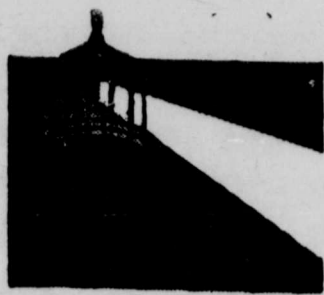


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On The BEAM

The last rain of the year thus far came in the morning of Tuesday, June 18, marking the end to one of the longest wet spells we have ever seen in this country.

The prolonged rains, which amounted to almost a full year's rainfall, put a splendid season in the ground. The past two or three weeks have been hot and the ground has dried out down an inch or so below the surface which brings up the question, "when will it rain again?" Nothing is really needing rain, field crops that is, except early planted feed that is heading. It would be wonderful if we could make a whopping big feed crop along with a big cotton crop, so we are ready for another rain. Those with irrigation wells have already started watering. They may get to prove the value of supplemental irrigation this year. In previous years the wells had to furnish most of the water the crops received.

There is a possibility that a frozen foods plant will be located here in Loraine if farmers are willing to cooperate by planting certain things the plant would require to operate profitably. If located here the plant would need the assurance from farmers that such crops will be planted on sufficient acres to produce enough. We feel sure such assurance will be forthcoming if a market is established here.

Value of Property Rises at Death of Husband or Wife

You may not know it but in Texas the value of your property changes for income tax purposes if either the husband or wife dies. This is best brought out by this example: John and Mary Doe bought the old homestead for \$1,000 in 1920. Before John's death they had a tax base for \$500 for John and \$500 cost for Mary. If either John or Mary had sold their half of the property, the value of the property would have been \$1,000. The children who inherit John's half of the old homestead have a tax base of \$100,000 instead of the \$500 that John had paid for the property. A lot of people find it hard to believe (but it is still true) that Mary's half of the old homestead also increases, for income tax paying purposes, from \$500 to \$100,000 or whatever the fair market value of the property is on the date of John's death. This law pertaining to estates applies whether any Federal estate tax is due and paid or not. This law is worth many tax dollars to Texas widows because of the tremendous increase in property values in the past few years.

Man Made Moon Will Be At State Fair

A full-size replica of the "man-made moon" which will be launched into space to circle the earth will be exhibited at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, October 5-20.

The Dallas Health Museum will display the earth satellite model, along with much of the IBM calculating equipment which will gauge its flight and record its reports. A model of the three-stage launching rocket which carry the "moon" into space also will be on exhibit.

The exhibits will be furnished by the U. S. Naval Research Laboratory in Washington, D. C., where the technical program is being carried out for Project Vanguard.

"Vanguard" represents man's first real attempt to conquer space. The earth satellite, a sphere 20 inches in diameter, packed with intricate instruments, will be fired into outer space where it will circle the earth in an orbit some 300 miles out. Its instruments will send back data by radio which will assist scientists in their studies of space.

The launching of the "man-made moon" is one of the experiments to be carried out in the United States' scientific program for the current International Geophysical Year which began July 1.

It is estimated that the "Vanguard" project has already cost \$37,000,000, with hundreds of the nation's scientists involved in work to perfect the satellite sphere, design the equipment to track it and build the giant rocket to take it up.

Invalids and Mentally Deranged Persons To Get Help From State

Complete and permanent invalids or persons in the community so mentally deranged that they require continuous oversight to keep from harming themselves or others may soon be able to receive small monthly checks from their State Department of Public Welfare through the new state-federal program of aid to the permanently and totally disabled. The Constitutional Amendment which was adopted by the voters in November, 1956, limiting the amount of money that can be appropriated for this program to one and a half million dollars per year, makes aid possible only to those who are helpless and have no relatives able to support them.

Tommy J. Compton, Welfare Supervisor for this area, pointed out this is the only welfare program which requires consideration of the ability of relatives to support. This law defines "responsible relatives" as children, parents, step-children, step-parents, brothers and sisters. Compton said that for the first time in nearly 20 years the Department's Field Workers will be required by law to determine the resources of relatives of persons who apply for aid.

The "permanency" and "totality" of the disability will be determined by a State Reviewing Physician after study of a complete physical or mental examination by the person's own private physician. Complete helplessness from a medical standpoint, rather than inability to work, is the criteria. The state will pay the private physician for his examination.

Funds for assistance payments will not be available until September 1, 1957, but applications will be taken after July 15. While the helpless individual will not be able to leave home, the persons responsible for his care may come to the local welfare office and acquaint the Department with his situation. A Field Worker will then call, as soon as possible, at the home to take the application.

Sen. Yarborough Advocates Parity

Referring to letters from Texas farmers, Senator Ralph Yarborough has called to the attention of the Senate the increasing problems confronting the nation's farmers.

Strongly emphasizing the inadequacy of the soil bank program, Senator Yarborough stated that it "clearly shows the grave need for retention of the parity principle."

Senator Yarborough praised the Progressive Farmer for its editorial in the July, 1957, issue stating that it "clearly shows the grave need for retention of the parity principle."

Secretary Benson has not proved that the parity principle has failed. He has simply proved that there has been too much looseness in enforcing or carrying out the parity principle. We ought to mend parity. A vigorous fight by farmers at this time may save the parity principle, even though it may be necessary to change the methods by which fair or parity prices are obtained.

If we do not save the parity principle, farm prices may drop to bankruptcy figures any year. "Every passing day brings new evidence in support of the principle of fair parity prices for farm products."

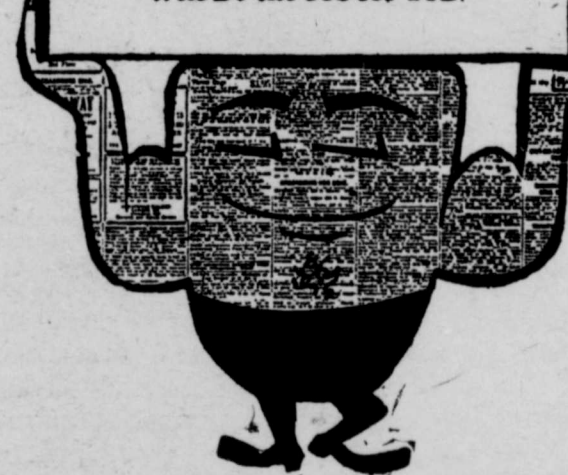

Federal Gas Tax Refund Booklet
Now Available To Farmers

A. E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene Internal Revenue office, announced today that a revised Farmer's Gas Tax Refund guide booklet is now available to assist farmers in submitting Federal gas tax refund claims for the year ending June 30, 1957.

The publication, No. 308, together with claim Form 2240 and instructions for submission of claims are available on request at the Abilene, Texas Internal Revenue office. Forms and instructions also may be obtained at county agricultural agents' offices.

Claims should be filed on Form 2240 on or after July 1, but not later than September 30, 1957.

Last year a million and a quarter farmers filed claims for refund of the Federal tax on gasoline used for farming purposes, and refunds averaged \$20.

It is estimated that the number of claims for refund filed this year will be close to 2,500,000 and the total refund is expected to increase correspondingly. These expected increases are due to an increase in the Federal gas tax rate from two to three cents a gallon plus the fact that an entire year will be covered by these claims whereas only taxes paid on gas used during the first six months of 1956 were subject to the claims filed last year.

The Farmer's Tax Refund guide explains in plain language the rules and procedures to be followed in filing a claim for refund of the Federal gasoline tax. It also explains conditions under which the farmer may purchase diesel fuel and other special motor fuels, to be used for farm purposes, without payment of the Federal tax thereon.

Impact of Texas' New Egg Law
The Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective in a few weeks, will have probably a more far-reaching impact on the citizens of Texas as a whole than any agricultural legislation of recent times.

Although regulations will extend only to certain areas of the egg industry itself, the effect of the law will be felt not only by producers and other industry men, but by consumers as well. And the effect felt will be a good one.

What the law actually does is to stop misrepresentation of inferior eggs as quality merchandise and to place emphasis on accurate product labeling of quality eggs and a better product for consumers.

This is accomplished through a system of egg grading which requires all eggs offered for sale to consumers through retail outlets to be accurately labelled according to size, grade and condition of freshness.

Small Producers Protected
Heretofore, labelling of eggs as to grade and condition was a free and open affair with no recourse available even in the most flagrant violations. The new standards require that no egg below actual "A" quality be sold or advertised as fresh, selected, infertile, cage, or any word of similar import.

Producers of eggs who sell only the production of their own flocks are exempt from provisions of the act unless they claim some kind of grade. If producers choose to claim a grade, their eggs must conform completely with provisions of the law.

The act becomes effective August 22. Deadline for obtaining licenses (by retailers, dealers, wholesalers and processors) is October 20. Actual enforcement of violations, which carry fines up to \$1,000, will start after Feb. 17, 1958.

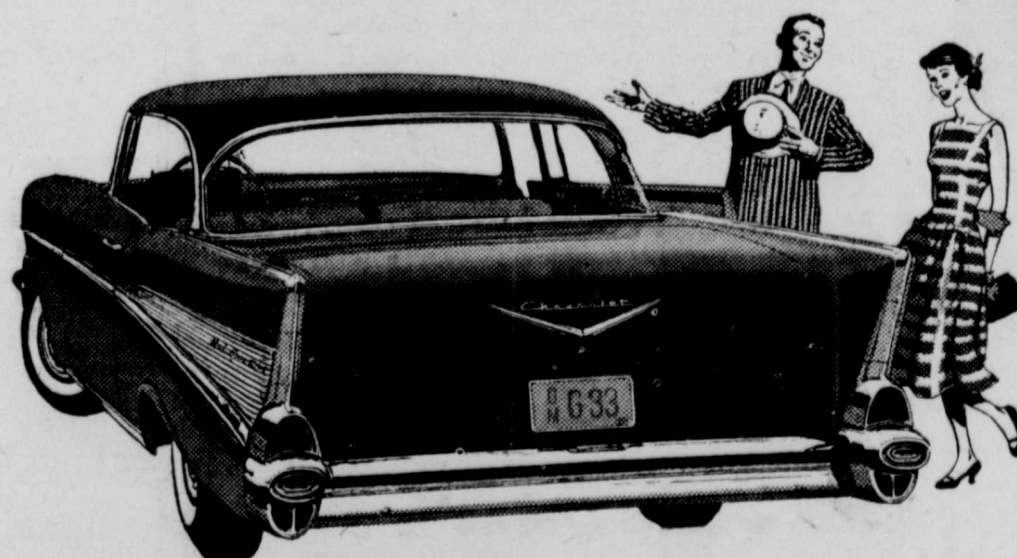
