LAMESA SCHOOLS WILL OPEN 1940-41 TERM SEPTEMBER 2

The official opening date for Lamesa Public Schools has been set for September 2, 1940 by the School Board of the District at the July meeting. The faculty of forty-eight members is complete by election and acceptance.

The school census for 1940-41, taken in March, includes 1687 names of pupils between the ages of 6 and seventeen years respectively. There are a few pupils between the ages of seventeen and twenty-one who are to attend school as they are supposed to do, and a fairly large number of transfers will be added to the local roll. The gross enrollments for high school, elementary school and colored school were respectively 631, 1177 and 71 for the 1939-40 term for a new high total of 1879 pupils. There are no indications now at hand to indicate a decrease in pupil enrollment for the 1940-41 session.

There are now plenty of classrooms and auxiliary rooms to provide space for the pupils, and these spaces have been prepared for occupation. Three workmen have been busy since the close of school in house cleaning, repairing desks

Terry County's New Oil Well Is Better Producer

While the No. 1 Terry County well, the George P. Livermore No. 1 M. E. Jacobson, was rated about 850 barrels when put on production, the second well after two treatments was rated at 1,126 barrels daily. This is an offset to the Livermore well, some three-quarters of a mile and is located in section 5 instead of section 6, block D-11.

The Sunray Star-Telegram gives particulars as follows:

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 2 Mallett, Northwestern Terry County test in the south extension area of the Slaughter pool, rated a 1,126-barrel potential after acidizing with 2,500 and 7,500 gallons at 3-035 feet in line. It is 440 feet out of the northwest corner of section 5, block D-11. C&M survey, offsetting to the east George P. Livermore No. 1 M. E. Jacobson et al. extension producer.

May Connect Cochran and Terry-Hockley Fields. One and one-quarter miles east and slightly south, Magnolia No. 1-B Mallett, just south across line in southwestern Hockley County, had drilled to 2,830 feet in salt and anhydrite. If the well attains production, it will serve to link the Duggan pool with the Slaughter pool of Hockley.

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TO THE VOTERS OF DAWSON COUNTY:

In asking you to elect me County Judge, I do so realizing the importance of the office and the many responsibilities that will be mine should I be elected. I do not think I should be fair to you, or to myself, if I did not state frankly how I propose to conduct myself, relative to some of the major problems that would confront me as County Judge.

Co-operation

No county official can be successful unless he has the cooperation of the people, as well as his associates in the Court House. This co-operation can be had only by honest, efficient and courteous service to all. This is the only promise that I will make.

County Court

The County Judge, as presiding officer over the County Court, is charged to uphold the honor and dignity of the law and see that justice is meted out to all alike. The County Court has jurisdiction over the criminal and civil cases in which two years in jail or a fine of one thousand dollars might be imposed. The County Judge tries probate cases involving all amounts and tries lunacy cases. Last, but not least, he is the trial judge in juvenile cases involving the youth of this county. This not only involves those that deliberately violate the law, but those that through wrong influences, unintentionally violate the law. As to the first group, the law is clear and definite. The second group is the one to which justice can largely be meted out, through my and your cooperation, to discourage the youth of our county in participating in those things that are wrong and assist in setting up conditions that will direct his thoughts and actions in the right direction. To those in which we fail and it becomes necessary for them to come into court, I will cooperate with the prosecution, as well as the defense, to keep an open mind, respect for the law and a heart of love to save that boy or girl from a criminal career.

The State laws provide that questions of law should be taken to the County Attorneys Office, which office is the only one in the County Official Family, that must be filled by a lawyer.

The County Judge, as a member of the Commissioner's Court, has a very responsible position. His influence, whether good or bad, will

be felt through the court. I would not be honest, efficient or courteous if I did not cooperate with the Commissioners in that every one will be served. The Commissioners' Court has the authority to pass on property values, to set your tax rate, to collect taxes, and the expenditure of the tax dollar.

In making out the County budget, careful consideration, and much study should be given as to what the taxpayers want their money spent for, to be sure and include those things that are necessary and exclude those things that would not be good economy, and would not meet with your approval. Before the budget is approved, I will ask the Court to give notice through our local papers then if you are interested, you can come and see what we propose to spend your money for. And if you have constructive suggestions to offer, consider those suggestions before making final approval.

The County Judge of Dawson County serves as purchasing agent for County supply and through his hands much of your tax money passes. If I am your judge, I pledge you the same care and prudence in handling county funds, as I would use in handling my own. It would be my policy to keep as much of Dawson County's money in Dawson County as possible, by patronizing home concerns or home representatives, in so far as good business acumen would allow.

Now that we are in a tremendous re-armament program and that it will be necessary to increase taxes, makes it tremendously important that we watch our local expenditures. Economy should be our watch word. Economy does not mean no spending, but careful spending. I am one hundred percent in favor of progress—economical progress. I believe in good roads. However, I question the economy to continue to drag dry sand out of the bar pits to be blown away by the next windstorm. I believe our roads should be worked immediately after a rain, as we do our farm land, and use the difference, with the help of the State and Federal governments, to build a few miles of permanent farm to market roads. In a few years we can have farm to market roads out of each community to our main highways without any additional cost to the taxpayers. I will offer this idea to the commissioners for their consideration.

The Federal government is appropriating tremendous sums of money for WPA. I am of the opinion Dawson County was included, and I am sure Dawson County will be included when pay day comes. I will cooperate with the court to see that we get our full share. Don't misunderstand me to say that we are not getting our fair share now. I don't know. If we are not, we

should. We are living at a time when we have no idea as to what tomorrow will bring. In this connection I want to say that should a National crisis arise and Dawson County called upon to cope with any emergency, I will lend my fullest cooperation to the Commissioners' Court in laying aside precinct problems and serving the best interests of the county as a whole, as well as the nation.

I am 44 years old, was reared in Taylor County. My college training was received at Simmons University and West Texas Teachers College. Served in the U. S. Navy during the World War and upon my discharge, came to Dawson County. It has been my privilege to live as a citizen of this county more than twenty years. During this time I have given my best in the building of a great county. I am asking you for this office upon my own merits. If in your opinion, I merit your vote and confidence, I will certainly appreciate it. I assure you that I will exercise every ounce of energy that I possess to make a County Judge worthy of that vote of confidence.

Now In Effect
By Democrats

Only a majority vote of the 1094 Democratic delegates—348—will be required to nominate a Presidential and Vice Presidential candidate at the party's convention.

The century old two-thirds rule was dropped at the 1936 convention in Philadelphia. The vote on this history-making change was unanimous, but there was a tight behind the scenes. The solid South long had cherished the two-thirds rule

for it gave the Democratic strong-hold a veto on any prospective candidate. Opposition did not reach the convention, adopted the report the convention floor, however, and of its rule committee.

For more than 50 years the old rule had worried the party. In 1932 the Roosevelt forces had enough strength to repeal it, but Mr. Roosevelt disapproved forcing it on the convention at that time. He indicated he would favor changing to the majority rule at the next convention. With no rivals for the nomination in 1936, the Roosevelt forces obtained approval of the change.

Marketing News
On Classing Of
Cotton Is Free

August 1 and August 15 are the deadlines for receiving application for the free classing and cotton marketing news services provided under the Smith-Dealey Act.

The August 1 date applies to all of Texas except the High Plains and the August 15 deadline to the remainder of the state.

The service is available to one-variety cotton improvement groups, and gives farmers the correct grades and staples on their cotton, together with official market prices. Instructions and forms for making application may be obtained from county agricultural agents. Texas officers of the Agricultural Marketing Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture are located in Dallas, Austin and El Paso.

In 1939, 287 cotton improvement groups in Texas and 106 Oklahoma availed themselves of the service.

Bund Leader In State Employ

The Dies Committee, now investigating Un-American activities at its Austin session, this week revealed that Herman Koetter of Houston, Texas, commander of the Kyffhauser Bund, a secret organization of German war veterans, has maintained a close and active working connection with L. A. Woods' vocational educational administration.

Subjected to fierce grilling by the Dies Committee, Koetter, in an attempt to prove his good character produced letters from the State Board of Vocational Education and a copy of an official manual prepared by him and published and distributed with state funds.

Koetter had been serving on the State Committee on Apprentice Training for the painting and decorating trade, and his traveling expenses had been paid out of state and federal funds by the Woods' administration.

Pearfully anticipating the disclosures before the Dies Committee, James R. D. Eddy, director of industrial education under L. A. Woods, rushed out a prepared statement that Koetter had been serving on a local Houston committee. However, the records of the Dies Committee show that Koetter was serving on the state committee. This was proven by a letter from Eddy now in the Dies Committee record.

It was further disclosed by the Dies Committee that Koetter had lived in the United States for 17 years and had declined to become an American citizen. His Kyffhauser Bund organization is affiliated with another Bund which has headquarters in Nazi Germany.

The least that Mr. Woods can plead is an unpardonable negligence in allowing this head of the Nazi Bund to serve on one of his major educational committees. This shows how easy it would be for subversive and un-American activities to spread in our own school system through the carelessness and gross negligence of a State Superintendent.—Political Advertisement paid for by the Dawson County friends of S. Former Citizen

Displays New Type Of Gun

Perhaps you saw press dispatches from Monahans some time ago about an electrical gun that would throw self-propelled projectiles from it on their way for miles and miles up to perhaps 250 miles to drop on a fort, munitions factory, or battleship. Olie and wife were through here Saturday on their way to Lubbock, and dropped in to show us the gun in action. Mr. Bruton was formerly in the watch-repair business here.

The barrel of the model he had was about 18 inches in length, and had only one unit of electrical power, but it would pitch a six-inch piece of iron rod shaped like a projectile, and 3-4 inch in diameter several feet. He stated that it did much better with a direct current. Now fancy a gun of the model several hundred times as large, with a strong unit about every two inches all around it, and you would have a muzzel velocity almost unbelievable.

It has not been Olie's aim or desire to patent any kind of projectile or the radio beam to direct it, perhaps hundreds of miles. Uncle Sam already has that. But the trouble has been that all the guns yet invented tore them up in projection. In this model, the projectile never touches the barrel, but is held by powerful magnets to the exact center of the barrel, and when they leave the muzzel, the wings open, and the propeller comes into action.

Mr. Bruton stated that after the AP dispatch appeared in the dailies, the Ordnance department of the U. S. wrote him for particulars, and they now have a model and working out details for its use if necessary. He has had a number of mysterious calls he stated, wanting to see or buy his model.—Terry County Herald.

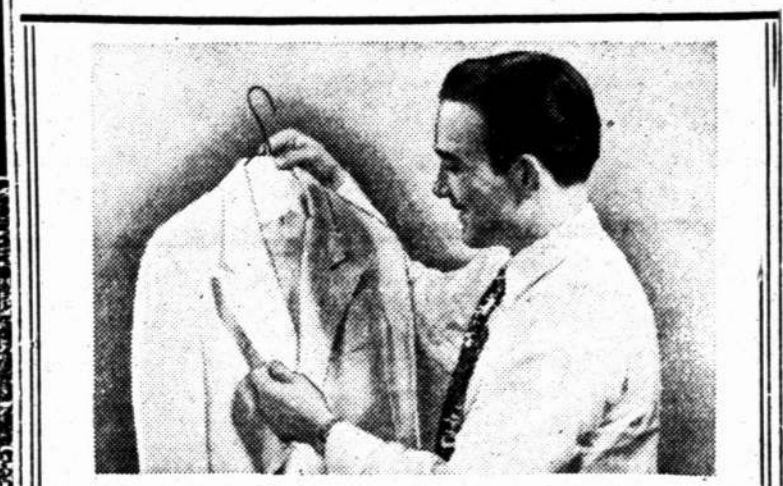

County is shut down at 5,214 feet in lime. Last time bailer was run there was 4,800 feet of sulphur water in holes originating chiefly from 5,000 to 5,056 feet. Pipe will be set through water and test will be made of oil showing from 5,206 to 5,214 feet. It is reported that the well will be drilled 2,000 feet deeper in search of additional pays. Location in 660 feet out of the northwest corner of section 54, block M, EL&RR survey.

It is understood that many now believe the fault at the Cedar Lake will eventually connected with the Hackley-Terry fields, the fault passing just west of Brownfield. It is reported on good authority that many geologists share this belief.

Attend Farmers
Short Course

Eight Thousand farm people took in the annual Farmers Short Course at Texas A. and M. College last week.

The number was made up of three thousand 4-H Club boys and girls who registered for the junior section during the first two days of the week and of that many men and women who registered for the adult section. In addition, it is estimated that 2,000 people from surrounding counties attended without registering for rooms.

Frozen feed lockers, land use planning and conservation, headlined the program with speakers divided about equally between men and women of national importance. Special groups who made the short course for meetings included the Texas Home Demonstration Association, Texas Agricultural Workers, Master Farmers of Texas and Hereford Cattle Breeders Association.

County agricultural and home demonstration agents gathered for their annual conferences, as did workers of the Agricultural Experiment Station. Several hundred members of land use planning committees and some 500 AAA county committeemen also attended. The Texas County Agricultural Agents held a business session.
