COOLIDGE VISITS BIG STOCK SHOW

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—President Coolidge arrived here this morning to visit and speak at the International Livestock Exposition and address the luncheon gathering of the Commercial Club of Chicago.

Delegates representing two organizations met the president and his party at the depot and escorted them to a hotel where the executive held several conferences prior to the commercial club luncheon.

Mr. Coolidge arrived here on the regular train from Washington, departing from the capital yesterday afternoon. He plans to return to Washington tonight following his address.

SAYS FURNACE VICTIM SUICIDE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 4.—Mrs. Addie Sheatsley, wife of the Reverend C. V. Sheatsley, Lutheran preacher, whose body was found in the furnace of the Sheatsley home in Bexley, suburb of Columbus, several days ago, committed suicide, Coroner Murphy held in his formal report of the inquest today.

The coroner held as his view of the case from the first investigation that the woman crawled into the furnace and was cremated alive, in spite of the fact that C. F. Long, chemist, and Dr. H. M. Brundage, pathologist, said that it was their opinion that the woman met death outside of the furnace.

JAP EXCLUSION HURT CHURCHES

(By Associated Press)

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 4.—The action of congress in passing the Japanese exclusion act is termed as needless and wanton in a report of the commission on international justice and good will, which has been prepared for submission to the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, in session here, it was announced today.

The report asserted that missionary leaders in Japan feel that the exclusion of the Japanese from this country has set back the progress of the Christian movement at least twenty years.

ATLANTA, Dec. 4.—Doctor Parkes Cadman, of Brooklyn, New York, was elected president of the Federal Council of Churches today, succeeding Dr. Robert Speer, who was not eligible for re-election.

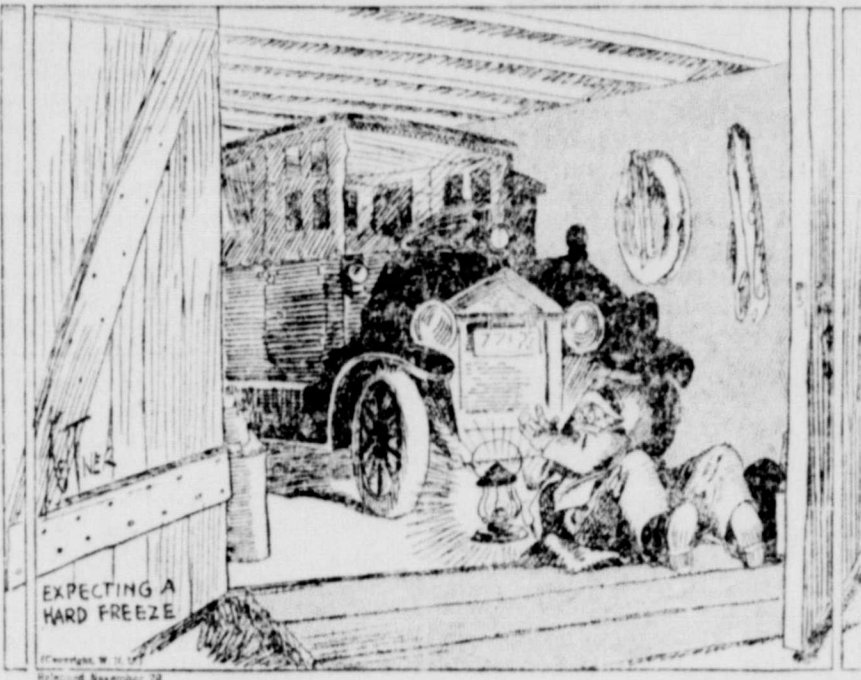
SEVERAL KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

The grand jury at Brady turned in six bills to District Judge J. O. Woodward's court this week.

A. J. Morrison, of Talpa, lost eight head of sheep from an unknown cause. Mr. Morrison penned 140 head of sheep to salt them. Eight head of the sheep were found dead a few hours later.

Quite a stir among the sinners is resulting from a union revival being held at Brownwood. Evangelist Bob Jones is in charge with all the churches uniting, and big crowds are meeting in the memorial hall.

Brown county is claiming a cotton production of more than 16,000 bales, or about one-third

the size of the Runnels county crop.

San Angelo citizens have been called together in mass meeting to take some steps for solving the charity problems of that city.

Guy Jennings Gist, age 13, and his 7-year-old brother, Jack Gist, were buried in the same grave at Colorado, Texas, Tuesday afternoon. The two boys died within a few hours of each other Monday from typhoid fever.

Brown county's turkey revenue for this year is estimated at \$350,000, according to the Brownwood Bulletin, which announces that turkeys are selling in that city now at 22 cents per pound on foot.

The fur season is now on with trappers operating throughout the country. It is estimated that pelts from Runnels county's fur bearing tribe will bring several thousand dollars into the channels of trade.

U. S. BONDS SELLING FAST

SNOW AND RAIN BRITISH REFUSE OVER WIDE AREA DEAL WITH EGYPT

FT. WORTH, Dec. 4.—Snow, sleet and rain fell in portions of the Texas Panhandle last night. Stockmen were given ample warning and had sufficient time to guard against any serious loss.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 4.—Rain or snow has been general throughout the Southwest during the last twenty-four hours, and unsettled conditions will continue until tomorrow, it was announced at the weather bureau here this afternoon.

The storm has been accompanied by low temperatures in Texas and Oklahoma with a drop to twenty-six degrees predicted for this vicinity by Friday morning. In Western Kansas a blanket of snow five inches deep covered the ground.

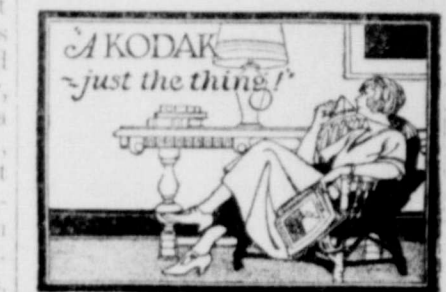
GENEVA, Dec. 4.—Great Britain has informed the League of Nations that the British government will not recognize that any signature by Egypt of a peace protocol will give Egypt a right to appeal to the League of Nations on the matter connected with the Anglo-Egyptian dispute.

The British note to the league says that Great Britain will not accept any interference whether it be by Egypt, the League of Nations, or any individual government on matters touching the Sudan question.

Fifteen Hundred Americans Wear Ribbon of French Legion

PARIS, Dec. 4.—Crosses awarded in war time and during the reconstruction period have increased the membership of the Legion of Honor from about 15,000 in 1914 to approximately 150,000 in 1924. Of the present total 120,000 members are French. In the foreign contingent the United States stands high with 1,500 members, including six Grand Crosses, the supreme rank, 21 Grand Officers, 189 Commanders, 550 Officers and about 800

Knights. This formidable growth in the last ten years is due principally to the fact that in war time there is no limit to the crosses that may be conferred for military valor.

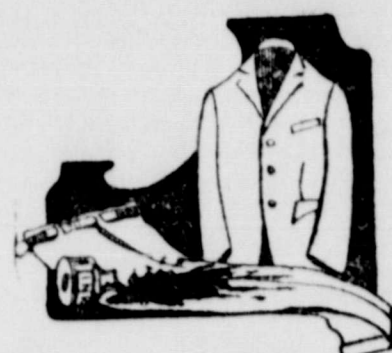

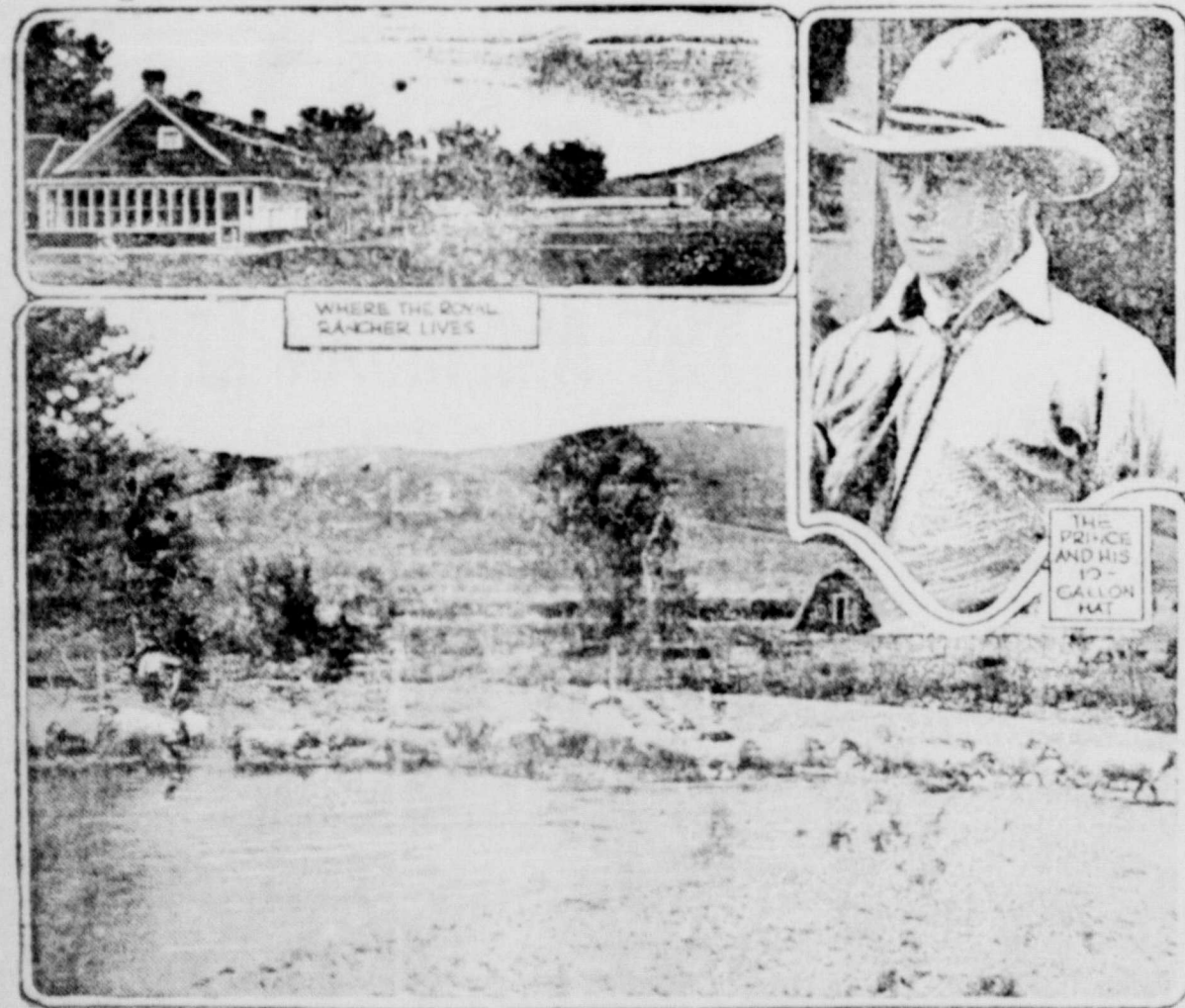

Prince of Wales' "Little Gray Home in the West," Canada



After having enjoyed about as much privacy as the proverbial goldfish during the international polo games near New York, the Prince of Wales retired to the quiet and seclusion of his Canadian "Little Gray Home in the West," 25 miles from High River, Alberta, a station on the Canadian Pacific, to rest, recreate and work far from curious crowds, reporters, still photographers and "movie" men. It is very pleasant, no doubt, to be the most popular young man in the world, but about once a year the rolling hills and rich prairie land of his "E. P. Ranch" call the Prince of Wales, Baron Renfrew or "Davy Windsor," as they refer to H. R. H. in Alberta, back to the land.

The prince is a real farmer and

owner, and is honestly endeavoring to improve the breed of horses, sheep and cattle in Western Canada. His pure-bred, imported animals and their offspring have won many prizes in competition at live stock shows in Western Canada, not because they were from the royal ranch, but because they were the very best exhibited. Since he bought his little acre ranch in Alberta in 1919, the prince has been sending to it the best stock he could secure in Great Britain, and every year he sells at auction the surplus animals for the benefit of live stock growers in the western provinces. The Earl of Minto, who owns a big ranch nearby, does the same thing. Also, King George took the prince some of his best animals for the stud.

of the members of the Alberta Shorthorn Breeders' Association. "When he comes out here we don't chase him as they do in other places. We just let him ride, and next thing you know he has all of us neighbors in as his guests, and wants to meet all the ranchers who are his neighbors, and there isn't a thing about ranching he doesn't want to know. His ranch is no bad. He is running it for the benefit of Canada first, and second for the purpose of making the "E. P. Ranch" a business venture, just as any level-headed man would do. When he is on the ranch he wears a "ten gallon hat," the same as all of the cowboys, and he does his work daily like any other ranch hand.
