Arms revisions considered

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan was meeting with the National Security Council today to consider revising a proposed treaty with the Soviet Union on reducing strategic bombers and missiles.

Options under review at today's White House meeting included one giving the Soviets more leeway to retain the heavy land-based missiles that account for about 70 percent of their nuclear arsenal, according to administration officials who asked not to be identified.

Consideration of a compromise also could be a signal to Congress that if it approves deployment of the controversial MX missile, the administration would urge the Soviets to join in a cutback on multiple warhead missiles on both sides.

The options for Reagan's consideration and possible adoption were assembled by an interagency task force as a way of breaking an impasse in the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks (START), which resume in Geneva, Switzerland, on June 8.

Initially, Reagan called for a reduction of one-third in the approximately 7,500 strategic warheads amassed by the two superpowers. The treaty he outlined a year ago would also set a limit of 850 missiles on each side, thereby overcoming the advantage the Soviets now have in ground missiles.

Cutbacks in strategic bombers and submarine-launched missiles, categories where the United States has an edge, would be left for a later phase of bargaining.

Now, to try to overcome the Soviets' rejection of the plan, the task force has considered raising the

ceiling on missiles above 850 or eliminating it entirely in the first stage of a U.S.-Soviet treaty.

The panel, drawn from the Pentagon, the State Department, the Central Intelligence Agency, the National Security Council, and the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, has also considered altering provisions that deal with "throw-weight," the total nuclear force that reaches a target.

Another option, officials said, is to stick with the Reagan proposal.

While rejecting Reagan's initial proposal, the Soviets countered with a plan calling for a 25 percent cutback in missiles and bombers on both sides. This was rejected by U.S. negotiators.

The task force has stepped up its pace over the last week or so to enable Reagan to make a decision before U.S. negotiator Edward Rowny resumes his talks in Geneva with Viktor Karpov, his Soviet counterpart.

Next Tuesday, the United States and the Soviets will resume another set of talks in Geneva on nuclear missiles in Europe.

Reagan has already advised the Kremlin that U.S. negotiator Paul Nitze will offer a compromise to the president's original "zero-option" proposal. It called for the Soviets to dismantle all the missiles targeted on Western Europe in exchange for the scrapping of deployment of 572 U.S. missiles beginning in December.

The compromise would permit the Soviets to retain some of their European missiles while only a fraction of the new U.S. arsenal would be installed.

Transplant patient doing well

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Eleven-month-old Amy Hardin underwent liver transplant surgery today using an organ donated by a Florida family whose baby died in an auto accident, Amy's father said.

"Dr. Najarian said she was doing well," David Hardin said after the surgery was completed this morning. "He said there were no complications."

Dr. John Najarian, chief of surgery, headed the operating team at the University of Minnesota Hospitals.

The donated liver was rushed from Tallahassee, Fla., to Minneapolis for the operation, which was completed around 7 a.m., said Hardin, of Cahokia, Ill.

Doctors learned Monday afternoon of the availability of a liver from a 10-month-old child, he said. The donor family was not identified.

Preparations for the transplant, including the removal of Amy's diseased liver, began around 11 p.m. Monday, Hardin said. The donor liver arrived around 3 a.m.

The hospital's public relations director, Ralph Huessner, said he would issue a statement later today on the girl's condition.

"The doctors do seem very positive and they said Amy is in top shape," Hardin said from the waiting room where he and his wife, Robin, had been since the surgery preparations began.

Amy was born with biliary atresia in which the bile ducts malfunction and the liver becomes hard.

Ector County panel favors annexation

Attorney calls school district changes 'illegal, unwise'

ODESSA — Ector County Commissioners Court voted to annex more than 4,000 acres of Midland Independent School District land into the Ector County school district despite warnings from an attorney the decision is "illegal" or "unwise."

The unanimous approval during the special meeting Monday afternoon followed a year-long effort by residents of the Ridgewood Subdivision, located in far west Midland County and Midland Independent School District, to be annexed into the Ector Independent School District.

Housewife Jean Berridge, a Ridgewood resident, began the effort last year when ECISD trustees voted to charge MISD students who transfer into ECISD schools \$1,260 tuition, due to overcrowding in the Odessa schools.

Mrs. Berridge's children are among the 67 students living in the area who attend Odessa schools. Eleven other students in the area attend school in the Midland district, while one attends private school and one does not attend school, she testified.

Referring to Section 19.261 of the Texas Education Code, the residents on Feb. 15 presented ECISD trustees a petition signed by a majority of the registered voters in the area asking for annexation into ECISD. Ector school trustees approved the request April 5.

According to the Texas Education Code, the next step the petitioners should seek is approval of the county commissioners, said Richard Bonner, attorney for the residents.

Besides the Ridgewood Subdivision, the request for annexation into ECISD also includes Mission Estates,

developed by HBF Corporation of Midland.

MISD attorney Charles Tighe questioned the inclusion of the 4,000 acres of uninhabited land and the exemption of a mobile home area immediately south of the area in question.

"(The petition) describes not only the Ridgewood Subdivision but approximately 4,000 additional acres of uninhabited land, all of which is also in the Midland District and within Midland County. The devel-

oper of that area is, we believe, promoting, encouraging, and most likely helping to finance the effort that is now before you."

According to Tighe, the residents' "reliance" on Section 19.261 is "misplaced."

ECISD boundaries were defined by the Texas Legislature in 1921, he said. Therefore, "we do not believe you have the power or the jurisdiction to unilaterally affect in any way territory within the Midland Independent School District and within

Midland County."

The legislation stated ECISD boundaries "shall be and are hereby declared to be the same boundaries as those of Ector County and said District shall contain and be composed of identically the same territory as the county of Ector now contains."

Calling the wording of the legislation "clear and precise," Tighe said he was surprised that when the petition was presented to ECISD trustees, "there was not one word men-

tioned in the public hearing concerning that legislation.

"I can only conclude that the members of the board were not aware of the legislation, or, for some reason and at someone's request, simply have chosen to ignore it."

County Judge Jan Fisher responded that as a lawyer having studied the legislation, she is not convinced it overrules the Texas Education Code.

"(The legislation Tighe presented) is not as clear cut as you have presented in your case," she told Tighe.

Tighe cited two court rulings which prove Section 19.261 of the Texas Education Code does not authorize ECISD to expand its boundaries. According to those cases, he said, "The statute applies only to land within the county in which the school trustees or county board sit. Otherwise, there would be absolutely no reason to include the language 'in each county.'"

"That statute applies only to territory within a single county and provides no basis for an independent school district to detach, annex, disannex or do anything else to land in another county and within another independent school district without that district's consent," he said.

According to Dr. Bill Walker, ECISD director of business, an area may detach and annex into another school district as long as it does not "cause harm" to the former district.

By his calculations, he testified MISD would not be damaged by losing the students.

Drinkers invited to ride 'Tipsy Taxi'

If that night out on the town has left you a little tipsy, there's now one way to get home safely at no cost to the drinker or the unsuspecting public.

Through a "Life Ride" service offered by KNFM/KMND radio, Midland-Odessa residents who may have had one too many cocktails can get a free taxi ride home from the Petroplex's restaurants and bars.

Tipsy Taxi is designed to keep impaired drivers off the road, said George Bakke, KNFM/KMND president, in a news conference this morning at Midland Regional Air Terminal.

"In no way are we taking a position pro or con on drinking," he said. "We are taking a stand on driving while intoxicated."

According to Pam Harper, KNFM/KMND radio representative, alcohol caused 1,350 arrests for driving while intoxicated, 826 accidents and 21 fatalities in the Midland-

Odessa area last year.

"The DWIs alone cost the taxpayers \$99,926 last year," she said.

Midland County Attorney J. Scott Henderson said in this county "DWI charges account for more of our caseload than any other type of misdemeanor offense. Alcohol-related accidents cause the deaths of more Americans every two years than died in the entire Vietnam conflict,

and are responsible for untold injury and property damage."

Midland-Odessa law enforcement agencies said this morning they give the program full support.

"Any program that might aid in preventing the tragic loss of life and property is certainly worth strong consideration, therefore, it is my intent to give my support and

endorsement to this new program, Tipsy Taxi," said Midland County Sheriff Dallas L. Smith.

Ector County Sheriff Bob Brookshire agreed, saying, "I give this program 100 percent support — anything to keep drunk drivers off the streets and highways."

A hotline number for the Tipsy Taxi will be available through posters in restaurants and lounges and broadcast announcements. Bakke said the hotline number — 561-8336 — is a direct line to the radio station and employees manning the phones will call the cabs.

"Restaurants and lounges have agreed to post the number at their cash registers," Ms. Harper said.

Although the program initially will be funded through KNFM/KMND, Bakke said "we have talked to 12 to 15 restaurants and lounges and they've been very enthusiastic about contributing to the cost."

Bakke estimated that taxis make 80 to 100 trips per month, averaging about \$5 a ride.

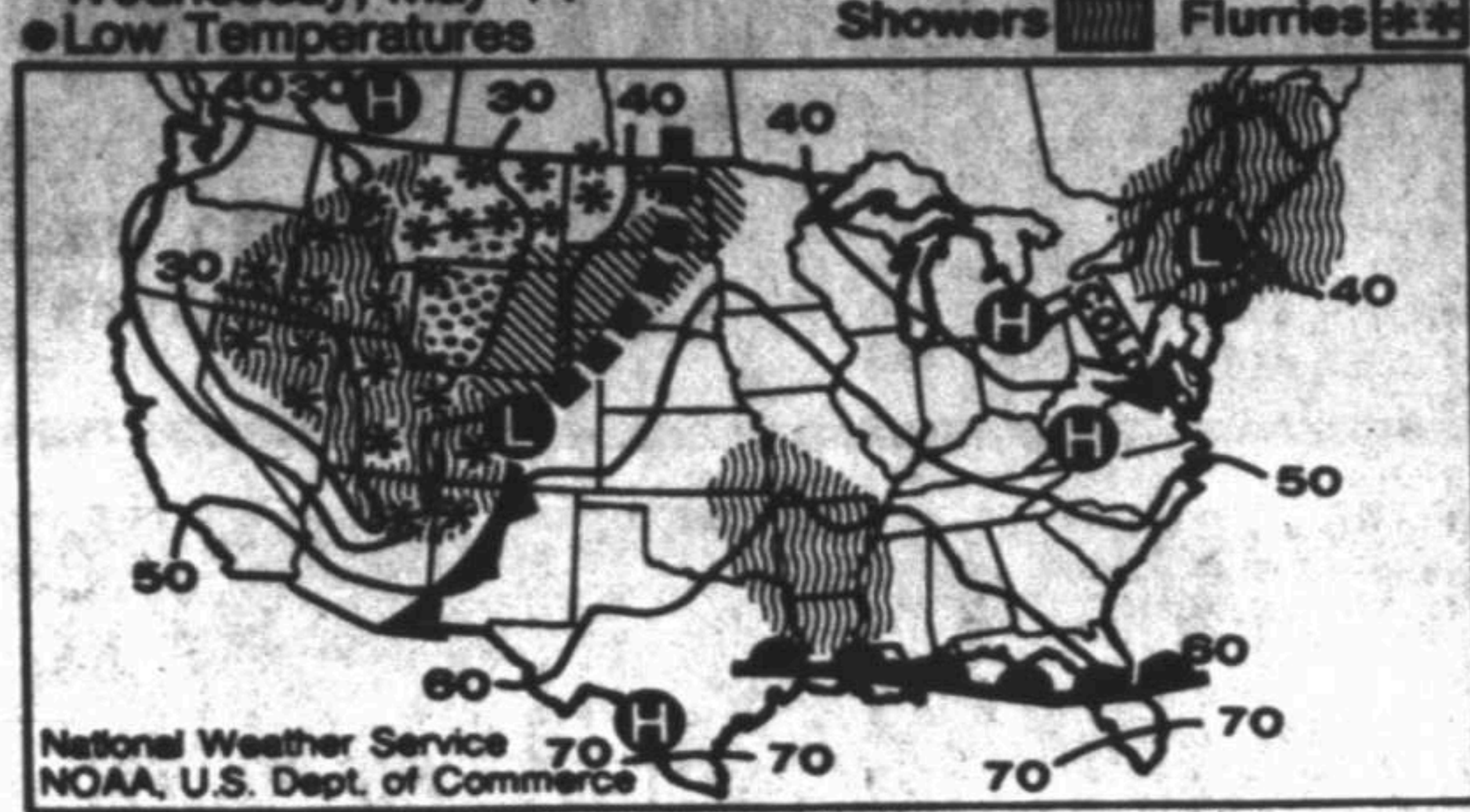

Monetary reform plan debated

PARIS (AP) — U.S. officials reacted cautiously today to French President Francois Mitterrand's proposal for a conference on reforming the world monetary system.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said Mitterrand's speech, in which he advocated a return to a cooperative Western monetary system, was very broad and would have to be studied carefully.

Treasury Secretary Donald Regan said U.S. officials will "have to think about" Mitterrand's proposals, which he said contained new elements with which the United States "might agree."

Baldrige and Regan were meeting with foreign, trade and finance ministers from 24 nations in Paris for the annual meeting of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development.

A U.S. official speculated one reason for Mitterrand's proposal Monday was his continuing worry about the strong dollar, which the French president believes is hampering French economic recovery.

In a speech Monday, Mitterrand said the global economic crisis is severe enough to warrant a return to fixed currency exchange rates between the United States and its allies.

Mitterrand also indicated France would consider withdrawing from future economic summits if the one scheduled for Williamsburg, Va., in less than three weeks ends in failure.

In contrast to Mitterrand, U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz conveyed the Reagan administration's optimistic economic outlook to the ministers. He also urged allies to

"beware" that trade with Soviet bloc countries does not become too important to their economies.

Mitterrand, at a reception for the ministers, said, "Today, as after the war, the world (economy) has to be reconstructed...The moment has come to think about a new Bretton Woods." He referred to the agreement that regulated currencies from the end of World War II until the early 1970s. "Outside such a position, there is no safety."

Mitterrand said consultations should begin with "an international monetary conference at the highest level..."

"Time is pressing," he said, without specifying when such a meeting should take place. His Socialist gov-

ernment is struggling with a devalued franc, high inflation and a serious trade deficit.

Shultz said the United States is headed for a "year of unmistakable and significant growth" that could help stimulate recovery in industrial and developing nations.

The secretary of state arrived Sunday from two weeks of shuttle diplomacy in the Middle East. He is to meet with Mitterrand today and return to Washington Wednesday.

The OECD meeting, which ends today, is laying the groundwork for the summit of seven major Western industrialized nations in Williamsburg at which President Reagan will be host.

Mitterrand recalled the monetary agreements of last year's Versailles summit and asked whether such conferences had any meaning.

"Didn't the seven countries affirm their desire to coordinate interventions?" Mitterrand asked, referring to the promise the Europeans thought they secured from the United States to intervene more often in money markets.

"If not, then why keep having round after round of international meetings? We will see if we are on the right course and each will draw the conclusions with regard to the usefulness of such summits," Mitterrand said.

This amounted to a warning that France would consider withdrawing from such meetings if Williamsburg ended.

The Reagan administration's policy is to intervene in exchange markets only when they are extremely disorderly. Previous U.S. administrations intervened frequently.

New budget compromise considered

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate leaders are considering a new budget compromise from five Republican holdouts who want to raise taxes by \$14 billion next year and make further cuts in President Reagan's defense buildup.

New legislation makes it crime to tamper with consumer goods

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress has passed legislation making it a federal crime to tamper with consumer products — an action prompted by the seven Tylenol-cyanide deaths last year.

The House voted 292-0 for the legislation Monday and the Senate passed it unanimously by voice vote. Now they will try to resolve differences between the two versions.

Both measures provide a maximum sentence of life imprisonment and a \$100,000 fine if serious injury or death results from tampering with a consumer product.

Under the Senate bill, tampering with the intent to damage a business would bring a maximum penalty of 10 years imprisonment and a \$20,000 fine. The House bill mandates no federal penalties for persons who tamper with products solely to damage a business' reputation; the tampering must include a significant threat of bodily harm.

Both measures provide a maximum sentence of life imprisonment and a \$100,000 fine if serious injury or death results from tampering with a consumer product.

Under the Senate bill, tampering with the intent to damage a business would bring a maximum penalty of 10 years imprisonment and a \$20,000 fine. nally wanted a 10 percent Pentagon increase, but has tacitly accepted the 7.5 percent figure included in the proposal urged by Majority Leader Baker.

The group has proposed a budget that would partially repeal some of this year's tax cut and include lower federal deficits than those recommended by Republican Senate leaders, according to sources who spoke on condition they not be identified.

Because the five GOP moderates hold a temporary balance of political power in the Senate, their plan, agreed upon privately Monday, was likely to get serious attention.

As behind-the-scenes maneuvering continued, votes were scheduled today on various proposals to modify the budget approved by the Senate Budget Committee.

For over a week, Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker Jr., R-Tenn., has been trying to find 51 Republican votes for a budget blueprint so no Democratic support would be needed.

Baker and Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, have been pushing a budget scheme that would permit almost no tax increase and a defense hike reluctantly accepted by President Reagan.

—Deficits of \$180 billion in 1984 and \$141 billion in 1985.

—Non-defense domestic spending \$11.4 billion above Reagan's recommendation.

—Tax increases totaling \$70 billion over three years — \$14 billion in 1984, \$22 billion in 1985 and \$34 billion in 1986. It would mean limiting this year's income tax cut to \$300 per taxpayer, although the emphasis will be placed more on the amount of new revenues than on how to get it.

Until now, the five had held out for a complete repeal of the 10 percent increase. Reagan has said he would veto any legislation which tampers with the tax cut, which voters will be seeing for the first time in July when changes in withholding begin.

Senate Democrats have also abandoned original intentions of repealing the 10 percent tax cut, but Senate Minority Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia said Monday he wants to limit the reduction to lower and middle income taxpayers by IMPOSING A CAP.

Sen. Lawton Chiles of Florida, senior Democrat on the budget panel, said he and other members of the Senate minority would wait until the Republicans demonstrate they are unable to pull together 50 or 51 votes for a budget plan before dealing for a bipartisan compromise.

But the five GOP holdouts have refused to go along. They insist on new revenues to offset rising federal deficits, and because there are only 54 Senate Republicans, Baker has been blocked.

Now the five — John Chafee of

Rhode Island, Mark Hatfield of Oregon, Charles McC Mathers Jr. of Maryland, Lowell Weicker of Connecticut and Robert T. Stafford of Vermont — have drafted a new proposal as a possible way out of the deadlock.

Congressional sources, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said the five are suggesting: —A military buildup limited to 6 percent in the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, and 5 percent in the succeeding three years. The president origi-

MISD has a total indebtedness of \$31,394,006, Walker said. Because annexation of the land would result in a loss of tax revenue for MISD, Walker suggested paying the Midland school district \$158,541, or 506 percent of that debt.

That money would go for retirement of the debt in lieu of taxes that would be lost from this property.

In an effort to be fair, although the amount could be paid over a period of 10 to 15 years, Walker suggested paying the \$158,541 in one lump sum Feb. 1, 1985, so it could earn interest "to offset any decrease in interest they might expect."

In compliance with the law, the commissioners must proceed with plans for the bonded indebtedness and voted to approve Walker's recommendations.

According to Walker, the state presently pays ECISD \$1,035 in average daily attendance for each MISD student who attends ECISD schools. That figure is about 40 percent of the total cost of educating those students.

"(The Ridgewood parents) chose to move into Midland County and into the Midland District, an area in which some of the children go to Midland schools and which area is served by the Midland District bus system, and in which area, if the need arises, the Midland District will

Texas had richest, poorest in 1981

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas had the richest and the poorest of 305 metropolitan areas in terms of 1981 per capita income, according to statistics released by the Commerce Department.

A per capita income of \$16,467 gave the Midland metropolitan area the nation's highest per capita income in 1981, the statistics showed.

The bottom three areas rated also were in Texas. The Brownsville-Harlingen-San Benito area ranked 303rd with per capita income of \$6,172. Laredo was \$6,148, or 304th. The McAllen-Pharr-Edinburg was \$5,606, or 305th.

Per capita income for the United States was \$10,495, up from \$9,483 in 1980, the department said.

Reagan says rejection would injure security

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, lobbying for approval of the MX missile, says rejection of the weapon by Congress would deal "a blow to our national security that no foreign power would ever have been able to accomplish."

Speaking at a memorial dinner for the late Rep. John Ashbrook in Ashland, Ohio, the president called on Congress to support the MX program and promised, in turn, to combine it with "vigorous arms control."

Reagan stopped in Ashland for several hours Monday night after a long weekend at his ranch near Santa Barbara, Calif., then returned to the White House.

He planned to continue his lobbying effort today in a meeting with members of Congress from both parties.

Prior to that session, Reagan was to meet with the National Security Council to consider revising a proposed treaty with the Soviet Union on reducing strategic bombers and missiles.

Larry Speakes, the deputy White House press secretary, said efforts to persuade Congress to go along with production of 100 missiles at an estimated cost of \$18 billion would be the main focus of the president's week.

Speaking to reporters aboard Air Force One as Reagan flew from California, Speakes said the president would spend "a good deal of time with congressmen on the MX this week."

Congress is expected to vote by the end of the month on whether to deploy the huge new system. Production funds were deleted last year, partly because of opposition to Reagan's proposal for basing the system.

In response, the president appointed a commission of defense experts to come up with a basing mode. The commission, which issued its report in mid-April, suggested that 100 MX missiles be built and installed in existing Minuteman silos near Cheyenne, Wyo.

Mideast withdrawal talks now focused on Syrian role

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Syria has replaced Israel as the focus of American efforts to get foreign forces out of Lebanon, and Israel hopes one result will be improved relations with the United States.

Israel's approval of a withdrawal agreement Friday takes Prime Minister Menachem Begin's government off the hook in regard to U.S. pressure to remove its 25,000 troops, part of the force which invaded on June 6.

The United States has accepted Israel's position that it does not have to withdraw its troops until Syria

and the Palestine Liberation Organization do likewise.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz, before ending his two-week peace shuttle in the Middle East, made final stops in Israel and Lebanon to report on Syrian President Hafez Assad's cool reaction to the accord he worked out to obtain Israeli withdrawal.

Despite Syrian objections, Shultz said the Israel-Lebanon pact would not be renegotiated. He called the pact "a great thing" and said Israel would be patient in allowing time to

win agreement on a Syrian pullout from Lebanon.

Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir pledged that Israel will implement the agreement "as soon as possible" and said the timing depends on Syria and the PLO.

Shamir also signaled that Israel expects warmer relations with Washington.

"We are in a period of considerable improvement of relations between us and the United States," Shamir said. "The agreements undoubtedly contributed to this."

Shultz has indicated the United States soon will end its embargo on shipping F-16 warplanes to Israel. The Israelis complained that while the Soviet Union replaced all of Syria's losses in the Lebanon war, the United States was denying Israel the top-quality fighter bombers.

The 75 F-16s were scheduled for delivery in 1985, so the embargo has no immediate impact on Israel's military capability. But the political overtones ranked the Israelis.

Shultz also said Begin is welcome to visit the United States. Begin was there last November and planned to meet with Reagan but had to cancel because of the death of his wife.

The United States regarded Israel's early goals in negotiations as unrealistic and opposed Israel's insistence on having a peace treaty with Lebanon and keeping some troops there. In the end, Israel agreed to considerably less.

Since the agreement may be nullified if Syria refuses to withdraw its troops, some Israelis suggested Israel had come to terms more with the United States than with Lebanon.

Even though Syria is now in the focus, there is uncertainty about what Damascus will do.

Gunshot wound won't stop girl

HOUSTON (AP) — A 10-year-old Cambodian girl who was shot in the shoulder as she walked to school says she's afraid, but she'll return to class on foot anyway.

"Yes, I'm scared. But I'm going to keep walking to school," Chansopheh Nhim said after the shooting, adding that she planned to go back to school today.

The girl was struck behind the right shoulder apparently by a random bullet Monday morning as she took a short cut to her fifth-grade classes at Golfcrest Elementary School.

"I feel a hurt in my shoulder and I touch it and I saw some blood," she

said. "I run back home to tell my mother."

Her mother took her to a police station, where an ambulance took her to Ben Taub Hospital. The girl was treated and released.

"She said she didn't have any idea where it (the bullet) came from," said Laura Jeanes, principal of Golfcrest Elementary School where the girl is a fifth-grader.

Safe at home Monday afternoon, the girl was still reluctant to talk about the incident. But she was sure she didn't want to miss school.

Paramedic Robert Koryciak said

the wound appeared to have been made by a .22-caliber bullet. Police speculated that it could have been a "stray" shot fired at another target, instead of a deliberate shooting. No arrests have been made, police said.

Koryciak called the young girl "an excellent patient" who was calm and stoic during the trip to the hospital.

"We had a little conversation. She said she likes it here, that when she first got here she really liked it," said Koryciak.

Chansopheh, who has been in the United States 20 months, said even though she was shot, she still liked America more than her native country of Cambodia.

Bill called plot to do away with death penalty

AUSTIN (AP) — House backers of a measure that would allow life in prison without parole as a third option in capital murder cases today searched for the one vote that would break a tie and revive the bill.

San Antonio Rep. Joe Hernandez proposed to add the third option Monday in a 71-71 vote. It takes a majority vote to approve a bill.

Texas jurors now decide whether a defendant convicted of capital murder should be executed or sen-

tenced to life in prison. Under a life sentence, inmates can be eligible for parole in about 12 years, according to House debate.

Last Dec. 7, Charlie Brooks Jr., of Fort Worth became the first person executed in Texas since 1964.

The additional option offered by Hernandez, a longtime death penalty foe, would allow jurors to send murderers to prison for guaranteed life sentences.

Rep. Mike Toomey, R-Houston, argued that Hernandez was trying to

"destroy the death penalty statute." Toomey predicted that approval of the bill would leave Texas death sentences "frozen" until the courts could review the new law.

Rep. Tom DeLay, R-Stafford, called the bill an "insidious plot to do away with the death penalty."

He accused anti-death penalty groups of trying to weaken capital punishment in Texas. He pointed to the list of organizations — including the Texas Civil Liberties Union — that supported Hernandez' bill.

"Have any of these people ever supported the death penalty? They've always wanted to do away with the death penalty," DeLay said.

Rep. Al Granoff, D-Dallas, led the floor fight for the Hernandez bill. After the vote he said he would ask for reconsideration if he could change one vote.

Granoff accused DeLay of "attempting to play on a prejudice against various organizations in this state."

Family backs son in mercy killing of dad

HOUSTON (AP)

Robert Clore and his son, Billy, were partners in a used tire business. That partnership ended a month ago when the 25-year-old son allegedly fired a bullet into the brain of his comatose father.

The family has rallied to the son's aid and is helping to pay for his defense.

"My brother is not a murderer," said Bob Clore, 30, who manages a men's clothing store.

Billy, at his attorney's request, has refused to discuss the March 21 shooting in his father's nursing home room.

But police in Humble, a Houston suburb, said Billy told them afterward he felt his father was suffering and that the shooting would end his pain. The elder Clore died at Northwest Medical Center two weeks after

he was shot through the temple with a .45-caliber pistol.

Police said Billy, the youngest of the family, lingered for several minutes before pulling the trigger.

Robert Clore spent four months in a coma before he was shot. His kidneys failed and he suffered two cardiac arrests. Doctors gave him little chance of recovery and said that if he lived he would be seriously brain damaged.

Bob said his father had often expressed a fear of being unable to take care of himself.

"My father had always told us, 'God, don't let that happen to me,'" Bob said.

He said his youngest brother was the closest to his father of anyone in the family.

"Billy not only lost his dad, he lost his business partner, his best friend, a part of himself," Bob said.

R.K. Hansen, an assistant district attorney for Harris County, said he cannot agree with the family's mercy killing arguments.

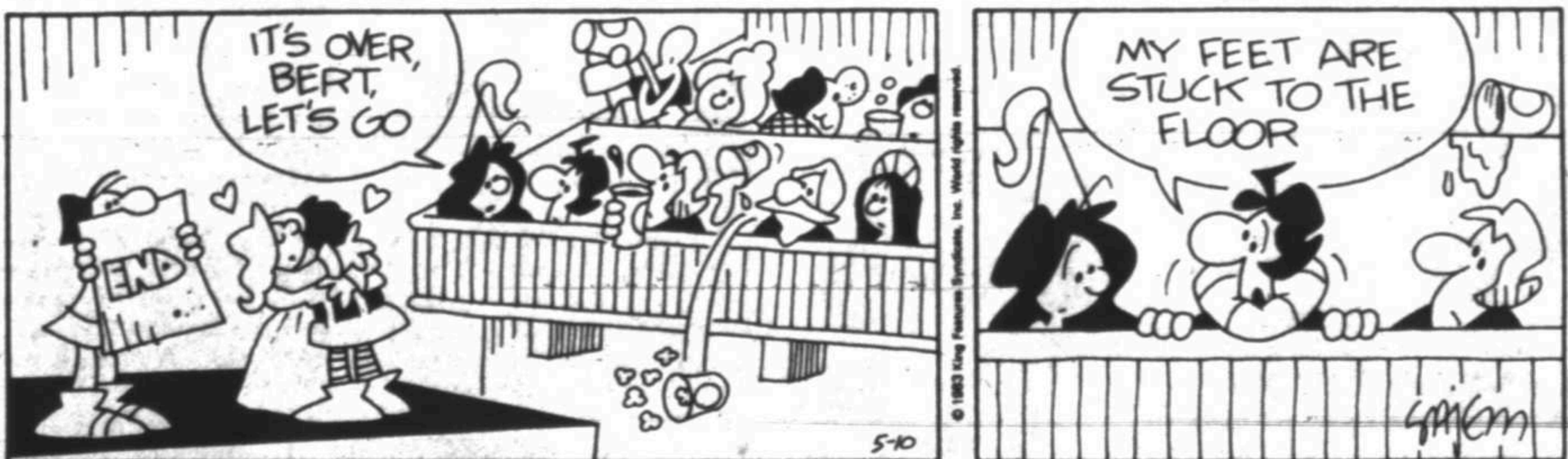

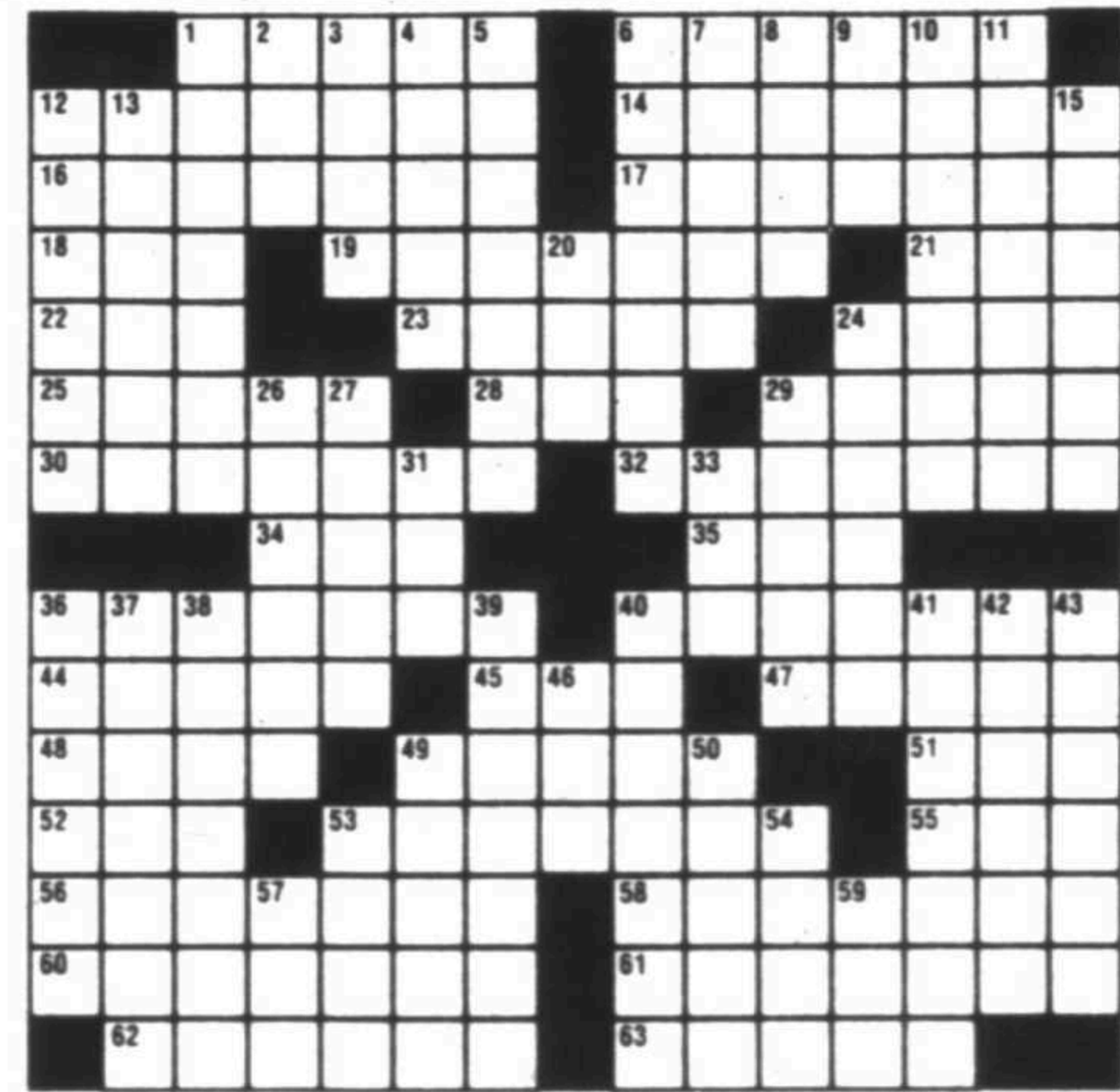

Lady tries to save 'Voyagers'

NEW YORK (AP) — How much success can one well-motivated woman expect in her effort to save an acclaimed but otherwise struggling TV show?

Probably not a lot. Thousands, acting in concert, couldn't keep "The Paper Chase" on CBS, though Showtime, the pay-cable network, recently revived the series that stars John Houseman and James Stephens.

Shelagh Collins wants NBC to stick with "Voyagers!" despite dismal ratings for the action-adventure series for children. And she's written Grant Tinker, the network's chairman, to plead her case.

"There are a lot of things in that show that suggest one person can influence history," she said in a telephone interview, "and I think that's a good message for young people."

Miss Collins, who works in the medical school library at the University of Pittsburgh, wrote newspapers, parent-teacher groups and youth organizations suggesting they join the campaign, and NBC said about 100 letters, most of them from the Pittsburgh area, had been received through the first week of May.

In her appeal to parents and educators, she praised "Voyagers!" for "attempting to create an interest in elementary school children in historical events through an entertainment format."

The series, introduced in October, featured Jon-Erik Hexum and Meeno Peluce as time-travelers who try to set straight the course of history. The show won praise from the National Education Association, Scholastic magazine, and others, though there were others who complained that the emphasis on historical conflict was at times violent.

In fact, "Voyagers!" probably was doomed from the start. The series was scheduled on Sunday night opposite CBS' "60 Minutes," which finished the 1982-83 season as the No. 1 program in prime time. "Voyagers!" was ranked 96th among 99 series broadcast in the recently completed TV year.

In fairness to NBC, the network did attempt to give younger viewers something of educational value in prime time. Indeed, NBC, though No. 3 in the ratings, has become a leader in quality — or at least thoughtful — TV, with shows like "Cheers," "Hill Street Blues," a revived "Taxi" and "St. Elsewhere."

In the auction, you are correct to devalue honors in the enemy suit. But don't overlook them in the play. When this hand was dealt in a recent pair tournament, most pairs reached a four heart contract after an opposing opening bid. Unfortunately, most declarers failed to bring home ten tricks. We do not recommend West's featherweight raise to two diamonds, even though it is a fairly common practice at duplicate.

The declarers tried to bring home the contract via a crossruff, or by trying to ruff out the ace of clubs, or even by leading a spade to the king. All those lines were doomed to failure.

Declarer has six fast tricks. If he can score a second diamond trick and a club trick, he needs only two ruffs in dummy to bring his total to ten.

The winning line is to take the queen of diamonds with the ace and immediately return the jack, discarding a spade from dummy. East's best defense is to return a trump. Declarer wins, cashes the ten of diamonds for another spade sluff, then ruffs a diamond on the table and exits with the king of spades.

If West wins the ace of spades, East must have the ace and a ruffing finesse can be taken against that card. As the cards lie, East wins the ace of spades, and since he can't lead another trump, declarer is able to ruff two of his spade losers on the table. But even if East could return a trump, the contract is safe. Declarer wins in dummy and leads the king of clubs,

discarding a spade. He will still be able to ruff a spade in dummy and discard one on the queen of clubs. Declarer will lose one trick in each side suit.

Sign of unrest

Nothing much ever happens in the little Mexican community of Alamos, sleeping against the Sierra Madre foothills in Sonora.

Nothing until recently, that is. On the morning of May 1, about 80 armed peasants appeared at El Caracol trailer park near town. They seized the park and took four U.S. citizens as prisoners for a time.

The peasants, carrying rifles and pistols, say they are members of the leftist Workers Revolutionary Party. Nevertheless, the citizens of Alamos do not seem to be taking the episode seriously.

Alamos, 35 miles inland from Navojoa, is a federally protected parklike community. Once an important silver mining center, it now has a colony of U.S. citizens who have restored the mansions wealthy Mexicans and the French built in the last century.

At first glance, the Alamos "revolution" seems a minor event. But there are serious problems in Mexico these days. There are many signs of unrest.

At the recent May Day Parade in Tijuana, for instance, some 30,000 disgruntled union workers marched in protest. They demanded pay increases and an end to runaway inflation, which has reached 200 percent in a little more than a year. Marching in the parade were teachers, bus drivers and assembly plant workers.

The situation in Alamos may well be an indication of feelings throughout Mexico. There is much anger brought about by corruption, unemployment and inflation.

Mexico's leaders have a job cut out for them in restoring a healthy economy and civic tranquility to their nation. They will need all the help we and our government can give them.

Visitor from space

Hark, a comet approaches. Astronomers have named the heavenly visitor IRAS-Araki-Alcock. They say IRAS will come within 2.9 million miles of Earth on Wednesday — the closest a comet has approached our globe in two centuries.

IRAS is speedy and tiny and may be difficult to see with eyeglasses only. Scientists suggest those who wish to pick IRAS out of the multitude of sparkles in the night sky should resort to binoculars or telescopes.

For those of us who fail to locate IRAS among all those stars overhead, there will be another chance offered by a second visitor. Halley's comet will swish by Earth within two years and it will be vast enough for all to see without any vision aids.

Halley's comet makes its trip from outer space about every 76 years. It does a quick turn around the sun and heads back

again on its long, outbound voyage. Last time Halley's comet called, in 1910, it came within 14 million miles of Earth, and its tail stretched two-thirds of the way from the horizon to the sky's zenith.

Scientists, by the way, are excited about the Wednesday visit of IRAS. It is coming so close astronomers will have an excellent chance to gather data on the comet's temperature and composition.

They don't really know a lot about comets, which are believed to be among the most primitive bodies in the solar system. Some think they are nothing but "dirty snowballs" — frozen gases and galaxy dust.

IRAS really should be more than that — possibly a gleaming hunk of Superman's Kryptonite or the galaxy's largest flying diamond. But no matter. We'll enjoy the visit from this solar traveler anyway.

Another View: New look for EPA

"There will be no hit lists, no big-P political decisions, there will be no sweetheart deals." So pledges William D. Ruckelshaus on the approach that he plans to take as the administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency.

If this appears to be a curiously negative agenda, it is also a necessary one. Under Anne McGill Burford and the 13 other high-level Reagan administration appointees who were recently fired or forced to resign, the EPA had beyond dispute become a place of ideological vengefulness, political favoritism and attempted sabotage of existing laws. Duplicitizing the agency will be Ruckelshaus' first and proper priority.

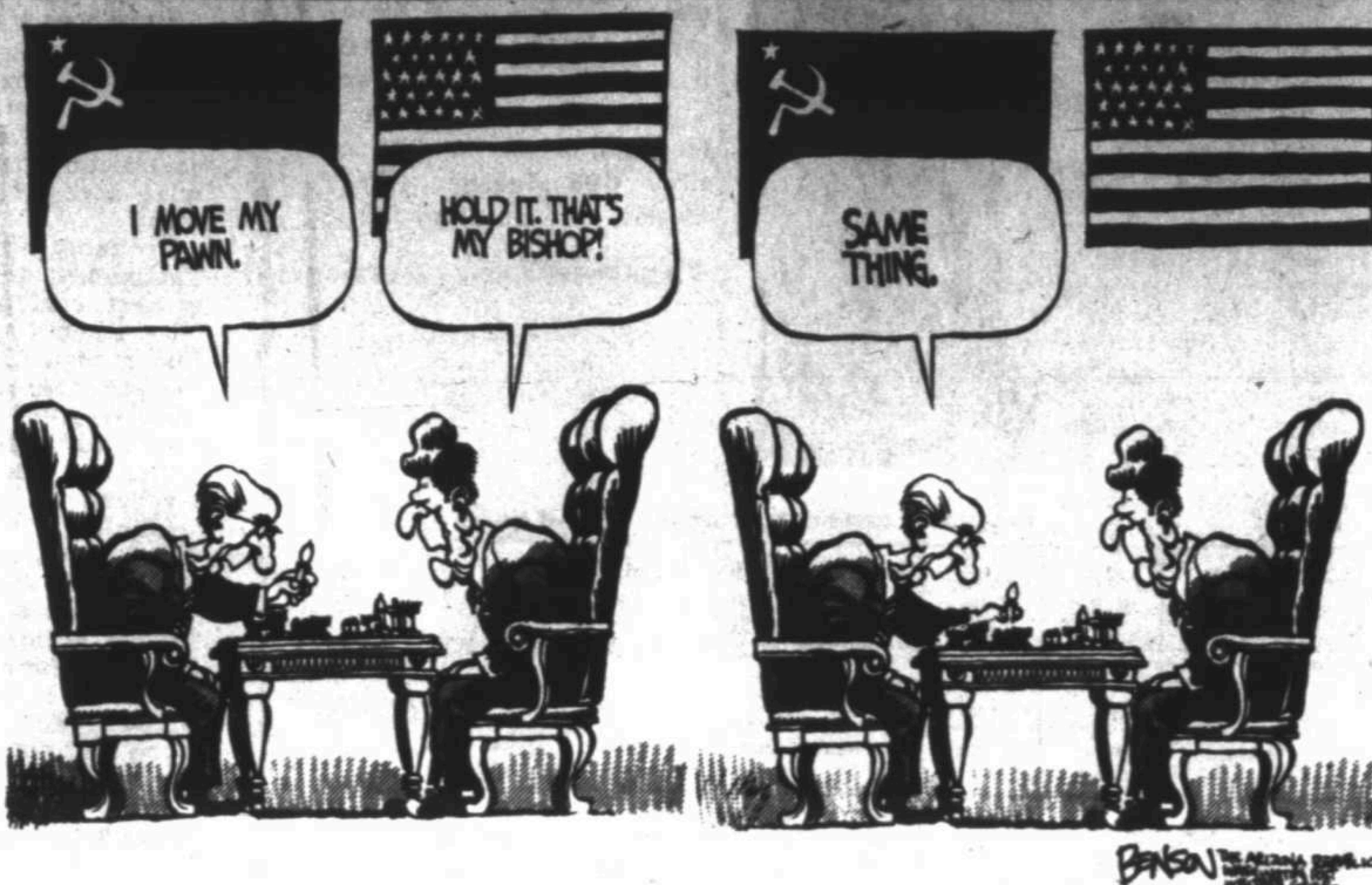
The senators who must approve the Ruckelshaus nomination generally liked what he had to say in three days of confirmation hearings. The public can be reassured by it. Ruckelshaus does not uncritically agree with all the laws that he will be sworn to uphold. He does promise to enforce them and, where he thinks changes are needed, to work through the legislative machinery to get those changes. The "abuse of process" that raised such a stench of scandal over the EPA in the immediate past will not recur. That is Ruckelshaus' promise, and there is nothing in the record or the character of the man that gives any reason for doubting it.

Ruckelshaus has indicated that he agreed to return to government service on President Reagan's word that the EPA

would not be subjected to political manipulation. No doubt that word was given. Now efforts must be made to see that it is kept. It strains credulity to think that Burford and the other nongone political appointees in the EPA's upper reaches acted solely on their own when they moved to make life easier for polluters and miserable for agency dissidents. External direction, explicit or inferred, from the White House or elsewhere in the political hierarchy almost certainly was given, albeit given to willing actors. The senators questioning Ruckelshaus made clear that they trusted him to resist improper political pressures. The very tone of their questions also made it clear that they suspected that such pressures could arise.

For responsible reasons Ruckelshaus has avoided commenting for now on specific actions that he intends to take — with one exception. In place of the slow, dubious approach of negotiated settlements to clean up toxic-waste sites that his predecessor pursued, Ruckelshaus plans to move quickly, spending the money that Congress appropriated for that essential work and dealing with issues of polluter responsibility later. This means that the work will be done faster and more effectively than would otherwise have been the case. This means, in other words, doing what Congress intended, and what the public health requires.

Beirut bombing warnings ignored

WASHINGTON — U.S. intelligence agencies received warnings a month in advance that Iranian-backed terrorists planned to bomb the American Embassy in Beirut. Yet nothing was done to beef up security at the building where 17 Americans were killed.

This shocking admission is contained in the super-secret National Intelligence Daily, a document that is circulated to fewer than 100 high-level U.S. officials. An autopsy of the Beirut bombing appeared in the April 20 edition — two days after the tragedy, and one day after the Islamic Jihad Organization claimed responsibility for the blast.

Though the report itself is classified above top-secret, it was reviewed by my associate Dale Van Atta. Here's the appalling story: The National Security Agency's code breakers had intercepted some alarming communications in the Middle East. These gave a clear indication that a pro-Iranian Shiite Moslem group, fanatically loyal to the Ayatollah Khomeini, was planning to bomb the Beirut Embassy.

At the same time, the CIA — which lost seven people in the bombing — had gathered "humint," or human intelligence, which warned that the same group had plans to bomb the embassy.

According to the intelligence report, preparations for the bomb attack were supervised by a high official in the Iranian Foreign Ministry, who also gave final approval. It was assumed that Khomeini also knew of the plan and approved it.

The admission that both the NSA and CIA had prior warning of the bombing was hedged with suggestions that the intelligence information could not be verified, and in at least one case came from an untested source.

But this alibi has a hollow ring. Not only had the Islamic Jihad shown itself to be a terrorist group that should be taken seriously, but the CIA had been keeping track of the Jihad and other Khomeini-backed groups for a year or more. For example:

— The Islamic Jihad claimed "credit" for a car-bomb explosion — the same kind of attack as that of April 18 — which killed 12 persons at the French Embassy in Beirut a year ago.

— It also took responsibility for grenade and machinegun attacks on American and Italian troops of the multinational peace-keeping force in Beirut last March. The toll: one Italian killed and five Americans wounded. And it claimed to have taken shots at members of the French peace-keeping force a few days before the U.S. Embassy blast.

— The Jihad is an offshoot of the mainstream Shiite paramilitary organization, Amal. The original leader, Musa al Sadre, was a Khomeini disciple who disappeared on a 1978 trip to Libya. The Jihad is closely associated with an estimated 1,000 Iranian revolutionary guards who have proclaimed an "Islamic-Khomeinist state" at Baalbek in northeastern Lebanon.

CIA reports over the past year list several cases of Khomeini's attempts to export his revolution beyond Iran's borders:

— An attempt to set up an Islamic state in Turkey through the Iranian consulate in Istanbul.

— A planned coup by 60 Bahrainis, many trained in Iran, to take over that Persian Gulf state.

— A meeting in Cyprus of Saudi Arabian opposition leaders to plot infiltration of the military, incite-

ment of the large Shiite minority and eventual overthrow of the royal family.

— Financing of secret trips by Moslem students to Iran for revolutionary training. The students are then smuggled back to their homelands to await the signal for uprising.

CUTTING THE TAPE: Leo Chavez of Albuquerque, N.M., is 19 months old and a victim of EB, a rare skin disease that results in lesions and eventual atrophy of the limbs if not treated surgically. But the only place the operation is performed is Frankfurt, West Germany.

Community groups raised \$31,000 for the trip and the treatment — but there was a bureaucratic problem: Maria Chavez, Leo's mother, is a resident alien. That meant she would require a re-entry visa for the return to the United States and the process usually takes six weeks.

So Mrs. Chavez asked Rep. Manuel Lujan, R-N.M., for help. He got her re-entry visa in two days, by having her fly to Houston, where an official walked her through the visa process, then to Chicago, where her new passport was delivered. Result: Little Leo got his emergency treatment in time.

ON THE TRACK?: At last a federal official will have the opportunity to put his hard-nosed policies into practice in the private sector. Robert W. Blanchette has quit as head of the Federal Railroad Administration to be the American representative of a French firm that builds high-speed trains.

During his tenure at the FRA, Blanchette consistently advocated cuts in Amtrak's budget and tried to reduce federal funding for rail improvements in the Northeast corridor. A spokesman for the agency said Blanchette opposes federal subsidies as a matter of principle — and that this applied to development of high-speed trains. The railroad industry will be keeping track.

Security chief becomes target

WASHINGTON — Lacking defense in depth and by nature disinclined to go on the attack, national security adviser William Patrick Clark is being weakened for possible kill by aggressive forces in the West Wing of the White House.

The disclosure last week of United Nations Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick's Dec. 23 resignation letter — which President Reagan declined to accept — shows the strength of the anti-Clark forces on floor on top of Clark's discreet hide-away in the West Wing basement.

Clark had nothing to do with leaking the existence of that letter. Since the office of chief of staff James Baker was the only other source aware of the letter (save Kirkpatrick and Reagan), White House insiders suspect that Baker's men made the letter known elsewhere in the White House (but neither Clark nor Baker told us that the letter existed).

Undermining Kirkpatrick with resignation rumors undermines

Clark's most valuable ally in the struggle over Ronald Reagan's national security policy between Reaganite true-believers led by Clark and Reaganite doubters led by West Wing pragmatists.

The doubters are not all that interested in the substance of foreign, defense and arms control policy. What fascinates and motivates them is how the president will appear to the voting public and in foreign capitals in conducting his policy. But Clark and Kirkpatrick insist that policy should be an extension of Reagan's own convictions since he was the one elected president, whether it be the "evil empire" of the Soviet Union or gun-running from Cuba to Nicaragua.

Reagan and Clark early this year managed to talk Kirkpatrick out of leaving (she had set June as her deadline). Last week, however, when word seeped through the White House once again that she was pondering resigning her U.N. post, no hard denials came to us from Turtle Bay.

But for now, Clark has scored a success in keeping his ally Kirkpatrick on the job. Despite that success, his vulnerability to the West Wingers in Baker's office makes for an unequal contest which a more power-loving person than Clark might seek to rectify through his intimacy with the president. Not having done so, the soft-spoken, self-effacing Clark faces pressures that his allies say have about evened the odds at 50-50 that he will be back on his California ranch after Labor Day.

"Bill Clark is not a power lover," one such ally told us. "And in this White House, the ones who love power are the only ones who will survive."

That's scarcely the beginning. Clark's real weakness stems from

from the West Wingers' clout with and knowledge of the reporters who cover the White House and their bosses in the newsrooms. White House insiders say that Richard Darman, Baker's shrewd chief aide, has become a conduit to one major East Coast newspaper of internal White House secrets comparable to the famed "Deep Throat" who spilled sensational Watergate revelations to the Washington Post 10 years ago. Clark is often the victim, but his own staff lacks a single political gut-fighter capable of playing in the same ballpark with Darman.

When the president arrived in Houston April 29, he was greeted with a prominently-displayed article in the Houston Post by Morton Kondracke. Headlined "Choosing William Clark Over Jim Baker Could Be Disastrous," the article dredged history to highlight Clark's "academic failure" as one "who flunked out of two law schools and failed a bar exam." It praised Baker and the West Wingers as "canny, experienced Washington operators who know how to ... plant a story in the newspapers." Clark men viewed the article as a flagrant Baker plant in his home town.

The broodings of Clark operatives that he may leave the White House — by his own choice — will become more morose if Reagan's Central American aid programs are gutted in Congress. West Wingers would blame the defeat on Clark, even though, paradoxically, Baker, Darman and White House congressional lobbyist Ken Duberstein are responsible for getting Reagan's programs through Congress.

Clark might yet convert from passive defense to an attack on his belittlers, but evidence is sparse indeed that he has decided on such an uncharacteristic course of action.

nation NASA begins nudging satellite into new orbit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The space agency, confident of success, today began nudging a \$100 million shuttle-launched communications satellite out of a lopsided path into stable orbit 22,500 miles above Earth.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration had to cut today's maneuvers short because two thrusting jets on the satellite overheated, but officials still were satisfied with the progress they made and will continue the attempt Wednesday, a spokesman said.

Several future spacecraft launches, including a European Space Laboratory aboard a shuttle next fall, could be delayed if the Tracking and Data Relay Satellite cannot be shifted to its proper orbit. After today's maneuvers the satellite still was more than 8,000 miles lower than it was supposed to be.

The first firing signals to the satellite's thrusters were sent at 12:12 a.m. EDT through the agency's deep space tracking station near Madrid, Spain, while TDRS was spinning in its misshapen orbit high above the South Atlantic Ocean.

Jim Elliott, a spokesman for NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in nearby Greenbelt, Md., said that at 1:34 a.m. the maneuver was halted because temperatures on two jets reached the safety limit of 240 degrees Fahrenheit.

NASA officials initially planned to

refire the thrusters after giving them an hour to cool down, but "we decided not to start another burn after all and just settle for the hour and 22 minutes" of maneuvers, Elliott said. "We're doing that to more closely evaluate what happened on the burn."

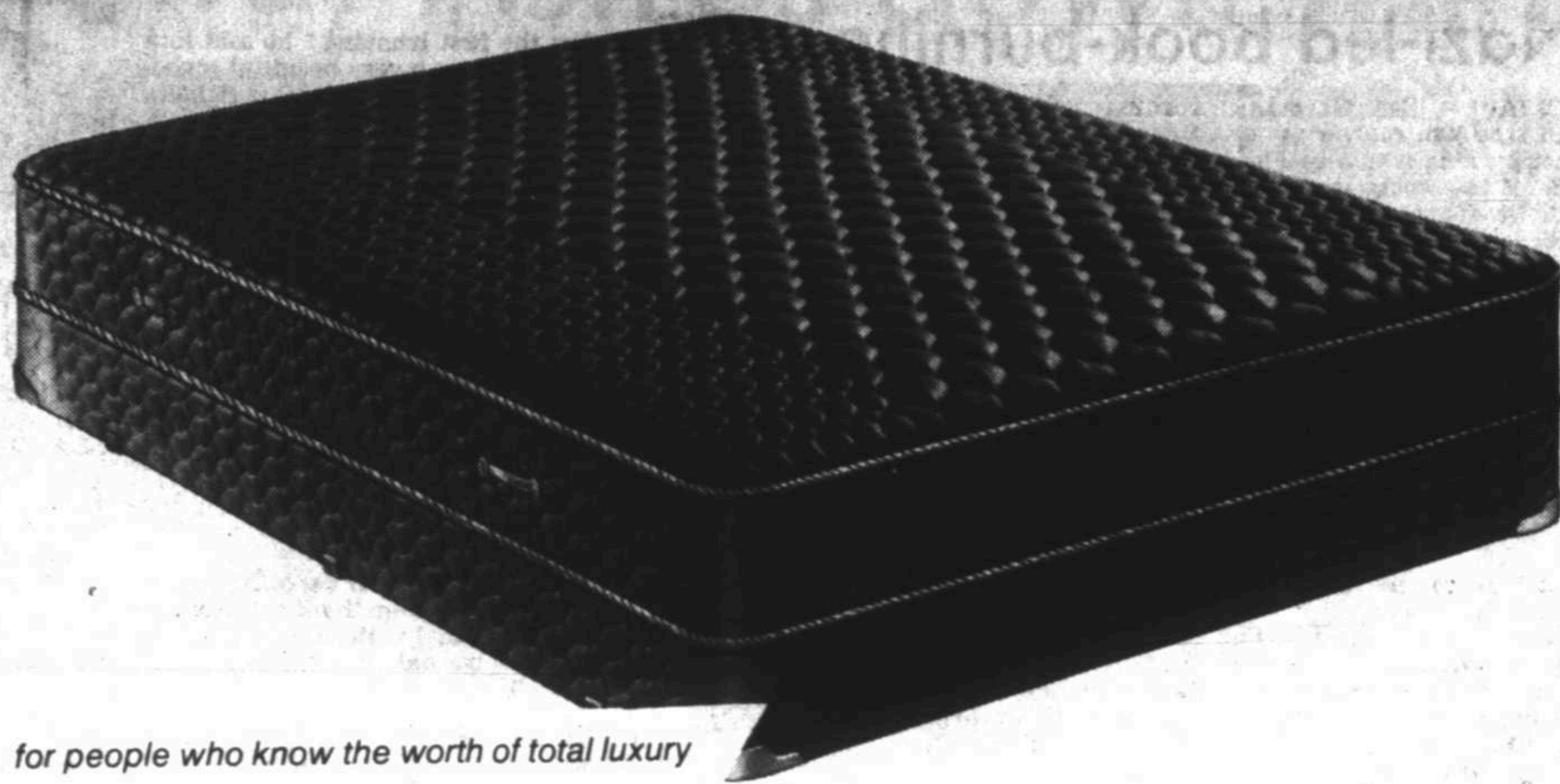
Under the procedure adopted by NASA for the maneuver, two of the satellite's seven thrusters were in continuous operation while the rest were being fired sporadically. It was two of the five in sporadic operation that overheated, Elliott said.

"They're still trying to figure out just how to work this out," he said. "They made more progress today, they feel, and they're still confident they can get the thing into (the proper) orbit."

The result of the maneuver was that the satellite gained 217 miles in altitude at the low point of its orbit but lost 41 miles at the high point. However, Elliott said the loss at the high point didn't bother the scientists.

The salvage effort will require at least 13 different firings of the satellite's jet thrusters — and perhaps as many as 30 — over several weeks. After two tests of the small jets last week, NASA officials expressed optimism they could get the satellite into the right orbit.

Secretary repays expenses

WASHINGTON (AP)

— Defense Secretary Casper Weinberger has "completely reimbursed" the government for his wife's use of Pentagon motor-pool cars and drivers on personal trips in the Washington area, a Defense Department spokesman says.

Weinberger had believed such use of government automobiles by his wife Jane was proper because it was permitted when he was budget director and secretary of health, education and welfare in the 1970s, spokesman Henry Catto said Monday.

"The secretary was made aware by an internal check of the motor-pool records that some unauthorized trips had been taken by Mrs. Weinberger, using motor-pool vehicles," Catto told a reporter.

"When the matter was brought to his attention, the secretary reimbursed the government in full."

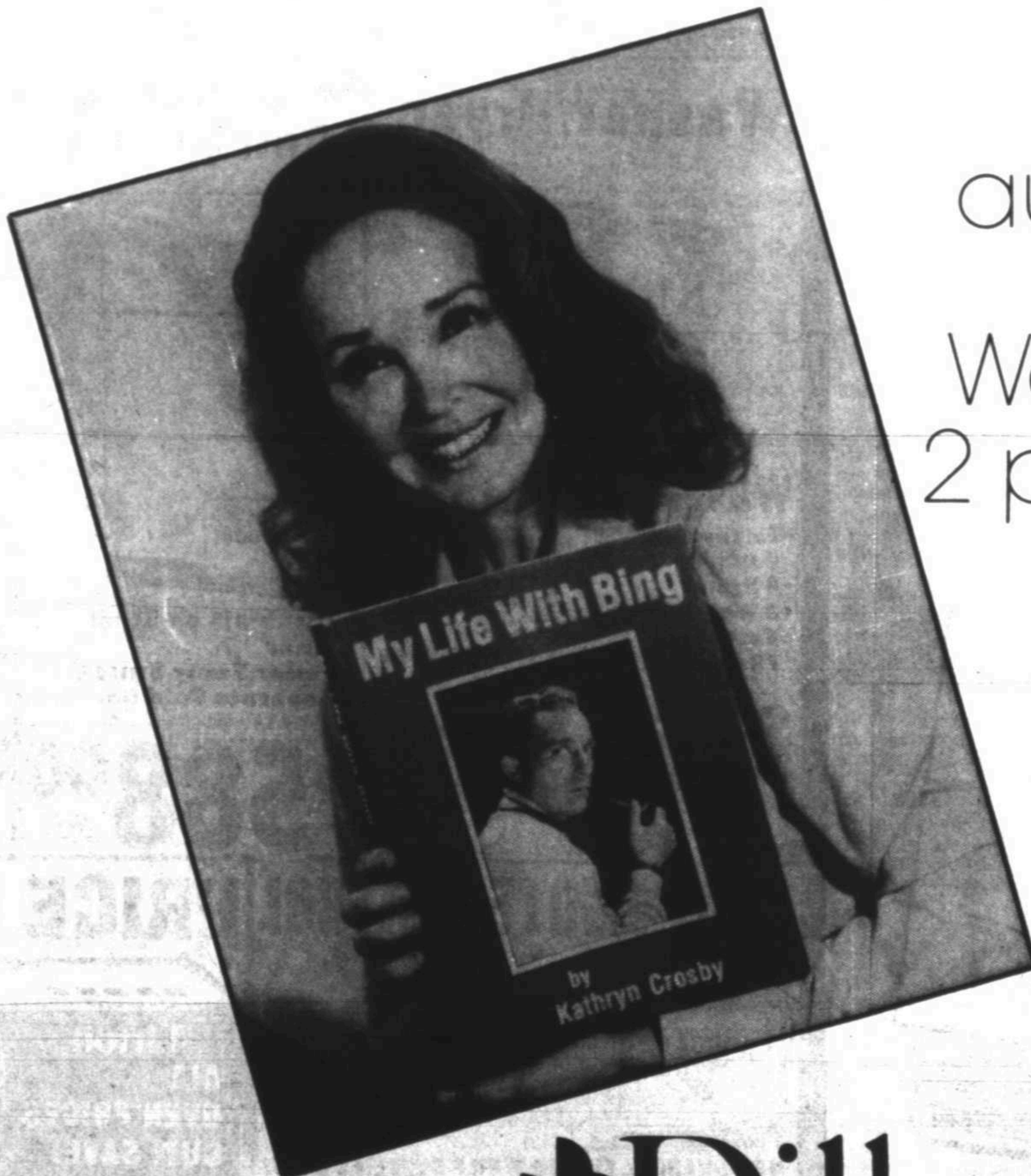
Catto said Weinberger paid "a couple of hundred dollars" to the Treasury.

The internal check of motor-pool records, referred to by Catto, was conducted last year by the Defense Department's inspector general, who reported in December that "we identified 1,039 trips during the six-month period covered by our survey that involved travel from and-or to locations that were not government activities."

The inspector general's report, dated Dec. 10, said, "These trips may or may not have been for official purposes, but this could not be clearly determined in most cases from information recorded in the vehicle dispatch records."

However, the report said investigators had identified 237 instances where records "indicated that the purpose of the trip may have been for other than the accomplishment of official duties."

Readings mark anniversary of Nazi-led book-burning

BERLIN (AP) — East Germany today marks the 50th anniversary of a Nazi book-burning with a reading from some of the works that were destroyed. Dissident writers were not invited.

The ceremonies are planned in East Berlin's Bebel Square, where on May 10, 1933, wildly chanting Nazi students built a bonfire and threw some 2,000 books into the flames.

The burned books included works by Thomas Mann, winner of the 1929 Nobel Prize in literature, and Erich Maria Remarque, author of the anti-war novel "All Quiet on the Western Front."

Nazi leaders called the books "undesirable" and "damaging."

The square, formerly called Berlin Opera Square, was renamed by the Communist government after August Bebel, a turn-of-the-century German socialist parliamentarian. It was draped with a large banner

reading: "50th Anniversary of the Day of the Fascist Book Burning."

On Sunday some 150 East German writers took part in a book bazaar there.

East German writers who are regarded as anti-government were not invited to display their works at either the bazaar or the reading.

The government said writers from several countries were expected to attend readings today by East German authors including Hermann Kant, Stephan Hermlin, Eva Lipold, Hedda Zinner, Frank Weimann and Heint Kamnitzer.

Kant is president of the East German Writers Association. Kamnitzer is president of the East German Pen Club.

Writers not invited to either the bazaar or the readings included Stefan Heym, Rolf Schneider, Wolfgang Hilbig, Luth Rathenow and Gerd Neumann, who have been published in West Germany.

Japan builds F-15s with American help

NAGOYA, Japan — When American B-29 bombers flew over this industrial city in central Japan in December 1944, Kiyoshi Hashimoto was a 13-year-old student, working after school at a Mitsubishi factory that produced Zero fighter planes.

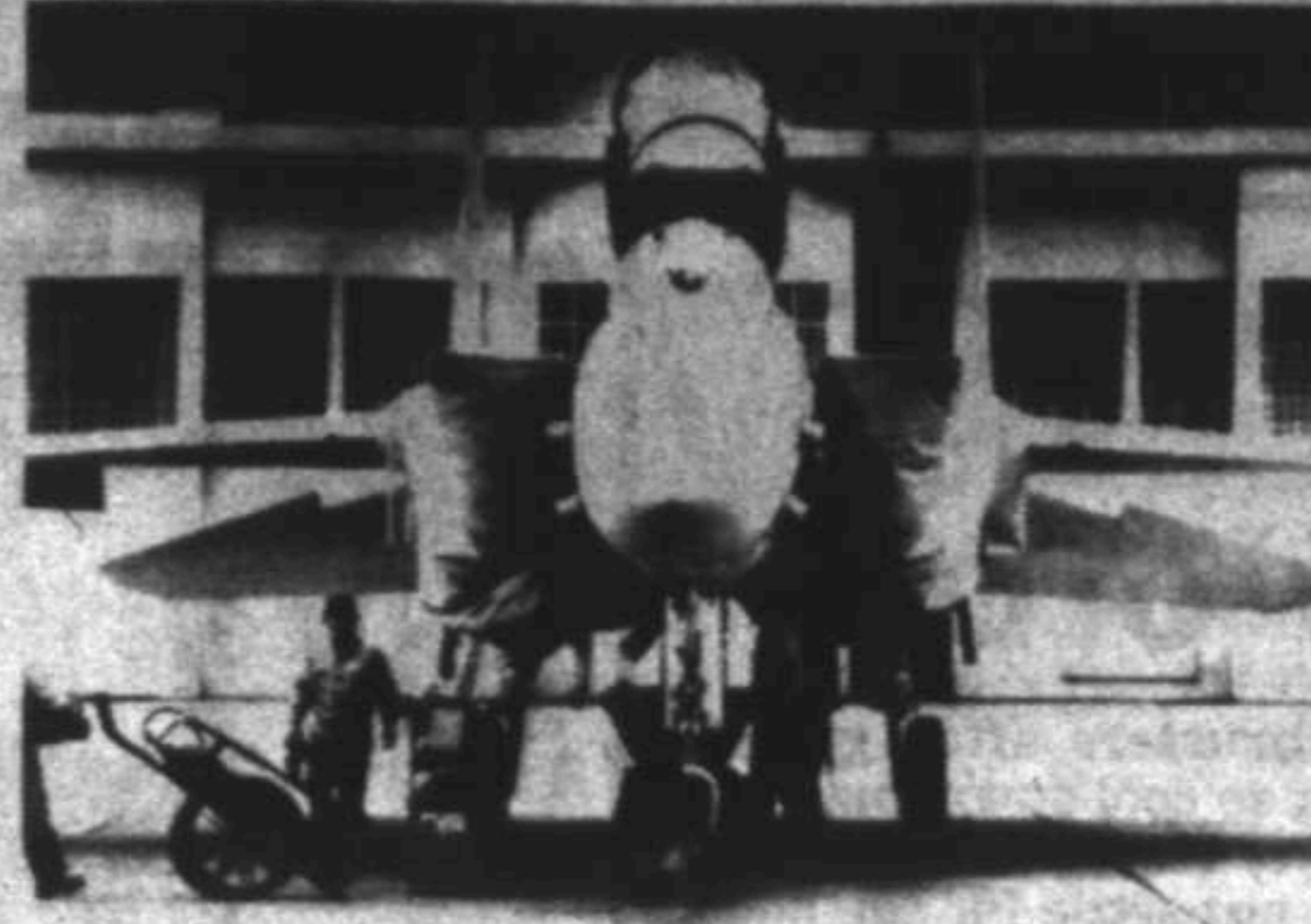
"I remember the first bombing," he said in a recent interview. "It was a very beautiful squadron, flying at a very high altitude. Our fighters could never get to that height."

Today, at 52, Hashimoto still helps Mitsubishi Heavy Industries make fighters. He is the manager of the Komaki South plant, where Japanese workers now produce F-15 interceptors for the Japan Self-Defense Force under a licensing agreement with McDonnell Douglas Corp., the U.S. aircraft maker.

In World War II, Mitsubishi factories here turned out 17,500 planes — Zero fighters and bombers — before the city was devastated by American bombs. Now, the combined efforts of several Mitsubishi factories here produce the twin-tailed F-15s at a pace that is anything but frenetic: one a month.

At Komaki South, the final assembly plant, workers build the planes from the same drawings and specifications used by McDonnell Douglas at St. Louis, Mo. — the only other F-15 plant in the world.

The deal between McDonnell Douglas and Mitsubishi, Japan's largest weapons maker, is one of

about 320 arms-related contracts between Japanese and U.S. companies for co-production or licensed-production, a U.S. official said.

A senior official in the Japanese Defense Agency's equipment bureau, who asked not to be named, estimated 80 percent of the aircraft acquired by the Japanese military are made in Japan under license with U.S. firms.

Officials and industry sources from both countries say Mitsubishi, like other Japanese defense contractors, is eager to learn U.S.-style weapons building, but is forced to limit production for political and economic reasons.

Japan officially bans arms exports and keeps

its own military spending at less than 1 percent of the gross national product. The constitution, written after World War II, restricts its military forces to a strictly defensive role.

The F-15, designed primarily as an air superiority fighter, would be used to help defend Japanese territory and sea lanes in time of war.

Although building warplanes is not a major industry in Japan, Hashimoto said the F-15s built by his plant are of "very good" quality.

"The workmanship is good and they're thorough," agreed McDonnell Douglas representative Ernest M. Zaiser Jr., who has been based in Japan since 1969.

The Japanese government wants 155 F-15s and Hashimoto said his company has contracts to deliver 79 of them by 1987. He said he could easily increase production if orders for more planes came in from the Defense Agency.

At Komaki South's No. 6 hangar, F-15s at four assembly stations occupy about a fifth of the floor space. On the other side, workers make panels for anti-submarine F-3C aircraft, part of a licensing deal with the Lockheed Corp. of Burbank, Calif. The rest of the hangar is almost empty.

Another hangar nearby is used for maintenance on the older F-104 fighter-bombers that form a key part of Japan's air defense forces.

About half the parts for the F-15s are imported from the United States, and the rest are built by Mitsubishi and other Japanese contractors such as Kawasaki Heavy Industries and Ishikawajima-Harima Heavy Industries.

Passengers returned to China

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Ninety-five passengers and crew from a hijacked Chinese airliner left for home today after a six-day saga that began with a bloody in-flight shooting and ended with a friendly South Korean farewell.

South Korean officials praised the "spirit of cooperation" that resolved the hijacking and predicted it would warm relations between Communist China and staunchly anti-Communist South Korea.

But in Peking, China's official news agency said the six "criminals" who hijacked the airliner should have been returned instead of kept in South Korea for prosecution.

Seoul and Peking have no diplomatic ties and the hijack talks in Seoul were the first acknowledged official contact between the two countries, who fought each other 30 years ago during the Korean war.

South African loan opposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. representative on the International Monetary Fund would have to vote against any loans for South Africa under a proposed bill granting an \$8.4 billion increase in the American contribution to the fund.

That prohibition — aimed at expressing U.S. displeasure with the white South African government's policy of racial segregation, or apartheid — was contained in an authorization bill approved Monday by voice vote of the House Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs Committee.

The restriction was written into the legislation by a subcommittee last week to register dissatisfaction with IMF approval of a \$1.1 billion loan for South Africa last November.

Nicaraguan talks rejected

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States has rejected Nicaragua's request for head-to-head

talks, saying the leftist Sandinista government wants security at home while it destabilizes its Central American neighbors.

The request, made before the U.N. Security Council on Monday, comes at a time when Congress is considering limitations on covert U.S. aid to anti-government rebels fighting the Sandinistas.

"Nicaragua has once again come to us demanding of the United Nations international protection while it destabilizes its neighbors," said U.S. Ambassador Jeanne J. Kirkpatrick.

She said Nicaragua repeatedly had rebuffed peace plans advanced by the United States in the last two years "based on the termination of Nicaraguan support of guerrilla groups" in El Salvador.

Salvadoran troops take hill

SANTA LUCIA ZAPOTE, El Salvador (AP) — Government troops recaptured Cinquera after taking La Mesa, a hill overlooking the strategically important town 44 miles northeast of San Salvador.

A military commander said 52 soldiers and 16 leftist guerrillas were killed in the heavy fighting Sunday and Monday.

Massed along a dirt road, about 200 government troops watched as leftist guerrillas scurried across the slopes of the brush-covered hill, dodging artillery shells.

Granting of residency likely

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israel is likely to grant permanent residency to Lida Vashchenko, the Soviet pentacostalist exiled from the Soviet Union after four years of refuge in the U.S. Embassy in Moscow, a government spokesman said today.

Miss Vashchenko, 32, arrived in Israel April 10 after the Soviet Union stripped her of her citizenship and passport and allowed her to emigrate.

Rogers burns Atlanta; Astros down Mets

Cubs secure cellar spot

Steve Rogers has won 136 games in 9 1/2 major league seasons and 137 of them came somewhere other than Atlanta.

The sunny South isn't Rogers' favorite place despite Monday night's six-hitter as the Montreal Expos defeated the Atlanta Braves 5-3. It was his 10th victory in his last 11 decisions against the Braves, but his first triumph ever in Atlanta, where he had been 0-6.

"Steve's not a hot-weather pitcher," said catcher Gary Carter, who homered in support of his batterymate. "It was warm (upper 60s), but not like it usually is here. It didn't drain him."

Rogers not only pitched a complete-game victory to snap his Atlanta jinx — "I would have hated to retire without one," he quipped — but also delivered a run-scoring single to cap a two-run second inning against loser Rick Camp.

Carter belted his fifth home run in the eighth. The Expos scored in the fifth when Tim Lincecum walked, stole second and came home on the third of Warren Cromartie's five hits. Carter homered in the eighth and singled by Raines and Cromartie plus an error gave the Expos a run in the ninth.

"We usually beat him (Rogers) at home," said Atlanta's Chris Chambliss, who homered and tripled. "He's really good. You don't want to get behind him. He doesn't give you much to hit. He's really good."

"I was aware of it," Rogers said of his failure to win in Atlanta. "It's a fact. But that gave me no extra drive to win tonight. Early in my career it was a worry. I was 0-4, but I really haven't pitched here very often."

Cromartie, who had hits in his last two at-bats in his previous game, tied club records with five hits in a game — a double and four singles — and seven consecutive hits.

"I don't want to brag, but I did that three years ago in Chicago," Cromartie said of his five hits. "But this is by far the best game I've had in two years."

Dodgers 4, Cubs 3

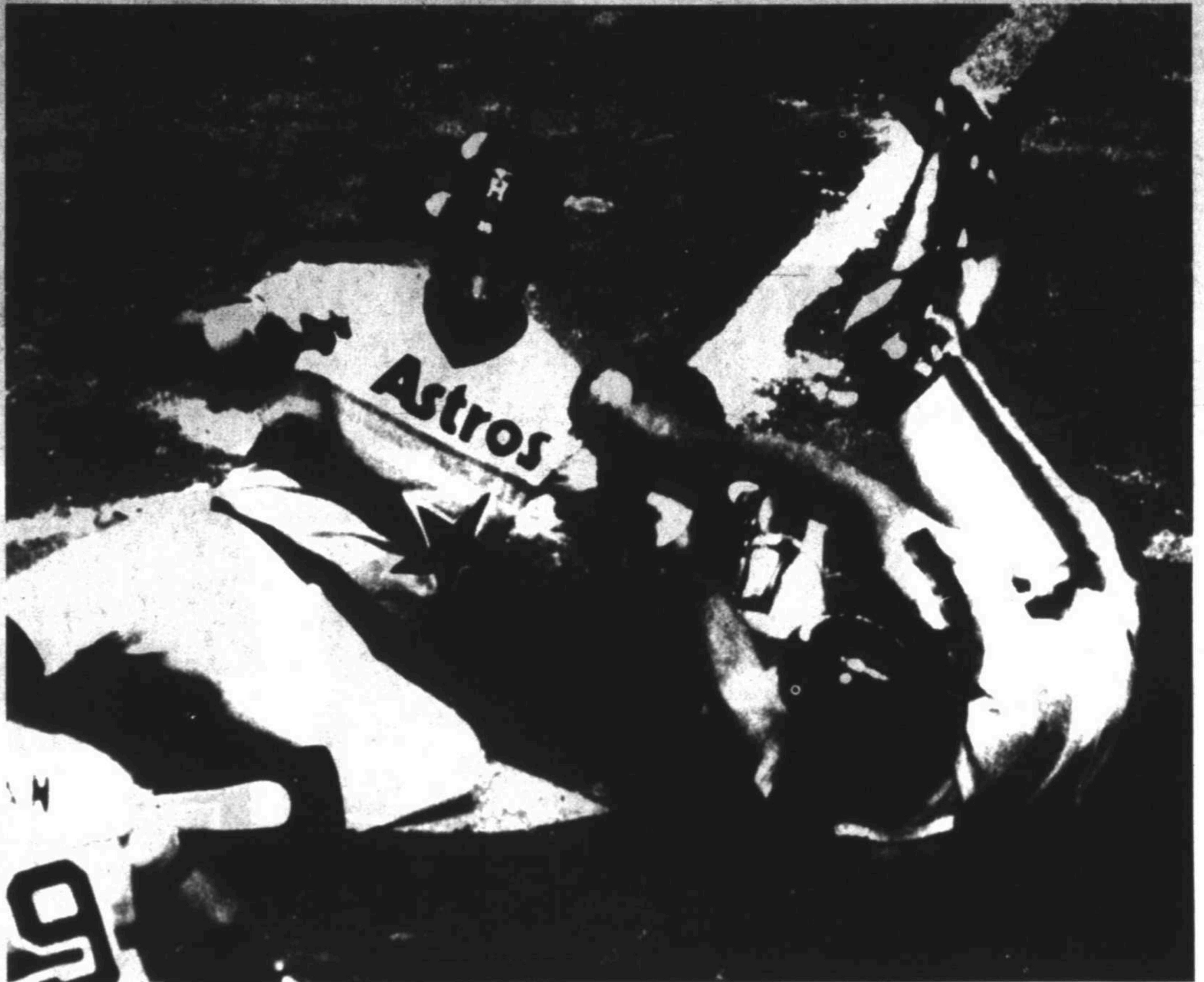

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — The first round of the battle of the big men clearly belonged to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar.

But 7-foot-2 center Artis Gilmore and the San Antonio Spurs get another chance tonight when they face Abdul-Jabbar and the Los Angeles Lakers in the second game of the National Basketball Association Western Conference finals.

The defending NBA champion Lakers jumped out to 1-0 edge in the best-of-seven series with a 119-107 victory Sunday at the Forum, as Abdul-Jabbar, also 7-2, led the way with 30 points and eight rebounds.

While the matchup at center is the focal point for the playoff series, the Lakers received some excellent play in other areas. Guard Norm Nixon popped in 30 points for Los Angeles, and the Lakers also got a morale booster when Bob McAdoo was able to play 22 minutes.

It was the first appearance for the reserve forward-center since he dislocated a toe on his right foot in practice Feb. 16. The Lakers had been thin in the frontcourt since McAdoo was hurt and rookie forward James Worthy went out with a broken leg.

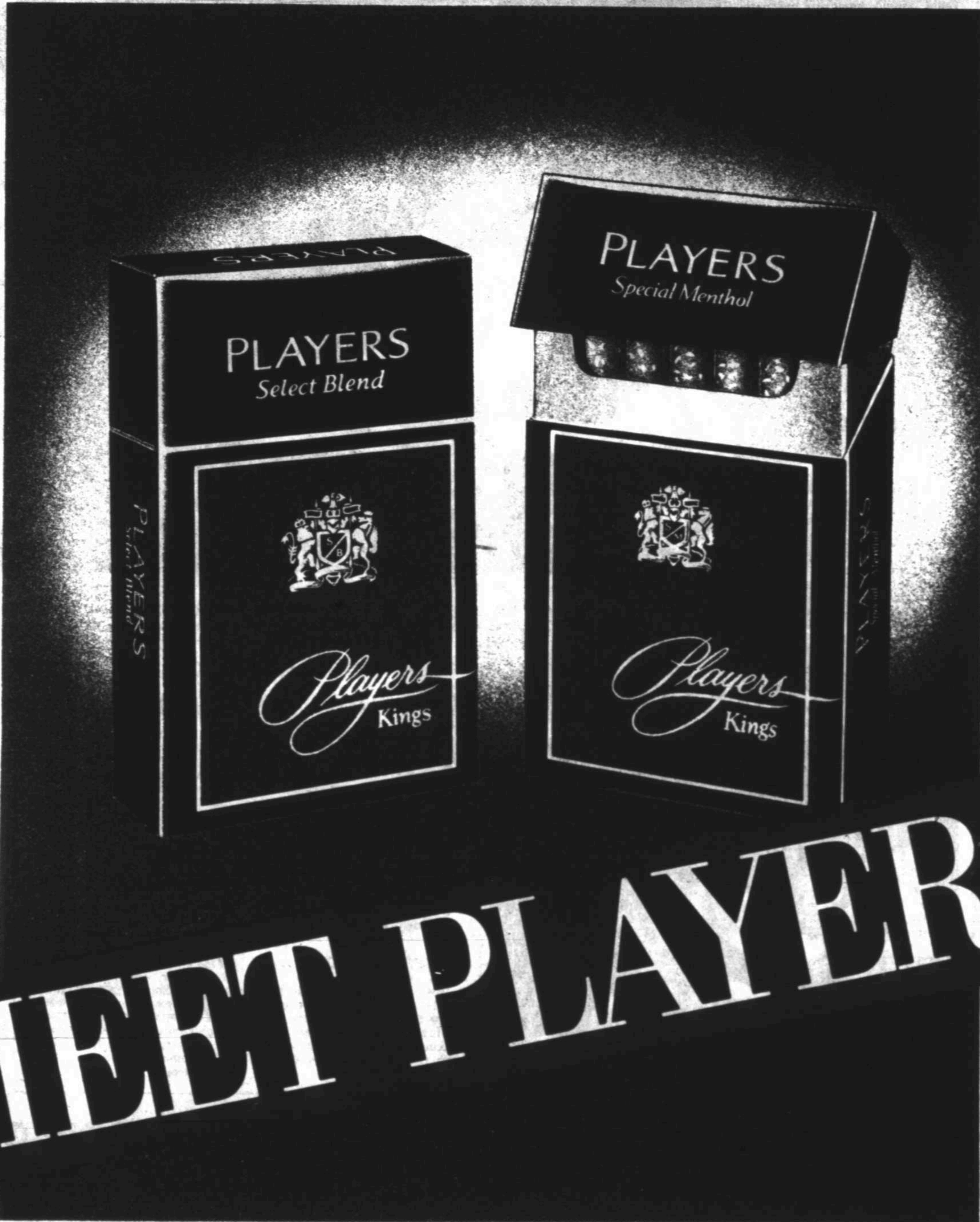

Norwood kicks Generals, 22-9

Walker has worst game

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Birmingham's Scott Norwood refused to hog the limelight.

His record five field goals propelled the Stallions to a 22-9 United States Football League victory over the New Jersey Generals and showed up rushing leader Herschel Walker, who was held to a career-low 28 yards on 11 carries.

White had a 1-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, accounting for the Stallions' only scoring other than Norwood.

Aside from Walker, quarterback Bobby Scott was the only New Jersey player with rushing yardage. Scott, whose 37-yard touchdown pass to Tom McConaughy early in the first quarter was the Generals' only score, had 10 yards on two carries.

"It's always good to have more than one running back. This way you can't key on anybody," Gant said. "We knew we had to run to control the ball and keep Herschel off the field."

"I never played against a team that controlled the ball the way they did," said Walker, whose previous low was 39 yards on 19 carries against Tampa Bay in the third game of the season. He had only 19 yards on five carries in the first half against Birmingham.

Sox refuse to pay LeFlore

Chicago White Sox chairman Jerry Reinsdorf says outfielder Ron LeFlore has breached his contract and the club is not paying him any of the \$735,000 due him for the 1983 season. The Major League Players Association will file a grievance against the club for refusing to pay his salary. The Sox maintain that LeFlore, 35, has failed to live up to the standard major league contract, which has a clause that governs the conduct of a player and also requires he present himself in condition to play. LeFlore was arrested last Sept. 30 on drug and weapons charges.

The American League club also retired the No. 9 uniform worn by former star outfielder Minnie Minoso, whose major league career spanned five decades. It was "Minnie Minoso Day" Sunday for the man who debuted with the Cleveland Indians in 1949 and played his last season with the Sox in 1964. Only two other White Sox players have had their numbers retired. They are Luke Appling, No. 4, and the late Nellie Fox, No. 2.

A plea of innocent was entered on behalf of Boston Red Sox utility infielder Julie Valdez, who is charged with statutory rape of a 14-year-old girl. Valdez' lawyer waived reading of the complaint, entering the innocent plea. Banks continued the ballplayer's bail of \$1,000 and set a court date of May 24.

Former Boston Red Sox slugger Tony Conigliaro, hospitalized for more than a year after a heart attack, underwent surgery to remove part of his left lung Monday morning at Massachusetts General Hospital. Hospital spokesman Martin Bander said doctors were reluctant to perform the surgery, but last week decided to operate because Conigliaro's left lower lung lobe kept collapsing.

Outfielder George Foster of the New York Mets, who drove in nine runs and hit two game-winning home runs last week, has been named the National League's Player of the Week. Foster hit in all six games the Mets played, getting 10 hits in 25 at-bats for a .400 average. His three-run homer in the 13th inning gave the Mets a 7-4 victory over Cincinnati Friday night and another three-run homer was the game-winning hit in Sunday's game as New York overcame a 5-0 deficit and beat the Reds 10-5.

Rod Carew of the California Angels, who at one point last week raised his season's average to .500, has been named the American League's Player of the Week. Carew, who leads the American League with a .472 average, had 13 hits in 24 at-bats during the week, a .542 pace, and on Saturday had a season's mark of 46 for 96, one of the two best starts in major league baseball history.

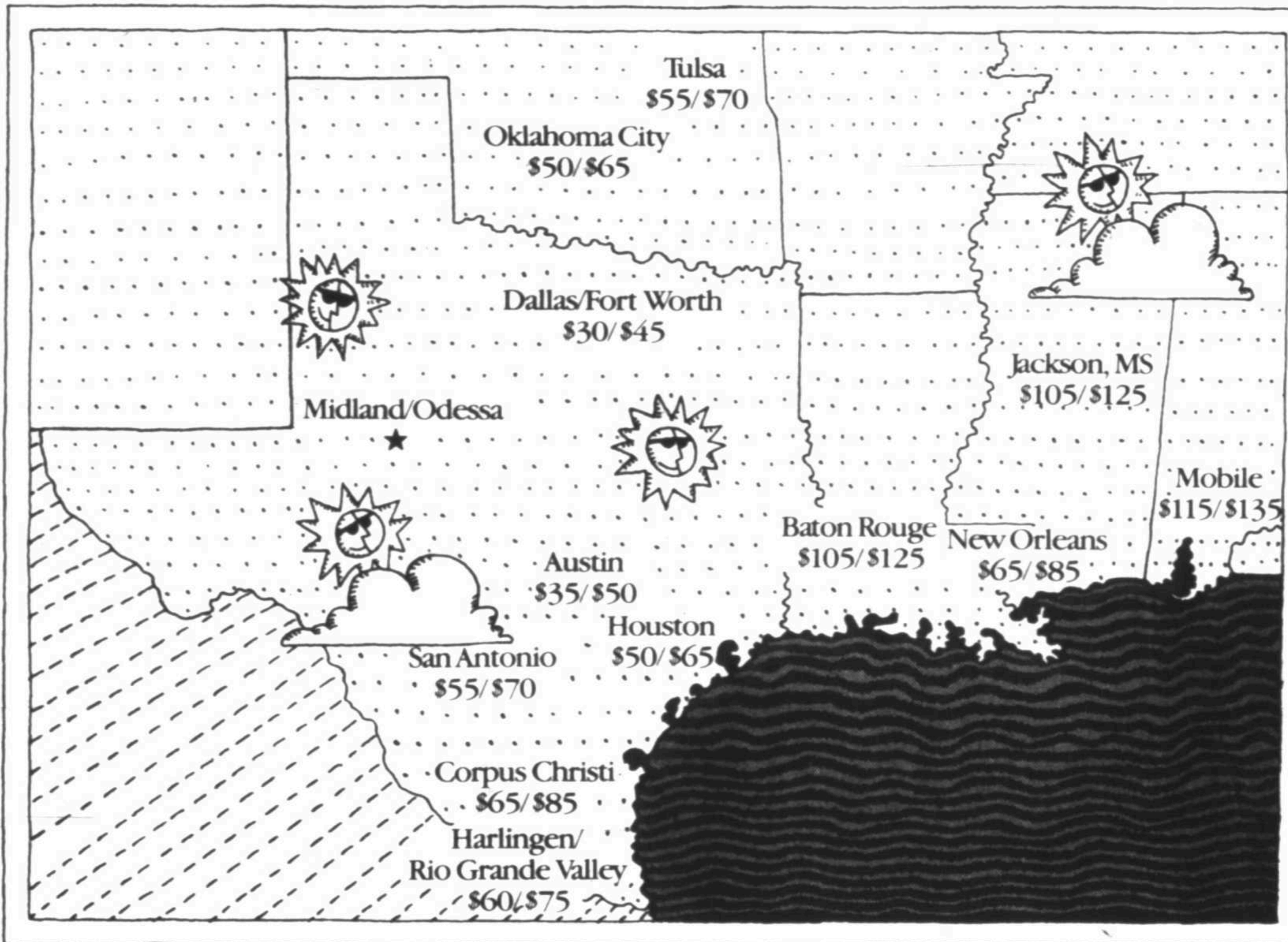

A doctor and trainers at the scene said Ohnstad's pulse stopped at least once. He was resuscitated at the scene, then taken to the hospital.

Frenchman wins around-the-world boat race

NEWPORT, R.I. (AP) — Philippe Jeantot, a French offshore oil rig diver, sailed his aluminum cutter Credit Agricole past Brenton Tower today to set a new world record and win the BOC Challenge single-handed race around the world.

With a lead of more than 10 days over South African Bertie Reed in Altech Vooortrekker, Jeantot slowed as he approached the finish line, waiting for the light of dawn before finishing with an unofficial elapsed time of 159 days, two hours and 26 minutes.

He crossed the line in the fog at 7:12 a.m. His time shattered the record set in 1973-74 by the late Alain Colias of France, who sailed from

St. Malo, France, in the 60-foot trimaran Manureva in 160 days, 4 hours, 11 minutes.

"It's a remarkable thing for a monohull to have just beaten one of the fastest trimarans ever built," said Dick Kenny, race committeeman.

A flotilla carrying race officials, backers and well wishers from the home of the America's Cup races greeted the Jeantot at the finish of the first single-handed global sailing race to start and finish in the United States.

After being towed by the Coast Guard to a dock at Goat Island Marina, Jeantot, emerging from his boat looking tanned, fit and freshly shaven in a white polo shirt and faded blue jeans, was

greeted by his mother, Genevieve Jeantot.

He said the only time he felt lonely was in the Southern Ocean near Antarctica dodging icebergs in deep fog for 13 days.

"It was the first time in my life when I was sailing that I wished I was elsewhere. Never in the trip did I wish I was with somebody else," Jeantot said.

He said he expected the worst in southern latitudes of the Indian Ocean, where the seas can reach 100 feet. But he had good weather conditions there for the most part, encountering more difficulty in the Pacific where he thought it would be easier.

Stanley Cup looks like western gun fight

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — Like two gunfighters in the old West, Wayne Gretzky and Mike Bossy are lining up for the big showdown.

It won't be a classic hand-to-hand kind of combat because Gretzky is a center and Bossy a right wing. But when the Stanley Cup finals begin here tonight, it wouldn't be surprising to see sparks flying off the sticks of these two super scorers.

Gretzky has led the Edmonton Oilers into their first National Hockey League playoff final. The record-shattering 22-year-old star leads all this postseason's scorers with 34 points, one shy of Bossy's record. He is just off a 71-goal, 125-assist campaign, the second best scoring season in NHL history — behind Gretzky's own 92-goal, 120-assist season the year before.

Bossy is the consummate playoff performer, the most valuable player of the 1982 Stanley Cup tournament as the New York Islanders won their third straight championship. He boosted the Islanders into these finals by scoring the game-winning goals in all four victories over the Boston Bruins in the Wales Conference championship series, tying an NHL record with nine goals in that

series, including a three-goal and a four-goal night. Bossy, 26, has never scored fewer than 50 goals in any of his six NHL seasons and has scored at least 60 in each of the last three

campaigns.

Neither Bossy nor Gretzky are looking at this series as a two-man confrontation, however, even though they are the centerpieces. It

is likely one of them will provide the decisive edge for his team.

"I don't have anything to settle with Wayne," said Bossy. "He does his thing and I do mine. What concerns me is winning the Cup. That, to me, is the most important thing."

"I don't look at us playing Edmonton as a matchup of me against Gretzky. We don't even play the same position. I don't think he will beat us singlehanded and I don't think I can beat them single-handed."

Gretzky felt basically the same. "Mike is a great player but my job is not to match him, it's to help us win the Stanley Cup," he said. "We play this game and it's a team sport and we're all here for one reason: to win the Cup."

Islanders center Butch Goring, who joined the team just prior to its first Cup triumph in 1980, marvels at both Gretzky and Bossy.

"Gretzky makes you wonder how he does the things he does," said Goring. "Mike's the same way. They're the two best scorers in the game and are at their best when their teams need it the most." Which is now.

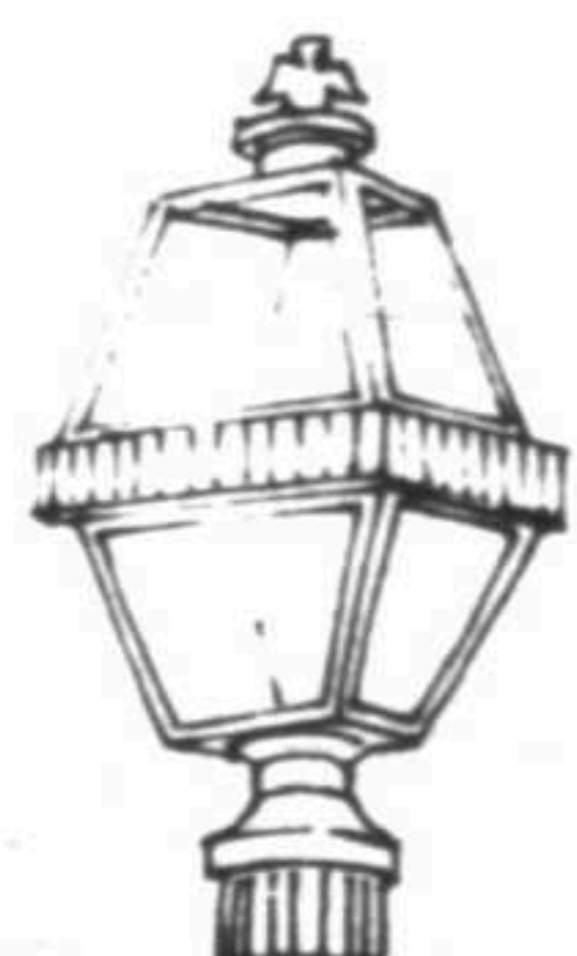
The Retama team consisted of Steve, Tom and Mat Goss and Owen Rinehart. Retama didn't score in the match, but got one-point on the handicap system.

Milwaukee betting Bucks on Moncrief

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Milwaukee Bucks Coach Don Nelson insists he's not worried about Sidney Moncrief.

Moncrief, who averaged 22.5 points in the regular season, collected just seven Sunday as the Bucks lost to the Philadelphia 76ers in the opener of their National Basketball Association Eastern Conference final.

"I've never seen Sidney have poor back-to-back games," said Nelson before practice for Wednesday's second game of the series here.

"Philadelphia did a good job on him. They took some of his favorite things away. But he'll make the adjustments I'm sure."

The 76ers won the first game of the best-of-seven series in overtime, 111-106, with Clint Richardson scoring the winning basket after Bobby Jones stole an inbound pass and flipped to the little guard under the basket.

Nelson said Richardson and Andrew Toney played Moncrief "terrific."

"They did as good a job on Sidney as we did on Moses Malone," said Nelson.

The Bucks held Malone to 14 points and 12 rebounds, well below

his 24.5 and 15.3 regular-season averages.

Moncrief, who is suffering from a muscle pull, said Richardson played great defense on him.

"You can't take that away from him. But I thought my offense was lacking because of myself. I only took nine shots. I've got to take advantage of more offensive opportunities and be more aggressive with the ball," said Moncrief.

Nelson said he would make a few minor adjustments.

"But we're not going to change much in our game, whether we lose by two or 30," the coach added.

Sixty Coach Billy Cunningham said the Bucks had to be pleased with their set offense.

"Even though Sidney (Moncrief) didn't score a lot, they executed very well. Moncrief doesn't have to score for them to win. He was aggressive and going to the boards. His lack of offense didn't take away from the rest of his game."

Cunningham said he planned some adjustments against the Bucks' set offense, adding that he was pleased with the way Toney moved, considering the sharp-shooting guard wore a heavy wrapping on his deep left thigh injury.

Andretti, Newman team up at Indy

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Mario Andretti is the only driver on actor Paul Newman's racing team, and the veteran of 17 races here says he prefers it that way as he seeks to win the Indianapolis 500 for the first time since 1980.

"I don't say that's the only formula," said the 43-year-old driver who was a teammate of 1982 Indy 500 winner Gordon Johncock the past two years after several years of teaming with drivers such as Rick Mears and Tom Sneva.

"Putting together the proper ingredients, you don't get confused with some of the politics that go on when you have say, two, equal number ones (drivers)," said Andretti, who has the financial support of Budweiser beer this year.

"It gets to torment you after a while. You wonder whether you're getting all the best pieces and everything else. So, I just wanted to get away from that and the opportunity was here with this situation," he said. "Just to be alone, have a 400 percent effort behind you. I think I can make that work. Given the time, I think I can make that work very well."

Andretti, always a fast qualifier, is working on his new Lola chassis while his celebrated owner concentrates on other activities.

"He (Newman) calls each day and we discuss the car, but he just can't be here every day. He'll be here for qualifying (Saturday) and will be back just before the race."

While Andretti was working on his car Sunday, three-time Indy

winner Johnny Rutherford smashed his into the wall on the first turn. The Wildcat was a near total loss, but Rutherford escaped without being seriously injured. He needed five stitches in his right leg but anticipated being able to participate in this weekend's time trials.

Rutherford said he didn't know what caused the accident, which came after he got the car high

heading into the turn.

Meanwhile, Andretti admits he's still learning about his new chassis. He drove the car to a fifth-place finish in its only race, at Atlanta last month.

"At the time (Atlanta) we had to do some educated guessing and we were just way off. That certainly comes from not knowing the chassis."

Andretti's top speed in the first

weekend of practice was 196.430 mph — more than seven mph slower than Rick Mears and the eighth quickest overall.

Andretti, who has only placed among the top 10 four times since his 1969 victory, never drove a lap in last year's race. He was knocked out of the race when his car crashed into Kevin Cogan's machine as the 33-car field neared the starting line.

Baseball experts try, try again

Drivers continue gaining speed

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Impressive practice speeds at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway this month, accomplished even with new engine and aerodynamic restrictions, prove that progress can be slowed but not stopped, says track record-holder Rick Mears.

"As long as there's technology around, things will always continue to gain. They've made changes (in rules), and in a sense it's worked. It's kept us at least, so far, where we were," said the 1979 Indy winner, who again led all drivers in practice with a lap at 203.850 mph on Monday.

Four other drivers, Bobby Rahal, Kevin Cogan, Mike Mosley and Howdy Holmes, also topped 200 mph for the first time on Monday, while Al Unser Jr. and Pete Halsmer raised their top practice speeds to more than 190.

Mears won the pole position last year with a record four-lap run at 207.004 mph. In the race, he was runnerup to Gordon Johncock by .16 second, the closest margin between first and second place in Indy history.

Prompted, in part, by the high speeds and by the fatal crash by driver Gordon Smiley during

qualifications, the U.S. Auto Club and Championship Auto Racing Teams modified their technical specifications this year, lowering the engine boost and eliminating the use of aerodynamic "skirts" beneath the bottom of the chassis.

Speeds are again climbing, however, "because of technology," says Mears.

"In other words, we'd have gained another 5-10 mph. If we could go back right now to our rules last year with skirts and everything, with what we've learned with aerodynamics, we could definitely run a lot quicker," the former Indy winner said.

"So in a sense, by changing the rules the way they have, they've done their job. They've kept us at least close to where we're at. And I don't know, it may slow us down some. I'm not so sure we'll be able to get where we were at here last year. I won't know until later on this week."

Whether Mears tries to break his own record "depends on if I know I have a shot at it or not. If I know I'm in the ball park, I definitely will try for it. I won't know until I find out if I'm in the ball park."

Mears' top speed on Sunday was 202.565 mph.

The second driver to top 200 mph in practice this week was Rahal, who piloted his new Cosworth-powered March race car to a lap at 201.207. That's nearly 7 mph faster than his qualification speed as a rookie last year.

Rahal, 30, finished 11th a year ago. He competed in 10 other champ-car races last year, including victories at Cleveland and Michigan, and he finished among the top five in five other races, good enough for second place — behind Mears — in the CART season point standings.

Cogan later came in at 201.929. Mosley was clocked at 201.838, and Holmes had a lap at 200.088.

Mears said his new Penske-Cosworth PC-11 "seems to be working pretty well. It took us a while in the middle of the off-season to get it sorted, get the car where it seemed we found what it liked."

Mottram gets it Fromm Eric

Food firm introduces tamper-evident jars

CAMDEN, N.J. (AP) — Food companies, conceding it may be impossible to make tamper-proof packages, instead are introducing containers that alert consumers when a product has been opened.

Campbell Soup Co. recently began selling its Prigo spaghetti sauce in "tamper-evident" jars with indented "buttons" on the lids, similar to those used for years for baby food.

Inscribed on the lids of the spaghetti sauce jars is a warning: "Safety button pops up when original seal is broken. Reject if button is up," said James H. Moran, a spokesman for the Camden-headquartered food company.

"I think there's a trend industry-wide toward tamper-evident packaging. I think the consumers want it in light of some recent incidents," Moran said Monday.

John Resch, technical director of the Packaging Machine Manufacturers Institute in Washington, D.C., said his organization, which represents 200 companies that design packaging machines, has seen an increase in requests for tamper-evident containers.

"I think the responsible manufacturers are probably trying to protect themselves against some sort of a poisoning and are going into this tamper-evident or tamper-resistant packaging to make it plain to the consumer that this package has been tampered with," said Resch.

Congress also has been acting on the problem. The House on Monday passed legislation that would make it a federal crime to tamper with any products designed to be ingested. A similar bill is pending in the Senate.

After the still-unsolved poisonings with cyanide-laced Tylenol killed seven people in the Chicago area last fall, pharmaceutical companies began using tamper-resistant packages.

It may take a long time for many food companies to make the switch, said Samuel Bonacci, manager of packaging development for the Hershey Chocolate Co. in Hershey, Pa.

Doctor who stabbed himself, set house afire, must go to jail

MARIANNA, Fla. (AP) — A doctor who stabbed himself, set his house on fire and then told police he had been attacked by unknown assailants must spend 10 days in jail and two years on probation, a judge has ruled.

Jackson County Circuit Judge Robert McCrary on Monday also ordered Dr. Frederick Boedy to pay \$300 per month restitution for 24 months to compensate for filing false police reports.

Boedy has not practiced medicine since he put his license on inactive status several months ago after receiving psychiatric treatment at a center in Dothan, Ala.

Judge halts enforcement of law

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Although a federal judge has halted enforcement of a new law requiring parents be notified when minors buy contraceptives, a state official says that doesn't mean it will never take effect.

"It's a setback to the extent that the Utah law won't be able to go into effect immediately," Assistant Attorney General Doug Baivin said Monday after U.S. District Judge David K. Winder granted a temporary restraining order barring enforcement of the new law.

The American Civil Liberties Union and Planned Parenthood of Utah Inc. filed a lawsuit last week claiming the measure violated the constitutional rights of minors to obtain contraceptives. Winder said a hearing on the issue must be scheduled by Aug. 5.

Fewer Americans have high PCB levels

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fewer Americans are carrying high levels of toxic chemicals like PCBs and DDT in their bodies than they did six to 12 years ago, the government reports.

The Environmental Protection Agency, besieged for months by critics listing its failures, held a news conference Monday to tout some of its successes — sharply lower levels of several chemicals banned during the 1970s.

The agency issued a report showing that the number of Americans with high levels of polychlorinated biphenyls — PCBs — had declined from 9.7 percent in 1977 to 1 percent in 1981.

"This is a dramatic example of the improvements that environmental regulations are bringing us," said Don Clay, EPA acting assistant administrator for pesticides and toxic chemicals.

The drop in levels of DDT, banned in 1972, have been even more dramatic, EPA scientists said.

The average DDT level in humans, which hit a high of 8 parts per million in 1971, dropped to between 3 and 4 parts per million in 1981, the EPA said.

The 51 percent decline in DDT levels was matched by a 57 percent drop in the levels of dieldrin found in human tissues. Most uses of dieldrin, another popular pesticide, were stopped by the EPA in 1974.

Levels of heptachlor epoxide, a component of the pesticides chlordane and heptachlor, are also down, but by only 17 percent, the agency said.

The fight over PCBs was one of the major chemical battles of the 1970s. Congress in 1976 imposed a ban on the manufacture of the compound — used as an insulator in electrical equipment — after tests implicated PCBs in a variety of illnesses in laboratory animals and high levels of PCBs were found in such bodies of water as the Great Lakes and the Hudson River.

Dr. John Craddock, an official of Monsanto Co., the largest PCB producer before the ban, said the latest study showed "PCBs are not the mad-dog chemical that people once thought they would be."

The study found that 1 percent of Americans in 1981 had a high level of PCBs — more than 3 parts per million — in their fat tissues, compared to 9.7 percent in 1977.

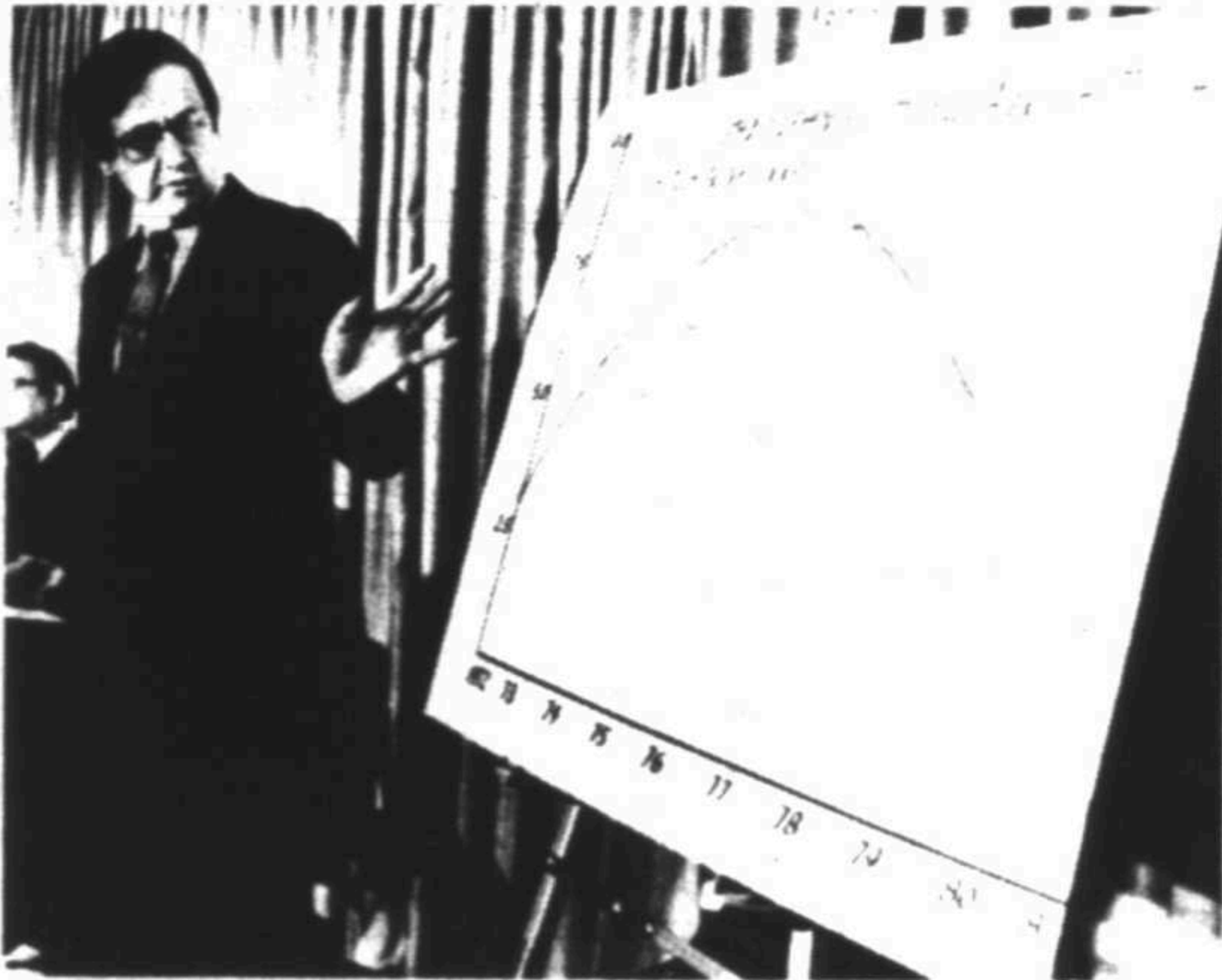
The new study found that all Americans now carry detectable levels of PCBs while 99 percent of Americans have some DDT in their bodies and 98 percent have detectable levels of dieldrin and heptachlor epoxide.

The human study was based on tissue samples collected from hospitals around the country.

While the agency has done tests on the effects of high dosages of these chemicals on laboratory animals, no data has been produced showing effects on humans at low levels. PCBs, in laboratory tests, have been found to cause reproductive failures, gastric disorders, skin lesions and tumors.

The manufacture of PCBs was ordered stopped in 1976 after 1.25 billion pounds had been produced since 1929. The EPA estimates that half that amount is still present in the country — either in storage or in use in large electrical equipment.

The EPA has developed standards which will require 1.5 million pieces of electrical transformers and capacitors containing PCBs to be replaced in the next six years.

Hospital to study abortions

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Madison General Hospital officials say they will name a committee to determine procedures for performing late-term abortions after fetuses from 5 of 21 such abortions lived briefly during the past year.

The hospital said Monday it would resume abortions on fetuses older than 18 weeks even though "there's certainly no guarantee" that live births won't happen again.

"You have to remember that when we say a fetus lived after an abortion, we're talking about maybe a few heartbeats," said hospital spokesman Timothy Warner. "At most, it can survive a couple of hours on life support systems."

Doctor charged with kickbacks

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A physician accused of involuntary manslaughter in the overdose deaths of 11 patients also faces trial June 28 on federal charges of taking kickbacks from a laboratory.

Dr. Mark Hopp, 68, who formerly ran a drug detoxification clinic in Huntington Beach, pleaded innocent Monday to accepting \$3,000 from a laboratory in exchange for sending it work.

A preliminary injunction prevents Hopp from practicing medicine until the state Board of Medical Examiners decides whether to revoke his license. He faces a Sept. 19 preliminary hearing on the manslaughter charges.

Mothers need support from doctors when babies die

ATLANTA (AP) — Two experts in psychiatry and women's health say mothers who lose children through stillbirth, miscarriage or early death need to hear more than "that's all right, honey" from their physicians.

Women who lose a baby go through a distinct grief process of guilt, anger and ambivalence, said Dr. Raphael Good of the psychiatry department at the University of Texas in Galveston.

Obstetricians and gynecologists can play a crucial role in helping patients overcome grief, he said, adding that too many doctors give women pat-on-the-back reassurances, such as "that's all right, honey, it's nothing to worry about," after the loss of a child.

"That's not meaningful," he said. "That isn't what she wants. She wants her baby back. You should tell her, 'Many women in your situation feel the same way.' That's a comforting statement. That makes the patient feel she is not different."

Nearly 600,000 American women each year lose their babies. Unless they can handle their grief, serious complications can result for themselves and subsequent children, said Dr. David Youngs of the Maine Medical Center in Portland.

"If the loss is not worked through, the next pregnancy may be at risk for parenting problems," he said, pointing to the potential for mothers who feel resentment after the birth of a second baby to abuse the child.

"That second child could never live up to the expecta-

tions she had for the first child," said Youngs, who, like Good, is both a psychiatrist and a doctor of obstetrics and gynecology. Both spoke Monday at the annual convention of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists in Atlanta.

Parents who lose a baby may find themselves shutting all children out of their lives by turning off the television when a child appears or avoiding people and places with children, Youngs said.

It is crucial, they said, for physicians to talk the patient through her grief. Doctors also should do what they can to bolster the woman's hopes for the future — whether that means having another child or simply going back to work.

Graffiti artist gets jail term

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An admitted graffiti artist who refused to participate in a court-ordered neighborhood cleanup, saying he feared for his safety, has been sentenced to five days in jail.

Judge John L. Cole handed down the sentence Monday, even though an attorney for Gustavo Vasquez argued against the constitutionality of the judge's order for gangs to clean up their work or face contempt charges.

Some 65 street gang members have participated in the cleanup effort since Cole ordered three gangs — Dogtown, Primera Flats and the 62nd Street East Coast Crips — to remove graffiti in their areas.

Kemp: Football is democratic, capitalistic; Soccer socialistic

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., calling himself a "very, very old" football player, tried the other day to set the House straight on the difference between football and soccer.

It was as the House was discussing a resolution to support efforts to have the United States host soccer's 1986 World Cup.

Kemp, the former Buffalo Bills quarterback, took issue with the name of the international soccer association that oversees the World Cup competition — the Federation Internationale de Football Association.

"They should change their name and stop confusing all of those young boys and maybe some young girls who think of football as football..." he said.

"Football is football; soccer is soccer. Soccer does not have a quarterback; only football has a quarterback," Kemp said.

Kemp was told by colleagues that, in other parts of the world, soccer was often referred to as "football."

Kemp said he didn't care. "I think it is important that for all of those young people out there, who some day hope to play real football, where you throw it and kick it and run with it and put it in your hands, a distinction should be made that football is democratic, capitalism, whereas soccer is a European socialist..."

Several colleagues challenged Kemp to elaborate on his contention that soccer was socialistic while football was democratic. "It's a challenging intellectual concept," said Rep. Gerry E. Studds, D-N.Y.

"I am going to have to revise and extend my remarks (in the Congressional Record)," Kemp said. "I do not think I want to leave this on the Record."

But whatever Kemp's editing plans, his remarks were printed the next day in the Record for all to read.

What could Jackie Onassis and Abbie Hoffman possibly have in common?

Helping box office sales at "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas," that's what.

Ticket sales were not going well in the (preview) off Broadway production of "Whorehouse," until publicity played in the New York City and area press (except for the New York Times) over a fight the night Jackie Onassis was in the Entermidia Theatre audience.

After a successful two month off-Broadway run, "Whorehouse" was moved to the 46th Street Theatre, on Broadway. By mid-December ticket sales were in a slump, when good fortune once again hit in the form of free publicity.

This time one of America's most wanted fugitives, Abbie Hoffman, came to see the show, stopping backstage to have his picture made with one of the stars afterwards. A publicity hound, Hoffman released the picture to Associated Press 48 hours later and AP released it over its national wire.

Both episodes caused ticket sales to soar.

It all fits. After all, "Whorehouse" began with national publicity.

Established in 1890, LaGrange's Chicken Ranch (so nicknamed because clients paid off their debts with poultry during the

Depression) made national press and met its downfall in the 1970s when a zealous television reporter from Houston launched a one-man crusade against it.

Jackie Onassis nor Abbie Hoffman will be among those in attendance at Midland's Yucca Theatre for Thursday's gala benefit premiere of "Whorehouse," but a certain television reporter — Marvin Zindler — and former Midlander — Larry L. King — will.

It was King's Playboy Magazine article (April 1974) about the Chicken Ranch which served as the inspiration for the musical. The musical form of "Whorehouse" represents the combined efforts of three Texans: King, Carol Hall and Peter Masterson.

The 30-member Midland Community Theatre cast has been in rehearsals since March 24 to portray the Aggies, crusaders, hookers, politicians and residents of the small Texas town in the fictionalized musical version.

The production opens the public Friday with performances Thursday through Saturday until June 4. A Sunday show will be staged May 22. Admission is \$12.50, \$10.50 and \$8.50.

Ticket prices for the premiere, which includes a barbecue dinner, drinks and music, range from \$2,500 per couple to \$200 per couple.

Commissioners consider housing subdivision

Midland County Commissioners made a break for higher ground Monday when they were asked to approve a preliminary plat for a subdivision in the southeastern part of the county.

Commissioners, in a regular session at the county courthouse, told developer Jerry Mack the plat would be approved only under the condition he "hold the county harmless" should any damage be caused by water.

County engineer Bill Harral told the court areas surrounding the subdivision — on South Lamesa Road about one-fourth mile south of Interstate 20 — "could be subject to flooding."

However, Commissioner C. Wallace Craig said flooding could hap-

pen only "under the worst circumstances."

"They're building in the middle of an old dry lake," Harral said. According to Brian Martin, attorney for Mack, the "first phase of this development is near a low spot. We don't believe it's a dry lake bed."

Craig alluded to the potential drainage problem, saying, "It's like a cup of water. If you fill that cup with half sand and try to put all the water back, it's going to spill out."

Because Harral requested Mack to level the property, Martin said his client filled in the "low spot" to avoid any drainage problems for the eight ranchette houses to be built on the eight to 10 acres.

"They filled it (dry lake) up with three feet of dirt," he said. "They spent that money .75 to 80,000 yards of dirt and took up the water storage area. It could flood out some-

one that wasn't flooded before."

In a telephone interview following the meeting, Martin said, "The only drainage problem we'll have is if we have a 100-year rain. Then everyone will have a problem."

Martin said he was aware of the commissioners' concerns about drainage and "in the highly unlikely event there is flooding the developer has agreed to defend the county if there should be any action taken."

In other action, commissioners:

—Approved a letter of intent for a matching grant funding the Midland County Elderly Nutrition program.

—Accepted annual certification of juvenile detention facilities.

—Reappointed Edward Weyman to the board of trustees of the Permian Basin Center for Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center.

—Approved closing a bank

account formerly maintained by a committee on aging. The \$150 will be turned over to Casa De Amigos.

—Approved a budget amendment of \$700 to cover unexpected cost of a telephone line for the Juvenile Probation Department and a \$1,000 increase in the department's budget. The \$1,000 was shifted from the Culver Youth Center's home repair budget to the department's budget.

—Approved deeding Midland County property along A Street to the City of Midland.

—Accepted bids for road repairs. Bids submitted by Ennis Paint Manufacturer included \$5.79 per gallon for 3,000 gallons of yellow striping paint; \$5.62 per gallon for 800 gallons of white striping paint and \$2.10 per gallon for 1,000 gallons of Toluene. Also, a bid submitted by Potters Industries included 24 cents per pound for 1,800 pounds of glass beads.

Principal roles are being played by Coila Morrow, the madam Miss Mona; Rochelle Rabouin, Miss Mona's helper Jewel; Drew Anderson, Melvin P. "Watchdog" Thorpe; Trudie Thomason, the waitress Dootsey Mae; Rick Wannall, the sidestepping governor; Bill Shaner, the mayor; Jim Galyean, the senator; and Michael Trost, the sheriff, Ed Earl Dodd.

It was the role of the sheriff which secured MCT a first in "Whorehouse" history.

MCT's opportunity began last fall with a call from King.

"Originally I wanted to come back to Midland and play the sheriff myself," King said in an interview.

"I had played it on Broadway a while and I used to act in the MCT and Permian Playhouse in Odessa 30 years ago or so and I just wanted to come home and play in it myself. So I talked with the people here at MCT and we agreed that would happen."

But time and circumstance were to alter King's plans.

"I got involved in writing another musical and contractually just can't get back here because I have to be in New York and Washington D.C., working on that play."

Although the amateur rights will not be released until this September, an exception has been made for MCT.

"It's my home town and they wanted to go ahead and do the show anyway," King said. "Because it's my hometown we gave them special dispensation to be the first community theater in America to do 'Whorehouse.'"

"And I'm glad its going to happen here first."

Man convicted in shooting

DALLAS (AP) — A 37-year-old man has been convicted of capital murder in the shooting death of a teen-age grocery store clerk.

A state district court jury deliberated two hours Monday before returning the guilty verdict against Harold Joe Lane, of Mesquite, in the death of Tammy Davis, 17.

Miss Davis was killed Nov. 20 during a holdup at a Winn Dixie market in North Dallas.

Slaying suspect not suspect in second death

DALLAS (AP) — Investigators piecing together the details of a Dallas police officer's murder say a suspect apparently was not involved in the abduction-slaying of a theater manager.

Vernon Elwin Morales, 44, and his companion, Rosemary Conclio, 38, died Saturday in a murder-suicide at a farmhouse south of Little Rock, Ark., after authorities surrounded the residence.

Both were named in capital murder warrants issued in the May 2 slaying of Officer Ronald Baker, who was shot five times and run over twice with a van in an apartment complex parking lot in the Pleasant Grove section.

Police had checked out a possible connection between Morales and the execution-style slaying of Ingrid Phillips, the manager of a Pleasant Grove theater, investigators said Monday.

"There was information originally that led us to believe there might be a connection (to Morales)," said Lt. Ron Waldrop. "But there are now several pieces of evidence to indicate he wasn't involved."

Mrs. Phillips was abducted Thursday after the theater was robbed of about \$700, police said. She was

taken to the Grove Hill Cemetery, where she was forced to kneel and was shot once between the eyes, according to investigators.

Police used metal detectors to search the cemetery and recovered a bullet slug that was believed to have killed Mrs. Phillips. Tests should determine positively if Morales was involved in the killing, Waldrop said.

'Venetian solution' for shelves

Q: We recently remodeled our kitchen and added new base cabinets and upper shelves (instead of closed cabinets).

I thought the open shelves were a good idea at the time and I still like them for every day. However, our kitchen opens into an informal dining room. This means when we entertain the kitchen is distracting.

I don't want to add new upper cabinets. Do you have a solution short of that? — R.N.V.

A: Have you considered blinds for your shelves. I've recently seen this done and it can be effective.

You could attach thin mini-venetian blinds to the ceiling or soffit in your room over the shelves. Keep the blinds pulled up for everyday use to expose the shelves. When you entertain drop the blinds.

This same technique is most effective for closing off a portion of a room or even obscuring one wall that is perhaps used as a home office.

In your kitchen you can do interesting color designs to add drama. For example, you could order your blinds in a combination of colors, colors you might choose to repeat in your dining room.

Q: I have moved from a small rented apartment to a larger condo.

Just before moving I bought a plain lime green rug for my bedroom which was much smaller than my new one. I still like the color because my spread is also new and in matching shades of lime, deep pink and turquoise on a gray background.

I have tried to use the rug in other rooms in my condo but it seems not to have a place except in the bedroom. Do you have any ideas? — M.V.

A: Go back to the shop where you bought your rug and see if you can find carpeting that you like in some of the other colors in the room. Have the store cut strips of the other carpeting and bind the strips to your existing rug to enlarge it to the desired size.

Let's say your lime rug is expanded by an 8-inch strip of turquoise and a 12-inch strip of gray to tie your color scheme together. Or

be bold and use a strip of turquoise and deep pink. Any of the combinations from your bedspread could be handsome.

This is a great technique that can also be used when you want to lengthen draperies after a move from one house to another. Simply add bands of color or another interesting fabric.

Q: My office which I have just moved into has pale gray-beige walls and gray commercial carpeting with dark, deep blue squares.

I like lots of plants and will add life to the office in this manner. However, I'm wondering what type of office furniture would be pleas-

ant and if I might introduce a bit more color here or there. I like modern, clean lines.

The gray walls seem a bit overpowering because there is so much gray. — P.B.

A: To lighten things some, why don't you choose a desk or other wood furniture in light oak with an oiled finish that is practical in an office. Choose chrome and oak chairs for a light look.

Introduce a brilliant blue to your color scheme through chair upholstery. Painting one wall of your office in the bright blue would be attractive, leaving the remaining ones gray.

Write requests

Convincing the landlord to make needed repairs or correct poor conditions is a problem for many renters. If a conflict arises between you and your landlord, make a request for repairs or remedies in writing.

According to the law, landlords must correct conditions adversely affecting the tenant's physical health or safety, such as plumbing problems, rats and excessive roaches, or broken stairs. No one is legally required to repair conditions resulting from ordinary "wear and tear," but most landlords maintain their property to keep it rentable.

Send your written request for repairs by registered or certified mail so that you have proof the landlord received the notice. If your letter is ignored, send a second notice and ask for a written explanation of why corrections have not been made.

If changes are not made after the second written request, you may terminate your lease and move from the unit. Then you can file suit and attempt to recover some rent and damage money in addition to court costs.

You are due a full refund of your security deposit if you have paid your rent and obeyed the lease up to the date it was legally ended. But you must leave the property in good condition, except for the conditions under dispute. Don't withhold the last month's rent because you think the deposit will cover it. The landlord can sue you for three times the amount of rent withheld.

To receive the deposit refund, provide your forwarding address in writing. If neither the refund nor itemized list of charges is provided, you can sue for the deposit and attorney's fees.

1/2 teaspoon salt

Grated rind of 1 medium orange (about 1 tablespoon)
2 large eggs
1 tablespoon orange juice
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar mixed with 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons butter, melted

Stir together flour, baking powder and salt. In the large bowl of an electric mixer, cream 1/2 cup butter with 1/2 cup sugar and the orange rind; beat in eggs well, one at a time, then orange juice. Add flour in 3 additions alternately with milk, beating just until smooth. Turn into a buttered 9 by 9 by 1 1/2-inch baking pan. Sprinkle with sugar-cinnamon; drizzle with melted butter. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean — 30 minutes. Cut in squares in pan and serve warm.

Financial community reacting positively to First National Bank's planned changes

First National Bank said over the weekend it is taking steps to correct its financial and procedural problems.

Midlanders and investors seem to have reacted favorably to the bank's candor.

"The bottom line is, they're finally admitting they have a problem, and that is the first step toward solving it," said one local businessman.

There have been a lot of denials, but you can understand and appreciate that, too.

First National's board of directors and the Comptroller of the Currency signed a formal agreement to implement certain procedures and policies at the institution, according to Donald L. McCall, the bank's chief executive officer.

No details were given, but McCall

said First National has already met some of the stipulations in the agreement ahead of schedule.

The bank's actions are in response to a drop of nearly \$300 million in deposits and a rise in loan quality problems since last fall.

Some members of the bank's executive committee were in Washington, D.C., last week. Officials wouldn't confirm whether they went there to discuss the formal agreement with federal regulators.

Such an agreement is one of many steps the Comptroller may take to ensure sound banking practices are followed, according to Lee Cross, spokeswoman at the Comptroller's office in Washington, D.C.

"All enforcement agreements arise out of an examination of a bank, and thus, we cannot legally talk about specifics," she said.

Formal agreements can cover a range of banking subjects. The Comptroller can ask a bank to review its existing loan policy or

write a comprehensive new one, or hire specific kinds of personnel or change accounting procedures.

"A bank may not be having problems; its loan losses may not be high," Cross said, "but we are looking at the way management is set up."

The Comptroller may suggest some action be taken because it is concerned a bank's management system is not equipped to handle problems that might arise in the future, she said.

The most minor action is to issue what is known as a memorandum of understanding, in which the agency spells out what a bank should do to improve its operations.

A formal agreement, the type of document that has been issued to First National Bank, must be signed by the bank's directors. Although it, too, spells out specific procedural changes, it is slightly stronger than the memorandum.

The strongest action the Com-

troller may take, short of closing a bank, is to issue a cease and desist order. This is sometimes accompanied by civil penalties or fines, if wrongdoing has been found.

The bank also announced steps to improve its balance sheet. McCall said the board of directors will add \$40 million in capital through a common stock offering and debenture purchase later this summer.

The bank further said it entered into an agreement with several unnamed Texas banks to borrow up to \$250 million of funding if need be.

First National's announcement of a plan to improve its financial and procedural condition is seen by the investment community as a positive move which can enhance confidence in the bank.

John Blackwell, a broker in the Midland office of Rauscher Pierce Refsnes Inc., which trades FNB's stock, said Monday the bank's stock is stable. Not a lot of trading has

taken place.

"No one is throwing their stock on the market to sell; no one is scared. I think the whole thing sounds pretty positive," Blackwell said.

"It's definitely a positive move," said James Chaffee, president of Professional Asset Management Inc., a California-based firm which brokers large investor deposits to banks. PAM has brokered investors' deposits to First National Bank Midland, and other Midland banks, in the past.

It is one of several national firms that analyze banks based on their

financial call reports which are published quarterly. The firm advises institutional investors such as pension funds on where to deposit their money.

"From our clients' standpoint, we would not direct them to the bank until these things had been accomplished," Chaffee said.

In the first quarter 1983, ended March 31, the bank broke even and paid a 30 cents per share dividend to shareholders. McCall said it was unlikely FNB would issue any further stock dividends the rest of this year.

Senator would rather do nothing

WASHINGTON (AP) — A leading Senate advocate of expanded federal controls on natural gas said Monday he would rather do nothing to existing price ceilings than pass the Reagan administration's plan for full decontrol by 1986.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, called the existing Natural Gas Policy Act "the lesser of two evils," even though monthly gas bills to 45 million residential consumers rose an average 25 percent last year under the 1978 law.

Metzenbaum is co-sponsoring legislation that would extend the 1978 controls two years beyond their current expiration dates, 1985 and 1987, depending on the classification of the gas. He blamed "greed, avarice and monopoly" for forcing retail prices up despite a 15 percent supply glut.

But Sen. Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo., said the administration's proposal is the only measure that can increase competition and put downward pressure on the existing artificially high prices.

"Continued controls subsidizing the expensive and penalizing the efficient cannot benefit the consumer," Wallop said. "The debate should be

on how and how soon we decontrol, not whether it is done."

The two senators, both members of the Senate Energy Committee where the first round in the fight over natural gas legislation is taking place, debated the issue at the National Press Club.

Wallop blamed the 1978 law, under which controls on half the nation's gas supplies are gradually being removed while the other half remains under price ceilings forever, for distorting the market. Prices now range from 25 cents to \$10 for the same 1,000 cubic feet (mcf) of the fuel.

Under that law, "old" gas discovered before April 1977 is selling at an average price of \$1.25 per mcf while the average price for "new" gas from fields opened since 1977 is now about \$2.90.

However, many pipelines and the local utilities that purchase gas from them are locked into long-term contracts they signed in the late 1970s when there were severe shortages. The prices in many of those contracts are tied to the ceiling prices determined by inflation and the price of competing oil under the 1978 law.

The Senate committee three weeks ago

defeated on a 10-8 straw vote an effort by Metzenbaum to remove the decontrol of old gas from the panel's consideration in drafting a bill to be sent to the Senate floor.

Since then, the 20-member committee has been bogged down over provisions that would enable local utilities and industries to buy their gas directly from producers.

Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, the committee's chairman, hopes to bring that issue to a close this week. Immediately after that, the panel will again take up old gas, with an effort by Sens. Wendell Ford, D-Ky., and Henry Jackson, D-Wash., to strike the decontrol provision from the administration's bill.

Bentsen opposes rule change

WASHINGTON — A switch in Senate committee rules could affect the nation's chance to create more jobs, keep prices lower and sell more goods abroad, said Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D. Texas.

Appearing before the Senate Rules committee Monday the body that makes the operating rules for U.S. Senators, Bentsen fought against the proposal to abolish the Joint Economic Committee and merge its duties with the Senate committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs.

As former chairman of the Economic committee and a top ranking minority member now, Bentsen said such a change will deny the Congress its long-range study in ways to develop and

improve the nation's economy.

The Economic committee does not write laws but conducts studies and takes testimony and writes timely reports. The Banking committee writes legislation.

Bentsen when chairman of the Economic committee conducted numerous studies of ways to improve trade with Japan, how to sell more citrus and beef abroad, and ways to improve U.S. productivity and efficiency in manufacturing.

"The Banking committee will not have time to write laws and make these studies, too," he said. "By changing the committee assignments, we could find ourselves without the facts we need to find more jobs, to keep down prices and even to avoid higher taxation."

WINNIE, Texas (AP) — Gray dust coats everything on either side of Wilber Road. The only thing that distinguishes it from any other road jutting off from Texas 73, is a nondescript sign that says, "Entrance to SPR Big Hill Project." SPR stands for Strategic Petroleum Reserve. Trucks and bulldozers and other heavy equipment rattle more than five miles down this bumpy, dusty dirt and gravel road daily. The work has begun. The Big Hill Petroleum Reserve Project will be one of six sites nationwide that will eventually provide storage for 140 million barrels of crude oil in 14 caverns hollowed out of underground salt domes. The projects were approved by Congress in 1975 and initiated by the Department of Energy.

Judge drops rape charges against band

AYER, Mass. (AP) — Rape charges against four men associated with a rock band have been dropped, but a grand jury is continuing its investigation of the case, a prosecutor said.

Assistant District Attorney Anthony Pelusi asked Monday for a postponement of a probable cause hearing against the defendants, saying a grand jury investigation was continuing.

When Judge George A. Sullivan refused the request in Ayer District Court, Pelusi declined to prosecute and Sullivan then dropped the charges against the four men and returned their bail money.

Joseph Balliro of Boston, attorney for Corey W. Pirrotta, 25, lead singer in the band Grand Slam, accused prosecutors of legal maneuvering.

"There is no case pending," he said. "In 32 years of practicing law, I have never heard of an investigative grand jury being called in a rape case. It was an obvious attempt to deprive us of an opportunity in open court to confront" the alleged victim.

The three other defendants, all connected with the band, were Glen C. Little, 26, and John R. Fournier, 25, both of Newburyport, and Thomas J. Crowe, 24, of Salem, N.H.

Police reports alleged that an 18-year-old female soldier, who was not identified, accepted a ride back to Fort Devens aboard the band's bus after watching a performance at Franklin's Club in Shirley on the night of April 22.

Once aboard, the reports alleged, she was held down and raped repeatedly as the bus drove from Shirley to Ayer, a distance of about five miles.

IRS: Injured policeman must pay tax

WASHINGTON (AP) — A worker's disability benefits are subject to federal income tax unless they are paid solely for a job-related illness or injury.

The Internal Revenue Service ruled Monday that a New York City policeman who was injured in the line of duty three years ago must pay tax on his benefits. The reason: the compensation was paid under a union agreement that entitles policemen to benefits for any mental or physical injury or illness whether or not it was incurred in the line of duty.

The law exempts from taxation any benefits awarded under workers' compensation or under a statute in the nature of such compensation. But the IRS held that "a statute is not in the nature of a workmen's compensation act unless it limits benefits to instances of work-related disability."

Government auditors say the mortgage-revenue bond program for assisting homebuyers is less efficient

than other plans and that most of the money is going to people who probably don't need it.

The General Accounting Office, in a preliminary report on its investigation of the bonds, said that last year, the typical homebuyer benefiting from the bonds was an individual or two persons between the ages of 20 and 35 with an income of \$20,000 to \$40,000. "Fifty-three percent of the subsidized borrowers were among the more-affluent half of the families in their states."

Although one-quarter of the benefits went to those with incomes of less than 80 percent of the median, "three-quarters of the buyers had incomes above \$20,000 and could likely have purchased homes anyway," GAO said.

"A direct subsidy program (providing a one-time grant of \$3,400 to help obtain a mortgage) providing the same number of loans could have been funded for about \$680 million — a savings of about \$2 billion," the report said.

State or local agencies issue the

tax-exempt bonds to finance mortgages at below-market rates for first-time homebuyers.

The IRS analyzed the tax returns of 381 cab drivers in the Las Vegas area and found they averaged tips of 15 percent of their fares. As a result, three cabbies who reported smaller tips have been billed for additional taxes and hit with a penalty for negligence as well.

Leroy E. Nichols reported no tips, saying he just included them as part of his fares. Michael D'Errico reported tips of 4.9 percent. Nello D. Petrichella reported 5.1 percent tips, but admitted he kept no daily records.

The drivers rejected the IRS findings and sued in Tax Court. The court sided with the IRS, saying there was no evidence the cabbies got below-average tips.

An American who has lived in England since the age of 9, is married to an Englishwoman and who has a son born in England may not

claim the son as a dependent.

In a private ruling, IRS said a child born abroad to an American parent married to a foreigner is a citizen only if the American lived in the United States for at least 10 years, including five or more years before he was 14.

A person who disagrees with an IRS bill for additional taxes may delay paying by filing suit in Tax Court — but the suit must be filed within 90 days after IRS mails the notice.

Kenneth H. Winchell of Breckenridge, Colo., shipped his suit on the 90th day, and to make sure it arrived at the court on time, used a private air-express service. But the service delivered it to the court on the 91st day.

The court threw out the suit. But it noted that if Winchell had only used the U.S. mail, the letter could have been postmarked on the 90th day and everything would have been in order, no matter when it reached the court.

Couple finds cute pet turns into real hog

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — The Campbells thought they had a dream come true in Otis — a pint-sized pet who was intelligent, sanitary and affectionate. But as he got older, Otis turned into a real hog.

When Jack and Shari Campbell bought Otis as a piglet two years ago, they were told he would never weigh more than 120 pounds because of selective breeding of his ancestors.

So much for genetic research. Otis' exact weight is unknown, but 300 pounds would be a conservative estimate.

"We thought he would be perfect," said Mrs. Campbell, remembering young Otis. "At 120 pounds, Otis would not have been much larger than a good-sized dog."

"He was going to be a house pig," she said. "We thought it would be great to let him jump into the car and go to the beach with us."

For the first months Otis lived with the Campbells, they thought they were in hog heaven. Otis was cat-box trained, learned commands quickly and became the darling of the couple's two daughters.

Then problems grew as fast as Otis' expanding waistline. "The first time we tried to take him to the beach, we weren't even halfway there when Otis got so car-sick we had to turn around and come home," Mrs. Campbell said. "It's just no fun to have a pig get sick in your car."

After that, Otis was banished to a dog kennel when the Campbells left town.

"Otis kind of liked going to the kennel," she said. "He'd swagger through the door like he was the Fonz. He acted like he owned the place. The poor dogs were terrified

of him, and he really loved making them yelp."

But Otis' ballooning figure, perhaps the result of a thyroid condition, eventually put an end to his kennel visits.

"He just got too big for the exercise area," Mrs. Campbell said. "His body got too long, and because pigs' backs are kind of rigid, he couldn't turn around between the fences."

So Otis found himself confined to the Campbells' yard, where he took up a new hobby — rooting.

"He'll shove his snout down until the dirt comes up to his eyes and just move through a whole field that way," Mrs. Campbell said.

The talent is wonderful for truffle hunting but terrible for lawns. The Campbells had to cover their side yard in concrete.

Otis' size led to additional problems. Mrs. Campbell said her husband became embarrassed at being seen with the animal and stopped taking him for walks. The chore fell to Mrs. Campbell.

"We were so tied down," she said Monday. "We couldn't go the beach for a day or a weekend. We finally had to say, 'He's important, but so are our children.'"

The Campbells decided against asking for their \$250 purchase price back. "I'm not the type of person to make a real big deal about it," Mrs. Campbell said. "He's really neat. Pigs are so much smarter than a dog. They're very human-like, and we're attached."

Instead, the family decided to give Otis to someone who would promise not to carve him up for pork chops.

"It's hard with a pig," Mrs. Campbell said. "With a dog, you know no one's going to eat him. With a pig, that's a free dinner."

Justice criticizes delays in death penalty cases

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP) — States should "abolish capital punishment" if the courts and Congress cannot eliminate prolonged delays between sentence and execution, says U.S. Supreme Court Justice Lewis F. Powell.

Addressing judges from the 11th U.S. Judicial Circuit, Powell warned Monday against any "rush to judgment in capital cases," but criticized the use of "repetitive review to draw out for years the resolution of issues that have or should have been resolved earlier."

"This malfunctioning of our system of justice is unfair to the hundreds of persons confined anxiously on death row. It also deserves the public interest in the implementation of lawful sentences," he said.

"Unless the courts — and Congress — discharge their duty to move effectively to address this problem, the legislatures of the several states should abolish capital punishment," Powell said.

"It seems to me that courts themselves...often contribute to the slowness of the process," he added. "We now have more than 1,000 convicted

persons on death row, an intolerable situation."

Sen. Howell R. Heflin, D-Ala., a former Alabama Supreme Court chief justice, told the conference that Congress was discussing ways to reduce case loads in the federal judicial system.

One proposal now before Congress would create a temporary tribunal to handle some work which now goes to the Supreme Court, he said. Another would change federal civil and criminal practices to allow judges to curb abusive delays by lawyers.

"We do have a lot of problems in our courts today (but) I believe, in the long run, we'll come out," Heflin said. "There is no doubt there is a great need for relief on the U.S. Supreme Court."

Another speaker, Chief Justice John C. Godbold of the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, said state courts often have been blamed for most of the delays.

Courts must show "full and due regard" for the rights of convicted defendants, for the states' interest in enforcing their laws and for the interests of the public, he said.


