Formal Opening of New Building
Set April 4-5 by Reid Chevrolet

Andy and Bob Reid, who have operated Reid Chevrolet here since February 12, 1937, are to be hosts to residents of this area in the formal opening of their new building Friday and Saturday, April 4-5. The Chevrolet sales and service firm has a total of 11,246 square feet of floor space in its two buildings. The buildings and new equipment represent an investment of between \$45,000 and \$50,000.

It will be the largest, most varied showing of new vehicles ever to be displayed in Abernathy. The Reids expect to have six passenger type 1947 Chevrolets and ten, 1947 Chevrolet commercial units on display this week-end.

Located on the highway a block south of the Zeman building which housed Reid Chevrolet for about ten years, the new buildings are of light brick construction with attractive trimmings.

Spacious in all departments, the total floor space is divided as follows: service department, 5,500 square feet; body, fender and painting department, in a 3-room building west of the main structure, has 1,380 square feet of floor space; the auto show room, which has a beautiful, light green terrazzo floor, has 816 square feet, with an additional 300 square feet of same construction for display of Frigidaires, also sold and serviced by the firm; ground floor parts department has 1,625 square feet and the second floor parts storage room has the same number of square feet of floor space.

A rest room for ladies is on the ground floor, entrance through the parts department. Rest rooms for men, and showers, have an entrance through the service department.

The three offices are between the showroom and parts department.

The architect firm of Walker and Acheson of Lubbock designed the building. H. E. Rantz, Abernathy building contractor, supervised its construction. A. J. Davis' Abernathy Pump and Equipment Co. rig was used to set steel frame work of the buildings. Window and door glass finishing was done by L. J.

COTTON IS GIVEN
5-YEAR SUSPENDED
SENTENCE

PLAINVIEW, April 1.—A five year sentence suspended was passed by the 64th district court today on recommendation of the jury finding Leroy Cotton, Abernathy former service man, guilty of murder without malice of Jess Jenkins.

Jenkins died Aug. 13 after a scuffle in an Abernathy cafe. Morticians testified that he, contrary to first belief, did not die of a heart attack, but had suffered two wounds in the chest. Sheriff Ted Andrews identified an ice pick the state contended had been the weapon that inflicted the wounds.

Other witnesses said the men scuffled after Jenkins had declined to charge Cotton's order of food.

The jury reported at 2:20 p. m., three hours after it began considering a verdict. John Mathes of Plainview was foreman. Testimony was completed Monday night.

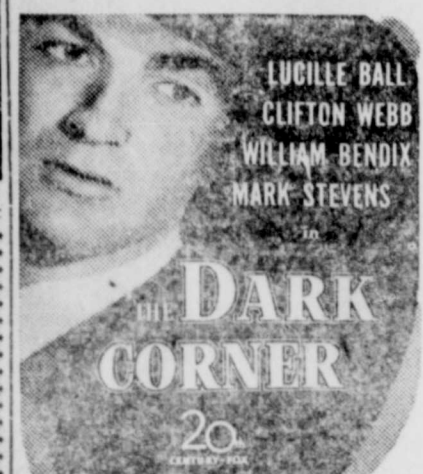

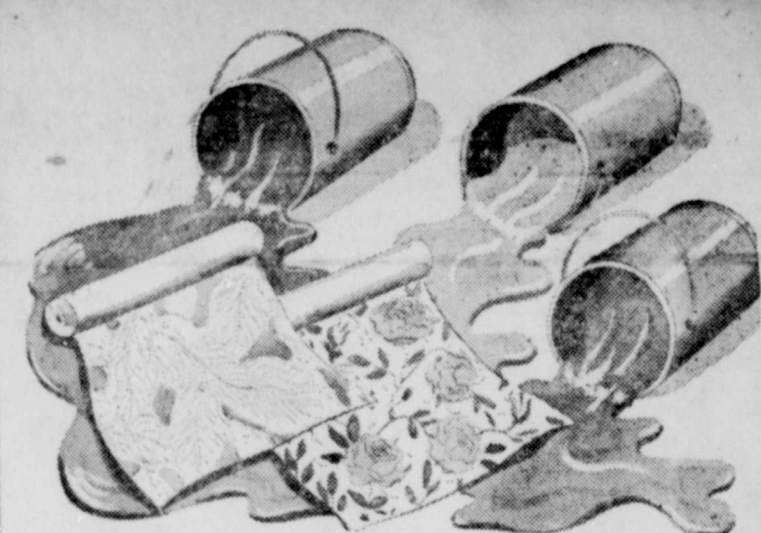

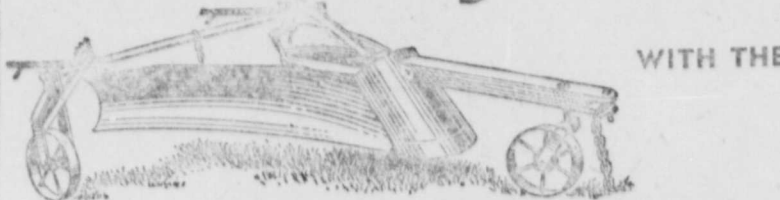
