Prison Concentration Bill Passes In Legislature Texas Tech Presents Fourth Annual Pageant Tonight

Program To Be Staged On Green Behind Cloisters

Arrangement Made To Take Care Of Crowd Between Six And Seven Thousand People; Starts At 8:30

Costumes Colorful

Citizens And Faculty Members To Have Part In Affair This Year; Miss R. Pirtle Directing

ALL the splendor and chivalry of the Elizabethan age, accentuated in charm by gorgeous costumes announced by spot lights, will be presented by 200 students at Texas Technological College's fourth annual pageant Friday evening at 8:30 before the cloisters of the administration building, where arrangements have been made to accommodate an expected audience of 6,000 to 7,000 persons.

Rehearsal Thursday evening revealed the spectacular and glamorous elements of the festivity. In beauty and elaborateness, the pageant eclipses all entertainment programs of the college.

The event this year is an Elizabethan fair and, although the cast is comparatively large, the pageant will be concluded in two hours, according to directors, Misses Ruth Pirtle and Zella Reigel.

During the entire evening there will be a number of episodes in progress simultaneously and each will be brief.

Miss Lynn Daugherty will represent Queen Elizabeth in this program and it is before her throne that the fair takes place. Preceding the entrance various characters will appear, including shepherds, Robin Hood and his merry men, villagers, robbers, tumbler, scholars, gypsies, dancers, musicians, fencers and others.

As the program progresses a rotating group of persons enter going to the queen's throne. The queen has this year brought before her throne Miss Marion, a part played by Miss Donna Vaughn, is crowned queen of May by Robin Hood, played by Wayne Castleberry.

West Texas Rail Routes Granted By ICC Thursday

Orient Extensions From Alpine To Presidio And To Sonora From San Angelo Are Approved

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 16.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today authorized the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad of Texas to construct an 86-mile extension from Alpine to the Rio Grande river at a point near Presidio.

Construction Will Start In 30 Days On New Line

SAN ANGELO, May 16.—Construction of a new rail line from San Angelo to Sonora, permission for which was granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission today, is expected to begin within the next 30 days.

E. H. Sautter, general manager of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient, who left here today before he had been advised of the approval by the I. C. C., already had said that several carloads of rails are on their way to San Angelo. Engineering crews are surveying the route and locating depot sites.

Denton Attorney Takes Own Life

DENTON, May 16.—J. W. Sullivan, 60, attorney, today told his law partner, John Speer, that in three months he believed he would be blind. A few minutes later, in his private office, Sullivan shot himself to death. A verdict of suicide was returned.

A democratic presidential election in 1912, three times a delegate to the national democratic convention, Sullivan had been active politically. Once was county attorney here.

She was removed to the Southern California Hospital for the Insane at Patton on complaint of her mother, Mrs. Theresa Rubens.

Miss Rubens' latest encounter with the authorities came early today when her mother called sheriff's deputies to her home to subdue the actress, who, her mother alleged, had attacked her nurse and attempted to commit suicide.

Eckener Heads Ship Back Home After 12 Hours Out

(By Associated Press) FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 16.—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin tonight slowly cruised homeward from the Mediterranean with two of her five motors crippled and eighteen disappointed passengers who had hoped that Lakehurst, N. J. would be their first stop.

The giant airship, in its first twelve hours of flight, had covered nearly 1,000 miles and had reached a point between the Balearic Islands and the Spanish Mediterranean and Gibraltar. From there she was to have followed a course over the Azores, and possibly Bermuda, to America.

Heads For Home

Instead, motor trouble, apparently due to crankshaft or connecting rods, caused her commander, Dr. Hugo Eckener, to swing the ship around and head for home here.

His decision was reached at 6:35 p. m. (12:35 Eastern Standard time).

It was the first time that the Graf Zeppelin had turned back from any of the long voyages set for her. The first to America was accomplished despite storms which damaged and called for repair of her fabric.

It seemed probable that the Graf could not arrive till sometime after daylight.

BASTROP, May 16.—Joseph D. Sayers, soldier and statesman, who adopted Bastrop as his home 70 years ago, came back today in death.

The body of one of Texas' most beloved governors was buried beside his father and mother and his first wife, Ada Walton Sayers, who died 58 years ago.

Argument Results In Fatal Shooting

Grant Swafford Dies From Bullets Of Son-in-Law's Gun; Clive Griffin Named On Murder Charge

(By Associated Press) WAXAHACHIE, May 16.—Grant Swafford, wounded earlier in the day in a shooting affray, died at 11:30 this afternoon and his son-in-law, Clive Griffin, of El Paso, was charged with murder. Relatives said that the two men, who have disagreed over family matters, met half a mile from Waxahachie this morning and got into an argument.

Swafford was struck by three bullets. Griffin is partially paralyzed from World War injuries.

Dam Breaks Near Stamford Thursday

STAMFORD, May 16.—Lake No. 4, which covered nearly 160 acres of land and was almost full from recent heavy rains, was pouring its water into the lowlands here today through a 40-foot break in its three-quarter mile dam.

The lake is about three miles north of Stamford. It once was used for a municipal water supply.

One highway was under water in places, and several farms had been inundated, but property loss was expected to be slight. No persons were killed or injured.

PLAN NOT ACCEPTED

Canada Won't Allow U. S. Officers On Other Side

OTTAWA, Ont., May 16.—(By Associated Press) Canada's offer to allow the United States to place officers on the Canadian side of the border to obtain information on liquor shipments intended for the States was not accepted, it was disclosed today when documents covering the January conference of officials of the two countries were tabled.

PIKEVILLE, Ky., May 16.—(By Associated Press) A city policeman was killed, a suspected prohibition law violator probably fatally wounded, and a United States constable was shot through the leg in a pistol battle in the Happy Hollow section of Pikeville today.

Padlock's Bogey Hits Huge Hotel

CHICAGO, May 16.—(By Associated Press) The bogey of the government padlock has poked its way into the Stevens hotel, the world's largest, and today the hotel voluntarily ordered that service of set-ups to hotel guests be stopped.

The Stevens was the largest of a series of hotels, clubs and cabarets to apply the blotter and mop lest their be the fate of the score of night clubs closed by federal injunction because their patrons illicitly spiked the innocuous beverages they served.

Blast Death Toll Increased To 124

As Probe Is Made

Explosion Believed To Have Resulted From Combustion; No One Blamed For Tragedy; More May Die

(By Associated Press) CLEVELAND, O., May 16.—Spontaneous combustion in an overheated store room caused fire and explosions which wrecked the Cleveland clinic building and took the lives of 124 patients, nurses and doctors, fire wardens reported today.

The heat came from a leaky steam pipe in the basement room. Deputy Wardens Max Gross and P. T. Ferris reported.

Coroner A. J. Pearce, after completing his first day's investigation, said he failed to find any evidence of negligence by any one connected with the clinic. Neither did any of the other investigators attempt to place blame earlier in the day.

Coroner Pearce had been inclined to believe carelessness might have been responsible.

Plumber's Story Heard

It was the story of Bojoffery Boggs, a plumber, who was sent to repair the pipe, which led to the investigation and decision that the heat caused the flames which liberated clouds of poisonous gases and overcame many of the 300 occupants of the building.

As reports were received regularly of additional deaths, due to the poisonous action of the fumes, the total mounted toward the 124 mark with indications that this number would be increased before tomorrow.

PAYNE IS ELECTED

Malakoff Student Wins In University Election

AUSTIN, May 16.—Robert M. Payne of Malakoff, was elected president of the University of Texas Student association today, defeating Spurgeon Bell, of Abilene, in a run-off election after the men had tied in the general election a week ago. The vote was 1,450 for Payne, for Bell, 1,117.

WELL EXTINGUISHED

LULING, May 16.—The Shell oil company well on the Clint Smith tract in the Bruns field, which caught fire as it blew in Monday, was extinguished today by the use of mud and steam.

Two Armies Totalling 170,000 Men Are Pitched Against Each Other In China

(By Associated Press) CANTON, China, May 16.—Two well equipped armies totaling 170,000 men engaged in serious battle tonight on two fronts with this rich commercial city as the prize. The fighting went on both east and west of Canton, but reports trickling back did not indicate with whom the advantage lay.

The defending Kwangtung forces consisted of 70,000 men well equipped with modern rifles, hand grenades, light field artillery, sub-machine guns, machine guns and automatic pistols. They had a tremendous advantage in possession of 20 airplanes. Their opponents have none. The Cantonese navy also is three times as large as the attacking fleet.

The attacking Kwangsi army, advancing down the west and north river, had 100,000 soldiers equally well equipped except for air and water fighting. Since their task is to take the offensive their greater number does not constitute an overwhelming advantage.

It was reported that the Kwangsi authorities at Samshui had refused to accept surrender of several units of the defenders. They were said to have granted only the alternatives of fighting or fleeing.

Robison Receives Severe Criticism In Solons' Report

Findings Of Land Office Probe Placed Before House Thursday Despite Efforts Barron, Others

Charge Negligence

Report Says Commissioner Was Unsound In Policies Of Office; One-Cent An Acre Fund Is State's

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, May 16.—Severe censure of Land Commissioner J. T. Robison, contained in the report of the joint house and senate investigating committee submitted today, tonight had caused the tenseness of a possible legislative fight.

Speaker W. S. Barron and other house leaders were endeavoring to dissuade Woodruff of Decatur, and others, in an announced intention of bringing the matter to the floor through a resolution, bearing on findings of the committee.

Held In Obedience

The resolution was sent to the speaker soon after the report had been read but was held in abeyance. Woodruff said he intended to insist on putting it before the house and that he was having it rewritten for that purpose.

Although refraining from submitting any suggestions as to what action the legislature "should take concerning the acts of the land commissioner," the committee report charged that the commissioner, while Mr. Robison handled the "one cent per acre fund" collected from purchasers of state land to defray expenses of administering the reclamation act of 1925, was "irresponsible, unwarranted and unjustified; that the same involves an unsound public policy and should not be countenanced by any public official."

Agreement In Rail Strike Is Reached

Texas Strike Question Is Settled In Signing Of Papers Thursday; Half Of Losses To Be Paid

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, May 16.—Representatives of 4,000 members of four railway brotherhoods today signed an agreement with the Texas and Pacific Railway company which had as its basis recommendation made recently by a federal board of mediation. The effect was to nullify a strike vote taken by the men before the hearing, and to give them some of the concessions they sought.

The main issue in the threatened strike involved claims by the men against the road for losses sustained on homes purchased in cities from which they were transferred.

The road will pay half of the property loss received by the workers and will recognize this principle in the future, said J. A. Somerville, general manager of the road.

BEAUMONT, May 16.—(By Associated Press) Abilene was selected as the 1930 convention city and J. W. Parks, Dallas, was elected president in the closing session of the Texas Federation of Labor here tonight.

Question Of Prison Commission Is Now Up To Governor Moody; Likely That He Will Sign Bill

To Select Site

Widely-Scattered Plants To Be Centralized On State-Owned Property In Plan; May Be Approved

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, May 16.—Penitentiary A concentration business after more than two years of controversy in the Texas legislature tonight.

It now is up to Governor Moody whether a commission of nine citizens, independent of the prison board, shall decide whether it is practicable to centralize the now widely-scattered system on some site of present state owned properties.

House Concurred

The house tonight concurred, 105 to 7, in the senate amendments to its bill.

Legislators close to the governor said he would sign the bill.

Under amendments attached by Senators A. J. Wirtz of Seguin and C. C. Small of Wellington, the governor would name a commission of nine to make a survey of present properties and if it found a practicable site thereon it would direct the prison board to effect the concentration.

If the commission decides property owned by the state is not suitable then the lieutenant governor would appoint three senators and the speaker of the house five representatives to act with the prison board in a survey of the state with a view to recommending a site. A report and recommendations then would be made to the governor who

Rogers Trial Goes To New Braunfels

Defense Attorneys Attempt To Disqualify Jeffrey In Trial; Prejudices Said To Be In Case

(By Associated Press) LAGRANGE, May 16.—Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers' trial for robbery of the Farmers National bank at Buda today was transferred from LAGRANGE to New Braunfels, Comal county.

When Judge M. C. Jeffrey announced the transfer to another county in his district, defense attorneys filed a motion to disqualify him on the ground that he is "highly prejudiced against the defendant and showed that prejudice through the trial." Judge Jeffrey announced the venue change after it seemed a jury could not be chosen here. Publicity attending a former trial at LAGRANGE in which Mrs. Rogers drew a 14-year sentence was said to have led to the formation of opinions in the minds of most prospective jurors. The 14-year conviction was reversed and remanded on appeal.

Arguments on the motion to disqualify Judge Jeffrey are to be heard at New Braunfels. The motion said that during the examination of jurors for the second trial here Judge Jeffrey once threatened

The Texas banks, he said, are responsible for the maintenance of a friendly intercourse of great magnitude with foreign countries.

STAMFORD, May 16.—(AP)—The confusion over Mexican residents in Texas which is causing many misunderstandings in southern counties in the state may be cleared up as a result of an effort on the part of Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and others.

J. H. Green, secretary of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce wrote the manager of the regional organization quoting instances of injustice to Mexicans with the suggestion that he take it up with the proper authorities. Congressman

Claude Hudspeth has already been notified. Wade immediately took the matter up with Tom Connally, senator.

Must Have Papers Green advised Hudspeth's interpretation of the law was that Mexicans residing in Texas or the United States five years or more, can not be deported, also those having been here a less period of time, if provided with proper papers and good record.

It seems that there are several agencies gathering up Mexicans and returning them to Mexico, if the Mexican does not have in his possession at the time of contact, proper papers.

It is rumored, Green stated, that the Mexican is given no opportunity to state his case, produce his papers, nor furnish proof, but that in some cases Mexicans have been hurried into buses and rushed away, without any kind of a hearing or representation.

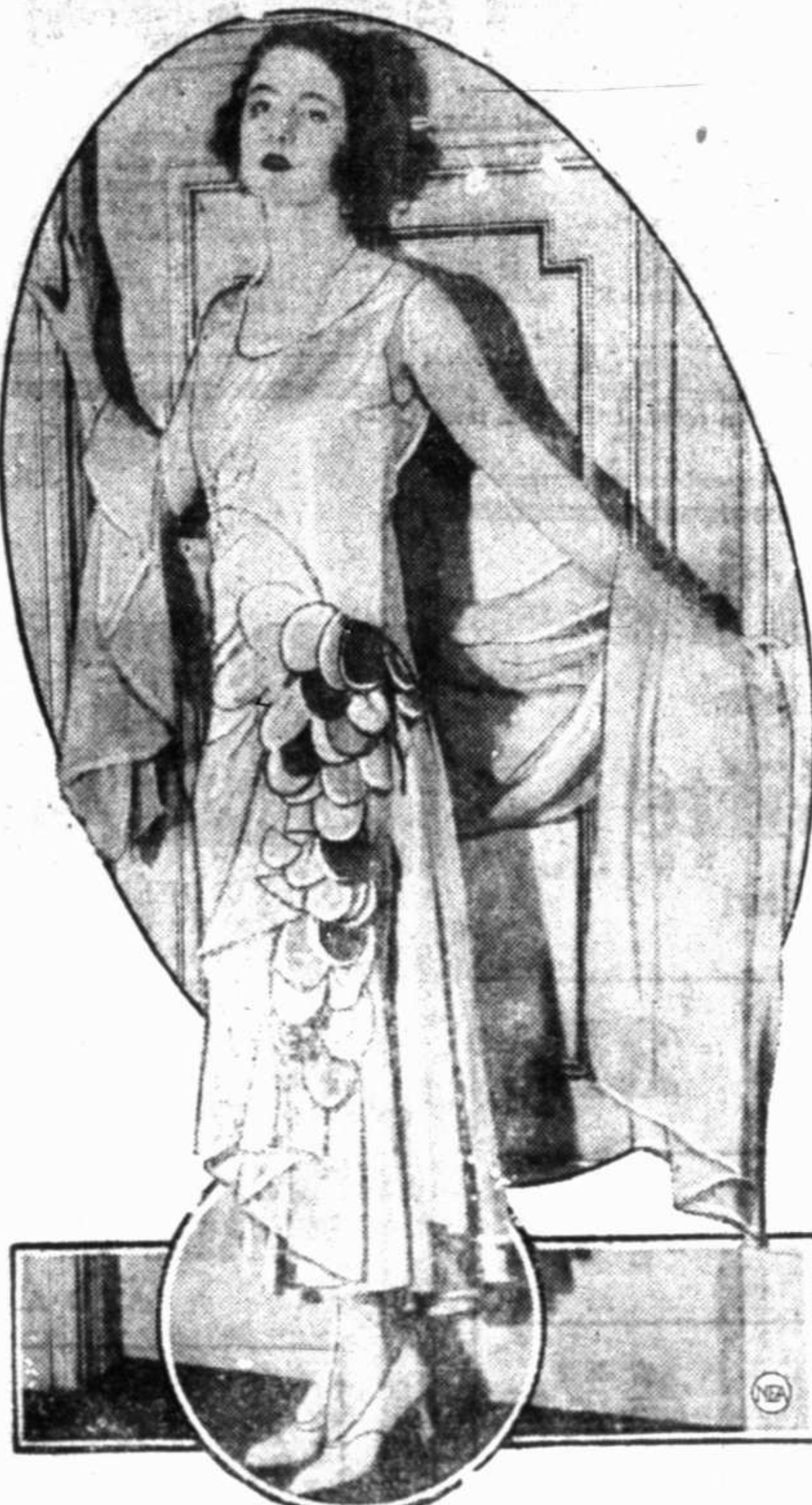

Third Tech Frosh Stock Judging Contest Saturday

Twenty-Six Students Will Take Part In Judging Of Stock; Gold Medal Offered To Winner

The third annual Freshman Livestock Judging contest, of the Texas Technological college, will be held Saturday, May 18, in the livestock judging pavilion at the college, beginning at 7:30 a. m. and occupying practically all day.

Ten classes, representing five different kinds of livestock, will be judged. There will be two classes of beef cattle, two of dairy cattle, two of hogs, two of sheep and two of horses. Oral reasons will be given on five classes. The total possible score for each contestant will be 750 based on 30 for placing of each class and 50 for reasons.

Twenty-Six Entered

There will be 26 students, representing the upper two-thirds, based on scholarship, of those pursuing the Freshman Animal Husbandry courses, will participate in the contest. The high man of this contest will be awarded a gold medal, which is being presented by Alex McDonald, of the McDonald Packing company. High men of the other two annual livestock judging contests were: W. G. Shepard, winner of the first contest in 1927, and E. Y. Freeland, winner of the second, in 1928. Shepard is now herdsman for J. P. Osborne, outstanding breeder of Angewies Herefords, of Miami, Texas. Freeland is athletic director at the college, and is taking courses in agriculture, majoring in Animal Husbandry.

The 26 students who are to participate in the contest similar to those grouped into five teams, for the purpose of making the contest similar to those held at the large stock shows in Fort Worth, Kansas City, Chicago and other large cities. The winning team Saturday will be entertained with a theater party by their instructors, Prof. R. C. Mowery, and F. G. Harbaugh.

The contest will be conducted by the senior students in Animal Husbandry. Dennis Cameron will act as superintendent, John Burroughs and Ronald Tom as section leaders, and Vaughan Corley as clerk.

These four men were members of the Texas Tech judging team competing last year at the International Livestock show, at Chicago. Cameron placed high man of the horse judging contest at this show.

ficial in the discharge of the duties of his office.

Public Fund Always

The committee concluded that the one cent acre fund "was at all times a public fund and that all the money which remained undispensed by the commissioner in the actual administration of the 1925 reappraisal act, is the property of the state of Texas. The committee recommended that the attorney general investigate the advisability of instituting suit against the land commissioner, calling on him to make an accurate account of the fund, and for the recovery of the sums of money which such accounting shows have not been legitimately used by the commissioner in administering said account."

The committee's conclusion that the fund was "public money" was supported by an opinion from Attorney General Claude Pollard.

Refrain From Suggestion

The report said that the committee expressly had refrained from making any suggestion as to whether or not any action should be taken concerning the commissioner by virtue of this report because such a suggestion was not positively called for by the terms of the resolution under which the committee acted and because such responsibility should rest upon the legislature as a whole.

The report stated that all "undisposed and scrap lands" may be sold without effect and that the two instances in which such lands were located in proved oil territory for a nominal consideration and that as a result the public school funds have suffered extensive damages and losses.

Found Vast Deceit Open

Boggs told authorities he found the fire proof door to the vault open and the place where the films were kept full of steam, presumably from a leaky pipe. He was unable to find the leak, however, and finally noticed a brown sticky substance on the ceiling from which steam seemed to be issuing.

He used a fire extinguisher with no effect and was overcome a few minutes later by the gas. As he was attempting to crawl out of the room, Boggs said, an explosion lifted him through the door and he eventually reached the outside, seeing none the worse for the experience.

While anywhere from seven to twenty deaths were expected among the victims in hospitals, it was claimed tonight that many who thought they had escaped and had not gone to the hospitals for treatment might be affected later.

The white brick clinic building was roped off today to keep all but officials away. It was feared there might be some of the gas still about the structure.

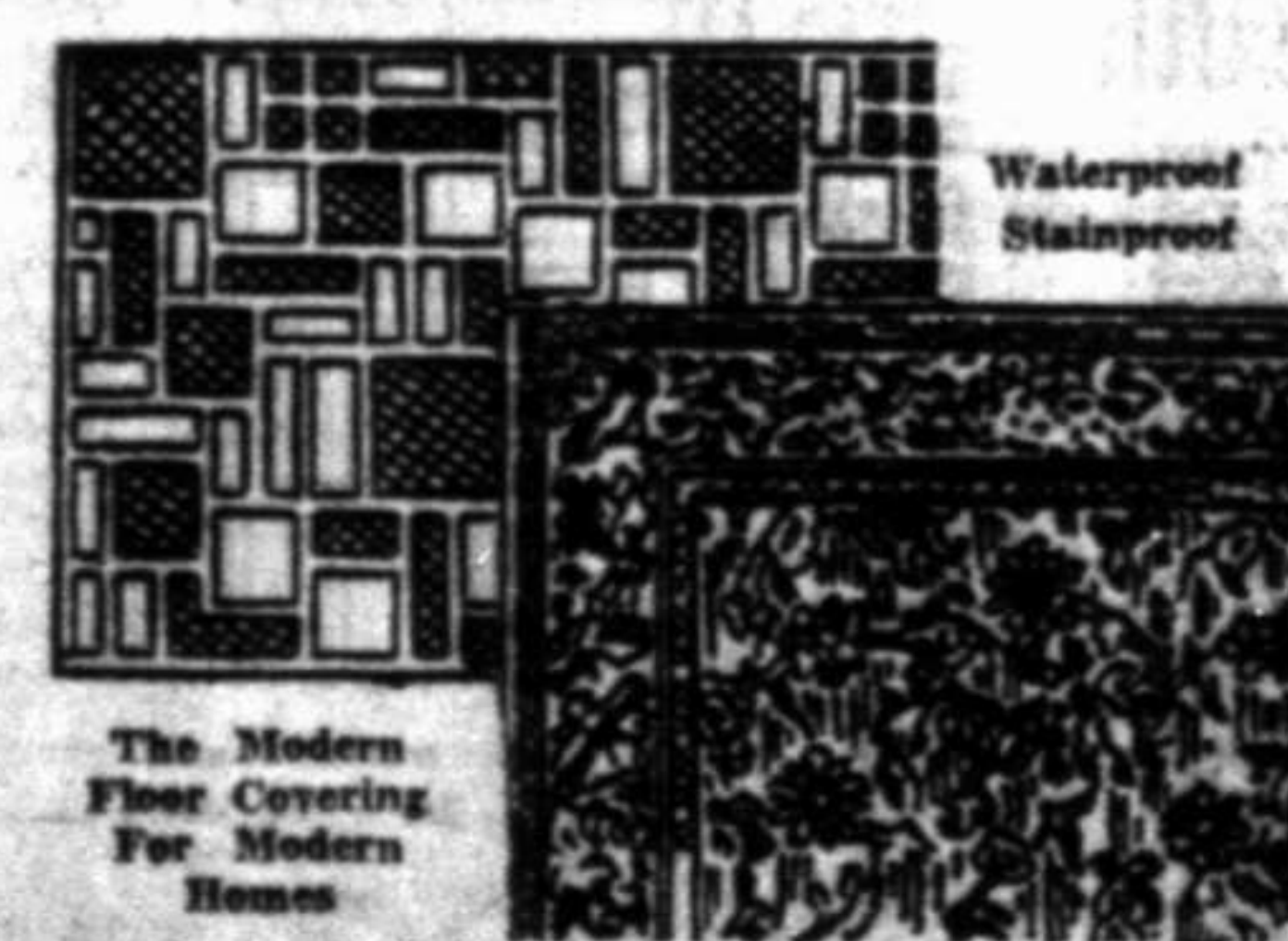

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On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

STEWART SEES NO REASON WHY TEARS NEED BE SHED IN BEHALF OF SINCLAIR

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Now that Harry F. Sinclair really is getting on into his 90-day term in jail, a good many people are beginning to feel sorry for him.

On every hand one overhears their expressions of sympathy for the poor captive.

Pictures of him did look rather melancholy, as he entered the prison portal a few nights ago. Probably he actually felt pretty good at that particular moment.

However, he soon got over it. No tears need be shed in his behalf. Even in jail, he still is plenty better off than a lot of folk outside it.

In the first place, it is all nonsense to say that Sinclair is treated exactly like any other prisoner.

Major W. L. Peak, the jail superintendent, undoubtedly means to have him treated like all the others. But can the major erase from all his subordinates' minds—yes, and from the prisoners'—consciousness of the fact that Harry can scatter a handful of million-dollar tips around as easily as not, if he chooses, when his 90 days are up?

Major Peak is a fair man. If ever there was one, but it is easy enough to see that the oil magnate gets the "breaks" from all hands, every time he turns around in the District of Columbia bastille.

It was by virtue of no discrimination in his favor to be sure, that Sinclair got the best berth in the jail the very first morning of his residence there. He owes that to himself—that is to his training as a pharmacist.

The pharmacy is the pleasantest place in the institution to work in—comfortable surroundings, light duties and a large measure of privacy.

The assignment was perfectly natural and perfectly proper.

Sinclair unquestionably will make himself exceedingly useful in it.

The fact remains that he got the star assignment of the entire prison. And there were persons who wondered if he would be set to scrubbing floors—or weeding the garden—or some other menial task!

—Just to demonstrate that he is no better than anybody else.

The D. C. jail has rules which Harry will have to conform to.

Nevertheless, as Major Peak explained to me, they are more or less elastic. For instance, as a general proposition, bedtime is 9 o'clock, and everybody is supposed to turn out at or before 8:45 in the morning. But the prisoners who have special assignments cannot always keep strictly to these hours. For them allowances are made.

Illustratively, the office force—all prisoners—frequently have reports to get out, or miscegenation work to do, which keeps them working until quite late in the evening. Of course, they are not expected to get up so early.

Obviously, the pharmacist can find good reasons, whenever he likes, for staying with his tubes and reports as late as he cares to—practically adapting his working day to his own preferences.

Harry's sleeping quarters thus far have been in a big dormitory, which is not so pleasant, but it is suggested that it may be found desirable to furnish him with a cot in the pharmacy—where he will be right on hand to mix medicines, in case anyone should be taken ill unexpectedly.

His meals he will continue to take in the main mess hall—unless, possibly, as his duties pile up on him, it becomes necessary to have them sent in to him occasionally by his prescription case.

It should be distinctly understood that there will be no discrimination.

Any seeming favors that are shown to him Harry will earn by being one of the most serviceable prisoners ever housed by the District of Columbia jail. At the same time, it is lucky for him that he is an expert pharmacist.

Sinclair will not be allowed any special table delicacies. Friends have offered to send them in to him, but Major Peak vetoed this proposition promptly. The prisoners are fed well anyway. The food is not fancy, but it is clean, plentiful and well cooked. For a change, it is quite likely that Harry will not only thrive on his rations, but relish them.

Smoking is permitted.

Prisoners who are at all dependent on alcoholic refreshment—some of them suffer considerable discomfort for a while, getting used to complete abstinence from stimulants. Of course alcohol is barred absolutely—except medicinally—on prescription—from the pharmacy.

All I saw of Sinclair at Major Peak's jail was the merest glimpse, in the distance. Harry does not want to meet any outsiders, except his lawyers, who are quite frequent callers, and the institution's management makes a point of respecting his wishes.

BELIEF THAT FISH CAUSE TYPHOID IS RELIC OF DARK AGES

The notion that typhoid fever comes from fish in drinking water, from dead weeds, or from similar contaminations, is a relic of the dark age before the discoveries of Pasteur.

He proved that bacteria are responsible for infectious diseases of the type of typhoid fever. In the fifth century, B. C. writers described continued fevers of the same nature as typhoid and in the middle ages some physicians wrote descriptions of cases which are easily identified today as typhoid fever.

After Pasteur made his important announcements in 1876-1879, a German scientist, Eberth, found a short germ in the tissue of persons who had died of typhoid fever. Four years later, another investigator named Gaffky got the germ out of the tissue and made it grow. Thus he established definitely the fact that typhoid fever is caused by the germ.

The next step in the investigation was to find out how this germ spreads from one person to another, because the germ must get into the intestinal tract before it develops the disease. It was soon found that the typhoid organism is spread by sewage passing out of the human body and contaminating food, water and milk.

The lower animals do not become infected with the typhoid organism, but they can carry it about in their bodies and spread it through contaminating food supplies. Some people who recover from typhoid fever carry the germs about in their bodies and act as typhoid carriers. Feces serve as carriers of infection.

In the combat against typhoid fever, modern scientific medicine controls the condition by eliminating feces; by controlling milk, water and food supplies, and by proper treatment of the typhoid carrier. When a person is sick with typhoid fever, all his excretions are disinfected before they are disposed of.

In the battle against infectious diseases, the greatest enemy that science has to overcome is ignorance and superstition. As long as there are people who believe that typhoid fever is due to dead fish in the water, the attempt to control the disease by scientific sanitation will be difficult.

World Educators To Meet In Geneva

COLUMBIA, Mo., May 16 (AP)—A thousand teachers of the United States will join 4,000 other educators at the third biennial conference of the world federation of education associations in Geneva, Switzerland, July 25 to Aug. 2, for discussion of the modern trends of education.

Charles H. Williams, extension director of the University of Missouri here, is secretary of the federation.

The delegates will discuss the general theme, "International understanding and good will through education," and will have a part in the Herman-Jordan plan, in which five committees are concerned with world peace through education.

Discussion sections will consider kindergarten and pre-school education; rural life and rural education; the international aspect in language, science and public life. Each section will sponsor two to four separate meetings in the mornings of conference days.

General discussions will be on subjects such as Labor and education, with an address by Albert Thomas, director of the international labor office, and "The international aspect of education," by Prof. Gilbert Murray of Oxford University.

Speeches Translated
Speeches will be translated into English, French and German.

The speakers include Philander C. Claxton, former United States commissioner of education; Dr. I. K. Kishi, Japanese senator; Mrs. J. S. Valka, administrator of child welfare in Hungary; and Albert Zimmerman, director of the Geneva Institute of international relations.
