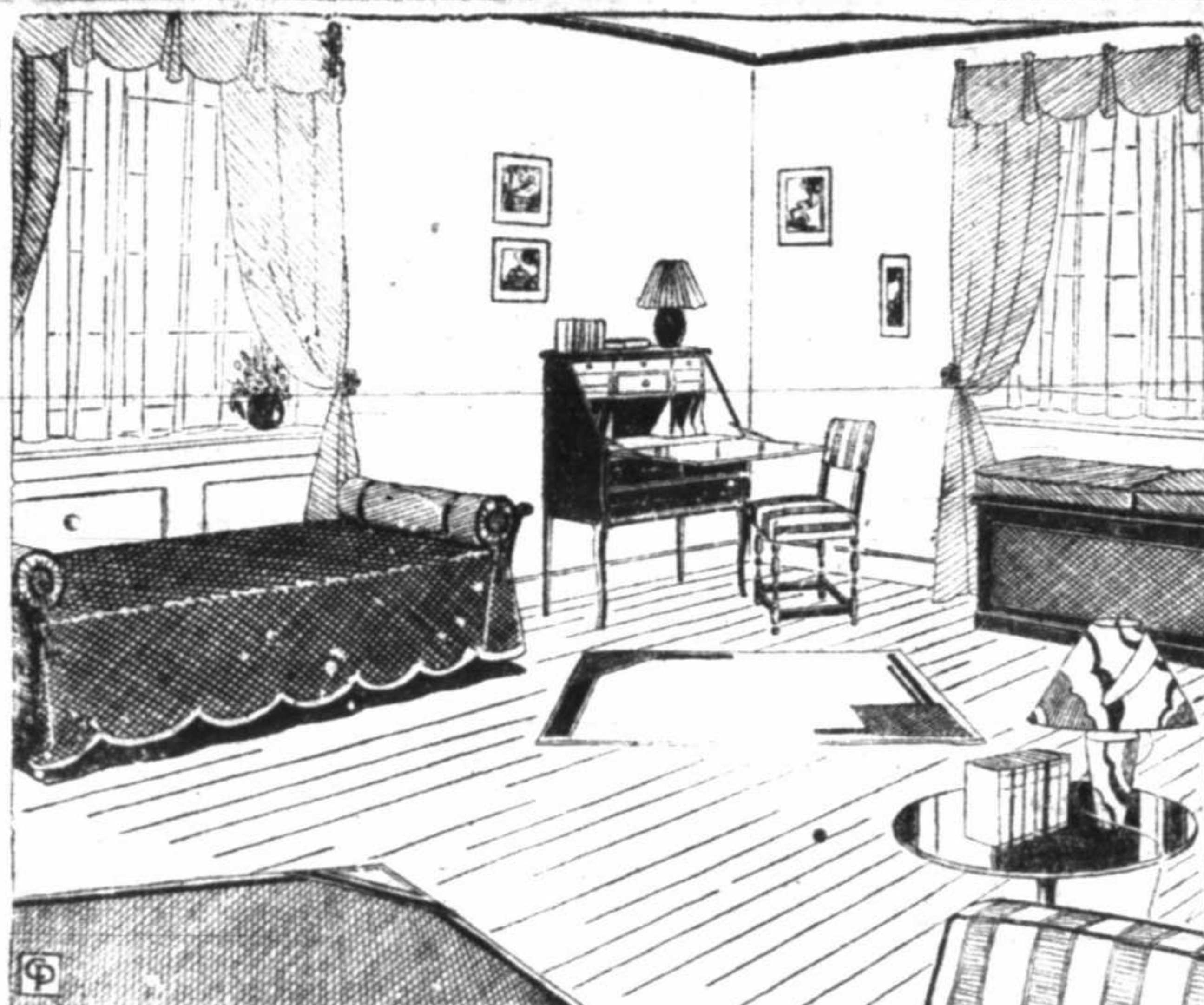

Simplicity Makes This Room Up-to-Date



BY HILDA HUNT

The heat has been turned on, and is now going full force, screens have been taken out and awnings are down. Thanksgiving is fast approaching, and it's time to think of winter draperies for the windows, winter coverings for the furniture, and a cover for the radiator. Studied simplicity is the keynote of modern decorating, whether it be modernistic or just plain up to date, with no radical changes to speak of.

The living room sketched is of this last classification. There is no attempt to make it extremely modern. It is just a case of rearranging what you have, and perhaps adding a more modern touch here and there in some small piece or ornament.

As this is the usual room found in the modern apartment with cream or buff walls and the usual hardwood floor, the color scheme is open to many variations. One must not lose sight of the fact, however, that the cool colors, like blue and green, should dominate where the room is very light, and the warmer colors, like yellow and red, where there is not so much sunlight. As the room

sketched receives the sun the greater part of the day, green dominates the color scheme. The window drapes are in a soft leaf green, and the glass curtains of ecru net.

Scalloped Outline Effective
The valances are draped to form a scalloped outline, which is more effective than the straight valance where the windows are large and wide. The long, low radiator below the window is covered with a wooden case, stained mahogany to match the woodwork of the furniture. A mahogany desk stands in the corner between the windows. This day bed, placed beneath the window, is covered with deep orchid, the orchid being repeated in the glass floral devices which hold the tiebacks to the window drapes, and in an occasional ornament. There is also a note of orchid in the scatter rug, and a very narrow strip of the same in the yellow and green damask used for the upholstery of the chairs and for the roller curtains at either end of the day bed.

The day bed, by the way, is becoming an indispensable adjunct to the home. It is appropriate for either

bedroom or living room but usually takes the place of the sofa in the living room of the small apartments as an extra place to sleep when guests arrive. Where there is a guest room, the sofa is a better bet for the living room.

How to Achieve Beauty

BY MADAM RUBINSTEIN

I have purposely begun with this less strenuous system, because many women who have not exercised for a long time find it unwise to go back to exercise via too vigorous a route.

The system is also good for the woman of delicate health who cannot indulge in the more violent forms of calisthenics, but who still wants some means of stretching her limbs.

The whole system is built around the principle of expansion and contraction, and the laws of specific gravity and equilibrium. You can stand perfectly still, with your arms outstretched, contracting your back. You then draw your shoulders in from the arm sockets and expand. All motion must begin from the source, or joints. For instance, if you want to do arm circling to straighten your back and to give you an erect carriage, you must stretch out your arms for arm circling. You move the upper arm at the socket in your shoulder, paying no attention to the actual movements of your hands but permitting the motion of the shoulders to move your entire arms. In the same manner the legs are exercised by moving the upper body in a rotary movement at the hip joints. The legs and thighs are made limber by a swinging and rotary movement of the entire limb from the hip joint. The women who take this course are taught to exercise their abdominal muscles independently. This is a difficult exercise and requires expert teaching.

However, from this school there emanate some of the less rigorous exercises which every woman can do in her own home. Just going through the elementary movements of pulling a rope or imitating the movements of a cat stretching can

do much to take the kinks out of an inactive body.

The important factor in doing these comparatively simple exercises is regularity for it is only after a certain amount of time has elapsed that they are truly beneficial. This is one of the very new schools of body building.

Man Who Lost 16 Millions In Fight Against 'Big Business' Says Little Man Hasn't A Chance Against Horde

Recent Market Flurry Will Make Rich Richer But It Will Also Make The Poor Poorer, He Believes

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 11.—It's foolish business for any individual to try to beat the Wall Street crowd, for in the end there is bound to be only one result—disaster for the individual.

Thus does Clarence Saunders, grocery chain store king, comment on the spectacular Wall Street debacle of the last few days. Saunders knows what he is talking about. There was a time when he thought he had Wall Street licked. He bucked Wall Street with \$16,000,000 in cold cash. Then, a day or so later, he woke up to learn that Wall Street had him licked. "I never put a dime in Wall Street during the recent upheaval and the present crash is to him a matter of academic interest only."

He came back, though, now has 50 stores of his own and is worth more than he ever was before. In three years he returned to a millionaire from semi-poverty. But he didn't put a dime in Wall Street during the recent upheaval and the present crash is to him a matter of academic interest only.

"My advice to the great mass of American men and women," he says, "is to refuse absolutely, whatever the temptation, to buy or sell stocks on margin. Such stock trading is gambling and nothing else—and when you do it you'll get gambling losses more times than you will get gamblers' luck."

"It Had To Happen"
What has happened in the stock market is just what had to happen. The only question was, "When?"

"Who is to blame? That is a question that can be answered in two ways. If the banking interests of the country, including the Federal Reserve system, are to be held to a supposed duty of protecting the great mass called the American public, then they are to blame. "If the gullible public is to be left to its own cupidity and ignorance without the guiding hand of these in a position to guide, and with the powerful rich left free to feed on that cupidity and gullibility as long as there is a pound of flesh left, then the blame must be against that cupidity and ignorance."

Propaganda has been poured out

borrow money on such a basis except with the certainty that there was another sucker that would take the load from him at a profit, and it seems that there were too many of these suckers for their own good. "The money lender is the profit maker out of this wild orgy of uncontrolled gambling and speculation. The man and woman of moderate or small means has been stripped of his or her savings. The big rich have been made richer, for they first sold at a huge profit and now they can buy back (because they have the cash the little fellow got squeezed out of him) at their own price the same stock they sold at a high price."

"Most Americans are born gamblers. They want to get rich at somebody else's expense and this same spirit and desire is in the hearts of the little rich as well as the big rich. The only difference is that the big rich know their onions, and when they make an occasional mistake they have plenty of resources for another try, whereas the little rich take a fling to win all or lose all, which in many cases will finally mean lose all."

"I have been accused of trying to buck Wall Street. And buck them I did, with all the fight that was in me, but my march into Wall Street with that reputed 'train of money' was not for the purpose of trying my wits and financial strength against the powers that be but simply to do all I could to keep the stock market sharks from ruining my business."

Asked what effect the Wall Street crash would have on business, Saunders replied:

"There's some slowing up in business, but on the whole the country is prosperous and I think it will continue on such a basis for a long time to come, regardless of what happens in Wall Street."

At the height of his wealth before the crash came Saunders built an enormous mansion here—the pink palace—as it was called. When the crash came it was sold under the auctioneer's hammer, and was nearly everything else Saunders possessed. Now the city has a new home—a log cabin in the middle of a 300-acre estate a few miles from Memphis. Its simplicity symbolizes his desire to get away from Wall Street—and stay away.

"Pay" for Kansas Fullback Stirs Up Western Football

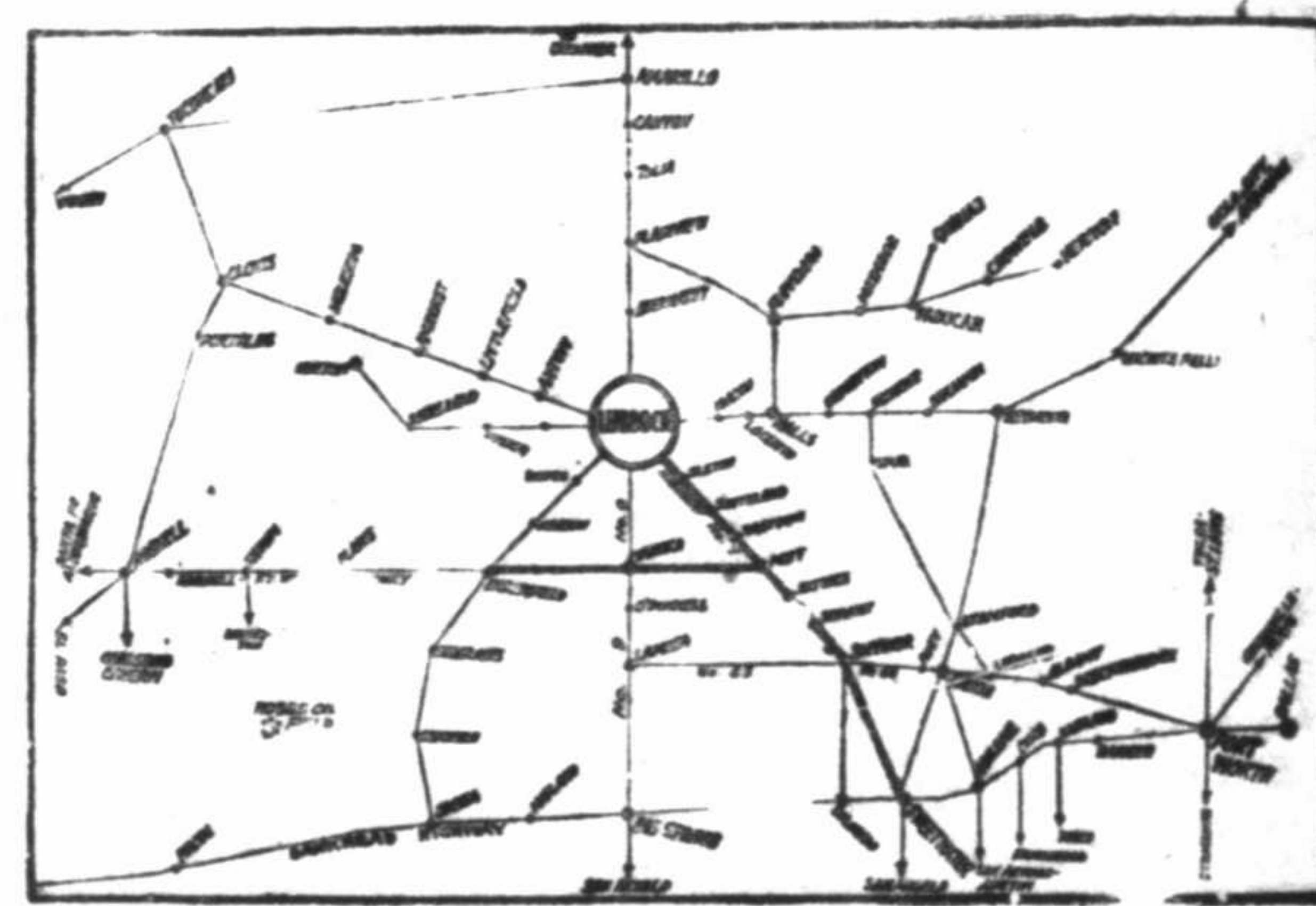

PENNSYLVANIA'S ONLY SENATOR HAS EARNED VACATION ABROAD

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Senator David A. Reed, of Pennsylvania, has earned a vacation, as one of America's delegates at the London naval limitations conference early next year.

Ever since his colleague, George Wharton Pepper, term ended two years ago last March 4, and the senate refused to seat William S. Vare as George W.'s successor, the Pittsburgher (Senator Reed's home is in the smoky city) has been the Keystone state's lone representative in the upper house of congress.

Doing double duty for so long, with a re-election campaign on his own thrown in, his good measure is enough to wear any senator to a frazzle.

Besides, the Pennsylvanian has had to carry the bulk of the load involved in fighting the tariff bill all through the extra session.

Senator Reed Smoot of Utah, as chairman of the finance committee, which got the bill into the shape in which it was intended to have it passed, was supposed to have charge of the job of getting it favorably acted on without too many alterations. Senator Smoot, however, is not much of a scrapper.

He knows more about protective than any other man in Washington, and is a wonder at framing them up, so as to yield the maximum amount of profit to the protected interests, but he is easy to squelch in a free-for-all argument.

This bill has proved to require a long argument—very rough, some of it.

Seeing Smoot getting decidedly the worst of it, Reed—whose state is more interested in barrels of protection than any other two or three states put together—was forced to jump into the arena to help him, whereupon Senator Smoot promptly slipped out from under, and Reed has had to go ahead with the rumpus almost single-handed.

Senator Reed, in anything like a protective tariff fight, has the quality of boundless sincerity in common with Senator Hiram Bingham of Connecticut.

That is, they both are wholeheartedly and absolutely honestly convinced that most people are morally wrong in the way they take care of themselves, and that plenty of special privileges ought to be granted to the very few whom nature has blessed with brains, in order to enable them to do their best by the bone-headed masses (and of course, to reward the brainy folk for doing it).

The difference between Reed and Bingham is that Bingham is so unsophisticated as to express this notion quite candidly, whereas Reed is more tactful about it.

The truth is that a leader of Reed's views (Bingham's views are equally all right for the purpose, but not his judgment) is needed to wage a high tariff fight effectively.

It obviously is a fight in favor of special privilege.

The individual who conducts it must believe profoundly in special privilege, righteousness, or everything he says is bound to sound hypocritical. Reed's utterances never have sounded so for a minute. At all stages of the game he has given every evidence of being a true believer.

Nevertheless, he has had to work like a Trojan. A nice lone rest over in the refined atmosphere of diplomatic London is fairly coming to him.

The only question is: What will become of Pennsylvania in Reed's absence? It cannot safely do without any senator in this country whatever. The natural assumption is that the Vares case is on the eve of being settled, which certainly cannot be by any other method than Senator-elect Vares' final definite exclusion—and that it is all arranged for Governor Fisher to appoint a senatorial partner to Reed between now and next January.

Many politicians believe it will be "Old Joe" Grundy.

There is nothing the matter with Grundy's sincerity, and all Washington takes off its hat to his ability as a "fixer," but he hasn't it in him to be as fluent as Reed on the senate floor, by a long shot.

THE NEW SEWING MACHINE

On November 12, 1850 a patent on the first sewing machine to sew curving seams was issued to Allen B. Wilson, New York cabinet maker and inventor. He also introduced the rotary hook and stationary bobbin.

Wilson's invention aided materially in popularizing the sewing machine, which was just then becoming a real competitor of hand labor as the result of other inventions by Walter Hunt, Elias Howe, John Bachelder, Isaac Singer and A. E. Gibbs.

As the fundamental patents obtained by these pioneer inventors have gradually expired, the most satisfactory features of the older machines have been adopted by a modern sewing machine manufacturer.

Today also is the anniversary of the birth, on Nov. 12, 1876, of Joseph Hopkinson, author of "Hail Columbia."

Aggie President Wants Sweeping Athletic Probe

Investigation Of Conditions In All Texas Colleges And Universities Is Advocated

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 11. (AP)—A sweeping investigation of conditions in all Texas colleges and universities relative to methods of recruiting and obtaining athletes was urged today by President T. O. Walton, of Texas A. & M. College of Texas. The proposal was made in view of the recent report of the Carnegie Foundation on practices in college athletics all over the country.

Such an investigation, President Walton suggested, might be conducted by the committee created some two years ago by the association of Texas colleges, composed of the presidents of the five athletic conferences in the state, with the president of the Southwest Conference as chairman. The committee is empowered to investigate "any and all phases of college athletics in Texas institutions."

Wants Action
"As one deeply interested in the development and maintenance of inter-collegiate athletics upon a high plane, I should like to see this committee, or a special committee of the Southwest Conference, investigate conditions in all Texas institutions, and then give the widest publicity to any unsatisfactory conditions they might find," President Walton said.

"If abuses have crept into the management of inter-collegiate athletics in the conference, I am sure that the authorities of the institutions are not informed about them, and that when they know of the existence of harmful practices in their institutions, faculties and administrative officers will take prompt action to correct the conditions."

"The Carnegie report is a challenge to all of us who are interested in furthering a high plane. The charges are grave. The foundation investigated only three institutions of the Southwest Conference, and stated that the Southwest Conference is free from abuses than any other conferences in the practice of what it designates as 'sweeping athletics'."

"The practice was found to be so general throughout all the institutions where investigations were made that the inference is clear that the investigators are convinced that practically none of the higher educational institutions in the country are free from the practice of subsidizing athletes."

"The presentation of these facts will, unless prompt action is taken by college authorities, result in some loss of confidence upon the part of the public in those charged with the administration of inter-collegiate athletics and will serve in some measure to bring inter-collegiate athletic contests into disrepute with the public."

"Therefore, college administrators and athletic directors should use

their most earnest endeavors to eliminate from their respective institutions any practices that are detrimental to the right type of college athletics, to the best welfare of the students and to the institution.

"It is the responsibility of the Southwest Conference to look after its own affairs and to take whatever steps may be necessary to bring about a discontinuation of unethical practices, if and wherever such practices exist."

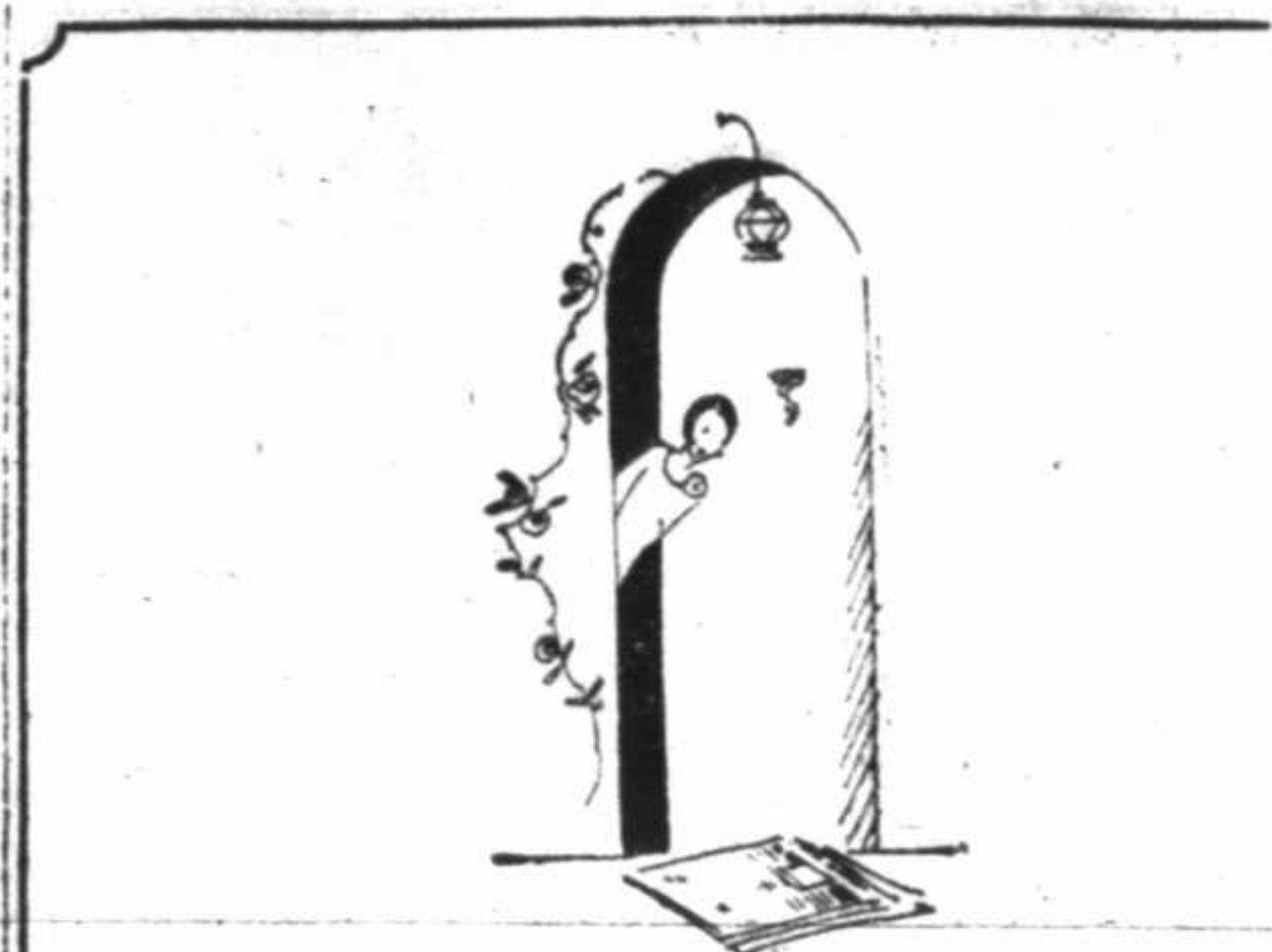

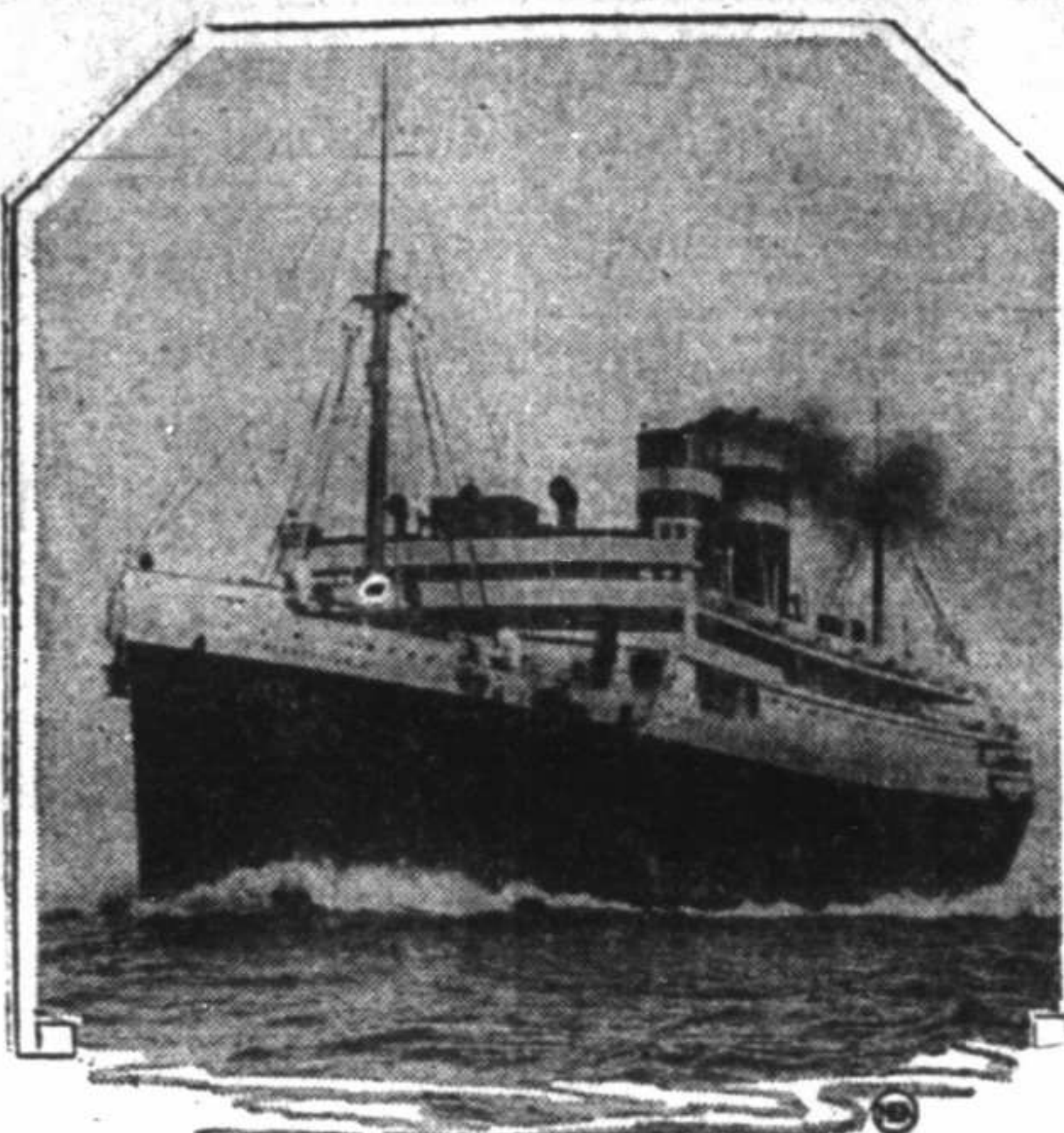

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—Here are some salient snatches from President Hoover's Armistice Day address:

No man came from that (World War) furnace a swashbuckling militarist.

Those who saw its realities and its backwash in the sacrifice of women and children are not the men who glorify war.

Peace is not a static thing.

To maintain peace is as dynamic in its requirements as is the conduct of war.

We must frankly accept the fact that we and all the nations of the world will be involved for all future time in small or great controversies and frictions.

Our ideals and our hopes are for the progress of justice through the entire world.

We are confident that at least in the western hemisphere public opinion will suffice to check violence.

I have full confidence in the success of the conference (naval limitation) which will assemble next January.

We must reduce and limit warships by agreement only. I have no faith in the reduction of armaments by example alone.

I am for adequate preparedness as a guaranty that no foreign soldier shall ever step upon the soil of our country.

No American will arise today and say that we wish one gun or one armed man beyond that necessary for the defense of our people.

Proper defense requires military strength relative to that of other nations. We will reduce our naval strength in proportion to any other.

Our nation has said with millions of voices that we desire only defense.

No idea can be perfected except upon the anvil of debate.

The time has come when we should remove starvation of women and children from weapons of warfare.

I have no fear that we are not able to impress every country with the single-minded good will which lies in the American heart.

Patriotic Parade Sidelights

As the long column of the Armistice Day parade in Lubbock filed slowly through the business district of the city, hundreds of interested citizens waited patiently. The roll of drums and an occasional strain of "Stars and Stripes Forever" could be heard along the street indicating the advance of the parade.

The Allen Brothers Post, American Legion, led the parade followed by two or three cars in which sat mothers and fathers of ex-service men. Judge Clark M. Mullican and Charles Whitacre led the section of doughboys made up of all ex-service men who wore caps and helmets and kept step to army marching. Local members of the National Guard rode on horseback and were followed by the Tech band.

Possibly one of the most attractive spots in the parade was the brightly clad pep squad of Texas Tech. Dressed in their costumes of scarlet and black and bareheaded, they made a brilliant scene as they passed along. They were led by Miss Nora Cooke.

Texas Tech also had represented ten members of the horseshoe riding class, closely followed by four girls dressed as clowns. Several members of the R. O. T. C. unit, in uniform and carrying rifles, marched behind the girls.

The Lubbock high school band was cheered by the spectators as it passed. Martha Alice Penny, leader of the girl's pep squad at the high school, and Rob O'Hair, leader of the boys, were at the head of a group dressed in their yellow and black uniforms and gaily keeping step.

Dozens of Boy Scouts were in the parade and with them marched Rev. L. G. H. Williams, also in the uniform of this organization.

The Camp Fire girls came in groups, each section having its banner and marching with the guard.

Several cars followed the parade to the Tech gymnasium where a patriotic program was given.

Westerners Bloc Still Independent Of Republicans on Tariff Question

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. (AP)—Taking stock of the menacing rift in the senate republican ranks, administration representatives found the bloc of westerners still independent today and still very independent of the republican regulars on the tariff program.

Cosciusco Hutton, intimate of President Hoover and the new chairman of the republican national committee, visited the senate wing of the capitol and had an opportunity to determine what damage, if any, had resulted from the last explosion in the party—the characterization of the western independents by Senator Moses, of New Hampshire, as the "sons of wild jackasses."

He was told by the western independents that the Moses lib was immaterial to them.

He learned from the republican regulars of discontent among those up for re-election in doubtful states and in some of the mid-west states against Moses as chairman of the republican senatorial campaign committee.

No Action Expected
Nevertheless, no action is expected against Moses either as chairman of the campaign committee or as president pro tem of the senate.

Moves in both directions were threatened. Republican regulars up for re-election are understood to be demanding that Moses do more consulting and less speech-making during the next few months when the political campaigns are in the delicate stages.

Reports went around the capitol today that the president wanted it understood he did not select Senator Moses as chairman of the senatorial campaign committee, that the selection was that of Senator Watson, of Indiana, the republican leader. Some of Senator Moses' friends had understood he was serving at the specific request of the president as well as of Senator Watson.

Bolters Indifferent

The apparently complete indifference of the western bolters to the Hoover farm relief and tariff programs is drawing the attention of the chief executive. While holding their silence, party independents who have combined with the southern democrats in the tariff and farm fights are known to be gauging the possibility of such an alignment in future political campaigns. An alignment of the west and south, they calculate, could be a serious political possibility.

Speaking privately, some of the independents said they regard the schism in the republican ranks as deeper than any in years. They compare the present situation to that existing when President Taft found himself in the throes of a similar tariff dispute.
