PROPOSED ROAD, PERRYTON TO AMARILLO

Hutchinson county will vote on a \$100,000 bond issue on November 22, to build a new highway from the north plains into Amarillo. The new road will cut the distance from Perryton to Amarillo by 40 miles. This is the report which was received here yesterday. The proposed highway is to traverse Hutchinson county from north to south, striking the Carson county line just south of Pan-Tex. This will provide a direct highway from Panhandle to Amarillo, following the new road through the oil field, and connecting by way of St. Francis.

The new highway is to be graveled the way from the Carson county line. The legal work for the bond is being handled by the Harry M. Taylor Investment Co. here.—Channing News

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Mr. M. R. Bentley, Extension Service Engineer, from College Station, Texas, was in this county Monday and Tuesday of this week looking over one or two small projects. Mr. Bentley has been over most of west Texas recently and he states that this section compares very favorably with the rest of the plains territory.

The flock of poultry belonging to Mr. Clarence Zirkle was culled last week, and it was found that about 40% of the hens were non-producers.

Go over your flock, eliminate the loafers, save the feed that they are consuming and put the money that they will bring on the market in good birds and build up some breeding stock for next spring. Eggs will be a good price in the winter, but so will feed, so if you don't get rid of the non-layer your net income will be greatly reduced.

Cotton is beginning to open in most every section of the county and several bales have been ginned, these coming principally from Oklahoma, but it is anticipated that the gin will be kept running rather steadily for a few weeks now. The quality of lint produced here has proven to be very good and will rank with that produced in most any other section of the state.

There are a few faulty segments of locks in a good many bales in some fields, this is probably due to a bacterial infection, known as the triangular leaf spot. This disease is proving rather serious in some sections but it is not believed that it will be so bad here in our high and dry climate.

Now is the time to prepare your land for cotton to be planted next spring. Turn under the stubble and weeds, conserve the moisture so that next spring a good seed bed can be prepared. It has been thoroughly demonstrated this year that where the seed bed was well prepared much better results have been obtained this is also true regarding the methods of cultivation. To successfully raise cotton in any locality it must be planted in a well prepared seed bed and thoroughly cultivated.

Now is a good time to start the fight on prairie dogs as they will eat the poisoned grain nowabout as readily as any time of the year. A small town was poisoned on Mr. Grant Sooter's place last week with very satisfactory results, part of these dogs were in a wheat field but still they ate the grain, a count the next morning after the poison had been put out the afternoon before revealed six dead dogs and fourteen jackrabbits, which demonstrated that the poisoned grain is also very effective for poisoning jack rabbits.

There is nothing that will add to the appearance of the out buildings, fences, more, than keeping them well repaired and properly white washed. This one thing alone will often enhance the sale value of a place several dollars per acre.

Many who have been looking for a good white wash formula will be interested to know how Uncle Sam keeps his property so nice and white. His white wash formula is probably one of the best. It is much whiter than most of the others and is almost as serviceable as paint for wood, brick and stone. A pint of this wash when properly applied will cover about ten square feet of surface.

The formula is as following:
Slack half a bushel of unsalted lime with boiling water, cover during the process to keep in steam, strain the liquid through a fine sieve or strainer, and add to it seven pounds of salt, previously dissolved in warm water, three pounds of ground rice boiled to a thin paste, and stirred in while hot, half a pound of Spanish whiting, and one pound of clean glue previously dissolved by soaking in cold water and then hanging over a slow fire in a small pot hung in a larger one filled with water. Add five gallons of hot water to the mixture, stir well and let it stand for a few days covering it from the dirt. It should be applied hot, for which purpose it can be kept in an oven or over a portable furnace.

ENGINEER AT WORK WITH RIVER SURVEY

Amarillo, October 26—F. H. Davis, U. S. government engineer from Memphis, Tenn., who is here making observations of possible dam sites on the Canadian River, left last night on a tour of inspection of the river.

He will return Wednesday, and will then spend several days working out of Amarillo. Yesterday morning he went to the river directly north of Amarillo, accompanied by A. S. Sinner and Jeff D. Bartlett, city manager.

Mr. Davis is working under the \$1,500,000 appropriation made by congress early this year, for a survey of the Canadian river, in Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico, with a view to an extensive project for the control and utilization of flood waters.

After he finishes his work here, he will return to Memphis, and a corps of field men will be sent to the Panhandle to make more detailed surveys of proposed dam sites. This report will be made to the War Department, which will then ask congress for an appropriation so that the actual construction of the dams can be begun.

It is expected that the bills will be ready to introduce when congress convenes in December, and will be acted upon before next spring it is said. Mr. Davis is doing the last work in this section, as he has already made preliminary surveys in Oklahoma and New Mexico.

The present plans call for a large dam above Logan, N. M. and two or three smaller dams in the Panhandle. It is probable that one of the dam sites to be selected will be close to Amarillo.—Amarillo News.

ADVOCATE CHANGE IN HOMESTEAD LAWS

DALLAS, Oct. 16—Amendment of the Texas Homestead Exemption law advocated by speakers before the Texas Association of Real Estate Boards, which opened its fifth annual convention here today.

C. A. Laddy of Dallas declared that the homestead law, as enacted in 1876, is an antiquated instrument, sanctioning fraud and hampering the free use of his properties by the owner.

"Back in 1876 the exemption allowed by the law was reasonable," Mr. Laddy said. "But now a man may sit back in his \$200,000 home and a creditor who may not have even a cottage to cover his family cannot collect a cent from him."

The exemption limit on a residence or farm used as a homestead should be \$150,000, he said, adding:

"The exemption feature of the Texas act is not doing the greatest damage, however. It is the provision which prevents a man using his home for collateral if he so desires."

Speakers at a meeting of the sub-dividers' section of the association declared the law compelled Texas home buyers to pay a higher rate of interest than is charged on home loans of other states.

W. A. Smith of Houston president of the association in his report, stated that the association has eleven boards with 313 active members and 250 associate members. He declared the chief concern of the organization at present to be the passage of the state licensing law to govern the real estate profession and an adjustment of tax values.—Amarillo News.

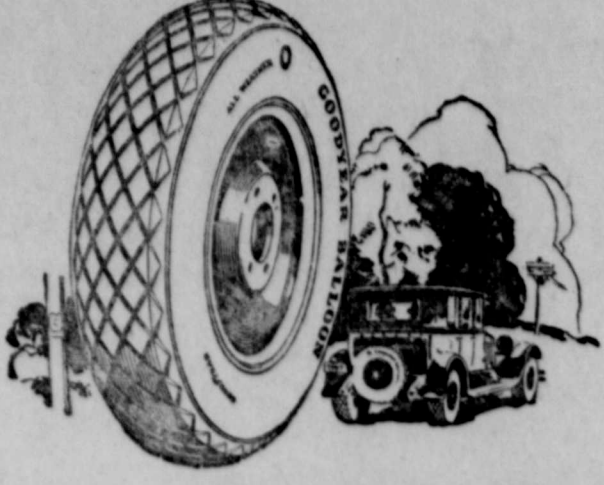
SPECIAL MISSIONARY SERVICE

Attorney General's Opinion as to Legal Methods Of Voting

Austin, Texas, October 10, 1924.

Answering letter from John Marshall, President of Good Government Democratic League of Texas, under date of Oct. 10, 1924, the Attorney General says:

"Attorney General Keeling is in receipt of your communication of the 8th inst., reading as follows:

"As President of the Good Government Democratic League of Texas, an organization of Democratic voters who have endorsed and are supporting George C. Butte, Republican Nominee for Governor of Texas, I am writing to submit the following inquiries:

1. Can a voter lawfully vote for George C. Butte for Governor at the election to be held November 4th, 1924, by marking off all the tickets on the official ballot, except the Democratic ticket and by scratching the name printed under the caption "For Governor" on the Democratic ticket and writing in place of it the name "George C. Butt?" Under the law should a ballot so marked be counted for Butte for Governor and for all the Democratic nominees for Presidential electors and for offices other than Governor?

2. Can a voter lawfully vote for George C. Butte for Governor by making out all the tickets on the official ballot except the Democratic and Republican tickets and by marking out all of the names on the Republican ticket except the words "For Governor George C. Butte" and by also marking out the name under the caption for Governor on the Democratic ticket? Under the law should a ballot so marked be counted for Butte for Governor and for all the Democratic nominees for Presidential electors and for offices other than Governor?

3. Is there any law prohibiting the preparation of a sample marked ballot for distribution among voters as circulars or for publication in newspapers showing the voters how they may lawfully vote for the Democratic Presidential electors and all Democratic nominees except for Governor and also vote for George C. Butte for Governor, provided, of course, such marked sample ballots are not carried by a voter into the election booth on election day?

I am receiving numerous inquiries showing that there is considerable confusion in the minds of the voters on these subjects, and I think it of the highest importance that the opinion of your Department should be promptly published covering the subject matter of these inquiries."

Replying to your first question you are advised that it would violate the law directing voters how to vote a mixed ticket for a voter to scratch the name of a candidate printed in the Democratic column and write in the place of it the name of a candidate printed in the Republican column after marking off all the tickets except the Democratic ticket. But the provisions of the law prescribing the method of marking the ballot are directory and not mandatory, and a vote cast in the manner above described should be counted for all the Democrats so voted for and for the Republican so voted for.

After further discussing the authorities and the law, the opinion says:

You are, therefore, advised that votes cast in the manner suggested in your first question should be counted for the person for whom the voter so votes.

In reply to your second question, you are advised that the law would not be violated if a voter marks out all the tickets on the official ballot except the Democratic and Republican tickets and then marks out all of the names on the Republican ticket except the one such voter desires to vote for, and also scratches out the name of the person on the Democratic ticket for whom he does not desire to vote. SUCH A VOTE SHOULD BE COUNTED FOR ALL THE DEMOCRATS SO VOTED FOR AND FOR THE REPUBLICAN SO VOTED FOR.

It is our opinion that the method outlined in your second question is the method which the statute contemplates shall be followed when a voter desires to scratch a candidate whose name is printed in the Democratic column and desires to vote for a candidate whose name is printed in the Republican column.

In answer to Question No. 3, the Attorney General holds:

"That where no agreement or proposal to vote for the person on the marked ticket has been entered into or made, and no request has been made to the person receiving or securing such marked ticket to vote for the person on the marked ticket, the law would not be violated by the preparation of a sample marked ticket, the law would not be violated by the preparation of a sample marked marked ballot for distribution among the voters as circulars or for publication in newspapers showing the voters how they may lawfully vote for the Democratic Presidential electors and all Democratic nominees except for Governor and also the Republican candidate for Governor."

Thrifty Tips FOR THE HOME
by J. C. C.

IVORY: To restore ivory that has turned yellow to its natural color, rub with turpentine.

COAT HANGERS: If coat hangers are covered with velvet instead of silk, the garments will not slip off.

CABBAGE: When boiling cabbage put in a piece of stale bread. This kills the unpleasant odor.

JAPANESE TRAYS: Try this for cleaning Japanese trays. Make a mixture of vinegar and powdered whiting. Apply it with a soft flannel, wipe off with a clean cloth and polish with a chamois.

TOOTHBRUSH: If a new toothbrush is soaked over night in a glass of water, the bristles will not come out and it will last twice as long.

POTATOE: To utilize leftover boiled potatoes, make a few "go around" cut them up, add a slice of bread cut into dice and fry the potatoes together. It makes a delicious dish.

SOUP: When making soup always put the meat in cold water. Corned beef and ham should be put in boiling water. Add a tablespoon of vinegar to make the meat tender.

HOT WATER BOTTLE: After emptying a hot water bottle it should be slightly inflated with air before the stopper is replaced. Then powder with talcum and put away in a cardboard box where it will not be damaged by contact with light and air.

LINEN: Linen that is not to be used for quite a while should never be starched, as it may crack. The linen should be rinsed quite free of starch, dried and folded away in blue paper. The blue paper will keep it from turning yellow.

STARCH: If little pieces of scented toilet soap are dropped in your hot starch, it will give the clothing a fragrant odor.

STAINS: To remove cocoa stains from tablecloths and napkins try washing them first with cold water and then pour boiling water through until the stain disappears. This will also remove coffee and tea stains.

BATH TUB: Rub the tub with a cloth dampened with kerosene oil. It does not hurt the enamel and will remove all stains with less work.

THE TELEPHONE

The telephone industry holds an important place in modern business and social life and it is necessary that the highest degree of efficient service be given. When communities were small and business life was less complex and before time became a factor in business transactions, the telephone was regarded as a convenience and a luxury. But the telephone today is a necessity with most concerns. Experience has proved that it is more satisfactory to speak with an individual miles away than it is to send a brief message which becomes a formal, impersonal communication. The telephone saves time, speeds up business and has scores of advantages in every office, store and home.

Transcontinental telephone service is of recent date and is made possible through the use of amplifiers at stated intervals. TEXAS SPENDS VERY LITTLE FOR EDUCATION

Texas ranks 44th in per capita state and local expenditures for all public purposes, including schools and state and local government. Texas ranks 37th in per capita state and local expenditures for all forms of public education. These facts have just been made public by Dr. George A. Works, director of the Texas School Survey. He stated that the averages are based on the total population, and they include 48 states and the District of Columbia.

For all public purposes, including all forms of public education, Texas spends \$19.42 per capita, ranking 44th. Nevada ranks first with an expenditure of \$102.26, and Alabama last with \$12.13. For all forms of public education, Texas spends \$8.41 per capita, ranking 37th. Montana leads with \$24.46, and Kentucky is last with \$4.36.

These facts, said Dr. Works, justify the conclusion that Texas maintains an inexpensive public service, including schools and state and local government, as compared to her sister states.

The second section of his report deals with the funds being spent on public elementary and high schools exclusively, according to Dr. Works. Details in this show that in its per

capita expenditures for public elementary and high schools, Texas ranks 37th, the amount per person being \$7.32. Montana leads in this respect with \$22.33 per capita, while Mississippi is lowest with \$3.54.

Texas gives \$3.64 out of state taxes to the public elementary and high schools, taking in this respect 10th place. Nevada leads again with \$7.51 while Florida is last with 70 cents. But Texas is far down the line in respect to local taxes spent on education, taking rank as 43, giving only on average of \$2.77. Montana leads here with \$17.64, and Mississippi is last with \$1.72. In the percentage of the total revenues for providing for elementary and high schools that comes from the state, as contrasted with local sources, Texas ranks first. There is no state in which a larger proportion of the revenues for these schools comes from the state treasury. But Texas is the lowest state in the nation in the proportion of expense of providing for elementary and high schools borne by the local communities.

TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR MOTORISTS

If all motorists would observe the following "ten Commandments" there would be a great reduction in the number of accidents on the highways.

1. Drive on the right side of the road; it's just as good as the left.
2. Slow down when approaching a cross road; it is nearly as dangerous as a railroad crossing.
3. Look out for children. You can never tell what they will do, and you are always in the wrong when you hit one.
4. Try to help instead of hindering the traffic officer; he's there for your good and he's got a tough job.
5. Be sure that your lights are not defective or glaring; it's no joke driving into a blinding glare, as you yourself know.
6. Read and obey the warning signs; they are not put up as ornaments.
7. If you've got to speed—do it where you won't kill anybody but yourself.
