BEER MEASURE IS BEATEN BY NARROW MARGIN

Sponsors Gaining On Each Roll Call To Call Up Bill Again

AUSTIN, May 2. (AP)—A resolution proposing to submit repeal of the prohibition section of the state constitution failed to receive the required 100 votes in the Texas house today. The vote was 85 ayes to 49 noes. Sponsors of the resolution said they would bring the resolution up at a later date.

Both houses already had voted to submit an amendment to the constitution to permit the manufacture and sale of 3.2 per cent beer. That election has been set for August 28. The resolution that failed of a two-thirds vote today would amend the constitution to permit the sale of any kind of liquors in event the federal amendment was repealed, and subject to local option.

When the resolution was before the house several weeks ago, it received only 72 affirmative votes, the vote today representing a gain of 13. Representative Weaver Moore of Houston, author of the resolution, said he hoped to obtain 100 affirmative votes on his next effort.

An amendment to hold the election August 28 of this year lost, lacking a two-thirds majority vote. The resolution provides for the election to be held at the general election in 1934.

\$51 In Old Gold Is Collected By Presbyterians

Dr. L. E. Selfridge, Superintendent of Home Missions in the Western Texas Presbytery, has 76 churches under his supervision. Recently he called upon these churches to collect and send in all their old gold to help him pay his preachers. His people responded heartily and \$1,100.00 or more was collected.

The Woman's Auxiliary of Sanderson collected old jewelry, spectacle frames, pen points, umbrella handles, bridge work and in fact everything in which there was a speck of gold. This was melted and sold and brought in about \$51.00.

Sanderson's quota was more per capita than any church in the Presbytery. The two churches of San Antonio collected \$105 and \$90 respectively making Sanderson with her \$51 third in amount.

Registration Of Births, Deaths Urged Of Texans

AUSTIN, Texas.—Texans are now being asked by the Federal Bureau of the Census, if they can prove that they have been born. For absolute proof a record of birth should be on file with the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas Department of Health. The Registration Area is that part of the United States, according to the government test, at least ninety per cent of all births and deaths are recorded with the proper officials. Texas is the only state that is not in this area and the present check by the government is for the purpose of finding out whether or not Texas should be admitted.

To secure this recognition and be placed on a par with other states it will be necessary for each person to see that any death or birth occurring in their family during the past year has been filed with the local registrar and that he has sent the report on to the state office. This check is now in progress and it is necessary that the records be sent in at once.

The proper registration of births and deaths is of the greatest importance not only to the individual but also to the public at large. A birth certificate will prove right to inheritance, citizenship, legitimacy, school age, legal age for marriage, right to vote, right to hold office, age for military service, nationality in foreign countries and qualification for jury service. They are also used in securing passports and determining the birth rate in states, counties and cities.

No civilized community should allow a human being to die and be buried without an official record being made of the fact. Such records are indispensable in determining the cause of death, relative death rates, ratio of deaths to births, duration of life, rates of insurance and relative wealthfulness of different states and localities. They are necessary in proving death for probating wills, settling estates, establishing claims for insurance and pensions and proving ancestry and heredity.

MORTGAGE BILL IS SIGNED BY GOV. FERGUSON

Executive Acts To Make Debt Holiday Effective At Once

AUSTIN, May 1. (AP)—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson today signed the mortgage foreclosure moratorium bill passed by the legislature on last Friday.

The law empowers district courts to give two extensions of six months each on the payment of debts secured by real property.

Governor Ferguson signed the act shortly after it reached her in order that persons whose property was scheduled for sale tomorrow might obtain its benefits. Debtors may go into court this afternoon in an effort to obtain injunctions to prevent the sales set for tomorrow.

In order to obtain an extension on his debt, the property owner would have to convince a district court that the land probably would sell for less than its intrinsic value. He also would have to show that the property was not being mismanaged. No person more than four years in arrears in his taxes could procure an extension.

The court may appoint a disinterested party to collect rent from the property and apply it on the indebtedness.

STEVENSON IS SILENT ABOUT FUTURE PLANS

Soothsayers Are Lining Up Probable Candidates For Governor

AUSTIN, April 28. (AP)—The political soothsayers already are lining up the probable candidates for the next gubernatorial campaign which is more than a year distant.

In the forefront of those mentioned as likely aspirants for the office is the name of Coke Stevenson of Junction, speaker of the House of Representatives. Stevenson, however, appears to have embalmied any thoughts he may have on the matter under his broadbrimmed ranch hat and is letting his friends and others, do the speculating.

While Stevenson is regarded by many as a likely candidate for governor, there are many who would have him seek the office of attorney general if James V. Allred, present occupant, decided to enter the race for governor.

Allred's position in the political picture is rather uncertain. He has told friends he intended to dispose of his anti-trust suit against the oil companies before he would entertain much thought of the future. Many considered it probable that Allred might seek a third term as attorney general, if his big case has not been gotten out of the way by the time the campaign begins to warm.

Allred has been pushing for a trial date on the suit but the start has been postponed until the end of the legislative session because one of the attorneys in the case is a member of the House.

Stevenson made a good impression recently in his address accepting in behalf of the state, the San Jacinto battle flag. Some observers, reading between the lines of his speech, saw a declaration of a possible platform on which he might base his candidacy.

FIRST SPRING LAMBS SHIPPED

The first spring lambs to go out of this section this season were shipped Friday, when a carload of lambs were billed to John Clay in Fort Worth by W. E. Weathersbee.

The shipment of these lambs and a carload shipped Saturday to the Texas Livestock Marketing Association in Kansas City are considered a record for early shipment, stockmen say. The lambs will average approximately 53 pounds, commission men think.

The case of Bessie Sharp, of this city, who has been in jail in Fort Stockton, for the past two months or more, and which was scheduled to come to trial at Fort Stockton this week has been postponed until the August term of the district court which will be presided over by Judge Joe Montague.

Mrs. Sharp, charged with the poisoning of her husband W. E. Eelfus Sharp on a ranch near this city two years ago, was tried for the offense in Del Rio and due to a hung jury the case was transferred to Fort Stockton. The case was originally set to come to trial this week, but due to the unavoidable absence of one of the defense attorneys Hon. Coke Stevenson, Speaker of the House at Austin, the case had to be postponed.

A large number of witnesses from this county as well as over the State will be in attendance at the trial which in all probability will require several days, but a speedy trial assured with Judge Montague on the bench.

Ask Steel Work Bids For Bridge At Devil's River

Sealed proposals for furnishing and erecting the steel work for the Devil's River Highway bridge will be received at the State Highway Department in Austin until 10 a. m. May 10, officials of the highway department stated in a communication received here Monday.

The proposals will be for furnishing and erecting six steel truss spans of 175 feet and two I-beams of 52 feet each. Flooring for the structure will also be included in the proposal it was stated.

The concrete structure, consisting of piers and abutments, was recently completed by Thompson and Simpson of San Angelo. The road work and approaches to the bridge was done by Thomas Spencer. The bridge was started last Fall, but the floods of early September made it necessary to change the plans and raise the bridge several feet. The new plans, put into effect, are said to raise the bridge considerably above any high water level of the river, and the piers are specially constructed to withstand the impact of floating trees and debris during floods.—Del Rio Evening News.

Spring Clip Of Mohair Is Sold By Local Company

The Sanderson Wool Commission Company reports this week that they have sold their spring mohair accumulation consisting of 148,000 pounds to Tom Richey of Lampasas, who is a representative of A. W. Hilliard & Son of Boston.

The accumulation is part of the warehouse mohair pool of between three and four million pounds that was recently sold.

Prices received for this accumulation were 28 to 30 cents for Kid hair and 10 to 13 cents for grown hair which is quite an advance in price over last season's.

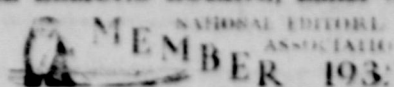

THE RULE OF REHOBOTHAM

My father made your yoke heavy, and I will add to your yoke; my father also chastised you with whips but I will chastise you with scorpions.

So spoke the young King Rehobotham when he took the throne of Israel upon the death of Solomon. It seems that the Rehobothams have taken charge of the House at Austin. Faced with the urgent need for less taxes, they pile more on. Hard times, say the Rehobothams of the House, are to be cured with harder taxes.

Anybody with the white-collar wages of \$2,500 a year is to feel the blow. Any business prosperous enough to be able to meet its pay roll will be staggered afresh with the tax gatherers' demands. Corporations do not vote. All they do is to provide jobs for voters—and voters are so simple minded that they will tax the possibility of their jobs in blissful ignorance that these jobs now hang by all too slender a thread. Thus do the Rehobothams of Austin reason.

The House was not willing to cut its own salary. The House has refused to enact any of the major reorganizations in the interest of economy as recommended by the Graves committee. The House has been timorous in the presence of lobbying minorities seeking to maintain the old wasteful ways of government and of education. The call, therefore, is for these \$10-a-day horsemen of the Depression to ride roughshod over the last remnant of solvency in Texas with the scourge of Rehobotham.

Some members of the House deserve none of these strictures. Some of them have done their best for the beleaguered taxpayer. Some have a record beyond criticism. But the majority gives character to the group, and the majority has done but little to meet a great emergency.—Dallas News.

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

Happenings That Affect the Dinner Pails, Dividend Checks and Tax Bills of Every Individual. National and International Problems Inseparable From Local Welfare.

With unexpected and dramatic suddenness—so far as the general public is concerned—came President Roosevelt's request to the Congress for the granting of powers which would give the President an economic dictatorship to an extent that is unprecedented in this country. His proposal has a number of phases, but its principal feature hinges on currency inflation. The President would decrease the gold reserve behind each unit of money and permit the issuance of \$3,000,000,000 of new currency in an attempt to revive prices, which Mr. Roosevelt believes to be the major need of the moment. The Federal Reserve System would buy up to \$3,000,000,000 of government bonds at the same time, as a means of expanding credit.

If the plan is authorized, it will naturally work drastic changes in the economic set-up of the country. Coming at the time it does, it is especially striking in its application to the economic conferences between Mr. Roosevelt and the representatives of foreign governments, and in the influence it will have on his hitherto untested control of the Congress. The issuance of his statement marked the mobilization of the first organized and directed opposition to his emergency legislation. The following day four of the principal Congressional Republicans—Senators Reed and Walcott, and Representatives Snell and Luce—came out with a biting denunciation of the main aspects of the bill, holding that "it violates the most elementary principles" of economics. A few of the leading Congressional Democrats, including Senator Glass, Secretary of the treasury under Wilson, are reported as being in the opposition. Democratic leaders, however, believe that they have sufficient support to pass the measure.

Opinion on the measure, aside from that of a political character, is mixed. The press generally has been cautious in its comment, neither supporting nor opposing the proposal. Influence on security prices was marked, with stocks and bonds, in addition to various basic commodities, making substantial price gains.

The Boston News Bureau reports that statements of industrial executives at annual corporation meetings have uniformly been of a more confident tone than for some time past. Justification for this attitude is appearing in the business statistics. Raw materials, principally wheat and sugar, are showing price strength. The rise in commodity prices is gradual and is being well maintained. Electric power consumption figures for a number of consecutive weeks show a marked betterment over last year. This is likewise true of car loadings.

Rapid trade expansion is not looked for until further adjustment in the credit structure has taken place, and this, in turn, waits upon additional thawing out of the banking situation. But opinion is practically unanimous that the worst has passed, and the work of recovery actually begun.

Conditions in various industries are:

STEEL—The middle of April found steel activities at a new high for 1933.

RETAIL TRADE—Most encouraging in several years in a number of large centers.

CONSTRUCTION—Industry said to be thoroughly deflated. Increase in building activities anticipated.

LIFE INSURANCE—New business appreciably under 1932 levels.

LUMBER—Generally speaking, orders running well ahead of output. Most regions are showing in-

Industrial development is explanation of the fact that during February of 1933 Texas wage earners were 6,000 more than they were in the peak month of a decade earlier.

A bill to require textbooks used in the Texas public schools to be printed in Texas has been favorably reported by the House Education Committee.

MOTORS—Automobile sales are maintaining upward trend.

COOTTON—Consumption increasing.

RAILS—Outlook continues to be more encouraging but profits are still at the vanishing point.

Two of the principal topics which the Administration wishes to settle by international action are silver prices and control of wheat surpluses. Effort will be made to improve and stabilize price of silver as an impetus to world trade. Present low silver prices have deprived half the world's population of much of its buying power.

The Interstate Commerce Commission will probably be thoroughly reorganized. It is reported that the fourteen bureaus within the Commission will be reduced to seven. Six bureaus will be transferred to the projected land transportation section of the Commerce Department's transportation division. One bureau—valuation—will probably be completely abolished, or at least much reduced in size.

export business for 1932. According to Department of Commerce figures, the total of Texas exports for the first nine months of 1932 was \$209,835,329 as compared with \$203,313,312 for the same period in 1931. Some states, Ohio among them, showed as much as a 50 per cent decrease in that period.

Fire loss of \$50,000 was caused to the Cumner-Graham Company plant at Paris when two warehouses with their contents were destroyed. Manufacturing activities were not interfered with seriously, as none of the machinery was damaged in the main plant.

PHARMACIST EXAMINATIONS OPEN

The United States Civil Service Commission will accept applications until May 23 for the positions of junior pharmacists and assistant pharmacist aide to fill vacancies in the United States Veterans' Administration and in the Public Health Service.

The entrance salary for junior pharmacist is \$2,000 a year, and for assistant pharmacist aide \$1,260 a year. The salaries named are subject to a deduction of not to exceed 15 per cent as a measure of economy, and a retirement deduction of 3 1-2 per cent.

Applicants must submit evidence that they are full-licensed pharmacists, such license having been obtained as the result of examination before a State board of pharmacy. Certain specified education and experience are also required.

All States except Iowa, Maryland, New Hampshire, Vermont, Virginia, and the District of Columbia have received less than their share of appointments in the apportioned departmental service at Washington.

Full information may be obtained from the Secretary of the United States Civil Service Board of Examiners at the post office in any city which has a post office of the first or the second class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

RECIPES AND MENUS

DENTON, May 4. — Everybody knows that small children need milk but as the two year olds grow into ten year olds and then twenty year olds there is frequently a tendency to depend more and more upon foods that possess very distinctive flavors and to neglect milk, one of the best foods available to man. Milk, more than any other food can make up for inadequacies in the diet.

It furnishes protein of excellent quality for building up and repairing body tissue, both brain and muscle; it furnishes calcium to build bones and teeth. For children, who need so much bone building material, it is the only satisfactory source of this very necessary mineral. Furthermore milk provides phosphorus for bones and blood and nerves and also adds iron and vitamins to the diet.

It is not necessary to serve milk just as a beverage. It may be used in a variety of ways. For example, to increase the quantity of milk that you are giving your family try serving more frequently cream soups, creamed vegetables and meats, ice creams, cottage cheese, custards, and puddings, or cereals cooked in milk. Have you ever tried a glass of orange milk foam?

Breakfast: Stewed peaches, bran with top milk, fried apple rings, bacon, toast, coffee and milk.

Lunch: Ham au Gratin, string beans, lettuce and young radish salad, corn meal rolls, butter, dewberries with cream, cocoa.

Dinner: Broiled steak, mashed potatoes, gravy, asparagus and Hollandaise dressing, tomato and cucumber salad, baking powder biscuit, pecan pie a la mode, coffee.

Orange Milk Foam: 6 T orange juice, 6 T milk (or 4 T evaporated milk), 1 t sugar, 6 T cold water. Beat or shake well. Serve at once in a large glass.

Corn Meal Rolls: 1 1-2 c flour, 2 2 t baking powder, 2 T shortening, 1-2 c milk, 1-4 c corn meal, 1 t salt, 1 egg, 2-3 c chopped raisins. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and corn meal. Cut in shortening and add raisins. Beat egg, add to milk and mix with dry ingredients until soft dough is formed. Roll to 1-2 inch thickness. Cut

into biscuit and bake or shape as parker house roll.

Ham Au Gratin: 1 1-2 c milk, 1-2 slice onion, 1 stalk celery, 2 T flour, 1 1-2 c chopped cooked potato, 1 c chopped cooked ham, 2 T butter, 1 egg 1 t salt, 1-4 t paprika. Put butter and flour in double boiler. When well blended, slowly add milk. Add minced onion and sliced celery. Cook until creamy, add egg well beaten, seasoning and ham. Pour into well-buttered baking dish, add cooked potato and bake 25 minutes in moderate oven.

Breakfast: oranges, muffins, with scrambled eggs, coffee, milk.

Lunch: Rice croquettes, baked beans, brown bread, tea.

Dinner: Baked potatoes, with pork chops, i gravy, buttered English peas, peach salad with cottage cheese, chocolate surprise, coffee.

The annual "Cinco de Mayo," celebration which is held by the Mexican population of this city will be held two days this year, Friday and Saturday, May 5 and 6th.

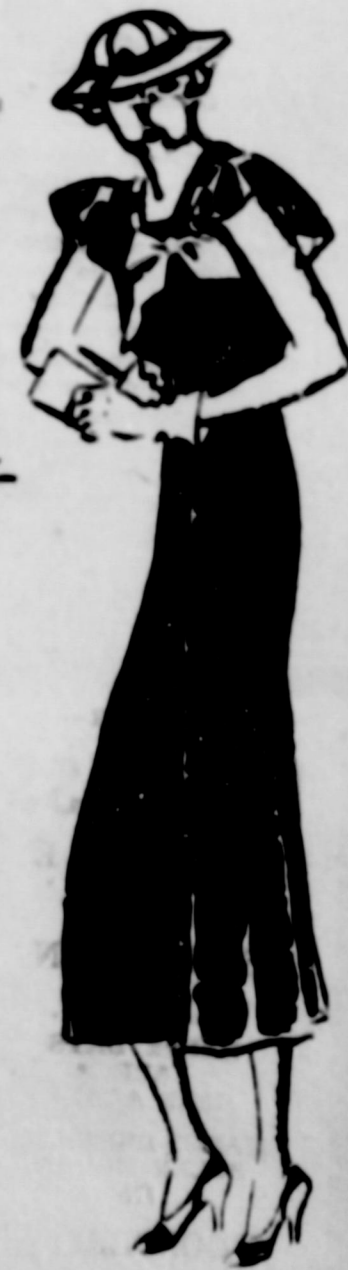

The Livestock Situation

J. A. McNAUGHTON

LOS ANGELES, May 4, 1933.—Recent advances in commodity values have failed to make much impression on livestock prices, although some gains were directly beneficial to stockmen. Most important to the sheepman has been the rapid improvement in demand for wool, and a consequent upward trend in values. What has been gained in wool values has more than been offset in lower lamb prices, however. Recent sales of wool clips in the western states have been made at much higher values than prevailed last season, while California early crop lambs are now selling at prices fully one cent a pound lower than in May, 1932.

A feature which has added strength to the cattle outlook is the prices have advanced sharply during the past month. When it is remembered that the hide of a steer averages about seven per cent of the entire weight of the bullock, it will be understood that the packer must take into serious consideration the value of the hide, as well as the beef. Under normal conditions, it is a well known fact that the packer was able to sell his beef at cost, and still make a satisfactory profit through the sale of the hide and by-products. Under present conditions, by-products hardly pay the cost of processing, so that plant overhead and profit must come from the sale of beef.

Hog prices have fluctuated within a narrow price range, showing a very small share in the general commodity price upturn. Last season's spectacular advance in hog prices came late in June and continued through summer. Government estimates indicate a larger supply of hogs for market during the summer of 1933 than a year ago, yet the trade generally is hopeful of a seasonal upturn which may take place in the very near future. Packers and producer agencies have started a comprehensive campaign in several eastern states to push the sale of lard and to regain at least part of the huge outlet for that product which has been taken over by vegetable substitutes.

It appears to this writer that the livestock and meat industry has been lax in developing markets for various by-products of the industry, including such products as lard, hides, tallow and the many other important "sidelines," that once held a vastly more important place in world commerce. Promotion of meat has been carried along on comprehensive lines, through educational and advertising campaigns. It is just as important to the industry to energetically push the sale of by-products.

GOOD ROADS PAY \$54,000 A YEAR HERE

AUSTIN, Texas.—Terrell county's state highway bring \$54,000 a year in extra business to the county in the form of tourist trade, the Texas Good Roads Association has estimated from a survey of the state's last official traffic census.

This business, the survey points out, does not include "natural" trade from local cars or those of adjoining counties, which obviously would increase with improved roads.

State checkers, from four days' actual count, found the average daily traffic to be: 250 motor vehicles on Highway 3; 75 on Highway 82.

Motor traffic in Texas is divided, the experts have found, in two almost equal classes. Roughly, half are local cars or from adjoining counties. The other half are from beyond the state, or from Texas points at least two counties distant. The latter are real tourists.

"On this basis, some 150 outside cars cross Terrell county each day," the Association's survey said, "scattering their good American dollars among the restaurants, hotels, tourist camps, hot dog stands, garages, filling stations and stores along the important highways."

"If they spend as little as \$1 per vehicle within the borders of the county, then Terrell county's trunk roads mean \$4,500 in added business per month, or \$54,000 a year, exclusive of the convenience and saving to her own 3,000 people, who operate some 500 cars themselves."

The survey, conducted by the Association for every county in Texas, was designed to show importance of roads to each community, and thus arouse public opinion against any further diversion of gas tax money, which would cripple the highway program.

TIPS ON TAXES

Legislative News Service Of The Texas Press Association, Austin

AUSTIN.—The Forty-third Legislature, now nearing the close of its regular session, will likely reduce the costs of State government from 25 to 30 per cent. Up to the present time it has created no new commissions or bureaus and levied no important new taxes. Every branch of the State government has had its budget reduced. Equally important is the passage of legislation designed to stop tax evasions, and to provide penalties that will insure more effective enforcement of special taxes, such as the cigarette and gross productions taxes. The Comptroller estimates that at least \$5,000,000 in these special taxes, which has been lost through inadequate enforcement facilities, will be saved and added to State revenues.

There are two constitutional amendments pending, which if adopted, will be of far-reaching importance. One would arbitrarily limit total expenditures of the State and the other would abolish the fee system of compensating county officials and make for lowering the tremendous costs of county government, which averages much higher than State government. The first of these amendments has passed the Senate and the second has passed the House. Prospects of their submission seems good, but citizens can do a real service by urging the submission of these two amendments.

In spite of failure to adequately meet conditions in many respects, the present session of the Legislature may be counted a success, if it adheres to its present apparent purpose to levy no new taxes and cut expenses and also submits these two amendments. The amendments will open the way for permanent tax reform and provide effective safeguard against recurrence of the recent orgy of spending by all branches of government.

Appropriations for expenses of the Legislature were approximately \$500,000. This represents a reduction of about 30 per cent below the cost of the regular sessions since the pay of legislators was increased by constitutional amendment. The Senate voted to make the pay of members \$8 per day, instead of the constitutional limit of \$10. The House refused to concur and fixed salaries of House members at \$10, and Senators at \$8. It is impossible to give the total cost of the session. It may be prolonged beyond the four months and thus necessitate an additional appropriation for salaries of members and other expenses.

The effort to again bring up a sales tax bill has failed for the time being. The house committee on revenue and taxation gave an adverse report on the Kayton bill, which differed somewhat from the administration sales tax bill, killed earlier in the session. It is regarded as doubtful whether the bill has a chance of being brought out on a minority report.

The income tax bill which has passed the House seems to have little chance of passing the Senate.

The House took up the higher education appropriation bill last week and made drastic cuts in salaries and other items, going below the reductions already approved by the appropriations committee. This is the last of the major appropriation bills. Senate figures in the appropriation bills average higher than House figures and differences are being compromised in conference.

Bootleggers Outwitted When Treasury Issues New Fag Tax Stamp

AUSTIN, April 28. (AP)—The Texas state treasury has outmaneuvered cigaret stamp bootleggers by adopting a cigaret stamp that can be used only once.

It has been estimated the state was losing several thousand dollars annually by bootleggers taking the stamp off one package of cigarettes after it had been sold and attaching it to another. The old stamp could be removed without defacement and easily placed on another pack.

It was virtually impossible for the small number of state inspectors to apprehend violators of the cigaret tax law. There was no way to determine whether the stamps had been used more than once.

The new stamp, however, can be used only once and persons attempting to remove it intact are doomed to disappointment. It merely chip off in flakes. By the time the stamp is removed, all that is left are numerous small pieces.

It is composed of a combination of paper and wax and was adopted after several efforts had been made to obtain a stamp that could not be removed and used again.

Increases in taxable wealth and population a demand for continued liberal support of approximately the same level as during the years of prosperity for public schools is being made. Since 1920 scholastic population has increased 26 per cent, taxable wealth 30 per cent and State school support 150 per cent.

Analysis of the State budget in the light of reductions already made, and provided the Legislature does not attempt to hold the school apportionment to prosperity levels, shows that legitimate needs of the government can be met without additional tax levies.

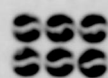
