618 Cars Checked By State Highway Patrol Safety Unit

The Texas Highway Patrol Safety Unit, which was in Lamesa Monday, June 7, checking the automobiles of residents of this territory for defects that might cause an accident.

Six hundred and eighteen automobiles went through the inspection and of that number 408 passed the tests, OK, while 210 were found defective.

Of those that were found defective 133 of them had bad brakes, 9 had defective mufflers, 57 defective lights, 46 bad horns, and 76 defective windshield wipers. In other words several of the defective cars had more than one thing wrong with them. Of the 210 cars given the red tags 90 came back for a recheck after having the defects corrected, while 119 failed to get back for the recheck. These persons are requested to get their cars fixed at once and then report to Chief of Police Jack Phinizy, who is authorized to remove the red danger tags and give them a safety certificate.

The unit showed pictures stressing the need of greater highway safety to a combined meeting of the Lamesa Lions Club, the Lions Club, and the Rotary club at twelve o'clock at the Plaza Hotel. The pictures were then shown to an estimated crowd of 500 at the Majestic Theatre beginning at 2 o'clock.

Members of the Highway Patrol Safety Unit were: Hammett Vance, in charge of the Safety Unit Work for Texas Highway Patrol; Sgt. Ross Dick, who had charge of the showing of the pictures; Tom Tidmore, Austin; L. P. McCasland, J. C. Ferguson, Weldon Lawson, W. C. Renfro, all of Lubbock; Elton C. White and M. D. Reed, both of San Angelo.

Mr. Vance requested that we extend the thanks of the entire unit to the local peace officers, to the citizens and automobile drivers, for their wholehearted support and cooperation in this work of Highway Safety. He urged that every one think, talk and practice safety, that we might stop this sudden death and massacre on the highways of our State.

Farm Payments Total \$243,039 for County

With the payments under the 1936 Agricultural Conservation Program nearing completion, the Texas Triple A force has certified for payment to the General Accounting office 1,043 Dawson county applications, totaling \$243,039.40, according to Joe C. Williams, county agricultural agent. A total of about fifteen hundred farms have earned payments in this county.

Total payments for the state are expected to be slightly in excess of 33 million dollars. To date the Texas office has certified for the payment of 192,829 applications totaling \$32,482,415.53, figures released by Geo. Slaughter, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee, show.

Start Topping Stanton Highway This Week

Work will probably start this week on placing of the topping on the Stanton Highway on the four mile unit starting at the bridge across Sulphur Draw near the city limits of Lamesa. This four miles of highway has been recently graded up and a high type of caliche base laid. Work has been started on the second four miles, but workmen are being delayed due to the lack of a suitable caliche pit.

The building of this 15 miles of road is a Dawson county sponsored WPA project and when this and Highway 15 are completed, with the already paved Highway No. 9 will give Dawson county three all-weather highways running in every direction from Lamesa.

Lamesa To Make Application For New State Hospital

The City of Lamesa is this week making application to the State Board of Control for the new West Texas State Hospital for the Insane, which will be located in some town west of the 100th meridian.

A committee composed of J. E. Barron, chairman, M. C. Lindsey, Carl Rountree, Sam Richardson, and A. G. Bearden, has been authorized to secure an option on the required land for the site of the institution, and a brief of the advantages offered by Lamesa is being prepared and will be filed with the official application.

To date the committee has not secured a favorable site, which the State requires must contain 300 to 500 acres of land and not be over six miles from town, and where lights, gas and water can be secured.

Lubbock, Big Spring, Colorado City, Sweetwater and Lamesa are all sending in applications for the institution, but it was pointed out by the leaders here in the fight for the institution that Lamesa is more centrally located for the territory to be served, and that the requirements for the location of the hospital can be met, and many additional advantages can be offered.

Recreational Facilities Of County Discussed at Meeting Tuesday

A group of interested business men met in a call meeting on Tuesday afternoon of this week at the Chamber of Commerce office to discuss the recreational facilities of Dawson county.

The group discussed at length the securing of a lake for Dawson county. A committee was appointed with Mr. C. Baldwin as chairman, to further investigate the Evans lake site, 10 miles north and 3 miles east of Lamesa. This project has been discussed here for the past several years, and if the site can be leased from the Evans estate would make a worthwhile lake for fishing and camping for the citizens of this county.

The City Commission was asked to make improvements at the present City Park west of town, and they were also requested by the group to purchase additional grounds near the park. The commission expressed their thanks to the group for their interest and promised that the matter would be looked in too.

The improving of the soft ball grounds was also discussed at the meeting. The old ball park site just south of the CCC camp has been secured as a site, with lights to be installed for night games, and other improvements to be made.

More Rain and Hail For Dawson County

Approximately one inch of rain was received in Lamesa Monday evening of this week, some hail accompanying the rainfall.

According to all information reaching this office considerable damage was done by hail in the northern part of the county. The hailstones in some localities reaching the proportions of baseballs, it is said.

Rain south of Lamesa did not materially affect the freshly planted crops the rain in that section being somewhat lighter than that received in Lamesa and north.

Wheat harvest is expected to get underway this week, the weather permitting, with the yield expected to be somewhat above the average for this section. According to the best authorities, approximately 20 bushels to the acre is expected to be the average yield.

Continued rainfall is delaying the planting of crops in some parts of the county with dry weather and plenty of sunshine much in demand. As far as it is possible to determine every portion of the county has had a sufficient amount of moisture and farmers are now wanting it to clear up and let them get caught up with their planting. The abundance of moisture in the county during the planting season is considered unusual and the prospects for the 1937 crop are considered very promising.

Cyanide Plant Will Probably Locate In Dawson County

The American Cyanide Company of New York is contemplating the establishing of a \$250,000 plant for the mining of cyanide at the old Frost Lake located in the northern part of Dawson county, the proposed site being near the Lynn county line and is eight miles west of O'Donnell, and fifteen miles north of Lamesa, according to reports reaching Lamesa.

This is the project that Charley Doak of O'Donnell has been working on for years, and he has spent much time and money in impressing the possibilities of the enterprise upon the financial leaders in the north and east.

It is understood that the Cyanide Company has already purchased a quarter section of land in the north east corner of section 6 in this county, and have leased other land near the proposed plant site in Dawson county. Although Lynn County is asking the company to build the plant in Lynn county, it is thought by all local interested parties that the plant will be located on the Dawson county site, as the cyanide deposits are all on the Dawson county side of the line and are about one-half mile from the Lynn county line.

Other salts than cyanide are also said to exist in the lake in large and paying quantities, and it is believed by many that the possibilities of the project are great.

It has been reported that if the plant is established, the company contemplates the operation of four 20-ton trucks and the possible employment of as many as 135 men working in three shifts of 45 men each.

S. L. Donnell Passed Away Last Saturday

S. L. Donnell, aged 75 years, passed away at his home here on last Saturday, June 5 from an illness of several weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. Donnell had been residents of Lamesa for about a year, moving into town from the Richardson community. Mr. Donnell was a member of the Methodist church joining that union in 1887.

This well is approximately 3 miles west and one mile north of the Ray A. Albaugh et al No. 1 John Robinson, discovery well for the county. The new well has been spudded to a depth of about 100 feet and rotary equipment is expected to be installed in the near future and drilling resumed.

Standard tools have been installed at the E. L. Wilson et al No. 1 Texas Land and Mortgage Co., well located on section 45, block M, E. L. & R. Ry Co., survey, replacing the rotary equipment that has been in use. Drilling has been resumed and a depth of approximately 4800 feet has been reached according to reports.

At the present according to information reaching this office, tools have been lost in the well, and a fishing job is underway.

The Albaugh et al No. 1 John Robinson well is shut down waiting on the installation of additional pumping equipment according to reports.

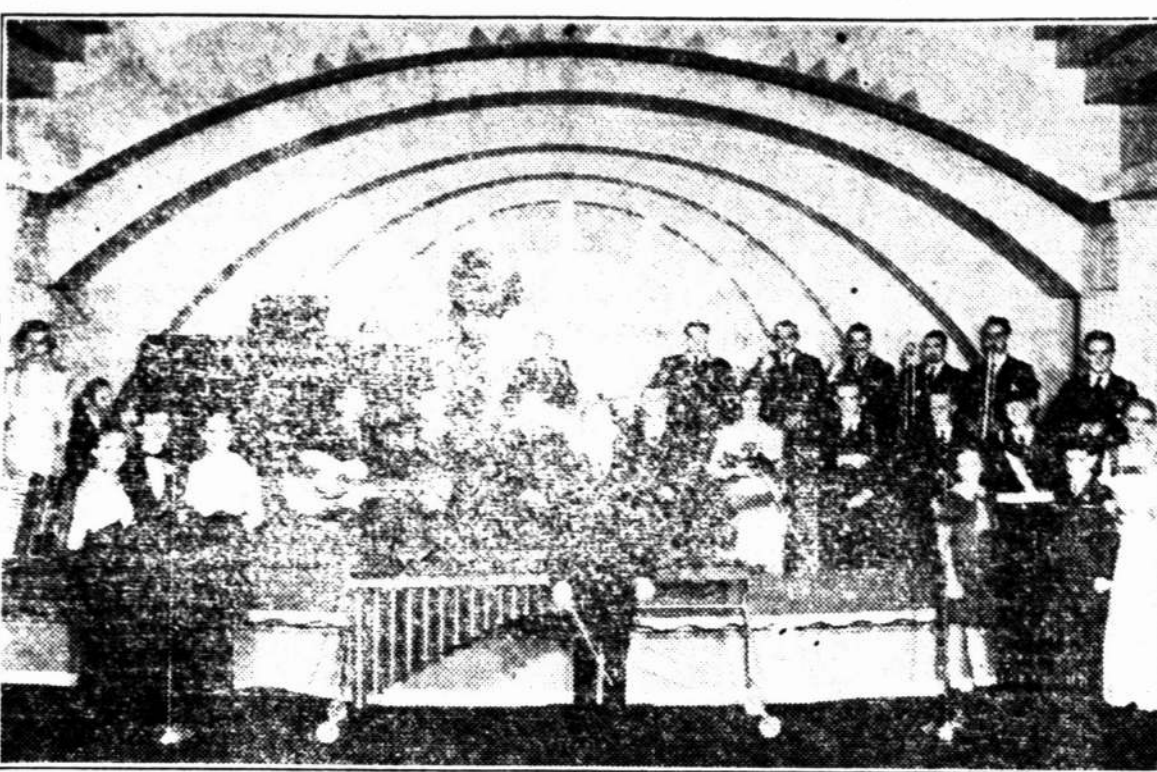

GULLIES PLAY LEADING ROLE IN FLOODS

Amarillo, June 9—"Gullies have played a leading role in the disastrous floods resulting from the heaviest rain fall in years in the Southern Great Plains Area," says R. C. Nelson, chief engineer for the Soil Conservation Service at Amarillo.

"Water that should have been held where it fell to provide moisture for a vegetative cover that would do much to eliminate the dust storms has found its way into gullies and then into the rivers," Mr. Nelson pointed out. "The result has been devastating floods that have washed out railroad and highway bridges, inundated towns and highways, with the carrying away of valuable top soil as the turbulent rivers sweep on toward the gulf. The very water that could have done so much good to farms and ranches has been allowed to do great damage in many areas.

The more gullies—wet weather tributaries—a stream has, the fewer perennial feeds and the more flash floods it is likely to have, the engineer explains. Gullies promote quick floods and on river systems that have a great many wet weather tributaries, as in this area, floods are likely to be more destructive than on river systems with spring fed brooks that flow the year round, he continues.

"It is the rainfall that sinks in, that supplies the springs and feeds the streams," Mr. Nelson says, and stresses the value of terraces, contour tillage, pasture furrowing and dams in holding the water where it falls, gully grows up. A little attention to start controlling a gully is before the gully grows up. A little attention to natural waterways in the early spring or late fall may save a big 'doctor's bill' later."

"In arid or semi-arid countries, or wherever gully treatment as such is seemingly unjustified, we are led to the conclusion that treatment should be made in the area contributing runoff of water to the gully in such a manner as to divert all possible runoff from the gully head before any attempt is made to control the gully itself," the engineer states.

"By this method," he continues, "it is possible to exclude enough runoff water from the gully so that small structures such as check dams will have some chance of success in the bottom of the gully. These structures can be built of temporary materials looking toward the collection of soil and moisture behind them sufficiently to justify subsequent shrub plantings such as black locust, tamarisk, and sand plums, thus allowing nature to assume its full share of responsibility in gully control and the ultimate curbing of disastrous floods such as have been experienced recently."

STAMFORD REUNION

JULY 1, 2, AND 3

Stamford, June 9.—Veterans of the range and trail who crowded the Indians and buffaloes from Texas plains are turning eager eyes toward Stamford as the time approaches for the annual Texas Cowboy Reunion on July 1, 2, and 3.

The round-up of pioneer cowboys and cattlemen to renew acquaintance, revive memories of the old west and keep alive customs and traditions of the early day cattle country is the original purpose for which the Reunion was organized in 1930.

The oldtime cowboys have their own organization, known as the Texas Cowboy Reunion Association, which holds its meetings each year as guests of the Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc. Membership in the Association, now numbering 1400, is limited to men who were actively employed on ranches 35 years or more ago.

Walt Cousins of Dallas, former West Texas cowhand, is president of the organization and will preside at the July meeting at which new officers will be elected. Chas. E. Coombes, Stamford, secretary, reports that 34 new applications for membership already have been received. Majority of the new registrants usually do not apply until a few days before the meeting. Payment of dues to date is on a par with last year.

Payment of the membership fee of \$1 a year is required before the coveted old time cowboy's badge is issued. The badge entitles the wearer to free admission to the cowboy rodeo with grandstand seat at all performances, a chuckwagon dinner at noon each day of the reunion, and admission to the cowboy square dance each night.

The oldtime cowboys have their own bunkhouse, a unique stone structure, engraved with scores of cattle brands. This building on the Reunion grounds serves as their headquarters and meeting place. Funds are being raised for enlarging this building. The fund now amounts to \$1,000 and two registered bulls will be sold at auction during the Reunion and the proceeds added to the bunkhouse fund. One of these bulls was donated by John M. Gist of Odessa, a past president of the old time cowboys, and the other by A. J. Swenson of Stamford, former treasurer. Other donors to the fund were T. J. Hendrick of Abilene, \$500, and the Texas Cowboy Reunion, Inc., an equal amount.

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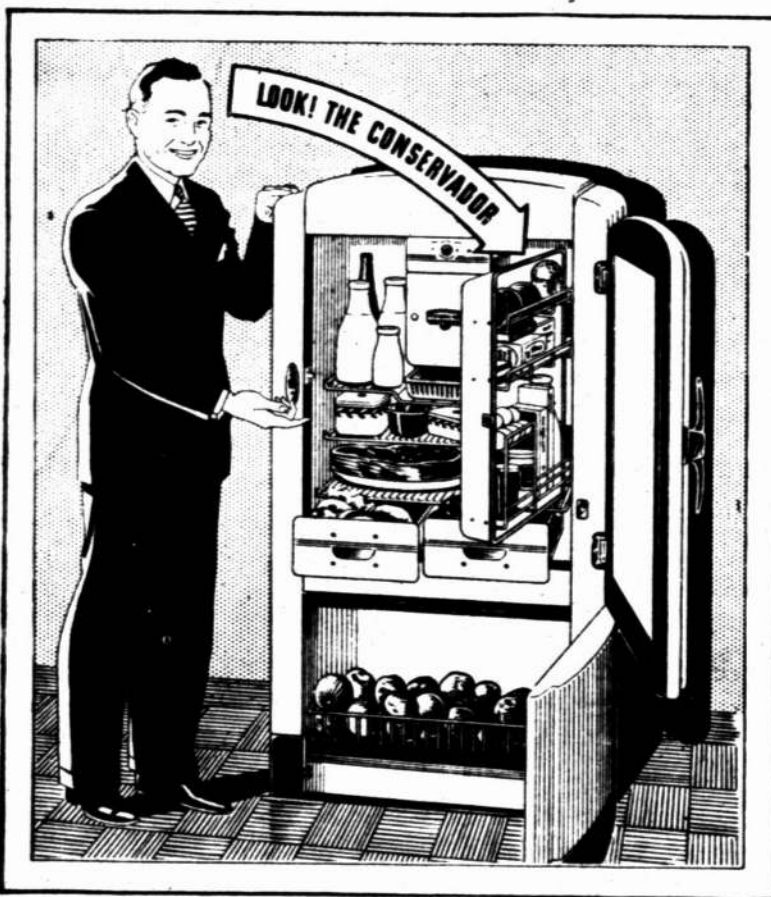

IMPORTANT TO SOCIAL SECURITY TAXPAYERS

Expressing the opinion that hundreds of taxable employers in this district still labored under the misapprehension that they were not subject to the taxing provisions of Title VIII of the Social Security Act and were not obligated to file Treasury Form SS-1, Collector of Internal Revenue, W. A. Thomas, today called attention to that section of the act which provides that "every individual" shall pay an income tax on wages and that "every employer" shall pay an excise tax on his employee's wages.

"Too many employers are confusing the provisions of Titles VIII and IX and think that because they do not employ as many as eight persons they are exempt from paying this tax," Mr. Thomas said. "This is not true. The Title VIII tax is due from every taxable employer and from his employee. It is due and payable monthly. The employer deducts one per cent of the employee's wages and adds another one per cent as his own share of the tax."

Drastic penalties, ranging from 5 per cent to 25 per cent of the tax due, will be imposed on the employers who willfully neglect to pay this tax monthly. Collector Thomas warned, pointing out that when an employer makes a deduction from the employee's taxable wages under the provisions of Title VIII he becomes the custodian of federal funds. The law also makes the employer liable for the employee's tax on all wages paid him whether he collect an officer or member of the crew of a vessel from his employee or not.

Another point Mr. Thomas stressed was that there are no provisions under Title VIII for state participation, consequently no deductions are allowed. Both employer and employee must pay their full and equal share of the tax, which is based on the employee's wages. "Some employers have made the mistake of sending in their Treasury Form SS-1 to cover a two or three month period," the Collector said. "This is not correct. A separate return must be made for each month based on the wages paid in that calendar month. The bureau will not accept accumulated returns."

Some employers, the Collector explained, are of the opinion that if the employee has no Social Security number they are not required to pay the tax assessed against both. This is not so. The employer must pay the full tax regardless of the employee's failure to produce a number. All employers should obtain the account number of each employee whether he be a new or old addition to the pay roll. In the event the employee shows no disposition to get a number, the employer at the time he files his Treasury form SS-1 should add to that return Treasury form SS-5 in behalf of his reluctant employee.

Collector Thomas said much needless correspondence between the taxing employer and his office could be avoided if the employer took great care to

sign that space in form SS-1 denoting his title. Only an officer or a member of the firm or one with a power of attorney may sign in that space. Too many employers whose payments are over ten dollars fail to obtain a notary's signature and seal on form SS-1 using instead the unworn signature of two persons. This last method of attesting is available only to those whose employee-employer tax is ten dollars or less.

In the language of the act, those employers and employees who are exempt from the taxpaying provisions of Title VIII are as follows:

Agricultural labor; domestic service in private home; casual labor not in business; service performed by an individual who has attained the age of the course of the employer's trade or sixty-five years; service performed as an officer or member of the crew of a vessel documented under the laws of the United States or of any foreign country; service performed in the employ of the United States Government or of any instrumentality of the United States; service performed in the employ of a state, a political subdivis-

ion thereof, or an instrumentality of one or more states or political subdivisions; service performed in the employ of a corporation, community chest fund or foundation, organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational purposes, or for the prevention of cruelty to children or animals, no part of the net earnings of which inures to the benefit of any private shareholder or individual.

SCS WILL COOPERATE ON LABOR SHORTAGE

Amarillo, June 10.—With a shortage of farm labor in some localities being indicated as the wheat harvest gets under way in the southern part of the High Plains and row crop planting starts, the Soil Conservation Service of Region Six has announced a plan to cooperate in meeting the situation.

Managers of the 26 erosion control areas in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, and New Mexico are being instructed to advise all their employees who are on a daily or hourly wage basis not to decline offers of private employment where their services will aid in the carrying on of seasonal farm operations.

B. W. McGinnis, associate regional conservator, announces that all such project employees, including tractor and truck drivers, will be released from duty in order to take advantage of opportunities offered. When such workers are released to accept private employment, it will be without prejudice to them in their present or future service on the project.

This action on the part of the Soil Conservation Service has resulted from the increasing demand for farm labor coming from individual farmers, Chambers of Commerce, the National Reemployment Service, Works Progress Administration and other organizations, Mr. McGinnis says.

MOISTURE CONSERVATION INCREASED 100 PER CENT

Dalhart, June 9.—Soil and water conservation practices in the heart of the dust storm region have increased moisture penetration one hundred per cent in furrows, tests made after the heaviest rainfall in this area within five years show, according to B. H. Hopkins, manager of the Soil Conservation Service project at Dalhart.

Moisture tests were made on the field of C. M. Peden, eight miles south of Conlen, following a 3.56-inch rainfall over a period of ten days and 65 hours after a 1.6 inch rain. Slope of the field is about 1.25 per cent.

Mr. Peden, who is a Soil Conservation Service cooperator, has chiseled his field on the contour between terraces, and a small strip through the center has been planted with a lister. Moisture penetrated to a depth of 35 inches in the lister furrows and 34 inches in the chiseled furrows.

On a nearby field, similar in all respects to Mr. Peden's land except that it had not been terraced or contoured, the moisture penetration was only 17 inches in the chiseled furrows.

Mr. Peden, who visited his field while the water was still running, says his terraces held all the water that fell in addition to a large amount of runoff water from adjoining pastures to the west and north.

He feels confident that the moisture stored in the soil will greatly increase his crop yield and aid in providing a vegetative covering that will resist wind erosion.

Attend Meeting in Big Spring Monday

A meeting was held in Big Spring Monday for the purpose of discussing the new proposed Farm Legislation which is now before Congress. C. H. Day, vice president of the Texas Agricultural Association, was in charge of the meeting.

In attendance were a large number of Dawson county farmers, which included a number of Association members. Among those present were: F. L. Grissom, Joe M. Peterson, Roy Truitt, T. D. Randle, J. W. Sharp, Walter Jones, J. W. Henderson, R. E. Echols, J. E. Towns, A. W. Matthews, V. F. Gordon, J. M. Barrett, J. M. Peterson, W. S. Ray, C. M. Burton, B. L. King, W. E. Hoskinson, and Joe C. Williams, county agent.

Mr. Day explained the various features of the bill.

"The provisions and principles of this new farm bill deserve the careful study and consideration of consumer, processor and producer of American agriculture," Mr. Day declared.

"The two fundamental purposes of

the bill are to protect the consumer and the producer of agricultural commodities against irregular fluctuation in prices and supplies.

"Stabilization of the corn and wheat supply would tend to provide ample livestock products, and consumers should have no fear of scarcity of meat and bread. This is possible through the ever-normal granary and soil conservation features of the proposed bill.

"The consumer would not expect these desirable guarantees against abnormal costs without giving the producer similar protection against unduly low prices for his products. It should be a partnership between consumer and producer. Out of this partnership the consumer is assured of food prices attuned to his income; and the producer is assured a system of loans to protect him against drastically low prices in years of excess production.

"At the present rate of cotton consumption," Mr. Day emphasized, "America can produce about 13 million bales of cotton without glutting the market with a large surplus. Loans would be made to cotton producers only in an emergency, for the reason that loans would not begin, under the proposed bill, until there is a real surplus. These loans could not be made at a rate above the world market, thus the system would not hamper America's export cotton trade because American as well as foreign buyers could buy at world prices. Under this plan, American manufacturers of cotton goods would be at no disadvantage against world manufacturers.

"The increase in price received by Texas farmers, by virtue of this plan would have a far-reaching effect on the increasing tenant problem, as well as affording farmers steady and PAR-

ITY buying power. This favorable effect on local and national business and industry would be a vital factor in preventing drastic fluctuations, up or

down, in industry and finance, as well as in agriculture.

"The bill also provides for soil-building payments but for no diversion

or soil-conserving payments. In lieu of the latter, however, the producer is guaranteed the difference between the average market price for wheat, cot-

ton, corn, rice, and tobacco and the adjusted PARITY price for his normal domestic and foreign supply of the commodities he produces for sale."

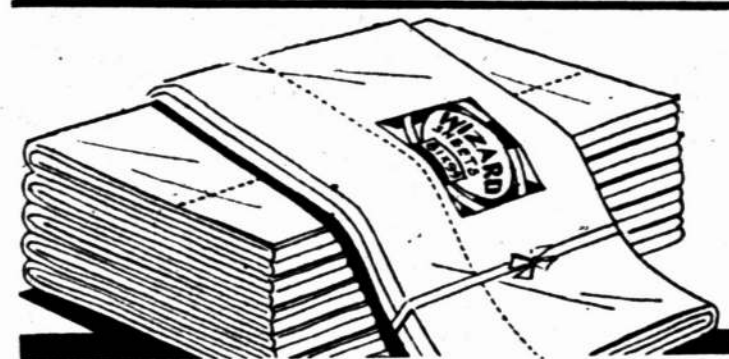

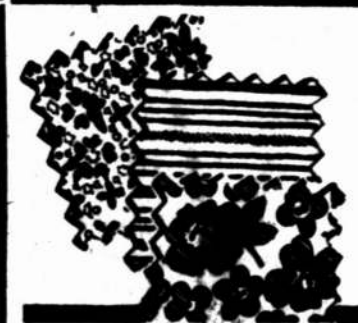

ADDITIONAL ROTC UNIT URGED FOR TECH

Washington, D. C., June 8.—Congressman George Mahon appeared last week before the Senate Appropriations Committee urging that funds and officers for an additional ROTC unit at Texas Technological College be provided. The item would be included in the War Department appropriation bill which is under consideration by the Senate Committee at this time. He had previously presented the matter to Major General E. T. Conley, Adjutant General of the Army.

Texas Tech was given a Senior Engineering ROTC unit last year, and the work which has already been accomplished has received high recognition by War Department officials. The report of the ROTC Inspector from Fort Sam Houston, headquarters for the Eighth Corps Area, made on March 1 this year, recommended that an additional unit be established at the College, preferably a Field Artillery unit. This type of unit would make the training available to about 1200 students of the college who are ineligible for training in the existing Engineering unit which is open only to engineering students.

The outcome of the matter will depend upon the disposition by the Senate and House of the proposed appropriation item for funds and personnel. The War Department advised Mr. Mahon that the Texas Tech application for such a unit was in excellent standing.

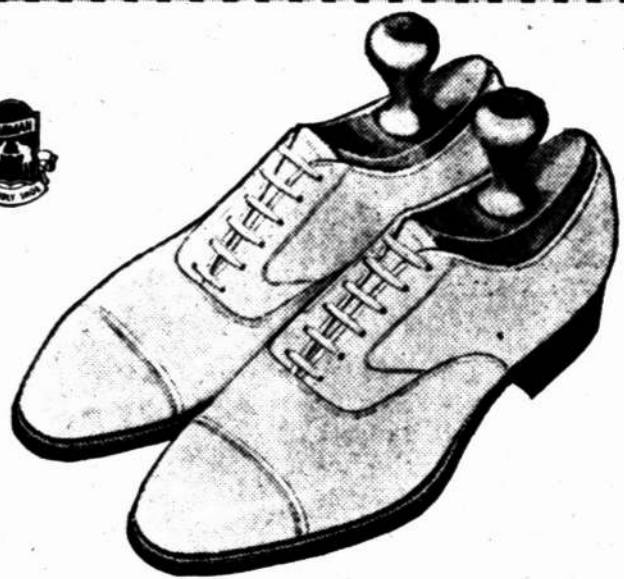

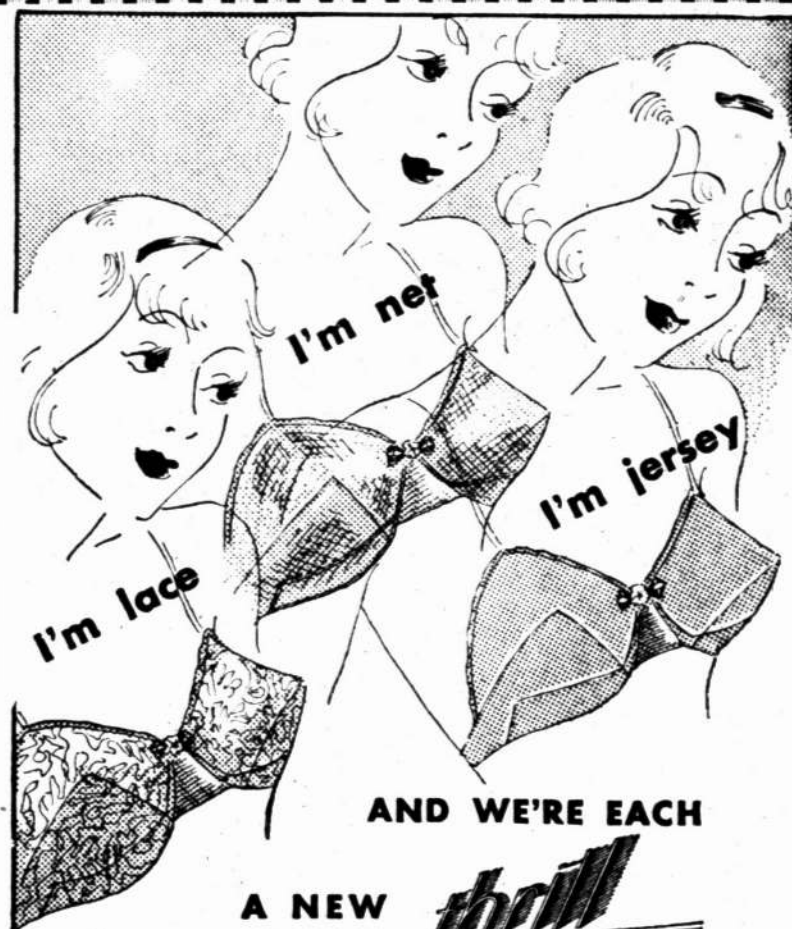

CONTOUR FURROWING OF PASTURES URGED

While there is ample moisture from recent rains is an excellent time to

contour furrow pasture, says Bernis W. Carmichael, Technician of the Lamesa Soil Conservation Camp.

Contour furrowing is beneficial regardless of the time of year when it is done, but is more effective when the grass has a chance to use the moisture stored in the soil, Mr. Carmichael points out. However, the work should be halted before the grass heads out to allow maximum seeding.

The furrows trap escaping rainfall allow it to soak into the soil, and almost always result in a thicker plant growth along the furrow. Mr. Carmichael says the Soil Conservation Service has found that shallow furrows close together are better than deeper furrows farther apart. More furrows mean a more even distribution of moisture and of the thickened forage crop.

Shallow furrows disturb the grass less in a permanent pasture, do not turn up the sub-soil, and are more easily crossed with farm machinery.

Deep furrows are more likely to cause gullies since the greater amount of impounded water sweeps out with increased force should a break occur in the ridge. With the deeper furrows, there also is danger of causing the water to penetrate to such a depth that it will be of no benefit to the grass roots, especially if the subsoil is gravel, Mr. Carmichael warns.

Small furrows about four inches deep, placed far enough apart to prevent overlapping of the furrow slice, and leaving an undisturbed strip of sod in between, are recommended. Vegetation takes hold more rapidly if implements are used that will allow pieces of sod to fall back into the furrow. The lister, with wings removed and the points clipped, may be used to get this result, Mr. Carmichael says.

Bleeding from an artery can usually be stopped by pressing with thumb at the spot where the artery crosses a bone. When bleeding is from a vein the flow of blood will be steady. The pressure must be made on the side away from the heart to stop bleeding from a vein. If the blow of blood is very slow, a compress placed over the wound may be sufficient. Only when these methods fail to check the hemorrhage should the use of a tourniquet be considered.

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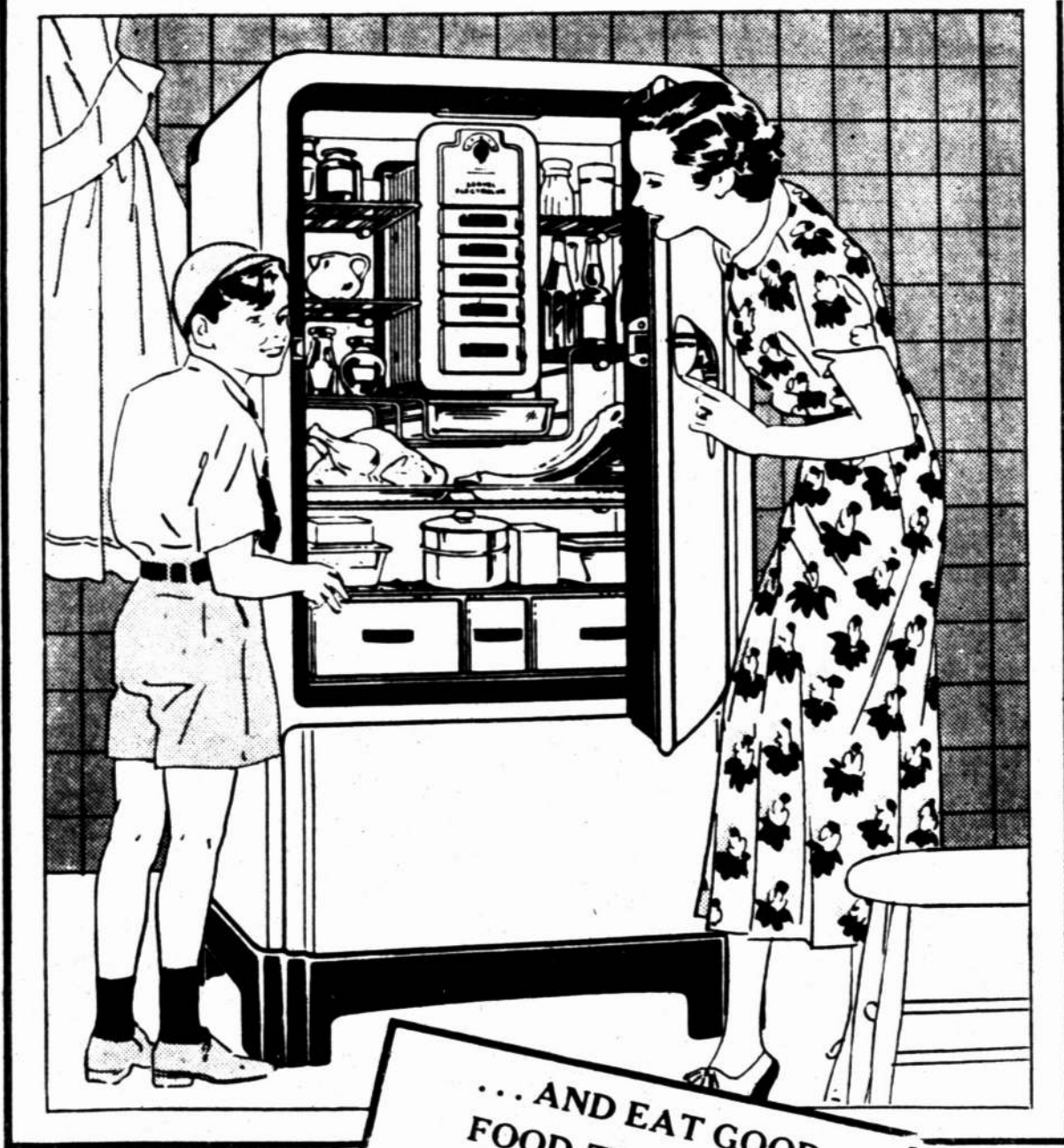

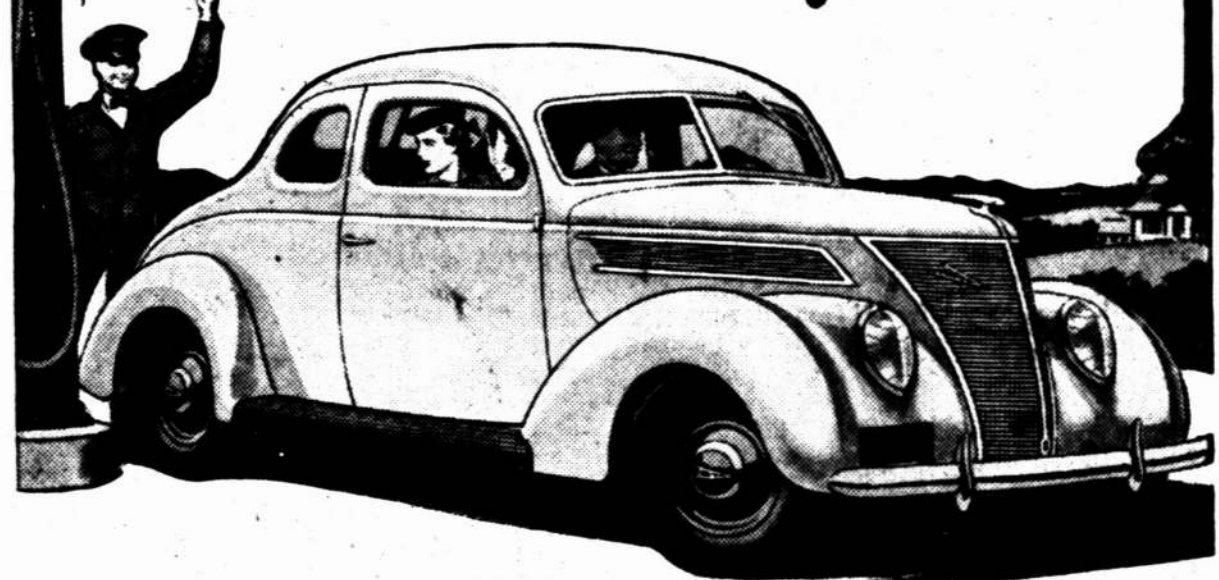

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to destitute children and for the payment of same not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) for one child or Twelve Dollars (\$12) for the children of any one family per month; further providing that the Legislature may impose such restrictions and regulations as to it may seem expedient; providing that the amount to be expended out of State funds in any one year for such assistance shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to destitute children; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall read as follows:
"Section 51d. Subject to the limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be provided by law, the Legislature shall have the power to provide for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years; such assistance shall not exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family; provided that the amount to be expended for such assistance out of State funds shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year. The Legislature may impose residential restrictions and such other restrictions, limitations, and regulations as to it may seem expedient."
"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial assistance to destitute children as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:
"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial assistance for such payment."
Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial assistance for such payment."
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required thereto.

Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.
Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor, and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:
"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment have write or have printed on their ballots the following words:
"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."
Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:
"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required thereto.

High waisted dresses, clinging jerseys, draping chiffons and all the others require smoothness; and if milady without benefit of girdle, will give herself a critical glance in a full length mirror, she will get that candid camera feeling.

Made of tropical cloth, cool nets, satin and elastic, and featherweight lastex, all without a single bone, these garments can be laundered easily and frequently. It's wise economy to buy two or three of them, thus lengthening the life of each.

The problem of smoothing out one's figure is usually one of redistribution, so care must be given to the selection of the type and style. A correctly fitted foundation garment will take away as much as three inches of unwanted girth at the right places. Measurements for fitting should be taken sitting down as well standing up, since the body has a spread of three inches when in a sitting position.
