## Big Gas Showing Made As Marland Test Is Shot Lubbock County Prisoners Captured After Jail Break

### Jailer Forced In Cell At Point Of Gun By Prisoners

J. B. Brown and Mrs. Bessie Tucker Enjoy Only Few Minutes Of Freedom In Sensational Break Here Inmates Held Up

Other prisoners refuse to take advantage of opportunity to gain freedom; held for forgery

Their sensational break for freedom ending about 10 blocks from the jail and a short while after they had risked every hope for leniency, J. B. Brown, sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary for forgery, and Mrs. Bessie Tucker, under grand jury indictment for forgery, this morning again look upon the world through the iron bars of the Lubbock county jail.

Friday afternoon about 4 o'clock, behind the mercenary point of a 22 calibre pistol, Brown held Jailer Will Earnest at bay while Mrs. Tucker took his gun, coat, hat and money, tied his hands behind him and stuffed a gag in his mouth. This done she headed the officer in a back cell on the second floor of the jail, held up the other prisoners, relieved them of their valuables and made their escape.

### Warning Given

"You are making a bad mistake," Earnest told the convict. "Don't make a single move," he replied. "I want my liberty, I've got to have it." And with this statement the pair disappeared.

Only a short time later they were recaptured six blocks north of the Santa Fe railroad on Avenue H. Slay Ashley and Policemen H. B. Brown and Walter Simmons located the pair after Ashley had watched them leave the jail.

### Bank Bandits Get Loot Of \$60,000

PERU, Ind., Oct. 18. (AP)—Bank bandits today robbed the First National bank of Peru of \$60,000 in cash and \$15,000 in securities, slightly wounded a policeman and a bystander and dashed out of town without a shot having been fired at them.

### New Plea Denied



NEW YORK, Oct. 18. (AP)—Charles D. Waggoner, above, Colorado banker sentenced to 15 years in Atlanta penitentiary for mail fraud, today in federal court lost a motion to withdraw his plea of guilty entered to the indictment on October 10. The court, however, took under advisement a motion to have the maximum sentence lowered.

### Workings Of Two More Big Liquor Syndicates Bared

Indictments Are Returned Against Forty-Two Alleged Members Of Rum Running Rings Fifteen Arrested

Undercover agents enjoy confidence of conspirators for nine months previous to arrests

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 18.—The workings of two huge liquor syndicates, centered at Detroit and serving New York, Chicago and intermediate points, were bared today by a federal grand jury which returned indictments against 42 alleged conspirators.

Fifteen of the 42 men mentioned in the indictments already have been arrested and released under heavy bonds, according to John R. Watkins, district attorney. All but eight of the alleged conspirators live in Detroit, the remainder being residents of New York, Chicago, Toledo and small towns in Ohio and New York.

### Two And Half Million Cubic Feet Of Gas Is Flowing After 'Shot'

Oil And Gas Are Sent Over Derrick With "Nitro" Blast

REPORTS at a late hour last night to the Morning Avalanche stated that the Marland Oil Company's No. 1 Slaughter test, located in Cochran county, five miles southwest of Lehman, was flowing two and one-half million cubic feet of gas following a shot of 140 quarts of "nitro" at 4:30 Friday afternoon.

The reports stated that the well, while not given an exact gauge was easily flowing two and one-half million and perhaps three million cubic feet. Further developments were not announced by officials of the company. The well now stands at 5,000 feet in depth and was shot yesterday afternoon at depth of 4,745 feet. The first shot of the well, made several weeks ago, was at a depth of 4,900 feet.

### Borger Quiet As Guardsmen Leave

Twenty-Day Housecleaning Comes To End As Martial Law Is Lifted; Rangers Remain In City

BORGER, Oct. 18. (AP)—Free from soldiers, after undergoing a 20-day tall housecleaning, Borger was singularly quiet tonight. The detachment of soldiers, sent here 20 days ago when Governor Moody decided to intervene to end a reign of lawlessness, were on their way to Fort Worth, their mobilization point. Eight state rangers remained behind to help the new county and city administrations under way, but all of the city and county offices were in the hands of civil authorities.

## Postponement Of Approval Sought

Oklahoma Governor Will Go To Washington In Effort To Delay Transfer Of Boundary Land

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 18. (AP)—Hoping to obtain postponement of approval by the United States Supreme court of a commissioner's report transferring approximately 2,000 acres of Oklahoma land along its western boundary to Texas, Governor W. J. Holloway and J. Berry King, attorney general, will leave here today for Washington to seek aid of government officials.

The delay is sought in order that state officials may further negotiate with Texas for purchase of the property.

Go To Washington

The chief executive determined to go to Washington after residents in the affected area called upon him with the request that he exert every effort to keep the land in Oklahoma and avert problems which would arise from the transfer. A re-survey of the 100th meridian would place in Texas a strip of land hitherto regarded as a part of Oklahoma, occupied by approximately 400 families. Postponement of approval by the court would be impossible unless both Texas and Oklahoma requested it, and Texas has refused to agree to the delay, Attorney General Mitchell said.

State Senator W. C. Austin of Altus, chairman of the Oklahoma legislative committee which has negotiated with Texas for purchase of the land, said today he considered the agreement of the Texas legislative delegation to place Oklahoma's offer before the Texas legislature an agreement to postpone approval of the commissioner's findings until the two states had worked out their problems.

## Tribesmen Attack French Soldiers

Fifty Killed And Twenty Wounded When Moorish Tribes Make Another Raid On French Legion

ORAN, Algeria, Oct. 18. (AP)—Moorish tribesmen have made another raid on French troops on the south slopes of the Atlas mountains, cutting up a column of the French foreign legion. Fifty legionnaires and native soldiers were killed and twenty-one wounded. The tribesmen left many dead on the field.

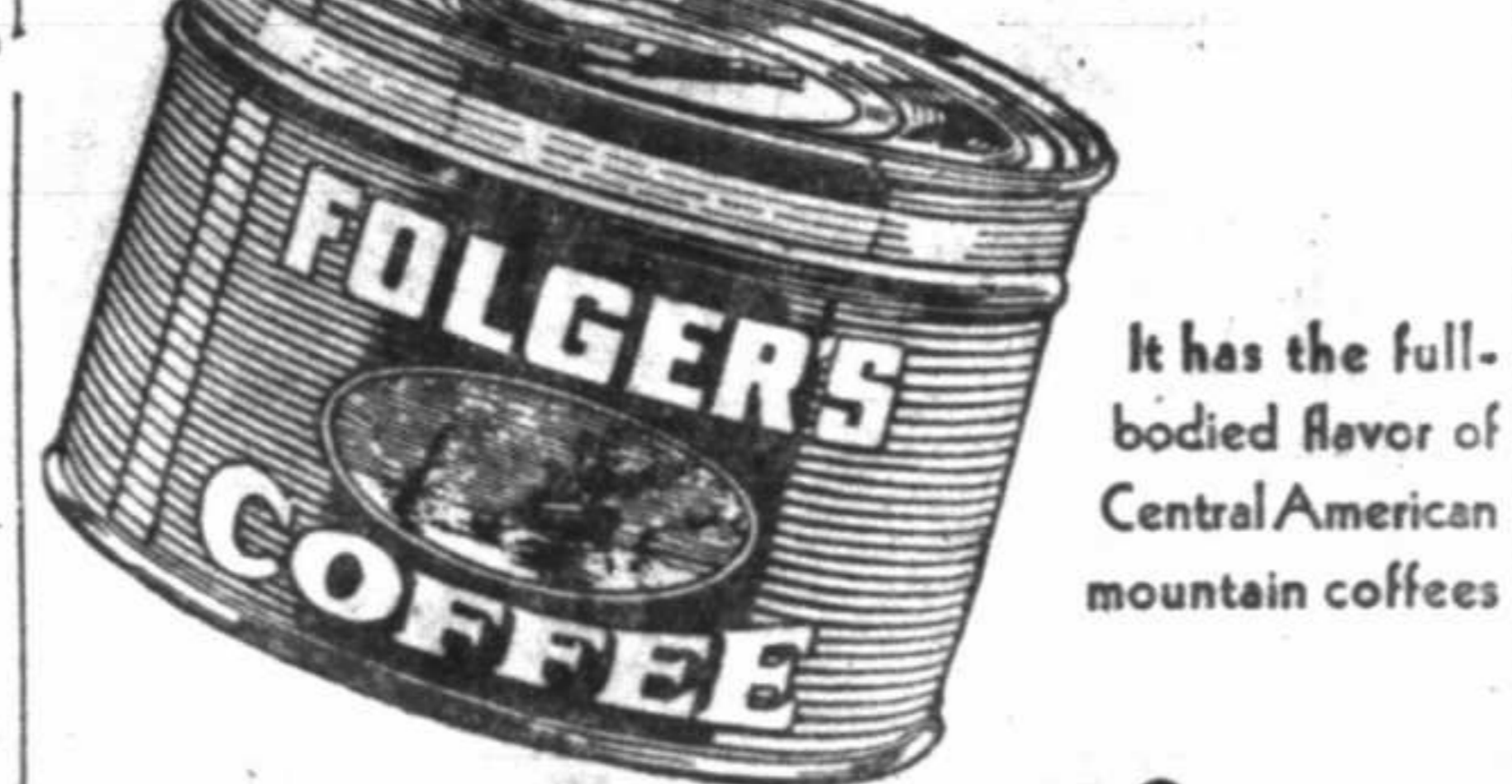
Attack Viewed

## Chinese National Troops In Mutiny

Foreigners Evacuate City And Go Aboard Japanese Gunboat Until Revolting Troops Are Driven Out

SHANGHAI, Oct. 18. (AP)—Advises from the city of Wuhu, in the province of Anhwei, today indicated some nationalist government troops had mutinied there this morning but were driven from the city. Latest reports said Wuhu was quiet and all the foreigners were safe.

It was authoritatively learned all foreigners, including about six Americans, evacuated the city and

went aboard the Japanese and British gunboats. The foreigners included 70 Japanese and 30 of other nationalities.

Authentic accounts of what took place at Wuhu indicated the trouble there started when the nationalist government attempted to disarm a contingent of troops belonging to Feng Chen-Wu, chairman of the Anhwei government. Feng had been disarmed by Nanking yesterday because of his doubtful allegiance. Feng's troops also were reported to have attempted to extort \$100,000 Mexican from the residents of Wuhu which was refused.

Troops Open Fire The troops opened fire on the city at three o'clock this morning and carried out looting to an extent not yet known. Nationalist government forces stationed in the city clashed with the revolters, and after a day of fighting and disorders drove

them from the city. Wuhu is only fifty miles from Nanking, and it was understood the Nanking government was rushing additional forces by motor trucks.

TO COST \$5,000,000 DALLAS, Oct. 18. (AP)—New lines which the Santa Fe wishes to build in Texas will cost approximately \$5,000,000, according to E. J. Engle of Chicago, vice-president of the road who passed through here on a tour of the road's lines in the southwest. The expenditure is dependent upon the attitude of the interstate commerce commission which has yet to approve the new projects.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18. (AP)—Chairman Caraway, of the senate lobby committee said today he had no intention of asking for prosecution in connection with any pos-

sible violation of law which might be involved through the employment by Senator Bingham, republican, Connecticut, of an official of the Connecticut Manufacturers association to advise him on tariff matters.

### National Defense Revision Sought

Chairman James May Draft New Army Air Expansion Program; Investigation Of Projects Looms

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18. (AP)—Looking toward a revision of the national defense act and the drafting of a new army air expansion program, acting Chairman James May today announced that he plans to institute investigations of those projects by the house military committee at the December session of congress.

James expressed confidence today that evidence gathered at hearings before the committee on the de-

fense act and the air program will result in a redrafting of the former and an expansion of the latter to meet conditions which have developed since they were adopted.

**Program Inadequate**  
Asserting that he believed the five year air expansion program was not adequate to meet modern advancements in aviation, James said the investigation would disclose whether "it is up to date," if not who is to blame for it, and how much money is necessary to bring it up to date.

Pointing out that the present air program was adopted in 1926 before Col. Charles A. Lindbergh and other aviators made their historic trans-oceanic flights, James said army experts then had taken the position that this nation was "on an air island and that it would be impossible for airplanes to fly across the Atlantic."

### Old Court Ruling Is Held Obsolete

Person Need Not Believe In Supreme Being To Be Competent Witness In Court, Judge Rules

CONCORD, N. C., Oct. 18. (AP)—Declaring a state supreme court decision of the past century obsolete, Judge A. M. Stack ruled a person need not believe in a supreme being to be a competent witness in a North Carolina court as the trial of four Gastonia cotton mill employes charged with the flogging September 9 of Ben Wells, communist and atheist, opened here.

Judge Stack's ruling was in var-

iance with recent holdings of two other state superior court jurists. Testimony of Wells was ruled out by Judge Thomas J. Shaw, superior court judge sitting as a magistrate in a preliminary hearing in the case.

**Allow Testimony**  
Under Judge Stack's ruling, Wells, if he can be located, will be permitted to testify against his alleged assailants. He was not present at the trial opened and court officers could not find him to serve a sub-

poena. He reported to have gone to New York.

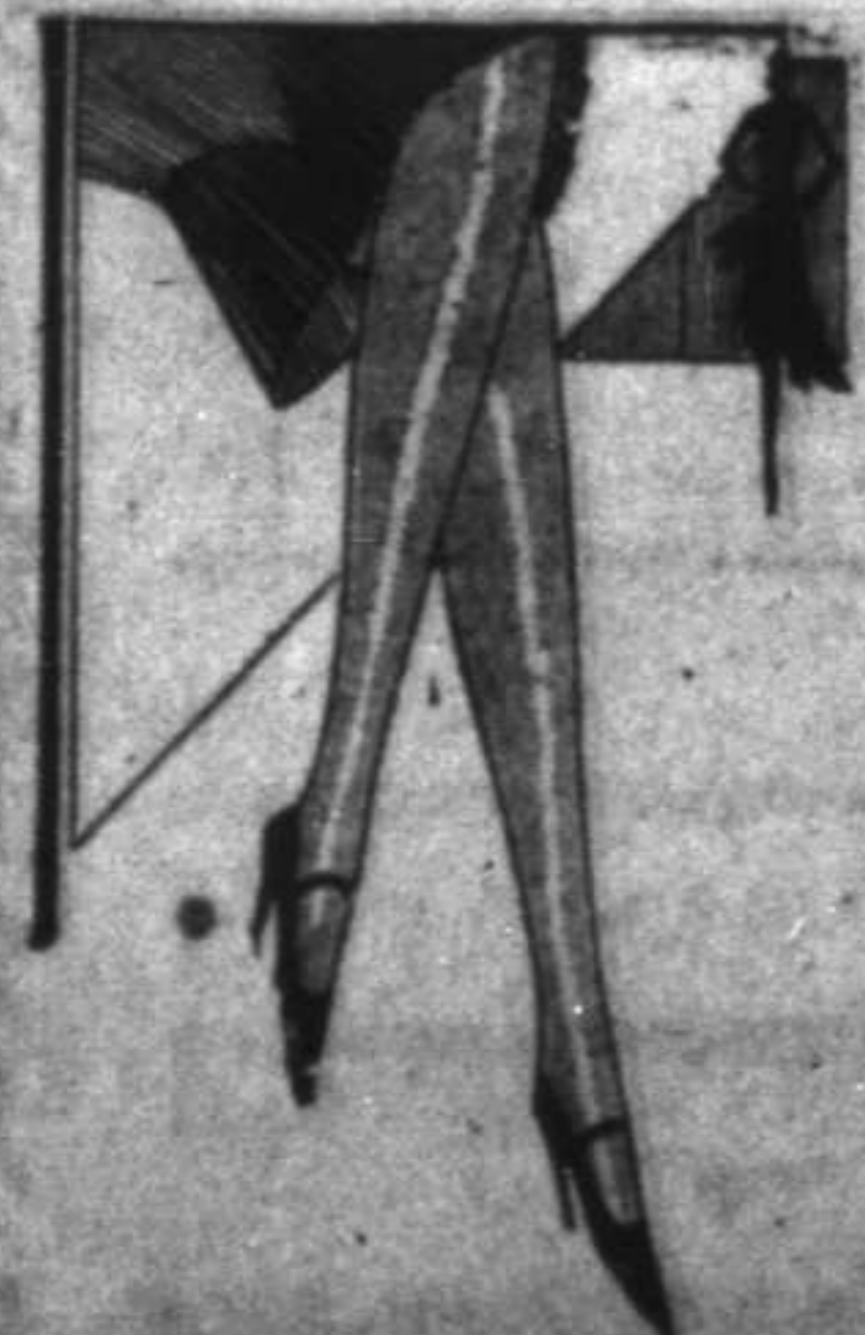

# Lubbock Westerners Smother Electra Tigers, 20 To 6

## Frnka-Morgan Aggregation Turns Loose Powerful Onslaught In 2nd Conference Game Of 1929 Season

Gold And Black Grid Artists Put On Impressive Demonstration In Defeating Class A Rivals; Smith And Price Shining Stars

The savage Electra Tigers were turned into very tame Kittens on the college gridiron Friday afternoon when the Lubbock Westerners unleashed a powerful running and passing attack to wallop their Class A opponents of District One, 20 to 6, in a football encounter more one-sided than the score indicates.

Striking the ends, crashing of tackle and taking to the air with equal success, the golden-jerseyed lads of Frnka and Morgan gave the home town fans what they had been waiting for throughout the season. The Westerners outplayed, outmanned and outclassed the Bengals in every department of play, turning in their most impressive demonstration of the season.

**Tigers Outweighed**  
The under-sized Electra gridsters were decidedly no match for the Lubbock grid warriors. This was apparent as the outset as the locals marched down the field through the aid of straight football and scored their first touchdown within the first five minutes of play. But despite their weight handicap, the Tigers showed a never-say-die fighting spirit, and opened up in the final minutes of play with a determined aerial attack that netted a touchdown in short order. At this stage of the combat, the Westerner secondary had let up considerably, allowing the Tigers to complete several successive passes.

Old-fashioned, hard-driving football gave the Westerners their initial six-point lead by the versatile Moody Smith, the Lubbock crew started its drive from the center of the field to reach the Bengals' goal line. Malcolm Martin, playing his first year with the Westerners took a leading hand in the steady march down the field, as did W. D. Lawson, Lubbock quarterback. Smith's 12-yard run through the Tiger line placed the ball on the visitors' 16-yard line. Lawson shot through tackle for 10 yards. Smith added 5 more in two attempts and Lawson crashed over for the touchdown. Smith's team placement was good for the extra point.

**Smith To Price Clicks**  
The Smith to Price overhead combination gave the locals their second counter at the beginning of the second quarter. Crass of Electra kicked out of bounds on his own 45-yard line, and on the second play, Smith tossed a 15-yard pass to Yancy Price, who raced the remaining distance of the field untouched for the Westerners second touchdown. Smith again kicked goal and the score stood: Lubbock 14; Electra 0.

After the locals had counted their second marker, the customers were treated to the most spectacular play of the game. A. Smith, Electra's halfback, received the kickoff on his own 10-yard line, eluded the entire Lubbock team and raced down the sidelines with an open field ahead. Just as the spectators had conceded Electra a touchdown on the play, Yancy Price stepped up out of nowhere and started in pursuit of the flying Tiger back. Gaining rapidly as the stripes were passed, one by one, Price came within driving distance of Smith on Lubbock's 20-yard line. The Lubbock end left his feet in a beautiful flying tackle and brought the Electra runner down with a thud.

**Tigers Fumble**  
Offered a golden opportunity to score on the Westerners, Electra fumbled on the first down and Lubbock recovered. The Westerners started another drive from their own 20-yard line, but a bad pass from center broke up their playhouse and the half ended with the locals leading by two touchdowns.

Electra came back fighting in the third quarter and held the Westerners scoreless until the opening of the final period. The Lubbock crew on one occasion reached the Tigers' 37-yard line, only to be thrown back by a determined Bengal defense.

Malcolm Martin gave the Westerners their third and final touchdown within the first minute of the fourth quarter. Lubbock regained the pickin' on Electra's 37-yard line after holding the Tigers for downs. On the first play, Martin galloped around the enemy's left flank, aided by strong interference, and crossed the Bengal's goal line standing up. Smith's try for extra point this time was wide.

**Bengals Take To Air**  
The Tigers started their passing drive for touchdown in the closing minutes of play from Lubbock's 45-yard line. The first heave was incomplete. Hub White made four yards through the line and the next play, a 15-yard pass, was given to Electra. When it was ruled that Lubbock interfered with the receiver, two more passes, mixed with running plays from the same formation, advanced the ball to Lubbock's 15-yard line. Crass' pass to Smith on the Westerners' 1-yard line was juggled by two of Lubbock's backs before the ball fell into the waiting arms of Smith. Crass plunged over on the first play for the touchdown.

Moody Smith returned the Electra kickoff 35 yards before he was brought down on Electra's 47-yard line. From here the locals started a determined march that would have saved another counter if the

### Testimony Given In Murder Trial

#### Seven Textile Union Members Charged In Death Of Gastonia Chief Of Police In Riot

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Oct. 18. (AP)—Arguments that the dead chief's bullet ridden clothes showed conclusively he was killed by a fellow officer and that there had been a conspiracy of the defendants to kill him were presented the jury as attorneys summed up evidence against seven textile union members charged with the death of O. F. Aderholt, Gastonia chief of police.

T. A. Adams, speaking for the defense, said holes in the clothing could have been made only by shots from a sawed off shotgun such as officers carried to the Loray mill

striker tent colony the night of June 7 when they went with Aderholt to investigate reports of disorders there. The police chief was wounded fatally by a shot in the darkness.

Jake Newell, prosecution attorney, held the clothing before the jury and said the shots in the back showed he had been killed while leaving and as a result of a conspiracy.

#### DISORDER FATAL

#### One Man Killed In Buenos Aires Demonstration

BUENOS AIRES, Oct. 18. (AP)—A hundred shots were fired and one man was killed here today when supporters of President Yrigoyen tried to break up an anti-government demonstration. The disorder was a sequel to similar fights Sunday and Wednesday.

Today's fighting started while a mass meeting was in progress under the auspices of an anti-govern-

ment group. Orators blamed the administration for the Sunday and Wednesday incidents, saying that anti-government partisans had been wantonly attacked.

#### CHARGES DENIED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18. (AP)—Representative Robison, republican, Kentucky, in a letter filed in the record of the senate patronage committee today, denied charges he had solicited money from Kentucky postmasters for his primary campaign of 1924.

#### MEMORIES RECOUNTED

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 18. (AP)—Vivid memories of the vanishing longhorn steer kept 800 old trail drivers spellbound today as one of their members recounted the virtues of the animal that best typifies the pioneer history of Texas.
