Sterling City picked up two points on a first quarter safety and then held on for a hard fought 2-0 win over Lorraine in a tough, defensive battle in Sterling City.

Sophomore wingback Terry Brewer was the Bulldogs' top ground gainer with 39 yards on six attempts. Lorraine had 68 yards rushing with Sterling City managing 74.

The Bulldogs had only three first downs, but the victors had just four.

A first period field goal attempt by the Bulldogs was unsuccessful after Lorraine got to the Sterling sixyard line with a fourth down situation.

On defense end Donnie Phillips led the charge for the Bulldogs while linebacker Bob Farlow and halfback Chris Hubert also turned in steady performances.

Ball control played a big part in the Sterling City win as the home team ran off 32 plays as opposed to Lorraine's 18 efforts from scrimmage.

Lorraine mentor Don Bryan told The Record Saturday that the Bulldogs turned in their finest team effort of the season. "The defense did a fine job and the offensive unit is beginning to jell. We're going to win some ball games from here on in," he said.

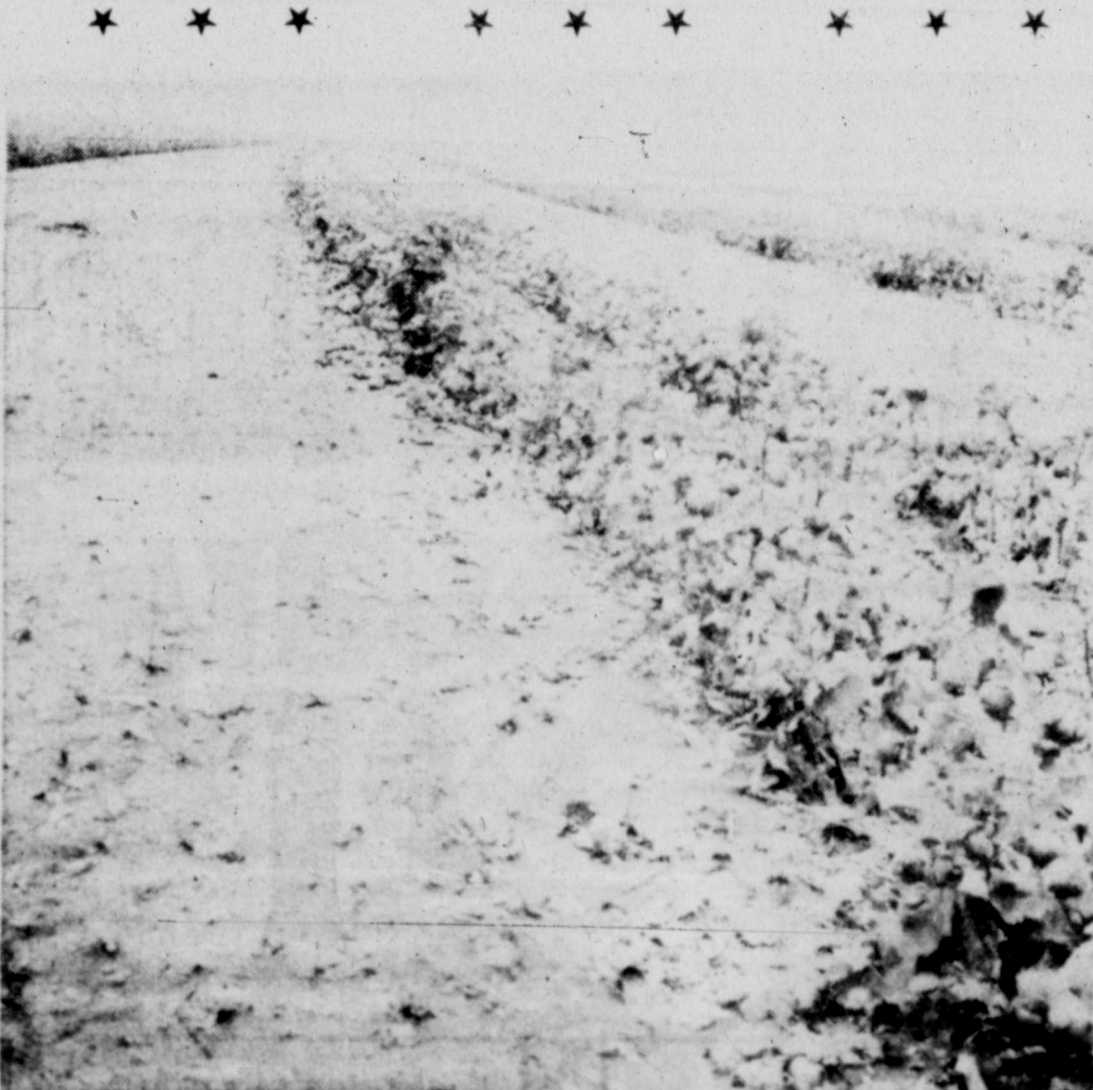

CHS Wolves Beat Fighting Roscoe

ROS COE—A high geared running attack by the Colorado City Wolves vaulted the undefeated "11" to a muddy 14-6 victory over a tough bunch of Roscoe Plowboys Friday night.

The Wolves gained 195 yards on the ground and hit on two aerials for 27 in grinding out the win against a determined Roscoe team that put a vigorous battle.

Dan Steakley put C-City on the scoreboard first with 3:38 the fleet halfback caught the entire Roscoe team flatfooted and scampered around left end on an easy five-yard

jaunt. Glen Nix flipped a short pass to Larry Paul for the two points and the Wolves had an 8-0 bulge.

Roscoe huffed and puffed through the stingy Wolf line that allowed only 90 yards in the game—for almost two quarters before Jim Rayburn finally saw daylight on a five-yard blast to paydirt with 2:09 left in the second period. Try for points failed.

The plowboys moved into scoring position mainly on the strength of a 29-yard pass play that moved them to the Wolf 20 before a tremendous tackle by Dan Steakley slowed the gainer.

Wolf penalty put them on the six and after two no gains tries, the home team punched in for the score.

Sets Up Score

On the first play of the fourth period Higginbotham gathered in a Roscoe punt on his own 20 and it was 63 yards later before a Plowboy defender finally managed to bring the hard charging fullback to the muddy sod at the Roscoe 15-yard line.

Nix was dumped for a five yard loss on the first play of the series, but Steakley gained it back on the next down.

A pass fell incomplete and the Wolves appeared in deep trouble with a fourth down and 10 yards to go for a first.

Then Steakley pulled it out of the fire for the Wolves with a 14-yard romp that fell just short of paydirt and gave the C-City team first down only one yard away.

After two unsuccessful sneaks Nix handed off to Higginbotham who cracked the Plowboy line for a yard to score.

Roscoe threatened again in the fourth period and drove to the Wolf 26-yard line before Bubba Kennedy intercepted a Plowboy aerial to snuff out the effort.

The Wolf defense looked tough throughout the contest with sterling performances being turned in by the middle of the line including Robert Mathers and Ascension Bonilla. Sophomore Johnny Matthews had a tremendous night from his linebacking spot.

Higginbotham was the leading ground gainer with 107 yards on 20 carries while Steakley rambled 83 yards on 17 totes. Wayne Russell picked up 13 on four tries.

The Wolves first scoring drive got off to a roaring start as Nix tossed to Riley Tilly for a 20-yard gain to Roscoe's 28-yard line.

Steakley hit for four yards and Higginbotham got seven and a first on two carries. An 11-yard run by Steakley set

Prospects for the second bumper crop in as many years are being dampened by wet and cloudy weather that has been hanging over the Mitchell County area for the past several days.

A Wednesday night hail storm southeast of Colorado City resulted in damage estimates as high as 90 percent on portions of farms operated by Sidney Compton, Whit Holman and Lester Finley.

Less damage was inflicted on acreage farmed by Willis and Leroy Cornutt.

The hailstorm struck a mile wide at a for about six miles eastward down farm-to-market road 644.

Compton was also reported to have received damage to part of his grain sorghum crop.

In places over the storm area, green cotton bolls and leaves covered the ground completely leaving half stripped stalks standing in the muddy rows.

Delaying Maturity

County Agent Bobby Lemons said Saturday that the wet and cloudy weather was definitely beginning to hurt the '66 cotton crop.

"The weather is delaying maturity and this will hurt our micronaire reading and thus cause price drops," Lemons added.

He said cotton blooming from Sept. 5 to 15 needed 45 days of temperatures over 65 degrees to make a mature product.

Of course some of the earlier planted varieties are not being hurt as much as others planted later in the summer according to Lemons.

He noted that some cotton was beginning to open in the Buford area northeast of Colorado City.

Bacterial blight is also showing up over the county and according to the county agent this is also slowing down maturity of the crop.

Other Problems

The weather is causing other worries for farmers besides late maturity.

Two of the most prominent are the muddy conditions of the field preventing farmers

from plowing and spraying insects.

"Weeds are becoming a real problem," Lemons said.

And the size of the cotton is preventing use of plows in some fields. This means the use of more labor to hoe the crop and thus ups the cost of producing the crop.

Boll weevils are still on the increase in some parts of the county including the Looney community and north of Lorraine.

A spraying program calling for three treatments of the pesky insects has been slowed and some farmers have only applied one or two sprayings to their crops.

This could allow a larger number of weevils to overwinter and hibernate in the county thus making for a bigger weevil population next year.

Lemons said the cotton would retain most of its staple length despite the weather but the strength of the fiber could be lessened.

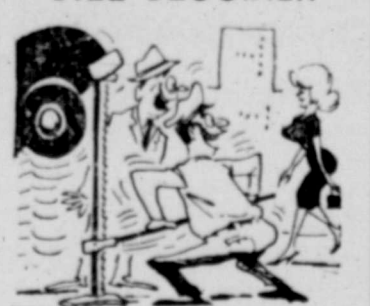
