TO HOLD PRESIDENT'S PARTIES

BANQUET AT HOTEL PERRYTON AND DANCE AT DONLEY HALL ON EVENING OF JANUARY 30

Max W. Boyer, president of the Young Democrats Club, the sponsoring organization for the President's parties in Perryton, announces that a number of other local committees will be selected within the next few days.

The purpose of these parties for the President is very simple and humane. President Franklin D. Roosevelt will be 52 years of age on January 30. Parties and balls will be held in every city of consequence in the United States to provide an endowment fund for the carrying on of a wonderful work. It is to establish through the direct help of the citizens of the country an endowment fund for the Georgia Warm Springs Foundation, created in 1926 by President Roosevelt, so that this Foundation may carry on its national crusade against Infantile Paralysis, and devote unselfishly its full energy and thought to the coordination of the fight against a scourge which physically handicaps every year, thousands of American children.

Furthermore, the success of this country-wide party, sponsored by the citizens of the United States, will be a growing testimonial to a man who has waged and won a hard personal fight against what might have been accepted as a lasting handicap.

Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, and J. C. Penny have been advertising right along in the face of all the depression. And they have been selling goods.

One cannot accuse chain stores of humanitarianism, but the managers appear to know how to get money flowing. All three chains mentioned have made statements of profits, and one cannot but conclude there must be connection between continued advertising and continued profits.

If advertising will sell chain store goods, then it will sell independent store goods, prices and goods being equal.

If he is unwilling to admit those things, then he alone is at fault in not getting his share of the business and profits, since they are to be got.

HIGHWAY PROJECT APPROVED

HIGHWAY EAST FROM COUNTY LINE TO NEW NO. 4 IN SOUTHWEST PRECINCT TO BE GRADED

Through the efforts of Commissioner R. A. Fuller and the full cooperation of the Commissioners Court and the Ochiltree County Board of Welfare and Employment, the project for the grading of the east and west highway through the southwest precinct has been approved as a CWA project.

This highway at the present time with Highway No. 4, fifteen miles south of Perryton. Application was made for \$25,000. Word has been received that \$9,000 is available at once for this work, same to be used before February 15.

The first work to be done will be an extension east from old No. 4 to new No. 4, a distance of about six miles. Actual grading operations will be started just as soon as the survey is completed and right of way secured. The road will be 100 feet in width and will be graded to regulation state highway specifications.

H. K. SMITH BURIED SUNDAY BLUE MOUND CEMETERY

Hamilton Kiggins Smith, age 72 years, 7 months and 20 days, passed away at his home in this city, Friday, January 5. The deceased was born on May 15, 1861, near Springfield, Mo.

He was married to Miss Mary Jane Pruitt, March 6, 1881, near Huston, Mo. Six children were born to this union, two of whom died in infancy. Those surviving are W. L. Smith, J. L. Smith, and Mrs. A. C. Spangler, all of this city; and Mrs. H. B. Brown, Seling, Oklahoma. There are 27 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren, who join with a host of friends in mourning his departure.

In 1887, Mr. Smith moved to Montague county, Texas, going from there to the Indian Territory in 1897, where he resided until 1906 when he came to Beaver county, Oklahoma, locating near Gray. Here he made his home until 1926, when he became a resident of Perryton.

BANK DEPOSITS SHOW INCREASE

PERRYTON BANKS DECREASE LOANS WHILE CASH ON HAND SHOWS MARKED INCREASE

Statements of the financial condition of the two Perryton banks, the First National and the Perryton National, show marked upturn for the better as compared with the statements at the close of business on October 25, 1933. The statements published in this week's Herald show the standing at close of business on December 30, 1933.

A comparison of the two statements brings out the following interesting facts: First, deposits increased from \$212,000 to \$220,000, a gain of \$8,000. During the same period the combined loans of the two banks were lowered better than nine thousand dollars, while the cash on hand in both banks went up from \$75,000 to \$96,000.

Keep in mind the above gains were made before any wheat allotment checks were received in any of adjoining counties. There is question but what the exceptional Christmas business, delivered very largely through the advertising campaign directed by the Herald, had much to do with this increase.

Since the wheat checks commenced to come into adjoining counties of Beaver, Texas, Hansford and Lipscomb, deposits in Perryton banks have increased about \$37,000.00.

Both Perryton banks are now operating under the federal guaranty deposit law, having received their certificates of membership in the national deposit fund. Under the new Federal law, deposits up to \$2,500 in all banks which are members of the fund, are guaranteed.

FARM EXPERIMENTAL STATION AT WOODWARD WILL CLOSE JULY 1; WILL CONTINUE DAIRYING

The United States experimental farm at Woodward, Okla., in operation since 1912, will be abandoned on July 1.

Government support of the \$1,000,000 institution will be withdrawn on that date.

Experimental dairy work, which is conducted separately from the station proper, will continue. The budget for this department, as submitted to Congress, totals \$10,575. Abandonment of the Woodward station is expected to seriously affect the entire Plains region. It will mean a halt in the program to develop seed especially adaptable to this territory.

EDITORIAL

Last week I let brevity rule my pen, but this week I intend to take up more space in extolling the merits of your student publication "El Sombraero". Not only as the Rang-ers hat, is it "always on top", and not only as your official organ does it truly typify the superiority of Perryton schools, but it is, after a fashion, the yardstick or standard by which our school is measured.

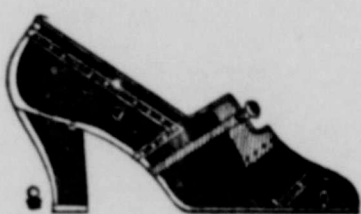
