Post Trustees Set Election, Discuss Delinquent Taxes and Career Ladder

The Post ISD Board of Trustees set Saturday, May 7, 1988 as election day for the three positions to be filled at their regular meeting Tuesday, February 9.

Positions to be filled are Position 1 - vacated by Jimmie Bartlett, Position 2 - currently held by Don Payne and Position 3 - held by Jerry Hays.

Joy Dickson was selected to serve as election judge and Kay Hays as absentee election judge.

The first day for candidates to file will be Monday, February 22 and the deadline to file is Wednesday, April 6.

Absentee voting will begin Monday, April 18, and end Tuesday, May 3.

The trustees discussed a letter from Jean Westfall, Garza County Chief Appraiser, concerning their opinion on a delinquent tax suit.

The members asked superintendent Bill Shiver to get a list of people with delinquent accounts and the amounts they owe for their consideration.

The trustees also approved the financial statements for January.

In other business the trustees selected Tom Middleton to participate

in the Texas Association of School Boards.

The board of trustees approved the extension of the principals and athletic director's contract through the 1988-1989 school year.

Along the same line the trustees approved a \$114 month raise for the principals in a 5-1 vote.

Trustee Don Payne voted against the raise.

It had been pointed out that the principals had not received a raise for the last two years.

The Textbook Committee for 1988 was approved by the trustees along with the Career Ladder Policy

for the 1987-1988 school year.

Concerning the Career Ladder Policy, the trustees agreed that no local tax money was to be used for it and that stricter performance criteria should be used.

Attending the meeting were trustees Payne, Jack Kirkpatrick, Royce Hart, Pru Basquez, Jerry Hays, Middleton along with superintendent Shiver.

Also present at the meeting were representatives of Post Boy Scout Troop 316: Trevor Thuet, Matt Pennell, Richard Hudman and Jay Mitchell along with leaders Jimmy Mitchell, Ronald Thuet and Curtis Hudman.

County Represented At Jail Meeting

County Judge Giles Dalby was one of the representatives of commissioners courts of six South Plains counties who met recently to enter into an agreement for the purpose of soliciting proposals for the private financing, construction and operation of a regional jail facility and to begin drafting an invitation for bids on the facility.

Judge Dalby also met recently with Attorney General Jim Mattox at a College Station meeting and discussed with Mattox the most convenient and least complicated method of soliciting bids for the facility.

Officials of Garza, Cochran, Crosby, Hale, Lubbock and Yoakum counties agreed in principle to enter into the interlocal agreement and pursue the possibility of establishing the regional facility, due to the overcrowding problem, the difficulties of meeting jail standards, and the uncertainty of what the next session of the legislature may impose on counties.

The location and size of the facility have not been determined, although the regional jail will house at least 100 inmates.

Local Post Office Changes Retail Hours

As of February 13, the local post office has adjusted its retail hours, according to Postmaster Johnny Kemp, but the office will continue to meet all postal needs.

New hours will be: 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday with the post office closed on Saturday.

Mail delivery will not be affected and Saturday mail delivery will continue on the same schedule.

Operating hours are being reduced to help meet the Postal Services'

reduction in operating expenses as required by Congress' Deficit Reduction Act.

This Act requires the Postal Service to trim \$1.245 billion from its operating budget.

Nationwide, post offices have been ordered to reduce retail hours by 10 to 12 percent.

Rather than closing one afternoon a week as many areas are doing, the local facility has chosen this daily reduction as the least disruptive to service.

Judge and Commissioners Attend Annual Conference

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby and Commissioners Tommy Young and Buck Craft were among the 600 judges and commissioners from across Texas who attended the 30th Annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference at the College Station Hilton, January 26-28.

Theme for the conference was "Responsible and Responsive County Government Operations," according to John Gilmartin, county officials program specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The conference was an educational program of the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a

part of the Extension Service, in cooperation with the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas.

Following registration, a special workshop for county judges was held. Workshops keyed to special needs of judges and commissioners were held January 26.

A general session was held on Wednesday, January 27 with Adolph Thoma, Cameron County commissioner and association president calling the meeting to order.

Dr. Zerle Carpenter, director of the Extension Service, made the welcoming comments and provided an update about Extension.

Governor Bill Clements addressed the county officials at 11 a.m.

Also addressing the general session was State Attorney General Jim Mattox of Austin, along with other state officials and association members.

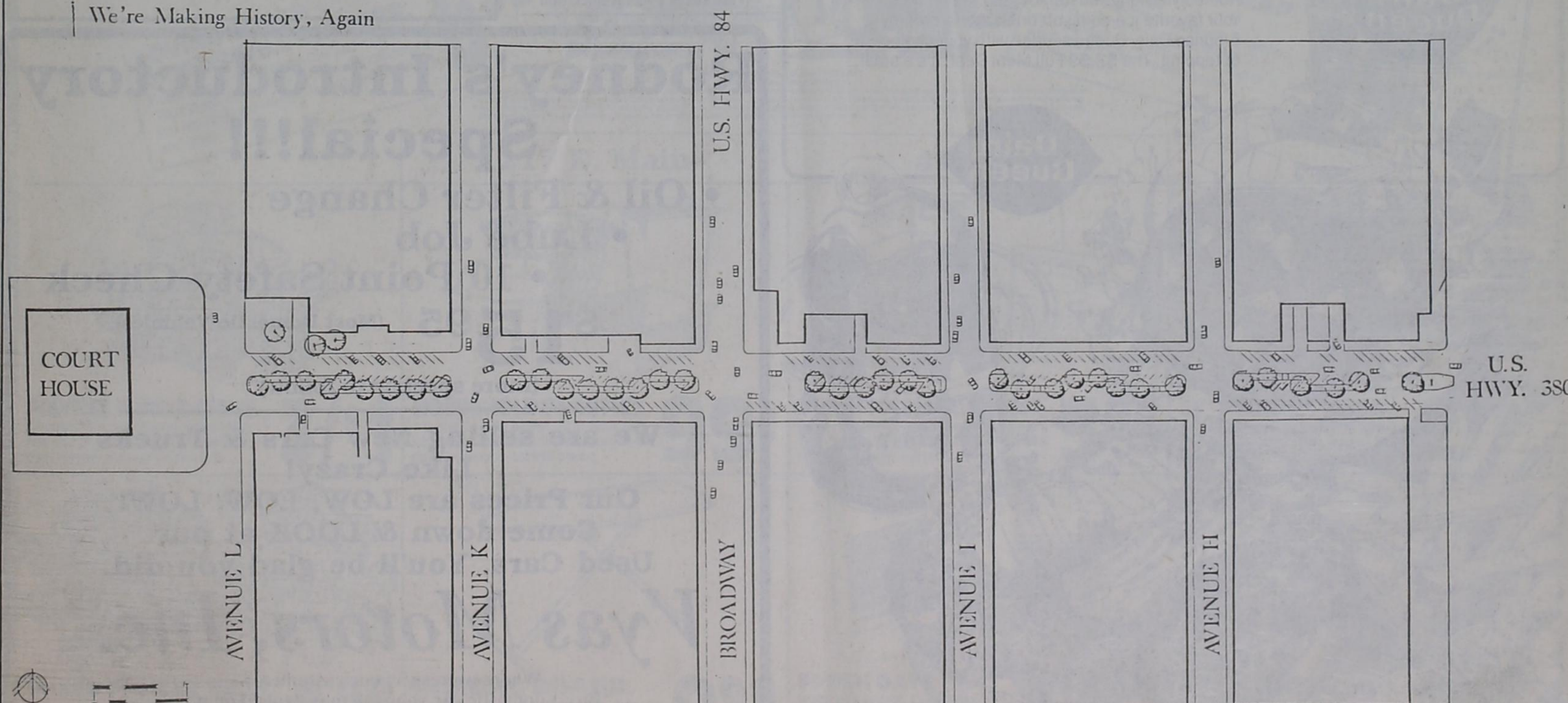
It was noted that continuing education units (CEUs) will be awarded to Commissioners Court members who attended all the sessions.

HISTORIC MAIN STREET



MAIN STREET LANDSCAPING PROJECT-The final plans for the historic, downtown, five-block Main Street Project landscaping have been presented to the Texas State Highway Department by Melissa Cunningham, Main Street Project Manager, and Debra Miller, Austin landscape architect who has worked on the plans for several months. The project is expected to be given full highway department approval by March and work could begin in August,

with late October or early November set as the completion date. Each block in the area would be landscaped with red oak or honey locust trees, with trees at least 40 feet apart at maturity. Hard surface areas would also be included as pedestrian crossings and as the setting for park benches, trash receptacles and street lamps. The original Post landscaping plans by C.W. Post were followed as much as possible in the planning.

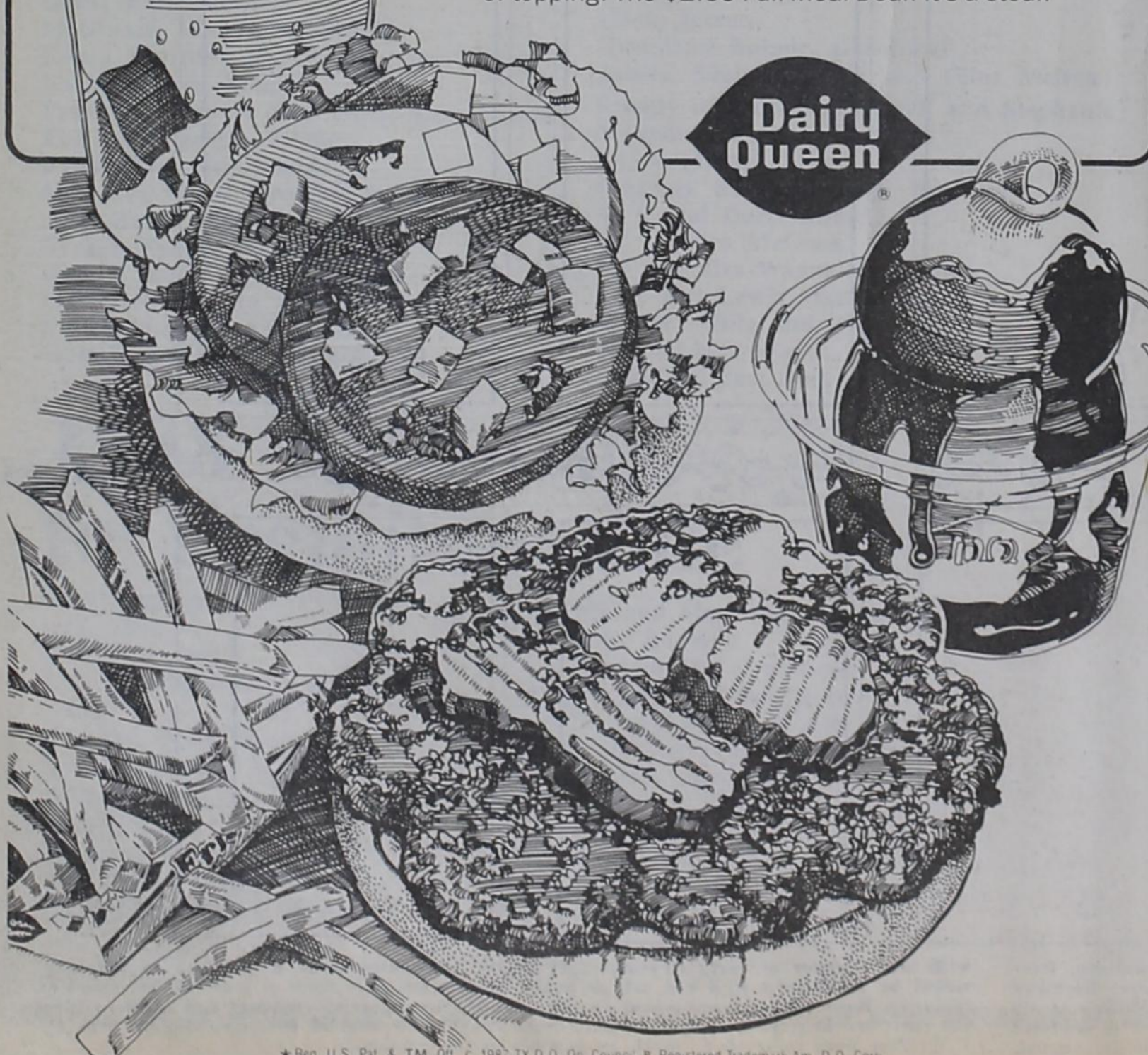

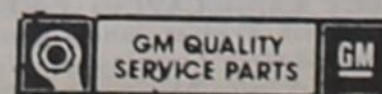

John Beatty of Southland In Houston Calf Scramble

John Beatty, FFA member from Southland will compete in the 1988 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble on March 5 in the Astrodome.

John, the son of Kelly Jo Beatty, will compete for one of 252 calf purchase certificates to be awarded at the rodeo.

Additionally, as many as two youngsters from each of the 18 rodeo performances are awarded "hard luck" certificates for their hearty efforts in attempting to catch a calf, resulting in 36 more certificates actually given.

Known as an entertaining event with an educational purpose, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo funds agricultural scholarships and research projects all over

Texas through its annual net proceeds.

The calf scramble, a yearlong activity, also is one of the show's major programs benefiting Texas youth.

Beginning with athletic competition in the Astrodome, the program ends with top-notch competition in the Astrodome showing.

The event itself involves 28 energetic youngsters who are turned loose with half as many wild calves in the Astrodome arena. Those who manage to capture a calf, halter it and drag it across the finish line receive a \$600 calf purchase certificate.

The certificate, donated by a sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a purebred reg-

istered beef or dairy heifer. The calf is raised by the winner for special showing competition at the following year's Show. Each project is closely supervised by a vocational agriculture teacher or county extension agent.

Additionally, the winners are required to submit to the calf scramble office accurate financial records, essays, photographs and a scrapbook detailing the progress of the venture.

To date, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo calf scramble program has put 10,796 animals valued at more than \$2 million into the hands of Texas youth.

Good Quality Hay In Short Supply

The hay situation across Texas is mixed, with generally good quality hay of all types in short supply, says Dr Robert Schwart, economist - dairy marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Demand for lower quality hay is brisk, and grass hay demand is strong in some areas alfalfa hay has normally been available, Schwart says. This year good quality alfalfa is in generally short supply.

Prices for alfalfa of all grades continue strong, while grass hay prices are variable. "In some areas of the state, high quality coastal presently is bringing as much as high quality alfalfa brought last year at this time," Schwart says.

The USDA's 1987 annual crop production summary released recently indicated 149 million tons of all types of hay were harvested nationally. This is 4 percent below the 1986 production levels. Additionally, U.S. 1987 alfalfa production was down 8 percent while other hay production was up 1 percent last year, Schwart notes.

Texas hay producers harvested a total of 3.24 million acres of hay in 1987, down 1 percent from 1986 harvested acres. Production of Texas alfalfa hay totaled 490 thousand tons from 140 thousand acres in 1987, compared to 640 thousand tons from 160,000 acres in 1986. In addition, 3.1 million acres of other types of hay were harvested in Texas in 1987, unchanged from 1986 levels. Total other hay production in 1987 was 7.44 million tons, up 9 percent from 1986 levels, the economist adds.

Gibson is a multi-media instructor at WTC and is currently conducting college art classes which will continue through May 27 at the Algerita Art Center.

He received his B.F.A. degree at the University of Oklahoma in 1977, and his M.F.A. from North Texas State University in 1979.

Gibson began teaching at Snyder's Western Texas College in 1979 and continues there as an associate professor of art.

He and Mrs. Gibson have two children.

Study Shows Surprising Drop

Railroad Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent says a new study of the state's oil wells shows a surprising drop over the past two years in the number of wells considered to be "good" producers.

"We expected to see a sharp drop in the number of marginal or stripper wells as a result of the oil price plunge of 1986," Nugent said. "And we did see some 30,000 drop off production between December 1985 and October 1987. What is alarming is the number of good wells that also went off-line during that period."

Nugent said over the 22-month study period, Commission figures show the number of wells producing more than 10 barrels a day dropped by more than 4,800 and the number of wells producing between three and 10 barrels a day dropped by more than 4,500.

Translating those losses into production, Nugent said oil production time from the 3-10 barrel-a-day group of wells dropped more than 28,000 barrels a day over the study period. And production from the state's best wells - those producing 10 barrels a day or more - dropped a whopping 222,000 barrels a day.

"We've seen a disturbing reshuffling of our production well lineup," Nugent said. "As thousands of stripper wells have stopped producing, thousands of good producers have slipped away, too, and the few new wells that are being drilled don't come to replacing those losses."

"It's the loss of our good producers that hurts most," Nugent continued. "If the price collapse had caused the loss of all the 93,000 Texas wells making three barrels or less a day, the lost oil production would be half the actual loss from the more than 9,000 wells making more than three barrels a day that were not replaced."

The Railroad Commission chairman said the modest rise in oil prices over the last few months is not enough to turn the state or national drilling picture around. "We had better put aside regional self-interest and get about the business of developing a national energy policy," Nugent said. "We must decide, do we want to be an aggressive energy-producing nation, or do we want to be a nation of cowering consumers complaining about the price and doing nothing? Let's demand that our presidential contenders tell us how they would develop a national energy policy to establish a sound resource of energy within our borders."

Cotton Talks

A study by Area Extension Economist Dr Jackie Smith and another from the Texas A&M Agricultural Economics Department have become exhibits I and II in the ongoing effort to get federal disaster assistance for hail-ravaged High Plains farmers.

Both were quoted extensively January 28 in a meeting called by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, to broaden and intensify support for the effort. Dr Smith's work documents a total of over 160,000 cotton acres destroyed in the Spring and Summer of 1987 at a farm level cost in excess of \$23 million. Using an economic turnover factor within the area of "at least 2.5" Dr Smith puts the aggregate damage to the economy at almost \$60 million.

Smith emphasizes also that only complete losses through August 14

are included in the seven-county tally. Partial losses in these counties, losses in other counties and after August 14, known to have been severe, would add substantially to the overall adverse effect on the area.

The other study, compiled by four Texas A&M economists refutes the contention of U.S. Department of Agriculture officials that producers could have mitigated their economic ills with multi-peril insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC). Despite a 30 percent subsidy on premiums, they conclude, FCIC insurance coverage is a losing proposition in three of the four regions studied.

The economic payoffs from multi-peril crop insurance for cotton are negative at all levels of coverage in the Texas Southern Plains, Coastal Bend and the Mississippi Delta, the report states. The only positive return shown for FCIC insurance was in the Rolling Plains. Producing the FCIC analysis, based on historical price and yield variability, were A&M's Economics Department Head Dr Ronald Knutson and Drs James Richardson, Gary Helms and Charles Miller.

Attending the January 28 meeting in Lubbock were congressional aides for three area congressmen, one Texas senator and representatives of area chambers of commerce, the National Cotton Council, cooperatives, Farm Bureau, Farmers Union, agricultural lenders, the High Plains Research Foundation and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Congressional aids present were Jimmy Clark for Larry Combest of Lubbock, Karr Ingham for Beau Boulter of Amarillo, Don Starr for Charles Stenholm of Stamford and Mike Sims for Senator Lloyd Bentsen. Lindsey Dingmore of Senator Phil Gramm's office had a conflict and could not attend.

The plan adopted at the meeting calls for all entities in early February to write letters of support to PCG where they will be photocopied and distributed to appropriate congressmen, senators and USDA officials.

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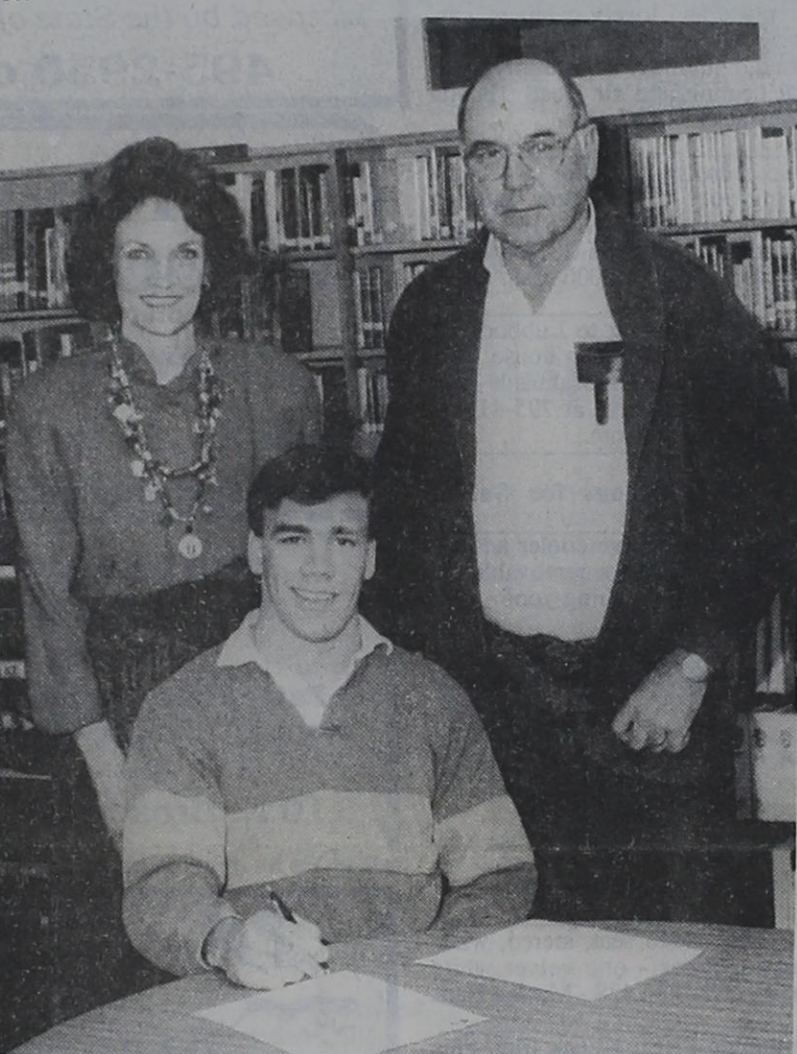

Oil Marketers Sponsor Storage Tank Seminars

The Texas Oil Marketers Association, a statewide trade organization comprised of petroleum product wholesalers and retailers, is sponsoring a series of underground storage tank seminars for owners of tanks containing petroleum.

The seminars are designed to update tank owners on the new federal and state regulations that are applicable to underground storage tanks containing petroleum. The Texas Water Commission is currently developing the state's program and will advise tank owners of their responsibilities under the new law.

Tanks covered under the regulations include any underground tank with a capacity of more than 1,100 gallons that is used to store petroleum for commercial use. Farm and residential tanks with a capacity of less than 1,100 gallons are excluded.

The regulations require tank owners to upgrade or replace their tanks, over a 10 year period, with corrosion protection, leak detection and overfill protection. All tank owners must also carry a minimum of \$1 million insurance coverage. The regulations are expected to be finalized and go into effect in late spring or early summer.

Although the program will cover the proposed regulations, the Texas Water Commission does have regulations currently in force and will be discussing the present responsibilities of tank owners in Texas.

The seminars are being presented in cooperation with the Texas Water Commission and are co-sponsored by the following trade organizations: Texas Aggregate and Concrete Association, Texas LP Gas Association, Lone Star Service Stations Association, Texas Motor Transportation Association, Texas Municipal League, Texas Retail Grocers Association and the Texas Service Station Dealers Association.

An area seminar will be held on Wednesday, February 17, 1988 at the Holiday Inn Civic Center located at 801 Avenue Q in Lubbock. The seminar will start at 9:30 a.m. You may call (806) 763-1200.

Book Review Presented

Isabel Stelzer reviewed the book, "Duty Into Pleasure," the story of the life of Annie Rattan Throckmorton (1828-1895), who was a First Lady of Texas.

Annie Rattan was born March 5, 1828 in Carrollton, Illinois and received the meager education available for the girls of that era.

However, she continued to educate herself throughout her life by reading newspapers, books, magazines, and the classics - Shakespeare, Dickens, Thackeray and Eliot.

She married Dr. James W. Throckmorton in March of 1847, and they moved to Collin County, Texas. He built his bride a log cabin and set up his medical practice in the area. Patients needing long-term care were brought to their home for "hospital" care and Annie's nursing skills.

The Throckmortons were blessed with ten children of their own, reared two children of a niece's, and later added Annie's niece and Throckmorton's nephew.

Annie stayed at home, rearing the children and managing the farm, while Throckmorton (tired of practicing medicine) pursued a career in politics.

He served in both houses of Congress in Austin and Washington. He was elected governor of Texas in 1866, becoming the first post-Civil War governor. He served only until July 31, 1867, as

he was too conservative for General Philip Sherman who removed him from office as an "impediment to Reconstruction."

Throckmorton died April 21, 1894. She died October 30, 1895. Both are buried in the McKinney Cemetery.

Electrical Device Heals Bones

A new, portable bone growth stimulation device uses electrical current to promote healing in bone fractures that fail to mend and offers an alternative to surgery.

Unlike other bone growth stimulation systems, this device is lightweight, requires little maintenance, and allows a patient to resume normal daily activities while undergoing treatment. In most cases, the patient can bear weight on the casted extremity.

The OrthoPak Bone Growth Stimulator System by Zimmer Inc. is powered by a 9V-alkaline battery, and can be worn on the belt or mounted in the patient's cast. It is 5 1/2 x 1 1/2 x 7/8 inches, and weighs 3.8 ounces with battery in place.

The device is molded of tough LEXAN® polycarbonate resin, manufactured by GE Plastics. This lightweight, high-impact material has good insulating properties and resists current dissipation, helping to ensure that the injury site constantly receives the specified electrical signal.

A test meter is used periodically by the physician to monitor progress and patient compliance.

Texas State ASC Committee Reappointed

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced the reappointment of three members of the Texas State ASC Committee and the naming of one new member.

The committee, which consists of Jerry D. Harris, Chairman, George W. Eller, Dale V. Hunt, and new member D.V. Guerra, Jr., oversees the administration of Federal farm programs in Texas.

Chairman Jerry Harris of Lamesa, who raises cotton and grain sorghum in Dawson and Gaines Counties, was named to a fourth one-year term and his third term as chairman.

Harris operates a 7,000-acre family farm, as well as being active in cotton ginning, warehousing and marketing.

He serves on the Board of Governors of Lubbock Christian College.

Harris is also active in the National Cotton Council, the Lamesa Cotton Growers, the Texas Food and Fiber Protein Commission, and the Texas Cotton Ginners.

George Eller of Panhandle, appointed to his fourth one-year term, farms grain sorghum and wheat and raises cattle on his 1700-acre cropland farm.

He has operated his Carson County farm for 36 years and is a 25-year member of the Carson County Farm Bureau.

Dale Hunt, who farms rice and raises cattle in Garwood, was named to his second one-year term in the committee.

His background in agriculture includes participation on the National Commission on Agricultural Trade and Export Policy and is a former president of American Rice, Inc., a regional milling and marketing co-operative which serves 2,000 rice farmers on the Gulf Coast of Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

Hunt also has served as chairman of the Five-State Rice Producers' Legislative Group, as president of the Texas Rice Research Foundation, and is currently a director of the Garwood Division of the American Rice Growers Cooperative.

New member D.V. Guerra, Jr., farms and raises cattle in Hidalgo, Starr and Brooks counties.

He was named "Man of the Year in Agriculture" in 1977 by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association and has served as a member of the Governor's Task Force on Agriculture.

He also was a member of the USDA's Agriculture Structure Planning Committee in Washington, as an officer of the Hidalgo County Farm Bureau, as a director of the Rio Grande Valley Livestock Show, and as a chairman of the Hidalgo Soil and Water Conservation District.

The formal appointment of these committee members was made by Secretary of Agriculture Richard Lyng.

The farm program administration is carried out through the Texas State ASCS office in College Station and 239 county ASCS offices. Terry Harman is State Executive Director of the Texas operation.

Texas ASCS employs 1,400 people with an annual budget of \$35 million. In 1986, Texas ASCS supervised the distribution of \$1.6 billion in program benefits to the farmers and ranchers of Texas.

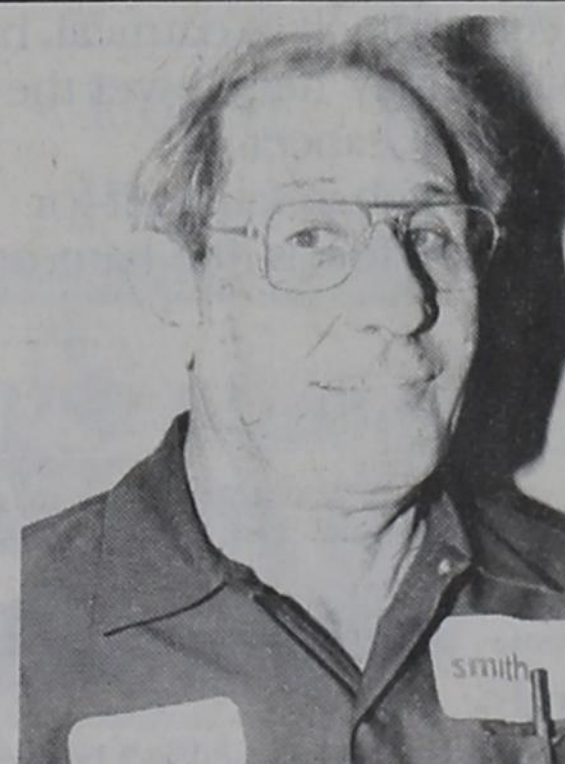

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Amity Studies Lake Country

Amity Study Club met January in the home of Ginger Carlisle with Janet Peel as co-hostess.

Continuing the study of the seven Texas Trails, Barbara Babb conducted the program on the Texas Lake Country.

Texas, second only to Alaska in volume of inland water, has more than five thousand square miles of lakes and streams.

The trip begins in Big "D", Dallas, where there are seven lakes within the city limits - not just little ponds, but large lakes for boating, swimming and fishing.

In northeast Dallas is the city's most popular lake, scenic White Rock, with a surface of 1,119 acres.

White Rock Lake offers fishing, boating, picnic and park facilities, and a Trailside Museum open from 8 to 5 daily.

Other lakes accessible to Dallas are Bachman, Grapevine, Lavon, Lewisville (formerly Garza-Little Elm Reservoir), Mountain Creek and Ray Hubbard.

Fort Worth, with its many museums, Log Cabin Village, Botanic Gardens and Forest Park Zoo, offers vast green parks and a surrounding network of major lakes -- Arlington, Benbrook, Eagle Mountain, Grapevine and Worth -- offering abundant opportunities for water sports and outdoor recreation.

The Japanese Garden in Trinity Park is a worth a trip on its own. The man who built the garden started with a trash dump and worked for seventeen years planting exotic plants, building arched footbridges, waterfalls, teahouses and a moondeck.

East of Weatherford is Lake Weatherford, a 1,210 acre municipal lake on the Clear Fork of the Trinity River with several designated fishing areas.

Ladies, if you work it right, while your husband fishes you could take in the First Monday Trade Day "Trash and Treasure" sales in town.

South of Weatherford is Lake Granbury where you can take a sightseeing cruise on the Granbury Queen, a 73 foot replica of a Mississippi River paddlewheeler.

Granbury is the site of the smallest state park in Texas; consisting of one grave - that of Elizabeth Crockett, the second wife of Davy Crockett.

From Granbury, we drop down to Glen Rose, established on the Paluxy River as a trading post in 1849.

In the famous Dinosaur Valley State Park, the Paluxy River flows over solid rock containing the best preserved dinosaur tracks in Texas.

It was here the first saurpods tracks in the world were found. Saurpods were plant-eaters more than 60 feet long and weighing up to 30 tons.

Other tracks found in the riverbed are those of the duck-billed dinosaurs (only 30 feet long) and theropods (12 feet tall meat-eaters).

Near Glen Rose is the Fossil Rim Wildlife Ranch, a nine mile drive, 1,500 acre preserve with 20 rare and endangered species of African wildlife and a children's petting zoo.

The lakes near Glen Rose are Granbury, Pat Cleburne, Whitney and Squaw Creek.

Squaw Creek, an unusually deep and clear 3,228 acre lake stocked with spotted, smallmouth and hybrid striped bass and walleyes, was built for cooling a nuclear power plant.

Meridian, named for its location on the 100th meridian, was established July 4, 1854 at the county seat of Bosque County.

The local lake in Meridian State Park is only 70 acres on Bee Creek and was the home of the Tawakoni Indians until the mid-1800s.

Near Clifton is a community established by Norwegian settlers, who came to the area in 1850, and is the site of a beautiful old church, Our Savior's Lutheran Church, where a giant smorgasbord is held in November of each year.

Just north of Clifton and open year-round is Texas Safari Wildlife Park, with four drive-through areas - the Ponds and African Compound, the International Plains, the Mount Kilimanjaro Preserve and the Texas Plains.

Leaving Clifton, we go northeast to Whitney, gateway to Lake Whitney, one of the most popular in the nation with more than four million visitors annually.

There's room for all at this 23,560 acre lake which stretches 45 miles up the Brazos. Fishing is excellent and scuba divers explore the 100 foot depths.

We now make a big loop up north and come back down to Hillsboro to the Confederate Research Center and Gun Museum, devoted to the Civil War era, especially Hood's Texas Brigade, CSA.

The museum features 3,000 rare books, maps, photographs, historic firearms and edged weapons, artifacts and a historical art collection.

Next we visit Hubbard and Dawson; the latter near Navarro Mills Reservoir, a 5,070 acre lake on Richland Creek where the fishing is very good - black bass on rods and catfish on trot lines.

Our road leads to Corsicana, the first Boom Town - where the city was drilling for water and hit oil.

The first refineries in Texas were built in Corsicana and the city was the first to use natural gas for fuel and lighting and crude oil for locomotive fuel.

The Collin Street Bakery, with its famous "Deluxe" fruit cake, uti-

lizes more than 1,250,000 pounds of Texas pecans turning out over four million pounds of fruit cake yearly.

Malakoff, a town settled by Russians, is at the southern tip of Cedar Creek Reservoir, a huge 33,750 acre lake operated for recreation and the water supply for Fort Worth.

From here we head up north to Lake Tawakoni, spreading out over parts of three counties. This 36,700 acre lake, crossed by a two-mile long bridge, has some of the best fishing in Texas.

Blocks of timber were left to be covered by the water of the lake, providing a prime habitat for the fish and also helping to control waves on the lake.

Going west we come to Denison and Lake Texoma on the Red River. Lake Texoma has a shoreline of 580 miles and an 89,000 acre water surface.

There are 57 campgrounds, scores of trailer parks, 110 picnic areas, and more than 100 shelter buildings and 80 boat ramps, superb marinas and luxury resorts.

The fishing is some of the best in the nation, with several enclosed docks for fishing in air-conditioned comfort.

Going west we come to Gainesville, originally a point on the California Trail. Here are brick paved street and beautiful Victorian homes.

Traveling south we find ourselves back in Dallas. We have passed through many smaller towns along the way; each of them unique in their own way, with their own histories to tell.

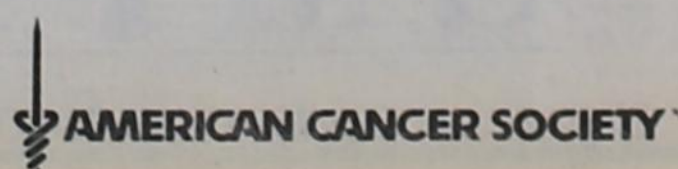

Farm Bureau Is Fighting Diesel Fuel Tax

Texas Farm Bureau is mounting a statewide campaign for passage of legislation to maintain the federal diesel fuel excise tax exemption for off-highway agricultural use, according to S.M. True, TFB president.

Texas Congressional leaders are key proponents of bills to resolve a provision in the budget reconciliation bill recently passed by Congress that would substantially affect farmers and ranchers, True said.

The Revenue Act of 1987, enacted as part of H.R. 3545, the budget reconciliation bill, changes the collection point of the diesel fuel tax, forcing farmers and ranchers to pay the tax at the time of purchase and then apply for a refund.

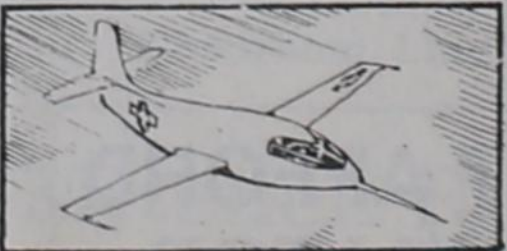
This is scheduled to take effect April 1. True said it is hoped that the new legislation can be passed before then.

In a letter to U.S. Representative Kika de la Garza, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, and to U.S. Senators Phil Gramm and Lloyd Bentsen, True said the provision would cause an "impending and imminent economic hardship on Texas agricultural producers."

S 2003 by Gramm, H.R. 3865 by U.S. Representative Larry Combest and H.R. 3866 by de la Garza would exempt the 15 cents per gallon excise tax being levied on all diesel fuel used for farming purposes.

According to the new fuel tax guidelines, quarterly refunds would be limited to those for \$1,000 or more. Otherwise, refund applications would have to be made annually.

True said the up-front costs would increase as would record-keeping and tax preparation workload.
