Wilson Church Of Christ Meeting To Open Friday, July 27

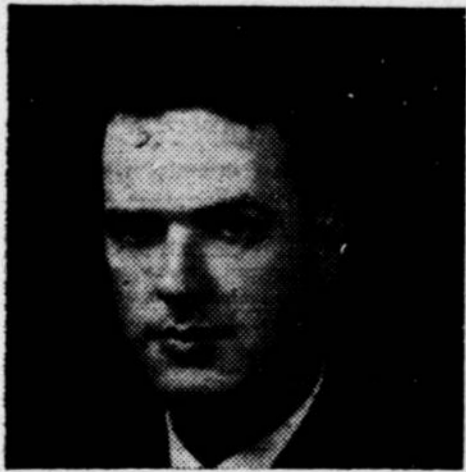

Entering the service May 9, 1945 Pvt. L. I. Dean Jr., the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. I. Dean Sr., who reside in Midway Community, is presently stationed at Camp Hood where he is attached to the Infantry. Before entering the service Pvt. Dean made his home in this city and for 2 1-2 years was employed at the Cope Butane Supply Company. His wife and two children, Johnny Mac and Beverly Ann, make their home here. They recently visited Pvt. Dean at Camp Hood. The twenty-nine year old Infantryman attended Lamesa High School.

The local Home Demonstration Council is sponsoring a drive to collect waste paper. They are asking every citizen in the county to save all their scrap paper and to help with the collection of it.

Mrs. C. F. Gowen will keep the building located just inside the Fair Grounds open every Saturday afternoon from 3 to 6 o'clock and community leaders may take their paper there and leave it.

There will be a trailer on the Courthouse lawn throughout the day on Saturdays, and individuals who have bundles of paper will take it to the trailer each Saturday.

Merchants in Lamesa are being asked to save their paper and cardboard boxes separately from the other rubbish. Mrs. C. F. Gowen, chairman of the City Paper Collection Committee, is making plans with the City Council and Grady Harp to collect it.

A contract has been made with the American Paper Stock Company in Dallas to buy all the paper collected in carload lots through September 15. If there is still a demand for waste paper a new contract will be signed after that date.

Waste paper is wanted in four different kinds of bundles, including miscellaneous waste paper in boxes or bundles, newspapers in bundles, magazines in bundles and corrugated boxes in bundles. Mrs. J. H. Adkins, general chairman of the committee suggests the following directions to be followed as the paper is saved:

Waste basket paper including wrappings, envelopes, etc., should be flattened and packed in a box or tied securely in a bundle so that it can be carried. The council does not want bundles of paper dumped on the Courthouse lawn. They request that you do not bring bundles to the courthouse except on Saturdays, as there will be no one to care for them.

Newspapers should be folded flat and tied in bundles about 12 inches high.

Magazines and books should be tied in bundles about 18 inches high, so they can be easily handled for collection.

Corrugated boxes, brown wrapping paper and paper bags, should be flattened out and tied in bundles 12 inches high.

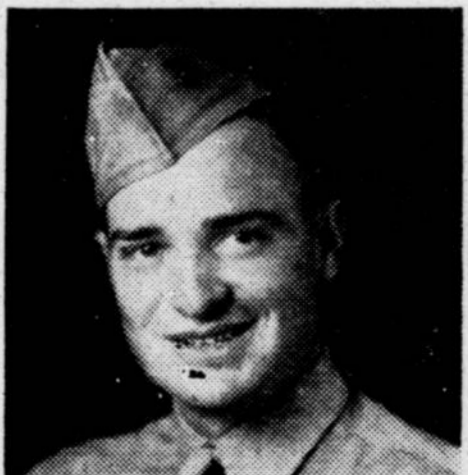
1946 Car Permits To Be Granted After Quotas Are Set

Pvt. Loyd C. Hall, Back After 38 Months In Italy

MIAMI, FLORIDA — Texas can get out the red plush carpet. More of her native fighting sons are headed home after being flown by Air Transport Command from far-flung battle fronts.

They were among the 50,000 ATC fliers coming from overseas each month, the majority of whom land at ATC's Miami Army Air Field. Spending less than a day at the base, they are taken by rail to Camp Blanding, Florida. Their next step toward home is a reception center for separation from the service or furloughs prior to reassignment.

Latest Texas returnees through ATC's Caribbean Division hub included Pvt. Loyd C. Hall, 32, who spent 38 months in Italy where he served with a medical detachment.

L. Johnson, M.M. 2-C Back From Combat Duty In The Pacific

Lawrence Alfred Johnson, 25, machinist's mate, second class, USNR, of Welch, who has been on a destroyer recently returned from a long tour of combat duty in the Pacific. Johnson participated in the bombardment of Kiska and Marshalls, Truk, Ponape, Gilbert Islands, Palau, Okinawa, Formosa, Bonins, Marianas and Leyte and Lingayen operations.

Johnson is married to the former Virgie Rogers of Welch. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Johnson. They have another son, John Leonard Johnson who is a machinist's mate, first class, in the Navy.

S-Sgt. L. Jackson Is Awarded The Bronze Star

S-Sgt. Lewie E. Jackson of the Cavalry in the United States Army, and a former resident of Borden County, was recently awarded the Bronze Star Medal at his overseas station. The award was presented him for heroic achievement in action.

The citation, accompanying the award is as follows: Lewie E. Jackson, staff sergeant, Cavalry, United States Army. For heroic achievement in action on 16 April 1945 to 19 April 1945, from Barchetta, Italy to Mt. Arnigo, Italy. On numerous occasions Staff Sergeant Jackson voluntarily exposed his tank to enemy fire to deliver supporting fire to our Infantry. At one time his tank was hit three times by heavy artillery. Although the tank was hit hard, Staff Sergeant Jackson still drove forward, laying down heavy fire and knocked out numerous pillboxes. The superior action on the part of Staff Sergeant Jackson aided materially in the capture of Mt. Arnigo, his objective. Staff Sergeant Jackson's courage under fire and indomitable fighting spirit reflects great credit on himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. He entered military service from Gail, Texas.

S-Sgt. Bill Suggs, Twice Wounded, Back In States

S-Sgt. William (Bill) E. Suggs, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Suggs of Welch, twice wounded veteran of the Pacific, has returned to the States after serving overseas 17 months.

A member of the 151st Infantry, S-Sgt. Suggs was wounded on Luzon, Philippine Islands, June 16th, and was again wounded eleven days later, suffering from injuries received in his right leg below the knee.

The 21 year old Infantryman arrived at Hamilton Field, California, on July 4. From there he was transferred to William Beaumont General Hospital in El Paso, arriving there July 12.

S-Sgt. Suggs entered the service 22 months ago. He was promoted on May 1, of this year from sergeant to staff sergeant.

A brother, Pvt. James A. Suggs also a member of the Infantry died of wounds on Cebu Island in the Philippines March 28. Pvt. Suggs had gone overseas on December 30, 1944 after entering the service July 10 of that year. He was 19 years of age.

Both boys were former members of the Welch String Band.

Mr. Gibbs was born January 1, 1892 in Hilton. A veteran of World War 1, and a member of the American Legion, he was residing on Route 2 in this county at the time of his death. He farmed while making his home here.

He is survived by his widow, and two children, Margaret and Billie Frank. Others surviving include one brother, George Gibbs and two sisters, Mrs. Henry Gleason and Mrs. Paul Gleason of Hermleigh.

Mrs. Gaines and daughter are at home now at 906 North Third Street.

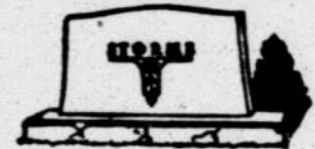

S-Sgt. Goodgion Air Vet, Now At Lubbock Station

S-Sgt. Eddie W. Goodgion, the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Z. Goodgion, who reside on Route 3 in this county, is among the nine boys from the South Plains area who are combat returnees now stationed at South Plains Army Air Field.

S-Sgt. Goodgion was in combat 10 months with the Eighth Air Force in England and was awarded the Air Medal and four clusters for his 30 missions.

The South Plains Army Air Field is a new installation of the Air Technical Service command, where B-17 Flying Fortresses back from pulverizing Germany, vie for the romance of war only with the men who manned their guns.

The personnel at the field has the job of preparing for storage the big planes and keeping them in condition to fly to combat again if needed. Retraining for another type of work is another objective in stationing the gunners at the base. When the men arrive, they are asked to name their job preference, then, as nearly as possible, they are given their chosen work.
